Gas rationing plans prepared for Congress

WASHINGTON (AP) - The White House prepared to send Congress standby plans for gasoline rationing today, but Energy Secretary James R. Schlesinger assured the nation's governors that rationing would be used only as a last resort.

LEAVING FLOODED HOMES — Chauncey residents

Schlesinger said rationing would not be used as a result of the loss of Iranian oil, but that other mandatory, energy-saving measures proposed by the administration might be imposed if the Iranian cutoff continues for a

'We will not come to rationing because of what is a relative shortfall shutdown, Schlesinger told the natural resources committee of the National Governors' Association.

Schlesinger spoke as the White House was about to send Congress its standby plan for rationing and other steps, including allocation of crude oil among refineries and possible restrictions on weekend retail sales of gasoline and diesel fuel.

Schlesinger predicted possible gasoline shortages this summer due to the Iranian shutdown, and said some mandatory steps contained in the administration's contingency plan might be triggered.

Asked about the plan for barring gasoline sales on weekends, he said that if this step is taken the administration might consider allowing states to pick a weekday if they

However, Schlesinger said he hoped such harsh steps would not be required at all.

He told the governors that gasoline prices probably will rise 10 cents a gallon because of the combined effect of Iran caused shortages and recent price increases voted by oil-producing

Asked about published reports the rationing plan would limit gasoline use to two gallons or less per day per registered vehicle, Schlesinger said that figure was an average based on "the typical car."

However, when pressed further on what the actual rationing quantities would be and would have to check it

Earlier, Energy Department spokesman James Bishop said reports of the two-gallon limit were a "total fabrication" and that the standby rationing plan contained no specific

Any gasoline rationing plans probably will be based on the assignment of coupons to owners of registered vehicles, according to sources who asked for anonymity. The coupons could be freely bought and

Schlesinger told the House Budget Committee last week that the loss of Iranian oil production during the political turmoil there could lead to mandatory steps to insure an adequate supply of heating oil next winter, causing a reduction in 'gasoline availability.'

Israeli Cabinet rejects invitation

JERUSALEM (AP) - The Israeli Cabinet today rejected an American invitation for Prime Minister Menachem Begin to attend a Camp David summit meeting without President Anwar Sadat of Egypt. Begin said last week's Camp David talks produced no progress and accused the Egyptians of hardening their position.

The Israeli decision indicated serious problems for the American effort to mediate a Mideast peace between Israel and Egypt.

'The Cabinet decided that the prime minister is not in a position to accept the proposed meeting with Prime Minister (Mustafa) Khalil," Begin said after the Cabinet meeting. The vote against Begin going was 14-2.

Begin said Foreign Minister Moshe Dayan had reported to the Cabinet on President Carter's proposal that Begin and Khalil meet at Camp David with Secretary of State Cyrus R. Vance. Dayan had returned from five days of talks at Camp David with Khalil.

Though Israel made counter-proposals, Begin said, "Prime Minister Khalil insisted on the Egyptian proposals.

Vietnam reports fierce fighting near Hanoi

BANGKOK, Thailand (AP) — Vietnam reported fierce fighting today in the northwest corridor to Hanoi and said its forces wiped out 2.000 Chinese there from Friday to Monday

The official Voice of Vietnam said the fighting was concentrated in the Cam Duong area which sits astride the Red River delta corridor which runs from the frontier to the Vietnamese capital.

The broadcast also said two more Chinese companies were decimated in Lang Son province northeast of Hanoi Monday and another 250 Chinese soldiers were killed or wounded in the past two days in Phong Tho district of Lai Chau province.

Phong Tho is 15 miles inside Viet-

nam and 190 miles northwest of Hanoi. President Carter called on China to undertake "a speedy withdrawal" from Vietnam, in a message given to top Chinese leaders by Treasury Secretary W. Michael Blumental who is visiting Peking. It was the bluntest statement to date of American opposition to the war.

But intelligence sources in Bangkok noted that the Chinese showed no signs of a withdrawal after 10 days of fighting and in fact were still reinforcing their troops in some frontier areas, including Lang Son.

Vietnam claimed Monday its troops were holding fast in the Cam Duong area and inflicted heavy casualties on the invaders at the other end of the

Minimum charge increased \$1.50

City water costs go up April 1

The final reading of an ordinance

boosting Big Spring's water rates passed during this morning's meeting of the city council

Big Springers packed the meeting. but most came to either ask questions or just listen

A typographical error in the published council agenda in regard to the increase may have contributed to the high attendance. The agenda had mistakenly listed 2,000 gallons rather than 3,000 gallons under the specified monthly minimum charge for water. The mistake was cleared up during

the opening minutes of the meeting. Effective in April 1, the minimum monthly charge will be \$5.75 for the first 3,000 gallons of water used. Water in excess of 3,000 gallons will cost 85 cents per 1,000 gallons. The minimum charge is presently \$4.25

for the first 3,000 gallons. Residential and commercial charges are identical under the new

rate schedule. During discussion, Tina Arguello, 1208 Madison, asked whether the city would refund excess revenues from water sales at the end of the year.

City Manager Harry Nagel explained that excess revenues were very unlikely

"Using a housing study done in June of 1977, we found that meters from multi-family units, other homes, duplexes and trailers will produce an estimated \$92,376 in revenues during the rest of the fiscal year," he said, pointing to figures on a blackboard.

Nagel further explained that since new rates will not go into effect until April, they will only be collected for half of the fiscal year. With a monthly increase in water costs of \$11,906 from

District, an estimated deficit of \$14,778 will result at the end of the

Pat Githens, an employee of KBYG Radio Station, then rose to ask Nagel whether the increase would cover the deficit by the end of the fiscal year created by the transfer of over \$100,000 from the city's water and sewer fund to the general fund. "I sincerely doubt it," replied

Nagel. The city manager noted that budget revisions are under way, and that revenue sharing funds, water sales, meter setting fees and fees for maintenance may "blacken the water

"What will happen to the general fund if you don't have money to transfer from the water fund?" asked

"I don't know, but we hope to find a

E.A. Fiveash, 803 E. 14th, also had a question for Nagel.

"According to the information you've provided, the revenues are based on minimum consumption. In many places much more than the minimum amount of water is used. Where does this extra revenue fit in?"

"Water sales have been down during the first of this period; even lower than two years ago. That contributes to the deficiency. The best we can do is look at the billions of gallons used, and make an estimate." replied Nagel.

Clements' plan might lighten BSISD taxes

Contrary to critics' claims, Governor Bill Clements envisions a lighter burden for Big Spring Independent School Distirct taxpayers over the next two years.

If Clements has his way, property owners within the district, will get \$712,000 in direct tax relief. The extra state aid would mean a 27 percent drop in current school tax levy. And so long as taxes stay at or below

designated levels, the district would qualify for more state aid to cover higher operating costs and an increase in its share of the foundation school program's cost.

Coahoma ISD taxpayers would get \$57,000 or almost 6 percent in relief under the Clement's proposal.

Forsan ISD is in a special category of sparsely populated districts. Forsan could increase tax levies and still receive state funds.

The local relief is a part of Clement's overall plan to return one billion dollars in tax relief beyond the cuts already authorized by the 1978 Tax Relief Amendment.

Legislators are expected to shy away from the plan, opting instead for smaller tax cuts advocated by the legislative Budget Board.

Actually, only \$554 million would go directly to state taxpayers under the Clements proposal. School districts

would keep \$117 million for operating costs and another \$189 million would bc absorbed by increases in the local share of the state's basic educational Clements maintains that the

proposed tax cuts are both necessary and reasonable. The plans detractors, notably Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby, contend the governor is seeing dollar signs where none exists.

Rather than relieve tax burdens. Hobby says Clements will exacerbate taxpayers' woes. Big Spring ISD taxpayers, he says, would have to pay \$83,833 more for their children's education.

Clement's acknowledges his plan will cause a local share increase, but says it would be offset by a maximum allocation of \$230 per student he plans to give school districts that follow his

Big Spring, for example, would have to reduce its total tax levy from \$2.5 million to \$1.8 million to be eligible for state funds. The extra aid, Clements said, will cover any new costs and provide the district with a 7 percent increase in funds available to expand its basic school program.

In general, the less a school district''s property wealth, the more tax relief it would receive. No district would have taxes cut by more than 50 percent of current levies.

Action / reaction: 'Driving habits'

Q. How can 'driving habits' influence better gas mileage? A. For one thing, avoid jackrabbit starts and stops. Most people press the gas pedel down too far, pumping more fuel through the engine than it can handle. Accelerating hard and then jamming on the brakes at the next light wastes fuel and wears out the brakes faster. Don't start the engine until you are ready to go. Many start the motor as soon as they get into the car, then adjust the mirror, buckle the seat belt and wait for their passengers to get in. And don't run the engine while waiting for the driven bank teller to process your deposit. If the engine is warm, it takes almost no fuel to start it.

Police strike produces 'strangest' Mardi Gras

Because of a police strike, today is the strangest Mardi Gras in 261 years of New Orleans history.

Also scheduled today was a resumption of talks between the city and the Teamsters-affiliated Police Association of Louisiana, which represents the 1,100 officers who have been on strike since Feb.

Some of the bitterness engendered by the strike appeared Monday in a full-page newspaper advertisement in which all seven members of the City Council urged the union to hold a secret ballot to determine whether police want to continue their

The ad referred to "Detroit Teamster tactics." City officials have repeatedly referred to Teamsters negotiator Joe Valenti of Detroit as an outside agitator. Valenti and other union officials could not be reached for comment, but picketers debunked the ad.

What do we need a secret ballot for?" said a 3rd District officer, who asked not to be named. "The last time we took a voice vote, it was unanimous.

Several strikers ridiculed the idea that any officer might have felt intimidated into siding with the majority on the voice

Regardless of the outcome of the negotiations and even though the street party was expected to attract thousands of carousers, some felt it was too late to salvage the heart of the boisterous Mardi



Texas senators tired of 'Easterners law'

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — Texas senators say they are tired of Easterners trying to set the highway speed limits

"These little old states in the East with about three miles of freeway want to set the speed limits for the rest of us," Sen. John Traeger, D-Seguin, told the Senate State Affairs Committee Monday.

By unanimous voice vote, the committee cleared for full Senate debate a resolution calling on Congress to pass a pending bill letting states set their own speed limits — without loss of any highway funds if the limits exceed the federally approved 55 miles-per-hour.

If approved by the Senate, the resolution goes to the

"Oklahoma passed this recently and I think Texas should join them and pass this too," said Traeger.

Under present federal law a state is subject to losing any federal funds being used for highway purposes if that state does not comply with the 55 mph limit to conserve o'landgasoline supplies.

It has been estimated Texas could lose up to \$400,000 if it raised the 55 mph limit to 70 mph, as some legislators

Early price increase pondered by OPEC

NEW YORK (AP) — Due to the flurry of individual oil price hikes by several of its members, the Organization of Petroleum Exporting Countries may be on the verge of an additional increase in general oil prices before its scheduled April 1 hike, analysts

The latest OPEC nation to raise its crude oil price following Iran's oil cutoff is Kuwait, which told customers Monday it was tacking 9 percent onto its current price of \$13.35 a barrel, raising it to about \$14.55 a barrel. The Kuwaiti move is said by analysts to be

significant because it is one of OPEC's larger members and one of the 13-nation cartel's opinion leaders.

The supply squeeze caused by Iran's oil cutoff has been pushing prices up on the open, or spot, market, and producing nations feel the general market will bear higher prices, according to analysts. The April 1 OPEC increase is for 3.9 per-

cent. That rise is part of a four-part increase totaling 14.5 percent spread out this year. The first increase, of 5 percent, was Jan. 1. But OPEC could decide at its scheduled

Sweepstakes offer the prospect of instant wealth — and the opportunity to buy something, usually at a reduced price. Their number is growing and this is the time of the year when you can expect to get at least one of the tantalizing

Down in the fine print, you'll probably discover that your chance of winning the big prize is only one in a million or more. You have nothing to lose—except the price of a stamp -but is it really worth the effort to send the card back?

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Maybe. "It's just a matter of luck," said Betty Glass, director of sweepstakes for Reader's Digest. "The odds are probably no worse than in the state lotteries, "said Jones. A sweepstakes is a game of chance in connection with the

sale of a commodity. There is no skill involved. You do not have to buy the product being offered; if a purchase is required, the sweepstakes becomes a lottery and a separate set of laws applies.

There are no figures available on the number of sweepstakes conducted throughout the country because they fall under state rather than federal law. In New York State, the number of sweepstakes registered with the secretary of state went from 136 in 1973 to 382 last year, an increase of almost 200 percent. And industry spokesmensay that the state figures reflect the national trend

Jones said the relaxation of anti-gambling laws in some areas has helped boost interest in sweepstakes. So has a change in morality. "There's acceptance from a societal point of view," he said.

The games run by supermarkets and gas stations differ slightly from the sweepstakes offers you get in the mail, Jones said. Those games are designed to get you into the store rather than promote a product. They continue over a period of time, during which you collect numbers, symbols

with a sweepstages, you simply mall your entry and wait to see if you've won. In many cases, winning numbers are pre-selected with the aid of a computer; in other instances, winners are picked in a random drawing after all the entries

The odds against winning the big prize are huge. You have only one chance in 17½ million of getting the \$116,000 grand prize in the current Reader's Digest sweepstakes, for example. The odds of winning the minimum \$5 prize from Reader's Digest are one in 450.

New products liability bills pass easily in committee

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) -Seven bills making it harder for consumers to collect damages in court from makers of products that injure them whizzed through a Senate committee Monday.

Unanimous or nearunanimous votes sent the measures to the Senate floor for further action. It will be at least mid-March before attempts are made to bring the bills up for debate, sponsors say.

The Senate Economic Development Committee took less than 90 minutes to hear testimony and vote on the bills, which rank among the top issues of the 66th Legislature.

Sen. Ray Farabee, D-Wichita Falls, said the intent was to restore a balance between consumer and manufacturer interests that Texas court decisions had Because the skyrocketing

Government discriminates against wife

It appears some people working rithin government have come to realize that "it takes a heap of living to make a house a home." Maybe Congress itself should concede such a

A booklet authorized by Joseph Califano Jr., secretary of Health, Education and Welfare (HEW), purposes that Social Security benefits the husband more than the wife. Califano would give the distaff side full credit for playing a major role in the household

THE PLAN, as defined in the booklet, has two options - one to guarantee minimum benefit plus

whatever benefits the individual earned as income. The other would have the husband and wife to share benefits equally, regardless of who earns what amount

benefits for one wage-earner in situations in which both the husband and wife work Under present rules, a couple whose

One major provision would equalize

combined income equals that of a oneworker family receives a smaller monthly check

To cite an example, a family in which the husband has reported earnings of \$12,000 a year is entitled to a monthly Social Security benefit of

\$648. If the husband and wife earn \$6,000 each, however — the same \$12,000 — they are entitled to a benefit of \$544 each month.

It's little wonder such couples feel they're discriminated against.

The Califano proposal can be improved upon because, under his plan, the benefit for the one worker family would be reduced to that of the twoworker check. That is, in the aforementioned example, both families would get \$544 rather than \$648.

SOCIAL SECURITY benefits have not kept pace with the escalating cost of living. As a matter of fact, those depending exclusively on Social Security checks to keep the wolf away from the door are getting farther and farther behind in the financial rat

Congress should act with compunction to review the new proposals and see if it can improve upon them. Congress also needs to address itself to the problem of seeing that the Social Security program is well funded

All too many people are frightened by the prospect that Social Security will go bankrupt by the time they

I made a promise to myself that when the follow-up series "Roots: The Next Generations" came on television would not get involved in it. I don't like getting involved in series on television because I generally can't see all of the different parts and I miss some of the most important parts. But, for lack of anything else decent to watch, I became involved in the

I enjoyed the series just as I enjoyed the first series, "Roots". I was a history minor in college and things about the past always interest me. I remember with the first series there were many mixed emotions about the program. I grew up in an area where there are a high number of black people. Many of the "old-timers" thought that something of that nature should not have been aired. They thought that the subject should not have been drudged up again. Some even ventured to say that the portrayal of slave boats and slave masters was a little bit overdramatized.

MY IMPRESSION of their reactions was that the subject hit a little too closely to home. Their prejudices were being aired before them like dirty laundry. They were forced to face how their ways of thinking had caused many a human being such pain and hardship.

Even though their attitudes were not quite like those of the people in the early slavery days, there were many similarities. I can remember when the blacks in my town were not allowed to eat in the same dining room

in one of the fast-food places. When some black people from out-of-town tried to enter the dining area, the owner became furious and affronted that any black would have the audacity to eat with the whites in his establishment. And, until I was in high school, the public schools were segregated.

But for all their mixed emotions about the show, people watched it anyway. And, all truly enjoyed the series. I wonder what their reactions were to the last series. Especially since it involved a time period in which they were personally involved.

"ROOTS: The Next Generations" was good and it shows the struggles that one family went through to survive in a very realistic and artistic way. But they were not alone in their struggles. Many other blacks and many other races were put through the same struggle.

Most immigrants were persecuted because they spoke a foreign language. People were afraid of them because they could not understand them. And what they could not un-derstand they feared and that fear drove them to persecute them. Indians, Jews, Germans, Japanese and so on and so on bore the brunt of the fear of white Americans.

I feel that the story of Alex Haley and his family serves two purposes. The first is to show us what it was like to be on the other side of persecution and the second was to remind us that no matter who we are or what our heritage might be, we are all God's children and we are all loved by Him.

WASHINGTON - It appears that the U.S. Postal Service laid a gigantic turkey egg a few years ago when it shelled out \$1 billion for 21 superautomated "bulk mail centers" designed to process parcels and other non-first-class mail.

The bulk mail system was a subject of controversy from the start, and even after a five-year supposed shakedown period, the complaints are still coming in. Customers have complained to us of lost or damaged packages; employees have complained about unsafe working con-

THE LATE REP. Leo Ryan, D-Calif., had received so many gripes about the bulk mail centers that he planned to work incognito in one after he returned from his ill-fated trip to Guyana. Rep. Ron Dellums, D-Calif., investigating the San Francisco facility; postal inspectors are checking out the New York center after complaints were filed with the

U.S. attorney's office in Newark. We decided to do our own investigation, and sent our associate Vicki Warren to the Washington Bulk Mail Center in Largo, Md., where she posed as a worker. She had a chance to talk with "fellow" employees unhindered by any self-serving, banana-oil

coverups by front-office bureaucrats. The bulk mail center is a machinepowered world modeled after Charlie Chaplin's "Modern Times." Automated carts full of mail run continuously along trolley tracks, heedless both of parcels that fall off and people who get in the way. Overhead trays carry mail

from the control room.

Operators in the control room can tell how the mail is moving by watchthe flow on video screens. Unfortunately, what the screens don't show is the plight of a worker frantically trying to load a truck as fast as the conveyor belt spews the mail out. Or what happens when the assemblyline workers can't keep pace with the relentless machines and can't shut off or slow down the conveyor belt. (What happens is that the parcels spill off the belt onto the floor, where they remain for days.)

Employees at the Washington center have their own wry slogan: 'You mail'em, we maul'em." It's not the humans who are doing the mauling, though; it's the machines. Like the sack shake-out rig that empties parcels - including those marked "Fragile - Glass" - from

PACKAGES THAT get jammed in the automatic conveyors are ripped apart. Attempts are made to patch them up, but the many Humpty Dumpty irreparables end up in a parcel graveyard — a room designated "loose in the mail" and off-limits to all but a few employees. Our reporter got inside for a look around, and found thousands of items from books to homemade Christmas presents. There were so many books, in fact, that they had been arranged by topic on metal shelves.

When the "loose in the mail" room is full, the items are moved to a depository in Washington, where throughout the building, tipping their they're eventually auctioned off to the contents into chutes on command public.

WASHINGTON - I'd like to write one more snow piece. It's not really about snow, but about people. We had a major snowstorm in Washington and while it was big news in this part of the world it didn't mean much in the rest of the United States

Stomach stapling candidates rare

Dear Dr. Ruble: I would like your opinion on "gastric stapling" for losing weight. I am a 28-year-old woman. I weight 217 pounds and am 5 feet, 2 inches tall. When I joined a weight-reduction class two years ago I weighed 250. I lost 46 pounds at that time, but in the past couple of months I have gained about 12 of them back. I don't seem to be able to control my eating habits. - D.C.

The decision to recommend surgery for weight reduction, whether intestinal bypass or the newer "stomach stapling" procedure, is based on strict necessities. You are doubt ve candidate for surgery. The top-off is that you could lose 46 pounds with the weight-reduction class. That tells me that, properly motivated, you can reduce by restricting calories. That is always the best way. You mention bad eating habits. You were apparently on your way to changing those habits while you were losing 46 pounds. The question, then, is why you lost the motivation to change? I have referred to the stapling

procedure before. In it, a portion of the stomach is literally "stapled" shut, reducing its size and capacity for food. Sounds simple, but there can be problems. Reflux (upward spilling) of stomach juices into the gullet has been reported, so have perforations. Others have lost rapidly, only to become voracious milk and protein supplement drinkers afterward, regaing lost weight that way.

For some, surgery may be the only answer, but I doubt you are in that small category. The staple gun is seldom the ultimate answer to weak will at the dining table. Behavior modification group therapy may be

Dear Dr. Ruble: Can a hand splint help a stroke victim? Can it make the damaged hand come back? - Mrs.

It may not improve use of the hand, but it will help prevent contracture permanent fisting of the hand. The splint need not be tight, just enough to allow the hand to rest in an opened position. I have seen such splints made at home with stiff cardboard and masking tape. For other aspects of post-stroke living see the booklet, "Stroke — Hope and Help." The Big Spring Herald. Dear Dr. Ruble: Is it true that intelligent people need less sleep than less intelligent poeple? - Mrs. H.P.

Not true. At least one study I know of indicates that average adults sleep a third of their lives away, no matter how intelligent they are. People of intelligence may lean toward occupations that require greater mental activity. This might interfere with sleep. Depression can be a factor in shortened sleeping spans. The average college president needs as

much minimum sleep as the laborer. Dear Dr. Ruble: Why are people ith back problems such as slipped discs not sent to chiropractors, who seem to help in a short period and at less expense? Isn't this preferred over surgery or traction which takes so long and is so expensive? - Mrs. A.D.

An orthopedic surgeon and a chiropractor do different types of treatment. The chiropractor uses therapy essentially to relieve pain and keep a person comfortable with a back problem. Often, the problem is so severe that disc surgery is necessary to prevent weakness, numbness, or partial paralysis. If pain is bearable and examination shows no nerve complications, treatment by a skilled therapist is satisfactory. The dividing line between the need for surgery and the need for physical therapy is often thin. The orthopedic surgeon by virtue of his special training is equipped to say when it must be crossed.

Dear Dr. Ruble: Has homosexuality been cured by psychiatry? — B.C. Qualified psychotherapy has been successful if the person desires this change. A more common use of psychiatry is to alleviate the guilt feelings some homosexuals experience.

Dear Dr. Ruble: Please explain 'urethral stenosis.'' - G.B. The urethra is the tube-like passage urinary outlet (at the vaginal opening in women, penis in males). Stenosis is a Greek word meaning "narrowing." Urthral stenosis is narrowing of the

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) - Gov. Bill Clements says teachers are "quasi state employes" entitled to the same pay raise he has recommended for other state employes, but no more.

But the president of the Texas State Teachers Association said Monday Clements doesn't understand public education and is not living up to his promise to be all the people's governor.

'The governor has never really changed his position," said press aide Jon Ford, who was with Clements in Washington Monday

Ford said Clements favors a hike in teacher salaries equivalent to raises other state employes will receive, but objects to a Legislative Budget Board recommendation to give teachers an additional increase.

Instead, Ford said the governor favors a merit system for better teachers. Clements' proposal to erase board's



Teens attend nursery for juvenile offenders

But perhaps something will click and turn a life around. By VICTORIA GRAHAM NEW YORK (AP) Twenty-nine boys sit around a table in a blue and yellow playroom: There's a rapist,

truant, an incorrigible and a neglected child. They attend a kind of nursery school for juvenile offenders, an inner city street compressed every day into five hours and two rooms. A time-bomb air pervades the place. It feels

of frustration. "Nobody is opening any doors for these kids," says Rosalind Geraigiry, director of this nursery-day center. 'They're going to have to kick them down. But they don't even know how to turn

And these are not the "worst" kids - they are locked up. These are dabblers in delinquency, not yet dyed in crime. But with time and neglect, they could join the 74,000 juveniles in detention or correctional facilities around the nation.

Their cases are pending in family or criminal courts. Meanwhile, they won't be put in detention like some others. They attend this Manhattan Day Center because they seem to have a bit more inner strength and home support than many

other kids. Still, they have precious little going for them: fractured. fractious families, little schooling, previous

arrests. "These kids are socially primitive, 15 going on 5, still at the crawling stage," said Fred Boneri, director of the four city centers. He jokes with the kids, wrestles with them, baked their Christmas ham. He doesn't confuse the

possible with the ideal. 'How much can we do?" he asks. "We are not therapists or miracle workers. We keep them a short time until the court decides what to do. We do the

Survey shows girls more conservative

NEW YORK, N.Y. -Today's teen-age girl is still very concerned about issues pertaining to women, but she appears to be taking a more conservative direction. This is one of the findings of Seventeen Magazine's 1978 'Teen Trends Survey' conducted every two years to measure the thoughts. opinions, attitudes and activities of young women.

Equal education and training evokes the highest interest level on topics pertaining to women, with almost 94 percent of the girls interested in this issue. But while a majority of teen girls are still concerned with the passage of the Equal Rights Amendment for women, the number of those "very interested" in this issue dropped from one-third in 1976 to less than one-fourth in the current survey.

More conservative attitudes also emerged on topics concerning marriage and morality. Fewer teens approve of such issues as living together without marriage and unmarried mothers keeping their child. Less than one-third of the girls approve of premarital sex (versus 38.4 percent two years ago). Teens also took a more conservative turn on the highly controversal legalized abortion issue. The survey reports that a majority of teens no longer approve of legalized abortion (41.3 percent in 1978, as compared to 51.9 percent in

Almost one-third of all teen

political service, with their biggest contributions to student government and campaign work. Half of the girls questioned described their political views as "middle of the road." A little more than half the girls (57.8 percent) described their views as "about the same" as their parents.

In formulating opinions on political issues, the media plays a significant role among teens. Reading magazines, newspapers and books was thought to be the primary source for information, followed by television and radio.

One of the other findings in the "Seventeen Teen Trends Survey 1978" is:

While almost 60 percent of the teen-age girls attending college are currently enrolled in four-year schools, attendance at two-year schools has risen 71/2 percent since 1976.

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


The Woodmen of the World bought most of the land, and J.A. Shafer donated the remainder to the organization, to complete the remainder

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

Milk a rare commodity

NEW YORK (AP) - Milk is a rare commodity in the New York City area as a Teamsters strike continues to cripple 85 dairies with 10 million customers. Mediation was to resume today.

A run on milk touched off by an announcement of the strike during the weekend cleaned out the supplies of milk and milk products from most stores throughout the city and adjoining Long Island and southern Westchester County. One supermarket chain, Daitch-Shopwell, was maintaining its own milk supplies. Picket lines are up at each of the struck dairies. The strike also has cut off supplies of cream, skimmed milk, some cheeses, some yogurt and some ice cream mixes.

Settlement suit rejected

CHICAGO (AP) - A \$34 million settlement for persons who unknowingly bought Oldsmobiles with Chevrolet engines has been tossed out by a federal appeals court, opening the door to individual suits

The court said the federal judge who approved the settlement failed to exercise enough control over negotiations. The settlement, agreed to by General Motors and 47 attorneys general, provided that GM g ve \$200 cash to each of the 66,782 persons who brught 1977 Oldsmobiles powered by Chevrolet eagines. The settlement also included extended warranty privileges.

Cargo removed safely

BENTON HARBOR, Mich. (AP) - The radio-active cargo from a twin-engine airplane that slid off a runway at Twin Cities Airport was removed safely, authorities said. No radio-activity was released and no one was injured.

The Cessna 402 was carrying Sodium 24 to the Donald C. Cook Nuclear Plant at nearby Bridgman Monday when it skidded into a snowbank after suffering a broken strut on landing. It took workers about two hours to reove the radio-active material. Airport manager Lee Schiek said he didn't know how much radio-active material was aboard the

Stroke incidence lower

ROCHESTER, Minn. (AP) - Better treatment of high blood pressure, a cutback in smoking since a 1964 Surgeon General's report and dietary changes may have led to a dramatic decline in the incidence of stroke, say researchers at the Mayo Clinic

Stroke is the nation's third leading cause of death. Clinic researchers reached their conclusions after studying nearly 2,000 patients over a 30-year period. A decline was especially noted among the elderly, the study showed. The decline was reported in both sexes and in all age groups, but the decreased incidence was more common in the elderly

Fraternities may end

HANOVER, N.H. (AP) - The 22 fraternities and two sororities at Dartmouth College will lose sanction to operate on campus if they don't clean up their act in 12 months, the school's trustees warn.

The trustees sided with a faculty assessment that the system promotes "racism, sexism and the abuse of alcohol." According to the trustees, the fraternities and sororities have 12 months to demonstrate "they have the capacity to make a substantial positive contribution to student life." The trustees asked the faculty executive committee to evaluate efforts by the inter-fraternity council and fraternity board of overseers to change the



Sparky Anderson in Yankee pinstripes?

Sparky Anderson in New York Yankees' pinstripes in 1980 — a marriage made in heaven, George's heaven? Count Billy Martin out as a returning prodigal son. Pillowy, pleasant Bob Lemon can't wait to get out of the dugout and those silly high socks and long pants. His tenure as interim manager of baseball's most successful and volatile franchise is finished after this season - win, lose or draw. He insists on it.

So what does that leave? A rich, talent-loaded baseball team without a skipper and a highly respected, winning field general without a rein. Put them together and — whammo! — you've got powerful chemistry.

This magic merger seems inevitable to anyone studying the shifting winds and the strange vagaries of the personalities involved.

When Anderson was unceremoniously fired by the Cincinnati Reds last November, despite a record of four National League titles and two world championships, owner George Steinbrenner of the Yankees called it "the biggest boo-boo of the year." Anderson is Steinbrenner's kind of guy - dignified,

inspirational, strictly Marine spit-and-polish with a fetish for short hair, shaven chins and intense team He doesn't stray too far from George's conception of

America as "Kate Smith, apple pie and Yankee pinstripes," although Sparky may have to swallow hard to digest the last one While Sparky is fulfilling the final year of his Cin-

cinnati contract with menial jobs, Steinbrenner and Martin are back in the pits again - exchanging barbs and innuendoes. How can these two mavericks - each strong-willed

and impetuous - ever find a common ground for a harmonious relationship? They can't. It's obvious that Steinbrenner has girded himself with an escape hatch in promising to give

Martin his job back "if he carries himself in a manner that dignifies the Yankees. That's like telling a leopard to change his spots or like turning a bulldog into a purring pussy cat. Dignity

is not Billy Martin's long suit - never was and never will be. Steinbrenner knew that when he hired the fiesty firebrand as the Yankees' pilot in August 1975. Billy the Kid's record, first as player, then as manager of Minnesota, Detroit and Texas, reads like a

page from the Ring Record Book. He has spent his career feuding with players (often his own), bosses, the press and fans. He hasn't been reluctant to belt an antagonist when the situation warranted. The Yankees' owner was visibly upset over Martin's

appearance at training camp last week at which time he said he and agent Doug Newton were anxious to turn Steinbrenner's promises into firm commitments.

"Nobody's going to put pressure on anybody," Steinbrenner snapped. He said, in effect, that Billy must shape up or stay out. It's a rap the trigger-happy

Asikis said the shooting scene was "mass confusion"

when he arrived at the school moments after it occurred. "We've talked to a bunch

of the kids and can't find any reason at all. Usually when a kid has got something up there (at school) he's not supposed to have, one of the other kids will come up and tell us about it. This time we got no word at all (about the gun)," school principal Don

Hufstedler said. A family friend, who asked not to be indeitifed, described Gains, an offensive lineman on the school's football B-team, as "a good kid. He believed in enjoying every day of his life."

Hufstedler added later, "He was friendly, outgoing, probably gregarious would be the best word to describe him. You'd see him in the hall, and the kid would always have this big friendly grin on his face.

Conservation districts Chagra's asked to map strategy brother

WASHINGTON, D.C. -Bergland has called upon the causes. nation's nearly 3,000 soil and to assist in the development of a national plan and strategy for carrying out soil and water conservation programs to meet future needs of the nation and ensure the protection of this

natural resources. Bergland spoke at the 33rd Annual Convention of the National Association of Conservation Districts in Washington, D.C. Feb. 11-14.

Some 2000 conservation district officials took part in the four-day session. Local participants in the NACD Convention included J. M. Sterling, chairman of the Howard SWCD Bergland said, "We can't

decide in Washington what is best for your local district. There is nobody as capable as you of designing a program that makes sense. There won't be a dime for any conservation practice or program which is not designed to accommodate the heavy pressure on soil

and water resources. Major speakers included NACD President Lyle Bauer of Harper, Kan., who told the group that the nation has a responsibility to help private landowners protect the longterm public interest in land

"Attempts to deny that responsibility in order to save a few dollars mislead the American taxpayer," he stated. "Conservation program dollars, effectively spent, mean that soil and water will be more productive next year and

very year thereafter. "That productivity, Bauer emphasized, "is our major source of national strength and wealth. Failure to spend conservation dollars now is both a false

and hazardous economy We in NACD find it hard to understand when the President proposes to fight inflation by cutting back conservation dollars," he declared. "If the nation gets serious about controlling price, he explained.

inflation, it will have to move Secretary of Agriculture Bob against inflation's root The loss of productive land - whether water conservation districts by urbanization of prime farmlands or by erosion of productive topsoils - is oneof those root causes."

Congressman Thomas S. Foley, House Agriculture Committee Chairman, urged conservation district officials to help generate a new commitment by Congress and the country to continue their investment in soil and programs in time of budget

Foley stated that he opposes proposals to move the U.S. Forest Service and the Soil Conservation Service out of the Department of Agriculture into a new Department of Natural Resources. Congress needs "to demand more evidence that these proposed changes will be more efficient than

they have been in the past.' Congressman James M. Jeffords of Vermont announced plans to introduce bold natural resource management legislation that would provide incentives for farmers from rural America to take leadership in soil and water conservation. These incentives would encourage farmers to practice sound conservation while continuing to produce agricultural commodities and earn reasonable profits

for farming. He expressed alarm that soil loss is taking place at a rate up to 10 times faster than the rate at which soil is being formed. Our soil loss, most of which is due to erosion by water, presents other costs to society as well, he said.

An estimated 4 billion tons of soil are washed into waterways annually, where they cause pollution. Losses due to the conversion of farmland to other uses causes land-price escalation, creating a stiuation that requires us to examine the supply of land and the demand for food in terms of

MIDLAND, Texas (AP) — The brother of slain El Paso lawyer Lee Chagra has been arrested on federal drug charges for alleged activities in Texas, Florida and the Republic of Colombia.

The five-count indictment against Jamiel Alexander Chagra was 'Jimmy' returned Monday by a federal grand jury in Midland and kept secret until the arrest. Chagra was arrested by Drug Enforcement Administration agents in Las Vegas, Nev., where he moved last year from El Paso.

'This indictment is an outgrowth of an intensive grand jury probe expected to continue for as long as a year or more," U.S. Attorney Jamie C. Boyd said Monday. "We have called 40 wit-

nesses already, and we

anticipate calling as many as 200 before it is over." Chagra was indicted on charges of conspiracy to import marijuana and cocaine; conspiracy to possess marijuana and cocaine with the intention to distribute; and aiding and abetting the possession of cocaine.

The indictment carried no implication of Chagra's connection with his brother's death or with racketeering, narcotics and prostitution in Texas and several other states which federal grand juries in El Paso and several other cities have been investigating

The El Paso grand jury resumed its deliberations today. It has returned indictments earlier against two members of a motor cycle club for drug violations. The El Paso grand jury
