WASHINGTON (AP) — Corporate profits slipped 2.4 percent during the second quarter this year, but the nation's overall economic growth did not fall as abruptly as first thought,

the government reported today.
The Commerce Department said
the Gross National Product, which measures total output of goods and services, declined 2.4 percent from April 1 to June 30. Preliminary ates released last month had placed the drop at 3.3 percent.

Nevertheless, the two new statistics on profits and GNP offer further evidence of the nation's slide into a recession, economists said.

Corporate profits, after taxes and on an annual basis, totaled \$138.6 billion, compared with \$142 billion during the first quarter, the Com-merce Department said. These figures are adjusted for seasonal

Pre-tax profits, meanwhile, fell from \$233.3 billion in the first quarter to \$226.9 billion in the April-June period, the department said.

Corporate profits are seen as a key indicator of the economy's growth because it helps determine how much

The revised GNP decline of 2.4 percent compares with a 1.1 percent

The government also said that the annual inflation rate declined from 9.3 percent in the first quarter to 9.2 percent in the second three months of 1979, as measured by a broad national standard called the GNP implicit price deflator

Today's reports followed announ-cements that interest rates are rising, housing starts are plunging and in-dustrial production is falling — signs that economists say point to a recession and higher unemployment.

The Federal Reserve Board, indicating it will risk recession to douse inflation, Thursday boosted the discount rate, or interest charged its bank lenders, from 10 percent to a record 10.5 percent.

Meanwhile, the Commerce Department said housing starts fell 7 percent last month, while total industrial output slipped 0.1 percent. Auto production plummeted more than 3 percent.



Two huge patches of oil present threat

CORPUS CHRISTI, Texas (AP) -The Coast Guard began battling today two huge patches of runaway Mexican oil that one official said presented "the biggest challenge and threat" to the entrances into the environmentally fragile Laguna Madre.

A four-mile-by-one-mile patch of mousse, an emulsion of heavy oil and sea water, loomed less than five miles off the Brownsville jetties, the southernmost entrance to the lush lagoon that runs along behind the 100mile-long Padre Island.

Meanwhile a 10-mile-long ribbon of mousse was only a mile away from the Port Mansfield cut, a 200-foot wide channel some 30 miles up Padre

"This has presented the biggest challenge and threat to the inlets at this time," said Lt. Cmdr. Jim Paskewich, a leader of the defense

Extra anti-oil booms were being installed at the Port Mansfield cut to go with another boom that has been blocking the channel for about two

Paskewich said that to fight the oil off Brownsville, the Coast Guard would use its open water containment boom and skimmer system before the oil could get dangerously close to the

Such a system "corrals" the oil at sea and feeds it into the skimmer.

"Minor" patches of sheen were discovered Thursday behind the booms in the two southerly inlets, but task force scientific coordinator John Robinson said today, "We're confident that sheen doesn't represent any great hazard."

Meanwhile nearly 20 miles of scenic Texas beaches have been blackened by history's worst oil spill.

Seeking solitude

Carter's floating campaign

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Carter, seeking some solitude and relaxation amid a floating campaign for his energy program, embarks tonight on a seven-day trip down the Mississippi River on an oldfashioned sternwheeler.

He is flying to St. Paul, Minn., in the late afternoon to begin his week-long adventure aboard the Delta Queen, plying the upper Minnesota, Wisconsin, Iowa and Missouri shores to St.

Before boarding the 53year-old steamboat, he will attend an energy briefing this evening in St. Paul, the first of several energyrelated appearances he has planned along the river.

The president, who in the last year has taken advantage of some exotic forms of transportation - a raft on a wilderness river, a train through the Egyptian countryside — will be able to take advantage of what is advertised as "the pampered, good life." It is costing him about \$1,800,

White House officials said. Brochures listing the Delta Queen's features note its "sumptuous dining, exquisite cuisine." Should Carter, his wife and daughter choose, they can sample "riverboat ramblin" at its liveliest 'tiff the wee hours of the morning.'

Not to be overlooked, either, are the "burnished brass railings and trim ... rich mahogany ... ornate stained glass windows ... floors of rare Siamese ironbark."

"She preserves in grand style the romance and pageantry of a bygone era," the boat's owners advertise. Indeed, she is listed in the Interior Department's National Register of Historic

The boat's diversions include jogging on deck, checkers, cards and kite

Carter will go ashore at least four times, stopping in Prairie du Chien, Wis.; Davenport and Burlington, Iowa; and Hannibal, Mo., for a town meeting, a picnic, a radio call-in show and a factory tour to study its energy conservation

Resignation of Young captures headlines

"He certainly did not show that he was master of the situation, even though he has been trying to do just that for the past few weeks. It is hard to imagine what could now help the former governor from breaking his fall."

Young resigned Wednesday after admitting he held substantive talks with the Palestine Liberation Organizations's U.N. observer. The United States had promised not to conduct such talks until the PLO recognized Israel's right to

Calcium important in women's diet

Paul G. Donohue, M.D.

Dear Dr. Donohue: Will you please advise those of us who have bone thinning? I have broken one hip and am in fear of breaking the other. I was never one to drink milk but now have started taking calcium tablets. Will this help at this late date? What about

exercise? — Mrs. J.M.

Dear Dr. Donohue: Thanks for your column. Sometimes it takes the fear out of ailments that have frightening names. I would like to ask about taking calcium for elderly people with osteoporosis. Does it do any good? -

A number of studies of osteoporosis (bone-thinning and shrinking) support the idea of calcium and vitamin D use to slow the process. It's thought, too, that many women might avoid this bone problem if they got adequate calcium (i.e. milk) throughout their lives. Otherwise, calcium supplements (a gram a day) and vitamin D (up to 1,000 international units a day) might help both of you slow the

bone thinning, even at this late date. In more severe cases where bones are subject to easy fracture, estrogen and flouride are being tried. The estrogen is taken in cycles of three weeks on and one week off. For maximum benefit it should be started within three years of menopause. when bone thinning accelerates in

most women. Mrs. J.M. asks about exercise. It is recommended on a daily basis, but within the limits of pain. In many cases of osteoporosis such things as hip fractures may be present and actually cause the fall rather than the fall itself causing the fracture. They are accidents "waiting to happen."

Dear Dr. Donohue: My grand-nother is 71. She is 5 feet, 2 inches and weighs about 98 pounds. We are very worried about her because she refuses to see a doctor about her problems. She fears an operation. I hope you can help. She practically lives on coffee, candy, cigarettes, sweet rolls, bread and fruit. Nothing substantial like meat or vegetables will stay down. Most of the time she loses whatever she eats, anyway. She often mentions pain in her stomach and some days she spends all day in bed. On others, she's

peppy and feeling fine. Any talk of operations and hospitals will discourage her. She's afraid of cancer. So do you have any idea as to what it may be and a possible medical cure? I'm hoping your advice will encourage her to see a doctor. — Mrs.

DEAR L.L.C.: Your pastor is probably not aware of your feelings. He has many responsibilities and may be unaware of the needs of which you speak. Has the problem of the lights

oeen pointed out to him?

Let me suggest first that some of you consider things that you can do together to meet your special needs. If your church has a custodian, speak to him about your problem with the lights. If the church does not have bright enough bulbs, take up a collection in the class to get stronger ones. On a more basic issue, however, what are you doing to minister to each other? The Bible tells us "Carry each other's burdens and in this way you will fulfill the law of Christ"

Buyers' beef

WASHINGTON - Americans with an appetite for beef are paying more and, apparently, enjoying it less. They are caught between the cattlemen, who cut back production until scarcity made the price rise, and the retailers, who aren't above a little finagling at the wrapping-and-pricing machine.

Beef prices have catapulted from an average of \$1.48 to \$2.31 a pound in about two and a half years. Yet the more-expensive-than-ever sometimes aren't as tasty as they used to be. You see, some profithungry retailers are passing off lowgrade steaks and roasts as "Prime." Here's what has been going on behind the meat counter.

THE PRICE GOUGING began on the range. The rancher's profit, on the average, zoomed from \$25 to \$50 a head last year. By March of this year, the profit for beef on the hoof hit a temporary high of \$114 a head.

Yet the cattlemen can point, with some justice, to other factors beyond their control, which have sent the price of cows jumping over the moon. These include high feed prices caused by the sale of grain to Russia, two successive droughts, an influx of foreign beef and President Nixon's temporary controls on beef prices.

The Nixon move froze producers' prices but did nothing to cut their overhead costs - a situation that drove many cattlemen out of business, with huge financial losses.

Herds that were liquidated during unprofitable years cannot be built up overnight. Cattle take time to grow especially breeder cattle. Even with the spur of higher prices, there were only 111 million cattle on the hoof earlier this year, compared to 132 million in 1974.

Another piece in the jigsaw puzzle is the role of the middleman, that anonymous villain suspected of causing most of our meat-counter melancholy. The Agriculture Department's statistics make him less sinister than he appeared to be.

When beef was \$1.48 a pound, the farmer got 83 cents and the retailer 47 cents, leaving 18 cents for the middleman. With beef at an average of \$2.31 a pound today, the farmer gets \$1.39, the retailer 81 cents and the middleman only 11 cents.

The Agriculture Department's investigators, however, have un-covered profiteering at the retail level. The latest big case, against Dominick's Finer Foods of Chicago, demonstrates the need for eternal

EVEN AS THE Justice Department was preparing a 20-count criminal charge of deliberate mislabeling of meat at 10 of the chain's 69 supermarkets, a compliance check showed that some Dominick's stores were continuing blithely to mislabel, Washington officials allege.

A check of 16 stores by four teams of Agriculture Department investigators on May 18 turned up evidence of mislabeling at six of the markets. The alleged violations were the same kind as those which had led earlier to the filing of charges. The investigators found that cuts of

meat, originally graded "Choice" by federal inspectors at the packing house, had been fraudulently labeled "Prime" by Dominick's. This allowed the stores to charge an extra 30 cents a pound at the meat counter.

The Justice Department recommended a \$200,000 fine, and Dominick's agreed to pay it the day after the criminal charges were filed. A spokesman for the chain told our associate Tony Capaccio that he was not aware of the findings of the May 18

There may be hope, meanwhile, for some price relief. President Carter has put on a big show of jawboning the food industry into lowering prices. This is something, the industry claims, that would happen without the president's intervention because of seasonal fluctuations in supply

Footnote: We reached John Coplin, the Agriculture Department's main station supervisor of Midwest meat graders, but he refused to comment on the Dominick case on the grounds that it may end up in court.

TREASURY TIFF: Secret Service agents are furious over a confidential report that's being closely held at the Treasury Department. It describes mismanagement and possible corruption in the Treasury office responsible for processing claims for U.S. government checks.

What bugs the professional investigators of the Secret Service is that because of the parent department's bungling, or worse, they aren't being turned loose on the rising number of cases involving forged government checks. On the contrary, Treasury has sharply reduced the number of such cases referred to the Secret Service, which is charged by the law to investigate them.

"The incidence of forgery is likely to increase," one portion of the report warns, "if the U.S. Secret Service is not able to effectively deter the crime by investigative efforts. So while Treasury fiddles and the

Secret Service burns, the total of double payments shelled out by Uncle Sam due to loss, theft or forgery has almost tripled — to \$70 million. Sources told us that much of this money will never be recovered now. Meanwhile, the bureaucrats who

could have gotten some of this money back for the taxpayers sat around with virtually nothing to do, adding another million dollars or so in salaries to the waste, our inside sources estimate.

And a number of Treasury Department poohbahs responsible for the multimillion-dollar scandal have been promoted, we've been told.

(AP) - Nearly 400 years after astronomers first identified the rings around Saturn, a robot spacecraft hurtling toward the planet at 50,000 miles an hour may help scientists determine whether man is alone in the

Pioneer 11, launched six

through the planet's mysterious rings Sept. 1, scientists estimate. The flight to the sixth planet from the sun - nearly a billion miles from Earth - will probe the rings and the potential for life on one of

Saturn's satellites. As it sweeps around

Scientists speculate that because Titan has a solid surface and an atmosphere of methane - the same gas produced by decaying plants - it could harbor life.

NASA scientists estimate the rings could range from several yards to several thickness. in Individual particles may be as big as cars or as small as

Instruments aboard Pioneer 11 are expected to gauge the size and composition of the rings, and also confirm for the first time the limits of Saturn's gravity, magnetic and radiation fields.

As the spacecraft passes within 26,000 miles of Saturn's cloud tops, other instruments will take photographs and measure temperature and chemical composition of the outer atmosphere.

most hazardous moment in the two-day encounter will occur when the aluminum, nuclearpowered spacecraft passes through the planet's rings where it risks collision with debris too small to be seen from Earth, said Wolfe.

Saturn is the second largest planet in the solar system, lying almost a billion miles from the Sun and orbiting between Jupiter and Uranus



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
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

Growing pains in paradise

HONOLULU (AP) People wept for joy and danced in the streets when President Dwight Eisenhower signed a piece of paper on March 18, 1959, and made Hawaii the 50th state.

Hawaii officially joined the Union on Aug. 21, 1959, and the third Friday in August since has been a day of celebration

Today is this year's official Admissions Day holiday, but it's unlikely there will be any dancing in the streets to celebrate Hawaii's 20th anniversary as a state.

Statehood plunked the island paradise into a simmering caldron of social and physical change, with results still bubbling to the surface two decades after the heat was turned up.

'The 45 percent increase in resident population during the last 20 years is probably the key to the most important changes that have occurred since statehood," said Andrew Lind, a retired University of Hawaii sociology professor.

"Most of the persons in the giant increase are million to \$1.4 billion. relative newcomers not acquainted with island charters.



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

York Yankees Manager Billy Martin says that major league baseball hurt itself by hiring the minor league umpires who filled in during the regular umpires' earlyseason work stoppage.

"The sooner we get rid of these scabs the better off baseball will be," an angry Martin said after being ejected from Thursday night's 5-1 loss to Minnesota by Dallas Parks, one of the new umpires.

"These guys are up here for one reason and I know what that reason is," Martin continued. "It's not helping it's hurting baseball. baseball.

The fiery Martin, who had drawn a warning finger from Parks earlier, was ejected in the eighth inning after going out to talk to pitcher Ron Davis. Since there was no activity in the bullpen, it was obvious Martin was waiting for Parks to come out to the mound.

Parks eventually did and Martin, upset about the umpire's ball and strike calls, let him have both verbal barrels. Parks then gave Martin the thumb and Martin gave it back with his right foot, kicking dirt and dust over Parks' shoes and trousers seven times.

"He showed me up so I showed him up," Martin said. "Did you ever see dirt on a scab? It doesn't hurt because the wound's already covered. I don't like scabs, especially when they're bad

NEW YORK (AP) - With the appointment of an executive director, the machinery is beginning to roll for a new national agency to police the finances of hundreds of Christian

charities. "It is an idea whose time has come," says the Rev. Olan Hendrix, 52, a Baptist minister and the newly named full-time director of the Evangelical Council for Financial Accountability.

"Every Christian charity must be fully accountable to its giving public. Each dollarmust be regarded as a sacred trust. ECFA will seek to insure that it does."

Plans for the new agency were adopted this spring at a meeting of representatives about 1,100 Christian charities with combined annual income of nearly \$1 billion

Acting in the face of sporadic criticisms and mouting pressures for more government regulation of religious-charitable groups, they formed the new selfgoverning agency and adopted for it a set of strict uniform standards for financial disclosure.

These require, among other things, an annual audit by an outside public accounting firm, making the

audited statements available to anyone, the establishment of continuous audit committees of non-employes and an active, regularly meeting governing board, a majority whom are non-emple with policy-making

authority. Commending the move for stricter standards, the evangelical weekly, Christianity Today, said that "up to now, it has usually been easier to find out about the financial affairs of secular companies than about some religious organizations that appeal to the public for funds.

"The accountability that ECFA intends to promote is a demonstration of responsible Christian stewardship;" the weekly adds.

Main offices of the agency are being set up in Pasadena, Calif.



religious convictions figured prominently in the campaign that put him in office, has mobilized religious forces to a wide extent with his call for a restoration of American confidence and faith.

In the wake of his address stressing that the lack of such spunk underlies the nation's travail, a groundswell of religious voices has responded, "Amen." They've also pledged to work harder in trying to shore up that crumbling rampart.

It's a matter of upholding the "common good," a broad front of them said jointly, reviving an old theme of the nation's founding purposes. If "we cannot all pull together," they added, "we will certainly fall" into failing the cause.

Not that there was any religious lining up behind Carter's specific proposals, but to a degree unmatched since the struggle of the 1960s for black civil rights, religioss leadership has

rallied to his call for bracing remarkable unanimity.





AMARILLO, Texas (AP) District Attorney Tom Curtis posted a \$1,000 personal bond and was freed Wednesday after a state grand jury indicted him on two misdemeanor counts charging abuse of office.

The indictments stemmed from a subpoena Curtis issued the grand jury foreman calling for a tape recording of his own testimony before the panel.

The indictments charge Curtis with "intent to obtain a benefit for himself, namely discovery of said defendant's own testimony as a criminal suspect ... by issuing a grand jury subpoena calling for Robert S. Rudd, foreman of the grand jury, to appear and bring with him for inspection and copying tape recordings of Curtis' own testimony before the grand

The first count of the indictment charges that action constituted unauthorized exercise of his official power." The second count cited the same reasons and charged that Curtis "exceeded his official M. Jones, 8; and their cousins, Tony M. Beard, 3, power.'

The grand jury last June asked Curtis and his staff members to leave their deliberations in a case that Curtis had decided not to prosecute. The grand jury subsequently returned four indictments in that case

Jurors in perjury trial fail to reach verdict

EL PASO, Texas (AP) -Jurors in the federal perjury trial of Ransom Patrick Cross failed to reach a verdict Wednesday, and Judge Thomas Reavely declared a mistrial.

Cross had been accused in connection with the attempted assassination last November of former U.S. Attorney James Kerr in San Antonio.

His appearance last April before a federal grand jury in San Antonio probing the rifle attack resulted in the perjury charges.

During the three-day trial, prosecutors alleged Cross told the panel he never heard members of the Bandidos motorcycle club discuss the unsuccessful Nov. 1 attack on Kerr. Assistant U.S. Attorney

James Bock contended Cross denied to the grand jurors in April knowledge of the weapon used in the incident. Cross testified Tuesday he had told the truth to the grand jury.

Prosecution witnesses testified Cross knew where the weapon was hidden and allegedly knew persons involved in the shooting.

Kerr escaped a hail of rifle fire directed at his car by diving beneath the dashboard. He had been under 24hour guard ever since.

Wednesday, U.S. Attorney Jamie Boyd announced that Kerr had left his job to work elsewhere in law enforcement.

Boyd refused to disclose the job or its location "for security reasons."
