Hijacker returned to United States

MCGUIRE AIR FORCE BASE. N.J. (AP) - An anticommunist Serb who hijacked an American Airlines jet with 135 persons aboard earlier this week was returned to the United States today on the same Boeing 707 that he forced to fly him to Ireland.

Nikola Kavaja was led off the plane in handcuffs shortly after his arrival here on a flight from Shannon, Ireland, where he arrived on Thursday and was ordered deported early

Kavaja was not allowed to talk to reporters as he was taken to be arraigned on an arrest warrant issued because he failed to appear for sentencing Thursday for the 1975 bombing of the home of Yugoslavia's consum in Chicago. His hijacking odyssey began Wednesday when he commandeered a jetliner on a flight from New York to Chicago, where he was to have been sentenced.

U.S. Magistrate Stephen M. Orlofsky ordered Kavaja returned to Chicago and officials said he would be flown to Illinois aboard a chartered airplane after the arraignment was completed.

Five Irish policemen guarded Kavaja and his American lawyer, Deyan Brashich, on today's flight to the United States. The jet was flown by the same volunteer crew that took it to Ireland on Thursday.

One of the Irish guards, Deputy Superintendent Pat Docey, said Kavaja was "very calm and relaxed. He might have dozed for a short

At his arraignment, Kavaja was asked if he understood his right to remain silent. Brashich, who translated for Kavaja, quoted his client as responding: "I know that and I will make no comments or any statements or answers to any questions

When asked if he was tired, Kavaja said: "I have not slept for four days. What kind of country is this? America is not a communist country

He asked that the hearing be rescheduled until Saturday morning, but Orlofsky rejected the request.

The Irish government announced early today that it was sending Kavaka and his lawyer back, even though Ireland has no extradition treaty with the United States. The pair apparently were deported as illegal

Carter keeps promise to truckers

The White House announced plans today to end the federal rule giving farmers priority in obtaining diesel fuel, apparently so it can be diverted to independent of the control of the cont to independent truckers.

Agriculture Secretary Bob Bergland said President Carter ordered an end to the rule. The action followed the worst day of violence yet in the strike by the nation's 100,000 independent truckers.

The president's action followed his promise Thursday to make more diesel available to the striking truckers, who have complained of fuel

Bullets tore into more than three dozen rigs in 18 states Thursday. Other trucks were pounded by rocks, run off the road, set afire or plagued by nails strewn on roads. In Idaho, drivers had to make their way around two trees set across a highway.

Rupert Welch, a spokesman for the American Trucking Associations, said in Washington today that more than 40 percent of the hauling capacity of regulated carriers had been stopped by the strike and by fuel problems Welch said the 40 percent plus

shutdown figure - "a ballpark estimate" - was a couple of days old and that the percentage probably was higher today He said the shutdown had been

across the board - both among the irregular route carriers, who haul goods from factories to distribution points, and those who have regular routes between trucking terminals.

Refrigerator trucks, which carry meats and frozen vegetables, have been among the hardest hit by the shutdown, and another major

In the incidents Thursday, two men were injured — one critically — when their tractor-trailer rig swerved off Interstate 64 east of Mount Vernon in southern Illinois after the right tire was shot out, state police said.

Officers said John Kelley, 26, Florissant, Mo., was in critical condition at a hospital with a back injury, and Barry Awalt, 32, of St. Louis was admitted for observation. The Tennessee Highway Patrol said

Meanwhile, in Chelsea, Mass., about 80 rigs parked bumper-tobumper today to shut down the New England Producer Center, and state police arrested more than a dozen persons, many of them protest leaders. The remaining drivers cleared away from the gate after the arrests, but left their trucks.

The truckers' strike called to protest rising diesel prices and dwindling supplies, load regulations and the 55-mph speed limit, also tightened its grip on the nation's supply lines for fuel and food.

Five poultry producers cut back operations in Georgia, chickens were drowned and eggs smashed in Tennessee for lack of transportation. North Carolina's cucumber crop was rotting, milk was dumped in Pennsylvania and cotton piled up in

The action gets under way shortly after 8 p.m., in the Rodeo Bowl located next to the Howard County Fairgrounds. Thrush Judy Lynn, who entertained the crowds with her remarkable singing ability the first two nights, has moved on.

Replacing her in the spotlight this evening will be young Marty Davis and his band while comely Charly McClain takes center stage Saturday, when the rodeo winds up.



Satanic leader denied bond

CLEVELAND (AP) - A satanic cult leader charged with threatening to kill President Carter has been denied bond, but his attorney says arrangements are being made to have him admitted to an institution.

Michael Lurie, 34, of suburban Cleveland Heights. pleaded innocent Thursday to a charge alleging he attempted last month to hire hit men to kill the president. A preliminary hearing is set for June 30.

Lurie's lawyer, Bernard Berkman, told the judge his client "is a very sick man" and that "arrangements are being made to get him institutionalized in a hospital-type environment.' Lurie says he is a leader of the Satanic Church and plans to establish a world government in

They face charges of statutory burglary, destruction of property and breaking and entering, and a possible 31 years in prison.



Law enforcement agents, intent on learning the identity of participants, produced a search warrant, barreled into the newsroom and proceeded to inventory practically every picture and negative in sight.

Members of the fourth estate were upset. Appeal after appeal led the case eventually into the United States Supreme Court, which ruled last year that police could search a news office for evidence of a crime even though the only connection was criminal activity was through its news

There were procedures newsmen could follow to prevent police types from extending the search beyond material related to a specific incident. Still, it made every newsroom vulnerable to unreasonable searches.

President Carter later interceded, petitioning Congress to approve federal legislation which would prevent policemen from rummaging through a newsroom. Texas lawmakers, however, may have anticipated administrative in-

THEY SHAPED UP a bill which prevents officers from searching a news office if there is no evidence reporters or other employees of a

newspaper are actively involved in criminal activity. The news coverage of a crime is not sufficient evidence,

according to the legislation.

Ramroding the bill was Sen. Luther
Jones of El Paso. It swept through the House, 108-12, and all but one of the 29 senators casting ballots favored it. Only three other states — Connecticut, Nebraska and New Jersey -

have passed similar bills this quickly. The law frees the media from the threat of improper searches and allows newspapers to go about their business without harrassment.

This was the first thought that flashed through my mind when I heard that ABC television correspondent Bill Stewart had been gunned down in cold blood while kneeling at the feet of a Nicaraguan guard. It was a very reactionary thought for one who considers himself a liberal humanitarian.

But it was also a thought that elicited several others in its wake, calling for a bit of soul searching on

WHY HAD I reacted so strongly to this incident? After all, innocent people are killed in a similarly ruthless fashion throughout the world

Perhaps my reaction was based on the fact that Stewart was a fellow reporter and an American. But shouldn't I be able to extend that same empathy to any fellow human being who might suffer such an atrocity?

The development of a jaded attitude toward the death or misfortune of fellow humans is an occupational hazard for a reporter. In too many situations, he is required to cooly observe and make record of another's misery

A dispassionate attitude, callousness, serves as armor to protect a reporter from that which might render him ineffective at his

It is ironic, however, that the same armor might achieve the opposite purpose. A reporter without compassion is equally as worthless as one who faints at the sight of blood. S

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THIS HOLDS DOUBLY true for those in other professions, such as medicine and law enforcement, that require a measure of both humanity

and cool-headedness. It is unfortunate that it often takes an incident such as Stewart's senseless death to bring those feelings of

humanity into sharp focus. His death brings home the point that we are all victims of violence, and when it is allowed to fester, no one is

Such brutality must be swept out of any dark corner of the earth where it can thrive, and into the clear light of day. That is what Stewart, himself, was doing in Nicaragua.

It was not just that he was a reporter and an American that made his death important and shocking. It was also that he was just one of many innocent human beings whose lives have been snuffed out without purpose

As President Carter so aptly put it, Stewart's death was "an act of barbarism that all civilized people condemn." Let us hope that the civilized can continue to outnumber the barbarians



Unconvincing

WASHINGTON - 'Our recent column on the alarming state of decay and deterioration of priceless American historical documents at the National Archives generated an outpouring of letters from outraged readers to Archivist John Rhoads.

The response was swift and productive. Archives officials ordered some of the cluttered shelves and floors tidied up. They installed four new hydrothermograph machines to monitor temperature and humidity in an annex where some of the precious documents are kept. They began a crash program to lick the problem of deteriorating nitrate film; they also initiated security measures to keep unauthorized persons away from items that might tempt the sticky-

THEY EVEN managed to locate a that we reported had been missing for 10 years. (It was found behind a shelf two days after our story appeared.) Still missing, though, are some wartime telegrams of President Lincoln. In a meeting with us, Rhoads admitted that Archives officials hadn't even known they were lost until they read our column.

But Rhoads insisted that we had wrongfully assailed his stewardship of our national heritage. He and his top assistants gave us a Cook's tour of their domain to convince us we had

treated them badly Despite the hasty, gratifying cleanup campaign, however, we remain unconvinced.

For example, Rhoads and his top brass conceded that there is a "major preservation problem" at Archives. They merely argued that their inability to solve it can be blamed on lack of money provided by their parent agency, the General Services

Administration. Rhoads pointed proudly to the fact that in his 10 years as Archivist he has been able to wangle \$11 million out of GSA for preservation — a far cry from the \$200,000 a year the agency was spending on preservation when he took over AM-mall

WE AGREE THAT getting money has been a big problem for the Archives. But we must point out that Rhoads knew the magnitude of the preservation work needed deteriorating maps, treaties and pers of the Continental Congress from an internal study he ordered back in 1969. Yet he asked for only \$1.5

million for a five-year period. It would cost more than that just to neutralize the acid that is eating the Continental Congress papers, whose bindings are also falling apart. If Rhoads had publicized his problem 10 years ago, he might have raised the needed funds.

A more fundamental problem is determining just how Archives handles the money it does get. We have learned that much of the agency's appropriated funds is spent in highly questionable ways.

There is, for instance, the private "trust fund" that Archives operates.

Last winter, for example, sizable numbers of pronghorn antelope drifted down from Saskatchewan into Montana. Under the treaty provisions, it is possible that all antelope in the United States and Canada would thereby be classed as international migrants. They would then be subject to the management decisions of the majority of the treaty nations.

'Old age' gets blamed for too many ills

Dear Dr. Ruble: I have very dry skin on my arms and legs. It itches and I scratch until I get my arms bleeding. I was told this is due to old age. I am 59 years old. When I scratch my arms or legs they look scaly. What doctor should I see? - A.P.

Old age gets blamed for a lot of 59 you aren't considered old anyway, so you have to lay the itching to a health problem that requires treat-

At your age (and it's wise at any age), look for other causes. One of the chief ones is scabies (no matter how careful you are hygienically). It's increasing in all age groups. If this is ruled out the doctor might investigate drug allergy of such internal problems as lymph node disturbance or diabetes. There's a whole list of other trouble points that can produce skin symptoms - kidney, liver, or the blood itself - a condition called poly-

skin quality and can also be involved. Consider the skin an "organ" of the body. It acts as a "two-way" early warning system — both for problems caused by outside factors and things going on inside. Rashes, itching, and scaling usually have identifable causes. It takes detective work to determine what the skin is "trying to tell us." Dermatologists have special training in this field.

Kelp has a relatively high iodine content, so if you have been using it and have not been bothered you may continue, but the salt gives you the iodine one normally needs

new trial.
McGee, who is no relation to Kerr-McGee co-founder Dean A. McGee, said that during the 11-week trial a number of incidents involving the nuclear industry combined to prejudice the jurors, who awarded Miss Silkwood's estate \$10.5

Among the incidents the reactor accident in Pennsylvania in late March.

Jim Ikard accused McGee of appeals.

Earthquake rumbles along Mexican coast

BERKELEY, Calif. (AP) A strong earthquake measuring at least 6.2 on the Richter scale rumbled along the Pacific coast of southern Mexico at 11:36 p.m. PDT Thursday, an official at the University of California Seismographic Stations said. Such an earthquake is capable of severe damage in

populated areas. "It's an earthquake which is capable of doing damage, but for Mexico it is not a particularly large quake," said David W. Gordon, a seismologist at the National Earthquake Information Center in Golden, Colo.

Preliminary computations of the quake's epicenter placed it 2,200 miles southeast of Berkeley in the vicinity of the southern coast of Chiapas, a Mexican state, said Dr. Robert Uhrhammer, research seismologist

at the Berkeley station. Gordon said the Colorado semismograph registered 6.3 the point on earth above the on the Richter scale. Gordon

said the Colorado center also estimated the epicenter as just off the Pacific coast of Mexico. He said he didn't know if the area was populated.

The Richter scale is a gauge of the energy released by an earthquake, as measured by the ground motion recorded on a seismograph.

Every increase of one number, say from magnitude 5.5 to magnitude 6.5, means the ground motion is 10 times greater. Some experts say the actual amount of energy released may be 30 times greater. A quake of magnitude 6 or

greater can cause segere damage. The San Francisco earthquake of April 1906 was later computed to have a Richter magnitude of 7.9 The quake and subsequent fire were blamed for an estimated 700 deaths.

Teen suicide

By Robert Wallace, Ed. D.

Suicide is the third leading killer of teen-agers (following accidents and homicides). And while about 5,000 teenagers commit suicide each year, the number who attempt to kill themselves is

100 times as high Psychiatrists claim that many in this last group - the attempted suicides - are really looking for attention, not death. And many of these teens have a common and alltoo-fatal belief - that a brush with death will bring them the love, attention and respect they are desperate for in life. Their suicide attempts are what doctors call "cries for help."

How can you tell if someone you know is contemplating suicide? Dr. Mary Griffin, a psychiatrist, reports that an easily observable change in behavior might be a sign of impending suicide The honor student who stops studying, the easygoing girl who suddenly turns sullen and forlorn, and the quiet boy who becomes loud and aggressive all might be suicide signals

The signs seem easy to spot. Why then do too many suicide notes lament, "None of my so-called friends would listen to me?" Dr. Francine Klagsbrun, author of "Too Young to Die: Youth and Suicide," points out that some very dangerous myths often keep us from helping

our friends "Too often people ignore the suicidal person's talk of killing himself because they think he's just looking for attention." says Dr. Klagsbrun. "Ignoring people who

are on the verge of suicide is the worst thing to do. People who talk about suicide want attention - in the same way a drowning person wants a lifeguard to save him.

"Some people feel that once a person has decided to kill himself, no one can stop him," Dr. Klagsbrun remarks. "This is wrong. Everything we know about suicide shows that peopledesperately want to find a better way. Thus, no matter how distraught or self-destructive the individual is there is a good possibility he can be helped.

There are 200 centers across the country that offer help to suicidal persons, 24 hours a day seven days a week. To findthe nearest center, call 411 or look in the Yellow Pages under 'Suicide Prevention," "Mental Health" or "Clinics." The American Association of Suicidology in Houston (713-644-7911) will refer any person needing help to a doctor or center close to his or her home. Or look under 'CONTACT" in the telephone book. There are 81 CONTACT centers across the United

If you're worried that a friend is about to kill himself. don't carry the burden alone. Involve parents, teachers, counselors. Your friend may be furious with you for betraving a confidence. But losing a friendship beats losing

Estes trial continues

No machines delivered. leasing firm officials say

DALLAS (AP) — Leasing company of-ficials testified in the fraud trial of Billie Sol Estes that their companies bought a number of steam cleaners several years ago, but they have yet to see any evidence those

"I've never seen anything we bought," said Jerry Fowler, president and general manager of Western Lease Banc, Inc. Fowler also said his company lost about \$30,000 in the deal.

Prosecutors continue their efforts to link Estes to the allegedly fradulent marketing scheme in federal court here today.

Estes and former associate Raymond K. Horton are accused of conspiring to defraud four leasing companies of more than \$500,000 through the sale of 36 non-existent steam cleaners

The government planned to try to connect Estes and the steam cleaner operation with the testimony of two former Horton associates in the fraud trial today.

Assistant U.S. Attorney Jim Rolfe has called Frank Fuell and M.L. Copenhaver to testify in what he has described as a paperonly deal to buy and sell the cleaners. Fuell and Copenhaver both have pleaded guilty to fraud charges stemming from the steam

Fowler testified that in 1975, his company agreed to buy eight steam cleaners from Atomic Enterprises Inc. of San Antonio and lease them to Wallace Oil Co. of Midland, companies the federal government says were owned by Horton and Estes. The invoices showed the cleaners were


delivered, but when he went to Midland to inspect them a year later, Fowler said they 'We asked to be told where the collateral

was," he said. "He (Horton) said he didn't

Fowler said he later was shown one brandnew steam cleaner, but he could not identify it as belonging to his company because it carried no serial number.

Estes was convicted in 1963 after he built a fortune in a similar scheme involving mortgages of fertlizer tanks that did not exist. He was paroled in 1971 after serving six years of his 15-year sentence.

Bill Stanton of Lubbock said he, too, was shown one steam cleaner with no serial number when he went to Midland to check on the eight cleaners purchased by Borg-Warner Leasing Co. of Chicago.



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Lured by lower prices and promises of plentiful supplies, thousands of Americans are turning to natural gas instead of oil to

"We're backlogged by 800 customers at this point," said Louis R. Hampton, president of the Providence, R.I., Gas. Co. "Gas at the moment is considerably cheaper than oil." Columbia Gas of Ohio expects to

add 7,000 customers this year; Intermountain Gas in Idaho has signed up 1,200 families so far in 1979; and the president of Northern Utilities in Portland, Maine, reports a "substantial increase" in

The American Gas Association says its members reported that 144,000 customers converted from oil to gas last year; this year, said spokesman Terry Uhl, the figure is

expected to be even higher. Between 60 percent and 65 percent of American homes use

natural gas; about half as many use heating oil. Heating oil prices are soaring, however; they are expected to hit 80 cents a gallon this winter, up from 50 cents at the start of the 1978 heating season. There are warnings of shortages, particularly in the Northeast, which relies heavily on oil. And price and supply are prompting some people to switch fuels.

Heating bills vary widely, but a look at some averages shows that the savings achieved by switching can be dramatic.

The National Oil Jobbers Council estimates that the average household which uses oil consumes about 1,300 gallons during the heating season. At 80 cents per gallon, that would mean an annual

The American Gas Association says the average gasheated household used 78,000 cubic feet

during the 1978-79 heating season. The group said the current average price is \$2.53 per thousand cubic feet for a heating bill of just under \$200. Prices are rising, but even if they reached \$6 per 1,000 cubic feet, the annual bill still would be only \$468 - less than half the amount spent by a family with oil

Individuals aren't the only ones who are changing to natural gas. In New York City, the Lefrak Organization, announced it was converting 54 buildings with 9,214 apartments from oil to gas.

Legislation passed by Congress in 1978 lifted price controls on natural gas in a series of steps designed to result in nearly complete deregulation by 1985. It already has resulted in price boosts for consumers. It also is expected to bring increased supplies and has prompted some authorities to lift restrictions on utilities which had been prohibited from adding new natural gas

The Washington Gas Light Co., which supplies the District of Columbia and its Maryland and Virginia suburbs, had not accepted new customers for over five years. Area public service commissions okayed a limited expansion last year and company spokesman Paul Young said Washington Gas Light is adding customers at the rate of 2 percent or 11,000 to 12,000 a year. "Supplies have been improving for this area and we are now showing a steady growth

ended a seven-year moratorium on new customers and spokesmen say they have a backlog of 10,000 to 14.000 orders for residential ser-

vice. Dave Talbot of East Ohio Gas Co. said over 85 percent of the new homes built in his company's service area are using natural gas. "We have a lot of customers who are switching from oil to gas and we are picking up a number of commercial accounts that are changing over," he said.

William Chapman of Idaho's Intermountain Gas said growth was small last year, but is up sharply in 1979. He said supplies "excellent" and the company, which now has 96,000 customers, could add 70,000 more without trouble. Prices also are

CORPUS CHRISTI, Texas (AP) — The statelmated tiege at Lester Roloff's Rebekah Home for Girls entered its third day today with a state task force awaiting word

"We are not an army. We are a social service agency," said Marlin Johnston, associate commissioner of the Texas Department of Human Resources.

A state judge has told the DHR to clear out the Roloff homes. The fiery fundamentalist preacher says licensing his homes would be a violation of the separation of church and state. The courts have said the homes can't operate without the license.

"It's not a matter of whether," Johnston said Thursday about the closing of the facility. "It's just a matter of when

Until Johnston figures out how to get past the legion of Bible toting preachers and parents who have blockaded the church where the Rebekah girls have been spending their days, the 140-member state task force remains headquartered at Texas A&I University at Kingsville. While Johnston maintains the task force is not an army. he has started to talk about strategy and maneuvers.

He was told Thursday that the state cannot enter Roloff's People's Church to get the children. Johnston said state officials have told him that the church - though on the same grounds - is not considered a part of the homes. "We will not go into the church," said DPS Lt. Herbert

Hale, who is working with the DHR team. Johnston was asked if the task force would wait until nightfall in an effort to catch the girls outside the church.

"My desire would be never to go in the middle of the night, but I wouldn't rule out anything," he said. 'I just don't know how you pull off a surprise action with everyone watching. I question whether it is feasible to go in at night," he added.

Johnston made a brief visit to the Roloff facility Wednesday — the day the state hoped to close the homes. He came out empty handed after a chat with Roloff. He said the DHR had planned to return that day

Lemon to manage **AL All-Stars**

NEW YORK (AP) — Bob Lemon will put on his New York Yankees uniform once more when he manages the American League in the All-Star Game against the National League at Seattle July 17.

"I feel very great about being named AL manager," Lemon said. "I feel that it's an honor to be the manager of the All-Star Game. Always when I was playing I looked forward to playing in it... I was a coach twice and an honorary captain once."

Lemon was named manager of the Yankees at midseason in 1978, taking over for Billy Martin, leading the team to a World Series victory and was named AL Manager of the Year. He was replaced as manager last Monday by Martin.

"Bob wanted to be the All-Star manager and he certainly earned the honor," said AL President Lee MacPhail. "It seems to me that Bob is the perfect choice. He has been active in the league and has seen all the teams this year, and he knows all the league talent thoroughly

"Together, we hope to select the best possible club to oppose Tommy Lasorda and the Nationals..."

A member of baseball's Hall of Fame, Lemon was a

20-game winner for the Cleveland Indians seven times. pitched in four All-Star games and two World Series as

It will not be the first time that a manager has been called from the sidelines to handle an All-Star team. The last was Dick Wiliams, who piloted the 1974 American League team after resigning as Oakland manager following the 1973 World Series. But by then, he had been signed by the California Angels.

In the very first All-Star Game at Comiskey Park in Chicago, in 1933, John McGraw managed the National League team although he had been replaced as New York Giants manager by Bill Terry during the 1932

The American League team was managed by Philadelphia's Connie Mack, even though Joe McCarthy's Yankees had won the pennant the previous

Neither Johnny Keane of the 1964 World Champion St. Louis Cardinals nor Yogi Berra of the Yankees was managing the same club at the start of the 1965 season. Keane was replaced by Gene Mauch, who had managed the Philadelphia Phillies to a tie for second place in 1964, and Berra by Al Lopez, who had piloted the Chicago White Sox to a second place finish in the

In 1963, Ralph Houk's Yankees won the AL title, but Houk was named general manager of the team and Lopez again managed the AL All-Stars in 1964.

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

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



I went to the hospital right after the fight, and they found I had a kidney ailment. A lot of people thought Ali put me in the hospital. Shoot, no way. No way a man can hit me on the head and hurt my kidness."

He looked fit and trim. He hasn't fought in several years, since George Foreman bombed him into retirement, but has kept his figure, and you couldn't help drawing a mental comparison with the widely circulated picture of Ali's belly.

"I feel better right now than I did when I got into the ring with Clay that night," said Joe Frazier. "I was tired. I was tired for weeks before the fight."

"Why didn't you postpone it?"

And so, weak and sick, Joe Frazier went into the ring and went 15 savage rounds with Ali that night, March 8, 1971, to become undisputed heavyweight champion of the



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Police find bodies of 246

HONG KONG (AP) — Police have found the bodies of 246 persons they believe drowned while trying to swim from China to Hong Kong this year, compared to 209 in all of 1978, a government spokesman reported.

Hong Kong police have rounded up and deported 41,727 illegal immigrants from China since January compared with 1,566 in the same period last year. Officials estimate that for every one caught, two elude the border patrols.

Illinois doctors to use weed

SPRINGFIELD, Ill. (AP) Illinois, which generally outlaws use of marijuana, is about to start distributing the weed to doctors - for medicinal purposes only, of

It looks like a regular cigarette, comes in cans of 300 and is grown on the grounds of the University of Mississippi, according to Thomas B. Kirkpatrick Jr., executive director of the Illinois Dangerous Drugs

"It's Mexico stock," Kirkpatrick said Thursday. 'It's very carefully grown, just like a commercial tobacco crop.

Kirkpatrick said Illinois is the first state approved by the U.S. Food and Drug Administration to distribute the pharmaceutically pure, government-inspected, prerolled and packaged marijuana to treat the side effects of chemotherapy

Marijuana reportedly alleviates the extreme nausea and discomfort that accompany chemotherapy treatments for cancer.

According to the National Organization for Reform of Marijuana Laws, at least 13 states now use marijuana in legal research programs conducted under federal auspices. And a NORMAL spokeswoman, Alice O'Leary, said Oregon authorizes dispensing of the drug by doctors and use by patients under limited

Kirkpatrick said the pot will be given to doctors throughout the state who have been approved by the Illinois Cancer Council, a private organization.

Doctors who receive monthly marijuana shipments must have no criminal records and secure places to store the drug, Kirkpatrick said. They must also report their results to the council

When the Legislature first authorized the plan last year, it did not specify how doctors were supposed to get the pot. Street sales obviously were not suitable, Kirkpatrick said, because the dosage is irregular and they often are contaminated by herbicides.

For example, Secretary oseph A. Califano Jr. of the U.S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare, is seeking comment from federal agencies on a study suggesting paraquat spraying to kill marijuana grown in Mexico may lead to lung illness in pot smokers. Paraquat is a herbicide.

So the Illinois pot, grown from Mexican marijuana seeds with the federal government's approval, will be obtained from the National Institute of Drug Abuse, Kirkpatric said. Kirkpatrick said the active

ingredient tetrahydrocannabinol, or THC - varies with different types of marijuana. He said Illinois will be getting two batches, one containing 1.2 percent THC, and the other 2

Xirkpatrick said already has samples of the marijuana, but it will be about 90 days before the way is cleared for patients to start using it.

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
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
