Inflation rate soars to 33-year high

prices climbed 1.2 percent in December, pushing inflation for all of last year to 13.3 percent, the worst annual increase in 33 years, the Labor Department reported today

What cost consumers \$1 in the 1967 base year cost them nearly \$2.30 as 1979 ended.

Over the year, workers' real spendable earnings were down 5.3 percent as a result of higher taxes and other rising costs. While average wages before taxes rose 8 percent, they were offset by a slight decrease in hours worked and a very high inflation rate.

The acceleration last year was caused primarily by housing and energy-fueled transportation costs, which rose relentlessly and accounted for about three-fourths of the entire increase in the Consumer Price Index

Through the inflation-ravaged year, the price of a gallon of gasoline rose an average of 35.7 cents, while home heating oil jumped an average of 33.8 cents a gallon, the department said. All energy costs rose 34.7 percent.

Last year also saw. -Home financing costs skyrocket 34.7 percent;

-House prices shoot up 15.8 per--Food and beverages rise 10 automobile prices, jump 18.2 percent; -Medical care climb 10.1 percent.

December's 1.2 percent rise offered little prospect of relief to inflationweary Americans, for it was somewhat higher than the average monthly increase through November.

The final CPI for 1979 is especially important because it affects the wages and benefits of more than 90 million Americans and the spending of billions of federal dollars.

That's because the index is used to calculate cost of living raises for more than 9 million union and non-union workers; benefit increases for more than 34 million Social Security recipients, and adjustments for 16 million food stamp recipients, 28

Economists estimate the government spends \$1 billion to \$2 billion for each percentage point rise in the CPI. The index is a survey of the average changes in retail prices for a fixed list of goods and services ranging from food, housing and energy to shoes, tobacco and vacation travel.

As a result of rising consumer prices throughout the year, the average gross weekly earnings of Americans fell 5.3 percent, the Labor Department reported.

East Texas murders studied

An East Texas double murder bears 'eye catching" resemblances to the Reeves murders that occurred here April 26, said Howard County Sheriff's

Deputy Bill Shankles. Mr. and Mrs. George Arriola were abducted from a family owned liquor store at closing time Monday night in west Nacogdoches County. Their bodies were found in the country. They had died from gunshot wounds from a small caliber weapon, possibly

Ann and Tracey Reeves were abducted from the IS 20 an highway 350 Texaco station at closing time also. Their bodies were also found in the country, dead from .22 caliber gunshot wounds.

Mrs. Arriola had been stripped, just

as Mrs. Reeves had been. As in the Reeves case, robbery was the apparent motive of the abduction.

Mr. and Mrs. Arriola were approximately 59 years of age. Mr. Arriola's body was found 13

miles from his wife's body. He was clothed and had a gunshot wound in Mrs. Arriola had apparently been shot with two weapons-a .22 caliber

and a .38 caliber or a 357 magnum. She had been shot once in the breast, neck and side. Neither victim showed signs of having been tied or restrained. Ann and Tracey Reeves had not

been tied either. They had also been shot several times. In neither case was there any other sign of physical

Two armed Muslims hijack jet to Havana

ATLANTA (AP) — Two hijackers believed armed and claiming to be Black Muslims commandeered a Delta Air Lines jet carrying 64 persons from Atlanta to New York early today. They forced the plane to fly to Havana where they demanded another plane to take them to Iran.

State Department spokesman David Passage said in Washington that the hijackers asked Cuban authorities to provide them with a plane to Tehran, but the Cubans refused. Delta said the hijacked plane, a wide-bodied L-1011, was not equipped to cross the ocean.

FBI agent Welton Merry in Miami said "At least two of the passengers have been identified as hijackers. They claim to be Black Muslims and they want to go to Tehran.'

There were reports the hijackers carried a gun or a bomb. Merry said his only definite word was that they were armed with "real weapons."

Nearly seven hours after Flight 1116 landed at Havana's Jose Marti Airport at 4:03 a.m. EST, its doors remained shut and Passage said the only person allowed off was one unidentified diabetic passenger who was taken to a Havana hospital.

There were no reports of injuries. The flight was hijacked over Greensboro, N.C., at about 1:51 a.m. EST, said Delta spokesman Jim

Dennis Feldman, a spokesman for the FAA in Washington, said the plane apparently was being refueled in Havana and was to return to Miami. Aviation officials in Miami said they had not received a flight plan from Havana.

George Achlswede, San Angelo area livestock specialist from the county extension office, gave a seminar at 10 a.m. for the students on showmanship. He gave them tips on how to hold their lambs while the judge feels the animal for conditioning.

County Agent Don Richardson expects 200 animals in all. Currently most of the steers are at the Howard County Fair Barn. Around 50 of the lambs that will be exhibited have not been brought in.

Approximately 150 students will enter. Richardson said this morning

25 or 30 have yet to register.

The lambs were sheared two weeks ago in most cases. The steers are being trimmed this week. It takes them around six hours to trim a steer.

The lambs are being washed today and will be trimmed again. Richardson said each animal may be on a different ration to control their weight. Weight can be affected even

SEATTLE (AP) — A fishery biologist says he fears dredging by a rush of gold prospectors in the state's rivers and streams will harm salmon runs

Steel price going up

PITTSBURGH (AP) — A 6.5 percent price increase on steel used mainly in beverage and food containers has been announced by National Steel Corp., the nation's third largest producer.

National said Thursday the increases on those tinmill products, effective April 1, affect about 20 percent of the company's entire product line.

"These increases are moderate considering the very strong demand for tin-mill products and are in keeping with the government's anti-inflation program," Chairman George Stinson said.

Navy had sagest of years

NORFOLK, Va. (AP) — The Navy had 128 major aircraft accidents last year in which 74 lives and 93 planes were lost, but 1979 was still one of the Navy's safest years

Except for a series of crashes in the last six weeks of the year, 1979 would have been the best year for the service in the past decade, according to figures from the Navy Safety Center here.

However, messages to all Navy commands last week showed the office of the chief of naval operations is not satisfied. Vice Adm. Wesley L. McDonald, deputy chief of naval operations for air warfare, said he wants all squadrons to aim for a "zero accident rate."

Hostage-taker convicted

ATLANTA (AP) — A Fulton Superior Court jury has convicted Mark Anthony Haynes of holding a secretary hostage for 20 hours at the Hyatt Regency Atlanta hotel last October.

The jury deliberated for one hour Thursday and found Haynes guilty of kidnapping for ransom, armed robbery and aggravated assault. The charges stemmed from an incident last Oct. 4 and 5 in which hotel secretary Donna Craig was held hostage while Haynes negotiated with police. Miss Craig was released unharmed and Haynes was arrested after the car police provided for him did

Sentencing was set for Feb. 1.







THE SMALL RETAILER is 35 times more likely to be victimized by the light-fingered gentry than the retailer who has receipts of \$5 million annually and more. Last year, amateur shoplifting, the most common crime, depleted inventories nationwide by considerably more than \$2 billion.

Shoplifting is one of the fastest growing crimes in America, perhaps because some of the older people, who discover they can't quite manage on fixed incomes, are engaging in the pursuit, too. It's estimated that over a

third of all property theft is done by shoplifters.

Under Texas law, shoplifting is an act of theft. Theft, as defined by the Texas Penal Code, Article 31.03, Section "A," is when a person "unlawfully appropriates property with intent to deprive the owner of property." In other words, it is simply a more gentle word than "stealing.

HOW GREAT A LOSS does the average person suffer because the shoplifter takes his share? It's probably bigger than you think. Estimates on the markup of goods to cover losses to shoplifters run as high

Shoplifting becomes rather intense at holiday time but it can occur at any

Shoplifters are not always easy to catch, either. The burden of proof that they have been active at their trade lies with shop attendants, who might see the criminals commit their act but must wait until the light-fingered gentry gets outside their places of business before accusing them of it. By that time, it may have been too





Glands control calcium in body

Paul G. Donohue, M.D.

Dear Dr. Donohue: Please tell me about parathyroidism. My mother is 69 and has been told she has this. Is this really rare? She had many kidney stone problems the past four years. She has had surgery for removal of some of her parathyroid glands. Then her blood calcium went from a reading of 21 down to 16 and then back to 17. So now she will need further surgery on the thymus gland.

Mom seems better. At least her appetite is better and so is her at titude. She had been losing weight. Please explain all this for us. — Mrs.

It's not as complicated as it may

The parathyroid glands are located in the neck. They adhere to the surface of the back of the thyroid gland hence the name "para" (around) thyroid.

These glands control the use of body calcium and phosphorous through the hormones they secrete (parathyroid

hormones) Too much of these hormones can have very subtle effects at first. As time goes on the problem becomes more obvious with recurring kidney stones, peptic ulcers and personality changes. Actual loss of bone sub-

The condition is diagnosed by laboratory tests to measure the levels of calcium and phosphorous and of the parathyroid hormones in the blood

stance comes later.

Yes, it is a relatively rare disease reported in about one case in 1.000 patients yearly. Most often, removing the over-

producing glands results in cure. Sometimes all four glands have to be removed. There is another rare circumstance.

In some people a couple of parathyroid glands, through some quirk, may be found farther down from the neck close to the thymus gland. These may have to be removed also, and this is possibly the case with your mother.

Dear Dr. Donohue: I am 16 years old and weigh 115 pounds. My problem is that I have only menstruated once. when I was 13. Other girls at school with the same problem say their doctors tell them this is "normal." They say not to worry because it takes some longer than others. Is this anything to worry about? - Concerned

Menses can be quite irregular in the first year after the beginning of menstruation. For awhile periods can

be quite irregular. This problem usually solves itself within a year. You have been periodfree for three years. Beyond a year, this should be investigated to be absolutely sure the irregularity is only a phase of adolescence. This is what your girlfriends have done, and it is what you should do. See your doctor.

Dear Dr. Donohue: My grand daughter brought her five-month-old daughter home for the family to see for the first time. The baby is fine and healthy, but her ears protrude. One is worse than the other.


Many words have been written and spoken about the marvelous scientific know-how which brought Louise, the "test-tube" baby to Gilbert and Lesley Brown in Britain.

A good rule of thumb for movie viewers is to stay away from the flicks

with too many "stars" in them.

Take "The Visitor" for example. Since I was desperate to see a movie. and "Visitor" was the only one in town that was neither G-rated nor "Held Over For Its Fifth Big Week!" I plunked down my \$3 and went

Nobody should be that desperate. But how was I, lamb being led to the slaughter that I was, to know? I mean, look at this lineup of "big-name stars": Glenn Ford, Mel Ferrer, John Huston, Shelley Winters, and (get this!) Sam Peckinpah, the director.

UNFORTUNATELY, THE one who spent most of the time up on the screen was an obnoxious little girl "and named introducing .. somebody-or-other. I never could figure out which actor was Sam Peckinpah.

It is simple to pick out the ripoffs from other modern horror and sci-fi films: the worst traits of both possessed kids in "The Omen" and 'The Exorcist''; the ominous floating clouds from "Close Encounters"; the crazed birds from (what else?) A new housekeeper (Shelley Winters) comes to live with the paralyzed mother. She knows what's up, and proceeds to slap the kid around without, strangely, having her eyes pecked out by a hawk.

A mysterious stranger (John Huston) also begins hanging around the house. One has the impression he also knows what's going on.

Meanwhile, upset at the fact that the chump hasn't done his job, the demon worshippers hire some guys from outer space who wear football helmets and plastic visors to do it for him. They succeed, but Mom gets an

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THE CLIMAX IS coming. Mother returns from the doctor's office only to be attacked by a hawk. Then (this is my favorite scene) Shelley Winters kills the hawk and tells the mother, 'No harm can come to you now. Within seconds of this utterance, the demonic daughter pushes her mother on a wheelchair through a 2,000 gallon aquarium with no fish in it.

Soon thereafter, mother appears in a neck brace and is about to be done in by her daughter and the chump. She is saved (so help me!) by a flock of pigeons, who subdue the girl and bite he chump in the jugular vein.

The final scene of the flick shows us John Huston with the girl, now completely bald for some reason, in what I presume is supposed to be the Kingdom Of Heaven. Why do I presume this? Because there's a guy here who looks just like those pictures of Jesus in children's Bible story books. Heavy!

'Weak, vulnerable'

WASHINGTON — There is a quiet, nagging conviction in the Washington strategy councils that President Carter himself laid the groundwork for the Soviet invasion of

His unsure, unsteady hand at the helm, the strategists think, encouraged the Soviets to strike. These professionals believe Carter was gulled and intimidated by the Soviets. According to one scathing assessment, the Kremlin took Carter's measure and found him "weak, vascillating and vulnerable."

The strategists doubt that the wily but wary old men of the Kremlin would have risked a massive military move to the rim of the Western oil reserves if they had thought the president would stand up to them.

IN AN EARLIER COLUMN, I described how the Soviets had tested Carter's mettle at the beginning of his term. They repeatedly rebuffed him, and he repeatedly rebounded - full of confidence that moralism would triumph over amorality in the end.

He was sure he could reach an undertanding with Soviet President Leonid Brezhnev if only they could sit down together. Carter believed that the sincerity of his purpose and the power of his faith would overcome the barriers between them, that a summit meeting would ease world tensions and reduce the nuclear threat.

The president was as enthusiastic as an evangelist when at last he confronted Brezhnev in Vienna last June. Carter beamed happily when the Soviet leader responded to his appeal for world peace by declaring: 'God will not forgive us if we fail.' Eagerly, Carter jotted down the remark on a sheet of yellow paper. Other members of the American

delegation looked startled at the old atheist's reference to the Deity. Soviet Foreign Miniter Andrei Gromyko, apparently sensing their surprise, pointed at the ceiling and confirmed: "You know, that's the Guy up there."

CARTER LEFT VIENNA exuberant over his new personal relationship with the Kremlin czar. But intelligence reports suggest that Brezhnev was less impressed with Carter; according to one report, Brezhnev regarded his American counterpart as weak and waffling.

The next crisis came just a few months later. Photo reconnaissance detected a Soviet combat brigade on maneuvers a few miles south of Havana. Soviet advisers had been in Cuba for 17 years, but the appearance of a combat force within 90 miles of our shores was a disturbing new development.

The president registered a protest with his new friend in the Kremlin. Back came a flat denial that a Soviet combat brigade had been aent to Cuba. Carter complained to congressional leaders that the Soviets were lying. "The Soviets deny it has combat status," he told them

privately. "But it is a combat unit." He made his protest public. The presence of a Soyiet combat brigade in Cuba, he declared, was "unache said, "to get the Soviets to eliminate the combat nature of this unit . . . If we do not succeed, we will take appropriate action to change the

status quo. But four weeks of diplomatic efforts

had no effect upon the Soviets. Gromyko rejected Carter's entreaties in blunt language. "Our advice on this score," he said, "is simple: It is high time you admit this whole matter is artificial and proclaim it to be closed.' Seventeen years earlier, the Soviets

had backed away from a Cuban confrontation with President John F. Kennedy. This time it was America's turn to back away. What had been 'unacceptable'' four weeks earlier. Carter conceded, was now acceptable.

'The brigade issue is certainly no reason for a return to the cold war. he explained to the American people. He couldn't even extract a Soviet pledge, according to insiders, not to provide airlift or sealift capacity for the disputed brigade. Carter's backdown came last

October. There is solid intelligence that the Soviet decision to invade Afghanistan came later the same month, U.S. analysts believe that the two events were related, that Carter's nervous handling of the Cuban crisis convinced the Kremlin crowd they could get away with aggression in Afghianistan. Carter had made such a sorry hash

of things in Iran, meanwhile, that the Soviets were tempted to close in on the oil fields. At first, Brezhnev tried to mask his military moves by announcing a unilateral withdrawal of Soviet troops and tanks from East Germany. He made this appear to be a concession to Western Europe

In reality, the Soviet units were quietly moved to the borders of Afghanistan. They reinforced an airborne division, which was also put on a war footing.

The military buildup was monitored by U.S. intelligence agencies which submitted their reports to the president. He sought an explanation from Moscow, and Brezhnev reassured him that the Soviets intended no military action.

The trusting Carter accepted Brezhnev's assurances. Later Carter took the Afghanistan aggression as a personal affront. He was particularly offended by Brezhnev's explanation over the Moscow-Washington hot line that the Soviet troops had been "invited" into Afghanistan. "This was obviously false," the president later commented angrily.

But with the election only nine months away, he now seeks to project himself as the hero of his own catastrophes.

NEW DELHI, India (AP) — Muhammad Ali, stripped of his boxing title when he refused induction for the Vietnam War, says he would be willing to fight against Soviet forces in Afghanistan because "that would be a just war.

The now-retired heavyweight champion told reporters here Friday that "I am threatened, my family is threatened, the peace of the world is threatened" by the Soviet presence in Afghanistan. Ali also repeated his strong support of President Carter's call for a possible boycott of the Moscow

Hospital officials said they were awaiting test results to determine when Landon, the 1936 GOP presidential nominee, would be discharged.

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



House of Reps, AFL-CIO support Olympic boycott

The Senate is expected to follow the House in supporting President Carter's stand on the Moscow Olympics, but not before next week.

There were only 12 dissenters — as opposed to 386 in favor — when the House approved a resolution Thursday supporting a possible U.S. withdrawal from the summer Games.

But quick Senate concurrence was stymied when the chairman of the Foreign Relations Committee ignored a White House appeal for full congressional approval before this weekend.

Instead, said Sen. Frank Church, D-Idaho, his Foreign Relations Committee will stick to its plan to hold hearings on the resolution next week.

The resolution urges the U.S. Olympic Committee to honor Carter's request and seek to have the Olympics moved from Moscow or

canceled if Soviet troops are not out of Afghanistan by Feb. 20.

It would urge athletes from the United States and other nations to boycott the Olympics if they are held in Moscow while Soviet troops stay in Afghanistan.

The White House had asked congressional leaders to complete approval of the resolution before the USOC's executive board meets on Carter's request this weekend in Colorado.

A possible boycott also won support Thursday from AFL-CIO President Lane Kirkland, who charged that the U.S. Olympic Committee was arrogant in opposing Carter's proposal. "The committee has become big business, with financial interests rather than human concerns," Kirkland 'said. He accused the committee of prostitution of Olympic ideals in order to gain corporate sponsorships.

Energy credits pay off for tax filers

This is the fifth in a series of five articles entitled "Coping With Your Income Tax." They were written to help taxpayers prepare their 1979 tax returns.

With oil prices still climbing and the Middle East a perpetual powder keg, these energy credits appear even sweeter this year.

And Congress could expand the conservation incentives by the time taxpayers sit down to prepare their 1979 forms. At the moment, there are

two distinct energy breaks:

by up to \$300 for household amount of fuel used. improvements such as replacing your thermostat or weather stripping your

You can also claim a tax credit of up to \$2,200 for more ambitious endeavors installing what the law calls "renewable energy sources." These include devices that transmit some solar. wind, or geothermal energy energy conservation to heat, cool or provide hot water for a residence.

That must be your "principal" residence, the IRS cautions. Household improvements: These include:

-Insulation for floors, ceilings, roofs, hot water heaters and pipes. -Exterior storm, or thermal, window and doors. -Caulking or weather

stripping for exterior windows and doors.


