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Carter says more flexibility is needed

Begin: Great progress made

JERUSALEM (AP) - President Carter, his Mideast peace mission at a crucial crossroad, said today he has fallen short of an Egyptian-Israeli treaty. He told the Israeli parliament more flexibility is needed.

After hearing the results of an allnight Israeli cabinet meeting, Carter told the Knesset that leaders of the two nations are not yet ready to risk a peace treaty, although their people are now ready for peace.

Prime Minister Menachem Begin told reporters afterward, "We must all be patient." He said a new meeting had been scheduled between key members of his cabinet and U.S. Secretary of State Cyrus Vance

Earlier, at dawn, Begin said that his cabinet had made "reasonable" decisions on Egyptian peace terms during their 61/2-hour session.

Israeli radio said the cabinet had accepted some parts of the latest U.S. compromise, but rejected others.

Begin said at dawn he expected Vance to fly to Cairo to brief Egyptian President Anwar Sadat. Begin said he anticipated a "positive reply" from But U.S. officials said it was un-

"The leaders have not yet proven that we are also ready for peace, enough to take a chance," Carter added.

'We must proceed with due caution, I understand that, but we must proceed," Carter said.

The speech was followed by pandemonium in the Knesset, and one right-wing member of Begin's own party was ejected after heckling Begin as he tried to speak.

OKLAHOMA CITY (AP) — Eight murder charges were being prepared today against a fugitive wanted in last summer's killings of six steakhouse employees here and three members of a Texas family near Purcell, police

Roger Dale Stafford, 27, described by police as a drifter, was charged Sunday with first-degree murder in the garth of one of the steakhouse workers, 15-year-old Terri M. Horst. Eight additional murder charges

were being prepared today and would

be filed today or Tuesday, said Sgt. Tom Mundy, police spokesman. Det. Sgt. Mike Heath said the filing of charges was a time consuming

Police have concluded definitely that a man resembling Stafford who was arrested in Corpus Christi, Texas, this morning "is not Roger Dale

Stafford," Mundy said. Corpus Christi Police Chief William Banner said the man was arrested on a marijuana possesson complaint.

Officers revealed today that a man who had allegedly associated with Stafford while Stafford was in Tulsa last summer was arrested Sunday night in Tulsa as a material witness in the death cases.

Maj. Robert V. Wilder identified the man as Danny Lee Kerr, 24, of Tulsa. About 50 Oklahoma law officers were engaged in the search for Stafford in Oklahoma and in other

states today. State Bureau of Oklahoma Investigation agents have been sent to Arkansas, Alabama, Tenessee, and Illinois as part of the search for Stafford, OSBI supervisor Ted Lemke said today. Lemke said several dozen leads received on Stafford's whereabout have been investigated without

FBI spokesman John Warren said five FBI agents would be assigned to the search today after a federal fugitive charge was filed against Stafford by the U.S. Attorney here.

"We are sending out information on Stafford to every one of our offices and will be listing this as a highpriority investigation until he is found," Warren said.

Viet woman knew she was dying

SAN RAFAEL, Calif. (AP) — For four years, a Vietnamese woman pleaded with the Communist government in her native country to allow her four sons to join her. She knew she was dying.

Now Kim Ngoc Gonzalez, 45, is dead of kidney failure. Her sons, Thanh, Hai, Khanh and Hiep, whom she last saw after her wedding in 1973 to an American serviceman, were to have arrived at San Francisco International Airport in February. They

dead wife's struggle. "When I married my wife, she asked me to love her children and I accepted," said Gonzalez. "They are like my own to me. "The last thing she asked me was to

do all I could to get them to America. I

loved Kim very much and I will do it,

George Gonzalez has taken up his

no matter what it takes." Gonzalez, a cook at San Quentin state prison here, remembers how the boys' arrival was anticipated. "She was so very happy they were coming at last," he said. "No one could ever look forward to anything as much as she did to being with those boys again. Oh, she loved those boys.'

A State Department official told Gonzalez on Feb. 20 that because of red tape with the Vietnamese government the boys, aged 11 to 17, would not be arriving as expected. There was "some error in the papers," Gonzalez recalled Sunday. It was then, he said, that his wife's condition — first diagnosed in April

1978 — began to deteriorate. Two weeks later, she died. Gonzalez met his wife while serving in the Army in Vietnam. They married and came to the United The boys, children of Mrs. Gonzalez's first marriage, were then enrolled in a Catholic boarding school

and the decision was made not to interrupt their schooling Vietnam fell in April 1975. The new regime closed religious schools and,

according to Gonzalez, sent the children into the streets to fend for themselves. Gonzalez said he sent the boys \$4,000

Police baffled by art thieves

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) -Where a \$1 million Rembrandt masterpiece hung for 30 years, the M.H. de Young Memorial Museum 17th century painter by an unidentified disciple

Rembrandt's "Portrait of a Rabbi" and three less valuable paintings were stolen last Christmas Eve by a burglar who pried open a skylight and lowered himself into the museum. Police report that their investigation is at a dead end, but the FBI still has an active investigation under way in other cities.

Two days after the San Francisco burglary, the Art Institute of Chicago was victimized by thieves who stole 19th century paintings by Paul Cezanne from a storage room. The value: \$3

Chicago police also say they have no suspects or leads in their case. The Art Institute is offering a \$100,000 reward for information leading to recovery of the three



BANGKOK, Thailand (AP) - Vietnam and China charged each other today with new attacks in their border war, but Western intelligence officers in Bangkok reported that the slow Chinese withdrawal was continuing.

Radio Hanoi said that as of late Sunday, the Chinese were shelling, burning and plundering areas of all six Vietnamese provinces along the northern border.

Xinhua, the official Chinese news agency, said Vietnamese forces shelled parts of Guangxi Province in southeast China and attacked withdrawing Chinese troops inside Vietnam. 'Chinese forces responded

with an immediate counterattack positions," said Xinhua. "In every instance Chinese troops inflicted heavy losses on the ... Vietnamese.'

'Hippie Mayor' retires

MADISON, Wis. (AP) When he walks out of the office for the last time, he will take with him the sign on "Hizzoner da Mare."

Paul Soglin, who went from being an antiwar activist at odds with police to being mayor of this city of 170,000, is leaving office after

Soglin will turn 34 five days after his third term expires April 17. He was the youngest person ever elected mayor of a city of this size when he first took office in

merican n, Tekas on, West n, Texas ation and Bureau.

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He had been an antiwar activist of the 1960s; police clubbed him, arrested him and once cut his hair after a street demonstration.

Yet while still a law student, Soglin developed a solid reputation as alderman for the downtown area dominated by the University of Wisconsin campus.

By the time he announced 15 months ago that he would not seek re-election, Soglin's political base also encompassed both the bluecollar East Side and the

"I think things have gone really well the last six years," he said in an interview: 'There's nothing I

would do differently.' Things he did included presenting the key to the city to Fidel Castro on one of his three trips to Cuba, stridently supporting labor groups, and presiding over Halloween's City Council meeting in a "lame costume of feathers

and crutches What Soglin calls his 'radical perspective' has been universally accepted, however, particularly by conservatives, who criticize him for not enforcing sex-for-sale ordinances, and government traditionalists, who say he expanded and more efficient human services programs and a "triple-A" municipal

Prodded, he becomes reflective on his role as a symbol of his generation and used the power of his office too strongly in some areas, such as education.

Soglin prefers to talk about what he sees as his legacy for this city: one of the best public transit systems in the nation, a downtown mall and center project,

"During the first week in office in 1973, and I've had the feeling ever since, I've had the responsibility that those of us who came out of the antiwar movement could competent administer important programs," Soglin said.

Overseeing a \$60 million annual city budget and everything from welfare to bike paths, Soglin is con-fident he is not a poor representative of his generation.

"I know I haven't been a liability," he said, adding that while most protesters have exchanged jeans and long hair for three-piece suits and razor cuts, their radical perspective is intact.

'We haven't substantially changed our politics," he said. "What's changed is our ability to communicate. We've become more effectiven and that gives us greater freedom to make changes."

Compromise, he said, no longer means "selling out." 'There was always a need to compromise, but now where compromise is called for, I'm in a position where very little has to be given up. Eight years ago compromise meant giving up the shop,'

Soglin said. Is this new communication the result of the maturing of his angry generation or a new tolerant attitude on the part of the rest of the nation?

"A bit of both," a pensive Soglin replied. "The country is more accepting in terms of listening to us. And we've demonstrated, through time,

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

Meals-on-Wheels difference between hardship, happiness

thousands homebound Americans, the difference between hardship and happiness is a private volunteer program that provides them with low-cost

meals and a friendly face. The program is Meals-on-Wheels and it is celebrating its 25th anniversary in the

United States this ve The Meals-on-Wheels concept began in England during World War II. It was introduced to this country in 1954 by Mrs. Clarence Toy, a Pennsylvania woman who heard about the project from

a British exchange student. The programs are locally run; most are affiliated with religious or community

service organizations. Neil Scott, a political consultant who is a Mealson-Wheels volunteer and is editor of the International Directory of Meals-on-Wheels, estimates that there are almost 2,000 programs across the country, each serving 30 to 50 persons.

(Scott's directory is available at a cost of \$1.25 from Directory, 421 Seward Square SE, Washington,

Although the programs

operate independently, they are organized along similar Volunteers deliver meals to participants' homes once a day, five days a week. Each delivery includes two meals — one hot, one cold. Participants pay a sum equal to the cost of the meals, usually \$10 to \$16 a

week, according to Scott. Most of the people the me elderly, Scott said, but the program is open to anyone who is unable to get and prepare his or her own food and cannot afford to hire someone else to do it.

Wheels programs are selfsufficient. They can qualify for federal aid under the Older Americans Act of 1965. But Scott said recent amendments to the act will make it difficult for most programs to qualify unless they change their methods of operation and limit their services to people over 60. He said there is a difference between government programs and Meals-on-Wheels.

"I think there's a vital difference for the recipients between having a federal volunteer stand at their doorstep with a meal they

paid for with their taxes and are being urged to plan now having a neighborhood to find alternate ways of volunteer stand there with a meal which they also paid for, but which they know is there because the volunteers in the community care about them." said Scott. 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

LATIN WAS a dead language. The Italian and French tongues were beautiful when spoken by a Sophia Loren or a Charles Boyer but utterly impossible to master. German was gutteral. The Russians grunted when they talked. The English were apeaking a form of the only language we understood granted that they did it with some affectation. The city has put an end to most of the speeding problems in Comanche Trail Park.

They have also managed, in the process, to keep a large segment of the population out of the park by insuring that those who do drive through it are risking damage to their cars.

The speed bumps and blocking off

several segments of roadway in the park have made visits to the park more like an obstacle course.

I acknowledge that speeding problems in the park exist, and are enough — considering the safety of children — to warrant speed bumps. However, the humps in the park resemble something closer to the testing ground for a Superauto rather than a small bump to slow drivers.

To avoid bottoming out a small (low slung) car on the bumps, the driver must come to a complete halt, then still be jarred as the car eases over the hump.

Earlier, I griped in this column about being harassed by others in the park. I had gotten into the habit of carrying a sack lunch to the park (last summer) and eating there until some of the people who frequented the park persisted in bothering me to the point that I really didn't feel safe being

THE ROADBLOCKS and the speed humps didn't help that situation, except maybe to diminish the number of people visiting the park. If the humps were lower — where I didn't fear for the safety of my oil pan everytime I drove out there — and if I didn't wonder how the maze had been changed this week, I would feel that the measures might be an improvement.

Now, I go to the park only when I am attending a scheduled activity, and although I once went just for the pleasure of being outside and in a pleasant facility, I rarely do so now.

Another Scandal

WASHINGTON - Another of President Carter's sub-Cabinet appointees may be caught up in a financial scandal. He is Sterling Tucker, a respected District of Columbia political figure, who is Carter's newest assistant secretary of

Housing and Urban Development. Tucker ran unsuccessfully last year for mayor of Washington, D.C., and had the usual campaign debts. We have now obtained a sworn affidavit that accuses Tucker's attorney of trying to pay off one creditor by promising Tucker's help in obtaining

government contracts for him. The affidavit also charges that Tucker did not voice any surprise or objection when the creditor told him of the alleged offer. Both Tucker and his attorney, Woodrow Boggs, have vehemently denied any wrongdoing. But we have obtained secret tape recordings that lend credence to the charges.

THE AFFIDAVIT, obtained by associates Gary Cohn and Sam Fogg, was signed by Sherwood Ross, a media consultant. Tucker wound up owning him \$10,730 for work in the mayoral campaign.

Unlike Tucker's other campaign creditors, most of whom agreed to settle for about 25 cents on the dollar. Ross refused to accept partial payment for his services. He is suing Tucker for the full amount.

Tucker was recommended for his new \$50,000 post as an assistant secretary by HUD Secretary Patricia Bates Harris. Quickly confirmed, he has taken up his duties at HUD.

But while the appointment was still pending, Tucker, according to our sources, felt he would stand a better chance of White House approval if his campaign debts were cleared up. All the creditors except Rose were satisfied.

At one point Tucker and Boggs were under the impression that Ross had agreed to settle for \$2,000 or \$2,500. Acting on his misconception, Tucker informed the White House that his campaign debts had been taken care

Ross says he never agreed to a partial payment; Tucker and Boggs say the media man agreed and then changed his mind. At any rate, Boggs apparently was afraid the White House would think Tucker had lied about the campaign debts and would scotch the appointment.

'Woody Boggs...told me that I stood between Tucker and his appointment if I didn't settle," Ross' affidavit states. "He then said that when Tucker was appointed to HUD he would throw work my way, if I

forgave the campaign debt.

"I TOLD HIM I didn't feel like working all over again to earn what I had earned the first time. Boggs replied, 'Oh, you wouldn't have to work dollar for dollar for what you did during the campaign.' The clear implication is that the campaign debt would be paid off with sweetheart contracts from Tucker."

This conversation took place on Jan. 2, according to Ross. The next day he called Boggs and then Tucker, while a private investigator recorded the conversation. We have the tapes of

those conversations.
Ross reminded Tucker's attorney of his implied offer of the day before, and restated his objection to earning his fee twice.

Boggs then replied: "Sterling has never forgotten, you know, whatever anyone has ever done for him, and I don't think it's a matter of having to do work over again in the theoretical some work but certainly not all the time as it (unintelligible) to dollar for

dollar. "Once the man becomes secretary, there are things that will be automatic. And Sterling is political and the people around him are political, and I will certainly be mindful of this conversation. It wouldn't take much, and these things happen...'

Tucker told our associate Gary Cohn that there had been "absolutely no conversation of any such kind." He said, "I've not made any offers or done anything wrong."

A more common cause is irritation of the long nerve network that serves the abdominal area, including the phragm and the digestive system nach, etc.). Interference of the serve anywhere along its course can eguse the spasms that result in hiccups. Often a combination of internal problems with the various organs and the newe disturbance can cause

persistent hiccuping. By internal pro-blems I mean disturbance of the stomach (gastritis), of the liver, intestines, or the diaphragm itself. Inflammation of the pericardium (heart covering) may be an unsuspected source of hiccuping. Or the problem may be a local one, as in the nerve in e seck area.

patients? - B.G. Treatment for emphysema (overinflated and inelastic lungs) is almost always medical, which is to say nonsurgical. We think more in terms of controlling allergies and treating infections early and aggressively. Cigarettes have to be avoided along with other pollutants. Weight reduction helps and some exercises may

Some surgical procedures have gained acceptance, including one to remove large bullae (lung cysts) that may be impeding the passage of air. If air becomes trapped in the space between the outer lung lining and the lining of the chest cavity (a condition called pneumothorax) it can be removed in a surgical procedure. Certain breathing emergencies may require a tracheotomy (an opening in the windpipe).

But from your letter I believe the specific surgery to which you refer involves certain nerves. In some parts of the country, surgeons have clipped nerves in the neck to assist breathing relaxing certain muscles. However, since this may affect other important functions of those nerves the procedure is considered risky. For example, the nerve involved also detects low oxygen in the blood as a way of controlling breathing. Other nerve-clipping procedures have been tried but have no proven value.

Dear Dr. Ruble: Besides alcoholic drinks, what else must an alcoholic using Antabuse avoid in the way of food, etc? - J.J.

Antabuse is a drug that causes a violent reaction in the body in the presence of alcohol. That is the basis of its use in alcoholism and why it is called an "antagonist" drug.

The list of foods to avoid is too lengthy to list here, but they include many medicines. Some may contain as much as 50 percent alcoholic content. The user has to read labels closely. For most products there are alcohol-free substitutes. Some toothpastes, for example, can be a hidden source of alcohol, and it takes only a minute amount to trigger the Antabuse reaction. To be on the safe side alcohol should be avoided for 14 days after the last dose of Antabuse.

Jury aims at Bullock

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) - The Travis County grand jury focuses on Comptroller Bob Bullock's office today as four former and present state employees appear to testify.

The four were Ed White, head of manpower services; Paul Wehrle, research director of legal services; Leslie Vilas, Bullock's personal secretary; and Randall B. Wood, former chief clerk and now an Austin attorney.

They showed up Friday, but the grand jury was

tied up on another case and asked them to return at 1 p.m. today. Bullock's pilot and three others testified last week.

A previous grand jury criticized Bullock's recordkeeping, expense vouchers and use of state airplanes, but returned no indictments.

The present grand jury reportedly is investigating if travel vouchers were turned in for hotel rooms provided at no cost. But an investigation source said that allegation

apparently is mistaken. The secretary does the travel vouchers and she might not have been aware it was a complimentary

room. It looks like that's what happened," the Bullock declined a grand jury invitation to testify

on advice of his lawyer Roy Minton. The attorney said the district attorney's office would not agree to limit its questions to allegations of possible criminal

Silkwood trial continues

OKLAHOMA CITY (AP) - James V. Smith, a former supervisor at a nuclear fuel plant, is expected to testify in a \$11.5 million plutonium contamination trial that employees at the plant were forced to work in contaminated areas.

The suit was brought by survivors of Karen Silkwood, an Oklahoma City woman who died in a 1974 auto accident. The federal court suit alleges that Miss Silkwood, a lab technician, was contaminated with highly radioactive plutonium because Kerr-McGee Corp. didn't take sufficient safety

Smith, who was in charge of the liquid plutonium segment of the manufacturing process, was expected today to repeat allegations he made in a magazine interview more than a year ago.

SEATTLE (AP) - Numerous Puget Sound islanders were jolted awake by a moderate earthquake early today, less than 24 hours after a tremor that was felt in much of southwestern Washington state.

Bud Odell of the geophysical observatory in Newport said the quake northwest of Everett at 4:41 a.m. today registered 3.4 on the Richter scale, while the temblor at 6:40 a.m. Sunday registered 3.8 and was centered northeast of Kelso.

The Island County sheriff's office reported numerous calls, mostly from the Camano Island and the northern part of Whidbey Island.

HARTFORD, Conn. (AP) Sen. Lowell P. Weicker Jr., vowing to swim against a conservative political tide, today formally entered the race for the 1980 GOP presidential nomination.

"I don't want the United States to snuggle up with its past or get comfortable with its present. Just as with this candidacy, I want the nation up, out and looking for trouble - not running away from it," the junior senator from Connecticut told reporters at a midday news conference at the Old State

Weicker, 47, promised to fight what he called an antigovernment trend in which "Democrats and Republicans alike, in a cheap quest for votes, spit on the word government and tell a nation used to dreaming and ac-complishing the impossible that the future of America is no more than a good day today.

The first Republican liberal to declare his candidacy, he said his party needs a candidate who can win the general election as well as the nomination. Conceding that he faces tough odds, Weicker pledged to enter every presidential primary in the country.

Lopez, who made mincemeat of the Ladies Professional Association tour last year, posted her first victory of 1979 in a most dramatic fashion Sunday, sinking a 10foot birdie putt on the 18th hole to nip Hollis Stacy by one stroke in a \$100,000 LPGA tournament.

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) Texas legislators started the 10th week of the 66th Legislature today with a scheduled debate on tax relief measures approved by voters last November.

However, considerable attention turns this afternoon to a Senate committee hearing on an old familiar subject - horse

race betting.
On Tuesday, one of Gov. Bill Clements' key campaign promises comes up before another Senate committee the right of initiative and

House plans call for the package bill that implements the Tax Relief Amendment to be laid out and explained representives at their aft-ernoon session. Action on amendments begins Tuesday.

The package automatically exempts \$5,000 of the market value of every Texas owner-occupied home from school taxes. Homes owned by the disabled and those over 65 would get an additional \$10,000 exemption. School taxes of persons 65 or over would be frozen, except they would be increased for any additions or major improvements. It also would exempt two cars per family from property taxes, starting in 1980. Farm, ranch and timber land would be taxed on its productivity, except for foreign-owned land.

The measure has a definite prohibition against taxation of intangible wealth, such as bank accounts, stocks and bonds

ENCINAL, Texas (AP) -Progress - in the form of a gleaming new stretch of Interstate 35 — is killing Encinal.

The tiny South Texas town

had to pass through it on U.S. 81 before the final stretch of the Canada-to-Mexico interstate highway was completed last summer.

City officials said an estimated 3,400 drivers passed through Encinal in a typical day before the interstate, many of them stopping for gas at one of the town's four service stations, soft drinks at one of the four grocery stores or a chickenfried steak platter at one of the five cafes.

Now the heavy traffic zips past on heavily-traveled I-35 only 200 vards east of old U.S. 81 in downtown Encinal. A few cars exit the new highway and stop, but most drivers hold out another 39 miles until they reach Laredo

And Encinal's residents are feeling the pinch.

'We depended on tourists. Right now we're barely making it," said Robert F. Aldaco, a La Salle County commissioner and owner of the Recreation Center Cafe. "They built the highway to get the tourists from one big city to another to spend their money. It's eliminating the small towns, like my Encinal."

"I hate to say it, but there's no future here. People who can are leaving. The ones who stay aren't working," he added.

WASHINGTON (AP) Although many farmers and trade officials are optimistic that China may be developing into a giant regular market for American farmers, a report by the Agriculture Department suggests a more conservative view.

"Given China's history as an erratic market for farm products, caution is in order regarding its import potential, especially since Chinese crop production appears to be recovering from the drought-induced setbacks of 1977 and 1978," it said. The report was published

expressed qualified optoday by the department's Foreign Agricultural Service in its weekly magazine, "Foreign Agriculture." was written by the magazine's associate editor, Beverly Horsley. Another reason for caution

about China, the report said, is that it "has been the target of aggressive sales efforts by other countries," including Australia, Canada and Argentina, and the European Economic Community "with its surplus of wheat for sale at subsidized prices.'

However, the report said, China's role in the world market "must now be viewed in a new light that reflects the dramatic changes" made recently in U.S.-Chinese diplomatic relations and China's economic priorities.

"The other component of China's new look is its decision to push toward becoming a major economic power," the report said. Not only is the country seeking industrial expansion, but it also appears determined to modernize agriculture.

China in 1978 began buying large quantities of U.S. grain for the first time in four years. Department experts say this business is expected to continue for some time. depending on how China is able to progress with its plans to step-up poultry and ivestock production.

Cotton prices diminished

B. B. Manley reported that 20,000 cotton samples were classed at the U.S.D.A. Cotton Marketing Services Office in Abilene during the week ending Friday. About 9,000 samples were classed from bales produced in the Abilene territory, and the remaining 11,000 were from the Munda territory. This brough the seasonal total to 441,000 samples classed in Abilene, and 60,000 classed at Munday.

Local cotton prices were mostly lower during the past week. Prices declined by as much as two cents per pound early in the week, then recovered about one-half of the earlier losses on Thursday. Bid prices ranged from 61/2 to 9 cents per pound over CCC loan values. Most mixed quality lots of cotton sold at 49 to 51 cents per pound. Demand was light to moderate, and trading was

Cotton classed in Abilene during the past week was 65 percent Light-Spotted, 25 percent White, and 10 percent Spotted grades. Grade 52 comprised 38 percent of the total classings. Grade 42 comprised 25 percent, and grade 51 comprised 18 percent. Fiber length was 60 percent staple 32, 20 percent staple 33, and 19 percent staple 31.

Micronaire readings were 53 percent within the 35 to 49 range. About 13 percent miked from 33 to 34, 16 percent miked from 30 to 32. and 12 percent miked from 27 to 29: About 64 percent of the samples were reduced in grade because of bark or
