Heritage Group Talks Of Overall Park Plan

THE STATE Legislature convened this week in Austin, and lawmakers are faced with a critical problem.

The problem isn't necessarily new: lack of money. This time around, however, the solution may cause lawmakers more than a little concern.

The legislature is aware that many parts of the state are in a depressed condition, due to the collapse of the oil and gas industry. And the bad situation in agriculture leaves this portion of the state not far behind in the "woe" category.

Local and county officials already have agonized over the tax situation, as was evidenced here last summer when the new evaluation procedure was established. With income down, taxpayers are understandably cautious about the tax situation.

State comptroller Bob Bullock pointed out this week that the big problem facing lawmakers is a \$5.8 billion deficit in the state budget. This amounts to about 15 per cent of the current budget total, and Bullock warns that you cannot cut everything 15 per cent across the board without doing serious damage to the responsibilities of state government.

The deficit amounts to more than will be brought in by the state sales tax in one year, and more than will be raised through the state's franchise tax and oil and gas taxes over the next two years, so it is a serious problem.

Bullock says the state's current tax structure leans too heavily on the oil and gas industry, and that the only way to deal with the problem is to broaden the state's tax base. The state official has predicted a tax collection decline of 2.9 per cent for 1988-89, the first revenue drop in the state in 30 years.

One of the proposals to help the state's budgetary problems is that of creating a state lottery. Bills have already been introduced to create such a lottery. Backers say a state lottery would bring the state up to \$600 million a year in a "painless" tax, a program in which those taking part do so willingly.

But the lottery question is bound to face a lot of debate before it is passed. Lawmakers will be hesitant to pass such a program that deviates somewhat from the state's historically conservative outlook.

However, desperate times may dictate desperate measures.

In addition to the budget problems, the legislature has a number of items that will demand a lot of their time.

These include prison reform. Texas is being faced with a possible \$24 million a month fine due to failure to complete numerous reforms such as increased capacity and additional guards. This week, the state penitentiary in Huntsville had virtually reached its capacity.

Also, higher education will receive a lot of priority. Lieutenant governor Bill Hobby thinks budget cuts made earlier may have severely damaged the state institutions of higher learning.

Public education also will come into its share of discussion. A major item will once again be the "no pass, no play" rule. Governor-elect Bill Clements favors rolling back the suspension period from six weeks to three weeks.

All in all, it bids to be a busy and important session for state lawmakers. And, with all of the business they have to conduct, some observers are predicting even now that it won't all be completed without a special session after the conclusion of the regular legislative session.

The Community Heritage Society of Friona held their annual meeting Thursday evening, January 15 at the Bank Community Room for the purpose of electing new officers and board members and discussing future and immediate plans for the renovation of the old Santa Fe depot building.

Lois Norwood was elected president, with Carri Tatum as vice president, Mary Johnston as secretary, Diane Tatum as treasurer and Carol Ellis as reporter.

Board members are Allo Reeve, Beth Thompson, Debbie Smith, Joe Tongate, Peggy Monroe, Ilene

Osborn and Ann Nichols. Beelee Goodwin, who is retiring from the board, will serve in an ex-officio capacity.

Goodwin presented to the group a park plan which was drawn for the city by the State Department of Parks and Wildlife. The feasibility of applying for a grant for the beautification of the park was discussed. The park plan includes walkways, lamp posts, playground areas and picnic areas.

It was reported that electricity and water have been hooked up to the depot building since its removal to its permanent new site on the city park. A termite

inspection has been made and the building was pronounced structurally sound with nary a termite to be found.

The immediate plans for renovation include replacing the broken glass windows and sealing around the bottom edge of the building with metal siding and dirt.

Painting the exterior and replacing the chimney will be scheduled as soon as weather permits.

June Rhodes and Diane Tatum will head up a committee in charge of getting the inside of the building cleaned up. Carrie Tatum and Peggy Monroe were appointed to head the money making committee.

The Heritage Society boasts approximately 100 members at the present time. Anyone who is interested in seeing the depot renovated and made into the city park's showplace, should consider the \$5.00 membership. The fee can be deposited with Peggy Monroe at Friona State Bank or mailed to Mary Johnston, secretary, at Box 831 in Friona.

Any groups or individuals who are interested in donating their labor, time, supplies, etc. for the purpose of the depot renovation are asked to contact the group's president Lois Norwood at Ethridge-Spring Agency. A city-wide work day will be set up and announced as soon as spring weather offers better working conditions.

Memorial donations are still being accepted by the Heritage Society. Peggy Monroe at Friona State Bank handles the memorials for the group.

Three Seats Expiring On Council

Three seats will be expiring on the Friona City Council this April. Signup for the city election will begin Monday, January 19, and continue through February 18. The election is April 4.

Winter Storm Rattles Area

The Friona area was hit by a winter storm which began Thursday, bringing snow and some of the coldest temperatures of the year to the area.

After experiencing spring-like temperatures during the first part of the week, when high readings flirted with the 70-degree mark, the mercury began to fall on Wednesday as a Pacific front cleared the way for the approaching Arctic mass.

Thursday's high temperature was only 32 degrees, and residents awoke on Friday to a low reading of 15 degrees, with about three inches of snow. The snow was hard

to measure, due to the brisk north wind that blew steadily. About two inches were received in the local area.

With the wind, Amarillo's weather bureau had calculated the chill factor at -20 degrees early Friday.

Local schools were winding up their semester tests, and held classes on schedule on Friday. However, Monday will be a holiday, since it is a teacher work day.

The latest snowfall once again called a halt to the extended cotton and sugar beet harvest.

City Receives First Check On Rebates

The City of Friona will receive a check this week in the amount of \$5,106.59, which represents their monthly portion of the sales tax rebate.

The payment corresponds with a check for \$5,726.89 the city received at a similar date a year earlier, a drop of 10.8 per cent.

County municipalities received checks for \$7,519.66. This was down by \$979.59, or 11.5 per cent, from the \$8,499.25 they had received on the same date in 1986.

Parmer County's receipts compared favorably with most neighboring counties. Bailey County, for example, was down 12.9 per cent, and Castro County 11.1 per cent, from the same period a year ago.

Comptroller Bob Bullock said the state overall showed a decline of nine per cent.

The January checks represented taxes collected on sales made in November and reported to the Comptroller by December 20.

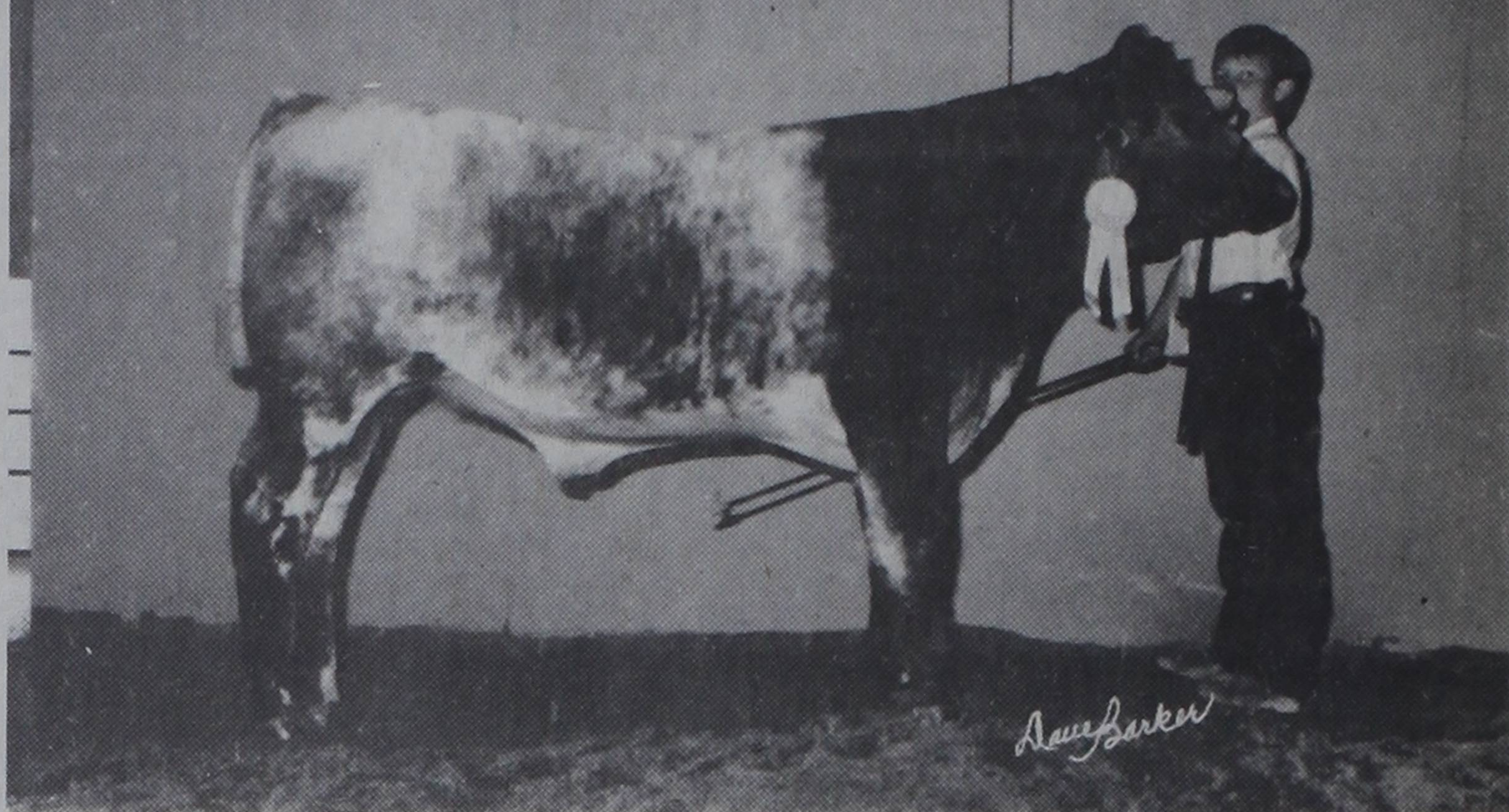

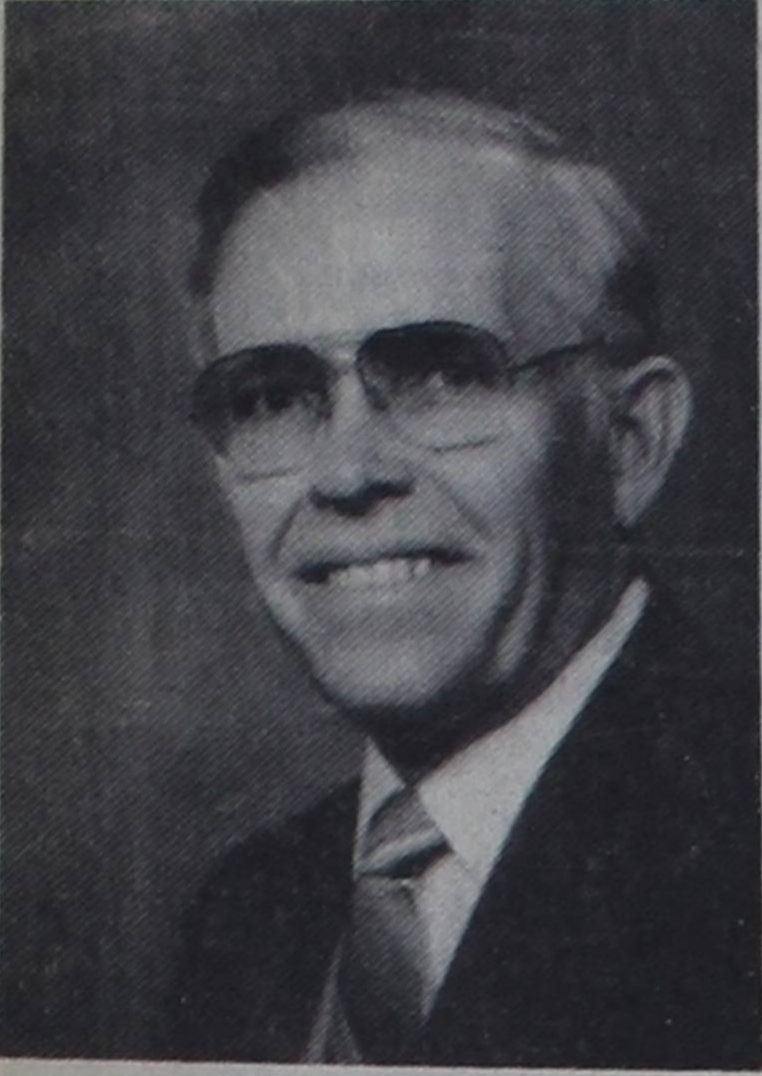

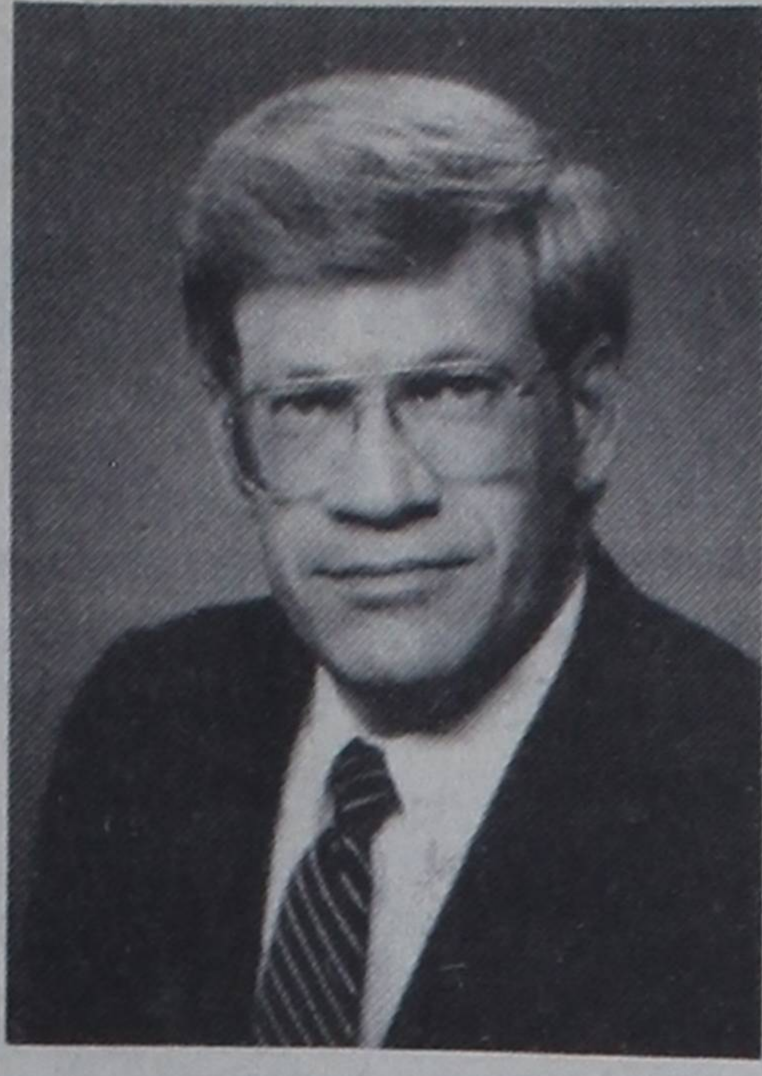

Hamilton, Smith Promoted By SPS

The Board of Directors of Southwestern Public Service Company (SPS) has elected Henry H. Hamilton and Albert A. "Pete" Smith as vice presidents of the Company.

Hamilton, 48, was named vice president of production. Smith, 42, was named vice president of generation plant design and construction.

Hamilton was born in Carlsbad, N.M. He received his bachelor's degree in mechanical engineering from New Mexico State University. He is a veteran of the U.S. Army.

He joined SPS in 1963 as a plant engineer at Cunningham Station power plant near Hobbs, N.M. He has been plant manager at Cunningham, at Nichols Station near Amarillo, and at Harrington Station near Amarillo. In 1976 he was named production superintendent; he was promoted to group manager of production in 1977; he was promoted to manager of production in 1985. He had been director of production since January 1986.

Hamilton is a member of the

Texas Society of Professional Engineers, the American Society of Mechanical Engineers and the Amarillo West Rotary Club.

Smith was born in Shamrock, Texas. He received his bachelor's degree in electrical engineering from Texas Tech University. He first worked for SPS in 1965 as a division engineer as part of the Company's summer intern program.

He began permanent employment in 1966 as a design engineer in generation plant design. He served in the U.S. Navy from 1969 to 1972, then rejoined SPS as a supervisory engineer in generation plant design. He later was promoted to senior engineer, principal engineer, manager of construction, and then manager of engineering, all within generation plant design. He became director of generation plant design and construction in January 1986.

Smith is a board member of Engineering Technology at Texas Tech University. He was a former Outstanding Young Engineer of the Year of the Panhandle chapter of the Texas Society of Professional Engineers.

Water Dist. Will Elect Directors

Two members to the Board of Directors of the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1 will be elected on January 17.

One board member will be elected from Directors' Precinct Three, which consists of all or part of Bailey, Castro and Parmer counties, and one member will be elected from Directors' Precinct Four, which consists of the portions of Armstrong, Deaf Smith, Potter and Randall counties that lie within the boundaries of the High Plains Water District's service area.

Incumbent A.W. "Webb" Guber of Farwell is running for re-election to Precinct Three, and incumbent Jim Conkright of Hereford is running for re-election to Precinct Four.

Registered voters residing within each of the Directors' Precincts are eligible to cast their ballot to elect the board member who will represent their interests in Water District activities during 1987.

The board members elected in January will serve a one-year term.

Board members elected in 1988 will serve a four-year term.

Absentee balloting for the 1987 election began December 29, 1986, and will continue through January 13, 1987. Absentee polling places will operate during the normal business hours of the balloting location. The absentee polling places in Parmer County for Directors' Precinct Three is the High Plains Water District office, 323 North Street, Bovina, Texas, with Pat Kunselman acting as clerk.

Election-day balloting locations will be open from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. on January 17.

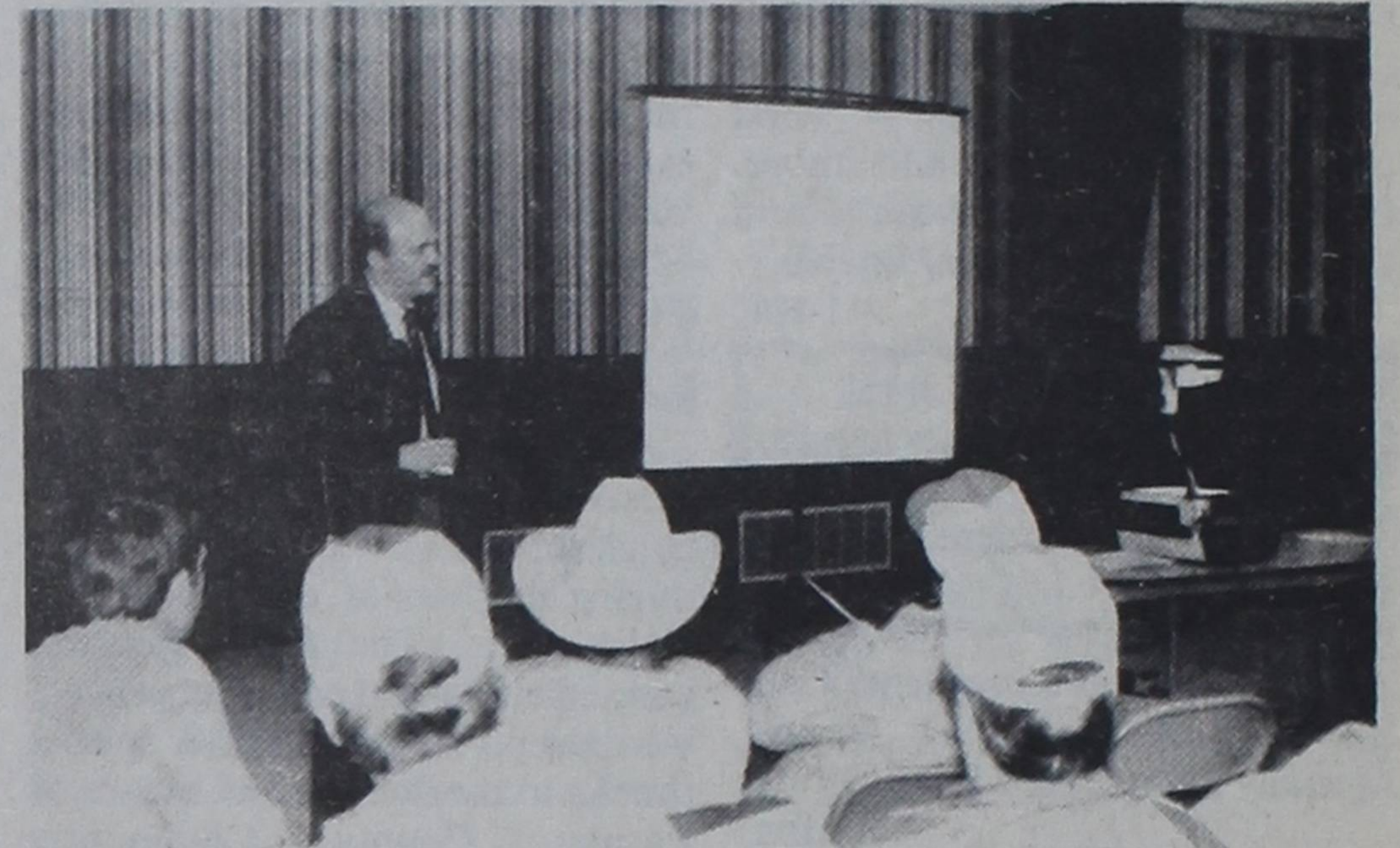

One of the casualties of the winter snowstorm that raked the area has been the junior high basketball tournament, which was scheduled for Friday and Saturday.

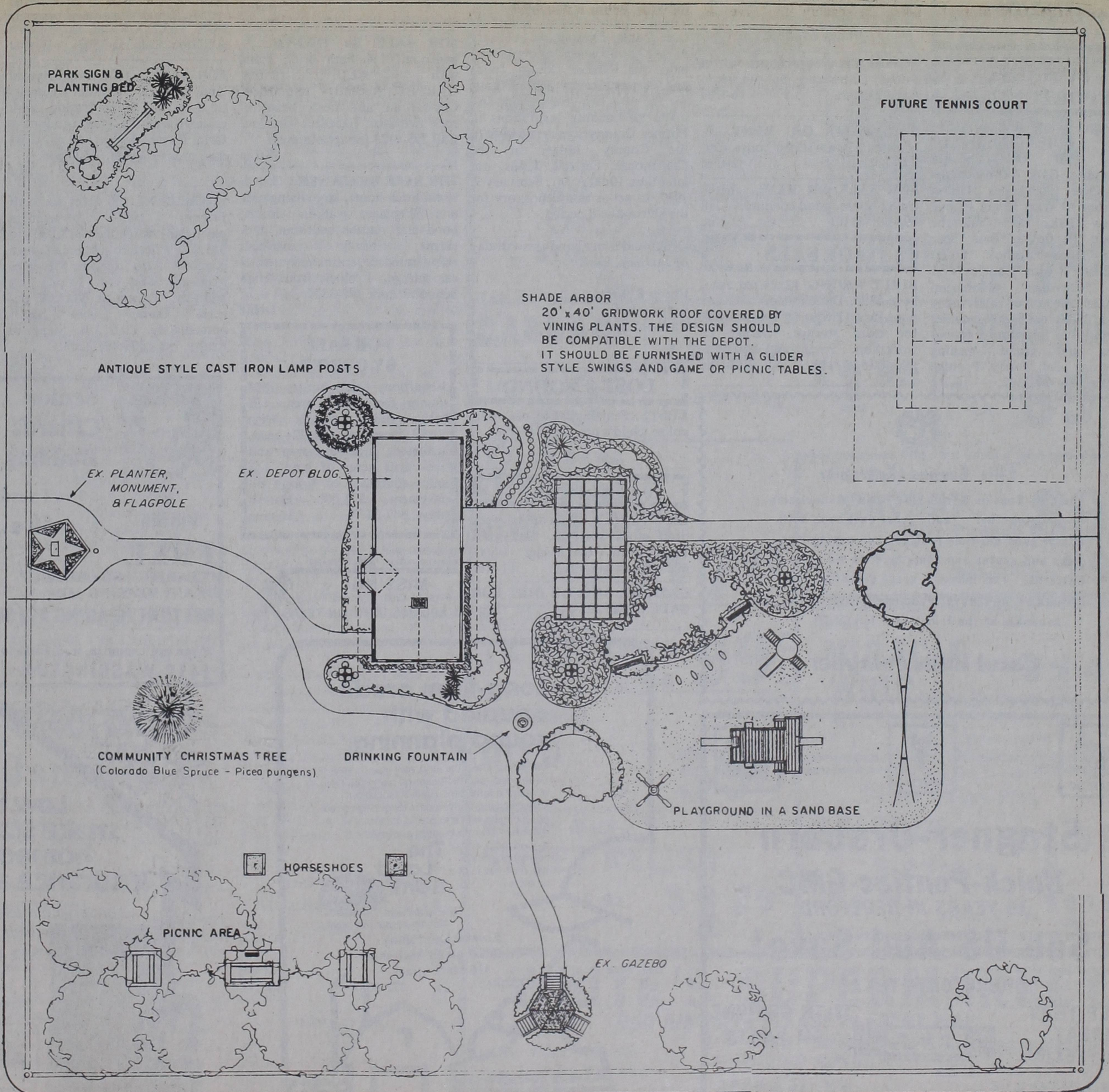

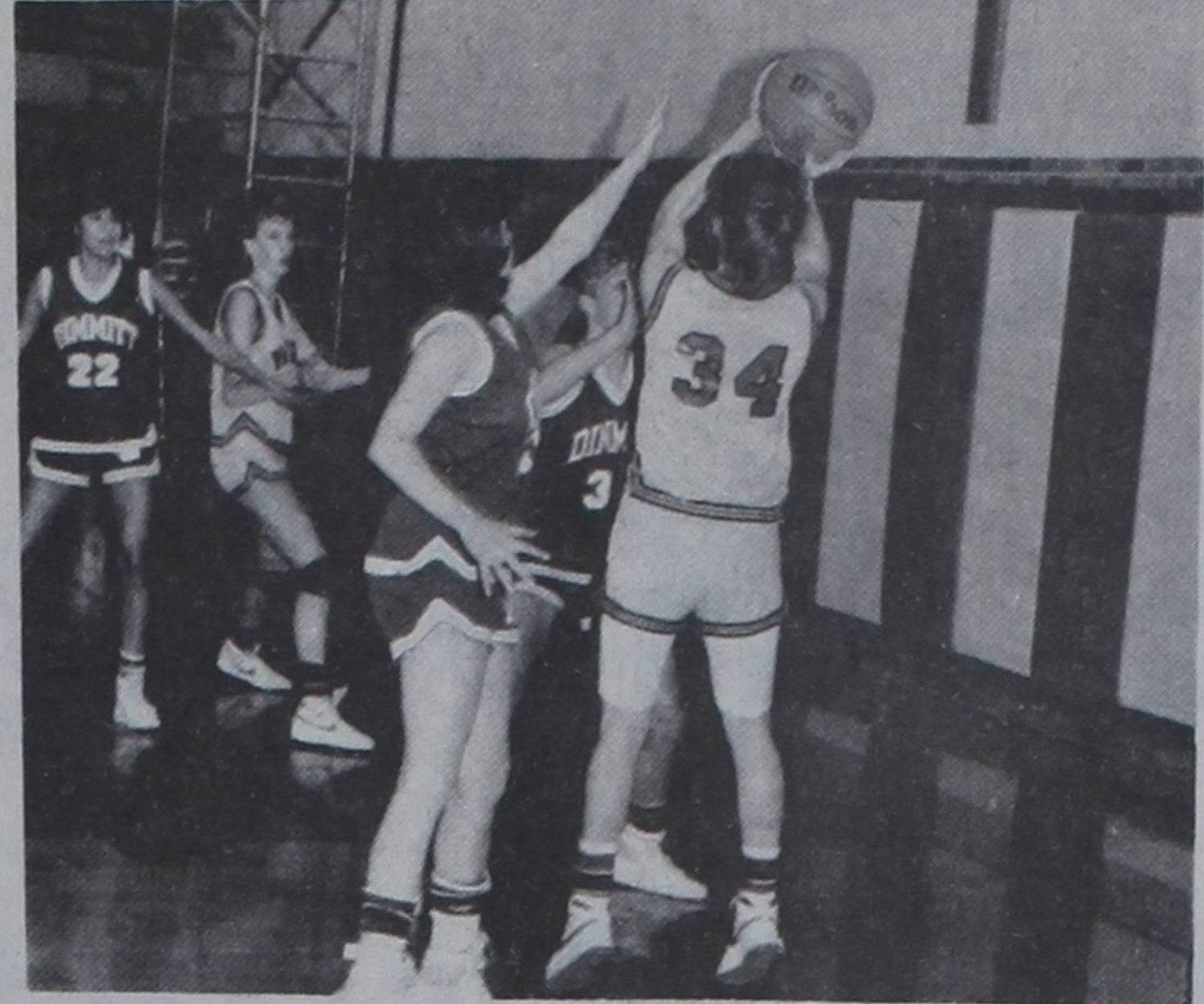
