Area's Cotton Crop Stunted

## The area's cotton crop has been hit a lick by the extended cold, we

 weatherplanted.
"We don't have a good handle on it, but someone estimated that 28 per cent of the acres in the county had been lost," said Jerry Butman, manager Friona Farmers Co-op Gin.
Butman said that if the cotton gets a good break from the weather the Gary Brown at Fre could be some normal yields.
7,000 acres of cotton had been lost--20 to 30 per cent of the crop
Some of the farmers, particularly in the south part of the county, have re-planted
or milo.
milo.
"If we can keep the cotton that has been saved going there could still be some good crops, as long as they don't get any further problems from the weather," Brown said.
In the meantime, harvest is underway on the area's wheat crop, and some excellent yields have been reported on some fields. Yields of 45 to 50 bushels per acre have been reported on wheat with irrigation, and some
dryland fields have yielded over 40 bushels to the acre, thanks to the excellent start the crop had from the moisture.
Other row crops have benefited from the prolonged rainy spell, such as
sugarbeets and corn. These crops are off to excellent starts for the most sugarbeets and corn. These crops are

released this week by State released this week
Comptroller John Sharp.
Parmer County accounted for
approximately $\$ 55,000$ in approximately $\$ 51,000$ in lottery
sales during the first week, tying sales during the first week, tying
the county for eighth among the 32 the county for eight among the
counties in the Texas Panhandle. Texas sold a record-breaking $\$ 102.4$ million in lottery tickets
during its first week, Sharp during its first week, Sharp
reported. His office oversees the
game. According to lottery officials,

in Potter County between 6 a.m. May 29 and 6 a.m. June 5. Another $\$ 318,000$ in tickets were sold in Randall County.

The sales ranged down to a low $\$ 500$ in Motley County, among the 32 Panhandle counties.
Parmer County's sales were no doubt helped by out-of-state
purchasers. Swisher and Floyd purchasers. Swisher and Floyd
counties, about the same counties, about the same
population-wise, but farther from the state line, reported just $\$ 20,000$ in sales apiece. Hale County, with populous Plainview as its hub, listed its sales at $\$ 61,000-$-just
$\$ 10,000$ more than Parmer's total. $\$ 10,000$ more than Parmer's total.
In Bovina, Allsup's reported that they sold approximately 12,000 tickets during the first week, and Bandy's Restaurant sold another 2,000. Allsup's said they had
averaged paying out about $\$ 400$ per averaged paying out about $\$ 400$ per
day in prize money, with a $\$ 100$ ticket being the largest payoff.
Harris County, which includes most of the city of Houston, led the way in ticket sales, with more than
$\$ 17.9$ million sold during $\$ 17.9$ million sold during the first with about $\$ 11.7$ million in sales. Lubbock County was in eighth place, with m
in ticket sales.
Cemetery Rd. Gets Sealcoat
In addition to the 33 blocks of city streets that were sealcoated in the recent maintenance program, the Cemetery Road also was coated by the contractor, Appian Corporation. It marked the first time since the Cemetery Road was first paved for the 1.5 -mile stretch of road to be seal-coated. The
contractor also re-topped the asphalt in the interior of the contractor
Funds for re-topping the Cemetery Road came one-half from Parmer County, and one-half from the Friona Cemetery Association.
Paula Wilson, Friona City Manager, said that an effort is being made to extend 14th Street to where it will intersect with the Cemetery Road. This would enable funeral processions to
