### Rain forecast for Texas coastal area

### Unlucky 13 estimated to die on Texas roads during holiday

AUSTIN — The director of the Texas Department of Public Safety today estimated that traffic accidents during the 30-hour July 4th holiday will claim 13 lives in Texas.

Col. Wilson E. Speir said the holiday will officially extend from 6 p.m. Tuesday, July 3, to midnight Wednesday, July 4. All available DPS Troopers will be on duty to enforce traffic laws and assist travelers on the state's highways.

Speir said due to the fact that July 4th falls in midweek, and because traffic deaths in rural areas are down from 1978 levels, the holiday may be less deadly than those in recent years. "Another factor in our estimate is gasoline availability in the Dallas-Ft. Worth-Houston metropolitan areas," the DPS director added. He said a recent survey indicates that rural highway speeds are down slightly in areas where the worst gasoline supply problems have occurred. The survey also pointed out that highway traffic is lighter at night and on weekends in several areas of the state.

Last year during the 102 hour July 4th holiday period, the DPS ended its preliminary death count with 49 traffic fatalities reported. Late deaths due to injuries received during the period raised the final count to 60.

"Excessive speed and alcohol are traditionally the prevalent violations leading to summer holiday traffic accidents. We will, therefore, be placing special emphasis on both speed and drunk driving enforcement," Speir added.

## Water quality improves in Big Spring area

Water quality has improved sharply — even dramatically in some areas — within the past two weeks, according to the Colorado River Municipal Water District.

Much of that is due to small but high-quality inflow into Lakes J.B. Thomas and E.V. Slence, but also substantially due to bringing on more wells.

Odessa was the first to obtain relief with the delivery of heavy volume of water from the Ward County well field at the rate of around 21.5 million gallons a day on weekends and slightly less on weekdays.

Big Spring and Midland, caught in the middle of the quality squeeze, have been receiving water about twice as high in quality as was the case in early June.

The southwest part of Big Spring, which is served off

the reservoir that now is receiving up to 1.5 million gallons a day of water from the O'Barr well field in Glasscock County, has experienced even greater improvement.

The remainder of Big Spring, which for technical reasons cannot receive the O'Barr supply, is getting a mixture of Lake Thomas and Lake Spence water, as are Midland, Stanton and Odessa (other than the well supply).

Lake Spence has seen its chlorides (salt) reduced drastically by the new inflow. Lake Thomas water is practically devoid of salt and is furnishing up to 5 million gallons a day for mixing with Lake Spence water at the Big Spring terminal storage point.

Demand and conservation dictate the amount of water used from Lake Thomas.

Snyder, because of

geographical and physical reasons, gets its water from Lake Thomas.

O.H. Ivie, general manager of CRMWD, said that better than 40 per cent of the average daily consumption of 54 million gallons by municipalities is now in well water or from the fresh inflow into Lake Thomas. The remaining six million gallons a day for industries and oil companies comes from other sources mainly brine wells and diverted non-potable water.

**Libya leader suggests shut off of oil production**

DAMASCUS, Syria (AP) — Libyan leader Col. Moammar Khadafy was quoted as saying in an interview published today he plans to shut off his country's oil exports for at least two years and is urging other Arab oil producers to do the same.

had been ordered. Khadafy was in the Syrian capital last weekend for talks with Syrian President Hafez Assad about strengthening the Arab opposition to the U.S.-sponsored Egyptian-Israeli peace process.

"We shall stop producing oil — except what we need for our own domestic consumption — for two years, perhaps three or four," Khadafy was quoted as saying. "The more we store the oil in our ground, the better it will be for us."

The interview was conducted by the Damascus correspondent of the Paris-based Arabic weekly Al-Mustaqbal last Monday, before the latest meeting of the Organization of Petroleum Exporting Countries.

There was no immediate confirmation today from the Libyan government or other sources that such a shutdown

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**TESCO wants more money**

**CRMWD leaders authorize two water sales contracts**

Directors of the Colorado River Municipal Water District authorized two water sales contracts at their meeting Thursday at the District offices in Big Spring, approved a maintenance project on the Lake Thomas dam, and took under advisement a requested electric rate increase.

Texas Electric Service Company had asked the District for another rate increase of 16.1 per cent, which was on the heels of a 9 and a 22.4 per cent increase during 1978. TESCO has filed similar requests with cities and other customers to generate an average of 16 per cent more revenue.

The water sales contract with Sun Oil Company was replaced with a new one since the original one reaches the end of its 30-year period. The new one calls for a base rate of 47.62 cents per thousand gallons, plus a differential of 12.51 cents, or the City of Big Spring rate plus the 12.51 cent differential, whichever is higher. The contract quantity also was upped from 14,000 barrels per day to 25,000 barrels per day with a two-thirds take or pay factor.

A water sales contract with Pierson-Siebert Oil Company, which has been conducting a pilot study for the past five years in northern Coke County. The contract is virtually the same as the Sun Oil contract but with only a 2,500 barrel a day quantity.

O. H. Ivie, general manager, told the board that a project to restore the Lake Thomas dam to its original grade level will come within the \$25,000 provided in a resolution authorizing the expenditure. Over the 28 years the dam has been in use, it has eroded to a minor degree and settled a couple of feet in the channel area. Grimmet Bros. of Snyder has completed the work to place wetted rolled wetback embankment to the specified levels. The work is required by the U.S. Corps of Engineers.

Approved was a second point of measurement to the City of Big Spring which will enable Howard College to take raw water off the main supply line, which crosses its property, for irrigation purposes.

In other matters before the board, Ivie reported the Texas Water Commission had overruled motions for rehearing on the permit it had granted to the District; that there may have to be an

adjustment in the amount of support for the Employees Pension Trust to meet actuarial specifications; that the water purchase contract with the University of Texas for the Ward County well field is at one of its 10-year incremental steps also retained Frank Booth and Jim Wilson, Austin attorneys who presented the District's application for the Stacy project, to monitor the water adjudication proceedings for the lower basin; that June rains, which produced modest runoff, came just days ahead of a projected cutoff date to some industries.

Ivie also noted that Walter Ross, auditor of the District almost since its inception, was critically ill.

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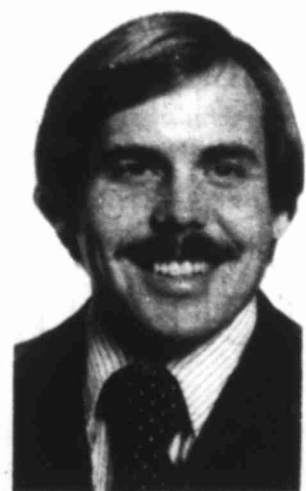
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JOHNNY STANLEY

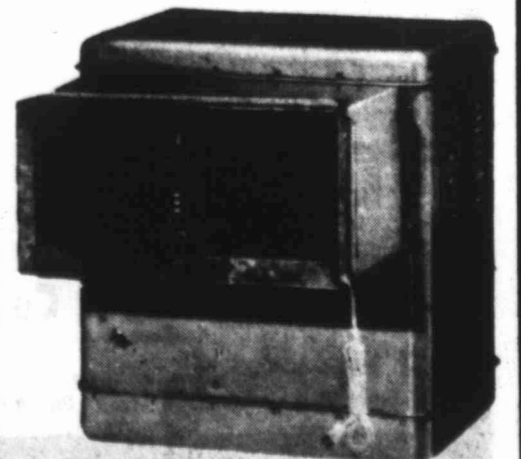

# Fuel crunch spoiling holiday plans

A Rhode Island supplier said sales for traditional clamcakes at the shore were off and a Maine town offered tourists free gasoline, as the spreading fuel crunch clouded travel plans for the weekend and July Fourth holiday.

A spot check by the Associated Press showed that weekend gasoline supplies were tight in 35 states, with the biggest pinch in the heavily populated cities in the East.

Seventy percent of West Virginia's gas stations were expected to be closed Saturday and 95 percent Sunday. In Portland, Ore., 93

percent were expected to be closed Sunday.

The situation has "stabilized at disaster," said the Automobile Club of New York, where gas lines stretched up to 2 1/2 miles this week and prices ranged up to \$1.60 a gallon.

The automobile Association of America said the average gas price across the nation was 94.3 cents a gallon — and OPEC adopted a new pricing system that will add four cents to that in the months ahead.

In Orange, Calif., a dealer who has been having trouble getting adequate allocations said he will begin selling fuel for \$5 a gallon Monday. Tony

Grasso said he's aiming at drivers who hate lines.

In Miami, the gas crunch was blamed for the suicide of 60-year-old James Rogers, who ran a newspaper-delivery service. Rogers' wife said he was "extremely despondent over not being able to get gas to deliver his

newspapers" because of rationing.

With end-of-month shortages, fuel blockades by striking truckers and threats of a shutdown July 1 by service station owners complicating the gas picture, officials took these steps:

—Pennsylvania and Rhode Island officials agreed to release part of their states' emergency "set-aside" supplies of gas for July to stations that stay open over the weekend.

## Four more counties added to gas plan

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — Gov. Bill Clements' odd-even gasoline rationing plan will cover four more counties — Galveston, Denton, Fort Bend and Waller — starting Monday.

The governor announced at his weekly news conference Thursday he had added the counties to eight already under odd-even rationing.

Since Monday is an even numbered day — July 2 — only cars whose license plates end with an even number will be able to buy gasoline on the first day of gas sales restrictions in the four new counties.

Clements said authorities in the eight counties already under the rationing plan tell him they "are satisfied with it and are convinced the lines are shorter and the system is indeed working."

He said "misbehavior is at a minimum" in the gasoline lines. "I am not familiar with any incidents in that regard." He mentioned with approval a new Dallas ordinance providing up to a \$200 fine for line-jumping.

Clements said "first of the month allocations will ease" somewhat the present tight gasoline supply.

Bill Lauderback, administrative assistant to energy adviser Ed Vetter, said the governor's office would watch the gas situation for two more weekends before deciding about Sunday sales. He said the odd-even rationing system might leave stations enough gasoline to voluntarily open on Sundays.

Clements said he "can't understand" why the U.S. Department of Energy allows new service stations to open at a time when existing ones can't get enough gas.

"They've done such a good job of botching up the program that I just assume this is one of their mistakes," he said. "If there is anything we don't need in Texas at this time, it is more filling stations. We need them like a hole in the head."

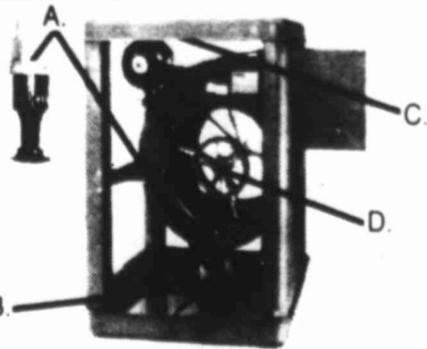
On other subjects, Clements said: —His talk with striking independent truckers on Wednesday left him hopeful they would start transporting farm produce and other goods again soon.

—He believes Attorney General Mark White will uphold his vetoes of several appropriations bill riders directing expenditure of more than \$95 million.

"If I hadn't thought those were valid vetoes, I wouldn't have done it," he said.

Chairman Bill Presnal of the House appropriations Committee contends a governor cannot veto riders and requested the attorney general's opinion.

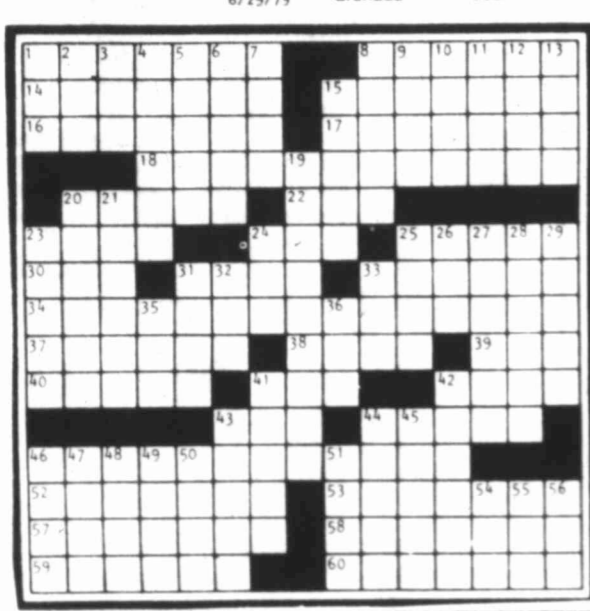

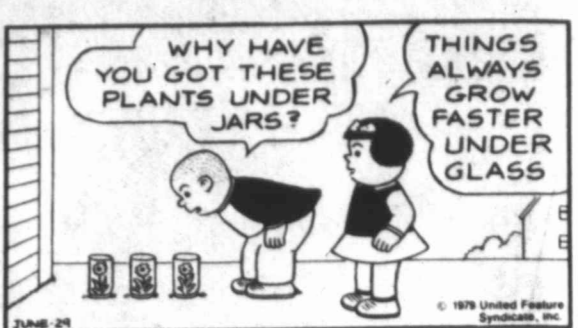

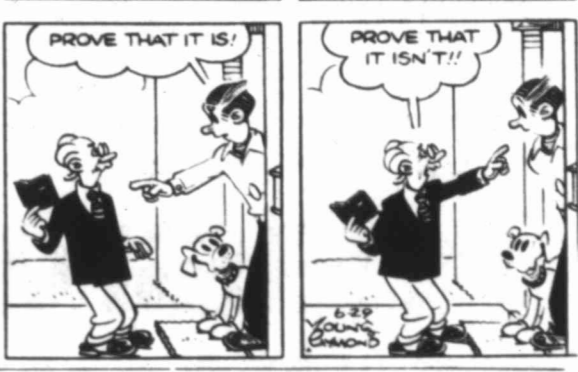

The deed for the sale filed in the county recorder's office Wednesday indicates the home is located on 2.86 acres of land in the foothills behind Santa Barbara. It was purchased from magazine photographer Jesse Alexander.

Among Martin's new neighbors are actors Robert Mitchum, Bradford Dillman and Burl Ives.

**Veteran actor worried**

SPOKANE, Wash. (AP) — Ralph Bellamy has seen a lot in more than 50 years as an actor, and he's a bit worried about what he sees now.

Here this week to promote his book, "When the Smoke Hits the Fan — A Reminiscence of the Theater, Movies and TV," Bellamy said there seems to be a shortage of good actors, writers, directors and producers, and an abundance of promiscuity in today's films.

"You can say what you want about the old moguls," said Bellamy. "They were detestable people as individuals, but they were theater people who had their fingers on what the people wanted."

But Bellamy says he's not really down on the motion picture industry, and thinks some of today's stars will pass the test of time — Jane Fonda for one, who he termed "the best actress we have."

**Godfrey sells estate**

LEESBURG, Va. (AP) — Radio and television personality Arthur Godfrey is getting out of the cattle and horse business.

Godfrey has sold his 1,900 acre estate near here to a Dutch corporation backed by a Saudi Arabian prince, according to court papers. The price was more than \$5 million.

According to the papers, Vanguard Co., a Netherlands Antilles corporation, bought Beacon Hill, the luxurious cattle and horse farm about 30 miles northwest of Washington, D.C. The papers said Prince Talal Bin Abdul Aziz Saud, a member of Saudi Arabia's royal family, personally guaranteed the mortgage on the land.

The estate has been on the market since mid-1977 with an asking price reportedly about \$6 million. Godfrey originally purchased 326 acres of land in 1946, then bought additional parcels to insure privacy for himself and his family.

**Jury indicts**

**Brother Roloff**

CORPUS CHRISTI, Texas (AP) — Evangelist Lester Roloff spent a tearful 65th birthday after being indicted for operating a child care home without a license.

The indictment, returned by a Nueces County grand jury.

He came less than a week after Roloff yielded to state pressure to close the Rebekah Home for Girls.

"What is my crime? Is it a crime to do good?" asked Roloff, who shed tears Thursday night as his congregation sang "Happy Birthday" during a celebration at the People's Church.

Roloff is accused of operating the home without a license on or about May 11 — a day County Attorney Mike Westergren said was picked at random. The charge, a Class B misdemeanor, carries a maximum penalty of six months in jail and a \$1,000 fine.

"Our county attorney, Mike Westergren, was very insistent that the grand jury indict this notorious criminal as a lawbreaker," Roloff told a nearly full house.

Roloff compared indicting him after his homes were closed to someone digging up a dead body a week after it was buried.

"After 35 years and more of doing what most people say is good work, it seems strange that anybody would want to dig up a dead body," Roloff said. "But there will be a resurrection."

**New York mayor predicts Carter renomination in '80**

NEW YORK (AP) — When the 1980 Democratic National Convention begins in New York, Jimmy Carter will be on friendly turf if Mayor Edward I. Koch has anything to say about it.

"We're going to have the convention and renominate the next president," Koch said Thursday after the Democrats announced they would hold the convention at Madison Square Garden. Carter was nominated in New York in 1976. The 1980

Democratic convention begins Aug. 11.

The Republicans picked Detroit for their national convention, which will begin July 14, 1980.

Police Commissioner Robert McGuire warned there could be more demonstrations in 1980 than in 1976 because the Democrats are in power and may be held responsible for the nation's ills.
