Inspections reveal cracks in engine mounts

FAA indefinitely grounds all DC-10s

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Federal Aviation Administration today suspended the design certificate of the DC-10, indefinitely grounding all 138 of the jetliners flown by the

The FAA acted after new cracks were found in the engine mounts of two of the jumbo jets that had been inspected and cleared earlier, an agency spokesman said.

The spokesman, Jerry Doolittle, said the grounding order came in the form of an emergency suspension of the DC-10's design certificate, an apparently unprecedented step in-volving a commercial jetliner.

Doolittle said the design certificate is required before a type of airplane is given an airworthiness certificate, a document that attests to the safety of

Burnt out' assertion draws denial

By EILEEN McGUIRE John Robinson, a Field Operations officer with the Texas Department of Human Resources, blames "a lack of communication and misunderstanding of communications" for what resulted in former Howard County foster parents James and Donna Van Ness leaving the program

Robinson was in Big Spring Monday and Tuesday gathering information from local caseworkers and foster parents to evaluate justifications for complaints made by the Van Nesses that the local department had been making foster parenting difficult for

them ever since they adopted Leann, a former foster child, a year ago. Robinson said Tuesday that the state normally discourages mixing adoption with foster parenting, but that he had found no "concrete evidence" of harassment.

"The investigation is in no way complete," he stated, but expressed some of his own preliminary opinions

He suggested that the Van Nesses had been "burnt out" due to their

that this may have led to the explosive situation when James Van Ness destroyed their license during a visit from a caseworker May 18.

James Van Ness, who was out of town during the investigation, had stated earlier that he had destroyed the license after caseworkers had informed him that their foster daughter's social security benefits were going to be transferred to the state department who would then issue a reduced amount for the child's

been the standard amount for a foster child in Texas, but Donna Van Ness alleges that the \$38 difference was needed to care for the child who had extra needs because of her condition.
"He asked me if I felt burnt out and

I told him 'no'," Donna said Tuesday afternoon. The Van Nesses had earlier stated that they planned to continue foster parenting but not as state foster

"Foster parenting has been a lifelong thing with us," she said, ex-plaining that she had been adopted as a baby and that James had been

raised by foster parents. The couple have been licensed by the state as foster parents for over five years, but began caring for other people's children right after their They have said that the local marriage, over 16 years ago, before the state had licensed foster parents. caseworkers have indicated that the

Robinson stated that he believes that the Van Nesses did feel that they were being harrassed, but he did not feel that any harassment was in-

"Foster parenting is tough," he said noting that Texas foster parents have to deal with not enough money for the children and a lot of regulations.

He stated that the Van Nesses' foster daughter, who had been brain damaged in an auto-truck accident which killed her parents two years ago, may have brought additional pressures to the Van Ness household. He talked of his own experiences with brain damaged children and said that working with them was often

The Van Nesses, however, say that they want the child. They have filed for managing conservatorship of her.

child will be institutionalized The Van Nesses still hope for an adoption for the little girl and say they want guardianship over her until

adoptive parents can be found. According to Robinson, who has worked extensively with brain damaged children, "She'll probably end up being institutionalized by the time she's an adolescent anyway because she won't be able to function

as an adolescent.' He said that it was difficult to find adoptive parents for children like her because people generally don't want the extra problems that accompany a

brain-damaged child. Robinson said he was not certain that placing her with the Van Nesses again would be good for either the child or the Van Nesses. His opinion was that the Van Nesses may need a rest from foster parenting.
He said that the decision over the

child's guardianship will be decided in court. The Van Nesses attorney, Fred Coleman Jr., was unavailable for a statement, but Donna Van Ness said that he has indicated that the matter will be decided by a jury trial.

A mystery that remains unsolved is a claim by the Van Nesses that certain progress reports and a psychological profile is missing from the girl's folder. According to the Van Nesses, a psychologist who tested the girl had said that she was trainable and had recommended that she be kept in a home environment and that she would

regress if she were institutionalized. Everything that was in there that said anything good about her is gone,' Donna stated

report his findings to the office of Commissioner Jerome Chapman. He stressed that the investigation is not yet over, but so far has not been able to find anything concrete to back up the Van Nesses' claims.

"I believe it was a communication problem on both parts," he said of the events leading up to the Van Nesses break with the foster parent program.

He blamed the traumatic days that followed their withdrawl from the program, during which a foster son was abruptly taken from the home and the girl was relinquished upon court order, on problems that all foster parents encounter.

"When foster parents become attached to the foster child, the separation is always difficult," he said. He added that he would've probably conducted the separation process differently than the local department had

Chief Bogard denies appeal of officers Burson, Limon

The first appeal for reinstatement by two former members of the Big Spring Major Crime Task Force was denied Tuesday afternoon.

Former task force members John Burson and Gilbert Limon were trans-ferred to the police patrol division after charges by their supervisor Capt. Tim McCain and Chief Stanley Bogard that they had failed to do an adequate job on the task force.

Both team members immediately secured the services of Joe Gilbreath,

Texas counsel for the International Brotherhood of Police Officers. He and the officers took their appeal to Bogard Tuesday afternoon.

"I denied the appeal and sustained the captain's (McCain's) opinion," said the chief this morning.

The next step in the appeal procedure will be a request for reinstatement to acting City Manager Paul Feazelle, which is expected some time today. If that too fails, the officers have stated that the matter officers have stated that the matter will be taken to court.

Lobbying nuns end pilgrimage

AUSTIN, Texas (AP)- A five-month pilgrimage has ended for two Corpus Christi

Mother Theresa Santoyo and Sister Maria Elva Reyes faithfully journeyed to the Capitol once a week during 140-day Texas Legislature.

They became - in their - "permanent fixtures" during the lawmaking session that ended last week.

But they gained few tangible results from their intensive, team lobbying on behalf of children placed in foster homes by the state welfare department. They watched as House

Bill 1492 by Rep. Hugo Berlanga, D-Corpus Christi, crashed to defeat in the House during the Legislature's final week. The measure would have given children more say over where they and their siblings were sent. It also would have required the state to pay more for their medical ex-

"This is the first time in the history of the United States that someone has proposed a law to grant legal and enforceable rights to children who are wards of the state," said Mother Santoyo, who has worked with children for 25 of her 35 vears as a min

Mother Santoyo, 50, operates the Pax Christi residential boarding school in Corpus Christi with eight other nuns. The home has room for 30 children of all ages who have been referred there by families or friends.

Sister Reyes, 32, is the home administrator. The residence operates on contributions. Residents attend nearby public schools

"We live 100 percent on faith and private con-God always tributions. provides," Mother Santoyo said

Until two years ago, the Pax Christi home took in children referred by the state welfare department. The state pays homes \$7.50 daily to house a child. It was her experience with welfare workers that brought Mother Santovo on her crusade to the Legislature.

We found there was no use to plan for the needs of a child when the state could come and take the child and place him anywhere. The children were left to the mercy of a caseworker and Santoyo said.

"I decided that this could not continue," she said firmly. "Someone must be willing to stand up and say something.

She resisted letting welfare workers inside to interview children and was threatened with a lawsuit.

'She has had a very unique problem with the Department of Human Resources to the point where she refused to let them in," Berlanga said. "She was tired of the way the department was treating her kids." The welfare department

let Mother Santoyo assume custody of eight children who were wards of the state. After that action, state officials stopped placing children in the Pax Christi

During House debate, Rep. Mary Jane Bode, D-Austin, said welfare caseworkers had contacted her and said Mother Santoyo's proposal would put too many restrictions on governmental agencies trying to help children

Berlanga's original measure would have required caseworkers to give children the names of their natural parents. That section was removed from the bill after opposition developed. Neither Mother Santoyo nor Berlanga have given up

MIKE HAS COME A long way in this, his third term in the stateh at Austin. Gov. Bill Clements has already signed 11 of the 35 bills or resolutions Ezzell has authored or coauthored, with indications he will give his blessing to most of the other legislation Mike is championing.

Among the Ezzell bills already signed into law is one setting weights and lengths for cotton module haulers; another authorizing the increase in gross weight on cotton trailers from 15,000 to 20,000 pounds; and a law which permits persons over 65 years of age to get permanent exemptions from jury duty, if they seek such waivers.

Ezzell also saw his proposal to amend the law which enables policemen to either draw pay for overtime or take compensatory time in lieu of pay, provided their city council approves such a plan. That bill, having successfully passed both houses, is now awaiting the governor's signature.

Also awaiting the decisive pen stroke of the governor is Ezzell's law permitting persons convicted of Class A misdemeanors the opportunity to do a volunteer community service, if they so desire; a provision permitting hypo-thryoidism screening for infants and a bill allowing drug treatment through the Department of Community Affairs.

Ezzell says he'd like to be a part of the legislative process when redistricting is ordered following the 1980 census. He's keeping his options open but don't bet against him not offering for the same office again next time. Nobody knows for sure but the new district could include Mitchell County plus one or two other sur-

Ezzell would be hard to beat in any legislative race out this way. His shadow is lengthening in Austin. He's made all the right moves and he retains a great appetite for politics. The committees on which he has recently served invariably have a good record for accomplishment.

Jack Anderson's recent in-troduction of a "secret" CIA document has added a new wrinkle to the US oil debacle...Anderson claims that his find shows the Shah of Iran was the "driving force" behind the gouging in 1974 during the Nixon administration.

The documents are purported to say that the US had the power to keep the shah from raising oil prices. Anderson said the shah depended on the US for military support. The US was even responsible for the shah's coming into

ANDERSON RAISES THE question, "Why, then, didn't the presidency at the time use its clout to keep prices from rising?"

He says the Nixon administration was kept from using its clout by the former secretary of state Henry Kissinger's relationship with the

Even the Ford administration had no trouble persuading the shah to keep oil prices equal with those of other countries, said Anderson.

Anderson hinted in his column that Kissinger acted as foreign policy counsel to the shah. They were in contact with each other often (at tax payers expense) as Kissinger kept the shah abreast of international affairs.

Kissinger's side of the story: he had to befriend the shah to protect US interests in the Persian Gulf

Anderson hinted at a deeper reason for the shah - Kissinger closeness. The columnist's suggestion is that

Kissinger acted on the part of the late Nelson Rockefeller, to whom Kissinger was indebted for his job and a \$50,000 gift.

Anderson revealed that Iranian palace sources say that Rockefellers have had financial ties to Iran for 18 years. Rockefeller, said Anderson, channeled millions of dollars through the Chase Manhattan Bank, money gained in the oil business

Kissinger would up as chairman of the bank's international advisory

I thought that it was a curious circumstance, that the initial problem with high gas prices may be due to Kissinger's Rockefeller in-spired suggestion to the shah that gas prices be raised, to benefit the Rockefeller fortune.

MUCKRAKER JACK Anderson (he calls himself that) has written a book, Confressions of a Muckraker, Random House publishers. He recalls some of his experiences with late columnist Drew Pearson and some Washington scandals covered and uncovered by Jack in his early days. Newsweek's review calls the sections 'detailed accounts of halfremembered scandals of the late '40s, '50s and '60s."

Anderson's digging into the muck reveals facts to an American public with a bitter sweet taste. Though we don't like to be shown the embarrassing details of society's scandals we're glad we have the information he provides.

Hike avoidable

WASHINGTON - Top-secret documents strongly indicate that Richard Nixon and Henry Kissinger could have headed off the ruinous oil price rise in 1973-74. Their failure to do so encouraged the oil seikdoms to levy a series of arrogant price increases that have inflicted severe economic damage upon the United States.

Americans are paying five times more for imported oil than they did six years ago. The oil cartel has fixed the price per barrel, economists tell us, at about \$10 more than the price that would prevail in a competitive market.

This means Americans are being robbed every time they fill up their gas tanks, ride the bus, heat their homes or purchase anything that has to be transported. Petroleum is also the base for at least 300 products, ranging from medicines to fertilizers.

IN PAST COLUMNS, we have laid out evidence from the secret files of the Central Intelligence Agency that the shah of Iran was behind the oil gouge. Not only was the shah one of the Big Three in the oil cartel but he was a pet ally of the United States.

Because Washington did not restrain the shah, the other oil-selling nations assumed that the United States condoned his drive for higher prices. The word spread that the Nixon administratimn secretly wanted high-priced oil to slow the wheels of rival industrial powers, such as West Germany and Japan, which were more dependent than the

United States on oil imports. The shah happily helped to spread this impression. From Saudi Arabia James Akins, the American ambassador during the oil negotiations, reported: "The Iranians had told (the Saudis) we were completely unconcerned about any price rise. The shah has also told this to numerous oilmen as proof that the U.S. is at least indifferent to an increase in oil

Only the Saudis, fearful of the economic consequences, opposed the price gouge. As the dominant oil power, "Saudi Arabia can veto any increase because it can produce enough oil to flood the market, and it has a surplus of funds," the CIA noted. But the Saudis were unwilling to stand alone against the Organization of

Petroleum Exporting Countries. The Saudis appealed to Nixon and Kissinger to use their influence with the shah to stop the increases. If the United States did not intervene with the shah, Saudi oil minister Ahmed Zaki Yamani sternly warned Washington, "It can only lead to Saudi Arabia giving up its present position on the crisis and joining its OPEC colleagues in their uncompromising

IN WASHINGTON, two financial pillars, Treasury Secretary William Simon and Federal Reserve Board Chairman Arthur Burns, were alarmed over the economic impact of the oil increases. They fought behind the scenes to break the OPEC price.

Simon flew to Riyadh where he got an agreement from the Saudis to sell their oil at public auction. This would have made it impossible for the cartel to rig prices higher than the competitive manufacturing bear. He returned home triumphantly to present the deal to hixon.

Burns, meanwhile, formed a planning group to prepare economic countermeasures to end the oil rip-off. But both Simon and Burns, incredibly, were thwarted.

The shah, not satisfied with the quadrupling of oil prices, continued to press for still his secret message to Saudi Crown Prince Fahd, intercepted by U.S. intelligence, the shah argued that the increases were justified "because major importing countries have failed to make a sufficient effort to fight inflation, which affects the cost of

OPEC country imports.' When Iran's oil sales began to decline in 1975, the shah also started putting out the line "that foreign aid and economic development efforts will have to be held down because of the decline in oil earnings in 1975."

But the CIA reported in a top-secret dispatch: "In fact, the Iranian balance of payments remains very strong. We believe that Tehran is using the drop in its oil revenues as an excuse to reject various requests for aid and to raise oil prices."

Both Simon and Burns, meanwhile presented their case to Gerald Ford after he replaced Nixon in the White House. Simon drafted a confidential,

six-page memo to the new preside The memo charged that Iran "is the dominant force in OPEC for higher oil prices." The shah's "bogus economic arguments," Simon pleaded, "... should not go unchallenged." He reported that "Saudi Arabia has

repeatedly asked us to put pressure on the shah." The Saudi royal family had told him personally, Simon wrote, that "Saudi Arabia would press OPEC for lower prices" but that they "need the U.S. to help turn the shah around.... They wonder whether, in fact, we want lower oil prices since we never even raise the subject with the shah."

Simon urged Ford "to take a tough private line with Iran, threatening overt U.S. counteractions if their stance is not altered." In fact, the new president called upon the shah to hold the line on oil prices and dispatched Kissinger to Tehran to deliver the





Tipped uterus may be insignificant

Many women panic when a doctor mentions "tipped uterus. They shouldn't. It is so common that it is almost normal. It means only that the uterus is angled, usually backward retroverted). Other women may have a forward tip. There are many variations and degrees. It seldom causes pain, menstrual problems or infertility. In the third to fourth months of pregnancy the uterus straightens and develops normally.

The uterus may change position throughout life, and may even alternate back and forth slightly from the norm. However, the same problems can occur in a tilted uterus as in a normally-positioned one enlargement, growth, etc. Any of these conditions might produce the discomfort you mention. In only a very few women does the tipped uterus produce pain with intercourse. One way to determine if your uterus tilt is causing pain is to wear a pessary, a ring support. If you get relief from this, then the tilting can be

considered the problem. Very rarely, surgery is needed. The years correct matters for most women, as the uterus shrinks at menopause. Unless you are one of those unusual women whose uterine tilt is a real problem,



DEAR DR. GRAHAM: If salvation is by faith alone, and our good works can never win us God's favor, does that mean that we can go out and live anyway we want to once we have been saved? -Mrs. C.T.

DEAR MRS. C.T.: No, it does not. Even in the times of the New Testament there were some who tried to teach this, but the Bible makes it clear that when we come to Christ we have a new life which should be marked by purity and good works.

Why is this true? One reason is because of God's purpose in saving us. Why did God send His Son into the World to die for our sins? Was it simply that we would then go to Heaven? No. It is far deeper and richer than that. Christ came so that you and I who know Him would live under His Lordship — that we would be disciples and follow Him as Lord of our lives. In the Gospels Jesus always called people to be His disciples. His great commission to His followers was that they were to "go and make

There is one other thing I would mention, although more could be said. It is simply this: the Bible — as well as life itself — teaches us that true joy and happiness are only found as we follow Christ. 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

'I have not yet begun to search,' author vows

NEW YORK (AP) - What do you do with a million dollars you made writing a popular novel about salvaging the Titanic?

If you're Clive Cussler, you sink a big hunk of it into reallife ocean salvage — in particular, the finding of John Paul Jones' ship, the Bonhomme Richard.

Cussler, whose "Raise the Titanic!" was a bestseller three years ago, is leading an expedition off the coast of England this month looking for the wreck of the Revolutionary War hero's ship.

The Bonhomme Richard was lost 200 years ago this September after dealing the British Navy an embarrassing defeat

Jones captured the British frigate Serapis in the first naval battle of the fledgling United States. It was during this scrap he is supposed to have said, "I have not yet begun to fight

But his ship was mortally wounded. It drifted 36 hours and sank off Flamborough Head, 180 miles north of London, with Jones and the crew escaping on the Serapis and other vessels.

Now, Cussler and seven others are seeking the Bonhomme Richard's watery grave. They're using sophisticated sonar, a metal detector, precision navigation equipment, research on the battle and even the guidance of psychics.

It's the second year the 47-year-old author has gone after the ship - at a cost of \$140,000 so far. An initial search last summer turned up no trace.

But we've done a lot of homework in research this year," Cussler said in an interview in New York before leaving for England.

The exact position of the battle isn't known, he said. But Jones jettisoned his cannon the morning after the battle in an effort to keep the ship afloat. British divers and fishermen have spotted the cannon in the area.


The foundation is named the National Underwater Marine Agency Inc., a title drawn from Cussler's halfdozen sea adventure books.

But the author insists his search for the Bonhomme Richard is firmly grounded in reality, "Nothing has ever come easy for me," says Cussler, a tanned, powerfullybuilt resident of a Denver suburb, amateur diver and former advertising man.

'Titanic,' when it clicked, was my fourth book. People say congratulations, you're an overnight success. Overnight, yeah - 11 years.

Cussler said he now likes to mix writing with projects of which the Bonhomme Richard is the latest.

"I've always wanted to do something like this. The success of the books has at least given me the opportunity," he said.

Reevaluating limitations

Every political movement since the beginning of time has had the seeds of its own destruction located within often from the onset. During the sixties and early seventies we became acquainted with such movements as the New Frontier. Great Society, and the social-welfare state. In this period our Country seemed to have unlimited resources. We could conduct a war on poverty at home and a fighting war in Vietnam half

way around the world. The government began a policy of intense regulation of the economy and spent billions trying to cure such problems as structural unemployment and poverty. The phenomenon of government expansion was world wide as we began to see the nationalization of many important industries in Western Europe and around the globe.

The idealism of the sixties finally collapsed when it was discovered that government programs did not cure poverty or promote efficiency in the marketplace. Massive amounts of foreign aid did very little to enhance world prosperity and military intervention overseas often did not stabilize pro-Western regimes or make friends for the United

Now we are in the process of examining our past errors. The issues people seem most concerned about are too much government spending and regulation,

inflation, and our eroding national defense. These concerns are not confined to America but are worldwide. A Conservative government recently won in Great Britain with a pledge to reduce inflation and government spending but at the same time to maintain a strong national defense.

A similar situation happened in Canada with the election of the Progressive-Conservative party. Prime Minister-elect, Joe Clark, ran on a platform of percent to 5 percent, using incentives to increase the economic growth rate, and to use financial incentives not government regulations, to encourage production and conservation of energy

Certainly these policies I support in this country. In 1976 a Socialist government was defeated in Sweden after 44 years in

Yugoslavia they are ex-perimenting with a decentralized economy based upon competition between separate business entities. A common denominator around the globe appears to be the desire for internal and international stability and an end to much of the social experimentation undertaken during the 1960's.

Certainly I am pleased that the world is beginning to move ever so slowly toward more laissez-faire reducing inflation from 9.8 economic system based upon limited government intervention. There are many problems that the government cannot solve and must be lived with. Hopefully we are finally entering a time of reevaluating our own limitations and a realization that most problems are the responsibility of each individual to solve and not for a paternalistic bureaucracy

NBC nudges past CBS in ratings

NEW YORK (AP) - NBC, mired for 15 weeks in third place, nudged past CBS in the prime-time ratings race in the week ending June 3, thanks in large measure to big audiences for the concluding chapter of "The Best Place to Be" and "Bob Hope's Birthday Party.

ABC, off track a bit, had five of the week's 10 mostwatched programs, including "Three's Company" in first place for the third week in a row, and regained the No. 1 spot in the networks' competition. ABC, in recent weeks, seldom listed fewer than seven of the week's most watched

Figures from the A.C. Nielsen Co. showed CBS in third place for the first time since the week ending Feb. 11. CBS won the networks' race the previous week following a 19week domination by ABC "The Best Place to Be. No. 2 for the week, and "Bob Hope's Birthday Party." No. 4, were being broadcast for the first time, as was CBS "60 Minutes," which finished

ninth. All other Top 10 programs were reruns of previous episodes. CBS was hurt by the relatively small audience for its broadcast of the pro basketball championship game



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
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

Journalists who reached Leon, Nicaragua's second largest city 54 miles northwest of Managua, saw a heavily-armed troop convoy moving toward the city late Tuesday and said it included a tank, two armoc1' a half-track and several truckloads

of troops. The journalists said Sandinista guerrillas had barred entrance to and around Leon and that army planes were rocketing and strafing rebel positions. Leon residents reached by telephone said the garrison had one tank, and that it was being used in front

of the garrison.

Leon residents also reported heavy firing in the city. They said the guerrillas had used public works department backhoes to dig deep trenches through major streets.

The national guard, Somoza's 10,000-man army and police force, said it had "begun an offensive to drive terrorists from two neighborhoods in Leon." It also said the guerrillas had "fired indiscriminately into the city with mortars, causing innocent victims and property damage.



Pope comes home to capital city where he served as archbishop

KRAKOW, Poland (AP) — Pope John Paul II comes home today to the ancient Polish capital he served as archbishop before his election to the throne of St.

The pope's schedule called for evening prayer services in Wawel Cathedral in the hilltop fortress overlooking the 1,000-year-old city 120 miles south of Warsaw, Poland's present capital.

The pontiff arrives after four crowded days of speeches, Masses, prayers and throngs during which he has hailed the devotion and unity of Eastern Europe's Roman Catholics and demanded full freedoms for the 30 million members of the church in Poland, the same line he took when he was Archbishop Karol Wojtyla.

On Tuesday, in his strongest statement yet, he challenged the Polish government to respect "the cause of fundamental human rights, including religious

He said if the government did so, there can be an "authentic dialogue" between church and state, even though the beliefs of Christians are "diametrically opposed"

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Texas Tech University president resigns post

LUBBOCK, Texas (AP) - Dr. Cecil Mackey, president of Texas Tech University, is expected to be named the new president of Michigan State University Thursday at a news conference at East Lansing, Mich.

Mackey, 50, visited the Michigan campus Tuesday, according to MSU officials, but could not be reached for

The search for a president began 19 months ago. The search committee said late Tuesday that the board of trustees will interview job candidates today and probably will decide by tonight who to hire.

The MSU president earns \$67,500, slightly more than Mackey's Tech salary of \$63,000.

John Bruff, chairman of Michigan State's board of trustees, said the original list of candidates included 250 names, although he declined to confirm or deny that Mackey is a candidate.

"We've had problems with names being released, Bruff said.

In late April, the names of Mackey; Archie Dykes of the University of Kansas; and Charles Ping, president of Ohio University, were mentioned as the top contenders for the job. Mackey and Dykes reportedly withdrew after their names were released

However, acting president of the school, Dr. Edgar Harden, has indicated he is leaving June 30 and the pressure is on to find a replacement this month.

Ping was interviewed three times. Barbara Reagan, economics professor at Southen Methodist University, was interviewed at the Michigan campus last week.

Bruff said the criteria for the job includes knowledge and experience with a land grant university, commitment to affirmative action, scholarsly accomplishments, experience in administraton, budget and fiscal matters, and a president who works well with the state legislature, private fund raising, faculty, students and alumni.

Mackey came to Tech in 1976 from the University of South Florida at Tampa, where he was president from February 1971 to 1976. He was in other administrative positions at Florida State University from 1969 to 1971. He received bachelor's and master's degrees at the University of Alabama and a doctor's of philosophy in economics at the University of Illinois

Mackey also did graduate law study at Harvard Law

Mackey worked with the federal government from 1963 to 1969, holding posts for the Federal Aviation Agency, the U.S. Department of Commerce and the U.S. Department of Transportation.

Mackey was considered for the presidency of the University of Texas at Austin last fall, and also was a candidate for the UT job in 1975.

Michigan State University, the largest in the state and one of the largest schools in the country with aa enrollment of 46,500, includes three medical facilities - a college of osteopathic medicine, a college of human medicine and a college of veterinary medicine.

WASHINGTON (AP) - A Senate plan giving President Carter new powers to deal with fuel shortages — including authority to ban home gas hoarding and to require states to meet fuelsaving targets — is awaiting House action.

The plan, viewed by many backers as a substitute for the president's rejected proposals for gasoline rationing and energy conservation, was approved by a 77-13 Senate vote Tuesday

Action is expected next in the House Commerce Committee, where a group of Democrats led by Rep. Toby Moffett, D-Conn., are vowing to replace the Senate bill with their own plan.

Their proposal includes a sticker plan under which motorists might be required to leave their cars at home one day a week to save fuel. A proposal by Sen. Lowell Weicker, R-Conn., for a but stricter

Heavy rains force residents of Wichita Falls to evacuate

WICHITA FALLS, Texas (AP) — Hundreds of residents scrambled for higher ground Tuesday as more than five inches of rain sent three creeks spilling over their banks and raised the Wichita River to threatening levels. Floodwaters inundated about one third of the area

devastated by the massive tornado that killed 48 persons when it cut a swath April 10 through the southwest side of this city, which sits near the Texas-Oklahoma line.

But flooding problems were reported in low-lying areas in several other sections of Texas, also. Flood warnings were issued in several other places and at least three funnel clouds were spotted in widely separated locations about Texas.

In Wichita Falls, a fire department spokesman said Tuesday at least 12 persons had to be evacuated from their flooded homes. There were no reports of injuries.

Officials said as many as 200 families may have heeded warnings to seek higher ground.

Red Cross chapter manager Jan Beall said survey teams reported at least 50 to 100 homes had been flooded. She said the teams, which were still checking homes late Tuesday night, found many

Floodwaters swirled about four feet deep in some of the houses along the Holliday, Plum and McGrath creeks, said Red Cross worker Pat Root.

The rampaging waters washed out at least three bridges in Wichita County and inundated others, the sheriff's department said. Assistant City Manager Bob Haley said employees would survey the extent of the damage

Residents living near the banks of the Wichita River were urged to move to higher ground Tuesday as the river approached flood stage.



NEW YORK (AP) - National Football League club owners were expected to outlaw forms of the "chop block" today in an effort to reduce the injury toll that has sidelined increasing numbers of high-priced talent

The owners opened their twoday meeting Tuesday by barring tacklers from using their helmets to "butt, ram or spear" an opponent, and banning players from "unnecessarily" using the tops or crowns of their

helmets against an opponent.

The prohibition against the use of helmets as battering rams carries a 15-yard penalty for violators, and was aimed at reducing rib and back injuries. The purpose of outlawing certain forms of the chop block would be to cut the number of leg and knee injuries.

The chop block is an innovation of recent years where you get that low chop to the legs or knees...a lot of it is coached," said Commissioner Pete Rozelle.

He said the owners had debated legislation against it Tuesday, but because some amendments were made, decided to put off a vote until today.

"They seem more concerned with the outside block rather than what happens on the interior line," Rozelle said in response to questions about the likely extent of the rule change. "It's a matter of how far they want to

Rozelle indicated that some club owners were reluctant to put further restrictions on what offensive linemen can do because "you open the gate to more injuries to the quarterback, the most valuable player

He said it was likely that a target of a ban on the chop block would be those offensive backs who zero in on pass rushers coming from the outside.

They wait for the defensive end to come in, and then, when the offensive tackle is trying to hold him (the end) off, that back comes in and cuts him from the side," Rozelle explained. "He doesn't have to come in from the side. Even a small back, if the defensive end is being engaged by another offensive player, can come in and hit him head-on.'

Rozelle said the proposed ban on certain forms of chop blocking and the ban on the use of helmets as weapons "were part of a continuing study to alter rules that will help reduce injuries.'

The owners also agreed Tuesday on some modifications in the complicated procedure for breaking division ties in the standings and wild card ties. NFL Public Relations Director Don Weiss said the purpose of the clarifications was to head off possible problems in determining playoff berths and priorities in the college player draft.







As pointed out in a Harte-Hanks Austin Bureau series three weeks ago, special interests greased their gears early for the 1979 legislature - contributing \$1.88 million to lawmakers' 1978 campaign funds.

Lobbyists came to the Capitol in record numbers and made their presence felt Liberals always yell about the lobby, but this time even many of the conservative,

Rep. Robert Bush of Sherman, enough of a House team player to earn a seat on the Appropriations Com-mittee, said he got so tired of lobbyists that he ran some out of his office.

"The lobby came down here much more focused and organized," Bush said. There were coalitions of

lobbyists. For example, the utility lobby got Chamber of Commerce and banker support for its top priority-a bill to strip cities of rate-making jurisdiction.

That bill died despite the intense pressure, but only because of equally powerful lobbying from the Texas Municipal League.

Some longtime legislative observers (reporters, consumer representatives, lobbyists, state employees) say the big difference in the 1979 session has that special interests became more active in trying to pass legislation.

In the past, they say, the focus was on stopping legislation, such as new taxes or social reform programs

Special interest now are growing bolder than they have been since the reform movement that followed an influence-peddling scandal that began this decade.

legislators believe the reform activities went too far, that it's time to step

The 1979 legislature moved somewhat in that direction with business-oriented legislation such as adjustments to the consumer protection act.

Liberals and consumeroriented moderates had to fight to hold their gains of the past, and were just happy to see the session end.



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Gasohol no real solution

WASHINGTON (AP) -There may be fuel in them there fields, but the revenuers don't look upon gasohol as an unmixed blessing.

They're worried that all the tiger may not wind up in the tank.

To make gasohol, you've got to make alcohol, which runs head-on into the government's strict rules on distilling the stuff.

It seems that alcohol good enough to burn can easily be

alcohol good enough to drink.

The government does not look with favor upon homemade alcohol, and with good reason. There's a lot of money involved. The tax on 100-proof alcohol for drinking purposes is now \$10.50 a gallon, and there's concern in Washington that grain alcohol distilled for

fuel could be diverted into illegal whiskey. One Midwestern farmer who wanted to build a still to tractors claimed the govern-ment treated him more like a moonshiner than a poineer in

a new technology. There has been a lot of talk in Congress and elsewhere about the production of alcohol to be blended with gasoline as a way to ease oil supply problems. Gasohol already is on the market in some areas. Legislation has been proposed to promote its

But Sen. Birch Bayh, D-Ind., says the process has been slowed in part by the very government that is trying to find ways out of the energy problem.

Bayh said that is particularly true of efforts by farmers and farm belt communities to build stills that could provide fuel for the local market.

The trouble is that alcohol has been produced for beverages or for industrial use but not, until lately, for fuel. As a result, government regulations don't take that into account

The Bureau of Alcohol Firearms and Tobacco tried to help solve the problem and issued a pamphlet for would-be gasohol producers, explaining procedures for getting a permit for alcohol production

But Bayh said it was too complicated to be much help. So he has proposed

legislation to simplify the process and ease the restrictions on small

They'd just have to guarantee that it wasn't going to be used that way. The new rules would

require that gasohol producers denature the alcohol by adding substances that will make it unfit for drinkings. They would also have to keep detailed records on production and records on production and use, and guard against diversion of the alcohol.

Presumably, the new rules would spare people like Lance Crombie of Webster, Minn., from problems with

the revenue agents.
Crombie built an inexpensive solar still to produce alcohol for fuel, although he said the sheriff advised him not to. It turned out the sheriff knew what he was

talking about.
According to Crombie, he had no sooner gone into production than two federal men showed up and con-iscated the still.

He finally applied for a federal permit, and says it came through six months



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


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Waitress' Woe: A Choosy Eater Scales Her Tips

New judge in the family

WASHINGTON (AP) — That old country lawyer from North Carolina may soon have a federal judge

in the family.

Sen. Robert Morgan, D-N.C., has recommended that President Carter appoint Sam J. Ervin III to the 4th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals. And the choice has the OK of Republican Sen. Jesse Helms.

Ervin, son of the retired North Carolina Democrat who chaired the Senate Watergate Committee and described himself as just a country lawyer, was one of five men selected by a presidential search committee. Carter's recommendation must be approved by the Senate.

Morgan said Tuesday he felt the junior Ervin's experience as a Superior Court judge would make him an outstanding member of the bench. Helms, who had made it clear he could not suport some of the other candidates due to philosophical differences, said Ervin enjoyed "broad bipartisan respect."

Reduced sentence denied

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — The Caifornia Court of Appeals has turned down a request from the con-victed assassin of Sen. Robert Kennedy for a

victed assassin of Sen. Robert Kennedy for a reduction in his prison sentence.

The decision Tuesday came just after the 11th anniversary of assassination. Sirhan Sirhan, convicted in the Los Angeles hotel shooting, had urged the court to cut his total period of confinement because of voluntary work efforts and social adjustment.

The Community Release Board has set May 1, 1985, as the date Sirhan is eligible for parole. Sirhan can now appeal to the California Supreme Court.

Collection second to one

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — Relatively speaking, the University of Texas' collection of Albert Einstein documents is only second to one.

The Humanities Research Center at the university says its acquisition of another Einstein manuscript makes its collection second only to that of Princeton's Institute for Advanced Study.

The manuscript on unified field theory completes an earlier one already at the research center, director Carlton Lake said Tuesday. He said the manuscript "contains more than 500 pages and has 32 parts ... The work was done by Einstein from about 1950 until his death in 1955."

The Einstein holdings at UT total more than 700

manuscript pages, as well as letters, portraits and photographs.

Duke of Kent honor guest

TOKYO (AP) - The Duke of Kent was guest of

honor when Chinese Vice Premier Wang Zhen (Wang Chen) gave a banquet in Peking, says the Xinhua (Hsinhua) News Agency.

The duke, vice chairman of the British Overseas Trade Board and cousin of Queen Elizabeth II, arrived in Peking Monday for an eight-day visit. He opens a British energy exhibition in the Chinese canital Wednesday.

In a speech at Tuesday's banquet, Wang said the Duke of Rent was the first member of the royal family to pay a goodwill visit to China.

Stubborn economy won't quit despite bad odds

NEW YORK (AP) - The bullheaded economy just won't go down for the count. Whacked over the head with two by four, one after another, it staggers, spins and

lurches ahead again. How much can it take? Truckers strike. Oil exporters raise prices. Interest rates and prices seem beyond control. Consumers are said to be worried.

Statistics too suggest the economy is in trouble, and perhaps on the verge of losing consciousness. April durable goods orders plummeted. Factory orders fell 6.1 percent. The leading-indicator index fell.

In fact, the latter fell in April for the third month this year, and it fell by 3.3 percent, the sharpest decline on record. Regardless, said a government spokesman, it

doesn't necessarily mean recession.

What does it take? For more than a year, some of our most esteemed economists have been roosting on a limb, calculating and forecasting and waiting for portents of

recession. It will come, they say.
It might. At the moment in fact, many economists are insisting all the more that May was the month when the recession finally did drop in. That claim cannot be sub-

stantiated until some future date. Meanwhile, there are signs of another sort that suggest some economists might have to sit out there on that limb

for a while yet. These are signs of strength; they aren't pervasive, but they exist. The Conference Board, ubiquitous monitor of

everything economic, has announced that business spending for new plant and equipment may rise strongly this year, despite all those forecasts of troubles to come. Smaller business also may be in a spending mood. Analyzing interviews made April 16, the National Federation of Independent Business found a surprising

Federation of (Independent Business found a surprising rise in the percentage of companies with expansion plans. The Federation, whose rolls are said to include more than 500,000 independent business people, found the improved spending outlook was accompanied by a sharp rise in companies expecting higher sales.
