# Congressman admits misuse of funds

Charles Diggs admitted today that he violated a House rule, agreed to repay some \$40,000 he improperly collected from the House of Representatives and to accept censure from House

The House ethics committee agreed to accept his statement by a vote of 11-The action ended the committee's investigation of the Michigan

Diggs told the House committee that he violated a House rule when he increased the salary of one of his employees and then accepted money from the employee to help him pay his

He also admitted that he benefitted from pay increases given other employees, but he said he did not willfully violate the House rule by

Diggs, a 12-term House veteran, apologized to the committee for his actions, agreed to repay \$40,031.66 to the U.S. Treasury by use of a promissory note and said he would accept censure by the full House. He also agreed to have all of his

current employees certify in writing that none of them is funneling funds to him from salary checks issued by the Treasury.

In return, the committee agreed to withdraw the 18 allegations it had earlier filed against Diggs.

Diggs would be the first congressman censured by the House in more than 50 years.

The ethics committee last year recommended censure of Rep. Edward R. Roybal, D-Calif., as a result of its investigation of alleged influence buying by the South Korean government, but the full House rejected that motion and instead agreed to reprimand Roybal.

Diggs told reporters after the brief session that he made the arrangement to prevent a prolonged and embarrassing proceeding for the House and for his family.

"I have volunteered to repay to the House approximately \$40,000 ... in order to finally put to rest any doubts about my past use of clerk hire allowance," he said.

Diggs said the arrangement will support his appeal of a federal conviction of the payroll misuse. He said this is so because he admitted he misused the payroll for personal expenses but the committee dropped all charges of misusing it for congressional expenses

He said that continuing the proceeding would "prolong the uncertainty under which my family, my staff and I have lived for the past several months.

There was no immediate word on when the censure motion would be brought to the House floor for a vote Censure is the strongest punishment

the House can mete out short of expulsion. It normally requires the member to stand in front of the full House while the speaker of the house reads the censure pronouncement.

The ethics committee had formally opened — and then indefinitely postponed — public hearings on aplegations against Diggs only four days ago without hearing any

Although the 18 allegations filed against Diggs by the committee basically paralleled the counts on which he was convicted in federal court, the House investigation is completely separate from the earlier court action

Diggs is appealing his federal conviction on charges of mail fraud and of making false statements. He

but subsequently was re-elected to Congress and remains a member while his appeal is being heard.

However, he holds no positions of power. He voluntarily relinquished his chairmanship of the District of Columbia Committee last year after his conviction and gave up the chairmanship of the International Relations subcommittee on Africa earlier this year.

The basic charges against Diggs are that he misused his payroll by inflating the salaries of certain employees and by then collecting funds from the employees to help him pay his personal debts.

Diggs has said some of his employees did voluntarily help him pay his debts but contends he broke no laws and that his constituents "had full knowledge of these problems" when they re-elected him to Congress

'The man she was with is not the father of the baby," stated Hooser. Miss Wierson's court-appointed attorney, Jack Thompson, confirmed

Hooser's statement "She denied all the way through that he was the father," he said. He added that the girl "looked 18."

Thompson had recommended to County Judge Bill Tune that the girl undergo a psychiatric evaluation. "Everytning she said was con-

tradictory," he said According to Hooser, it was the

Department of Human Resources that discovered the reason for the girl's contradictory statements. The Department had been at tempting to contact the couple's

relatives ever since their arrests DHR found out from a relative of the girl that she was a minor. Molly Whittington, director of the Department of Human Resources in the Midland-Big Spring

area, said that Miss Wierson's age

was discovered through a routine investigation of the DHR. "We checked with some relatives and an agency whose names she had given us." Ms. Whittington said.

She said that technically, she did not believe the girl was a runaway, but she was under a court order in Wisconsin and was not where she was

supposed to be. Arrangements for the return of Miss Wierson and Amber to Miss Wierson's mother and Wisconsin juvenile authorities were made by Rose Hodnett, a local caseworker.

The baby's father, according to Hooser, was revealed by Miss Wierson to have been a man who is now serving a penitentiary sentence. She did not know what he had been charged with. She did reveal that the baby was conceived in a cornpatch, said Hooser.

Gibson remains in the county jail and, according to Hooser, will stand

# Steering Committee backs school for deaf 100 percent

The Big Spring Steering Committee voted unanimously in a meeting Thursday to recommend to the city council that acreage in the Big Spring Industrial Park be deeded to Howard College for a school for the deaf in event this community is approved as a site for the school.

Dr. Charles Hays, president of Howard College, met with the steering committee to discuss his conference earlier in the week with the Texas Education Agency in Austin. Funds for a feasibility study of the school for the deaf have been approved by the

The proposed school is now be identified as the Texas Technical Institute for the Deaf. It would ultimately be named by the COLLEGE BOARD. It would become a part of Howard College with a campus that could embrace 80 or more acres in the Industrial Park, bounded by the old Webb AFB Officers Club south to and including Bogart's and east all the way to the property line bordering on the Big Spring State Park. Among other buildings, it would take in what formerly was the Webb hospital.

The federal government, which some time ago appropriated money for an educational program for the blind, would be petitioned to provide funding for school dormitories, Dr. Hays stated.

Hays said he anticipated an enrollment of anywhere from 1,200 to 1,500 in the first class, which could start as early as 1981-82.

The city council will consider the ecommendation made by the steerg committee at its next meeting.

Hays told members of the com-mittee that such a school could add as much as \$8 million annually to the Big Spring-area economy. Hays also reminded the group that 90 per cent of the money appropriated for the Howard College budget here is spent



'It shall be unlawful for any person to keep any dog in the limits of the City of Coahoma which has not been vaccinated against rabies or which does not have the provided tag fastened around the neck of such dog at all times.

"Any person permitting a dog to run at large in the City of Coahoma, or any person violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof shall be fined in any sum not to exceed \$100, and each and every day of such violation shall be deemed a separate offense.

Persons who wish to file complaints on citizens who let their dogs run loose, may do so, said the mayor. The complaints will be acted upon and a fine of up to \$100 will be ordered if the dog owner is found guilty.



### Unlucky 13 estimated to die on Texas roads during holiday

AUSTIN — The director of the Texas Department of Public Safety today estimated that traffic accidents during the 30-hour July 4th holiday will claim 13 lives in Texas.

Col. Wilson E. Speir said the holiday will officially extend from 6 p.m. Tuesday, July 3, to midnight Wednesday, July 4. All available DPS Troopers will be on duty to enforce traffic laws and assist travelers on the state's highways.

Speir said due to the fact that July 4th falls in mid-week, and because traffic deaths in rural areas are down from 1978 leyels, the holiday may be less deadly than those in recent years.

"Another factor in our estimate \is gasoline availability in the Dallas-Ft.



It's past, the United States finds itself with pathetically little influence over dictatorial allies who are considered bulwarks of anti-communism. Like parents of a spoiled brat who threatens to hold his breath till he gets his way, the United States must eventually cave in to prevent our client dictators from giving way to communist takeovers.

> TO PUT AS good a face on the situation as possible, the United States generally turns a blind eye to the more unsavory features of the authoritarian governments it supports. In the case of Gen. Park, this

In past columns, we have told how the South Korean government has attempted political assassinations, committed burglaries, kidnapped and terrorized opponents throughout the world and tried to buy U.S. legislators and government officials. These criminal and reckless activities. carried out in the sacred name of anticommunism, reflect a regime that is as repressive as many in the communist world.

The legal basis of Park's autocratic power is the constitution approved in national referendum in 1972. Ostensibly passed to present a facade of national unity for reunification talks with North Korea, the constitution concentrates enormous power in the president. The reunification negotiations have not gotten off, but the authoritarian constitution remains.

South Korea is basically an appointed government," a State Department told our associate Frank Washington.

That's understating the situation. The 1972 constitution gives President Park the authority to appoint onethird of the 231 members of the National Assembly, as well as all the officers and administrators of South Korea's nine provinces. In case the non-appointed legislators decide to probe the actions of Park's personally appointed executives, the constitution has a protective loophole: Government officials are immune from testifying before the National

NOT CONTENT with the powers given him under the constitution, Gen. Park reinforces his one-man rule with a raft of "emergency decrees" that protect him from any challenge to his authority. The most repressive of these is Emergency Measure No. 9.

The infamous No. 9 makes it a crime to criticize either the con-stitution or the emergency decree or the government, outlaws media reports of such criticism and bans unsanctioned student political ac-

dissent and reinforce security precautions." These measures included organizing students into quasimilitary units, censoring all entertainment media and forming a national defense corps composed of males between 17 and 50.





### How emphysema patient can clear lungs

Paul E. Ruble, M.D.

Dear Dr. Ruble: How does an

elderly patient with lung problems like emphysema, which you may or may not have.

A common cause of the difficulty is insufficient fluid intake. A healthy person needs about eight glasses of liquid a day, so take stock of that. Avoid lung irritants, such as smoking. Lungs remove a certain amount of fluid from the body by themselves each day (several ounces). Any disruption can make them less efficient in doing this job.

How can you force removal of lung secretions? The answer is in 'postural drainage." Prop a hip on several pillows and lie on that side for a few minutes. Alternate with the opposite hip. If you can manage, perhaps a better way is to lie over your bed with your upper body leaning toward the floor. It requires some agility, so go about it carefully

If you have a therapist, a family member can be taught another effective method - percussion. This involves a rhythmical tapping on your chest with open hands to help loosen mucus in the broncial tube. Some people can do it themselves, but it requires practice. Percussing is done on each side of the chest (under the arm area) while the patient is lying face down. Some doctors recommend steam inhalation.

Dear Dr. Ruble: My son is a diabetic. He is on insulin (70 ccs a day). He was told he can drink whisky or gin - up to nine shots a day, or more, so long as he dilutes with water, pop, tomato juice, or orange juice. Do you think this is correct? - G.E.R.

I don't think his doctor is telling him this. I certainly wouldn't. The fact that he is on this much insulin tells me he should be doing his level best to restrict carbohydrate intake (from any source). Diet, even for one on insulin, is the most important thing in controlling diabetes. Alcohol is a carbohydrate which is converted to sugar. This excess should be avoided it's diluted

> Dear Dr. Ruble: I just had an audiology test that showed I get plenty of volume, but the sounds or words are 'garbled." The specialist gave me little hope that this can be corrected. even by a hearing aid. Your comments will be appreciated. — J.W.M.

Such tests answer more questions than the mere loss of hearing. You should be able to find out if your hearing is better or worse in one ear than in the other or the specific type of loss you have. Loss for high-pitched tones usually indicates nerve deafness, which is difficult to improve even with hearing aids. Loss for lowpitched tones usually indicates 'conduction' loss — interference with the middle ear mechanism. That type is more easily helped with the aids More intricate testing may be needed to pinpoint the exact cause of your loss. The specialist will be more specific as to your test results if you

Dear Dr. Ruble: Please tell me about hypertension. Some doctors claim salt causes it. Others say excess weight. Others say nerves. Who's right? - Ms. I.B.

They are all partly correct, but the actual sequence of events that leads to

a combination of things. Those factors you mention in your question aggravate it. Obesity may be the chief factor for some, tension for others, hardening of the arteries for still others. I think the material you ask for will make the picture a bit clearer for you.

FOR MRS. A.B. - Based on the very nice photograph (full length) you sent me of your son, I see no need in the world for him to lose weight. Nor do the statistics (5-10, and 170 pounds) indicate any serious overweight



### Four more counties added to gas plan

AUSTIN, Texau (AP) - Gov. Bill Clements' odd-even gasoline rationing plan will cover four more counties -Galveston, Denton, Fort Bend and Waller - starting

The governor announced at his weekly news conference Thursday he had added the counties to eight already under odd-even rationing

Since Monday is an even numbered day — July 2 — only cars whose license plates end with an even number will be able to buy gasoline on the first day of gas sales restrictions in the four new counties.

Clements said authorities in the eight counties already under the rationing plan tell him they "are satisfied with it and are convinced the lines are shorter and the system is indeed working. He said "misbehavior is at a minimum" in the gasoline

lines. "I am not familiar with any incidents in that regard." He mentioned with approval a new Dallas ordinance providing up to a \$200 fine for line-jumping Clements said "first of the month allocations will ease"

somewhat the present tight gasoline supply. Bill Lauderback, administrative assistant to energy adviser Ed Vetter, said the governor's office would watch the gas situation for two more weekends before deciding the gas situation for two more weekends before deciding about Sunday sales. He said the odd-even rationing system might leave stations enough gasoline to voluntarily open on Sundays.

Clements said he "can't understand" why the U.S. Department of Energy allows new service stations to open at a time when existing ones can't get enough gas.


"They've done such a good job of botching up the program that I just assume this is one of their mistakes." he said. ... "If there is anything we don't need in Texas at this time, it is more filling stations. We need them like a hole in the head.
