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'Give him a chance,' defense pleads

# Sentencing of Curry delayed

Less than two months after the bizarre murders of a mother and son on a Howard County road, another tragedy, again involving a mother and son, occurred.

Jesse Packard Curry, indicted by a grand jury for the Father's Day slaying of his mother, went on trial for murder in 118th district court Mon-

Wednesday afternoon, the jury of six men and six women who had remained expressionless during two days of testimony, returned a verdict. They found the small 18-year-old not guilty of the charge on which he'd been indicted, but guilty of involuntary manslaughter.

The jurors had been given only one lesser choice of charges by District Judge Jim Gregg. Sentencing will be delayed, probably until after the Christmas holiday.
While Jesse was in court Wed-

nesday, his home, 2715 Central, was burglarized. He learned of the crime upon his return home at 5:30 p.m. Entry was gained through a garage door, sometime after 8 a.m., when Jesse left for his day in court.

Stolen were \$458 worth of goods, including a c.b. radio, cassette tape player, pocketknife, and bicentennial coin. Jesse told the police that he thought he knew who had robbed him during his absence.

The jury's verdict, returned at about 2 p.m., was unanimous, the judge was told. He called for a tenminute recess before the court reconvened to begin the punishment

Involuntary manslaughter is punishable with imprisonment of 2 to 10 years and a fine of up to \$5,000 if the jury so chooses, Gregg informed the jury. Since this was Curry's first felony conviction, the jury had the option of probating the sentence.

Wayne Basden, defense attorney, asked his client to take the stand and reminded him that he was still under oath. Jesse, who had quietly sat next to his 16-year-old bride, with no show of emotion from either while the verdict was read, said he understood

Basden asked Curry about his past record of criminal activities, a record limited to one brush with the law when Curry was arrested for drinking while Basden appealed for a probated sentence. He asked Curry if there was

anything he wanted to tell the jury.
"I need psychiatric help," Curry said, addressing the jury. "I can get this at the Big Spring State Hospital Outpatient Clinic, free of charge."

Jesse explained that he didn't have a job. He said that he redded. job. He said that he needed medicine to help him sleep at night and coun-

Under questioning from Basden, Curry said that his marriage to Sheri, a relationship that he had allegedly been trying to protect the night a gunshot resulted in the death of 50year-old Lillian Curry, had been helpful in dealing with his problems. 3

He revealed his plans to the jury. If the jurors saw fit to probate his sentence, he and his wife planned to move to Fort Worth and live in a mobile home on a lot of land that they owned there. The two intended to go to

work at a nuclear power plant. Sheri, he said, already had a job lined up. "I'd like a second chance to live a happy, normal life instead of a stormy, abnormal one," he told the

Through questioning Basden revealed that Curry had been so upset about the Father's Day shooting that he had been unable to discuss the case with Basden in order to help Basden

prepare a defense until six weeks ago. Basden told the court that the first time he tried to talk with Jesse, Jessue fell to the floor, got up and fell again. "He's suffering," Basden said.

Isn't that punishment enough?' Assistant District Attorney Don

Richard asked Curry about his employment record. Curry had worked for one to one-and-a-half months before the June 17 incident. Curry said he had sought help with sleeping difficulties from the state hospital

outpatient clinic after the incident. Still under oath, Curry told Richard that if he had been on probation since the time of his arrest for the shooting of his mother, he would have been a good probationer up until the present.

Then Richard began questioning Curry about some of the company he'd been keeping, specifically Darrel Martin, a convicted burglar, and Robert Ortega, who was arrested in July on suspicion of aggravated assault and released on bail.

# Why does child abuse happen?

EDITORS NOTE: This is the second of a three part series on child abuse

It is then up to the Department of Human Resources (DHR) to determine whether it is a legitimate

An average of 30 referrals a month are made to the DHR in Howard County and approximately 10 percent of those are legitimate, according to

Tom Hosier, child protective supervisor in Midland. "Many of the referrals are value judgments from neighbors, family disputes and overdiscipline," he says. "Sometimes the overdiscipline is not a systematic type of abuse. Maybe the child was spanked too hard. It usually

doesn't happen again. 'But no matter what the referral is. we have to conduct an investigation to see if a problem exists and deal with

"Our job is to protect the child, and strengthen the child parent relationship," he continued. "Infants can break a physical tie, but the older kids can't break the emotional tie. No matter what happens, it's hard to break the emotional tie. We can help give up the parents, but we can't help emotionally. No matter how seriously they've been injured, it's still their

Why does child abuse happen? "Ineffective parenting," says Hosier. "There is a lack of parental skills, stress, financial or marital problems, a tendency to take it out on the kids and frustration. To take out the frustrations on kids is easy. They can't defend themselves.

According to Louis Thorp, continuing education worker with the DHR in Midland, "everyone is a potential child abuser. If a child has colic for three days and he's been crying and your nerves are ready to go at any little thing, it's a real emotion, no matter how stable you

Cindy Gwin, protective care worker with the DHR in Big Spring says the main function of the department is to maintain the family and the home.

'We use county resources such as the Homemaker Service. We put the homemaker in the home so as not to remove the kids. If there's anyway possible to keep the child in the home we do it.

"We can put a homemaker in the home if, say, a mother has to go in the hospital. The homemaker can stay up to 96 hours. That gives us time to find relatives," she said.

Determining whether a child is abused or neglected is difficult.

"The doctor makes the decision on whether a child can be categorized as a Failure to Thrive Child, where the child is not thriving or would be dying.

"It's based somewhat on the weight of the child, and the child's responses. He may not notice you in the room. We go by psychiatric evaluations and physicians' reports.

"If a parent has a child not respond-ing, he is taken to the doctors for testing. The pediatrician gives extensive testing. We need to know if the child is normally this way of if there's

something wrong. The DHR defines abuse as "nonaccidental infliction or threat of infliction of physical injury or emotional or mental damage to a child by a person responsible for the child's health or welfare. Abuse is usually corroborated by medical, psychiatric, or psychological personnel. Example of abuse include burns, fractures, bruises, welts, sprains, exploitation, confinement, poisoning, exposure, starvation, malnutrition, sexual

attention, etc. Child neglect is defined by the Department as a "person responsible for the child's health or welfare nonaccidentally depriving a child of the life necessities which provide the minimally adequate physical and emotional requirements for life, growth, and development. Examples of neglect include inadequate food, inadequate housing and clothing, lack of needed medical attention, abandonment, lack of supervision or guidance, unmet educational needs, inadequate hygiene, etc.''

Last year, in the state of Texas. 15,770 cases of child abuse and neglect were handled by the DHR. The Midland-Odessa office which overs 17 counties including Big Spring, handled 604 cases.

From that figure, natural mothers were responsible for over half the abuse or neglect cases, with natural fathers being the second largest group to commit these acts.

Bruises were the number one result of abuse, with emotional abuse and sexual abuse following. According to Texas state law, not

reporting a case of abuse or neglect is misdemeanor, punishable by a fine of not more than \$1,000 or a confinement in prison for not more than 180

'What I determine as to abuse or neglect is the needs of the child, if the child is in a situation which is dangerous to them," says Cindy

"It's not necessarily how the child is dressed. But if he has just a diaper on in the middle of the winter and is sitting outside, that's neglect. It's neglect if he doesn't get needed

medical attention. Also, it's neglect if he isn't bathed in a week and has contracted impetigo. According to Gwin, a determination

has to be made as to whether the child has been abused or disciplined. "We ask, does it cover one area of the body? Is the abuse systematic or evasive? And where is the bruise on the body? A cigarette burn doesn't necessarily mean abuse. It could just be neglect. The burn could have been an accident.

"Any person is capable of abusing or neglecting their children," says Tom Hosier "It isn't limited to a social or economic group. It depends on how he or she is dealing with stress

"It could be marital problems, a single mother maybe having problems with her boyfriend, trouble with a job, frustrations. Basically, it's the stress of the individual and how they deal with it.

"Statistically, where a child has been abused, chances are, he'll the role model," he continued. "They remember what their parents did and overdo that. They use the same discipline, but impose excessive punishment. They have a poor self

How does child abuse start? "It's like excessive drug or alcohol abuse. It's a lack of emotional support of the stable parent. He starts out as a social drinker and alcoholism is a long way down the line. It takes a number of years to realize it's a problem and then the family tends to cover it up.

"In a high mobile or transient society, families become isolated. They have no friends or family in the area. Pressures become worse. I know of one social worker who is an abusive parent, so it can happen to anyone.

According to Hosier, less than three percent of the DHR caseload end up as removals from the parents' home. The reasons for the removals are chronic disorders, chronic alcoholism, psychotic personalities, long term neglect, and abuse over a period of years.

If the child cannot be put with a relative, he is usually placed in foster "Anytime you take a child out, it's hard on the kid to be put in a foster home," says Gwin, "The child has lived with this situation for years. The child cries out for his mama. In a case where a daughter has been the victim of incest, it's difficult taking her out of the home. She feels 'Why should I be taken out of the house if I didn't do anything wrong?'"

"Depending on what the situation is we contact neighbors, visitors to the home and doctors to determine if it's abuse, neglect or a value judgment.

"I've seen where the mother is a prostitute, but they're taken better care of than a lot of other homes," she said. "They're loved and well taken care of. We may not like their lifestyle, but that's where the value judgments come in.'

'We try to look for foster parents who are stable, and emotionally and financially comfortable in their

lives." says Hosier. "But the homes of foster parents are under standards and guidelines that must be followed. standards is cause to have the foster license taken away." "It depends on the severity and what we can do about correcting deficiencies. In five years of working with Protective Care, I don't know of any foster parents abusing a child.

"That doesn't mean it doesn't happen. Foster parents are just like anyone else with the same pressures. Without support, they can become abusive. We have had children die in foster parent care. But I've never had any contact with it.

Who abuses a child? "Anyone can be an abuser," says Hosier. "It doesn't matter about their professions or income brackets. Anyone can

"People think it happens in just lower income families, but that's a myth. They're just more visable to the agencies involved. They're visible to health service agencies because of the lower economic situation. Folks don't like to report wealthier people.

There is a tendency to project expertise because a person has a skill in one particular field. They think they should be good parents but they're not. Anyone can be an abuser. Just because they're good in a field

does not mean they have it all together as a parent

'The community sees abuse of a child as an horrendous act by someone less than human," he continued. "The feelings are children should be removed right away. They sometimes are, but people seldom see it through a child's frightened eyes.

'We don't want to create a dependency with the parents unless they're incapable. It's a resource problem. We have certain resources and it's up to the family to use them. We can't solve their problems. According to Hosier, there are several ways to identify an abused child. "The easiest way, is by physical evidence," he explained. "Emotional abuse is a lot more difficult. In many cases they're withdrawn and fearful. The child doesn't develop normally. They have emotional dwarfism. A child of seven or eight may have the physical development of a three-year-old, but may be eight years old developmentally. Sometimes we can determine this through a physical examination.

"In other children it's sometimes hard to tell between the parents and children. If a child is delinquent, do

we blame the parents?' A severely abused child withdraws or has an introverted behavior to protect themselves, according to

Louis Thorp. They fear their parents, so they withdraw so their feelings aren't expressed. They become invisible to avoid being hurt. They withdraw from the parents and the world.

"A less severely abused child retaliates,,says Thorp. He gets hyperactive, demanding to be seen and heard. This is done in an excessive and consistent pattern.

"But not every abused child falls into a category." "Some fall into both. And not every child who acts this way is abused

'Everyone loses,' he continued. 'There is damage anyway we go. We have to figure out what is the least damaging way to help. We have the conflict between what is best for the parent or child. There are no easy answers. There's always damage and suffering.

Thorp explained the patterns child abusers take.

The psychotic parent is the hardest to deal with and the chances of helping him become non-abusive are slim.

'The person with psychosis, is one who has a great deal of difficulty staying in touch with reality," he said. "They're sick. They abuse a child for their own needs.

"It's not to discipline them, it's to get something out of it. They don't necessarily enjoy it though they sometimes do. It's something they want to do. 'What makes it so difficult to work

with these people is they feel better about what they do. They have low self-esteems and they try to achieve something around it. They have a lack

slim chance of rehabilitation. This type of parent is the mother raising the child herself with no support from her husband and no extended family in the area.

The passive aggressive parent is one who abuses the child in a subtle

"This type of abuser may starve a child, or a person who knowingly puts his child in danger," Thorp explained. "For instance, a child may be put in the bathtub and the parent would walk away knowing the child is too small to be by himself

"The passive aggressive parent could strike the child but would rather take the angle of more subtle abuse. The reason they usually do it is competition between the kid and parent for attention. That's why sometimes one child in the family will be abused and others in the same family aren't. Prognosis on this type is not overly good. They can be helped but it's hard because it's ingrained into them to neglect their children this

The next category is the compulsive disciplinarian. "This person is easy to spot," says Thorp. "His most common expression is 'That's the way my daddy raised me and that's the way I'm going to raise my kid.

"The attitudes stay the same in a case like this, but the parent can be rehabilitated to be non-abusive. They respond positively to authority so we have to take on an authoritative position. They'll use denial. They'll swear it's an accident.

The impulsive parent is one who is adequate but stress forms in the home over a period of time. "In this, we help them see they are taking it out on the

kids. We have a chance in helping them with their problems.

"Parents with an identity role conflict is a case of someone who lost his job, an amputee or a mother supporting the family. In this case, it could be taken out on the kids.

"Sexual abuse is very prevalant in society," Thorp continued. "The roles are screwed up. He's a Mr. Milktoast outside the house. In the home, he becomes a tyrant. If we find out a 15year-old girl has been sexually abused, then it's been going on awhile. And the mother nearly always knows it's going on.

'We can't overreact. Our job is to help people. We don't always have to yank the kid out of the home or put the father in jail.

"It's against the law not to report an abuse or neglect," says Gwin. "It can be reported by just an address or a license plate number. Confidentiality is guaranteed to informers, family and children. We can also accept anonymous complaints.

"If a child dies, I'm to report it immediately to the district attorney or the police department. Incest is against the law. It's a criminal act and I'm required to report it. If I have any questions, I contact law en-

According to Thorp, abuse and neglect is a value judgment. "The laws in Texas are vague on what constitutes abuse or neglect. But we would rather have 10 reported and unsubstantiated cases than one that slips by and the child dies two weeks

"We're 100 percent human beings.

# Change in blood donor requirements announced

A change inblood donor at United Blood Services in requirements means that more people are now eligible to donate blood, according to an announcement made by United Blood Services. People taking drugs for high blood pressure or people on medication to reduce retention of sodium or water (diuretics) formerly were deferred from donating blood, but now they will be accepted if they meet the other donor requirements.

Concern for the donor's safety was the reason these particular people were deferred in the past. But studies completed recently

Albuquerque, determined there was no adverse reaction to donors taking these medications.

All prospective blood donors are carefully in-terviewed about their medical history and current health, including their medications, before each donation. This helps assure there will be no harmful effect on either the donor or the recipient of the blood.

This recent change in donor qualifications is important because more people are needed to share the responsibility for meeting area blood needs.

"Are you forgetting about the night of the Jet Drive-In?" Richard asked, referring to a fight involving some of

Jesse explained that he had seen the trouble coming and had walked away from it. That wasn't the point, Richard said. "You were with people who can put

you into situations like that." Jesse said he wanted to start fresh in Fort Worth. "I plan to have good,

upstanding friends. Under further examination from

Basden, Curry was told "If you're granted probation, there's no other chances. This is your last chance. No other chances

"Is he a bad person?" Basden asked Curry's wife after she took the stand. 'No." she said. She described him

as "a sweet and honest person." Basden asked if she thought he was sincere. She said he was. She also stated that his problems, stemming from an apparently traumatic child hood and early youth, had improved since their marriage.
"Do you love him?" Basden asked.

"Yes," she said, adding quietly 'very much.'

Sheri returned to her place beside Jesse, displaying signs of nervousness, biting her nails, when Richard rose to address the jury.
"The problem we have with

probation in a case like this," he said, is the value of a human life." The prosecution could not recommend probation, he said. "The terms allow a person to lead almost the same kind of life as you do," he told the jury. The kind of strain in the environ-

ment that Jesse had come from and had caused the jurors to select a lesser verdict, he said, "is not going to be cured by a couple of out-patient This young man needs to be taken

apart and put back together again,' he continued, telling the jury that that kind of in-depth treatment was available at Huntsville. "You know he won't be put in with hardened criminals

"Huntsville is the only guarantee that he will be rehabilitated," Richard concluded.

"I am surprised," Basden said to the jury, accusing the prosecution of being too harsh in its demand for imprisonment. He reminded the jurors that they

had found Jesse guilty of recklessly causing death and that the charge of involuntary manslaughter did not warrant the penitentiary. "One accidental discharge of a firearm that caused death," Basden

called it. "Is it Jesse Curry's fault?"

"He's only had problems with one person," he stated, reminding them that that person, his mother, cannot pose any more difficulties for him. Richard, he said, was not telling the true side of prison.

"There's probably less chance of Curry ever committing another crime than anyone here," he stated. "What good would it be to put him in the penitentiary with known felons and criminals? Does he need more punishment?

Do you need a penitentiary to reform Curry or a normal healthy home life?" he asked the jury. "He needs help and freedom. Give Jesse a

Richard took the floor once again. He told the jurors that the defense was using the defendant's young age and the theory that Curry had never had a chance to make his own decisions as an argument for probation.

"At age 16, he made a firm decision to fight back," stated Richard, reminding the jurors that the for-merly abused child had in turn abused his mother. "And he made a second firm decision — to have that young girl over there," he said, pointing to Sheri.

Jesse wouldn't leave home in order to have her, Richard said, because that would mean giving up "his playthings." He told the jurors about Jesse's bedroom, furnished with a c.b.

"He decided he was going to shoot his mother four inches from the

During testimony Tuesday, Curry had been asked why he shot his mother. During that testimony, he had said 'Don't you see?'

Indicating that that was Curry's excuse for his action, Richard said, "He's quite capable of saying again 'Don't you see? I had to. That person was in my way.'"

He's already violated probation,
Richard said. "His mind is not con-

Asking for the full sentence of imprisonment, Richard said "He needs to see what's required of him in society ... if not as a deterrent to other

offenders, how about other victims?' Assuming that the jurors had found Jesse guilty of involuntary man-slaughter rather than murder because they believed he was ill. Richard said that they must remember that he was

ill when they set sentence.

He asked for the full ten year's imprisonment. "Ten is precious little in this case," he concluded. During the next two hours, there

were obvious problems for the jury in setting sentence for Jesse. Several times, the foreman stepped out of the jury room, requesting information from the judge. The bailiff, Sheriff Deputy Milton Kirby, instructed the foreman on the proper procedures of writing the questions out.

The jurors were hopelessly dead-locked, 10 to 2. Reportedly, one juror wanted to sentence Curry to the maximum 10 years in prison. Another wanted to release him. The jury passed notes out of the jury room to Judge Gregg, telling him that

the jury was hung. The information caused Basden to advise Curry to withdraw his request for the jury to set punishment. It was nearly 5 p.m.. Sentencing will be set by Judge Gregg at an undetermined time, following an investigation by District Adult Probation Officer Guy Talbot to

aid Gregg in determining what the

punishment should be. Basden said it would be determined if Curry needs psychiatric help. During his investigation, Talbot will also look into the availability of psychiatric help in the Fort Worth area where Curry intends to move if his sentence is probated.

# Dallas police to pay for actions

Dallas may have to pay as much as \$5.7 million in back salaries because a federal judge ruled hat the Dallas police department discriminated against hiring blacks.

Attorney Kenneth Molberg estimated it would take at least a year to prepare arguments on the damage phase of the class action suit ruled on Tuesday by U.S. District Judge Patrick Higgin-

Judge Higginbotham's decision on the class action suit affects between 1,500 and 2,000 black applicants rejected by the department from August of 1973 to December of 1978, the attorney

The suit was filed on behalf of Brenda Davis, a black, and Javne Durbin a white claiming the department discriminated

against blacks and women in its hiring practices.

Of the 2.023 officers currently on the force, 130 are women and 106 are black, according to police department spokesman Bob

"Our numbers and percentages indicate we've not been standing still since 1972 (in hiring blacks and women)," Shaw said. He said both categories had increased more than 100 percent over the past seven years. Higginbotham said in his

decision the department offered no explanations for the disparity in hiring blacks "except generalized "statements" about blacks' reluctance to engage in, police work because of their attitude toward the man.

"Apart from its typecasting bias," he said, "that argument blinks at the reality of the

numbers of blacks that did apply The question of why blacks have disparately failed has not been answered.

But the judge said he found no evidence of bias toward hiring women by the department during the period mentioned in the suit. The judge set no date for

arguments on the damage phase of the lawsuit. "At this point, each member of the class (represented by the suit) is entitled to back pay and reinstatement," Molberg said, adding the number of applicants affected probably will decrease

The lawyer said rejected applicants who have taken another job would only be entitled to the difference in current pay and money they would have

before arguments are brought to

received from the police department. Applicants making more money than they would have as officers would not be entitled to back pay.

"A rough estimate (of the amount involved) would be between \$2.7 and \$5.7 million, but it might very well be more,' Molberg said.

The attorney said he offered to limit the city's liability to \$1 million during pre-trial negotiations, but that figure became moot when no settlement was reached.

The method of figuring back pay also must be decided, he and could include promotional raises during the fiveyear period.



# There's no need for special session

Reports from Austin say that Gov Bill Clements is still toying with the idea of calling a special session of the state legislature. Originally committed to a date early next year, it appears now that Clements will not have the legislative troops back in Austin at least until April. If he reasons his party's chances in the upcoming election could be enhanced, he could even wait until later in the year

Clements is hung up on the idea of initiative and referendum as a reason for a special session. If you're unfamiliar with the terms, they would frame legislation enabling voters to propose changes in the law.

THE IDEA OF a special session doesn't excite the man on the street. If you talk to the average man on the street, he says that whenever the

will cost him in some way - likely as not through increased taxes. There are some who even subscribe to the theory that it would be better if the legislature met only once every five

Initiative and referendum, and the other items on Clements' shopping list (like wiretapping), were considered by the legislature during the regular session, and they failed. The same elective officers would sit in judgment in a special session. What leads Gov. Clements to believe they would change their minds?

That adds up to wasted effort something that invariably costs the taxpayers money. The lack of accomplishment could cost Clements own party dearly in the elections ahead, since the voters will recall that

the idea for a special session came from the governor's mansion in the first place

As bad as the prospect is of underwriting with public funds the building of a GOP platform, the passage of initiative and referendum would be even worse.

Already groups as diverse as Texas 13 - a taxpayer organization advancing under the banner of California Proposition 13 idea — and the Texas AFL-CIO are mapping plans for referendum drives if the idea is approved. Texas 13 has designs on amending the Texas Constitution to satisfy its own desires to limit taxation. Labor is set to propose a corporate profits tax and a rollback of mortgage interest maximums.

Those may sound like attractive proposals, but they are not the sort of thing which should be decided in an

emotional, largely uniform way strictly on their popular appeal. A lower ceiling on mortgage rates sounds good, for example — but what good would come if no money was available at that price? Similarly, everyone is for lowering taxes - but it can't be done less than destructively if expenditures are cut proportionately.

Initiative and referendum would invite not only those proposals, but an infinite number of others, no matter how off-the-wall. The opportunity for capricious damage to the state, its favorable economic climate and the lives of its citizens is infinite.

Hopefully, the governor will change his mind. There is no reason why he couldn't wait until the next regular session of the legislative before again running his pet projects up the flagpole. If he persists, there can be nothing but losers among us.

If it wasn't so pitiful, it would be funny. Smokers may forget wallets and car keys, but never cigarettes. My cigarettes and lighter are a permanent part of my body. Where I go, they go. If I go to the kitchen, so do they. If I go to bed, so do they.

Another method of quitting is based on making it difficult to smoke. By stashing smoking parahernalia in a high kitchen cupboard, for example, the smoker will go to the trouble of getting one only if he's foaming at the mouth. So, they say. But you have to remember that we're dealing with people who'd walk a mile for a Camel. What's a short climb to a kitchen cupboard?

**ANOTHER SURE METHOD** to quit smoking, this one conceived by a medical expert, is to carry a small graph with columns headed I through V. Whenever you smoke, you rate the cigarette according to how badly you really needed it.

A "I" would be a "just for the hell of it" cigarette while a "V" would be a 'smoke or kill' cigarette. With this method, I discovered I was smoking about 60 "smoke or kill" cigarettes a day. To quit might actually be to inflict harm on society.

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It's tragic that the scare of cancer is not enough to make me quit. The best reason I can relate to is the expense. The astronomical cost of this habit compounds financial difficulties while the financial difficulties create a desire to smoke even more, particularly around the middle of the month when all of the bills fall due.

Now there's a novel idea - the only one I haven't yet tried. If every one of my creditors agrees to not bill me for January, perhaps we can get a smokeless New Year off the ground. What do you say, guys?

DEAR DR. GRAHAM: Do you during the 1980s? It seems like the world is getting so bad that His second coming can't be far off. —

DEAR P.R.: No one knows when Christ will return again, and we should be careful about making any kind of prediction about this. Jesus Himself declared, "No one knows about that day or hour, not even the angels in heaven, nor the Son, but only the Father" (Matthew 24:36). He also stressed, "So you also must be ready, because the Son of Man will come at an hour when you do not expect him' (Matthew 24:44).

At the same time, however, we are told to be on guard and watchful, since the Bible does point out some of the signs which will indicate His coming. For example, the Bible tells us there

will be "wars and rumors of wars Nation will rise against nation, and kingdom against kingdom. There will famines and earthquakes in various places" (Matthew 24:6, 7). Another sign will be that the Gospel

will be preached in every corner of the world (Matthew 24:14) before Christ comes again. Certainly these things seem to be happening in our own day, and many Bible scholars believe the end of the world as we now know it may be very near.

While it is interesting to speculate when Christ will come again, you should not lose sight of two important truths. First, He will come again to establish His kingdom and rule. Second, until He comes we are to be busy seeking to be faithful to Him in our lives and witness. Therefore, I think it is important for every person who reads this to ask this question: Am I ready to meet Christ? Have I really committed my life to Him. trusting Him for my salvation and seeking to live for Him every day? 

Dear Dr. Donohue: My husband acquired intestinal flukes while in Vietnam. Eight years ago he was hospitalized and treated for them. I'm concerned because he occasionally still passes them from his system. He has not sought medical advice since his initial treatment. Could these stragglers be harmful? — Mrs. R.F.

I can hear the question: "What in the world is a fluke? Well, a fluke is a nasty little parasitic worm whose life cycle is so complicated that its survival in nature

is miraculous. Fluke eggs hatch in water. The newborns must then infect a snail for further development. After living for awhile in a snail they emerge and

attach to certain water plants. Such plants are a popular part of the diet in When these foods are eaten by a

human, the fluke appears as a fully mature adult in the intestines. It can cause diarrhea and produce small ulcers in the intestinal wall. Maybe it's called a fluke because of

this complex lifestyle, but I doubt that. It is a fluke that it survives. Your husband, if he thinks he is still

infected, should report to a Veterans Administration hospital. The stool will be examined for eggs. The adult fluke is almost never passed in the stool. Effective treatment is available.

# Fault intelligence

WASHINGTON - Top Carter administration officials are privately expressing anger at the third-rate intelligence information they have had to work with in the Iranian hostage crisis, and are trying to put the blame on past administrations.

It's understandable that the president and his national security adviser, Zbigniew Brzezirski, would try to picture themselves as the innocent reapers of a whirlwind sown by their predecessors. That way, Carter can also harvest the political windfall of the crisis without having to accept any responsibility for causing it.

UNFORTUNATELY FOR CAR-TER, it's a bum rap in many respects. While it's true that previous administrations, in their blind devotion to the shah, effectively handcuffed S. intelligence agents, it's also true that Carter and Brzezinski had two years to correct the situation.

Yet the Iranian revolution a year ago caught U.S. leaders by surprise either because our agents were providing inaccurate information, or their reports were being ignored by our policy makers.

Hardworking spies and analysts tried to regain the ground that had been lost over the years in the Iranian intelligent desert, and by midsummer they had succeeded at least in part. I've already reported how some intelligence and State Department experts earned, months before the event, that U.S. diplomats might be seized as hostages if the former shah were allowed into this country. But their warnings were ignored by Carter and Brzezinski.

Once the preventable disaster oc-curred and the Tehran embassy was seized, our long intelligence blackout in Iran has had serious consequences as Carter & Co. try to figure a way out of the mess they helped to create. The sad fact is, our intelligence agencies know practically nothing about the so-called students who have led the world to the brink of war by their

INTELLIGENCE SOURCES told my associate Dale Van Atta that they have been able to identify at least three separate "student" groups among the terrorist-captors of our embassy personnel. Footnote: During the years of the supposed blackout of U.S. intelligence on Iran, I was able to report that the shah was widely hated by his countrymen, and that his regime was ripe for overthrow. As far back as 1976 I reported from sources in the intelligence community that the shah was likely to be replaced by a violent revolutionary uprising. It now seems that what is being depicted as a lack of intelligence at the working level was instead the lack of a different kind of intelligence — at the top.

BALTIMORE (AP) — After seven years, Arthur Bremer, the man convicted of the crippling assassination attempt on former Alabama Gov. George Wallace, is no longer considered a maximum security risk and has been relocated to a less guarded facility.

Al Herndon, deputy state corrections commissioner said Wednesday that Bremer, who is serving a 63-year sentence for the May 1972 shooting, has made satisfactory progress and officials at the state penitentiary here believe 24-hour observation is no longer required. Bremer, 28, was moved recently to the Maryland Correctional Institution in Hagerstown.

## Shah's sister buys home

LOS ANGELES (AP) — The eldest sister of the deposed Shah of Iran has bought a home in Santa Barbara for \$1.5 million, apparently determined to live in California despite a violent protest that forced her to flee her Beverly Hills mansion last January, according to published reports.

The Los Angeles Herald Examiner said Wednesday that Princess Shams has ordered a year's worth of renovations to the 18-room home before moving in. It said the princess is believed to be living in Washington, D.C.

The princess and the shah's 90-year-old mother, Tadj Ul Moluk, were inside the Beverly Hills home when it was attacked by Iranian students.

# Texas still No. 1 oil, energy state

HOUSTON (AP) — Back in 1931, martial law was declared in the East Texas oil field when near chaos developed as a then gigantic surplus of oil dropped prices to 10

Today, most Texas fields have been producing for months at maximum or near maximum rates and some posted prices have skyrocketed above \$32 a barrel.

But the Texas output is far short of demand as the nation continues to wrestle with a long anticipated energy crunch that became a reality with the Arab oil embargo

And Texas is still the No. 1 oil and energy state despite a bit of image jolting in the decade of the 1970s

Alaska replaced Texas as the top-ranked state in proved crude oil reserves in 1975, and Louisiana, primarily because of federal offshore areas, took over as the leading natural gas producer in 1972.

Downward trends may dominate current Texas oil and gas statistics but all is not

State tax rates on production are keyed to wellhead value and soaring prices have more than offset production declines. Current revenues from oil and gas production dwarf those of a decade ago. Here is a thumbnail of the shifting trends

that developed within the decade: Texas proved crude oil reserves declined 46.9 percent from a record 14.4

billion barrels in 1967 to 7.6 billion at the end -- Crude production peaked at 1.2 billion

barrels in 1973 and then declined steadily to 1.044 billion in 1978. An estimated 1979 output of 980.4 million barrels would drop the state below the billion-barrel mark the first time since 1966.

- Proved natural gas reserves at the end of 1978 totaled 54.6 trillion cubic feet but were 56.4 percent below the all-time high of

125.4 trillion at the end of 1967. Natural gas production dropped 21 percent between a record 8.2 trillion cubic feet in 1972 and 6.5 trillion last year.

State officials and researchers acknowledge a combination of continued inflation, continued increases in the costs of state government, and continued lagging reserves and production could pose tax structure problems down the road.

But no long-range studies are under way as yet.

An October report from the state comptroller said the full effects of President Carter's oil price decontrol program and new prices set by the Natural Gas Policy Act are not yet reflected in available data.

'Information that will become available in the next few months should aid our understanding of the significance of these events for state government and the Texas economy," the report said.

Jack Reynolds, the comptroller's director of planning and research, said the current congressional debate on windfall profits also

Once the feds come to a good stopping point, the chances are pretty good we'll do a study," Reynolds said.

"But everything is almost in a blur right now. We will be looking at the situation and are sure the legislature will, but we can't do anything until the blur in Washington clears

Dr. Lorna Monti at the Center of Energy at The University of Texas said many organizations are contending that there is a need to research various aspects of the situation, including the tax structure.

We have identified this as one of the important adjustments that might take place in the state as oil and gas production

'We have identified what should be looked into and we are looking for funding and will try to coordinate with anyone else.

Dr. Richard Thomas, director of the new A&M, said there is no question that concern over depletion of the state's oil and gas reserves is valid although there are a variety of opinions about the amount of natural resources yet to be found in the

Thomas said a recent study indicates 52 percent of the gross state product in Texas was petrochemically based.

"Of course, the bulk of that deals with Texas-generated crude oil or natural gas,"

Thomas said he believes such research could be completed within the indicated time span.

"It probably would require some acceleration," he said.

"But if the research programs are not successful, if we don't have an ability to switch over to some other type of feedstock source for our petrochemical industry, certainly the economic base of this state is going to have to change. Certainly, it is difficult to imagine how it would not affect the tax structure in the future."

Thomas said there obviously are other facets, including what is termed the "mobility fuel problem."

'You could use nuclear power plants and solar power satellites to generate electricity but a B-52 obviously doesn't fly on electricity and we see a very serious situation emerging with regard to that general issue of mobility fuels."

"I think the item of major concern there is it would be of a much shorter critical period. It seems to us a viable synthetic fuel program has to be pretty much on line by

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

# Seven to die for killing of Korean leader

SEOUL, South Korea (AP) President Park 'Chungassassin today received the death sentence he asked for, but the military court rejected his plea for clemency for the "innocent sheep" who joined him in the slaving and sentenced six of them to share his fate.

"I am happy to have found good cause for death, and I do not want to beg for my life," the former chief of the Korean Central Intelligence Agency, Kim Jae-kyu, told the five officers of the court martial in his final statement

The court found Kim, five of his KCIA men and Park's secretary Kim Kae-won guilty of the Oct. 26 assassination of South Korea's authoritarian president and five of his bodyguards. The court immediately sentenced the seven men to die

An eighth KCIA man was convicted of destroying evidence by burying the guns used in the assassination. He was sentenced to three years in prison.

The seven men sentenced to death were convicted on intent for sedition and attempted sedition. They exhibited no emotion as the verdicts and sentences were

Kim Jae-kyu shot and killed Park and the president's chief bodyguard during a dinner attended also by Kim Kae-won while the KCIA agents gunned down the president's other bodyguards in an adjoining room.

The former KCIA chief testified that it was 'heartbreaking' for him to kill the president but he did it to restore democracy to South Korea. Kim said he had been planning the slaying since 1972 and had brought a gun to meetings with Park on four occassions but each time lost his nerve.

The court said Kim's action posed "a great threat or challenge to free democracy. prosecution contended he killed Park so he could become president, a claim Kim denied in his testimony.

Park seized power in a military coup 18 years ago and rewrote the constitution in 1972 to insure his continued one-man rule. A clique of army officers has pushed its candidates into key Cabinet posts in an apparent bid to continue

Park's hardline policies. Six of those sentenced to die are civilians, and their sentences are automatically referred to the army Court of Appeals for review and confirmation or reduction. The appellate court's ruling can be appealed to the Supreme Court, and it would have to uphold the death sentences before President Choi Kyu-hah, Park's successor, could sign the death warrants. Civilians are executed by hanging.

Smith said he was nervous about the deliberations and only

slept about an hour and a half Tuesday night.

"My heart was jumping," said Smith. "A lot of things go through your mind. I wondered if I was going to make it to 20.

Smith reeled back and smiled broadly when the verdict was read, but he was not released from custody. He still faces charges in Florida of auto theft and dealing in stolen property

"I'd rather go to jail for something I did do than for something I didn't do," Smith said after his trial. One juror, who asked not to be identified, said it took only two votes to reach a unanimous

decision in the case. Smith testified he had made up stories about being involved in the crime to try to impress a man he thought was an underworld crime figure. But that man turned out to be a Florida undercover policeman, Al Luis, who secretly recorded the conver-

sations. The prosecution built its case around tapes of three of those conversations.

# Campbell gains another honor

NEW YORK (AP) — Running back Earl Campbell of the Houston Oilers was named The National Football League's Offensive Player of the Year today by The Associated Press for the second straight season.

It was his second postseason honor - on Tuesday he was named the NFL's Most Valuable Player by The AP - and also gave Campbell consecutive seasons with double honors. Last year he was also chosen Offensive.

In balloting by a nationwide panel of 84 sports writers and sports broadcasters, three from each NFL city, Campbell edged San Diego Chargers quarterback

Brian Sipe, quarterback of the Cleveland Browns. received three votes, quarterbacks Roger Staubach and Jim Zorn and rookie running back Ottis Anderson of St. Louis received two apiece and wide receiver Steve Largent of Seattle and guard John Hannah of New England each received one vote.

"Every time I hear that he's won another award, I'm proud and pleased for the kid — but I'm damn sure not surprised," Coach Bum Phillips said of Campbell. "He has done for us everything you could ask him to do, whether it's carry the ball 35 times or be the decoy and

"He's as good an addition to this ball club as we've made since I've been here and I'd love to think we

could get another like him. But I don't believe there are too many more in his class.

The figures, bear out Phillips' lavish praise. Campbell erupted for 134 yards last Sunday to finish the season with 1,697 yards (he had 1,450 as a rookie) and become only the third player in NFL history to win the rushing title in each of his first two seasons, matching a feat by Jim Brown in 1957-58 and Bill Paschal in 1943-

Campbell finished 87 yards ahead of Chicago's Walter Payton for the 1979 rushing title. A year ago he beat out the Bears' star runner by 55 yards. And this year, Campbell carried the ball a record 368 times, 29 times more than Payton did two years ago when he was the NFL rushing champ with 1,852 yards.

Campbell gained 100 or more yards in seven successive games this year, breaking the record of six shared by Brown (1958) and Franco Harris (1972). Eleven times he rushed for at least 100 yards, matching Simpson's 1973 mark. And 19 times he scored a rushing touchdown, tying Jim Taylor's 1962 record.

Before Campbell emerged from the University of Texas in 1978, Heisman Trophy in hand, the Oilers had gone eight years without appearing in the playoffs. In his two years with them, they have returned to post-

Directed by Ray Lawlis who is serving his 13th year in BSISD, five kitchens prepare the meals, for all the cafeterias plus the Meals on Wheels for senior citizens and the Nutritional Program for the Elderly. Mildred Puckett, Luther, directs the 16 cashiers. Mrs. Puckett has worked in the food service office five years and was cafeteria supervisor 17 years. Elizabeth Whatley, 2403 Brent, has been food service secretary for 19 years.55 cents for secondary students, reduced lunches 10 cents with many served free.

Lawlis was former director of cafeterias at Kermit and worked for Luby's Cafeterias nine years. A graduate of Texas Tech University with a BS in education. Lawlis is a Lt. Colonel in the army re-

Spring students receive well-balanced meals which must meet government nutritional standards. at nominal prices. Regular breakfasts are 20 cents and the reduced price is 10 cents, while others are served free. Regular lunches are 50 cents for elementary students and 55 cents for secondary school students, reduced lunches 10 cents, with many served

Regular lunches must have at least two ounces of protein, 34 cup fruit or vegetables or combination and one serving of bread with 1/2 pint of milk in order to receive monetary reim-bursement from the federal government for reduced price and free lunches. The United States Department of Agriculture also helps out with high quality surplus foods in the amount of 15 cents per meal.
