Only half of American cattle are treated with growth hormones, but the administration objected to having to implement a new and costly inspection system that would allow the U.S. Agriculture Department to certify that meat bound for Europe did not contain hormones.

Besides, the government officials pointed out, it has been proven that the five growth hormones allowed for the American beef industry have been proven safe. These include estradiol, testosterone, progesterone and two synthetic compounds, zeranol and trenbolene acetate.

Earlier, the government banned the use of another hormone, diethylstilbesterol, known as DES, which had been linked to some health problems.
