## Area Gets Springtime Weather

The Friona area has experienced a very mild week from the weather standpoint, with daily highs in the 60s almost every day, getting as high as 73 degrees on Wednesday.

The warm streak started on Saturday, February 7, when the mercury climbed into the 60s for the last day of the junior livestock show.

Although Sunday's temperature dropped back into the 50s, it warmed back up on Monday, and has been at least 60 degrees for a high ever since. In addition, since Monday the low temperatures have failed to drop to the freezing mark.

On Thursday evening, a spring-like thunderstorm moved through the area, leaving a small amount of moisture. The electrical display caused power to "blink" a couple of times Thursday night, when such items as digital clocks were stopped.

Deadline for filing in the city race is Wednesday, February 18.

For the school board, Dee Willard has filed for re-election, and Terry Wilcox has filed for the one-year unexpired term being vacated by Danny Murphree.

## Squaws vs S-F At Plainview

Friona High School's Squaws have earned the basketball playoffs for the second straight year, and will meet the Sanford-Fritch girls in a bi-district game to be played in Plainview's Hutcherson Center on Friday, February 20.

As of press time, the starting time of the game was not set. If it is a single game, it will begin at 8 p.m. However, efforts were being made to bring another game involving District 2-3A's runnerup (Dimmitt or Littlefield) and Childress. If there are two games, Friona's game will begin at 8:30 p.m.

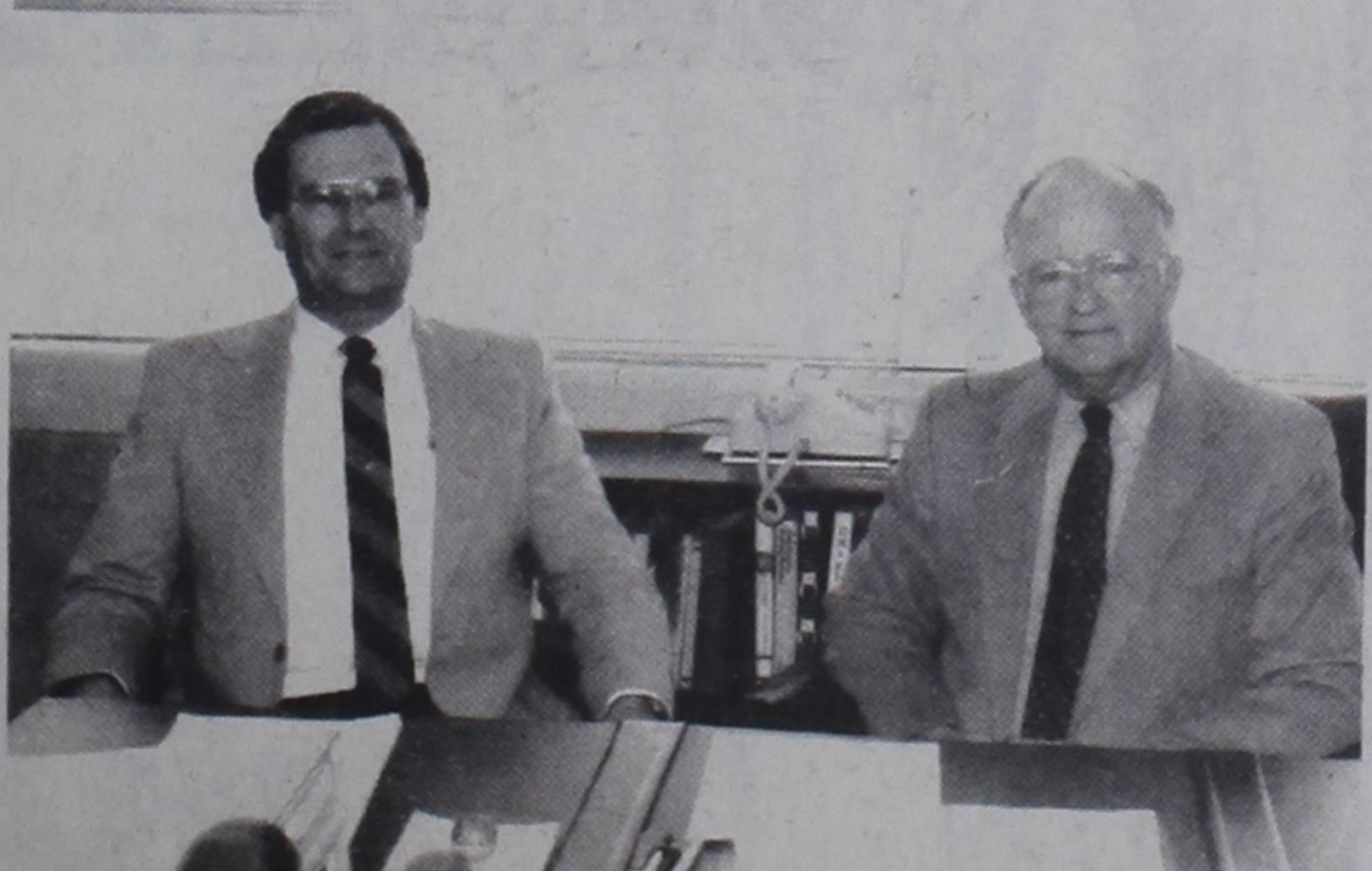
With a season record of 27 wins against only three losses (entering their final regular game Friday), Coach Vicki Hatton's Squaws will carry the best seasonal record of any area class AAA team into the playoffs.

In fact, among teams of all classifications, only class 4A powers Levelland and Canyon, who have suffered only three losses between them, have better season records than Friona.

Sanford-Fritch is the runner-up team in District 1-3A to Childress. The Eagles have a 17-11 season and 7-3 district record. They improved from a 12-13 record (5-5 district) a year ago, when they finished third in their district.

In District 3-3A, Slaton is running away with the district title with a 24-4 season and 12-1 district mark.

Two Lubbock schools, Roosevelt and Cooper, are fighting for the number two seed in Slaton's district. The winner will then meet 4-3A champion Greenwood, another team with a good record: 23-4 season and 10-0 district.

Burglars broke into Friona High School and managed to get into the vault in principal Hal Ratcliff's office. An undetermined amount of cash, thought to be between

\$700 and \$1,000 was taken.

The burglars entered the school through the north entrance. They first tried to get in through the safe door, breaking the combination dial off the front. They then went into the teacher's lounge, behind the safe, and knocked a hole through the 12-inch thick tile wall, and entered the safe.

"The worst part about it is that the money belonged to the kids--classes and organizations which had been raising the money for a purpose," said Ratcliff.

While in the office, the burglar(s) sprung a drawer of a filing cabinet.

Ratcliff could not put a dollar estimate on the damage. "We'll have to have a specialist give us an estimate on the safe," the FHS principal said.

The same night, burglars broke the glass door out at Malouf's, and took an undetermined amount of clothing.

Hanna Malouf, owner, said that the burglars took jeans, jackets, shirts and hats. "I can't tell how much they got, but they took a lot of merchandise," Malouf said.

The burglars took several sizes of jeans, and several high-priced jackets, boots, and tennis shoes.

The burglars had apparently tried on several pairs of boots and shoes, as evidenced by a number of empty boxes that Malouf found in his shoe department.

Malouf even found an old pair of tennis shoes, apparently left behind by the burglar(s).

"He (Malouf) said he hadn't seen the old tennis shoes before. If they're a clue, we have them," said Friona Chief of Police Lloyd Niece.

Malouf said that he does not leave cash in his store at night, and always leaves the cash drawer to his cash register open, so thieves won't ruin the cash register.

The store owner also found a stick, which the intruder(s) had apparently used to get hat boxes down from their high perch.

Niece said that there were no clues to tie the two burglaries together, except that they happened the same night. "In fact, we found very few clues, but we're working on both break-ins," the chief of police said.

## Melton Is Retiring; Shelton In

The Friona School Board accepted the resignation of elementary principal Freeman Melton at its regular meeting this past Monday.

Melton has served as Friona's elementary principal for the past 11 years, and has been involved in school work for 37 years.

The board named Jerry Shelton as Melton's replacement. Two-year contracts were extended to principals Hal Ratcliff and Tom Johnson, to head coach Tommy Moss and business manager James Warren. Shelton was also given a two-year contract.

In other business, board member Danny Murphree submitted his resignation, effective March 31. Murphree said that he planned to leave farming, and as his future plans were unsure, he thought it fair to the school to resign his position at this time.

The board adopted a resolution to hold the school election jointly with the City of Friona on April 4.

A presentation was made by Hal Ratcliff to Joy Morton, who has been nominated for the University of Texas-sponsored Award of Excellence for high school teachers.

The board also adopted on second reading, changes for the school's policy manual, upgrading the manual to comply with HB 72.

It was reported that the Chieftain Parents are continuing their efforts to raise money for an all-weather track.

## Local Youths 'Hog' Honors

Young FFA and 4-H showmen from Friona dominated the 40th annual Parmer County Jr. Livestock Show held here last weekend, winning the Grand Champion's banner in all four of the divisions judged.

Clint Hurst began what was to be a "good Friday" for Friona showmen by exhibiting the Grand Champion Barrow Friday in the barrow show.

Hurst won the title with a 226-pound Hampshire which had been named its breed champion. The win in the barrow show was only the ninth for Friona showmen in the last 40 years, but it was the fourth in the last ten years.

The Grand Champion was bought at the premium auction at \$4.00 per pound, by Hurst Farm Supply of Lorenzo.

The win was the 13th for a Hampshire, which leads all others in Grand Champions. Durocs are next with eight.

Reserve champion in the barrow show was exhibited by Russell Redwine of Lazbuddie, who had the Duroc champion.

Michael Head was owner of the Grand Champion Steer, judged Friday night. The animal was shown by Tracy Carthel. Head's steer had earlier won the breed champion for "Other Breeds." It was a 1325-pound exotic steer.

The steer was sold for 85 cents per pound at the auction sale to Herring Implement Co.

The reserve champion steer was shown by Clay Hurst, a 1325-pound animal which had been second to Head's steer in the "Other Breeds" category.

The reserve champion sold for 80 cents per pound to Leroy Berend.

The Grand Champion Heifer was also owned by Michael Head, and shown by Tracy Carthel. It was named winner of the "small frame" class.

Penny Stowers of Friona had the reserve champion heifer, which had won the "large frame" class.

Jennifer Smith had given Friona a running start when the 13-year-old youngster won the lamb show on Thursday with her 125-pound Hampshire, and Sheldon Mason of Lazbuddie had the reserve champion, also a Hamp.

Miss Smith's lamb sold at the auction for \$2.40 per pound to Friona State Bank.

Showmanship awards went to Dawnda Magby and Shane Mason for lambs; Brett Thomas and Keith Hancock for barrows; Kassie Weatherley and Loren Lookingbill for steers and Gary Stowers and Tracy Carthel for heifers.

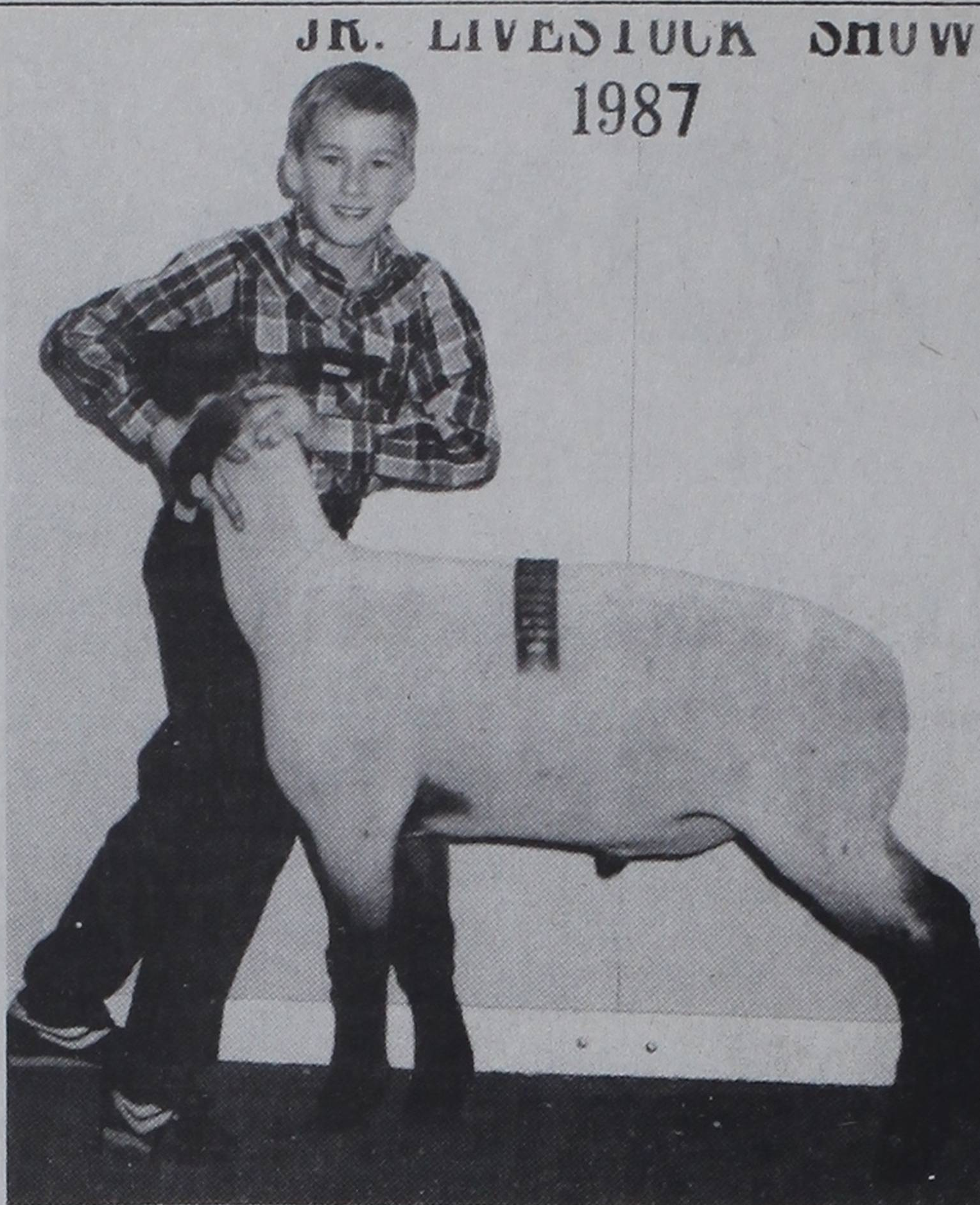
There were sixty-seven calls received by the Friona Police Department during the week.

# Teams Split Pair Against Hornets

The Friona High School Squaws downed the Tulia Hornets, 45-28 in a game played here last Friday, for their third win without a loss in second half of district. In the second game, the Chiefs fell to the Hornets, 48-31.

The Squaws' win, which was their 17th in a row and eighth straight in district play, featured a meticulous job by the Friona girls, who never trailed in the game and were in command all the way.

Shannon Atwell scored the team's first eight points. She connected on a jump shot from the side for a 2-0 Friona lead after 1:37 of play, then made a layup for a 4-0 score with 5:39 left in the opening quarter.

Another jump shot made it 6-2 after Tulia scored, and Miss Atwell became four for four with a shot from the right side at the 3:56 mark for an 8-2 Squaws' lead.

Before the quarter ended, Lacye Osborn made a jump shot and Glenda Ellis a set shot for a 12-4 margin.

## JV Chiefs Drop Game

The Chieftains' junior varsity team dropped a 39-34 game to the Tulia JVs here last Friday.

Friona trailed, 10-4 and 16-13, but took a 26-25 lead at the end of three quarters. However, Tulia rallied in the final quarter for the win.

Shy Burney finally hit a pair of free throws with 2:20 left in the opening quarter, but Tulia had a 12-2 lead at the buzzer.

Burney connected on a long shot 20 seconds into the second quarter, and Shane Hand's layup got the Chieftains within four baskets at 14-6. But Tulia outscored the Chiefs, 8-4 the rest of the quarter, to take a 22-10 lead to the dressing room.

# Squaws Win 18th Straight At Floydada On Tuesday

Friona High School's teams split a pair of district games at Floydada Tuesday night.

The Squaws, with the playoffs clinched, took another step toward an undefeated district record with a 48-31 win over the Whirlettes, while the Chiefs absorbed a hard-fought 56-53 loss.

The Squaws' shooting, particularly in the first half, was not all that good, as they held quarter leads of 9-7 and 20-12.

But they picked up the pace in the third quarter, sparked by Ronda Ratcliff who hit on five field goals and two free throws, to pull into a 38-24 lead.

Miss Ratcliff, along with Shannon Atwell and Mika Maddox, contributed goals in the final quarter, as the Squaws posted their ninth district win without a loss, making their season record a healthy 27-3 in the process.

Miss Ratcliff was the leading scorer with 17 points, and Lacye Osborn ably backed her up with 12.

Misses Osborn and Ratcliff really did a number on the backboards, hauling down 15 and 12 caroms respectively. "They really dominated the boards, and that was a big factor," said Squaws' coach Vicki Hatton. The Squaws held Floydada's leading scorer Paige Cannon to just three points, all at the free throw line.

The Chieftain-Whirlwind game was very much like the one the two teams played here late in January, being close from start to finish.

Friona was off to a better start than they had been in their last two district games, and matched the Whirlwinds point for point in the first quarter. Jeff Dickson scored a pair of baskets to pace the Chiefs.

Shy Burney hit two goals in the second quarter, as Friona trailed by just three at the half, 23-20.

Floydada had the edge in the third quarter, taking a 43-34 lead. But Friona rebounded with a good final quarter. Shane Hand scored six points, Burney and Daniel Echols five each as the Chiefs again made it close, but not quite.

Hurting Friona's drive was Hand fouling out in the fourth quarter.

The team had four players in double figures: Burney with 13; Echols, Dickson and Hand with ten each.

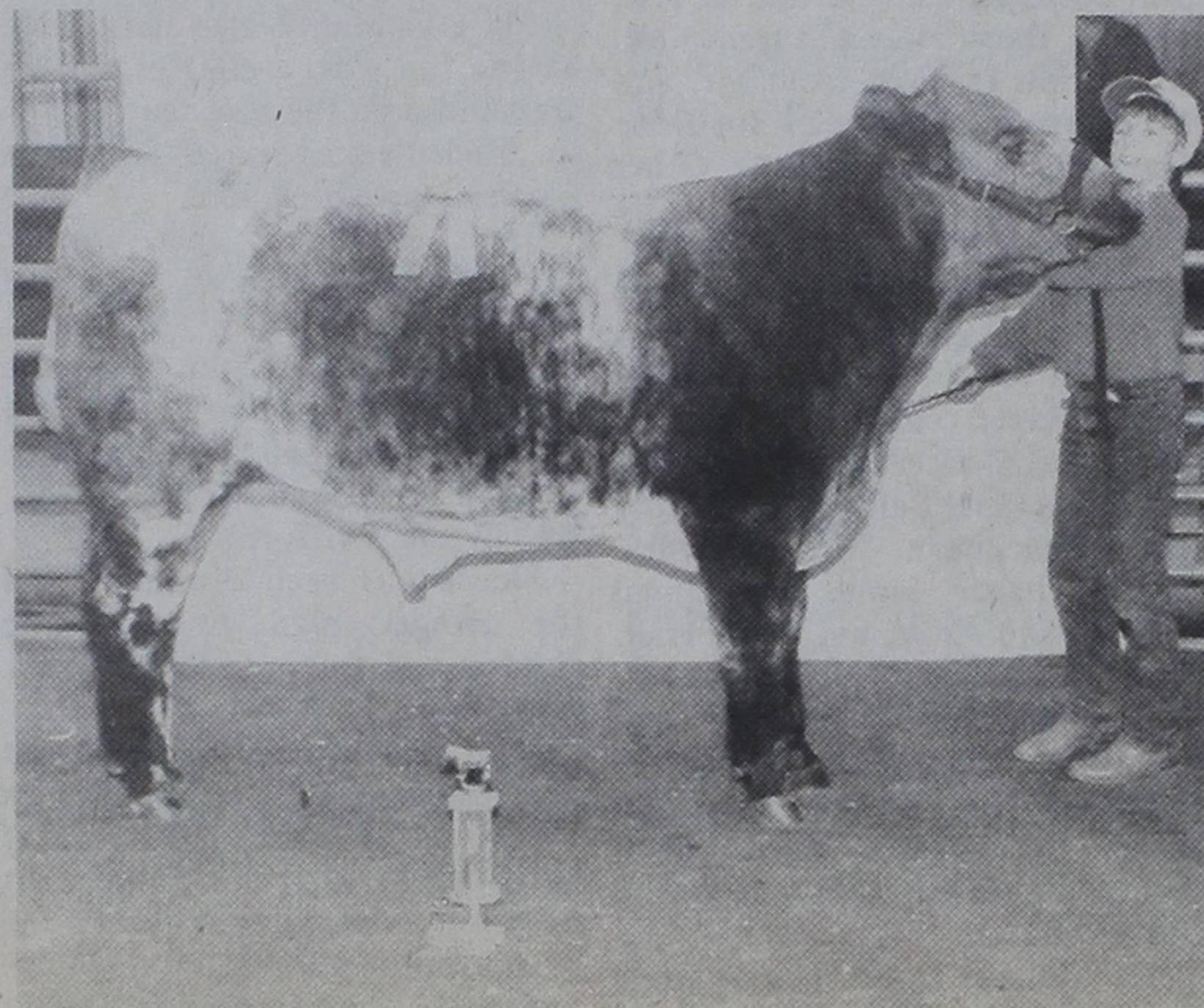

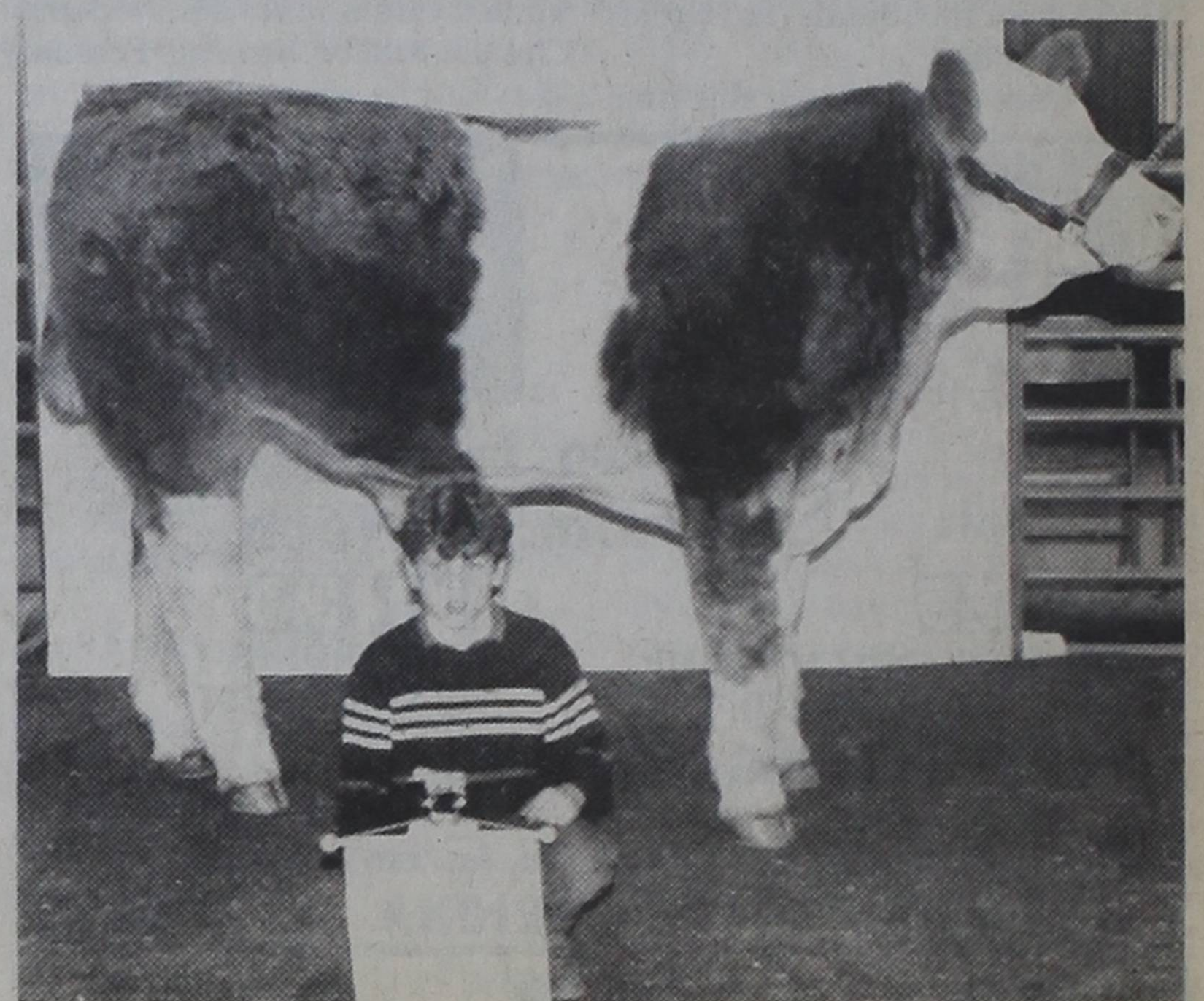

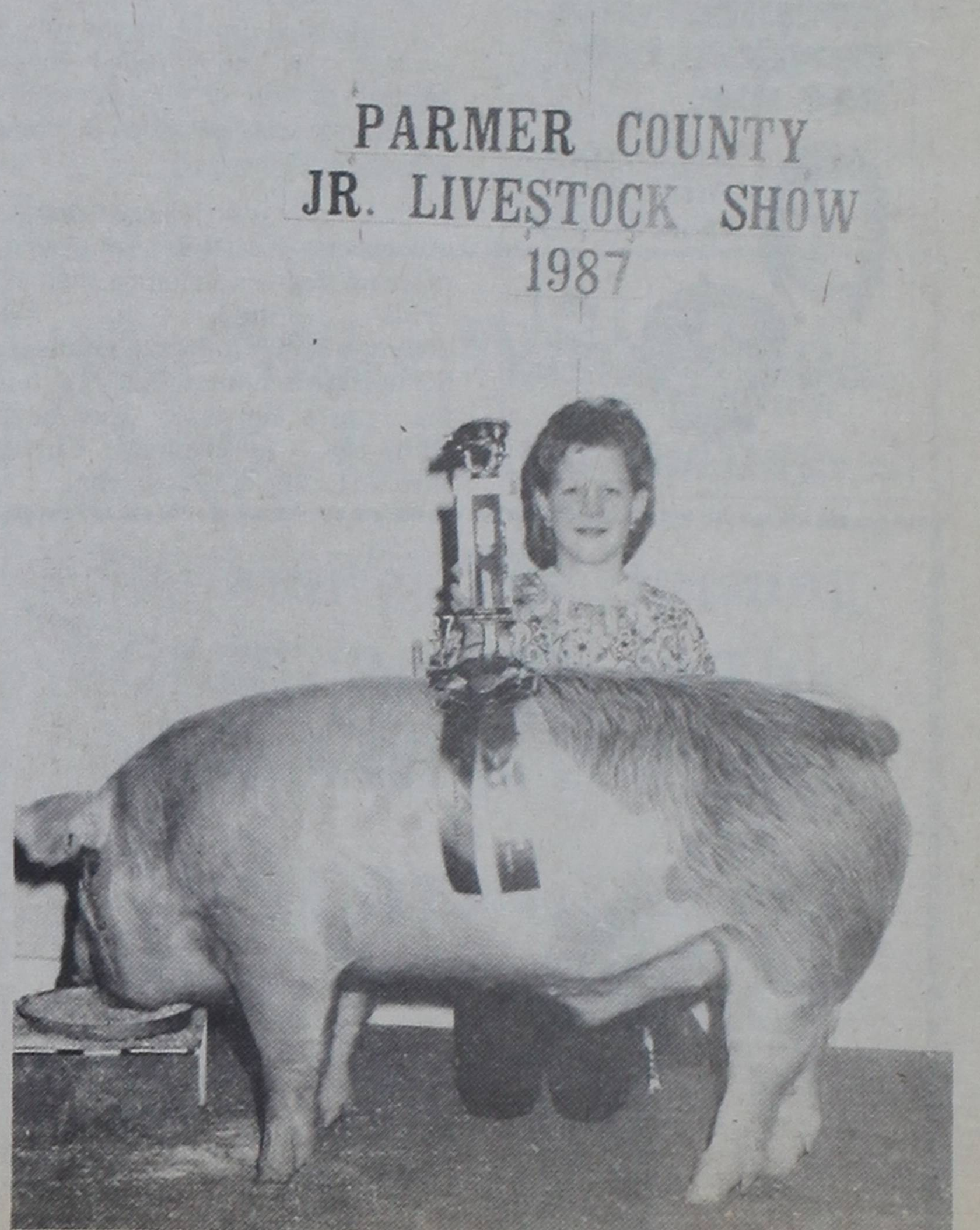

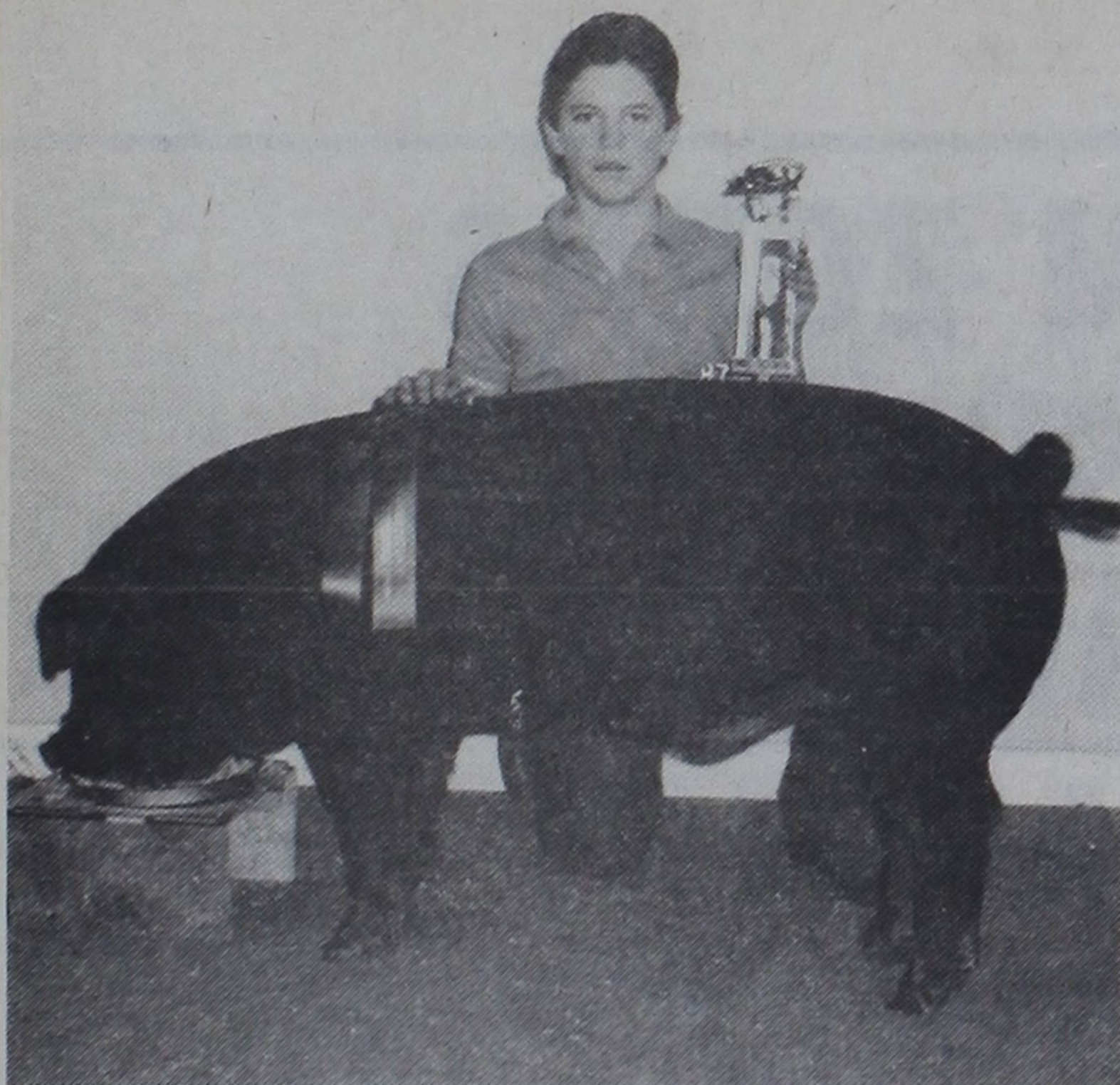

Long ago, people in England believed that birds chose their mates on February 14, and soon people began to look upon that day as a good day for choosing their sweethearts.

Declared St. Valentine's Day in 496 A.D. by Pope Gelasius, it became a very popular celebration and remains so today. One romantic legend is about a young priest named Valentine: it seems that although the Roman Emperor Claudius II had forbidden young men to marry because he felt they were needed as soldiers, this young priest secretly married young couples in love.

Celebrated since ancient times and mentioned by Chaucer and Shakespeare in their works, the Valentine tradition came with the colonists to America. The oldest American Valentines date from the 1700s, and one that remains was handmade with handwritten greeting in German. Valentines have been commercially produced in the United States since 1850. Happy Valentine's Day!
