# Stay of execution granted to Florida inmate today

STARKE, Fla. (AP) - John A. Spenkelink's life was spared early today, only hours before the 30-yearold murderer was to die in Florida's electric chair, when federal judges in Atlanta and Washington granted separate appeals for a stay of execution

"Praise God!" Spenkelink shouted as the news flashed across a television screen outside his cell a few feet from the death chamber.

His Episcopalian minister, the Rev. Tom Feamster, gave Spenkelink Holy Communion at 1 a.m. - just one hour before guards had been due on Death Row to shave Spenkelink's head and leg to increase the efficiency of the electric chair.

Less than 12 hours before, on Tuesday afternoon, Spenkelink's Death Row companion, Willie Jasper Darden, also was granted a stay of execution when a federal judge agreed to hear his appeal.

The executions would have been the first in the United States since a Utah firing squad shot Gary Mark Gilmore more than two years ago.

Gilmore had refused to pursue court appeals, and these would have been the first executions of prisoners

### against their will in the United States since 1967.

Spenkelink was to have been executed at 7 a.m., Darden at 8.

But minutes after midnight, in Atlanta, Judge Ellbert B. Tuttle of the 5th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals issued his stay on an appeal which former U.S. Attorney General Ramsey Clark had helped seek. Tuttle said he would set a hearing date today.

A few minutes later, U.S. Supreme Court Justice Thurgood Marshall granted Spenkelink's lawyers another stay of execution - after two other

Supreme Court justices had turned them down. The high court is to take further action Thursday

His mother, Lois Spenkelink, 67, was with friends in Starke, 11 miles from the prison, when she got the word. "Thank God. Our prayers have been answered," she said. "Thank the Lord. He found somebody to make the stay.

Then she was driven to the edge of the prison, where reporters and protesters had gathered. "Thank you, Judge Tuttle and Justice Marhsall for being fair." she said.



"The study is more of a formality, and a research program to formulate a basic design for the school - such things as what type of instructors needed and where we'll get them, how many students we can expect and necessary," Dr. Hayes said. "We have to justify the project to TEA, although they themselves have already agreed that there is a need for the school

"They have to be able to justify to the state legislature any funds they allocate to us for the school hence the need for the feasibility study," Dr. Hayes said.



College Technical School for the Deaf." The Steering Committee and individual members of the Big Spring City Council have already expressed approval for the transfer of the swimming pool, tennis courts, a basketball court, two buildings to be used for classrooms and dormitories. and a tract of land to the school.

There are only four such tech-nological schools for the deaf in the nation. Three are located in the Northeast - at Minneapolis, Minn. Washington, D.C. and Rochester, N.Y. - and the fourth in California. The school proposed for Big Spring would be the only one in the Southprogram as well as associate degrees in several programs.

'We should have the feasibility study completed in no more than four months, and in the meantime, we will be working with Cong essman Charles Stenholm to seek Department of Health, Education and Welfare funds for renovation of the buildings,' Dr. Hayes said. "Congressman Stenholm has already expressed optimism about obtaining the HEW start-up funds, since special money is readily available for programs of this sort.

"There is a need for the school because in the entire southwest U.S. the only higher education programs for the deaf are certain colleges which offer a sign translator for deaf students," said Hayes. "That isn't always sufficient, and the four other programs like the one we plan are crowded with very long admission waiting lists."

According to Dr. Hayes, Texas Senator Ray Farabee and Rep. Mike Ezzell were instrumental in getting

the \$25,000 for the study.

"The TEA has expressed enthusiasm for the project, and have told us - unofficially - that operational funding is readily available and no problems are expected," said Dr. Hayes. "Thanks to the efforts of Senator Farabee and Representative Ezzell, the project was pushed through and we got faster action on the proposal."

The feasibility will be conducted by Howard College with Mary Dudley, assistant to the president, in charge. Assisting her will be Gary Curtis and Doug Burke of the TEA.

'We think this will be an asset to the college and to the community, and we want to use deaf people in the administration of the school to insure that we are offering the deaf the services and knowledge they need in a setting that is appropriate," Dr. Hayes said. "We are excited, because we feel the school will be a benefit to all and a liability to none.

# Spannaus: 'I was never asked to guit'

### By EILEEN MCGUIRE

At a news conference today, resigning Industrial Park-Airport Manager Harry Spannaus stated that his decision to resign is based on strictly personal reasons.

"My primary reason for resigning is that I've been offered a position in fact more than one - that offers a better future for Harry Spannaus and his family," he said.

Announcement of his resignation was made public following a lengthy City Council meeting Tuesday during which procedures for loaning out Industrial Park equipment to the city were questioned by City Councilmen Larry Miller and John Massey.

Spannaus stated today that conflicts between Industrial Park and the City have nothing to do with his decision to

resign. "I asked for a salary increase last year and said at that time that if I didn't get it, I would stay on until I didn't get it, I would stay on until I found something else that I wanted."

Spannaus revealed that his annual salary is \$22,000 and that he had ed an increase of \$4,000 which had been denied. He said that he had

suggested that his successor be offered a starting salary of \$24,000, but expressed concern that the incoming city manager could find a qualified Industrial Park-Airport Manager for that amount.

"Councilmen have let it be known that I'm overpaid, but based on facts nationwide, I'm undernaid '

He said that new job prospects offer him a higher salary and better opportunities for advancement.

Spannaus said that he had heard rumors that he was going to be fired from his position as park manager, but that there were no truth to them.

"I was not under any duress whatsoever to resign," he said. 'There are things that I'm not pleased with-things that have tied me up in a few knots, but they have nothing to do with this. I was never asked to quit."

Spannaus expressed a desire that controversies between the park and the city and the citizens be eliminated.

"Erroneous facts are causing controversy," he said. "The city and the county must pull together for the continued progress of the Industrial Park. The inner fighting has to stop.

Success of the park is the objective. The only choice is to go backward or forward with it."

Asked whether Councilmen Massey or Miller had anything to do with his resignation, Spannaus said no and added "They've both been cordial."

Massey and Miller had directed questions to Spannaus at Tuesday's meeting about improper dispersement of federal properties from Industrial Park. He denied that there had been any implications that he had mismanaged the property.

"The problem is inadequate ac-countability of the property," he said. "It has been difficult to keep up with."

He clarified that the property had been left to the city for Industrial Park use and that except in emergency situations, property borrowed by the city should be cleared with him in coordination with the city manager.

He said that he was not opposed to the city using Industrial Park equipment if proper channels were used.

"I did take exception to branches of city government using property

without my approval. It's in violation of federal guidelines.

He said that allegations made by Massey that Industrial Park vehicles being used by the city have been painted white with a "City of Big Spring" decal on the side is a probability.

"We are checking documents," he said.

Accounting for properties that have been loaned to the city is a massive task, Spannaus said and added "I have pledged to get this done by the end of the month

Spannaus said that his decision to resign was not a sudden one.

"I told the mayor three weeks ago and asked him not to make it public until a new city manager had been appointed."

A decision on Harry Nagel's successor will be announced next week, Mayor Wade Choate said Tuesday. The new city manager will appoint Spannaus's successo

Spannaus outlined some possible requirements for his successor.

"He should have a college degree in (See Spannaus, page 2A, col. 3)

Q. This morning was the second time I have seen someone dumping trash and leaving an unsightly mess on the vacant lot behind our home. We live in the city limits, and I wondered if there is an ordinance forbidding it? If so, what action should I take if I see it happen again?

A. "Yes, it is illegal to dump biodegradable trash at any place in the city other than at the sanitary land fill," said Assistant City Manager Bill Brown. "The only exception to the dumping is if the action is authorized by the property owner, and the material is rock, plaster, concrete or some inert substance. Dumping of any biodegradable material that creates an unsightly mess is illegal." Penalty for "unauthorized dumping," a misddemeanor, is generally a fine of up to \$200, with the complaint filed under the health or streets and alleys codes, depending on the location. "Anyone who spots such activity should call the City at 263-8311, and ask for Rodney Ferrell, extension 35, in Code Enforcement," Brown said. "If the informant has gotten the license number and can give sufficient, specific information, a complaint will be filed."

# 14,594,540 barrels of crude produced in county last year

Howard County, which has had recorded production since 1925, last year produced 14,594,540 barrels of crude oil at the rate of 39,985 barrels per day.

Production in 1978 boosted Howard County's production total through the end of the year to 539,748,118 barrels.

The 53-year annual production average for Howard County is 10,379,771 barrels.

In 1978, 24 counties produced more than 10million barrels of oil, a decrease of two counties from 1977; a decrease of three from 1956, and six from 1975.

The following chart shows 1978 production figures for the state's five top producing counties, all with production in excess of 47-million barrels. Yoakum retained its spot as the state's top producing county, while Gaines, moving from fourth to second, exchanged places with Scurry County. Ector remained in third place and Hockley in fifth place for the fourth consecutive year. 1. Yoakum, 71,164,311 bbls.

2. Gaines, 60,706,710 bbls, 3. Ector, 59,227,760 bbls.

# Texas output tops one-billion barrels

DALLAS - With another year of production at the maximum efficient recovery rate in nearly all the state's fields, Texas' crude oil output last year again topped one-billion barrels. This is a level that has been achieved annually since 1965, although a downward trend in production continued for the sixth consecutive year. If this trend persists throughout 1979, it is unlikely the billion-barrel figure will be achieved this year.

The output of the nation's No. 1 oil producing state in 1978 was almost 1.1-billion barrels, thus pushing the state's cumulative production since 1889 to more than 43.7-billion barrels. However, last year's output was more than 61-million barrels below 1977 production and nearly 224-million barrels less than the all-time peak production year of 1972. H. B. (Hank) Harkins of Alice, president of the Dallas-based Texas Mid-Continent Oil & Gas Association, notes that the decline in production in 1978 corresponds to a drop of almost 777,500,000 barrels in Texas' reserves of crude oil. The decline from approximately 8.5-billion barrels to some 7.7-billion barrels amounts to a 9.2-percent drop. But, Harkins sees a brighter future for the Texas petroleum industry despite the recent drop in production and reserves.

'The improved prices for both old and new oil that we can expect as a result of a phasing out of federal price controls will help to stimulate increased efforts to recover oil in Texas, particularly through secondary and tertiary recovery projects," Harkins says.



# Public servant not usual cancer victim

Is there such a thing as a typical cancer victim?

If that is so, one who certainly wouldn't fit into the mold is Harold Runnels of Lea County, N.M. Fact is, it would be hard to fit Runnels into any kind of mold. He is one of those rare Americans who looks adversity in the eye and stares it down.

Harold is a United States representative and has been for five terms, the last of which he won without anyone contesting it for him.

**REP. RUNNELS HAS overcome** two cancer operations, the last one only a few weeks ago. Runnels believed he had rheumatism, or arthritis, in his shoulder. In March of last year he went to a doctor to check on it and was told he had a cancerous tumor in his left lung

Like most of us, Runnels believed cancer was something that happened

to someone else, not to him. Once convinced his diagnosis was correct, he began to wonder if a massive heart attack he had suffered in 1971 would keep him from undergoing surgery for removal of the tumor. Physicians at New York's Sloan-

**Kettering Institute for Cancer decided** instead to plant radio-active implants around the lung tumor, isolating the malignant growth. The isotopes served to shrink the half-dollar size tumor, with the result that the tumor does not now exist.

"After the initial shock." Runnels said, "I made peace with the Lord and knew things were right. I did not fear death then or now.

After recovery, Runnels went back to work in Washington. He also found time to campaign for other candidates.

However, pains in his lower back

became so intense he again sought out his doctors.

"I told them they had to do something," Runnels said. "When you live in 24-hour pain, it finally drives you up a wall."

What the doctors first thought to be a degenerative disc or inflammed nerve turned out to be cancer of the bone, which they found growing in the congressman's sacroiliac, a bone in the lower back.

HE FELT THE "world had gone out from under him" but he began a cancer treatment not a year old. On March 20, Runnels' bone cancer was frozen in a series of three nitrogen treatments which kill cancer cells but allows other healthy cells to survive. Prior to surgery, Runnels was told

that nerves leading to his foot probably would be affected and cause permanent paralysis of his foot.

Runnels and his foot fooled them. The pedal extremity is still working and he's confident of full recovery. Runnels has been in politics for 20 years, nine of which he spent in the New Merrice Screets II or placed only

ew Mexico Senate. He missed only about three weeks of the last congressional session because of his illness.

Runnels says he was raised "in a chicken coop with no college education." Of his journey into the

limelight, the congressman says: "Some people just want things a little more and try a little harder." The congressman also is acutely

aware that life is a very temporary thing and, that for some, death is more imminent than for others. He's ready for whatever is ahead. Says he: "I know I'm going to die sometime.

I know everybody is going to die. I'm prepared to meet my maker.

Christians did just the thing Paul told them not to. They may not verbally associate themselves with the man who founded their denomination. But they name their denomination after the particular issue their denominational founder asserted, or after the leader himself.

Beware of 'dogs'

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WE DON'T WANT to be so unbalanced as to swing too far like a pendulum to the other side, putting aside sound doctrine to embrace all doctrine, true or false. The point is that the church universal is one body and acceptance of members of the body is crucial for the proper operation of it, just as the physical body won't work well without the

cooperation of all its parts. We may not accept all the teaching that a believer holds to, but we should accept him into the church on the basis of his belief in Christ.

We should also watch out not to be so unbalanced as to accept those into the church who are not believers. And I'm certainly not saying that non-believers should not be allowed to attend church services.

But Paul warns us in his letter to the church at Phillipi to beware of the "dogs" that would damage the effectiveness of the local church. They claim to be believers but are not.

The church's problem started with following the headship of men rather than the Headship of Christ. The church is His body and He's the Head. We should look to Him to provide for the church the balanced, complete understanding of the Bible that the church needs to be effective in society.



Bigot

Daniel Patrick Movnihan has favored tuition tax credits for parents of students who attend private schools before, to use a phrase once used by Senator Movnihan in an angry exchange with New York's Ralph Rao, James Notaro learned to put grease on his hair. In a review published in the New York Times of the book "Four Reforms" way back in 1973, Mr. Moynihan was unambiguous on the question.

Since arriving in the Senate, he quite wisely backed a measure endorsed by his predecessor calling for tax relief for Americans who choose to send their children to private schools. Mr. Notaro, the executive director of the Liberal Party, a little enclave of doctrinaire social democrats whose trinitarian god is a) state activity; b) secularism; and c) Israel, has ac cused Senator Moynihan of "pandering to the Catholic vote." And the leader of the Liberal Party, the Reverend Donald S. Harrington, has threatened to "censure" Senator Moynihan. This would mean that Movnihan would be deprived of the backing of the Liberal Party in the 1982 run for reelection. Unless, of course, he contested the Liberal Party's choice and won in an open primary - which is not inconceivable. since members of the Liberal Party as is frequently the case in other parties - tend to be more sensible than their leaders.

BUT THE CONFRONTATION is ugly in its- implications. Mayor. Edward Koch, who is Jewish, has denounced the Liberal Party leaders, accusing them of "an undercurrent of bigotry." Mr. Koch himself endorses tuition tax credits. His allegation that bigotry is behind the Liberal Party leaders' move is entirely plausible There are many private schools in the country, and many private Jewish schools in New York City. The majority of Americans who patronize private schools, however, are Catholics. For the Liberal Party to reason from that datum to the conclusion that a backer of tuition tax credits is "pandering to the Catholic vote" is indeed to elide into a thoughtless bigotry. Suppose one were to endorse a law outlawing Jim Crow? Would it sound quite right to say that one was 'pandering'' to the black vote? Suppose one endorsed aid to Israel: is one "pandering" to the Jewish vote? Suppose one takes a position in favor of shield laws: is one "pandering" to the First Amendment vote? The operative word, of course, is 'pandering." The word suggests the subordination of principle for the purpose of gratifying unhealthy, or anti-social appetites. The question arises whether the word can be used to describe the motives of parents who desire for their children an education different from that given in a public school. One might as well say that Mr. Moynihan is pandering to the people's appetite for freedom.

**ONE** WONDERS ABOUT that haunted insecurity of the public school lobby. Why are they so afraid? The Moynihan bill would provide federal income tax credits for half the tuition of private schools up to \$500 a year for college and \$250 a year for elementary and secondary schools. The perstudent cost of high school education in New York City is approximately \$2500. A typical private school in New York charges \$1,000. Thus parents who send their child to a private school would a) save the city \$1500; while b) shouldering \$750 of the \$1,000 burden of private education.

What you're really asking is why take a drug many times more expensive than aspirin if the effect is the same? Medicine and economics don't mix very well, but here goes.

The drug you name (indomethacin) is one member of a new "family" of medicines for control of arthritis inflammation. Since no drug cures this condition, the question is which drug controls it better for you with the least side effects, the lowest dosage and least cost. If cost was the only factor, the answer would be easy. An aspirin tablet costs a few cents, with the average dose for control about 12 a day A 25-milligram indomethacin tablet may cost 20 cents and you may need several a day.

Unfortunately, it's not that simple. These new anti-inflammation drugs were developed to provide an alternative to aspirin for people who could not use it. Many cannot tolerate continued high dosages of aspirin. It may cause problems in some, not in others, or the side effects may be less severe from one of the newer drugs than from aspirin.

Don't switch from your present drug to aspirin without consulting your doctor, because the side effects (ringing in the ears, upset stomach, etc.) may be different depending on which is used. If you think you can fare as well with the relatively inexpensive aspirin, you can ask your doctor to let you try.

Dear Dr. Ruble: I was reading in a magazine about how a movie star had his hearing restored by a surgeon who made a new stapes bone for his ear. I am practically deaf without my hearing aid. I am 51 and interested in this new technique. Could you tell me the name of the surgeon who did this?

So long as there is no nerve disorder or eardrum defect the surgery to construct a new stapes bone is quite successful. There are many other reasons for conductive hearing loss, involving other structures. So not all deafness can be helped by the surgery, even if there is no nerve damage in the ear. The most common cause of conductive hearing loss is otosclerosis, a kind of thickening of this hearing mechanism. This may be helped by the surgery.

Dear Dr. Ruble: Is it harmful to use straight undiluted formaldehyde on fingernails? Many women at my office are using it. It does make my nails hard and prevents splitting. But I have noticed white spots appearing on my nails. - E.K.

I wouldn't advise it. This chemical compound is a potent irritant. It may be found in very minute and harmless amounts in some commercial nail hardeners. But in its pure state it is very likely to cause skin irritation and discolor nails, even cause you to lose one. It may take months for the nails

Dear Dr. Ruble: Perhaps you can relieve my mind. For the past few months my husband has had white spots on the insides of his cheeks. He went to an oral surgeon. He told him not to worry, that it was carrotosis. I hope I'm spelling it right. He said just to wash his mouth with baking soda. I hope it is nothing serious. - T.C. The white spots are called

leukoplakia (LOO-koh-PLAY-kee-uh) which is common in heavy smokers or drinkers. These areas are always biopsied (sections removed), and often what is found is keratosis. Keratosis is any horny growth in tissue. It can be caused by irritation. Your husband should be checked at regular intervals - every three to six months - to examine the area for abnormal growths. Is he overusing the mouthwash?

Dr. Ruble welcomes reader mail but regrets that, due to the tremendous volume received daily, he is unable to answer individual letters. Ricky McCormick, Texas Tech trackster from Big Spring, qualified for the NCAA Track and Field Championships beginning May 31 at the last possible

McCormick raced to a school record 3:42.9 in the 1500-meter run at the Tri-Conference Championships last Friday in Austin. This bettered the qualifying standard of 3:44.7, which McCormick has not been able

to crack until then. Converted to yards, McCormick's time is nearly a four minute mile

Two other Red Raiders will be in competition in the NCAA finals, which will be held in Champaign, Illinois, on the campus of the University of Illinois. They are 800-meter phenom James Mays and 1500-meter performer Greg Lautenslager.

The Bonne Bell 6.2 mile Mini-Marathon held in Chicago May 12 once again established the extensive interest of women in the long distance running competition, as some 3.600 females turned out.

One of the participants, Betty Bopart, traveled from the U.S. territory of Guam, a tropical island in the Pacific. Bopart finished second in her division.

Bopart is one of many females who believe that women have the physical capability to become topnotch contenders in distance running and are better equipped than men for the standard 26.2-mile marathon. She is especially incensed because the Olympic Committee and the AAU have consistently denied women the right to compete in the Olympic Games marathon run.

# **Bird**, Celtics still disagree

BOSTON (AP) - The lid has blown off contract talks between the Boston Celtics and the negotiator for college star Larry Bird, with an explosion of demands and allegations.

"There is nobody in professional sports, including Red Auerbach and myself, who can accurately determine what is a fair contract for Larry," attorney Bob Woolf said Tuesday

Nevertheless, Woolf, Bird's Boston-based agent, called a news conference to insist both that his current contract offer is fair and that the National Basketball Association team, through team president Auerbach, begin "bonafide" negotiations.

'He (Woolf) means negotiate as long as I go up," Auerbach responded later. "Can I go down?

The stalemate centers on the Celtics' refusal to budge from their original \$500,000-a-year offer to the college Player-of-the-Year from Indiana State. Woolf initially asked for \$1 million a season, plus another \$200,000 in extras. Sources now say Woolf has come down to about \$700,000 a year.

Bird was drafted No.1 by the Celtics a year ago as a junior. The team has until the NBA draft June 25 to sign him or Bird goes back into the 1979 draft pool.

'I thought we'd have a clean, fast deal," Auerbach said. "Give them your best shot, bowl them over, make him the highest paid rookie in NBA history and that's

Instead, Woolf claims Auerbach simply won't bargain and that unless he does, "I would not be op-timistic" about Bird's chances of joining the Celtics.

Woolf conceded he wants somewhat more than the Los Angeles Lakers will pay Michigan State star Earvin "Magic" Johnson, who will be the team's and league's top pick in next month's draft.

Woolf said reports are that Johnson will get \$600,000 a year. But Celtics officials say it's far less - \$250,000 cash and real estate, with money paid over a period of years.

Citing controversy centering on Bird's money demands, Woolf blamed the Celtics, saying, "I am at a loss to understand why the Celtics organization, by inference or innuendo, would in any way unfairly blemish the image of a fine young athlete ...." The agent said Bird "has never made any suggestions as to what the terms of his contract should be.

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





### police kill 14

SAN SALVADOR, El Salvador (AP) - Police shot and killed 14 men, women and children trying to take food to militants occupying the Venezuelan Embassy. It was the second time in two weeks President Carlos Humberto Romero's forces fired on demonstrators and raised the number killed by his military regime to at least 37.

Press Associated correspondent Gordon Mott said at least three of the dead were women and six appeared to be teenagers or younger. Notebooks and school bags were strewn on the ground and a woman's purse was spilled in a gully where her body had fallen. The bodies of two children,

between 10 and 12 years old lay side by side, their arms intertwined.

Corpses were lying on a street corner half a block from the embassy and a short distance from the Sheraton Hotel in the upperclass northwestern district, and two were found in a dead-end alley where the demonstrators apparently tried to hide from the police.

A Red Cross spokesman said in addition to the dead that an estimated 20 persons were wounded, some of them eriously.

The troops opened fire Tuesday evening as 100 to 150 demonstrators in separate groups marched toward the embassy from two direc-tions, carrying food to nine members of the Popular Revolutionary Bloc who Revolutionary Bloc who seized the embassy May 11. Presidential press spokesman Col. Rafael
