China, Vietnam claim victories

BANGKOK, Thailand (AP) - Vietnamese troops repulsed Chinese forces near Lang Son, a key provincial capital, but the Chinese battled back successfully at some points, intelligence sources in

Bangkok reported today. Vietnam claimed its forces had killed or wounded 27,000 Chinese in 12 days of fighting. The Hanoi report said Vietnamese troops also had destroyed 200 tanks and 30 other military vehicles but the claims could

Japan's Kyodo news service reported that Chinese Vice Premier Li Hsien-nien told reporters in Peking today that the Chinese invasion force had critically damaged "two or three" regular Vietnamese

"We will pull out once our objective is achieved," Li was quoted as telling the reporters.

In the fighting, the Vietnamese pushed back Chinese troops near the city of Lang Son, 80 miles northeast of Hanoi, and at nearby Loc Binh, the

"The main trend of world public opinion is that Vietnam should withdraw from Kampuchea (Cambodia) and China from Vietnam," Peking's Hsinhua news agency said.

'Although the Chinese frontier troops' counterattack in self-defense against the Vietnamese aggressors is entirely different in nature from Vietnam's aggression against Kampuchea by armed force," it continued, the concept of a mutual withdrawal "is fair and is also a key to resolving the

The Vietnamese invaded Cambodia Dec. 25, ousted the pro-Peking government of Premier Pol Pot Jan. 7 and replaced it with a pro-Hanoi regime of Cambodian Communists who opposed Pol Pot. Cambodian army units loyal to Pol Pot have been waging guerrilla war against the Vietname'se ever since.

The Chinese invaded Vietnam Feb. 17 with the declared aim of punishing Hanoi for border provocations, but analysts believe Peking also wanted to draw Vietnamese troops away from the Cambodian fighting to relieve the pressure on Pol

Hanoi Radio claimed Wednesday that Vietnamese forces wiped out 1,600 Chinese troops in Lang Son province, where analysts believe the major battle of the Vietnam-China war is shaping up.

Economic trend declines sharply

WASHINGTON (AP) — A key government indicator of future economic trends plunged by the sharpest margin in four years last month, providing a strong sign of an economic slowdown, it was disclosed today

A steep decline in building permits and the average work week caused the index of leading economic indicators to drop 1.2 percent in January, the Commerce Department said.

The drop-off followed declines of 0.4 percent in November and 0.1 percent in

In summer of 1977, however, the index also declined for three consecutive months but the economy kept on growing.

This time the government wants economic growth to slow somewhat as it tries to dampen inflationary pressures. It was not clear from the latest report whether the nation faces an orderly slow-down or a recession, as anticipated by

Besides building permits and the work week, there were sharp declines in the money supply, which is considered bad for economic growth but an encouraging sign in fighting inflation.

Five of the indicators actually increased, including stock prices, factory orders, plant and equipment spending, vendor deliveries and a smaller layoff rate. The January decline was the biggest since a 3 percent drop in January

The figures are adjusted for seasonal variations. The index has declined in

five of the six months of 1978. The decline in building permits was important because the housing industry often feels the brunt of a slowdown first. New housing construction already has begun to drop sharply.

The economic indicators were combined with two other reports Wednesday showing continued inflation and a mounting trade deficit. The Agriculture Department reported Wednesday that prices farmers

received for all products rose by 3 percent in February. That followed jumps of 3 percent in December and 5 percent in January. Overall, farm prices in February were 24 percent higher than a year ago

Beef prices went up 7.2 percent in February alone and vegetable prices rose by 7 percent.

Higher prices for cattle, soybeans, hogs, calves, oranges and broiler chickens contributed most to the increase. However, lower prices were reported for cotton, potatoes, turkey and barley

Some of the increases have already shown up on spuer market shelves, and consumers will see many others later. The increases have forced the department to raise its estimate of food price

increases for 1979 from 7.5 to 8.5 percent. But Howard Hjort, the Agriculture Department's chief economist, said the actual 1979 food price increases could range from 6 percent up to 10 percent, depending on the weather and other factors, including inflation. About 60 cents of every grocery dollar is paid to process, transport and sell

food after it leaves the farm. Thus, inflation will be a major factor in pushing up grocery costs regardless of what happens to farm prices. Another contributor to inflation last year was the nation's growing trade deficit, which led to a decline in the value of the dollar abroad.

In January, the nation's monthly trade deficit grew from \$1.7 billion to \$3.1 billion, largely because of a \$484 million increase in oil imports, the Commerce Department said Wednesday

Carter frustrated; supports Egyptian demands

WASHINGTON (AP) - President Carter, frustrated, impatient and already supporting key Egyptian demands, opens new Mideast peace talks tonight with Israeli Prime

Minister Menachem Begin. The outlook for wrapping up a treaty did not appear bright as Carter prepared for what he says will be "a frank discussion of the issues.

Before flying here, Begin criticized the United States for supporting Egyptian proposals he said "were totally unacceptable to Israel." He did not elaborate, but diplomatic

Khomeini returns to native holy city

QOM, Iran (AP) - Ayatollah Ruhollah Khomeini, spiritual leader of the Islamic revolution that drove Shah Mohammad Reza Pahlavi from power, returned to his native holy city today to a triumphant welcome after 14 years of exile.

Aides said he will live here permanently but "he has no intention of retiring." They said he would actively keep control and mantain the direction of the revolution.

"His move to Qom will in no way affect his existing role," said Ayatollah Shariat Madari.

Tens of thousands of jubilant Shiite Moslems braved the morning cold to get a glimpse of the 78-year-old religious patriarch. The crowds lined the route 30 to 40 deep behind

makeshift barriers. The ayatollah's motorcade took four hours to make the 100-mile trip from Tehran. It moved slowly through the banner-festooned streets following a single line of plastic flowers in the center of the roadway to the shrine of Hazrat Maasoumeh, sister of a Shiite religious leader who died 1,300 years Turbaned mullahs, or Moslem priests, and many of the 10,000 students at local theology schools led the crowds in a constant thunderous refrain of "Allah Akhbar!" - "God is

Khomeini returned to Iran a month ago but delayed his return to Qom while his forces took over the government in the capital and extended their control across the country. He was the religious leader in Qom until the shah had him arrested in 1963 and expelled him from the country for opposing the ruler's Westernization program.

Khomeini left Tehran despite a threat by Prime Minister Mehdi Bazargan to resign because of the actions of the ayatollah's Revolutionary Committee, a parallel government which operates in-Bazargan's

The course is entitled 'Meals for One or Two," and its objectives are to increase the awareness of older adults in selecting convenience foods and how to use them in meal preparation. To learn plan and prepare nutritious meals with a minimum of time, energy and skill. To learn to plan shopping, and learn to use cooking short-cuts and helps homemakers with physician impairments.

The first lesson Friday will be on omelet cookery. Eggs are one of the best food buys. A dozen eggs gives a pound and a half of the highest quality protein available for only pennies a serving.

A shopping tip on eggs is if two sizes of eggs are compared (i.e. large and extralarge) and there is not more than 7 cents difference between the two cartons, the larger size is the best buy. You're getting more egg per pound.

Eggs are a nutritional bargain, too. They supply 13 minerals, every vitamin except C and have only

calories each. incredibly Eggs are versatile. The many ways they can be cooked or used in foods are fried, poached baked, scrambled, hard for leavening, to thicken, as a binder, for coating, emulsify and clarify. 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



Tried to get a loan lately? If you are one of the unfortunate many who

targeted 1979 as the year to purchase a new home, car or other large invest-ment, good luck. HOT ON THE scent of Grover Cleveland's portrait against a background of green, I tread a trail of tears

from savings and loans to banks to credit unions to finance corporations only to discover that Grover's no longer in circulation. Neither is McKinley. The closest I could get to financing the mobile home for which I yearned was Ben Franklin who could only afford the front steps. True to the place within which I store my groceries, I tried to shop in

Big Spring. Eventually I was forced to head west where the red-ink stamped "Insufficient" on my forehead was overlooked. Dignity was restored as my lack of material wealth was measured against the assets which had, only a few days before, been labeled "inapplicable."

Where is the strong economy that I have read, heard and written so much about? The available funds I had counted on being there? What hap-pened between last year and this year to suddenly transform my meager but infallible credit history into a record of no more consequence than my kindergarten report card?

And why am I "inadequate" in the

town where I have earned, spent, borrowed and invested my money for four years, yet a desirable credit risk in a town which had previously received from me no more than the total sum of two rum and cokes?

Several years ago, when four of us were living on less than three of us live on now, I was half of a pair who were deemed a good credit risk. Despite our newness in the locality, acquiring one, then two, then three, then four loans was no problem.

WHEN HALF of the pair departed, I was informed that there was still no problem. Since all loans were joint, so was the credit record that had been accumulated. In fact, that credit record formed the foundation for building further credit references until, one day, inflation prompted what is called "selective borrowing" which really means selective lending.

Suddenly, the same institutions that had extended the initial credit foundation were remembering that unfortunately, the credit had been extended jointly, thereby tarnishing the impact of prompt payments and advance payoffs.

Everyone's belt must be tightened in times of inflation, including those who dole out the funds. But it seems that whenever a belt is tightened, it's that segment of the population who most needs the helping hand that financial institutions profit from, who feel the most painful pinch,

In the year ahead, it will be those who have other alternatives available who will qualify for selective lending. Those who have few or no alternatives other than borrowing in order to invest will, I think, come to the same conclusion that I have.

When money is ample, everyone smiles upon you. When money is tight, you discover that those smiles are on the faces of fair-weather friends.





'No evidence'

WASHINGTON - Justice Department prosecution of a "phantom" native Alaskan village corporation, indicted for allegedly trying to euchre Uncle Sam out of 69,120 acres of valuable land, was quietly - and reluctantly — dropped after a government lawyer's affidavit knocked the bottom out of the case.

The lawyer, former Bureau of Indian Affairs official Robert E. Bruce, insisted that the Shuyak Village corporation was entitled to land it claimed at Port Williams.

More crucially, Bruce stated he saw "no evidence of fraud" in the enrollment figures for the village, on which the land claim was based. They were the fault of the BIA and the "complexity of the concepts . . . particularly as applied to an unsophisticated and uneducated

This cast doubt on the fraudulent intent necessary for criminal prosecution of the village corporation, and the case was dropped.

THE SHUYAK VILLAGE corporation is a subsidiary of Koniag Inc., a regional native corporation. Koniag submitted 16 villages for certification that would give them over a million acres of federal land in Alaska. But FBI and Interior Department investigators checked out Koniag's villages on the scene and came to the conclusion that seven of them - including Shuyak - were phantom settlements created by Koniag to gain title to more than 600,000 acres of public land.

The Bureau of Indian Affairs initially approved all 16 of Koniag's village certification applications. But one federal investigator labeled the certification reports "absolutely fraudulent," noting that there were cases where "the bulk of the supposed villagers were living in Los Angeles."

Doubts about the authenticity of Koniag's villages led Interior Department officials to call in the FBI for a thorough investigation.

The years-long probe of Konaig's operations got no cooperation from the native corporation. Quite the contrary. Karl Armstrong, Konaig's executive vice president and Washington lobbyist, made this astonishingly self-incriminating admission to our associate Hal Bernton: "I sent word out to the villagers not to discuss their affairs with any strangers . . . especially not any officials of the U.S. government."

Undeterred by this self-proclaimed attempt to obstruct their investigation, FBI agents methodically tracked down and interviewed the natives listed as residents on the Shuyak Village application. They concluded that 90 percent of the enrollment was fraudulent. This led to the indictment that was eventually

described by some officials as the biggest attempted public-land swindle of the century - can be traced to the incredibly lax regulations which implemented the 1971 law. "Native villages" were defined in terms so loose as to invite fraud. The regulations permitted native "residents" to be enrolled by the very corporations which had the most to gain by padding the figures, since the

land was awarded in proportion to the village population.

THESE VAGUE regulations were enthusiastically lobbied for by Koniag's Washington lawyer, Edward Interior Department under the Johnson adminstration. They were opposed by some Interior Department officials who recognized the potential for fraud.

Interestingly, our sources report that these same officials have had little better luck with Jimmy Carter's appointees in the Interior Department. Indeed, instead of pressing for vigorous prosecution of Konaig Inc... the department brass has come out in favor of a special congressionally sanctioned conveyance of 115,000 acres of prime timberland to one of Koniag's phantom villages.

JUNKETING JUNKMEN: The Pentagon's junk dealers apparently like junkets as well as the next bureaucrat. So each year the Defense Property Disposal Service holds regional conferences so officials from Washington can discuss the finer points of unloading excess military hardware with their field representatives overseas.


The Pacific region shindig is held in Honolulu; the European region's is in Wiesbaden, Germany. Thousands of dollars in taxpayers' money are spent to take Uncle Sam's surplus property dumpers to these meetings, which are supplemented by the customary cocktail parties and banquets to relive the tedium of the day's business.

The rest of the year, the disposal service manages to carry on its business by telephone. But as a spokesman pointed out, "this can be stifling." The General Accounting Office is checking into the service's anti-stifling practices.

ANDY EVANS ADDENDUM: In a recent column urging a pardon for Patty Hearst, we likened her captivity to that of American soldiers who were brainwashed during the Korean War. We cited Air Force Col. Andy Evans as one who eventually signed a false war-crime confession after months of mental torture.

Evans, now a retired major general, wrote to clarify our capsulized version of his record. He notes that he signed a statement, which 'admitted" participating in germ warfare, only after he was certain the war was over. Also, he was careful to use as a date for the germ-warfare mission a day when he could prove he was in Hong Kong on leave.

Practically the last POW to be set free, Evans defiantly thumbed his nose at a Red Chinese cameraman filming the prisoners as they cross the bridge to freedom at Panmunjom.





Sickle cell answers elusive

Dear Dr. Ruble: Please explain the term "sickle cell anemia." Who does it afflict and what are the symptoms? What is the prognosis? My friend has this and I would greatly appreciate anything you can tell me about it. -

Sickle cell anemia is an inherited red blood cell defect. It affects blacks - almost exclusively. The red cells become fragile, take on a sickle or half-moon like shape, tend to clump abnormally, and lose their oxygenbearing capacity. Crises may arise in situations where outside oxygen supply is low (high altitude, diving, mining and anesthesia).

The chief symptom is pain, usually in the stomach or intestines. Throat and chest infections are common, but other organs may be affected. Gallstones may form because of the increased red blood cell destruction.

The results of intensive research in recent years have been disappointing. No way has yet been found to correct this defect, and treatment for other forms of anemia (iron supplements, etc.) are of no benefit. Yet, the outlook for sickle cell anemia patients has improved with modern medicine and treatment.

Screening is important, and mass programs were begun a few years back to identify persons with the sickle cell trait. In one form of the disease there is no pain, although there may be blood in the urine. This may be mistaken for evidence of a kidney problem. For this reason it is well for susceptible persons to be screened for the sickle cell trait and

get proper counseling.

Dear Dr. Ruble: This past year I developed a problem. I am 81, in good health - blood pressure, weight, etc. My problem is the leg pains I get after walking a bit. My doctor said I had a weak pulse in the leg. I have always enjoyed my walking. I am not taking any medicine for this problem. I would appreciate your thoughts, especially about the weak pulse. -

The pain you describe is called "claudication" (pain following exercise). The weak leg pulse indicates a circulation problem. Surgery is possible with some, but only if a single large vessel is

deficient. It can be bypassed.

You are doing as much as you can. Keep your weight down and your spirits up and stay active within your limits. Age has a way of creeping up with the best of us. Just don't let it creep ahead. me care of the Big Spring Herald. Dear Dr. Ruble: My husband is 5 feet, 8 inches tall, weighs 210 pounds (would you believe?), and has announced he wants to get into a conditioning program at a gym. Do you advise that? I certainly hope you don't, because I think it's bad for him. He'll go with what you say. - Mrs.

From the dimensions you give me I wouldn't recommend any sudden strenuous exercise program. It is probably all he can do to get around with that much weight. What I do advise is a calorie-reduction program combined with a very gradual (mild at first) exercise regimen. Walking each day is a start. Hospital emergency rooms are filled with these 'weekend warriors' of the obesity front. In fact, he'd do best to start with a good physical.

Dear Dr. Ruble: Would you say that a woman who has had several miscarriages in succession has an estrogen imbalance? Should she be taking supplements? - H.S.

About all one could say from this information is that she is an habitual aborter. Whether hormone imbalance is the cause is debatable. Many other factors enter the picture besides hormones, although that would be considered a possible factor

Claims unfounded, On the light side-TESCO head says

Texas Electric Service Company President Bill Marquardt said today he has heard no testimony in the current PUC hearing that would support any punitive action against TESCO or any other Texas Utilities Company.

"We've said from the start that all our efforts have been made in an effort to save our customers money and to provide them with adequate electric service. We've said that none of the transactions being reviewed here were intended to, or did, benefit stockholders.
"I think the testimony so far in this hearing has sup-

ported this contention," Marquardt said.

The Public Utility Commission hearings into transactions among TU system subsidiaries were recessed Wednesday after seven days of testimony by officers of TU companies, the PUC staff and intervenors in the case.

The TU companies will offer rebuttal testimony when the hearing resumes at 9:00 a.m. Monday

Marquardt said the issues in the hearing have boiled down to differences of opinion over legal technicalities and some accounting procedures.

"Before the start of this hearing, there seemed to be a great many allegations and a lot of innuendo about socalled improprieties on the part of our company.

"I believe all the testimony, including that by the PUC staff and by the intervenors, demonstrates that the allegations were unfounded," he said.

Marquardt said the overall impact of the staff and intervenor testimony has been to show that the TU system companies have acted in good faith to do what is best for

He noted PUC General Counsel John Bell's written brief in which Bell acknowledged that he has found no reason to believe that anyone connected with the TU system has willfully or knowingly violated any law or PUC order.

He also noted Bell's statement that all the TU companies "have made all of their books and records available for inspection and audit . . . and have been cooperative in facilitating the staff.'

Marquardt said he could not speculate on what the final ruling of the PUC will be.

"We can say that the PUC staff and the intervenors have made exhaustive investigations and, despite intense examination during this hearing, no evidence or testimony has been produced that challenges our honesty, our good faith or the fact that our management judgments have been beneficial to our customers." he said,

Bill against elk antlers

SACRAMENTO, Calif. (AP) - The state Legislature has been pulled into the Jung T. Wang aphrodisiac elk antler controversy.

Wang, a Korean who has a food business in San Francisco, wants to bring a herd of Rocky Mountain elk to a farm he set up on more than 100 acres near Tomales, just north of San Francisco.

Last week, Wang won permission of the California Fish and Game Commission to bring the elk into the state and harvest the antlers "to cure impotency." For centuries, powdered elk antlers and rhinoceros horns have been valued in the Orient as sexual

But state Sen. David Roberti stepped into the picture Wednesday when he introduced a bill to forbid the importation of any kind of elk, except for

LANSING, Mich. (AP) - Reye's Syndrome, a rare complication of viral diseases that strikes mainly children, has killed a third Michigan child year, and Wisconsin officials say the disease has taken its first victim there.

The disease has struck 35 Michigan children since an outbreak of Type A-Brazil flu. Wisconsin officials say two children there were suffering from the ailment and that two others had recovered. Reye's Syndrome causes swelling of brain cells, constant vomiting and altered behavior.

EL CENTRO, Calif. (AP) - With the winter lettuce season nearly over in the Imperial Valley, union leader Cesar Chavez is seeking support for the United Farm Workers' lettuce strike in other

Chavez met with 500 sympathizers in San Luis, Ariz., Wednesday to discuss the union's strike against 11 growers who account for 40 percent of the nation's winter lettuce crop. The harvest will shift soon to other parts of California and Arizona, a Chavez aide said.

The union wants a 40 percent wage increase in a one-year contract. The growers have offered increases averaging 7 percent a year for three years.

OLYMPIA, Wash. (AP) — A Senate committee has approved a bill that would legalize the use of marijuana by cancer patients undergoing chemotherapy and radiation treatment

The bill also would permit use of the drug for the treatment of glaucoma, but the major use would be to relieve the nausea and loss of appetite associated with chemotherapy and radiation treatment.



Since Joe Willie Namath signed his big contract after a bidding war between the New York Jets and the St. Louis Cardinals, through the unbelievable paydays for Muhammad Ali and onto the latest Pete Rose pact with the Phillies, I've usually cheered for the somewhat atrocious contracts of sports superstars. I mean, if you can get it from the owners, get it! Most of them own teams as more of a hobby than a money making business, so you might as well get as much as you can, even if

But when Bobby Bonds turned down a raise in his contract from Cleveland Indians owner Gabe Paul, it was totally ridiculous. Bonds' contract, originally signed when he was a member of the Texas Rangers, has four years remaining at \$440,000 per year. And he turned down a raise! Hey, Bobby, I know you are one of the better baseball talents around, but Idon't know too many people around who will race to the ballparks in hopes of watching you perform.

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Speaking of salaries, the NFL recently released a survey listing the yearly figures each player receives. The survey includes a player's base salary, plus a prorated share of his signing bonus. Performance bonuses and playoff money aren't included.

You might be interested to know that the average player salary in football is slightly below the average in the other widely accepted team sports, baseball and basketball. The average football salary was \$62,585 in

But that can basically be explained by the fact that both baseball and basketball have many more games than football and fewer players on the payroll than the NFL's 43 man team.

Of the top ten NFL salaries, there were five running backs and five quarterbacks. San Francisco's O.J. Simpson was by far the highest paid performer with a yearly football income of \$733,388. A distant second was Chicago's Walter Payton, who earned \$431,000.

Other running backs in the top ten salaries included sixth place John Riggins of Washington and Larry Csonka of the New York Giants at \$300,000, and tenth place Franco Harris at a measly 250 Gs. Csonka, however, will probably have to take a cut in 1979, as the Giants chose not to renew his contract.

The highest ranking QB was Viking Fran Tarkenton. Fran was ranked third in overall NFL salaries with a yearly intake of \$360,000.

Handsome Dante Pastorini finished just behind Tarkenton with an income of \$358,333. The other QBs were Ken Stabler at \$342,000, Bob Griese at \$260,000 and BertJones at \$250,000.

New England Patriot Harold Jackson was the highest paid receiver at \$237,657. New Orleans Saint rookie Wes Chandler was second at \$165,000.

Chandler is undoubtedly a great athlete, but this is somewhat unbelievable when one considers the proven greatness of such pass catchers as Lynn Swann of Pittsburgh and Dave Casper of Oakland, not to mention Billy Joe Dupree. Swann had a contract for \$162,000 in 1978.

New England also had the highest paid lineman in offensive tackle John Hannah at \$173,966. The highest paid rookie lineman was New York Jets offensive tackle Chris Ward - \$102,500.

Bill Bergey surpassed Jack Lambert as having the eminence of being the highest paid defensive player. Bergey made \$213,333 in 1978, while Lambert, 1977's highest paid player, made \$200,000. Lambert, however, surpassed Bergey if playoff money is counted

The highest paid defensive lineman proved to be Pittsburgh Steeler Joe Greene. Greene earned this distinction for the second straight year by having a regular season contract worth \$174,000. Denver's Lyle Alzado was a close second at \$172,000. Kansas City's Art Still was the highest paid rook ie defensive lineman at \$98,750.

The NFL's defensive backs, annually the lowest paid by position other than the kickers, were led by Dallas' Cliff Harris. The hard-hitting wildman made \$141,870, which is just slightly more than teammate Charlie Waters and Oakland cornerback Monte Jackson. Safety Luther Bradley of Detroit was the highest paid

'rookie defensive back at \$107,000. After Bergey and Lambert in the linebacker department, Jack Ham earned \$160,000. The highest paid rookie linebacker was Cleveland's Clay Matthews at \$87,917.

The Cleveland Browns Don Cockroft was the highest paid kicker at \$90,000. Tom Skladany was the highest paid rookie kicker, earning \$71,666 for his punting skills. This was more than the bionic leg, Ray Guy of Oakland, earned. Guy's salary was reported at \$68,771.

The highest paid rookie was Earl Campbell at \$199,666. Of course, Superman made more than this due to his numerous awards and playoff money but I still have to vote for him as one of the most underpaid players in the league.

There are also some interesting notes concerning the Dallas Cowboys. One is that Craig Morton, the former Cowboy now with Denver, earned \$6,000 more than Roger Staubach in 1978. Morton's contract was listed at \$219,166, while Staubach's was listed at \$213,000.

And for you Cowboy fans still upset with the pass that Jackie Smith didn't catch, check this out. Smith was given a raise from \$60,000 to \$93,500 for coming out of

Salaries as listed by yearly contracts can sometimes be misleading. My old college teammate, Viking backup quarterback Tommy Kramer, can be used as an example. TK signed a three-year pact with Minnesota after being drafted in the first round in 1977.

Kramer's contract, if incentive clauses and possible playoff money is taken into consideration, could fluctuate over the three-year period from as little as \$240,000 to \$550,000. For instance, each start earns TK an additional five Gs, each touchdown pass so much, each playoffgameso much, etc.

Johnny Unitas, recently elected into the pro football Hall of Fame, has some interesting comments to make concerning coaching and the men that pay the pro athletes, the owners and general managers.

When asked what type of pro coach he would make, Johnny U replied: "I wouldn't want a head coaching job in these times, not with all the baloney that goes on. Not working for some of these goofy owners and crazy general managers.

Johnny U also had some comments on the new breed of opulent athletes and overall society in general.

"My feelings about them are like my feelings on modern-day life in general. 'Month of ugly duckling'

ARLINGTON, Texas What is it they say about Six Flags Over Texas? It's what you wish the world could be?

If that were to become a reality this week, the world would smell like asphalt, wet paint and fresh-cut wood. And it would vaguely resemble London, right after the Blitz.

February is traditionally the "month of the ugly duckling" at Six Flags.

The Arlington theme park is in the midst of its annual refurbishing, with activity becoming more frantic by the day as the March 3 opening date gets closer.

General Manager Dan Howells says, "It's a lot like Cheryl Tiegs in curlers. The end result is going to be beautiful.

"As is our tradition, we're investing a couple of million dollars to assure that the park is fresh, fascinating and different. We've been doing it for 19 years, but it's always an adventure.'

Six Flags wound up its last season the final weekend in November. The very next day, dozens of landscape gardeners began ripping away at acres of flowerbeds.

Thousands of large tropical plants were unceremonisouly dug up and temporarily planted in peach baskets which were hauled by the truckload to huge greenhouses for the winter.

Within a matter of days the planting areas were the hiding places for thousands of tulip bulbs, covered over with a blanket of fledgling pansy plants.

If Mother Nature meets her usual schedule, the beds will be a blaze of color come March.

Elsewhere monstrous machines were digging up through the park's paint mature trees and hauling them to new "homes" to make way for the dozens of construction projects which suddenly dotted the leafless landscape.

'Sometimes,'' said Howells, "our projects are a little frustrating. Every year we find ourselves having to tear down buildings which have outlived their usefulness, and replacing them with brand new buildings which look exactly the same as the ones we tore down. It costs a ton of money, and chances are nobody will notice that anything has changed. The better job of restoring we do, the less likely anybody is to

spot the new construction. 'There's a gosh awful temptation to put up signs that say 'This old, familiar building is a brand new building,' but, of course, you can't do that

"It's the same way with curbing. Over the past few years we've replaced hundreds and hundreds and hundreds of feet of plain concrete curbing with a far prettier curb with an exposed pebble finish. Nobody actually knows what we have done. It just looks - for

some mysterious reason - a lot nicer and neater." Just after closing each year, the park's mechanics stage what has come to be known as the "Six Flags Gran Prix." That is the day when the modern and antique miniature cars are

driven in a noisy procession to the maintenance garages. Seats come out and head for the upholstery shops. Bodies come off and are hauled to the fiberglass area. Then the mechanics tackle the remaining chassis and

Weeks later, after bodies and wheels have traveled shops, the parts meet again and chug back into the park in mint condition.

In a chilly steel room 200 feet above the ground, technicians totally overhaul An entire row of buildings the sophisticated winches in the park's familiar Texas and computers which control the famous Texas Chute Out parachute ride. Others put the ride's miles of steel

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cables through rigid safety

Still other computer experts are at work on the controls of the Shock Wave double loop roller coaster. the coaster's And, tremendous cars are hauled away, taken apart and tested piece-by-piece.

The huge steel rails of rides like the Shock Wave, Runaway Mine Train and The Big Bend are subjected to strenuous scientific testing. In many instances the testing is as precise as that given components of a

All the while painters are swarming over sprawling complex. Workers empty store shelves. The shelves are repaired and repainted. Then, back on the shelves go the thousands of gift and souvenir items.

While the shelves are being restocked, the building exteriors get their annual coat of paint and, frequently,

a new roof. Restaurant buildings and equipment get a scrubbing, repairing, painting and general sprucing up.

Literally tens of thousands of signs must be repainted. Signs are the unspoken language of a facility as big as Six Flags.

Behind the scenes seamstresses work against the calendar to prepare the tens of thousands of individual peices of wardrobe which, come March, will be used to outfit the park's 2,500 hosts and hostesses. The inventory includes everything from pants and skirts, dresses and shirts to Indian loin cloths and railroad conductors hats.

There is also an overhaul of the park's own laundry and dry cleaning plant.

In the midst of it all, deliveries begin. First, there are a million and a half brochures which will tell visitors all about the park.

Then come such things as souvernirs, paper cups, napkins, tons of cleaning supplies, thousands upon thousands of balloons, frozen fish for dolphins and seals to



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Farm prices set records

WASHINGTON (AP) -Boosted by big gains for cattle and some other commodities, the government's index of farm prices continued to set records last month.

Prices that farmers get for raw products rose another 3 percent in February, the Agriculture Department said Wednesday.
It was the third con-

secutive month of record

The department's Crop Reporting Board said that higher prices for cattle, soybeans, hogs, calves, oranges and broiler chickens contributed most to the gain in the price index from January.

However, lower prices reported for cotton, potatoes, turkeys and barley partially offset the gains for the other commodities

Beef cattle prices, already at record levels, jumped another 7.2 percent from January. Vegetable prices, led by cabbage and lettuce,

WASHINGTON (AP) -China is expected to import a record 12.2 million metric tons of grain this year, almost half of it from the United States, the Agriculture Department

said Wednesday.
The imports, for the 1978-79 grain marketing year, would exceed last year's 8.6 million metric tons by about 45 percent, the department's Foreign Agricultural Service

China's imports of wheat alone are expected to be a record of almost 9.1 million metric tons, up from less than 8.5 million last year, the

rose 7 percent.

Farm prices overall in February were up 24 percent from a year ago, the report said. The commodity price index was 240 percent of a 1967 base used as a standard.

In January, the index what happens to farm prices jumped 5 percent — the as long as inflation boosts the biggest gain in more than four years - to 232 percent of the 1967 base. The index in December broke the previous record of 221 set in August 1973.

Economists do not consider farm prices in a single month good indicators of future retail food prices because they often fluctuate.

But over the longer haul, higher farm prices do have an impact on grocery prices and this has been happening the past year.

Higher livestock prices particularly were a major reason for a 40 percent boost in farmers' net incomes last year to \$28.1 billion, compared to \$20.1 billion in 1977, according to the department. With farm prices still

rising, the department says farmers' net income will rise again this year, although not so sharply, to about \$30 billion.

Howard Hjort, the department's chief economist, predicts also that food prices will "most likely" rise an average of 8.5 percent this year, compared to a 10.5 percent average gain in 1978.

Until Hjort announced the new estimate last Friday, the department had prediced a "most likely" food price increase this year of 7.5

About 60 cents of each grocery dollar spent by consumers at supermarkets is paid to process, transport and sell food after it leaves the farm. Thus, grocery costs will rise regardless of

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Carter agrees to consolidated programs plan

WASHINGTON (AP) -President Carter, yielding to ment's Forest Service and anticipated political opposition, has approved two modest reorganization plans that would consolidate domestic economic development programs in the Commerce Department and turn the Interior Department into a Department of Natural Resources, sources said.

The president's decision, expected to be announced today, caps two years of frequently bitter battles between Cabinet officers and between top White House aides over who would control programs in these areas.

Major lobbying groups and congressional leaders joined the fray to see that their close ties to existing agencies were not disrupted. They may continue the fight when Carter's plans go to Congress for approval, but initial congressional reaction praised the president for dropping more extensive reorganization

While Carter's proposals would shift 42,000 federal workers from one agency to another, plans previously weighed by his staff would have moved far more agencies and renamed both the Commerce and Housing and Urban Development departments.

Administration sources, who declined to be identified, outlined on Wednesday the changes this way:

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) -Western Opera Theater is hardly the Met - its traveling road show has performed "La Boheme" and other favorites before such unlikely audiences as Alaskan Eskimos and southwestern Indians.

But the cast is as wellreceived in most places as the finest performers in opera. "Some of the most difficult audiences have become our biggest fans," said Marilee Farrington, administrator for the roving organization which has been delighting out-of-the-way crowds for 13 seasons.

"Some of the least-likely audiences really enjoy our performances. They can be having a ball but they have a different way of showing it."

The 13 professional company singers travel through eight Western states with their own props, costumes and musicians, putting on shows for fees ranging up to \$11,000. It has made troupers of the singers, many of whom would otherwise have found it hard to get professional experience in the United

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
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Houston police officer testifies in murder trial

HOUSTON (AP) - Former Houston police officer John Olin held his hands over his head with the palms out to show how Randall Alan Webster appeared to police before he was shot to death.

Olin was the second witness Wednesday, the first day of the federal trial of three former police officers and an officer still on the force. They are charged with violating 17-year-old Webster's civil rights, conspiracy and perjury.

The Shreveport, La., teenager was killed in February 1977 after a high speed chase with police in southeast Houston. The government alleges the defendants planted a "throwdown," gun to conceal the fact that Webster was unarmed.

The defendants say former officer Danny E. Mays fired at Webster in self-

Mays, Norval W. Holloway Jr., and Paul D. Dillon later were fired. Robert S. Bloodworth is the fourth defendant.

Olin told the jury Mays struck Webster on the head with his gun and shot him after jerking him from the allegedly stolen van

Webster was driving 'Webster was not resisting arrest," Olin

Olin, 27, who also was fired, said he ran toward the van after it was stopped, and saw Mays "raise his arm and swing down

with the gun on Webster. "I heard a shot," Olin continued. "Mays stepped back. I saw blood start coming from Webster's head.

Within 30 seconds, Dillon and other officers began arriving, Olin said. Until that time, no gun lay on the pavement next to

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Webster, he testified.

U.S. District Judge Finis E. Cowan then excused the jury to hear evidence establishing the existence of a conspiracy and the admissibility of statements made concerning it, as required by a 1978 ap-







Metal locators were used to hunt for these treasures. The club held their first show in the Highland South Shopping

The members found interesting rocks on their field trips and became interested enough in them to become a lapidary club. The club is open to anyone interested in gems, minerals and artifacts, and is a non-profit organization.

Three beginning lapidary classes have been held by the club the past year. Nora Nixson, Charles Leek and Vergil Perkins taught a total of 21 students who learned to cut and polish cabochons.



Consumers got a break at the grocery store last month, but shoppers who've been keeping track of prices over the long haul will find little to cheer about, an Associated Press market-basket survey shows.

The AP drew up a random list of 15 commonly purchased food and nonfood items, checked the price at one supermarket in each of 13 cities on March 1, 1973 and has rechecked on or about the start of each succeeding month. One item, chocolate chip cookies, was dropped from the list at the end of November 1977 because the manufacturer discontinued the package size used in the survey.

The latest check produced a mixture of good and bad news

On the plus side for shoppers: The marketbasket bill at the checklist store declined in eight cities, rose in four and was unchanged in one. On an overall basis, the market-basket bill dropped an average of 1 percent during the month. The drop compared with a 2.7 percent boost in January.

On the minus side, however: Comparing prices today with those a year ear-lier, the AP found the market-basket bill increased by an average of 8.3 percent. And a look at current costs versus prices when the market-basket survey was started showed that the average bill at the checklist store has risen 71 percent. The Consumer Price Index of all items has gone up about 55 percent in roughly the same period.






