Jim Boyle, executive director of the consumers association, said the deceptive trade practices act would be "an act in name only" if the Hill bill becomes law.

"The consumer would not have an effective remedy when someone does not correct the problem - fix the car or the washing machine," Boyle said. He and Katy Davis, another representative of the association, said only triple damages provide enough money to give a lawyer an incentive to take a consumer case involving relatively small amounts of money.

First for Massey, last for Nagel

By JAMES WERRELL Today's Big Spring City Council meeting was the first for John Massey as a new member and the last for Harry Nagel as city manager.

McLaughlin elected mayor pro-tem

Massey, the winner of an April 28 runoff election in which he deposed incumbent Polly Mays, was officially sworn in to his new post this morning. Nagel, who had announced his resignation several weeks ago, said that today would be his last to serve as

city manager. "I had intended to leave Friday, but the Mayor (Wade Choate) asked that I stay until today. My private business is going to the devil, and I need to do something about it," said Nagel, following the meeting. "If the council

Feazelle, currently an assistant city manager, will fill Nagel's post on an interim basis. Honoring Nagel's wishes, the council will require his

services only as a consultant, said Choate. The mayor estimated that inter-

views of applicants for the job will take approximately 30 days. A proposed ordinance to regulate peddlers and itinerant merchants again sparked controversy at today's regular meeting of the Big Spring City Council

At the last regular meeting, Councilmen Bill Henkel and Ralph McLaughlin were appointed to review the proposed ordinance after several local property owners had cried foul. The ordinance originally called for a \$100-a-day fee for peddlers, solicitors and itinerant merchants for operation within the city

Some of the merchandise sold by these itinerant merchants is of questionable quality, and where are they when a citizen wants to complain or return an item?

Omar Jones, local contractor, took the opposite tack: I've lived here for 20 years, and I think this ordinance is discriminating against me. I have the best location in Big Spring (for rental to peddlers) at Fourth and Gregg, and they all have state tax certificates.

"I compete against out-of-town builders, and I don't understand why these people (the peddlers) can't compete here. I don't believe this is free enterprise, and I don't believe we should freeze competition out of Big Spring

Councilman Bill Henkel nominated fellow member Ralph McLaughlin, and member Larry Miller seconded the motion. Massey abstained from the voting, saying that he had not had "the opportunity to meet with all the council members."

Nonetheless, McLaughlin received enough votes to be elected.

Meeting in closed session following the regular meeting, the council reviewed 12 applications from those seeking Nagel's job, according to Mayor Choate.

NEW MAYOR PRO-TEM - Twoterm Councilman Ralph McLaughlin today was elected to serve as mayor pro-tem of the city. He replaces Polly Mays, who was defeated in an April 28 runoff election and who had served as mayor pro-tem for

three terms.

"We narrowed the list to seven, whom we intend to begin interviewing immediately," he said. "The ap-plicants are all Texans, and represent a good cross-section of the state. They are all either assistant city managers or city managers," he added.

None of the applicants to be considered are Big Springers, said the mayor

Henkel and McLaughlin came back today with the verdict that this fee should be reduced to \$25. This made almost no one happy. "I think that this ordinance should

be designed to protect Big Spring merchants. These peddlers don't contribute anything to the city. I think the fee should remain at \$100," said Tally Murphy, manager of the local Montgomery Wards Store.

Bill Albright, manager of the Big Spring Area Chamber of Commerce, echoed these sentiments: "The chamber is an organization devoted to the promotion of free enterprise. But I urge the council to consider an ordinance that will protect the people.

Following discussion, a motion was made to pass the ordinance on an emergency basis, retaining the \$100-aday fee that was initially suggested Councilman Ralph McLaughlin voted against the proposal, causing it to fail on an emergency basis, but allowing it to pass on a first reading.

The ordinance will be considered once again at the next regular meeting.

A review of bids for new golf cart sheds at the Municipal Golf Course also raised some hackles at the meeting. The city received bids from three companies to provide prefab materials for the carts, and even the lowest bid was more expensive than predicted by Paul Feazelle, assistant city manager. "I had an initial estimate of around

\$12,000. And there's a lot of difference between that and \$18,531 (the low bid submitted by Bryant Construction Company)," said Feazelle.

Bill Chrane, local recreational vehicle dealer, accused the city of dragging its feet.

'You have been considering this for three months. Now let's get going. You have the low bid, and you should go ahead and accept it," he said.

As an alternative, Feazelle suggested that another bid for nonpre-fabricated materials be submitted for consideration. Using these materials, city crews would serve as a construction force.

Councilman Henkel made a motion to that effect, and it was passed unanimously by the council.

Members also listened to an explanation of a county-wide mapping program by Earl Dean, county tax appraiser. According to Dean, the program of extensive aerial photography of the entire county egan last spring.

"The county has never been properly mapped before. This will provide ownership mapping on both urban and rural scales," he said.

No serious injuries in San Francisco quake

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Tall buildings trembled, but there were no serious injuries or damage when the second moderate earthquake in 10 days shook northern California. "It was pretty scary. The whole foundation of the house shook badly," said Carmen Irizarry of East San Jose after Monday night's tremors struck at 10:11 p.m. PDT. The earthquake was measured at

The earthquake was measured at 4.8 on the Richter scale by the University of California Seismographic Center at Berkeley,

and at 4.9 by the National Earthquake Information Service in Golden, Colo. Several aftershocks, including one of

2.6, following the main temblor. Officials said they believed it was the strongest quake in the San Francisco Bay area since 1970 when one registering 4.9 was centered near Danville, about 15 miles east of Oakland.

The epicenter was placed along the Calaveras Fault system, five miles west of Mt. Hamilton and 10 miles east of San Jose, a city of 600,000, about 60

miles southeast of San Francisco. In East San Jose, Larry Zanella said the refrigerator fell over in his kitchen, and in nearby Los Gatos, Ron

Vielicka said the quake set his dogs howling and growling. "My dogs went bananas beginning about two hours before it hit, and



BALTIMORE (AP) - A former Maryland National Bank employee who couldn't keep up with his work hid more than 25,000 Master Charge bill payments worth about \$2.5 million, bank officials

Diet not cause of disease

NEW YORK (AP) - The American Council on Science and Health says diet, particularly the use of artificial food coloring, does not cause hyperactivity in children.

The independent council reviewed studies on hyperactivity and diet after a California allergist suggested hyperactivity is caused by artificial food additives and a substance used to make dyes. He recommended an additive-free diet. But council adviser Dr. Stephen Barrett said the diet could be dangerous because it teaches a child that "his behavior is controlled by what he eats.

Federal judge not resigning

FORT WORTH, Texas (AP) - A new federal judge says he's sorry he used the word "nigger" in a recent newspaper interview, but says he will not resign his post.

The local chapter of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People has called for the resignation of Judge David Belew, 59, who was sworn in Friday. Belew called the incident "ridiculous," adding, "The important thing is what I've done for them (blacks), and I've done a lot."

Belew was quoted in Thursday's Star-Telegram as saving, when asked about a certain club membership: "There is nothing in the club's by-laws about it (excluding blacks). It just didn't come up because no nigger - no black - ever applied for membership.

Blaze requires 150 firemen

TUCKERTON, N.J. (AP) - About 150 firefighters from two counties were called to battle a blaze that whipped through Tuckerton, destroying a 110-year-old church and two businesses, authorities said. No serious injuries were reported.

Authorities said the fire apparently started in a variety store and spread to a vacant storefront next door. Flaming embers carried by the wind landed on the First United Methodist Church. Witnesses said the wooden church was consumed in 20 minutes. Sparks from the blaze also ignited about a half-dozen homes. Authorities said those fires were quickly extinguished.





Out west, they opt for rent controls

The issue of rent control was placed before the voters in Santa Monica, Cal., recently and the electorate went for the idea by an impressive 54-46 ratio

Let it be noted that 78 percent of the residents of Santa Monica are renters. The voters also elected a slate of candidates for the city council that ran on a platform advocating rent control

THE CABAL HAD strong backing from the Campaign for Economic Democracy, a pro-rent control organization run by Tom Hayden and his wife, actress Jane Fonda

Hayden, an unsuccessful candidate for high public office in the past, stated prior to the election that he believes housing should be regulated as a public utility, a statement that won't exactly endear him to landlords

Rent controls in Santa Monica will be administered by a five-member rent control board. The body has power to determine the rate of rent increases, administer eviction control and grant permission for demolitions and abandonments.

Conversion of rental units to condominiums must get the blessing of the board. Rents must be rolled back to levels which existed prior to the passage of Proposition 13 in June 1978.

The property owners and landlords are not going down without a fight. A legal challenge to the measure is looming Santa Monica voters had rejected

the idea of rent control as recently as last June, then by a 56-44 margin. Failure of owners to pass on Proposition 13 tax savings to tenants plus a dramatic increase in demolitions to provide land for future

condominium development are said to be the causes of the reversal of voter sentiment

RENT CONTROL IS the last thing most communities want but it's a safe bet a lot of them will be watching the Santa Monica experiment. Trends, politically and otherwise, invariably start in California and sweep eastward.

Adopting something like a rent control measure is one thing. Living by it is something else again. The experiment should be interesting.


For close to a year, the grand jury has tried to untangle the Gordian knot of Lance's financial dealings. The jurors have heard testimony that he juggled bank accounts, ran up huge overdrafts and forged the names of relatives on bank notes. We also tipped off the prosecutors that he had forged a relative's name to checks.

Yet Carter brought Lance into the White House to handle the federal government's finances. "He was the first person that I thought about when I was finally sure that I would be elected president," Carter once told me. "I wanted him in a major and very complicated department that

In a stinging departure from his colleagues on the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, Helms' expected minority report criticizing new U.S. aid to finance the treaty will warn Carter on two fronts: that his Mideast peace course risks dangerous overarming of Israel and Egypt, and that it virtually invites the Soviet Union to exploit anti-U.S. reactions among such once-solid American friends as Jordan and Saudi Arabia.

WHAT MAKES THIS rebuke to Carter politically important is its Up to now, criticism of Carsource. ter's Mideast plans has centered among the Arab states that feel betrayed by the treaty. Helms' break carries a loud warning to both Carter and Israel that the pervasive pro-Israel position of American politicians may be bending under the weight of taxpayer fury at inflationary government spending and America's longrange stake in its major oil suppliers.

Similar warnings have recently been conveyed to the Israelis by some highly-placed politicians, including Senate majority leader Robert Byrd Byrd told the Israeli finance minister that new Israeli settlements on the Arab West Bank could hurt Israel's U.S. aid package. One Democratic congressional leader went further in private. He warned that with each new Israeli settlement on the West Bank, Congress might consider reducing U.S. aid.

No such punitive action is remotely in prospect today. But the fact that Helms became an immediate lobbying target of Israel's chief allies here shows that his criticism has a sharp and worrisome cutting edge.

Blood problem, sun sensitivity linked

Dear Dr. Ruble: I am under a fers from swallowing problems. He octor's care for a disease called prophyria cutanea tarda." I have to cannot breathe at times. He has not have blood removed from time to can be a bad sign. Is it? - Mrs. S.K. time. Can you fill me in on this con-

dition? - L.A.R. This is a relatively uncommon problem. I have encountered only two cases in 25 years of practice. It involves overproduction of a substance called porphyrin, found in the blood plasma, and, essential in forming of red blood cells Some forms of this are hereditary. Others are acquired from liver malfunction. Your's seems related to the liver problem, not as serious as the hereditary kind. It affects the skin (cutanea) and comes later in life (tarda). The chief symptom is sensitivity to sunlight, which causes a rash. with the hereditary form, there are also abdominal pains. Blood removal is one treatment, usually done at about two-week intervals for up to nine months. With this treatment the symptoms may subside for extended periods, even years. A more up-to-date treatment involves removal of the whole blood, separation of the plasma portion, and retransfusion of the red cells back to the patient. This avoids the anemia problem associated with the usual phlebotomy (bloodletting). Persons with this have to avoid alcohol. In some the disease is a consequence of alcoholism (liver damage). Other drugs have to be avoided, and your doctor can list them for you. It might be wise to wear a medical tag to avoid inadvertent use of certain drugs in emergency treatment. Dear Dr. Ruble: Can a sinus infection cause a toothache? - J.D. Yes, a problem involving the maxillary sinus may. This is the largest of the nasal sinuses. It is located in front of the upper jaw on either side near the nose itself. The bottom of this sinus is guite close to the eye tooth, and if it gets infected it

Amitay, executive director of the American-Israel Public Affairs Committee (AIPAC), the highly influential pro-Israeli lobbying organization here. In an April 3 "Dear John" letter, Amitay defended the Egyptian-Israeli agreement as a treaty "that can stand on its own, whether or not a larger settlement is achieved" on the West Bank or elsewhere.

Amitay disputed Helms' worry about overall Arab anger at the U.S.backed treaty. He claimed the U.S. has "extensive influence on Saudi Arabia and the Gulf sheikdoms which rely on American political protection for their survival."

The letter led to an inconclusive luncheon between Carbaugh and Amitay. This, in turn, was followed by an invitation to Carbaugh to meet Simon Weisenthal, the famed Nazi hunter, at a small, exclusive April 29 dinner party in the home of Republican Sen. John Warner of Virginia.

Carbaugh went, along with half a dozen senators, but the effort to appease Helms and halt his criticism of Israel fell short.

Dear Dr. Ruble: I need to know if this is a serious problem to be checked by a doctor. I am only 37 years old. I have many tiny, bright red blood spots underneath the top layer of skin. They never surface or break. My skin isn't over-dry or itchy. I've had them for a long time. Please advise. - Mrs. D.S. Red spots have to be examined to

see if this is actually bleeding under the skin. Yours sound very much like bleeding from a very low blood platelet count. Platelets are the blood's chief clotting substance. You should be examined to find the cause. Sometimes blood vessels become fragile and will bleed easily with certain illnesses or drugs.

LANCE CONDUCTED his banking business in an offhand, disorganized manner. He was refreshingly unpretentious, comfortably old-shoe. He would hold rump court in his shirtsleeves. "His office was always open," one associate recalled. "If he wasn't busy, you could walk right in." Witnesses alleged that Lance didn't always separate his banking business from his political fund raising. In 1974, he tried to succeed his friend, Jimmy Carter, as governor of Georgia. Insiders say Lance threw money around like confetti. He outspent all his opponents but finished third in the Democratic primary, with a campaign debt over half a million dollars. Lance allegedly negotiated loans from several small Georgia banks in which he owned a stock interest. When some loans became an issue in the campaign, he allegedly renegotiated them overnight and screened out the names of controversial endorsers. He also solicited campaign contributions from carpet manufacturers who had borrowed from his bank.

The following year, Lance began raising money for Jimmy Carter's presidential drive. At the same time, he doubled as Carter's banker. Carter moved his peanut accounts from a small local bank to the larger, Atlanta-based National Bank of Georgia after Lance took over the management.

The Carter peanut works quickly became the bank's biggest borrower. A \$1 million construction loan, examiners found, was not properly secured nor disbursed. An additional \$5.8 million in short-term commodity loans were improperly handled. Under pressure from Lance, the repayment checks sometimes would be held up without cashing.

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determine whether any loan money was illegally diverted into Jimmy Carter's 1976 campaign. The White House has denied there were any illegal transfers.

Footnote: Our associate Clark Mollenhoff interviewed Lance at his 400-acre farm a few miles outside Calhoun, Ga. The manor house is called "Lancelot." The guest house, hauled to the farm from town, has been named "Eagle's Nest." But the white picket fence around the farm has no name on the gate.

Lance did not discuss his own legal troubles, which we have detailed in past columns. But he commented briefly on the controversial loans to the Carter peanut works. He was unfamiliar, he said, with the servicing of the loans which had been handled by subordinates. And once the money had been disbursed, he added, "I had no knowledge of what happened to the money in the Carter business."

He had no control, he stressed, over Billy Carter's handling of the loan proceeds. "I have no responsibility if Billy blew it," said Lance. He also declared firmly: "I don't know if the

money was used in the campaign." What does he expect the grand jury to do later this month? Bert Lance, a hero to his neighbors in Calhoun, expects to be indicted.

Revised gasoline rationing plan stands better chance of passage

WASHINGTON (AP) - Congressional energy leaders say President Carter's revised gasoline rationing plan stands a better chance of approval than his first version. But extremely close votes are expected.

"We're in a tight fight, a very tight fight," said chairman Henry M. Jackson, D-Wash., of the Senate **Energy** Committee.

His panel was taking up the modified measure to give the president standby authority to order rationing at a hastily called meeting today.

A Senate floor vote was planned later in the day if the committee approved the plan. "I would assume we'll get it out of committee. But on the floor, the vote could be very close. There's going to be quite a debate," Jackson said. And Rep. John Dingell, D-Mich., chairman of the House energy and power subcommittee, said he anticipates the

plan will face considerable resistance in the House if it passes the Senate.

"It will be difficult," Dingell said. Both Jackson and Dingell said they endorsed the changes made by Carter, which they claimed improved the overall plan.

Faced with likely rejection of the original plan in Congress this week, the president sent on Monday an amendment to the plan that would expand the amount of gasoline some states could get.

The modified version would give more gasoline to states like those in the West where driving distances are large and where more gasoline has been used in the past. Carter's original plan would have allocated rationing

coupons based solely on the number of registered cars in a household. Under the modification, the amount would be based half on the number of vehicles in a family and half on the amount of gasoline historically used in each state.

The modified formula also would allow households to get ration rights for no more than three vehicles The changes were aimed at picking up support for the

plan from various congressional critics. But Jackson said in an interview there are still "so many competing interests" that even the new plan could be in jeopardy

"I have yet to see a proposal that is considered by all involved as being fair," Jackson said. "This is an effort to find some accommodation. I just don't know what will happen on it.

However, Jackson said, if the revised rationing plan isn't approved, "probably no plan can pass.

The administration says it has no intentions of using the rationing plan in the near future, but that Congress should approve it so the president could invoke it if needed.

In a related development, Sen. Russell B. Long, D-La. strongly criticized Carter's proposal for a "windfall profits" tax on additional revenue oil companies would realize under his companion proposal to remove price controls from domestic crude oil starting next month.

Long, chairman of the Senate Finance Committee, said denying the oil industry money to increase production would leave communist nations in a position to dominate the world.







They are, of course, the exception rather than the rule. "If you find anything that is lower in price, it's a rather fluky situation." said one economist who did not want his name used.

Among the exceptions is the hand-held calculator, introduced to the general public in the early 1970s. In 1972, according to the Electronic Industries Association, the minimum price for a pocket calculator was about \$100. Today, you can buy one for less than \$10. Comparing today's prices with those of the past is hard because of the 1978 revision in the Consumer Price Index. The items checked today are not necessarily the same ones priced 10 years



(AP) - Gov. Bill Clements says he changed his mind and decided to back a bill raising the 10 percent ceiling on mortgage rates because it would protect Texas from a 'money flight."

"It was not a decision I took lightly," Clements told members of the Texas Bankers Association Monday. "But it was a timely one, and protects us from money flight.

"I was getting into a situation where the average homeowner was not able to buy," he said, adding that it also threatened a crisis to the construction trades "and tens of thousands of workers.'

Clements said he expects the Legislature to pass a new usury bill within the next two weeks.

The state's 10 percent usury ceiling has been a subject of heated debate in recent weeks because it has limited the flow of funds into home mortgages. The governor at first said he would veto an attempt to lift the ceiling, but, he told bankers, he was "under extreme pressure to do something.

Athlete of the Decade

Nicklaus wins prestigious award

Quick, after eliminating Muhammad Ali, whom would you pick as "Athlete of the Decade" for the 1970s 3

Rod Carew, baseball's computerized siege gun? Football's great O.J. Simpson? Hockey's Bobby Orr? Skyscraper Kareem Abdul-Jabbar or watchfob Bill Shoemaker, tennis' Jimmy Connors and Chris Evert? Try again. It's Jack Nicklaus, not only the golfer of

the decade but also of the generation, without too much argument perhaps the greatest ever.

When Big Jack made a strong run at Muhammad Ali a year ago in the inaugural "Athlete of the Decade" balloting conducted by the American Cancer Society, it was inevitable that the honor could not escape him for long

It didn't. In the second poll of the nations' editors, sports writers and broadcasters, Nicklaus was an overwhelming winner over a cordon of the most illustrious champions in sports. He will be honored at a New York dinner June 7.

Nicklaus' record of 17 major championships - five Masters, three U.S. and three British Opens, four PGA's and two U.S. Amateur crowns is an achievement that defies the imagination. That's eight more than won by 43-year-old Gary Player, 10 more than 49-year-old Arnold Palmer's seven - his closest active pursuers.

The game is filled with lean, keen and hungry tigers so grooved it appears they came off an assembly line - but the shadow of the Golden Bear hovers over them every time they tee up a ball. They look over their shoulders apprehensively. Nicklaus, at age 38, remains the man to beat

No one in sports - not even Ali - has so dominated or been a finer credit to his particular profession. As Muhammad Ali mesmerized the world with his fighting skills, bombast and charm, Nicklaus has woven a gentlemanly grace into his tapestry of silver trophies and gold boullion. In deportment and relations with the public and press, he has set a mold that other super stars would do well to emulate.

Nicklaus is unique in that he virtually has had two careers.

Nicklaus, a links prodigy, was winning tournaments at 13, beating the best men players in Ohio at 16. He won the U.S. Amateur at 19 and as a rookie pro of 22 beat Arnold Palmer in a playoff for the U.S. Open title, changing the course of bigtime golf.

He was a bulbous boy of 220 pounds, wide of girth, with thick hips and legs, and a crewcut hairstyle that accented his round German face. Derided because he posed a threat to the idolized Palmer, he became edgy and resentful

In the late 1960s, he seemed to become bored. His game suffered. "Jack has burned himself out," critics said. Sam Snead and Frank Beard were among those who predicted he was through.

As the decade of the 1970s emerged, so did a new Jack Nicklaus - a trim, handsome athlete of 180 pounds, more confident, more patient, more amenable. His game flowered. The decade brought him eight of his majors and some of his finest golf.

"People keep writing my obituary," Jack said at the Masters. "I hate to disappoint them — I think I've got a few years left."




