# Islamic government leader chosen

TEHRAN, Iran (AP) - Ayatollah Ruhollah Khomeini was reported today to have picked 70-year-old Mehdi Bazargan, a Moslem nationalist who once headed Iran's oil industry, to lead a provisional Islamic gover-

The religious leader's appointment of a government is expected to bring his confrontation with Prime Minister Shahpour Bakhtiar to a head. There was a press report that Iranian troops were being reinforced outside and inside some government ministries.

The selection of Bazargan a longtime human-rights activist, was reported by opposition sources and the Tehran newspaper Ettelaat. The report could not be confirmed immediately.

Tehran's English-language daily Tehran Journal said that at a news conference later today Khomeini would openly challenge Bakhtiar by naming a rival, Islamic government for Iran

arrest Khomeini if he tried to supplant the sitting government. He also warned his foes he would "answer Molotov cocktail for Molotov cocktail" if they carried out Khomeini's threat to launch a holy war to oust him.

Bazargan is believed to have acted as a go-between in secret negotiations between Bakhtiar and the Khomeini camp.

Khomeini says the Bakhtiar government, appointed by the shah, is illegal and vows to abolish the monarchy and establish a religiously oriented republic.

Opposition sources describe the negotiations as a "tug of war" for the allegiance of the Iran's 430,000-man current power struggle.

The military high command supports Bakhtiar and has hinted at an army takeover if Khomeini's forces attempt to depose the prime minister. But Khomeini's aides claim up to 60 percent of the troops side with them.

Cotton farmer Clifford Hamilton of Shallowater rolled his John Deere onto a bridge spanning the Potomac at 6:01 a.m. leading a 25-mile-long caravan of blinking amber lights. Hamilton, who left home on Jan. 12, completed his 2,100-mile trek covering the final 28 miles at a 12 mph pace.
"I tell ya, it feels good," cackled

Hamilton over his CB and hundreds of farmers following him cheered lustily into their radio microphones.

Farmers flew a red, white and blue AAM flag from atop the Agriculture Department and plastered windows and walls with posters of Agriculture Secretary Bob Bergland - with a target superimposed across his face.

Scores of city police and federal security guards watched helplessly as the farmers rolled their diesel monsters to a stop. Officers offered no opposition and joked with farmers in

# Area is blanketed by snow

It wasn't expected, but nevertheless, the white stuff began to pile up around 5 o'clock in the Big Spring area this morning

According to Bill Fryrear, research leader at the Experiment Station, an inch of snow was recorded at 8 a.m. and another half-inch had accumulated on top of that by mid-

"It's kind of late for this type of weather, but it has happened before," he said. "We had expected some rain maybe -- possibly snow flurries, but didn't really expect the moisture to accumulate as it has.

Despite the snow and ice, Big Spring students made an effort to get to school this morning. Some made it, some didn't. Those who nearly didn't continued to straggle in through the

Bauer, College Heights and Lakeview schools reported that their attendance was a little over half of normal by mid-morning with students still arriving. Buses were late in some cases up to an hour-but nearly all of the school faculty arrived in time for

classes to begin on schedule. Harold Bentley, assistant superintendent of personnel and instruction of the school district, said that no official count had yet been taken, but he estimated that a 25 per

cent absenteeism would be shown for

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) - An old controversy over locating a new prison in the Lower Rio Grande Valley could come to life again in the Texas Senate this week.

Sen. Bill Moore, D-Bryan, served notice he will try to bring up his bill (S.B. 245), enabling the prison system to sell its Blue Ridge farm and spend the money on land elsewhere in the state.

Sen. Raul Longoria, D-Edinburg, said he will attempt by amendment to limit the bill unless he receives assurances from prison officials they would not try again to put a prison close to Edinburg.

Without such assurances, Longoria said Saturday, he will offer an amendment prohibiting construction of a prison in Hidalgo County west of U.S. 281.

Moore's bill would drop a legal requirement that any proceeds from selling the Blue Ridge farm in Harris County be used to buy land within a 75-mile

radius of Huntsville. It also would enable the prison system to swap the farm for other land.

The bill would clear away the legal impediments cited by former Attorney General John Hill, an opinion that blocked the \$8 million purchase of 6,740 acres near Edinburg last April.

Edinburg city officials opposed purchase of the land, saying they do not want their city to become a prison town.

Longoria said prison board member Joe La Mantia of McAllen, who heads the site selection committee, had "told me they will not recognize any place where the local people don't want a prison."

He said he wants further assurances from W.J. Estelle, director of the Texas Department of Corrections.

An assistant director, Jack Kyle, told the Senate Finance Committee last week the department still wants the Edinburg site.

FORT WORTH, Texas (AP) - A Fort Worth woman says she would spare no expense, and would even sell her house and belongings, if she could convince prosecutors not to try Cullen Davis again.

A mistrial was declared in the Fort Worth millionaire's Houston murder-for-hire trial when jurors failed to reach a verdict. But prosecutors have said they will seek a new

"I think Mr. Curry's a nice guy, I really do. I do think he's been given some bad advice," she said, adding she believes Davis' Houston trial resulted from Curry's "desperate" efforts to make up for "the asinine mistake

Davis was acquitted of capital murder charges in Amarillo in 1977 that stemmed from the shooting death of his stepdaughter.

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# Caucus head to fight Clayton

AUSTIN (AP) - The chairman of the House Mexican-American caucus has vowed to block House Speaker Billy Clayton's election to any statewide office in 1982.

Rep. Paul Moreno, D-El Paso, said Sunday he expects Clayton to run for governor, and he will do everything he can to prevent the Speaker's election.

Clayton has said this term will be his last as speaker as he is thinking of running for a state office.

'I'm going to do all within my power to make sure my people know exactly what Billy Clayton has done to the Mexican-Americans in this House. And I'm going to make darn sure that when he runs for governor the Mexican-American and the Chicano is lined up against him," Moreno

said onhhe radio-television news panel show "Capital Eye."

Moreno said Mexican-Americans were insulted by Clayton's committee appointments, which reduced the number of committee chairmanships held by Mexican-Americans.

Moreno also disagreed with Gov. Bill Clements' support for reviving the Bracero program. The Bracero program allows Mexican nationals to work legally in Texas.

Moreno said he worked in an administrative job in the program and saw first hand what it was.

"Legalized slavery," was Moreno's definition of the Bracero program. He said wage scales were substandard and working conditions were poor

# McCrory a 'prisoner in solitude of fear'

DALLAS (AP) — David McCrory, the state's key witness in the Cullen Davis murder-for-hire trial, said he is a prisoner in the solitude of his own fear.

McCrory, 40, exchanged his testimony for federal protection, relocation and a new identity under terms of the Federal Witness Protection program.

"The price has been too damned high," McCrory told the Dallas Times Herald in a telephone interview.

Davis is free on \$30,000 bond after jurors in his murder solicitation trial in Houston failed to reach a verdict.

But McCrory said he is confined by his fear and restricted to his new hometown by provisions of the witness protection

program.
"All I try to do is stay alive," said McCrory, who added he inspects his car each time heigets in it, checking under the hood before trips to the grocery store. "I'm constantly looking over my

shoulder," the former Davis employee "I know he'll (Davis) try to have me killed sooner or later. Somebody with that kind of money can buy information to find

Davis' defense lawyer Richard "Racehorse" Haynes said McCrory's allegations that Davis has spent \$100,000

'We've not spent one dime looking for him." said Havnes.

"I just feel sorry for the folks of the community in which he is residing. McCrory branded the Houston mistrial as absurd. But said "Haynes may be the most brilliant person I have ever met.

"I can understand the jurors not believing me. I think he (Haynes) could put anyone on the stand in the country and make the jury believe what he wants them to believe. Their (defense) case was nothing but a pack of lies, though, made up by people expecting to get paid by giving false testimony.

McCrory said a U.S. attorney from Fort Worth suggested the witness protection

"He thought I had no protection at the house, and thought it was ridiculous. He told me I wouldn't live 15 minutes.

Assistant U.S. Attorney John W. Sweeney Jr., reached at his home in Fort Worth, said he would not comment Sunday night on the witness protection program



# Legislative branches need workable solutions

If we ran our personal business like Uncle Sam runs his, our credit would not inspire enough respect at any banking institution to get a loan for a

Regrettably, Uncle Sam answers to no one for his wastrel habits, so he is

forever on the shorts.

With income tax payment time not far removed, it must be distressing to most Americans to be told that each now owes \$4,087 as his or her share of the national debt.

FURTHERMORE, THAT figure is just the per-capita share of the \$899 billion national debt for each of the nation's men, women and children. When you figure the interest on top of that, it comes to another \$260

Sometimes, we must all wonder about the rationale of the Washington establishment. Sen. Robert C. Byrd, the Democratic leader in the upper house, said recently he is opposed to a constitutional amendment requiring a balanced federal budget because it would place a straitjacket on government leaders in times of deep economic trouble

The fact that 22 of the nation's 50 states had already gone on record as favoring such a control fazed Byrd and other members of the congress not one bit. Incidentally, Gov. Jerry Brown of California has been one of the most vocal supporters of such an amendment.

Byrd gives us lip service, saying he favors eliminating the federal budget's deficit but adds that a balanced budget amendment would deny the government a 'fiscal tool' to prevent recession from mushrooming into economic depression.

Byrd says that many states are able to operate without deficit spending because they don't have responsibility of providing national defense and because they receive extensive aid from the federal government.

Texas is one of those rare states which has been able to operate in the black the past few years. Some of our neighboring states aren't so lucky and have to depend on federal handouts to

MOST EVERYONE IS convinced that the federal government could do a better job of handling its money by cutting back on wasteful programs and eliminating the excesses some parts of the bureaucracy is guilty of.

It should not be necessary for the states to try and force the federal government to live by a spending limit amendment. Some very effective safety valves would have to be written into the amendment or the United States could occasionally run into real

trouble in dealing with an emergency Some tax payers probably need to be reminded that not all our national debt is owed in Washington, that foreign powers hold \$121 billion of our markers. Much of that is payable to the oil-rich Arab nations, the same countries which used to look to us for help and succor.

The new 96th Congress could take its place in the tax payers' Hall of Honor by balancing the budget by the end of 1980. It can do it only by reducing the amount of oil imports and by developing domestic energy.

How to reduce the over-spending and cut back the use of our energy resources will, no doubt, occupy a great deal of the Congress' time. We'd better all pitch in to help and pray the legislative branch of government comes up with some workable solutions.

## Not popular

WASHINGTON - As each president lays down the controls of government, he leaves behind a few appointees who don't want to go back to Pocatello. They're the perennial survivors, who always seem to find a roosting place in government. They bounce from one top policymaking position to another with apparent immunity to changes in political

One of the most durable of these nine-lived cats is James Schlesinger, the gray-haired, pipe-smoking, professorial energy secretary. Schlesinger, who'll be 50 next week, has gravitated around the center of power since 1969, when Richard Nixon appointed him an assistant budget

SINCE HIS RELATIVELY modest entry into the Washington merry-goround, Schlesinger has been riding high through three administrations. He served alternately as Atomic Energy chairman. Central Intelligence director, Secretary of Defense and, after a brief eclipse when Gerald Ford fired him from the Pentagon, as energy czar under

Jimmy Carter. Schlesinger is the kind of Ivy League egghead who seems to have an irresistible appeal for presidents summa cum laude graduate of Harvard, university professor, alumnus of the RAND corporation and author of learned treatises on ab-

struse national issues. Perhaps for the same reasons Schlesinger is also the kind of presidential appointee who has a highly resistible appeal to the pragmatic politicians on Capitol Hill, who must measure what should be done against the practicalities of what can be done.

Schlesinger's political relations with Congress are "a disaster," one congressional aide told our reporter J.D. Solomon. "Phone calls don't get answered and letters to him disappear, even ones from committee chairmen.

"He's simply imperious," said another Senate inside

"I've never heard one consumer organization say anything good about him," said a spokesman for a leading solar energy group. And in a speech last fall, Ralph Nader called for Schlesinger's resignation, suggesting that the guardian of the public's energy interests might be more at home working for the industries he should be controlling.

While a full-scale "dump Schlesinger" movement has not yet surfaced on Capitol Hill, Rep. Robert Drinan, D-Mass., is an outspoken foe. 'For over a year we've been calling him Carter's biggest mistake," a Drinan aide said. "Now we're hoping to generate support to get rid of him."

OTHER LEGISLATORS, including Reps. Toby Moffett, D-Conn., and Richard Ottinger, D-N.Y., are ready to join a move to ax Schlesinger. Recent public attacks on the energy czar by Sens. Henry Jackson, D-Wash., and Ted Kennedy, D-Mass., lend at least tacit support to Drinan's

campaign. As we noted, Schlesinger's staying power is remarkable; he may weather this latest storm successfully. But as the cost of heating homes and driving automobiles continues to soar, the Energy Department's lack of enthusiasm for alternate sources of energy, like solar heat and Mexican natural gas, may make Washington's most durable poohbah vulnerable at last.

WATCHING THE WATCHDOG:

The government's professional watchdogs are growling in discontent. A recent internal memo drafted by a group of General Accounting Office employees complains in scathing terms about overwork and administrative changes.

Sent to Deputy Comptroller General Robert F. Keller, with copies to the heads of the various divisions and offices, the memo was unsigned "for fear of reprisal."

"Employee morale may well be at its lowest ebb in 30 years," the memo said. "The silent, professional majority is disgusted, confused, repressed and tired of bureaucratic

changes Referring to the major administrative changes that were enacted to make GAO more responsive to Congress, the memo complains that the bosses' "zealousness to initiate these new concepts...may have dismissed employee morale problems too

lightly. The memo asked that a questionnaire be sent to all GAO employees, giving them a chance to voice their dissatisfactions - "with proper

measures to protect anonymity. A few weeks later, Keller responded with a memo - to the entire GAO staff, since, as an aide pointed out, "we don't know who these people were who wrote the memo." Keller explained that the agency's workload has doubled, and specific requests from Congress have tripled, largely because a change in GAO's charter broadened the range of work the agency is asked to perform.

However, he ignored the suggestion of an employee questionnaire.

UNDER THE DOME: Most houses on Capitol Hill have basement apartments that can be rented out to help defray the mortgage payments. Rep. Bob Carr D-Mich., has reversed the technique. He rents out the upstairs floors and lives in the unfinished basement. Aides say this suits Carr fine because he spends little

time there anyway. -Rep. Larry McDonald, the Georgia Democrat who is so far right he caucuses with himself, is thought by critics to be one of the most impolitic members of Congress. He apparently agrees. Hanging in his office is this sign: "Politicians and drunks not permitted on premises.'

WASHINGTON-Hand-wringing by champions of U.S.-Soviet detente, in and out of the Carter administration, over the theme of Teng Hsiao-ping's visit confirms the timely warning he trumpeted: be on guard!

In private meetings with President Carter and public utterances, Teng has exhorted Americans to stand up to the Soviet Union-especially in his Tuesday meetings with Congressmen. His message then: Sign all the agreements with Moscow you want. But be resolute in facing Soviet "hegemonists"; that means you must act, not just talk.

That is dissonant language for the ears of Secretary of State Cyrus Vance and his principal adviser on Soviet affairs, Dr. Marshall Shulman, because it undercuts their global strategy: do not offend Moscow. That strategy is precisely why Teng feels a lecture for Americans on the menace of the polar bear is essential.

THUS IS THE first visit here of a Chinese communist leader filled with irony. The very diplomats, academicians and politicians who have clamored for ties with Peking for a generation are embarrassed by Teng's warning that the U.S.-Soviet cold war persists. Some of the very Carter administration officials who insisted on "normalization" want to gag Peking's anti-Soviet voice.

Nothing better illustrates this than the experience at Monday's state dinner of actress Shirley MacLaine. one of the legion of American visitors the past decade entranced by the totalitarian cadence of Maoist dictatorship. When she exclaimed delightedly about her experiences in China in 1973, she was hurried down the receiving line by MacLaine Undismayed proceeded at the Kennedy Center gala to praise China's Maoist leaders now believed to be under house arrest at

Teng's preference ran not to Shirley MacLaine or even such longtime crusaders for "normalization" as Harvard's Dr. John Fairbank, placed at the No. 1 table with Carter and Teng. It was only Sen. Henry M. Jackson, a Democrat long denigrated by the Shirley MacLaines of his party as a cold warrior, who received special attention and warmth from the Chinese leader in the White House

receiving line. Jackson had long and amicable talks with Teng in Peking in 1974 and 1978 (in between which Teng was purged by the Maoists), and he probably has a closer relationship with the vice premier than any other U.S. official. But beyond friendship, Teng's embrace of the Senate's most important critic of U.S.-Soviet detente was an intentional message.

One reason that message was necessary was that only a bland press statement, not an official comnunique putting forth a common front against Moscow, ended the Washington phase of Teng's visit. U.S. officials say the Chinese made clear from the outset they normally do not issue communiques. If so, that practice evoked sighs of relief at the State Department

Teng's visit has been dreaded in Foggy Bottom by Prof. Shulman and his followers who fear any provocation of the Kremlin might not only endanger the SALT II arms control pact but so disturb the Russians that they would further destabilize world order. Word seeped out of the State Department to beware of the charismatic Teng sucking us into the new Indochinese war





# Three treatments possible for toxic goiter

Paul E. Ruble, M.D.

Dear Dr. Ruble: My doctor has advised me to have radioactive treatment for my goiter. I am 43. Do you consider this safe? The alternative is to take about 12 little pills daily for it over a year. I was told that with the radioactive treatment I would still have to take some medicine for life anyway. It's my choice. Can you help me understand things a bit more? - D.M.

Radioactive iodine (I-131) is accepted treatment and considered safe Toxic goiter is an enlargement of the thyroid gland, which is located in the neck. The enlargement occurs because the gland is overactive. The goal, then, is to reduce this overactivity. The I-131 does this by attacking the overactive tissue in the gland There are other ways to do this and I'll touch on them later on.

Whichever approach is taken vou can't predict precisely how much of the thyroid hormone will still be produced afterward. The dose of radioactive iodine has to be estimated. If the hormone production is too low afterward, oral supplements (hormones) have to be used to take up

One alternative treatment is surgery to cut out the gland (thyroidectomy). The surgeon usually leaves enough gland tissue to produce near normal supplies of the hormone But again, these matters cannot be predicted, so low activity may result and oral supplements needed.

The oral medicine treatment is effective, but, as you mention, it is a long and sometimes inconvenient way to accomplish what surgery or the radioactive iodine does in relatively short order.

There is seldom universal agreement about which approach is best in treating gland conditions, so it's an individual matter. Some form of supplement will probably be needed for life. If you are in poor health or have heart or lung problems the iodine method would eliminate the

risk of surgery. So, of course, would the longer, pill method. The radioactive iodine technique is not used with women of childbearing age

or who are pregnant Dear Dr. Ruble: Does the medical profession know what causes itching of the skin? I am 65 and have been bothered with "jock itch" for a number of years. What is the best treatment - P.W.S.

Hundreds of causes for itching are known because many organisms and other irritations can be involved. The skin is the body's first line of defense and itching is one way it has of telling us of something amiss. Jock itch is most often caused by a fungus that thrives in the warm, moist enthe same conditions responsible for athelte's foot. The name comes from athletic supporters, which are confining and abrasive. The chief danger is of secondary infection by bacteria. You have to begin with a careful control program, usually including anti-fungal applications. If there is secondary infection other medicines are needed. Obesity may be a factor. You might also consider an allergy to clothing material or to laundry soaps. If it's a serious problem you may have to see a dermatologist to get started on you

control program. Dear Dr. Ruble: Please say whether or not using a rocking chair will help the legs and ankles. G.M.N.

The rocking chair was popularized by the late President Kennedy. He had a back problem that limited physical activity. The rocker was recommended as an enjoyable and seden-

tary activity. It doesn't help keep the legs mobile and may even stimulate circulation and aid muscle tone a bit. But an hour of rocking won't shed many calories. For severely crippled arthritics it is sometimes one of the few exercises available. It can be a good "warm up" activity to be followed by a bit of walking about. It does allow use of the knees and

Dear Dr. Ruble: If I'm driving along and have a coughing spell sometimes I will get momentary dizziness. I recover quickly, but it is scary. What causes this? What can be done for it? - H.W.

Scary and unsafe. Coughing may create pressure in the chest cavity and interfere with return of blood to the heart. This may bring a temporary drop in blood pressure and dizziness. Find the cause of the coughing - probably smoking too much, or some other irritation. Your thyroid plays a critical health

## Kid discrimination

WASHINGTON (AP) -The Supreme Court today agreed to judge the validity of a Social Security law that denies mothers' benefits to otherwise eligible women who were not married to the

deceased wage earner. The justices said they will study a federal judge's ruling that the law discriminates against children whose mothers and fathers live together out of wedlock.

The high court was told the marriage requirement law's invalidation could add \$60 million a year to Social Security claims.

ployment. A portion of the Social Security Act provides insurance benefits to the mother of a child whose

wage-earner father dies. The payments are intended to replace the support lost by the wage earner's death to enable the woman to choose between working and staying at home to care for her child.

Children of deceased wage earners also are eligible for benefits up to age 18, or in some instances age 22.

When Norman W. Boles died in 1971, his widow. Nancy, and their two sons in Wilson County, Tenn., were awarded mothers' and children's insurance benefits. Nancy and Norman Boles

had married in 1967.

K was flabbergasted. She then asked you, Dear Abby, the great oracle, "Is that a proper question to ask a female applicant, or am I getting all shook up about a legitimate request for information?"

Your naive response: "When a new employee is hired, the employer makes an investment in time and training, and therefore has the right to know if the applicant plans to have a family or not - and, if so, when.' Abby, that question was not only improper, it was IL-LEGAL. Please set the record straight.

DEAR J.: I did set the record straight in my column of Jan 15, but I'm still being assaulted by a hail of mail! There's a lesson to be learned here: that which is legical is not

DEAR ABBY: Concerning the woman who was asked in a job interview if she planned to have a baby in the future: It is unlawful for a job interviewer to ask that question. The following are some do's and don'ts for questions during employment interviews. Bear in mind that some questions may not be asked prior to hiring because the law forbids them. Other questions, while not forbidden by law, might later be the basis for legal action. Questions that should not be asked:

What is your age? What is your date of birth? Do you have children? If so, how old are they? What is your race?

What church do you attend? Are you married, divorced, separated, widowed or single? Have you ever been arrested? What kind of military discharge do you have? What clubs or organizations do you belong to? Do you rent or own your own home? What does your wife (husband) do?

Who lives in your household? Have your wages ever been attached or garnisheed? What was your maiden name (in interviews with female

Questions that may be asked?

How many years experience do you have? (To a housewife) Why do you want to return to work? What are your career goals? Who have been your prior employers?

Why did you leave your previous job? Are you a veteran? Did the military provide you with job related experience?

If you have no phone, where can we reach you? What languages do you speak fluently? Can you do extensive traveling? Who recommended you to us?

What did you like, or dislike, about your previous jobs? What is your educational background? What schools did

What do you think are your strong points? Weaknesses?

Do you have any objection if we check with your former employer for references?

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



Similar measures have been considered for the last four years and have passed the Senate twice. Both proposals — by Sens. Tom Creighton of Mineral Wells and Bob Price of Pampa suggest a capitalization rate of 10 percent or 2 percent greater than the average variable interest rate specified by the Federal Land Bank of Houston whichever figure is larger.

AUSTIN — The Texas Arts and Humanities Commission wants its budget quadrupled even though top state officials are asking agencies to hold down or cut spending.

The commission requested an increase in its two-year budget from the current \$1.9 million to \$8 million But the Legislative Budget Board recommended \$1.7 million.

Supporters of the commission programs say the additional expenses won't cost the state money in the long run. Arts programs will attract tourist dollars and new industries, they say.

Most of the requested increase would be to expand its grant program which helps sponsor art programs around the state.

Since the commission was formed in 1965 it has funded programs such as the Chicano Film Festival, young peoples concerts in Huntsville schools, a resident sculptor for a month in Coriscana and the Abilene Community Band

Commission director Allan Longacre wants the arts taken to small communities through the program. He said 50,000 Texans attended Houston Grand Opera performances in 18 Texas towns including towns as small as Schulenberg.

"Most of these audiences were seeing live opera for the first time," Longacre

Currently an appropriations rider requires communities to match dollar for dollar any state funds used to sponsors arts programs. Because of the limited budget local communities are having to produce \$8 for every state dollar, Longacre said.

But the prospects for more funding are uncertain. Legislators are considering agency requests, the LBB and gubernatorial recommendations.

Before leaving office, Gov. Dolph Briscoe recommended a \$7.1 million two-year budget for the commission. Gov. Bill Clements hasn't representative



'parity' for what they sell. Depending on your point of view, the government's own figures show that the farmers have a case in seeking higher price guarantees for wheat, cotton and other commodities.

The Agriculture Department says the parity ratioan indicator that relates farm prices and expenses rose last year from its 1977 average.

But department records also show that, even with that increase, the indicator was the third lowest in 45 years.

For years, various administrations and many agricultural economists have called the old parity formula a poor indicator of farmers' actual financial condition.

But parity hangs on, parity. written into farm laws by Congress to help adjust federal price supports on many commodities, from milk to wheat.

It is a mathematical standard a concept going back to before World War I. that in the 1930s was defined

WASHINGTON (AP) - As get for various commodities they did a year ago, farmers with prices they have to pay

A base period for the years 1910-14 is used in the formula. Theoretically, at parity, farmers would have the same purchasing power they had in 1910-14.

In other words, as commonly used, a guarantee of parity would insure that farm commodity prices would go up enough to keep pace with rising costs of production. The Agriculture Depart-

ment is required by law to publish adjusted parity figures on many commodities each month to reflect changes in costs and inflation. Thus, parity 'floats' according to those changes.

For example, the parity price of wheat at the farm in January was \$5.61 a bushel A year ago it was \$5 a bushel. But farmers' costs have risen since then, and so has

Other commodities are computed and reported in a similar way. A composite parity ratio also is computed for all the major commodities as a single group.

# Federal investigation widened in Gregg County

LONGVIEW, Texas (AP) - Federal investigators apparently have widened their already sweeping investigation into allegations of gambling, prostitution, drug trafficing and official corruption in Gregg County.

Two newspapers reported Sunday that federal investigators are also looking into possible civil rights violations and the alleged misuse of county funds and The Longview Morning-Journal reported Sunday that

the financial records of more than 20 prominent residents and elected officials of the East Texas county have been subpoenaed. Longview is the Gregg County seat. And the Dallas Morning News reported in its Sunday editions that indictments are expected to be returned

against some prominent county residents. Authorities expect as many as 250 persons to testify before a federal grand jury during the investigation that could take up to six months. The grand jury is scheduled

to convene Feb. 21 in Tyler. We're not seeking indictments. We're investigating. Once that grand jury starts returning indictments, we can't use it to investigate anymore," said William L. Hinshaw, supervisory special agent of the Tyler FBI

The probe has mushroomed since 28 Dallas and Tyler FBI agents raided two suspected gambling operations

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


