## Citizens' coalition wants 'silent tax' inflation action

coalition of 70 consumer, labor and senior citizen groups is calling on President Carter and Congress to take immediate steps to end what it calls the "silent tax" — inflation.

The coalition - Consumers Opposed to Inflation in the Necessities includes the AFL-CIO, the Con-sumer Federation of America, the National Council of Senior Citizens and the National Women's Political

It is urging Carter and Capitol Hill to take steps the coalition says could cut the annual inflation rate by 3 percentage points over the next 18

The group's news conference today followed by less than 24 hours the government's announcement that consumer prices rose a dramatic 1.1 percent in May, the fourth straight month that saw prices up at least a

full 1 percent.

COIN argues that inflation, like a

Last year's 9 percent inflation rate, for example, reduced what each consumer's dollar bought by 9 cents.

Of most concern to COIN are rising prices for food, housing, fuel and medical care, items that constitute about two-thirds of the average family's spending.

Food and fuel prices have been the most troublesome this year. Although food prices rose only a moderate 0.7 percent in May, each of the five preceding months registered gains of

at least 1 percent. Gasoline prices rose 5 percent in May, "bringing the increase so far this year to an annual rate of 55.1 percent," the Labor Department said in releasing the May price report. Fuel oil prices, up significantly for the fourth consecutive month, rose 5.3

percent Overall, prices have been rising at an annual rate of 13.4 percent, about double the Carter administration's

COIN's members believe the time is right for their proposals.

They are going into an election Gar Alperovitz, the organization's economics adviser, said of the public officials to whom the appeal is being aimed. "They have to get the message that they can't keep doing what they are doing because it isn't working.'

Proposals in the "short-term agenda" COIN proposed to break the upward price spiral include:

-Reversal of the president's action to decontrol domestic crude oil prices. -Congressional passage of a ceiling on hospital cost increases

"Exploration of fast-hitting, anti-inflationary rebates or subsidies in the food sector."

-The establishment of reserve requirements for mortgage loans that would lower mortgage interest rates.

## Mississippi Gov. Finch sees first hand woes encountered by truckers

Mississippi Gov. Cliff Finch drove an unmarked 18-wheeler into the Rip Griffin Truck Stop here about 6:30 p.m., Tuesday but by the time he headed west an hour and 15 minutes later practically everyone around the terminal had either met him or knew

While his van was being refueled the governor managed to avail himself of the shower facilities offered by the Griffin complex manager, Ken venture into th shop where he tried to shake every-

Finch, together with his press secretary and his security people, is working his way west toward Los Angeles where he will receive reporters and newscasters in an interview. The ride west will be continuous. He turns the wheel over periodically to his relief driver, Clarence Harrison of Pearl, Miss., in order to catch 40 winks in the truck's

Gov. Finch hastily qualified for a commercial driving license in his home state after some one suggested he make the trip in order attention on the independent truckers' strike which is gaining momentum around the country.

"No one knew I could drive it,"

on the conversation, according to Burns. It wasn't long before a convoy of 20 to 25 trucks had joined him. "The majority of the truckers gave position reinforcement to the governor over the CB," Burns added. Burns predicted that Finch and his relief driver would take four-hour

driving shifts all the way to Los The governor's plane will be waiting for him in Los Angeles for the return flight to Mississippi. Harrison will go back to the mundane job of carrying cargo on the trip east. He plans to pick up a load of California-grown produce

and drive it to Jackson. Carl Smith, manager of the Griffin truck stop, said this morning that the local facility had experienced no problems during the truckers' strike but that the firm's business was off an estimated 30 to 40 per cent, an impact similarly felt by Griffin terminals in Lubbock and Limon, Colo.

The local terminal has been free of protest and service disruption, a fact that Smith attributed to the remoteness of the area from the metropolitan centers.

The local terminal has also managed to keep an ample supply of diesel fuel but, on occasions, has run short of some types of gasoline, according to Smith. Most of the trucks putting in here operate on diesel.



## Safety of concrete in Comanche Peak nuclear plant verified

The Nuclear Regulatory Commission, after an inof improper concrete testing at the Comanche Peak nuclear plant, has verified the safety of the concrete involved in the allegations.

'The NBC has conducted an exhaustive investigation of these allegations. Its final report graphically illustrates the extensiveness of the safety precautions used in construction of Comanche Peak," Texas Electric Service Company President Bill Marquardt said in announcing the NRC's findings today.

these "Although have no merit with respect to the safety of the plant, we welcome the extensiveness of the NRC investigation. Its report stands as reconfirmation of our total commitment to the building and operating of Comanche Peak as a safe and reliable power plant," Marquardt

In its investigation, the NRC found no items of noncompliance and concluded the concrete meets design requirements.

There is no substantive evidence that the overall quality and structural integrity of the safety-related paired," the NRC said in a report of its investigation. The allegations were raised in a copyrighted story

## Assassination attempt on Iranian shah denied

MEXICO CITY, Mexico Police and top security officals today denied reports from Tehran that an assassination attempt was made against Iran's exiled Shah Mohammed Reza Pahlavi at the Cuernavaca home where he and his family are living.

The head of Tehran's revolutionary court claimed that Iranian guerrillas attacked and slightly injured the shah, but "the jackal ran away this time."

"It is totally false. The reports circulating are just not true," said Capt. Miguel Mengochea Lopez, director of the judiciary police in Cuernavaca, 50 miles south of the Mexican capital.

Robert F. Armao, the shah's chief of staff, said in a telephone interview in New York that reports of an attack were "absolutely Armao made his comments before departing for Cuernavaca.







## Antibiotic helps her acne

Paul E. Ruble, M.D.

Dear Dr. Ruble: I have been taking tetracycline daily to clear up my acne. I am 19 years old, and for the first time in four years I have a clear complexion. How has it helped? I am told that the medicine is safe, but I have heard scare stories. The one that worries me is teeth discoloration. Is there a chance that my teeth will become less white as a result of taking is medicine? Also, what will happ if I stop taking it? Will my skin go back the way it was? - J.A.

Tetracycline is a "broad spectrum" antibiotic, an antibiotic being a medicine that fights off bacteria. A broad-spectrum-type is effective against many kinds of bacteria at once. Thus it helps to control deep acne the kind that includes infected cysts. While it controls these infected cysts, it has little effect on other existing ones. For this reason the medicine has more of a "holding action" against acne during its most active stage. It is not a permanent cure and you may have to use it off and on as your doctor advises. Watch for signs of vaginal inflammation, although doses used for acne are seldom strong enough to cause it.

Now, as to the scare stories. They are partly true, but at your age I doubt the need for concern about your teeth Tetracycline may cause permanent discoloration if used during tooth development. That includes to a baby if used in the last half of pregnancy. also from infancy up to eight years old. It may cause a yellow-brown-gray tinge. The drug can find its way into the mild of nursing mothers, so it

should not be used by them Dear Dr. Ruble: I read that hair dyes cause cancer. What about the hair color rinses? — B.B.

I wonder how many folks worry themselves into real problems after reading casual reports about this or that product or this chemical or that? Be assured that hair dyes do not

cause cancer. Women (and men) have used hundreds of hair coloring products. So far as I know they run no more risk of getting cancer than do those who don't.

You may have heard or read somewhere that this or that study is underway involving this or that thousands or chemicals in use today in coloring product. There are literally untold numbers of products. government agency responsible (Food and Drug Administration) is simply doing its job of screening them for safety and effectiveness.

As you read this, hundreds of products (probably some hair product among them) are being analyzed for safeness. If one is found harmful, you will hear about it, most likely in the pages of this newpaper. Likewise, thousands of chemicals are used daily in medicines to treat serious diseases. saving millions of lives every year. But even these are subject to continuing review and testing by the agencies responsible. Few governments protect their public as assiduously as does our own.

Dear Dr. Ruble: I am a 29-yearold unwed mother with a 110-pound, seven-year-old daughter. I work all shifts, so have little time with her. She spends a lot of time with her two grandmothers, who spoil her and feed her a lot. I was wondering if there was a summer camp for plump children.

She needs strong supervision. — C.W. Unless she is very tall she seems grossly overweight and you have a medical problem on your hands. I suggest you have the child seen by a pediatrician who has a special interest in overweight problems. Any local pediatrician should be able to start you off in the right direction in seeking one. This much excess weight in one so young usually means more than an overeating problem. There are special camps for such

Dear Dr. Ruble: Will you please say something about the mother has found a farmer who sells it and some of the health faddists around here are recommending that people drink it. — Mrs. W.M.

If you are a Christian, God the Holy Spirit dwells within you, and this is an added reason why you should take care of your body. One of the most important Bible passages on this is 1 Corinthians 6:19-20: "Do you not know that your body is a temple of the Holy Spirit, who is in you, whom you have received from God? You are not your own; you were bought at a price. Therefore honor God with your body"

This principle of honoring God with our bodies has wide application. In the chapter from which these verses were taken, Paul is warning against any type of sexual immorality which would defile the body. The Bible also tells us to take care of our bodies. In

Jesus' day exercise was probably not a problem, since people walked everywhere and most worked outdoors in the fields. But today a Christian will want to get proper exercise. The same is true with diet. The Old Testament law included numerous dietary laws, and scientific research has shown that one reason for these laws was that they promoted good health.

It is perfectly proper and good, therefore, for us to pay attention to such matters as diet. This does not mean that we will necessarily follow the exact path of your friends, but she has raised an important issue. At the same time, it is easy to become so absorbed in something like health foods (or many other things as well) that they preoccupy our minds too much. Jesus said, "Therefore I tell you, do not worry about your life, what you will eat or drink; or about your body, what you will wear, is not your body, what you will wear. Is not life more important than food, and the more important than clothes?...But seek first his kingdom and his righteousness and all these things will be given to you as well" (Matthew 6:25, 33, NIV)

## **Production cut**

WASHINGTON - Six months ago, Saudi Arabia began pumping oil fullblast to accommodate the United States during the shutdown of the Iranian oil fields. But today, the disenchanted Saudis are cutting back production sharply. "Why should it be Saudi Arabia's responsibility to meet the shortage?" Foreign Minister Saud al-Faisal has demanded.

It's an unsettling question, which poses a direct threat to the oil security of the United States. First, the downfall of the shah jeopardized the flow of oil from Iran. Now the cavalier attitude of the Saudi sheiks raises ominous new supply uncertainties.

THE SAUDIS HAD always been staunchly pro-American. Then what caused this change of heart? Why are they suddenly unwilling to do the United States any favors?

The answer can be found in White House papers which have been concealed from the American people. Last November, for example Secretary James Schlesinger warned President Carter of the grim consequences of an Iranian collapse. The curtailment of oil shipments from Iran, he said, could be more serious to the United States than the Middle East oil embargo of 1973-74.

But the Saudis came to the rescue with a dramatic upsurge in oil production. The Jan. 15, 1979, Cabinet minutes, carefully marked for the "eyes only" of top officials, recorded: "Secretary Schlesinger reported that unrest in Iran has resulted in a cut-off of the five million barrels per day production of Iranian oil fields.

"The Saudis and others have increased production of their fields temporarily be over three million barrels per day to replace approximately half of the Iranian supply loss. The net effect is a drawdown of approximately two million barrels per day from world stockpiles. If supplies from Iran are resumed within a reasonable time period, there will be no supply problems next winter...

The Iranians have returned to their oil pumps. But a hostile Ayatollah Ruhollah Khomeini has shown no disposition to bail out the United States, "We don't need America," he has declared. "It is they who need us. They want our oil.

Intelligence reports tell of turmoil,

meanwhile, in the Iranian oil fields. The ayatollah's troops put down an insurrection last month of Iranian Arabs. Their leaders, still unrepentant, are threatening strikes. So at best, the outflow of oil from Iran is

NOW THE SAUDIS, who supply most of our overseas oil, have turned sour on America. To alienate the friendly Saudis was difficult, but Jimmy Carter managed to do it. He shook their faith in him by failing to protect the shah from the Khomeini revolution. After declaring his unqualified surest of the abah, Carter abruptly abandoned him.

The besieged shall had pleaded with the Carter administration for advice

and support. But Carter had sent back word that the revolution was the shah's problem. "This is something in the hands of the people of Iran," said the president, with an air of detachment.

The Saudi rulers wondered whether they would receive the same indifferent treatment if their own regime were endangered. They put Carter to the test by calling on him to protect the tremendous U.S. stake in the Persian Culf oil fields. He responded by ordering the aircraft carrier Constellation to rush, fullsteam, from the Philippines to the Persian Gulf. But then he canceled the order, and the carrier dropped anchor off Singapore.

The Soviets tightened the pressure on Saudi Arabia, meanwhile, by airlifting 500 Cuban mercenaries into the Arabian toe and sending them into action against Saudi-subsidized North Yemen. In response to another appeal, Carter dispatched a dozen F-15 fighter planes to Saudi Arabia. But they arrived unarmed.

Disillusioned and desperate, the Saudis turned to their Arab neighbors, Syria and Iraq, which have close ties to Moscow. The Iraqis quickly persuaded the Soviets to call off the assault on North Yemen. Iraq has also rushed a division of troops to the troubled Iranian border. So instead of the American military muscle that the Saudis had sought, the Iraqis are staging a show of force at the head of the Persian Gulf.







known, is just part of a planned 52.9-mile system, scheduled for completion in 1989, that will link Hartsfield International Airport and other outlying areas with the downtown business district.

"It's a modest beginning but it's a start," says Alan F. Kiepper, who has piloted the project through political squalls for seven years since long before the current gas crisis turned Americans' thinking to mass transit.

Rail commuter systems drew little interest for decades as auto travel grew, but both San Francisco and Washington have opened downtown rail lines in the past decade, and such lines are being developed in Buffalo, N.Y., Miami, and Baltimore

In Atlanta, citizens were openly skeptical when the Metropolitan Atlanta Rapid Transit Authority announced plans in the early '70s for a high-speed rail system deep beneath the heart of the capital city.

Construction delays and skyrocketing heightened that skepticism. MARTA officials originally said the entire system could be completed by 1980 at a cost of \$1.3 billion. It is now scheduled to be completed in 1989 at an estimated cost of \$3.2 billion.

But the streamlined silver and black MARTA test trains zipping along at speeds up to 70 miles per hour along the graceful elevated arch of the East line have quieted many of the

skeptics. And Kiepper, MARTA's general manager, has taken steps to assure that Saturday's opening will be in-cident free. Scheduled for last Christmas, the opening was delayed for six months to work bugs out of the rail cars that arrived from France behind schedule.

And to steer clear of problems encountered by San Francisco's BART system, MARTA abandoned plans for a fullyautomated line, choosing instead a semi-automated one, controlled in part by operators.





## Coinola contraption has added instruments

looks like something out of a Rube Goldberg cartoon. But when Louis Kubala hooks up his contraption to a vacuum cleaner and drops in a quarter, the rattle, clang and plink are music to his ears.

Kubala's contraption is a coinola — a player piano with some added in-

As the roll unwinds, the hammer strikes the strings, the drum keeps the beat, and the tambourine, triangle and cow bell accent the rhythms of the wood block to such old favorites as "Romano," ' "At Sundown," "Me and My Shadow," and "Makin" Whoopee.

But Kubala, a 68-year-old machinist from this Central Texas community, says he is not a musician, he "just bangs around on the piano by ear. I don't read music, but I do a little piano tuning.

His interest in the mechanical bands began several years ago when he repaired a player piano at a steakhouse in Little River.

He didn't know anything about repairing player but he used his

TAYLOR, Texas (AP) - It mechanical experience and intuition to rebuild and construct parts needed to operate the instrument


"It's not real hard work." said Kubala. "You just have to keep after it. You might say the guy with the mostest,

The old player pianos are operated by air forced into machine through foot pumps, he said. As the music roll passes over the tracker bar, the air passage is opened and the bellows close, causing the hammer to strike the strings.

Kubala uses a vacuum cleaner motor to supply the air force. The instrument has over 435 feet of neoprene tubing running from the tracker bar to the 88 bellows.

The lower octave and a half are used to operate the added instruments.

"The parts alone usually cost about \$1,200," he said "It will cost you about \$4,000 to convert a player piano. Right now. I'm building my second coinola which will probably sell for around

## **OPEC** agrees on \$3-a-barrel hike

GENEVA. Switzerland break in the pricing unity (AP) — The 13 members of Organization Petroleum Exporting Countries apparently are ready to agree on a new base price of \$20 a barrel for crude oil, \$3 above their present average price, sources in the cartel said.

The sources said the agreement to be announced today at the end of a two-day OPEC pricing meeting also calls for an end to the leapfrogging surcharges of the past three months and another meeting in September, three months ahead of schedule, to take a new look at the price situation.

The price of \$20 for a 42gallon barrel of crude would add as much as 5 cents a gallon to U.S. gasoline and heating oil prices, analysts said

The \$20 price would be a compromise between Saudi Arabia, which pressed for \$18 a barrel, and such militants as Libya, Iran and Iraq, which argued for \$23 to \$27 a barrel.

The official base price of OPEC oil has been \$14.55 a barrel since March 1. But the average price has risen to \$17 a barrel because of surcharges added on by all members of the cartel except Saudi Arabia because of the shortage of supply due to the reduction in Iranian production

The surcharges threw world oil markets into tur-They also worried OPEC members because they indicated a

that has generally kept their foreign customers from playing off the members of the cartel against each

Cyrus Ebramzadeh of the Iranian delegation said his government was willing to compromise on \$20, and he and Libyan Oil Minister Ezzedin Ali Mabruk said Saudi Arabia was willing to accept that price for the sake of unity in the cartel. "The Saudis would come

up a little bit and the radicals would come down a little bit," said Ebramzadeh. "Somewhere in the middle here would be a price without surcharges.

If the compromise breaks down, OPEC might be left with a two-tier pricing system, with Saudi Arabia, the biggest producer, again charging several dollars less than other members.

The oil ministers during the first day of their meeting Tuesday approved in principle the addition of \$800 million to the OPEC fund for the aid of underdeveloped countries, the chief sufferers from the cartel's price increases. The proposal now goes to their finance

The addition would raise the fund's balance to more than \$1 billion. It is used to soften the impact of OPEC's

## SALTII backers dwindling

WASHINGTON (AP) - A growing number of senators are proposing substantive changes in the SALT II pact with the Soviet Union, any one of which might serve to kill the treaty if adopted.

Senate Republican Leader Howard H. Baker of Tennessee reportedly was set to announce his conditional opposition to the treaty at a news conference today.

The Washington Post in today's editions quoted informed sources as saying Baker will announce he is opposed to the pact in its present form and will spell out some specific recommendatins for changes in it. Baker could be a key

figure in the Senate's eventual ratification or rejection of SALT II.

Sen. Frank Church, Dtold reporters Tuesday he believes the Soviet Union must be made to understand that the Senate is likely to adopt some amendments, reservations or understandings.

Church hinted that ways are being sought to change the treaty just enough to improve chances for ratification but not enough to cause the Soviets to reject the amended treaty out of

He said he believes it would be a "grave mistake" for the Senate to doom the treaty by adding a "killer amendment" unacceptable to the Soviets.

"It would be preferable for the Senate to kill it outright rather than face a renegotiation which Soviet leaders have said would be unacceptable to them, Church said.





WIMBLEDON, England (AP) — Last year, Jana Navratilova had to travel from Prague to the Czech-German border to watch on German television as daughter Martina won the men's singles title at

This year, after getting surprise permission to leave communist Czechoslovakia for a visit to England, Mrs. Navratilova was at Wimbledon's center court Tuesday, proudly watching Martina defend her title in the world's premier tennis tournament.

"Four years ago, I thought we would never see each other again. It was like going off to the wars," said the 22year-old Navratilova, who defected to the United States in February, 1975 and now lives in Dallas.

"Winning Wimbledon last year was the greatest moment of my career. But this is one of the greatest

moments of my life," she told a swarm of reporters and photographers who followed her and her mother wherever they went at

The champion disposed of a 20-year-old South African challenger, Tanya Harford, 4-6, 6-2, 6-1 Tuesday. But her opening match in defense of the title was overshadowed by the reunion with her mother, here on a two-week visitor's visa.

"She's changed such a lot," said Mrs. Navratilova, 47, fighting back tears of joy. 'She's much prettier now. Spreading her arms out wide, she added: "Before she was so fat, but now she's beautiful and it's lovely to see her. I feel marvelous

Permission for Mrs. Navratilova's visa came on Friday, with the help of Czech Premier Lubomir Strougal, a tennis fan, and the All-England Club, Wimbledon's ruling body.

lute rules governing who is most likely to join a cult, a New York psychiatrist specializing in cult-involved teens says that certain young people are more vulnerable to cult leaders than

others. Students who are unsure of their future plans and who long for a sense of belonging are especially open to the suggestion of cult life, according to Dr. Alex Deutsch of the Cabrini Mental Health Clinic, in an article in CO-ED magazine.

A "yes" answer to several of the following questions also indicates a high vulnerability

- Is the teen unsure of his or her decision-making abil-

 Is the teen facing a major decision in life, such as choosing a college or career, or leaving home for the first time?

- Has he or she recently experienced a trauma, such as the death of a family member or friend, or the end of a relationship?

 Is the teen trying to find himself or herself? - Does he or she find it difficult to face the world as

it is, wishing instead for simple answers or a "better

Many cults play off this vulnerability by isolating new members on "utopialike" farms in the countryside, where it is impossible to maintain a perspective on the outside world. When they do go to a larger, morepopulated town it is usually to sell literature or flowers on a grueling dawn-to-dusk basis, which further weakens their resistance. In addition, many cult diets are low in protein, contributing to members physical

Teens should speak to a number of adults before joining a cult ... the opinions of a respected adult friend, teacher or clergyman might make more impact than that

The most important thing to consider, is whether or not the cult experience will allow the teen to mature and choose his or her own beliefs or whether it merely provides structure and belonging at the expense of becom ing an independent person and facing life as a mature





You could be if you don't compare savings accounts five important ways, advises Nancy Granovsky, a family resource management specialist. Savings accounts are not all "pretty much alike," she adds. Mrs. Granovsky is with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System. In fact, studies show a 171 percent difference between the highest and lowest paying accounts.

To find a savings account that pays the highest interest, compare them on at least three different pointsrate of interest, method used to compute interest, compound frequency, Mrs. Granovsky says.

There are five ways of computing interest — DIDO, LIFO, FIFO and LOW BALANCE.

DIDO - stands for "Day of Deposit to Day of Withdrawal." With this method, money earns interest from the day it is deposited until the day it is withdrawn.

LIFO - stands for "Last In, First Out." When money is withdrawn, the amount withdrawn stops earning interest all the way back to the date the last deposit was made in that particular accounting period

FIFO - stands for "First In, First Out." There are two interest the account will earn FIFO methods. Sandinista guerrillas were reported advancing northward from the Costa Rican border, attacking towns south of Managua and locked in 'ferocious fighting' in the capital in their war to oust President Anastasio Somoza.

Sources linked to the rebels claimed Tuesday they had broken through national guard lines that had blocked their advance northward from the Costa Rican frontier.

The sources said the guerrillas were striking toward La Virgen, six miles south of Rivas where they hoped to set up their provisional government. Rivas is 16 miles north of the border, and La Virgen is the site of a national guard compound and infantry training school.

But a spokesman for the

guard, Somoza's army and police force, said reports of the Sandinista advance in the south were "totally He said Somoza's "made a slight tacpullback to avoid charges that the national guard was threatening the Costa Rican border." claimed the guard was holding the Sandinistas approximately four miles north of the border and was inflicting heavy casualties with mortars, artillery and

air attacks. Informed sources said the rebels attacked several small towns between the Sandinistaheld cities of Diriamba, 28 miles south of Managua, and Masaya, 20 miles southeast of Managua. They speculated that the Sandinistas were trying to establish a front south of Managua stretching across

MANAGUA, Nicaragua the isthmus between Lake Nicaragua and the Pacific and cutting off the guardsmen battling on the southern front

> But the guard spokesman said the attacks south of Managua were "only diversionary attacks and

have no real significance. He claimed that all Sandinista positions in eastern Managua, where the rebels have held half a dozen slum barrios for more than two weeks, "will be cleaned out within 72 hours."

The guard claimed early Tuesday that it had driven the rebels from the Belo Horizonte slum, but late Tuesday refugees streaming from the area said the rebels were still entrenched and confident they could defend their positions

Members of Congress belonging to Somoza's Liberal Party met late Tuesday in the Intercontinental Hotel amid speculation they were discussing a successor should Somoza heed the calls for his resignation from the Organization of American States and the United States.

Somoza, his Cabinet and top legislative leaders met Tuesday morning and called a special legislative session for Thursday afternoon. But Somoza's private secretary denied categorically that the president would resign or that the session was being called to discuss a successor

Somoza's term ends in 1981 and he has vowed not to step down until then. His family has run Nicaragua since invading U.S. Marines helped put his father in
