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Gas rationing plan heads for showdown

Carter's latest proposal to gain standby gasoline rationing authority for a showdown vote in the Senate today. Leaders predicted a closely fought battle.

Senate Democratic Leader Robert C. Bryd of West Virginia, asked about the rationing plan's chances of ap-proval, told reporters: "We're working on it.

Said Assistant Senate Republican Leader Ted Stevens of Alaska: "It will be very close."

Under Carter's new plan — the second revision made by the White House — gasoline coupons would be distributed to states based on past gasoline usage.

Stevens said he and many GOP members opposed the plan because it sets no standards governing how rationing would be invoked.

Under the measure, such a decision would be left solely to the president's discretion. Energy officials say the plan would not be invoked unless there were at least a 20 percent reduction in current U.S. oil supplies, such as might be caused by another Arab oil embargo.

"It could be triggered by a bureaucratic error, by a misallocation of oil supplies," Stevens said. "And if it ever is imposed, it would be hard for the country to ever get out of it."

Meanwhile, the House Rules Committee met today on procedural matters that would allow a House vote on the rationing proposal — should it pass the Senate - to take place

The administration has said it has no plans to impose gasoline rationing in the near future, but wants the authority in the event of a severe oil

Sen. Henry M. Jackson, D-Wash., chairman of the Senate Energy Committee, warned that "the alternative is to tolerate anarchy at

Carter ditched two earlier standby rationing proposals and sent Congress an entirely new version Tuesday, one that would distribute rationing coupons based on how much gasoline

states generally use.

Those in states where gasoline use per vehicle is high would receive the largest share of the coupons.

Southern states would benefit if president's proposal okayed

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Carter's latest gasoline rationing plan, based on traditional consumption patterns, would generally benefit Southern and border states.

Here is a breakdown of comparisons between Carter's third plan, being considered today in the Senate, and the original plan rejected earlier by a Senate committee: Winners

Arkansas and Texas each would get 19 percent more; Mississippi 17 percent more; South Carolina and the District of Columbia 16 percent more; Georgia and Virginia 14 percent more; Delaware, 12 percent more; Missouri, 11 percent more; New Mexico 11; Louisiana 10; Arizona 10; Tennessee 10; Nevada 9; Wisconsin 7; Michigan 6; Maine 6; Wyoming 6; West Virginia 5; New Ham-pshire 5; Vermont 5, Maryland 4, New York 3, Kentucky 2 and New Jersey 1.

There would be no change for Indiana, Alabama, Utah, Illinois and North Carolina, which consumed about the national average of 49 gallons of gasoline per month per car during 1977, the base period used by the administration. Average consumption is 0jokected to rise to 64 gallons per month by 1980.



As gasoline prices continue to reach new heights, travelers are turning to mass transportation as an economical

Assaults rise. car thefts dip

Crime in Big Spring dropped during April, but the drop was by less than a

tenth of a per cent

April, but the drop was by less than a tenth of a per cent.

When compared with the previous month, April showed a drop in local crime of .00 per cent. No murders or rapes occurred in April, compared to one each during March.

Three robberies were reported during April; two more than in March. Auto thefts dropped from seven to six for the month.

Thefts during the month dropped from 60 to 56, but the drop was counterbalanced by a rise in both burglaries and assaults. Burglaries rose from 20 to 27, while thefts rose from 41 to 40.

The clearance rate for reported cases rose from 65 per cent to 69 per cent. This was perhaps due to an easier workload for detectives.

The average number of cases worked by each detective during April dropped from 41.7 for the previous month to 27.x4.

Jim Owens, manager of the local Greyhound Bus Lines, and Andy Terango, manager of Trailways, both say they are experiencing an in-creased business due to the increased cost of traveling by car.

The savings ca be substantial. For

example, a person can purchase a roundtrip ticket from Big Spring to Odessa from Trailway for \$8.55. At 30 cents a mile, the amount that most companies allow employees for operating and maintaining vehicles used in travel, it would cost \$36 for the same round trip by car.

"We're getting into the summer season and business usually does pick up this time of year," said Owens, "but it seems to be heavier than it should be.

"We're anticipating quite an in-crease in business as the gasoline

crease in business as the gasonne situation worsens."

Tarango said that his business is already "increasing quite a bit".

And it appears that those segments of the population that have the most difficulty in making ends meet are the ones taking the most advantage of public transportation.

Bill designed to curtail music, art in schools upsets teachers

A bill which would place severe restrictions on music and art programs below the ninth grade level in public schools, which has already slipped through virtually unnoticed in the Texas House of Representatives and is now being studied by a com-mittee in the Senate, has Fine Arts teachers worried.

Identified as House Bill 921, the legislation would, the teachers insist, simply remove such studies from the curriculum from kindergarten through the eighth grade.

The legislation was introduced by a state representative from Austin named Wilhimina Delco. Fine Arts teachers say that it was Ms. Delco's intent to put new emphasis on vocational and career-oriented courses in the lower grades, to provide new incentives for minority

It would still be possible to offer such programs in the lower grades, according to George (Buddy) Pedigo, choir director at Goliad Middle School, but interested students would have to undergo studies after school

The surprising thing about the legislation is that it passed in the house by the overwhelming margin of

Pedigo said he had been in conversation with Sen. Ray Farabee's office, however, and Farabee had predicted that the bill would never ave the Senate committee

Bill Cormack, head of the Fine Arts Department in the Midland schools and a member of the executive committee of the Texas Music Educators Association, is organizing

Sen. Vale of Killeen is sponsoring the bill in the upper house, reportedly with some reluctance. Oscar Mauzey is chairman of the Senate committee

which is studying the bill.
Under terms of the bill, students in Kindergarten through the third grade would be restricted to classes offering 95 per cent basic skills (math; reading, language arts, science; social studies, health and PE.)

Those in the fourth through the sixth

rades would be limited to 90 per cent basic skill courses and five per cent work skills (career education and vocation courses).

The seventh and eighth grades will-demand 85 per cent basic skills and ten per cent work skills. Those in the ninth through the 12th grades would be restricted to 60 per cent basic skills, 20 per cent work skills and 20 per cent elective course.

Big Spring water contains 53 grains. Installing soft water in your home would be extremely beneficial. An alternative is to use "Lime-Away," a product recommended by many appliance manufacturers and available at the grocery store. Or you can use a homemade remedy. First, place a cup containing % cup of chlorine bleach inside of the dishwasher and turn it on. Repeat the procedure using % cup of vinegar. To help protect against future build-up, Brown suggests dumping % tablespoon of vinegar into the dishwasher before each use.

Most dangerous age for driving- 16-24

Rare are the parents of teen-agers who don't feel some concern when their sons and daughters drive away on a date, a business mission or to meet a school schedule.

Young adults are injured in automobile accidents far out of proportion to their share of the population, according to a recent study made by the insurance industry.

THE SURVEY included the figures from more than 53,000 injury claims revealed that persons between the ages 16 and 24 accounted for more than 30 per cent of the injury claims paid by auto insurers, even though this group makes up only 17 per cent

the nation's population.
Individuals under age 16 and those
65 and older were under-represented in the group sustaining injury, while those in the 25 to 64 age group reported injuries roughly in proportion to their share of the population.

The high injury rates generated by younger adults were especially evident in serious injury cases, which might indicate that excessive speeds were involved in many of the wrecks. The faster a car is going, the more chance for major injury. Many young people are enchanted by the opportunity for maximum acceleration while driving a car.

In a separate study of auto in-surance claims that are expected to cost \$100,000 or more, about 48 percent of the injured people were between the ages of 16 and 24.

The average cost per injury is expected to run \$293,200, according to the injury study, and males accounted for 65 percent of those catastrophic injury cases.

Another study, based on a survey of 1,849 families that had experienced an injury-producing auto accident, found that persons with relatively minor injuries collect more reimbursement per dollar of economic loss than those with serious injuries. The trend holds true regardless of whether they

collect from auto insurance, health insurance or various government benefit sources.

ABOUT 22 PERCENT of the injured persons in the study reported they hired an attorney to assist them with their claims. Those residing in large cities were more than twice as likely to retain attorneys as those living in

Regardless of more vehicle safety devices and lowered speed limits on highways, traffic accidents remain among the most costly in the nation and are still one of the leading causes

WASHINGTON - Let others rely on George Gallup, Elmo Roper and Lou Harris for guidance in next year's presidential sweepstakes. We prefer 'Jimmy the Greek" Snyder, who calculates the political odds exclusively for us.

While Jimmy's rep as an oddsmaker is based on spotting events, he applies the same skills in his evaluation of political prospects: He

talks in the insiders who know the game best—the state party character and other seasoned political pros.

At this point, 10 months before the first presidential primary in New Hampshire, Jimmy rates President Carter as the odds-on favorite to win the Democratic nomination, and gives Ronald Reagan an almost even chance to be the Republicans' stan-

dard bearer. Here is Jimmy's "early morning on the race for the White House

CARTER: 4 TO 5. Though his popularity among party leaders is low

— Snyder talked to nine key state chairmen and not one wanted Carter as their candidate — the president has the enormous advantage of incumbency. Rarely have political parties dumped a sitting president; to do so would be a confession of failure that would taint the party's image

with the voters. Teddy Kennedy: 7 to 5. Kennedy was the unanimous choice of the state chairmen Jimmy talked to; all Teddy would have to do is say "Okay." But Kennedy fears that an open challenge would split the Democratic party and give the GOP the presidency. If Carter continues to slip in popular esteem, however, Teddy might be prevailed upon to run. Intimates say he has a low opinion of Jerry Brown and wouldn't want him to pick up the

nomination by default. Jerry Brown: 12 to 1. The young California governor is ready to challenge Carter in the primaries. While his mod lifestyle, chameleonlike politics and general flakiness turn a lot of people off, Brown did beat Carter four times after a belated entry into the 1976 primaries. Brown's stock would also go up dramatically if he were the only alternative to Carter.

Back in the pack at 20 to 1, Jimmy the Greek rates the other Democratic possibilities as definitely dark horses Vice President Fritz Mondale Sens. Pat Moynihan, Robert Byrd and Frank Church, Rep. Mo Udall and Health, Education and Welfare Secretary Joe Califano

The Republicans odds: Reagan: 6 to 5. The 68-year-old former Hollywood star and California governor is still the darling of the Republican right. His age is his biggest drawback, but his personal charm and conservative pronounts still cause flutters am little old ladies. He also has a

professional campaign organization, virtually intact from the 1976 race. John Connally: 3 to 1. The silver-haired spellbinder from Texas is coming on strong. He has an effective campaign team, he exudes a presidential aura of strength and confidence, and his views are conservative enough to pick up Reagan delegates should their favorite falter. But he is still remembered as a Democrat-turned-Republican, and his connection with Richard Nixon gives him a Waterstate tie that is no adconnection with Richard Nixon gives him a Watergate tie that is no advantage. He was acquitted of taking bribes from the dairy lobby, but the fact that he was indicted at all can hardly be considered a plus.

Howard Baker: 7 to 1. The Senate minority leader is offering himself as a moderate alternative to the con-

servative favorites, and he might be a compromise candidate in a deadlocked convention.

George Bush: 10 to 1. Another moderate dark horse, Bush is a Texan with strong ties to the Eastern establishment. His tenure as head of the Central Intelligence Agency is regarded as a drawback.

JERRY FORD: 15 TO 1. Though his personal popularity remains high, and he could were at the convention, the former president stands little change of getting the nomination unless he fights for it. And this he apparently won't do.

Phil Crane: 15 to 1. The Illinois congressman is overshadowed by fellow conservatives Reagan and Connally. But he has youth and per-sonal charisma, and if he manages to upset Reagan in New Hampshire, he

might make it. The longshots at 50 to 1 include Illinois Gov. Jim Thompson, Sens, Robert Dole, Lowell Weicker and Paul Laxalt, and Reps. John Anderson and Jack Kemp. Lightning isn't likely to strike them.

MARRAKESH EXPRESS: Despite President Carter's well-orchestrated paeans of praise for frugality in government, members of his Administration are still sticking the taxpayers for global junkets. Com-merce Secretary Juanita Kreps, for example, recently jetted off to Tunisia, Morocco and Romania, accompanied by a large retinue. The trip cost \$100,000. So big was the party that the hotel in the resort town of Marrakesh didn't have enough room; the Moroccan government oblingly kicked out enough guests to make room for the Kreps entourage. A Commerce Department spokesman explained that Kreps performed numerous official functions on the

JERRY'S JIBE: Aside from his African safari with singer Linda Ronstadt, California Gov. Jerry Brown's credentials on foreign policy are apparently felt to be a little lightweight for a presidential aspirant. So he has now delivered himself of a private opinion on the signing of a mutual defense pact with Philippines President Ferdinand Marcos that will allow the United States to maintain military bases in the islands. "It's ridiculous to pay tribute to foreign dictatorships, sniffed Brown.



Nixon on

Evans, Novak

WASHINGTON - Richard M Nixon recently had some charitable things to say about Jimmy Carter, telling one visitor that the president is doing much better than the press gives him credit for but badly needs to tighten his control of the federal bureaucracy.

In an expansive mood during a long, rambling political chat with a wellknown Washington lawyer, Nixon offered his usual list of helpful hints. To start with, he said, Robert Strauss, Carter's inside jack-of-all-trades, should be made director of the Office of Management and Budget (OMB) one of the truly powerful jobs in any administration.

Nixon's message: control of the bureaucracy, which Nixon himself never achieved, is eluding Carter. Part of the reason are cabinet members too much out for themselves Nixon cited Health, Education and Welfare Secretary Joseph Califano) or not "with it" (he cited Housing and Urban Development Secretary Patricia Harris)

WITH STRAUSS running OMB, he said, Carter could use his talents to extend presidential influence to all the departments and tighten up White House control over policy decisions.

Carter also needs a hard-nosed "Kennedy-style" politician to run national politics for him, said the former president. But on the inflation front, which he called Carter's toughest issue. Nixon was not critical of Carter or of his inflation-fighter, Alfred Kahn, Nixon described Carter's deregulation plans as good antiinflation medicine, but declared himself in the dark as to just how inflation could be brought to heel.

THE GLENN FACTOR

The condition of bad blood that President Carter seems to have encouraged between himself and Ohio's Democratic Sen. John Glenn, a vocal critic of the new strategic arms limitation treaty (SALT II), threatens lethal harm to the president in the Senate treaty debate.

The president has failed to communicate in any way with America's first astronaut since the day that Glenn, under heavy presidential pressure, censured his remarks during christening of the new Trident submarine Ohio.

Glenn agreed to remove from his prepared text that day early last month most allusions to the explosive question of verification of Soviet honesty in adhering to the stillunsigned treaty. Yet, despite the expurgations, Rosalynn Carter, representing her husband at the Groton, Conn., christening, publicly chided Glenn for raising "very questions about damaging" verification.

What this means is that Glenn, whose opposition to SALT II does not approach the intensity of the bipartisan defense-oriented Senate block, may be lost to the president in the hot ratification debate.

WHY NOT SHCHARANSKY?

The conspicuous absence of Anatoly Shcharansky from the list of Soviet dissidents exchanged for those two Russian spies worries Soviet specialists here. Shcharansky, it is felt here, is being held as a carrot-andstick weapon to play against President Carter in the final stages of the strategic arms limitation treaty (SALT II) negotiations.

Under this plausible theory, Shcharansky's fate would be thrown into the balance to influence Carter to yield on the last few details in the negotiations between Secretary of State Cyrus Vance and Soviet foreign minister Andrei Gromyko.

Dear Dr. Ruble: I am caring for an elderly disabled woman in my home. I wish you would discuss the matter of odors. I would like to know if very old people have certain odors naturally, and what can be done about it - S Y

I know a lot of elderly ladies who would take offense at your suggestion. Odors are not associated with age groups. Young disabled men and women in rehabilitation hospitals may give off the same odor. You might find it in a poorly-run nursery as easily as in a poorly-run nursing

The chief problem is a lack of urine control. Odor arises from the action of natural body bacteria on urine, which produces ammonia. If urine leakage occurs because of a urinary tract problem, the odor problem increases If a person is disabled for whatever reason, including age, even subtle perspiration may create the familiar

odors to which you refer. So here's a check list for you Is the odor due to urine leakage Correct the condition if possible. If perspiration is the source, regular skin cleansing can correct that. Check the scalp, the back, chest, armpits, feet and the perineum (genital area). Lotions or moisturizing creams can help, and so can a spray antiperspirant. Nothing substitutes for a thorough tub bath, as difficult as that

may be for some Make sure there is adequate ventilation in her room, especially in winter. A mild room deoderizer may be necessary. Clothing is important. Use cotton bedding and clothes rather than synthetics. Check her dentures to be sure they are being properly cared for. Ask the doctor to examine her for unusual drainage or for skin problems that can be corrected.

It is unfair both to yourself and to this woman to throw up your hands and lay the odor to her age.

Dear Dr. Ruble: I have an irregular heartbeat, but my doctor tells me it is nothing to be concerned about. At times my heart will start beating really fast. Is this normal? I am only 24 years old. Is there anything that can make it regular again? - Mrs.

I wonder what you mean by the term "irregular heartbeat"? A heart may have regular rhythm and beat fast occasionally. In a young healthy person a rapid regular beat is insignificant unless the episodes are

Avoiding such stimulants avoids the problem. In some people, a disturbing phone call can set off a similar chain of rapid

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



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

Three firemen hope to win pilot's freedom

HOUSTON (AP) — Three members of the Houston Fire Department hope to win freedom today for a fellow firefighter who is wounded and under arrest in Colombia for violating the air space of that South American country. William A. Spradley, 45, was being kept under guard in a Riohacha hospital Tuesday with a bullet in his back. He was shot after engine trouble forced him to land his twinengine aircraft on a nearby beach April 29.

The whereabouts of another man in the plane — 45-year-old Roy McLamore of Nashville, Tenn. — were still a mystery Tuesday.

planned to leave at 10:30 a.m. today on a private jet to

negotiate Spradley's release.

Everitt — an HPD spokesman with the rank equivalent to district chief — said money demands for Spradley's release have ranged from \$30,000 to \$45,000. Max Simms, owner of a local aircraft company, said he was contacted by a Riohacha lawyer who told him \$45,000

would be needed to get the firefighter out of Colombia. Simms said Spradley has been a pilot 15 years and occasionally works for his firm.

Everitt said he had a "polite" meeting Tuesday with Mayor Jim McConn and the Colombian consul general in Houston to discuss the situation. Everitt said the mayor asked about the procedures

necessary to get Spradley out, and the the consul general promised to do all that he could. "The consul general is arranging to send a represen-tative from Riohacha to meet us," Everitt said.

In a telephone interview from the hospital Tuesday, Spradley said he and McLamore, a country-western singer, were flying to Venezuela to pick up oil drilling bits and bring them back to the United States for remanufacturing

Spradley, a firefighter 18 years, said he made a normal emergency landing with the wheels down after the right engine began acting up, and several people appeared after the plane stopped.

WASHINGTON (AP) -Oil companies are running into new political trouble in a Congress angered by soaring gasoline prices and long lines at gas stations. that anger surfaced





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Hangin' Out

Last weekend, I was out in a front yard between dips in a pool casually playing pitch and catch with the football when someone asked me if I missed football now that my high school and college playing days are

"Yeah, I do," I replied, not really giving it a second thought. Luckily for my subconscious, I finally ac-cepted the fact that there would be no more football for

"Well, if you still miss it, why don't you go walk on omewhere," a present high school gridder asked? I laughed, and I'm sure my amusement didn't an-

swer his question.

I wasn't laughing at the question, and wasn't laughing at myself, but really just beginning to un-derstand that many people do not understand the way professional sports are run and have not had the op-

protessional sports are run and have not not the op-portunity to compete against the pro athlete or future pro athlete in order to perceive the procedures.

The recent pro draft really brought this to my at-tention. Many people that I have talked to in the area don't seem to comprehend the structure of the NFL

draft and their signing procedures.

Many seem to think that entering a pro camp is no different than going out for the local high school team. You simply walk in, tell the coach that you want to play, and he enthusiastically and immediately loans you all the equipment, a locker, and the time schedule for practice.

Really, sports fans, have a little respect for the professional football players' abilities. If anybody that wanted to could walk into a July training camp, every fantasizing Freddie Footballer would show up the first day of camp. And this would do nothing to help the quality of the pro game, as the coaches would have to waste most valuable time evaluating the unlimited

Many people say: "Yeah, but look at some of the tryout camps that some of the pro teams have." That's true, but these are non-contact drills in which people are weighed, timed, run pass patterns, cover receivers, etc. in hopes of making an impression on a coach. A pro football source once stated that the odds of a player getting invited from the free tryout back to training camp in July are something like 300 to 1, with the chances of such a person making the final cut estimated at close to 1,000 to one. Besides, an All-Pro could anonymously walk in and try out at such an event and not be asked back, as the only people asked back are usually the super impressive speedster or the monster that does dispaly some agility.

Look at it from a standpoint of numbers. If every senior starter on a major college team the past year (and that's not counting the smaller colleges that also produce some outstanding individuals such as Angelo State, Texas A&I, Sul Ross, etc.) were to be signed by a professional team, there would be approximately 1200 rookies in the 28 camps. As it is, each team drafts 12 players in the draft, which multiplied by 28 equals 336. Entering the regular season, the total numbr of professional football players, rookies and veterans included, on the final rosters are 1204.

In the NFL draft, the prospective athletes do not have a choice of who will draft them. A lot of people came up to me last week and said something like, "I wonder who Russell Erxleben will pick." It's not like the good high school athlete that has his choice of which college scholarship to take. Sure, some of the bigger names publicly state that they would rather play for a certain team or in a certain geographical region, but their desires are not necessarily considered. The reason for the draft, and it is a good one, is to try to maintain competitive balance between the teams. Competitive balance usually means more exciting games, which means more money from ticket

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tongest Looped id softFollowing the draft, the really good college players that did not get drafted, but very easily could have in the later rounds, are usually signed. And by really good, that's exactly what I mean. I don't mean omeone that was a good college player or a very good high school player, because these people are basically not professional quality. Sure, some times the scouts make a mistake between the very good and the good,

but by and large justice does prevail.

To illustrate the draft and ensuing free agent signings the following week, I'll give you the example of a person named Danny Johnson. In his senior football season at Rice (76), Johnson was a second team All-SWC pick. He gained a great deal of respect from the pro scouts when he outplayed University of Houston All-American Wilson Whitley the final game of his senior year. Johnson was a very good college football player, but not a great one.

Many of the NFL teams expressed a flattering in-

terest in Johnson, and he expected to be drafted. However on draft day he was not. But two days later he signed with the New York Jets. The reason he was still considered was that many teams realized that he had proven himself to be as good as many of the draftees.

The same could be said of former Coahoma and SMU stalwart Putt Choate this year. Putt expected to be drafted, as did many who scouted him, but was not. The main reason was Putt's lack of heighth (6'0") in comparison to othe rlarger linebackers that were drafted. But since he has proven himself in quality college competition, and was on many teams draft list,

he will sign with somebody very soon.

After the draft and the remaining quality free agents are drafted, the next time of evaluation is the opening of training camp.

Most teams have approximately 100 people in camp in July. Give or take a few, there are usually between 60-70 veterans and 30-40 rookies. By opening day, there will be only 43 players on the active roster. By simple Related Math I, this means that more than half of the gridders that began sweating in July in two-a-days have been cut. There is definitely much more prolonged intensity and continued effort to playing the game than what it appears as you sip your favorite beverage on a Sunday afternoon in the fall, avidly watching your favorite team. watching your favorite team.

And as for those that question why I am no longer playing, I'll give you the honest truth. I was a starter at playing, I'll give you the honest truth. Which was definitely a big mistake. My wrist split completely in two pieces, dangling uselessly.

I was out for the season. If I had been healthy the remainder of the year, maybe I would have received a free agent contract. But the odds are still against it. There are a lot of people in the world, and much more talent than many can ever imagine.

Silkwood trial continues

Defense to rest case

Kerr-McGee Corp. was expected to rest its defense case today in the \$11.5 million Karen Silkwood plutonium contamination negligence trial.

Dr. George Voelz, 52, of Los Alamos, N.M., had been on the witness stand about 18 hours when court recessed late Tuesday afternoon.

He spent most of Tuesday answering questions about the research and complex mathematics he used to calculate Miss Silkwood's probability 9f 5-lopiny cancer had she lived, which he said was five-in-10,000.

On re-direct examination, Voelz said there is no scientific or medical basis the some of measurement and risk calculations Silkwood lawyers led himnthrough

examination.

The Silkwood estate is suing Kerr-McGee alleging negligence in connection with Miss Silkwood's contamination with plutonium. The company contends she contaminated herself, possibly while spiking her

urine samples. When she died in a Nov. 13, 1974, car crash, Miss Silkwood was a Kerr-McGee nuclear fuel plant lab technician.

Voelz, chief of the Los Alamos Scientific Laboratory's health division, supervised radiation posure tests done on Miss Silkwood several days after it was discovered her Edmond, Okla., apartment was found to be contaminated with plutonium.

SAN SALVADOR, El Salvador (AP) — Eighteen dead and at least 39 wounded were reported after police fired on demonstrators supporting antigovernment leftists occupying San Salvador's cathedral and two embassies.

The count was made by Red Cross workers after the shooting ended Tuesday evening.

"We took 37 persons out of the cathedral with wounds, most of them in critical condition," one worker said. There were 11 persons dead inside the building and seven dead on the steps outside.

A television camera crew reported seeing two wounded policemen lying in the street

The Red Cross source said President Carlos Humberto Romero's military government authorized the Red Cross to remove the wounded and any who wanted to leave the cathedral, and that rescue workers evacuated 10 bystanders who were trapped inside by the shooting.

But he said the 30 to 40 members of the Popular Revolutionary Bloc occupying the cathedral since Friday afternoon and about 150 other Bloc members who took refuge to escape the shooting vowed to remain until the government meets their demand for freedom for five of their leaders they claim are being held.

Sixteen other members of the Bloc have been holding French Ambassador Michel Dondonne and five other hostages in the French Embassy since Friday afternoon. and three more Bloc members were still in the Costa Rican Embassy after the ambassador and four other captives escaped Monday night.

The shooting outside the cathedral began at 1:30 p.m. when national police armed with assault rifles and submachine guns fired into the air and dispersed 500 demonstrators

about 300 demonstrators returned to the square. A presidential press spokesman said some of the men inside the cathedral opened fire, critically wounding three policemen. But witnesses denied this.

One witness said about 100 demonstrators broke from the crowd to join the leftists inside the cathedral, and "the troops lining the square began firing above the heads of the crowd and then lowered their aim into the crowd.

Other witnesses said the leftists inside the cathedral fired back with pistols, then dragged some casualties from the church steps inside and bolted the heavy wooden

Minutes later, about 120 reinforcements poured out of a police barracks near the cathedral and sealed off the area. An explosion was heard, and the troops opened fire in the plaza and in nearby streets

People dashed into doorways. Motorists jumped from their cars and hit the ground. Armored cars opened fire

The shooting ended about 7:30 p.m., and police cordoned off the 17-block downtown area, cut off telephones and cleared it of everyone but residents.

The blood drive at the VA facility is being headed by Joseph Rouleau, director of Volunteer Services, and Garlond Evers, Hospital Administrator.

Recently, Big Spring has used 621 blood units above what was drawn from the community, and the VAMC is giving the community the opportunity to "even the

After blood is donated, a bacteria-tight seal is made on the tubing, which is then segmented. A few of the Segments are used by the Blood Center Lab in San Angelo to determine the blood type and perform tests necessary to assure the hospital patient of receiving the most benefit from the "gift of life." The remaining segments are used by the hospital's transfusion service to determine com-patability between the blood

With current technology. up to four different patients may receive aid from a onepint donation.

The red cells may be administered to an open heart surgery patient, transfused to a newborn baby with RH disease or used in the treatment of an extremely anemic elderly

People suffering from Hemophilia, a bleeding disease, need the antihemophilic factor to help their blood clot and stop bleeding. Leukemia patients, usually small children and young adults, need platelets to help prevent uncontrollable bleeding while they are

undergoing treatment.
Plasma is often used to treat burn patients and accident victims with acute blood loss.

The Blood Services Center thanks the VAMC for providing a place where nity donors can give, and thank the donors for the nselfish act of giving blood.

The VAMC encourages the staff and others to participate, so that Big Spring can give the blood needed by its own residents.





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House advances home mortgage bill

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — Texas' legal limit on home loan interest rates could "float" from the present 10 percent to as much as 12 percent under a bill approved Tuesday by

A 78-47 vote advanced the bill, which could come up for final passage today. The bill next would go to the Senate. Outside the House chamber thronged lobbyists for and against the bill. Some wore stickers depicting a cigarpuffing hog and saying, "Stop Greedy Savings and

Rep. Jerry "Nub" Donaldson, D-Gatesville, sponsor, said there was a mortgage money "crisis" that could be solved only by lifting the usury limit.

If legislators fail to raise the interest ceiling, "we would be precluding people from buying homes. We would be precluding people from building homes," Donaldson said. Rep. John Wilson, D-La Grange, said the bill would add to the inflationary burden of the average Texan and put home ownership out of the reach of many families.

"I don't want you to add to the futility felt by the average citizen who is trying to pay his bills," Wilson told

The bill would permit lenders to charge two percentage

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points above the average monthly rate for 10-year U.S. Treasury notes and bonds or 12 percent, whichever was

The April treasury rate was 9.03 percent, so mortgage lenders could charge homebuyers up to 11 percent if the bill were in effect today

Over Donaldson's objections, the House voted 97-36 for automatic expiration of the higher interest ceiling on Sept.

1, 1981, unless the 1981 Legislature extends it.

Again over Donaldson's objections, the Housevoted 71-57 to deny the higher interest rates to lenders who also charge "points" to sellers of homes. A savings and loan association or other mortgage lender would have to choose between "points" or higher interest.

Donaldson's original bill allowed a floating ceiling of three percentage points above the treasury rate, but the House voted to drop it to two points, the level Gov. Bill Clements had recommended. House action on the bill - one of the most controversial

of the session - came less than a week after Clements withdrew his veto threat. Clements proposed the "floating" ceiling idea, with an absolute maximum of 12 percent.

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Contaminated road oil may be widespread

HOUSTON (AP) - Road oil contaminated with toxic wastes that was used in one East Texas subdivsion may have also been spread on roads in four other subdivisions, the Houston company that provided the oil says.

The company, Browning-Ferris Industries, Inc., was originally ordered to strip road surfaces in a single subdivision near Corrigan in Polk County, where residents complained nine cows died mysteriously

recently. But Tuesday, a spokesman for the chemical company said the same oil may have been used on roads in another Polk County subdivision and three additions

in neighboring Tyler County. "Our own investigation causes us to suspect that if the state asked us to pick up oil at the Reily's Village subdivision near Corrigan, we are probably going to have to pick up all or some of the road oil we spread in four other subdivisions," said Don Fitch, vice president for

marketing. Tests showed a road surface in Reily's Village contained hazardous levels of nitrobenzyene and traces of cyanide, and one resident in the area said nine of his cows died after drinking from a creek fed by runoff from the road's ditches. The contaminated oil was s on a portion of a road in the

subdivision last November. Fitch said the other four subdivisions were Sheltered Cove in Polk County and Ivanhoe Estates, Town Bluff Estates and Barlow Lakes Estates in neighboring Tyler

"The company intends to commence the work necessary in these areas as soon as possible," said Fitch. He said Browning-Ferris had asked the Texas Department of Water Resources to add the four subdivisions to the existing order.

Small baby 'forgotten' by parents

PASADENA, Texas (AP) - At first she thought it was 'just a box or something in the road." But after Wanda Bedenbaugh swerved to avoid hitting the object, she saw it was a baby strapped in an infant's seat lying in the middle of a highway during the morning rush

hour Tuesday.
"I stopped in the middle of the street, backed up close to where the baby was and opened the doors on both sides (of her pickup truck) to block traffic," said Mrs.

The baby was lying face down in one lane of a busy four-lane divided highway in this Houston suburb.

"I saw it wasn't moving and I was afraid it was dead I just couldn't believe it hadn't been run over. But when I turned it over it started crying," she said. "I was never so glad to hear a baby crying in my life."
Mrs. Bedenbaugh was

reporting the incident to police when the baby's orried mother arrived. She told officers she and her husband placed the child on the roof of their car while loading two other children and then drove off, forget-ting about the baby.

She said they missed the child about 15 minutes later.

illness. Kleberg had chaired the King Ranch corporation, a family conglomerate that spreads through seven region of South Texas.


