# Water bill to increase \$1.25

#### By JAMES WERRELL

The city's bill for improvements of the sewer treatment plant will be paid by a \$1.25 monthly surcharge to customers.

The first reading of an ordinance levying the surcharge was passed unanimously by the Big Spring City Council during its regular meeting today. If the proposal passes on its second reading, the surcharge will appear on September bills.

The city was notified in 1969 that its sewer plant did not comply with requirements specified by the Environmental Protection Agency. Since then, the city acquired a grant from the Economic Development

In its second consideration, the council voted unanimously to give notice of the city's intent to purchase the bonds, and to hold a public meeting to discuss the proposal with concerned citizens. The date for the meeting will be specified at the next regular meeting of the council on Aug.

In its final consideration, the council passed unanimously the first reading of a resolution to levy the \$1.25 surcharge.

He said scientists are particularly concerned about a concentration of thick, floating oil 81/2 miles long and a half mile wide sitting several miles off the coast near Brownsville. Robinson said that patch is expected to "narrowly miss the coast" according to computer predictions.

"A slight change of wind will put it on the coast." he said."They (large oil slicks) still might come ashore somewhere else. We hope there is a reversal of currents somewhere, but we're not certain of that at this time by any means." A so-called reverse current would tend to suck floating oil back toward the center of the Gulf of Mexico.

Beach fouling ranks low on the government's priority list as far as permanent damage goes.

The environmentally sensitive Laguna Medre is at the top of that list. The lagoon is a strip of fairly shallow water between Padre Island and the mainland. It serves as a home for a variety of wildlife and as a breeding ground for shrimp and other marine species

Some tar balls have been reported in the Laguna Madre, but their presence was not alarming to the government experts.

"Right now it's relatively insignificant," Robinson said. "There are slight amounts of small tar balls getting into the lagoon. The volume of oli involved is very small, perhaps only a few pounds a day. Of course, I might have to take all this back tomorrow

Coast Guard Lt. Cmdr. Jim Paskewich said he was confident that the Laguna Madre could be protected 'at this point.'

Meacham also said "extremely light concentrations of oil particles have been detected by NOAA scientists in (environmentally sensitive) Laguna Madre." The impact at this point is still considered "negligible," Meacham said.

A new 6-inch mesh skirt will be attached to a boom set up across Port Mansfield Cut, a waterway leading into Laguna Madre. A similar skirt, designed to catch tar balls and oil slipping under the boom, was washed away by night tides.

Meacham also said scattered oil patches have washed aground on the Mexican shore south of Brownsville. "It looks pretty bad down there," he

said.

John Robinson, NOAA scientific coordinator for the government task force, said strong afternoon winds are still in the forecast and the slimy assault probably will continue for a while

"I believe it is going to get a little worse," he said Monday. "It does appear that in the next days, we are going to have greater impact.

"Beyond that, the future is hard to predict.

The oil has broken away from a gigantic slick growing out of the Mexican well Ixtoc I, which has spewed millions of gallons into the Gulf of Mexico since June 3. The leak in the well, located just off Tampico in Mexico, probably won't be brought under control for another two months, officials have said.

The task force had been gearing up to clean the beaches but only a few tar balls washed ashore last week. They were sucked up by Coast Guard vacuum cleaners.

GARDINER, N.Y. (AP) - An escaped convict who had held a hostage for nearly two days was captured in heavy underbrush early today after slipping out of a house in rural Ulster County, state police said. The hostage was reported unharm-

Richard Gantz, 28, was arrested by state police about two hours after he climbed out the back window of a house where he had taken six people hostage Sunday. All except Lester Cassano had been released by Monday morning.

Gantz, who escaped from prison last week while serving time for rape and robbery convictions, offered no resistance when State Police Sgt. Brian O'Connor wrestled him to the ground in a wooded, swampy area a half mile north of the house, officers said



#### Gas increases voted

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) - The Texas Railroad Commission approved small natural gas rate increases Monday for unincorporated áreas around Dell City, Marfa, Alpine, Blamorhea, Groom and Universal City.

In each case, examiners testified that the nearest incorporated cities had approved indentical rates inside the city limits as those proposed for the environs.

#### Lignite mining okayed

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) - Texas Utilities Co., Dallas, was given authority Monday to add 483.8 acres to its lignite surface mining operations in Panola County.

The area approved by the Texas Railroad Commission is adjacent to the Martin Lake mine three miles west of Beckville.

The commission also accepted a \$1.8 million firstyear performance bond covering Texas Utilities' newly approved Big Brown Number 2 mine, a lignite operation in Freestone County 10 miles northeast of Fairfield

The bond was based on an engineering report that the amount would be adequate to reclaim lands disturbed at the site.

#### 55 mph crackdown

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) - Special efforts will be made in six Texas counties to improve compliance with the 55 mile-per-hour speed limits, the Department of Public Safety said Monday

The counties included in "Project Accident Reduction" are Bexar, Williamson, Bell, Smith, Wise and Ector. The project continues through Dec. 31.

Officials said a special task force of highway patrol troopers will augment regularly assigned personnel during periods of high accident frequency. The task force will come from troopers working on their days off or overtime beyond a regular shift

All troopers will be in marked patrol units.

Payment for overtime costs will be provided from a \$509,000 grant obtained through the Texas Office of Traffice Safety.

The DPS said the counties were selected on the basis of statistics showing high accident rates, high traffic volumes and above average speeds.

Similar programs on a lesser scale are already in operation in Hopkins, Franklin, Denton, Tarrant and Hidalgo counties, and in the 21 counties of the Corpus Christi district.

#### Wheelchair picket wins

MISSOULA, Mont. (AP) - Fifteen-year-old Tammie Thompson, a cerebral palsy victim barred from city buses because she is confined to a wheelchair, has won her battle and will ride again.

"We're going to put Tammie on the bus," said Merlin Marks, her grandfather, after a decision Monday by the Missoula Urban Transportation Board. "She wants to go out to the mall Tuesday, so we'll see what happens.'

Following the board's decision, Marks said: "I feel good. For once the underdog won out.

Marks was one of those who had joined Tammie in picketing at the downtown bus stop where she was denied transportation Thursday.

The board, which sets policy for the Mountain Line bus system, held a special meeting Monday and adopted a plan to accommodate a variety of riders who must haul wheelchairs, strollers, grocery carts or other bulky objects with them.





WASHINGTON - We have been taken to task by Exxon for questioning whether the oil industry should be entrusted to develop synthetic fuels. We are nagged by the suspicion that the oil barons may choose to squeeze every last dollar out of every last oil well before making synthetic fuels readily available to a nation in the grip of an energy drought. As evidence that the oil men might

put corporate greed ahead of the public good, we cited the World War II experience with the oil industry. Then the most critical need was for rubber. The government entrusted the oil industry to develop synthetic method. stry to develop synthetic rubber.

This patriotic mission went to Exxon, then known as Standard Oil of New Jersey, but Standard Oil had a secret cartel arrangement with the German chemical giant, I.G. Farben, This agreement, signed in 1929, was renewed in 1939 on the eve of World War II. Justice Department records show that the German consortium

Our reporting on this scandal has aggrieved Exxon whose senior vice president, George T. Piercy, has written us a letter disputing our facts. 'You will, I am sure, wish to call all of this to the attention of your readers,' he concluded. So herewith are Exxon's arguments:

Exxon: "The (synthetic rubber) effort was a substantial success in which the U.S. Government, Standard Oil Company (N.J.) and many other industrial organizations played important roles. In the 18 months following Pearl Harbor, a new industry was created. Facilities were installed and production begun. By the second quarter of 1944, production of synthetic rubber had caught up with demand .

Response: Because of Standard Oil's obstruction, the country was critically short of rubber during the early war years. Indeed, the Justice Department had accused the com-

One defense official made this clear last week to a meeting attended by senate staff experts: U.S. negotiators of SALT II "know that the Russians deliberately negotiated Article 4 so that they could go ahead and test and deploy all their new missiles without violating the treaty.

THIS SOVIET upgrading or modernization of the existing force is a loophole totally separate from the provision in the treaty (Article 2) that gives each side the right to build one new missile. President Carter has announced a decision (still resisted by arms control enthusiasts) for the U.S to build the MX mobile missile as its new missile.

The U.S. has no plans for upgrading or modernizing its present land-based missile force. There is today no intention to fire a single test of any longrange missile until the MX itself is fired (now scheduled for 1983).

That means silence from the Americans amid heavy Russian missile-rattling. 'The Soviet Union, without cheating, is in the same position to modernize its land-based long-range missiles as it was after ratification of SALT I on Sept. 14, 1972. Immediately thereafter, the Soviets began initial tests of the huge SS-18 and the large SS-19, whose size did violent injustice to the spirit of SALT I. Now, both the SS-18 and the SS-19 will be modernized under SALT II, along with three lesser missiles.

Dear Dr. Donohue: My doctor has been treating me (with medicine) for my high blood pressure. It has come down from 212-120 to 170-90. Since my heart, circulatory system, kidneys and blood are all normal, he says there is nothing more that can be done. Is there anything further I can do to lower my blood pressure? I am 60 years of age. - F.B. I'm glad you were able to bring your

At your age this should be done carefully, even though you have a clean bill of health as regards your heart and circulation. You might

discuss this with your doctor. It's also important to continue your medicine as prescribed and to set up regular appointments to measure your progress. Dear Dr. Donohue: I'm told I have 'weaver's bottom," which doesn't sound too flattering. I'm not a weaver. What is it and how is it treated? Can you give me a nicer name for it? -

How about "bursitis of the ischial area?" The ischium is part of the hip. The ischial tuberosity is the bone protrusion you sit on. Weaver's bottom may occur in people who put continued pressure on the under hip area, and I suppose weavers (who apparently do a lot of sitting at their work) gave their name to it for that reason. Many quaint terms enter the rear door of medical literature in similar ways - "housemaid's knee," 'swimmer's itch'' (or ear), even

Dear Dr. Donobue: Please send me your material on diverticulesis. Also, is this condition hereditary? My father and four of his brothers and sisters all had it. -D.F.

It's not hereditary. Most people-have some degree of this, which becomes more likely with age. Most of the bowel supportchings are never diagnosed and never give trouble. About 20-25 percent of the bowel pockets become inflammed (diver-ticulitis), which you'll find discussed in the booklet. in the booklet.

UNDER PRESSURE from Adolf Hitler, I.G. Farben used this connection to try to block the development of a synthetic rubber industry in the United States. The records show that Standard Oil was faithful to I.G. Farben and tried to obstruct synthetic rubber production by Goodyear and Dow Chemical.

The British security coordinator in the United States, William Stephenson, helped to expose the secret cartel agreement and castigated Standard Oil as "a hostile and dangerous agency of the enemy." The Justice Department reacted by filing a massive antitrust action against Standard Oil.

In April of 1942, Assistant Attorney General Thurmond Arnold charged that the "Standard cartel arrangements with Germany ... are the principal cause of the present rubber shortage.'

Exxon: "In April of 1943, R.W. Gallagher, the then president of Standard Oil Company, wrote William M. Jeffers, the U.S. rubber director, offering to give the government free license to all synthetic rubber patents possessed by the corporation, not only for the war period but the life of the patents. The offer was accepted . .

Response: Pearl Harbor was bombed in 1941, not 1943. Standard Oil's offer came in the middle of the war only after the Justice Department had brought charges against the company. Earlier, Standard Oil willingly supplied I.G. Farben with tetryl ethyl lead that the Nazis needed for the Polish invasion.

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

WASHINGTON (AP) -President Carter's chief inflation adviser says he hopes the food industry will 'look again'' to make sure it is giving consumers a fair shake on food prices now that it knows the government is looking over its shoulders.

Alfred Kahn made the statement after Carter summoned 16 food industry representatives, including top executives of major supermarket chains, to the White House Monday to demonstrate his concern over rising retail prices.

Carter told the group he particularly disturwas bed'' that supermarket prices have been going up when farm prices have been coming down. "We are very concerned about this trend,' he emphasized during the meeting, which lasted more than an hour.

supermarket But a spokesman, Robert O. Aders of the Food Marketing Institute, said Carter was told he had been given faulty data on food prices. Aders the food also said representatives stressed that they were not gouging the consumer.

"I'm sure we convinced the president there has been no profiteering at all," Aders, who is president of the institute, told reporters after the meeting.

He didn't deny that retail prices might still be increasing while farm prices are declining, but said this reflects the normal food industry time lag and that the trends even out over time.

Aders also said any real

relief from rising food prices depends on controlling inflation, as the cost of food goes up along with goes up along with everything else. "It all depends on the general inflation rate," he said.

Aders, the group's spokesman, said several supermarket executives told Carter they were not increasing their overall profit margin at consumers' expense. But he said he didn't know whether this was true of the entire industry.

About 30 retail food firms have been named by the administration's Council on Wage and Price Stability as probably not complying with the government's voluntary price guidelines. However, none of these firms was represented at the meeting.

Supermarket chains that were represented included the Kroger Co., Pathmark, Albertson's, Safeway, Jewel, A&P, Winn-Dixie and Super Valu. Representatives of the meat industry also attended. Kahn told reporters Carter voiced skepticism over the assertion that the government's food-price figures were wrong. The data, Carter said, showed that while farm prices declined at an annual rate of 17 percent in the last three months, retail prices increased at an 8 percent annual rate.

'We've been particularly disturbed recently because the price of the food to the farmers has been going down substantially and the price of food to the consumers at the retail outlets has still been going up quite rapidly," Carter said.

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) - If Joe Roberto's lofty plan ever gets approved, you will be able to reserve a final resting place among the stars for \$2,995.

Roberto, a 39-year-old warehouse manager, started a firm called Astro Burial Ltd. for his proposed extraterrestrial sendoffs.

The idea calls for storing the remains of the dearly beloved in the cargo hold of the space shuttle being readied for launching by the National Aeronautics and Space Administration.

Up to 20 small canisters containing the ashes of cremated humans would be discharged from the shuttle and sent adrift. Astro Burial would give the bereaved a "tastefully designed plaque" that might contain a summary of the timing of the launch, orbital parameters and other information based on NASA computer data.

Roberto says he has contacted space officials, who he says think "it is an unusual request" although they have not approved it.

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# Brock 14th to score number 3,000 Putt Choate remains

ST. LOUIS (AP) - At a time when Lou Brock's attention had begun to fade, a fastball from Dennis Lamp under the chin served to awaken the aging superstar.

The message Lamp delivered to the 40-year-old St. Louis Cardinals outfielder spurred him to his 3,000th career hit in the fourth inning against the Chicago Cubs Monday night. One curveball later, Brock blasted a rocket off the fingertips of the tall righthander and scurried to first base as the ball rolled into foul territory toward third pandemonium swept and Busch Stadium.

Earlier, needing two hits, Brock stirred a throng of 44,457 to a near frenzy of anticipation by blooping a single off Lamp to left field in the first inning.

A rising crescendo of the familiar chant "Lou, Lou, Lou" filled the air as Brock opened the Cards' fourth by looking at a called strike and falling behind 0-2, foultipping a second pitch.

Cautiously, Lamp wasted a pitch to the outside of the plate before selecting his next delivery. Brock accepted the knockdown, arose slowly and connected squarely with a drive which caused Lamp to leave the game with severe bruises.

"I had to go after him," Lamp said following the contest which Brock left at the start of the fifth, following a series of standing ovations and a 16-minute ceremony at first base.

"I think he'd rather have me go after him tough than have me lay one in there," Lamp said. "It was a curve ball. Maybe not where I wanted it, but a good pitch. His 3,000th? I'm not ashamed to have given it up.

Brock's historic hit established him as the second St. Louis player and only the 14th in major league history to reach the lofty milestone. And, by fate, it came against the club that traded him away in 1964.

"I waited 19 years for this. It couldn't have come at a much better time, inasmuch as it was against the team that I started with," he said.

"I think the only thing that really distracted me was the fastball under the chin. It sort of jolted me back to reality. It was close. After that, it made me realize that I wasn't concentrating as I'd have to




