An apple a day may keep some doctors away, but it will not stand in the way of Parmer County Community Hospital's newest employee. She's young, talented, friendly, and dedicated to her job. She's Friona's new friend.

Dr. Tracey Totten, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Theodore Totten of Copperas Cove, Texas, brings to Friona not only a vital profession, but also a delightful personality. "I'd like to be a good doctor, and I hope people like me. I want to do a good job here in Friona," said Totten.

Toten has quite an interesting background. Since her father was in the United States Air Force for twenty-eight years, Totten moved around throughout her childhood as her father was transferred from base to base. "Moving from place to place was hard, but it gave me the chance to meet a lot of people," said Totten. Not only has she lived across the United States, but she has also lived in Japan, Bermuda, Hawaii, and the Philippines, where she graduated from high school.

In 1977, she began her four year stay at the University of Texas in San Antonio. After graduating with a Bachelor of Science degree, she spent the next year working in a lab.

In 1982, she started medical school at the University of Texas Galveston Branch. Specializing in Family Practice, Totten spent her three years of residency in San Antonio's Bexar County Hospital District. Now in Friona, she is beginning her first practice opportunity.

Toten is also hoping to appeal to the women of Parmer County. "I'm concerned that women aren't getting yearly check-ups. One in ten women get breast cancer. That scares me, so I hope more women will come in for check-ups," she said.

She has a strong message for the young people of Friona: "If you want to do something...do it! You

can do anything. You just have to find what it is and go for it. You have to be ready to work for it, too, but whatever it is...you can do it!"

Toten is glad to be in Friona, and she has been very pleased with the response she has received so far. "Every person I've met has said very nice things to me. I'm excited to be here and everyone seems glad that I'm here, too. I'd

like to thank everyone for the support and welcome I've received, and for making me feel at home," said Totten.

Friona is lucky to have such a talented and friendly new member of the community. Dr. Totten's services will certainly be needed and appreciated, and the people of Friona will definitely continue to welcome her to the community.

"Swim For Life" Set Here August 14

A "Swim For Life" special event is being sponsored by the Parmer Unit of the American Cancer Society. The event is set for Monday, August 14 from 12 noon to 7 p.m. at the Friona Swimming Pool, it was announced.

Leland Hart will serve as chairman of the event, which is expected to raise funds toward the Parmer Unit's crusade goal.

To participate, swimmers ask sponsors--family, friends, neighbors, businesses, etc.--to pledge a specific amount for each lap of the pool the swimmer completes. An average swimmer can complete about 30 laps of an Olympic-sized pool.

If a sponsor pledges \$1.00 per lap completed, he will make a contribution of \$30 if the swimmer completes 30 laps. The aim is to get as many sponsors to sign up before the event as possible, Leland Hart said, urging swimmers to sign up soon.

Ribbons will be presented in the different age groups, and it will be a fun time for all entrants. Refreshments will be served at the pool. Swimmers from age six through high school are invited to participate.

"The Swim For Life" is such an appropriate event to raise funds for the American Cancer Society, since it emphasizes fitness as well as breathing. We all realize the society's work to combat cigarette smoking, the major cause of lung cancer," Leland Hart said.

"Of course the American Cancer Society is involved in many, many activities to assist cancer patients, as well as in education to the public and health professionals regarding cancer treatment, early detection, and prevention. Today, almost fifty per cent of all cancer patients will survive and the odds get better every day as ACS-funded research continues to make strides toward new treatments and cures," he continued.

Leland Hart explained that ACS programs are administered by volunteers in the community and therein lies the strength of the Society--community members helping other community members. All fund-raising efforts,

including special events such as the "Swim For Life," are conducted by volunteers, he said.

To sign up for the "Swim For Life" pick up pledge cards from the Friona Pool or the Friona Public Library. Participants will need to bring the completed pledge card with them to the pool the day of the event in order to enter. They will then collect the pledges after the event.

Court Approves 911; Seeks Federal Grant

The Parmer County Commissioners Monday approved seeking a grant to build a waste water system for Lazbuddie's Main Street.

The federal grant, if approved, would supply 100 per cent of the funding needed. The area serviced would include the school, churches, Treider's, Sherley-Anderson and a small area across the highway.

The commissioners voted to spend some of its Permanent School Funds for two school projects:

*Lazbuddie Schools received \$40,000 of its Permanent School portion to build a bus barn.

*Farwell Schools received \$14,579 of its Permanent School portion to pay toward the cost of new windows. The entire project cost is \$76,139, with the majority of the money coming from the school's capital improvement fund.

The commission also approved a resolution supporting the implementation of the 911 emergency number system in Parmer County. This is expected to be implemented in a year or two, and throughout Texas by

1992. This will cost county residents an extra fifty cents a month plus one-half per cent of long distance phone call costs in Texas made each month. This is mandatory for all residents with phones.

The answering point for emergency calls (police, ambulance and fire) for most residents in Parmer County will be in Friona. But folks in some parts of Lariat and Lazbuddie will be connected immediately to Muleshoe. And folks west of Bovina and north of Farwell will go through Clovis.

Regardless of where the answering point is, the closest

department will be dispatched. Thus, although a caller on the Texas side of Pleasant Hill gets the Clovis dispatcher and asks for police help, police from the closest area--say, Bovina--will be sent.

The commissioners also are considering raising license fees \$5. This new money would go to the county bridge and road fund.

The state has passed legislation allowing this if counties so choose. A couple of years ago, \$5 was tacked on for this same purpose.

If the county raises this fee, it would be done to keep the ad valorem tax from increasing, said County Judge Porter Roberts.

A catered meal will be served by the Cattle Call Restaurant of Amarillo.

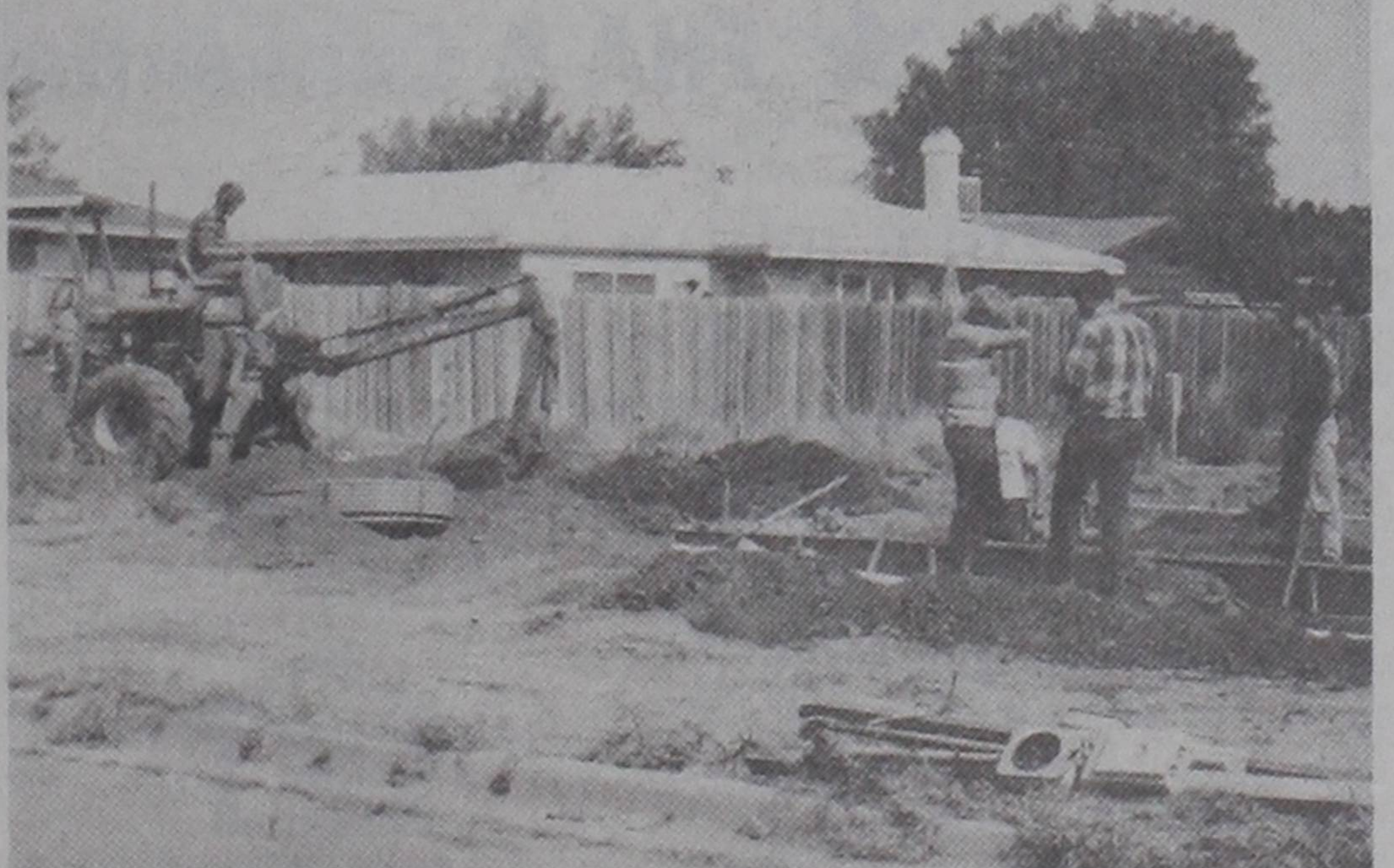
During the business session, three members of the organization's board of directors will be elected. Terms of Bill Carthel, Rickey

The membership also will consider changing the cooperative's fiscal year, which presently ends on June 30, to March 31 each year.

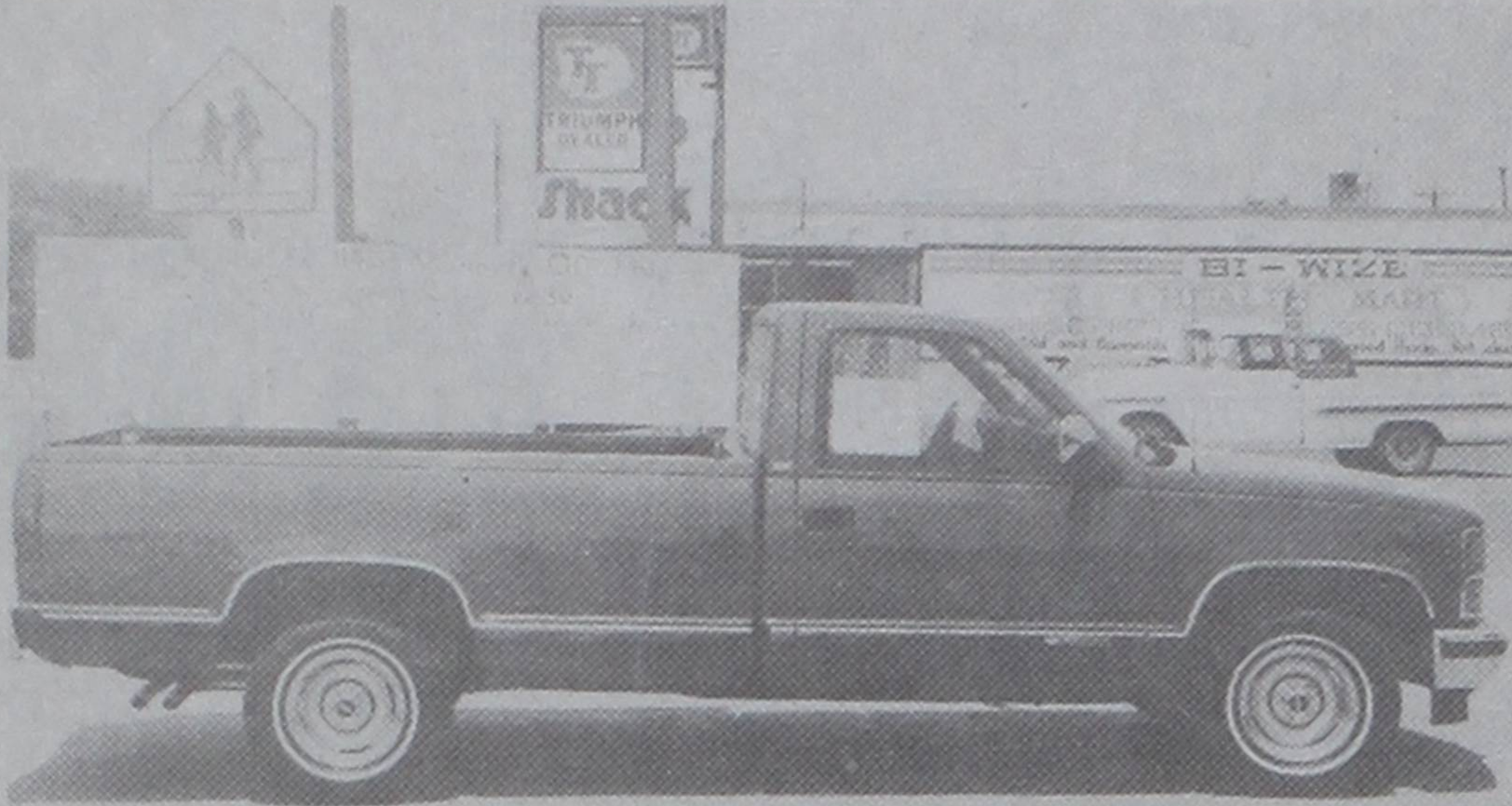

Lousy Losing Lessons Learned In Las Vegas

Once upon a time long ago in a city far away, when “American Pie” was popular and the Vietnam War was not, my wife and I would leave the stagnant, hot Salt River Valley and drive to the stagnant, hot Las Vegas Valley to wager and watch. We did more watching than wagering—and we learned a lot.

Back then the casinos offered a free roll of five nickels to prospective gamblers, the theory being: let a fool have five nickels free and he'll be hooked into spending more. My wife and I, no fools, but having less common sense than money, would walk from casino to casino, collect our nickels at each, drop them in the slots and move on. We had a grand time, though, and learned our geography—it's a long walk from the Golden Nugget to Caesar's Palace.

We also learned gambling behavior. The slot machines, much more enthusiastic than the humans attached to them, would bellow and flash, as they vigorously expelled their winning nickels, dimes, quarters or silver dollars. The hollow-eyed creatures attached to the machines never changed in expression—no joy was there, just duty: drop in a coin and pull the arm. Hour after hour they disconsolately sat and pulled, pausing briefly to move to another machine.

MONTH OF JULY, 1989

The Friona Police Department received 306 calls during the month of July, 1989.

Twenty-nine citations were issued. Twelve arrests were made—one for capias pro-fine warrants; two out-of-town warrants; four for public intoxication; one theft; one criminal mischief; one assault of a police officer (indicted by Grand Jury); one for possession of marijuana (under two ounces); and one driving while intoxicated (second offense).

tables were more varied—intense, frantic, bored, but never happy. Of course, there was the occasional neophyte who seemed to enjoy the roll of the die or the turn of the card, but this rookie, new to the game, would soon learn to be bored. For the vast majority, life there, at the gaming table, was dull, stale, flat and certainly unprofitable. Too bad Pete Rose wasn't with us; maybe he would have learned, too.

Most of us prefer to remember Pete as Charlie Hustle, the man who sprinted to first when he received a base on balls, the man of belly-flop, head-first slides, who played with boyish exuberance, a boy-man who, through diligence and hard work, pounded out a record-breaking 4,256 hits that far exceeded athletes of more natural grace.

For decades he symbolized spunk and spirit, a model for a whole generation of Little Leaguers. Now he's an emblem of the gambling fever that is sweeping America.

According to the magazine,

Gambling and Wagering Business, almost \$253 billion was bet in the United States last year, legally and illegally. Table games, such as roulette and baccarat, drew \$126 billion and slot machines about \$37 billion. Lotteries and pari-mutuel events, such as horse racing, each took in more than \$17 billion, the magazine says.

In the July 10, 1989, edition of *Time Magazine*, Dr. Howard Shaffer of Harvard's Center for Addiction Studies, cited figures that show the proportion of American adults who bet, at least occasionally, has risen from 16% two decades ago to 80% now. Nor is betting confined to adults: Henry Lesieur, a sociologist at St. John's University in New York City, found, in a 1987 study, that 86% of New Jersey high school students had gambled in the previous year and 32% gambled at least once a week, mostly on sporting events.

Now why am I writing about gambling? Do I enjoy sounding like Jimmy Swaggart? Am I a frustrated fire and brimstone

Baptist preacher at heart? Isn't this supposed to be an inspiration column, not a damning one?

Yes! I write about gambling to inspire us to stay away from it. Let's be aware of the problem. Let's be careful. Just as fever signifies pneumonia, gambling is a symptom of a lifestyle that wants more and more, faster and faster, where enough is never enough.

Long ago, my wife and I, initially intrigued by the flash and glitter, soon tired after a couple of days at the gaming houses. Worn and dull, we were ready to go home. As we wound our way out of the oppressive valley, we turned on the radio to lighten the mood and heard, "...and here comes Rose barreling his way around third...there's the throw...he dives, head first...safe!" Now you're out, Pete. Sadly, you're out.

Counseling Center Stresses Importance Of Prevention

As frustrating as it may be, Americans are being forced to come to terms with the growing drug problem in the United States. Each day when the newspapers hit the front porches, people are finding it a rarity if they can read the entire paper without running across some drug related story.

In Parmer County, however, a group of people are doing something about the drug problem. They are those who work at the Parmer County Counseling Center, 506 Cleveland, Friona. In an effort to combat the potential for an enormous drug/alcohol problem in the county, these people are participating in a program that deals mainly with prevention and intervention, rather than treatment, concerning drugs and alcohol.

As a part of the Central Plains Comprehensive Mental Health/Mental Retardation Center (MHMR), the Parmer County Counseling Center is able to receive the benefits of the much needed state and federal grant money used to fund the program.

In 1985, a survey was conducted in nine Texas counties to determine needs the residents had which their local counseling centers could provide. Teachers, doctors, lawyers, judges, police officers, and hundreds of other people in Parmer, Castro, Bailey, Lamb, Swisher, Hale, Floyd, Motley and Briscoe Counties provided information through the survey that pointed to a need for youth services. These youth services needed a focus on drug and alcohol education, prevention and intervention.

After discovering these results, the Central Plains MHMR Center began applying for state and federal money to fund the needed youth program. For the fiscal year beginning September 1, 1987, the Texas Commission on Alcohol and Drug Abuse (TCADA) granted the agency \$70,000 which helped to implement the new program in Parmer, Castro, Hale, and Lamb Counties. The program was called Adolescent Substance Abuse Program (ASAP).

In the next fiscal year, TCADA renewed and expanded the grant to \$140,000 which allowed the program to add Floyd County.

In April of 1989, the Central Plains MHMR Center applied for a grant through the United States Department of Education under Drug Free Schools, and received \$102,000 to implement the Youth Substance Abuse Prevention Program (YSAP) in Parmer, Castro and Hale Counties.

With the grants that the agency received, it was able to begin these new youth service projects in several counties. YSAP and ASAP are two similar services. YSAP is geared more in the direction of children from kindergarten through the eighth grade. ASAP, however, is available to children age 12-18.

ASAP was the first of the two programs to come into existence. The two services, though, are almost identical in format. The programs are designed with three components. Those are drug/alcohol education, alternative services and intervention counseling.

Through the drug/alcohol education, program officials hope to teach the participants decision making skills, social skills, coping skills, and the importance of positive peer pressure.

Alternative services is a component which allows the participants to join in some community based group activities. The children have the opportunity to utilize what they have learned in the education component. Judy Ichtertz, education/alternatives counselor, said, "With some kids, therapy didn't do anything. Alternative services made that change. Then therapy was able to help."

Intervention counseling has the family based approach. A spokeswoman for the center said, "It is difficult to help a kid without involving the whole family."

With the YSAP and ASAP programs, the centers deal with high risk children. In other words, these young people do not yet have serious drug or alcohol problems, but the potential for those problems does exist. Center

officials estimate that only 25% of their clients have even experimented with drugs or alcohol. The centers are not designed to treat, but to prevent serious drug or alcohol problems.

The full ASAP and YSAP programs are not available in all nine counties served through the Central Plains MHMR Center. All nine counties do, however, have counseling programs readily available to anyone in need.

In deciding which counties qualify to receive the YSAP and ASAP programs, the Central Plains MHMR Center looks at the relationship it has had with the local school system, how the county is utilizing current programs available to local people, and which counties have the greatest need for these specialized youth services. Fortunately, Parmer County has met these qualifications and has available to its residents the ASAP and YSAP programs.

"Parmer County is lucky!" said Rhonda Wilkins, supervisor of ASAP/YSAP. "Many Texas counties don't have any services at all. Some have treatment programs, but we're fortunate because we have prevention and intervention."

Larry Keltz, intervention counseling specialist, said of the ASAP and YSAP programs, "I feel it is vitally important to intervene in the lives of young children that are involved in destructive activities that tend to lead to future drug and alcohol abuse. We need to take a more positive approach to the problem than we have before through proactive involvement with at-risk children rather than reactive involvement."

The Central Plains MHMR Center has a message that everyone needs to hear. There is a problem out there, and it is the job of society to solve it. Not only do those who have a drug/alcohol problem need treatment, but those who have potential for problems need prevention and intervention

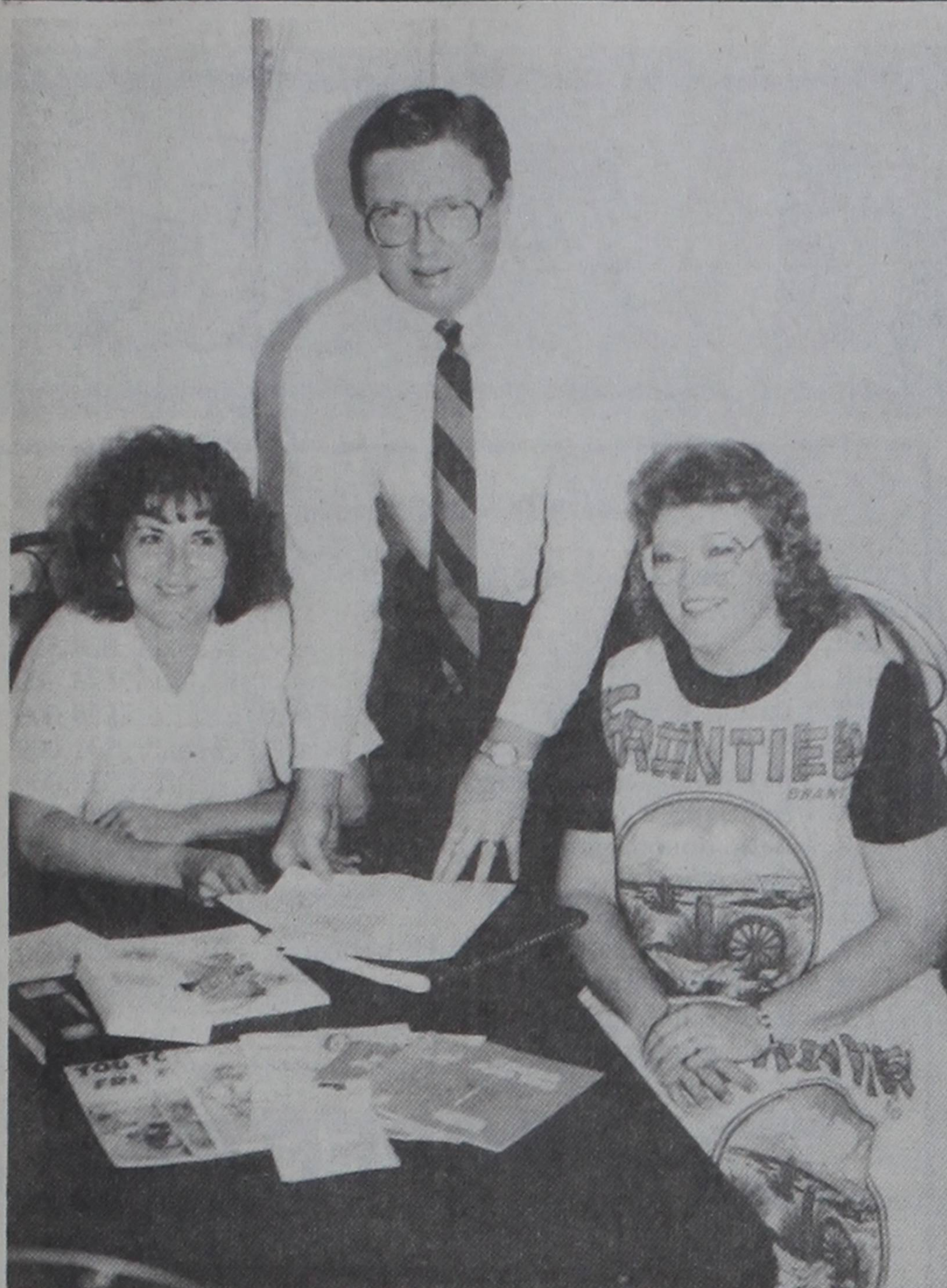
programs. Fortunately, there are some local people who are making these available. The unfortunate aspect is that many people do not know about these services, and they do not know that they are free of charge. It is careless of society not to use the resources it has available to it especially when it costs nothing.

"According to the National Institute on Alcohol Abuse and Alcoholism, as many as one out of every four children in the U.S. come from an alcoholic or chemically dependent family. That scares me! I didn't realize it would be that high. Based on that, think about how many kids are learning that drowning their problems in drugs or alcohol is a solution," said Mrs. Ichtertz of her personal

concerns.

The problem is there. Anyone can pick up the paper on their front porch and read about it. Maybe society cannot stop it in its entirety, but society can support and encourage the work of people like Judy Ichtertz, Larry Keltz and Rhonda Wilkins in their efforts to prevent and intervene in the lives of children who have the potential to carry the drug/alcohol problem even further.

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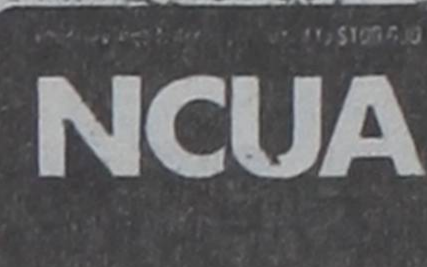

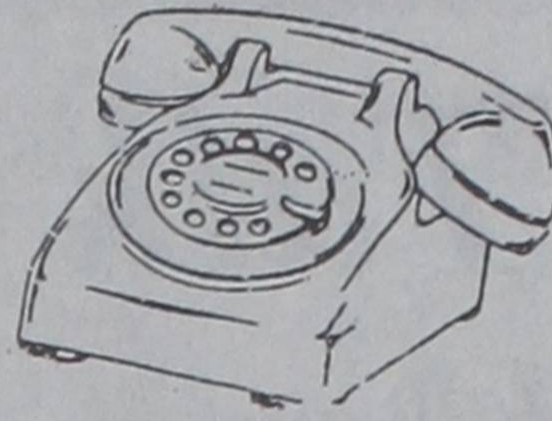

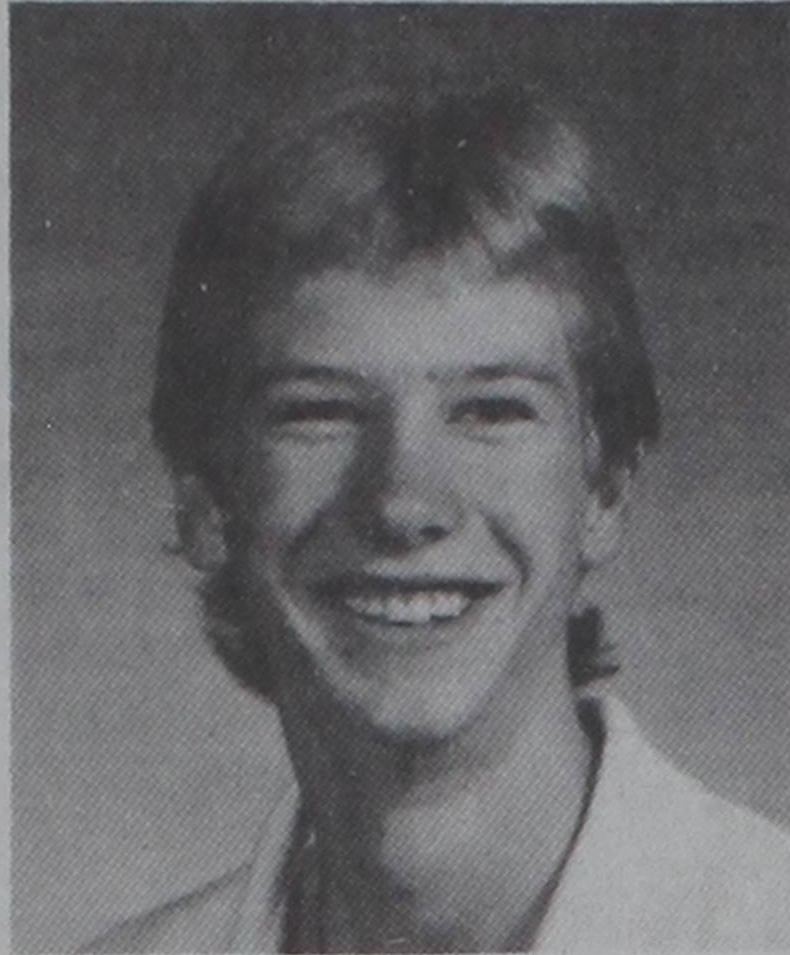

Consumer Groups Storm Local Grocery Stores!

Stores point finger at newspaper

Today saw one of the largest consumer responses of the week to offers made by local grocery stores for discounted prices. Across the city, shoppers were redeeming coupons cut from the local paper in record numbers.

"We know any offer we make will be highlighted most by the newspaper," commented a grocery store spokesman. "Our goal is simply to inform the consumers that these discounts are available. We are confident they will respond if they see it in the paper." His statement was backed by recent Consumer Data Service reports that indicated grocery store ads triple volume on discounted items and double volume on regularly priced items. It also revealed grocery ads are read by well over 70% of newspaper readers.

Grocery store representatives unanimously agreed that newspaper advertising was the only way to get immediate consumer response. One grocer remarked, "Most people read the paper, and a bunch of those readers clip our coupons. It's that simple." His comments reflect the well known Manufacturer's Coupon Center report which stated that over 80% of all families use coupons.

"When consumers want more for their money, they always go to the

Module XX: Confidential Information Is The Key To Your Protection

Whenever an investor opens an account with a member firm of the New York Stock Exchange, NYSE, some personal background information is requested. Although the questions may seem unimportant or unrelated to the transaction, they're designed for the customer's protection.

The daily business of registered representatives and their member firms is governed by Rules 401 and 405 of the NYSE. In the publication, *Patterns of Supervision*, the NYSE states that it requires "adherence to the principles of good business practice...and the use of due diligence in learning the essential facts relative to every customer, every order and every account."

These rules may sound vague, but their application is specific. Member firms are responsible for the actions of their representatives. Therefore, each firm makes every effort to ensure that their representatives "know their customers."

Some customers don't want investment assistance and require only that their orders be executed properly and that payment or delivery of securities be made as required. Others, however, depend on a full-service broker for information and suggestions. The NYSE doesn't distinguish between these types of customers when requiring information for accounts.

In order for the representative to make informed and intelligent suggestions, he or she must be aware

of the financial responsibilities and investment objectives of his or her customers.

When a registered representative opens an account, the stated investment objective must be consistent with the customer's age, investment experience and financial condition. This objective, or objectives, must be specifically recorded and no subsequent purchases may violate them.

The NYSE regularly inspects and audits its member firms. If transactions within an account are contrary to the customer's investment objectives, severe penalties may be imposed on the representative, the firm and the firm's manager.

NYSE Rule 405 is more specific. The rule is basically threefold. It encompasses due diligence, approval of new accounts and supervision of accounts.

Due diligence requires that the representative "learn the essential facts relative to every customer" prior to opening an account. The manager, or other firm officer, then approves or rejects the account application based on its completeness, accuracy and suitability.

Finally, each account must regularly be reviewed and updated. Significant changes in a customer's condition, including financial condition, investment objectives, dependents and occupation, must be noted on the account.

The NYSE suggests more than 25 questions for the representative to ask customers. This confidential information allows the representative to better serve customers in meeting their financial objectives.
