Court-martial ordered for Pfc. Garwood

CAMP LEJEUNE, N.C. (AP) --The commanding general of Camp Lejeune Marine base today ordered a court-martial for Pfc. Robert Garwood on charges of desertion and collaboration with the enemy in Vietnam, according to Capt. Dale Miller, one of Garwood's lawyers.

No trial date was set. The charges against Garwood, 33. stem from the nearly 14 years he

spent in Vietnam. If tried and convicted, he could become the second American serviceman to be executed in this century

for desertion. After a hearing comparable to a probable-cause procedure in civilian courts, a judge recommended Feb. 1 that Garwood be court-martialed. The hearing featured testimony filling more than 300 pages of transcripts

and 19 documents. A number of former POWs who said they encountered Garwood in Vietnam testified against him during the

hearing. The recommendation of a courtmartial, returned by Maj. T.B. Hamilton, went to Brig. Gen. David B. Barker, commanding general at Camp Lejeune



Olympic Committee to pull out. Within an hour of a statement from the International Olympic Committee (IOC) Tuesday night, rejecting Carter's call for moving the Games because of the Soviet intervention in Afghanistan, the White House turned the pressure on American Olympic

officials. Jody Powell, White House press secretary, issued this statement

"We regret the decision of the IOC to conduct the 1980 Summer Olympic Games in Moscow and to reject the proposal of the U.S. Olympic Committee to transfer, postpone or cancel the Games. Under the circumstances, neither the President, the Congress nor the American people can support the sending of the United States team

to Moscow this summer. 'The President urges the U.S. Olympic Committee to reach a prompt decision against sending





Gift covered

WASHINGTON - In his three years as Interior secretary, Cecil Andrus has managed to keep a pretty low profile. Except for a ludicrous flap over an endangered species of rattlesnake served at his favorite Washington restaurant, the former Idaho governor has escaped the kind of controversy that has embroiled some of Jimmy Carter's other appointees

What hasn't been reported, however, is that a serious allegation against Andrus - that he may have accepted a healthy campaign consports cartel in his 1970 gubernatorial race - was covered up by the White House at the time of his Senate confirmation hearing.

THE ALLEGATION, known to more than two dozen Idaho officials state and county police and the FBI, was included in the bureau's confidential report to Carter in early 1977. Yet it was mysteriously deleted before the report was shown to the Senate committee staff that was considering Andrus' nomination for

the Cabinet post. As a result, Andrus' confirmation hearing turned into what one senator described as a "love-in." He was confirmed in a breeze, with no embarrassing questions raised by the

One source who read the report as it was made available to the Senate committee stated categorically that it contained no mention of a possibly tainted campaign contribution 'There was no smoke of any kind,'' he

Yet another source, who was familiar with the FBI's background check on Andrus, told my associate Dale Van Atta that the allegation definitely was included in the original report to the White House

There was, he said, "mention of a questionable campaign contribution from out of state." He added: Because of the nature of the campaign contribution, the FBI report was red-flagged and landed on Carter's desk, and he personally ruled on

The allegation that was apparently scissored out of the FBI report after it "landed on Carter's desk" involved \$20,000 to \$40,000 purportedly kicked into Andrus' 1970 campaign chest by Emprise Corp., a Buffalo-based sports concession and gaming firm. Emprise was widely regarded with suspicion by organized-crime investigators, and in 1972 was convicted of a felony in Nevada for illegally disguising its partnership with known mobsters in a Las Vegas casino.

In 1970, Emprise wanted to open a lavish racetrack in northern Idaho, within easy reach of Spokane, Wash. which was then getting ready for its 1974 Expo. According to lawenforcement sources, Emprise's standard operating procedure at that time was to spread money around where it would do the most good, whether in payoffs or legal campaign contributions to politicians it regarded as favorable to it.

IN LIGHT OF THE corporation's subsequent conviction for illegal ties to the Mob, acceptance of a sizable campaign contribution from Emprise rfectly legal proved embarrassing to Andrus at his Senate nomination hearing. Someone in the White House evidently thought so, at any rate.

So Andrus was spared the necessity of even discussing the allegation, and was confirmed as Interior secretary, his Mr. Clean image gleaming.

Footnote: Andrus has denied emphatically that he took any money from Emprise. But though he has long been a vocal proponent of campaigncontributions disclosure, he steadfastly refuses to make public the list of contributors to his successful 1970 race for the Idaho governorship.

WATCH ON WASTE: The Pentagon spends more than \$350 million a year to operate cut-rate food commissaries across the country. Service families buy food and other items at a 25 percent discount, thanks to this taxpayer subsidy. Congress intended that commissaries serve military posts that were remote from civilian shopping centers, but the Pentagon wordsmiths have gotten around this by coming up with a unique definition of the word "remote." In the brass hats' view, a post is remote if it is more than 10 minutes' drive from a supermarket.

A loosely administered Agriculture Department program has the General Accounting Office buzzing angrily. The Beekeepers' Indemnity Program compensates apiarists as much as \$25 for each beehive population that's destroyed by pesticides. It'll cost the taxpayers almost \$3 million this year.

Paul Laxalt of Nevada, Reagan's national campaign chairman - that some Reagan aides thought he was about to drop out.

Misplaced uterous tissue

Paul G. Donohue, M.D.

Dear Dr. Donohue: I am 45 and have endometriosis. I have been told that removal of my uterus and ovaries would probably make me feel better. I worry about after the surgery and the dometriosis to grow worse? I also have bowel trouble and stomach

cramps. - Mrs. W.H The lining of the uterus is called the endometrium. Endometriosis means that some of this uterine-like tissue is being formed outside the uterus where, of course, it doesn't belong. Often, bits of the tissue, when sloughed off from the uterus, travel to other points There it behaves like regular uterine tissue in response to the body's hormones. More on this

A common place for the tissue to form is on the ovaries, but it may form elsewhere in the pelvic cavity, or even on the intestines. If it forms on the intestines it might cause rectal bleeding at certain times of the month or the kind of abdominal distress you

For a woman approaching menopause (as you are) removal of the ovaries and uterus (the source of the endometriosis) ends the problem. no matter where the extra tissue is located. With the source of the endometriosis gone, hormones no longer can aggravate matters. And, for some reason, once the uterus and ovaries have been removed, hormones do not usually affect the transplanted tissue.

Some women with endometriosis do not need surgery at all. In younger women, an actual pregnancy has been known to alleviate the problem Another way to accomplish the same result is to mimic a pregnancy through use of various hormone supplements.

Dear Dr. Donohue: Will you please enlarge on your flat statement that "mucus in stools should be investigated, no ifs, and, or buts." I am 60 and in excellent health except for some aches and pains. I can't remember when I didn't have lots of mucus in my stools. I've always attributed it to the fact that I have sinusitis and juicy lungs. — J.C.R.

One of the cancer danger signals, in fact, can be alternating diarrhea and constipation. It is to make sure that none of these illnesses are present that an examination is important. This is why I feel so strongly about it to make that kind of a statement. The mucus that is swallowed from the sinuses or your lungs is almost always digested in the stomach and upper intestines, so would not show up in the stool. It's my first encounter with your interesting

phrase, "juicy lungs. Dear Dr. Donohue: I am 36 years old, a female. About six months ago after shaving my legs I noticed on the front bone of my left leg a scaly patch, reddish in color. It fades a little sometimes. At other times it is quite bright, especially after exposure to sunlight, when it seems to be larger. It is very irregular in shape. I've tried to show you in the enclosed drawing. It is now the size of a half dollar. My doctor tells me not to worry about it. Can it be something serious? — J.E

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







ship, construction crews put up a wall of sheetrock all around the inside of the hangar.



Nole invoked the Fifth Amendment right to remain silent 102 times during the committee's public hearings last month but later told reporters he had done nothing wrong and had received "not a dime" that was not authorized.

Slack told reporters the report would "call attention to discrepancies we have found in at least eight categories." He said copies of the report would go to the attorney general for possible civil action and to district attorneys at Denton and Austin

"There may be violations of civil law or criminal law. Where a section of the law was violated, it will be identified by number," Slack said.

He said the committee would make its "voluminous" files of evidence available to district attorneys upon request.

"We have adequate evidence for anyone who wants to make a determination," Slack said. Noten's refusal to testify

was a "slight hindrance" but
"by and large" did not
hamper the investigation,
Slack said.
Committee investigators

submitted evidence in January suggesting that Nolen misused private foundation funds and state money.

Investigator Bob Shults

ILA refuses

Officials said Tuesday the ILA refused to load the "Orient Express," a 67,000 ton Liberian ship chartered by the Soviets. Workers were asked twice Tuesday to load the ship and refused both times.

"I imagine it (the grain boycott) will go on until the court says differently," said Vincent Lampasas, chairman of ILA Local 1273.

U.S. District Judge Norman Black denied without comment Monday a reqest for a temporary injunction to halt the boycott, which has been in effect on the the Atlantic and Gulf Coasts since Jan. 9.

About eight million tons of Soviet-bound grain were exempted by President Carter when he ordered a Soviet embargo Jan. 8, but the ILA refused to load the exempted grain.

In asking for the injuction, the National Labor Relations Board argued Monday that the ILA was engaging in an unlawful secondary boycott. West Coast ILA workers

have not joined in the boycott.
The Texas and Kansas Farm Bureaus and the American Farm Bureau Federation have also filed suit against the ILA in connection with the boycott.

That suit is scheduled to be

Cost of 'I Love You' with roses expensive

By The Associated Press The cost of saying "I Love You" with roses is going up. Sending your true love a dozen, long-stemmed red roses for Valentine's Day on Thursday will cost nearly \$50 in some cities and a few places report prices as high

as \$5 a blossom You can trim the tab in half by shopping around, however, and florists say there is an abundant supply of other flowers at much lower prices

There are ample flowers on the market." said Art Gasior of Allied Florists of Illinois, adding that good buys include jonquils, tulips, carnations, anemones and

An Associated Press spot check showed rose prices vary widely, from city to city and neighborhood to neighborhood; a florist with a

The best way to keep your roses fresh

A little effort will go a long way to help you get the most out of Valentine's Day roses. Select roses with a strong color and good foliage. Check each bud. If it's too tightly closed, it may mean the flower was cut too early. The bud won't open and the stem will droop. Look for an outside petal just starting to unfurl. If you DO get buds

that are tightly closed, place them in a deep container of warm water - about 100 degrees Fahrenheit - and immerse the entire stem. Leave the flowers in the warm water until the petals start to open slightly.

Before you place any kind of roses in a vase, recut the stems to break the seal that has probably formed on the base. Hold the stems under running water or in a container of water while you make the cut. Otherwise, the first "gulp" the stems take will be air and air bubbles will form, preventing the flowers from absorbing roses should last five to seven days.

fancy store in a high-rent district may be twice as expensive as one with a small store in a cheaper area. Prices also depend on the type of greenery you want, the complexity of the arrangement - box, vase or simple bow - and whether you want the flowers delivered.

"The real problem is that there are 30,000 individual florists setting prices," said Ed Buckley of Floral Reports, an industry newsletter in Chicago.

Buckley said he didn't have complete price figures for 1980 yet. In February 1979, the average retail price for roses of all kinds was \$1.89 per flower, up from \$1.66 a year earlier. Based on past experience. Buckley said, this year's average retail price could top \$2 for the first time in history.

Buckley said some stores Chicago charging as little as \$22.50 a dozen; others listed prices of \$40 and up. "Not since World" War II have I seen roses in the \$50 bracket," he said.

A spokesman for Roses Inc., a trade association of commercial rose growers in retail price, on a national basis, should be under \$25 a dozen for long-stemmed red

Gasior said major chains in the Chicago area were charging about \$2 to \$2.50 per rose - from \$24 to \$30 a dozen. One New York City florist quoted a price of \$48 a dozen for long-stemmed roses. Another store, three blocks away, is charging \$60 a dozen.

Bob Flagg of Allied Florists of Houston said florists in his area were paying from \$1 to \$1.25 per rose. At the retail level, he said, "I've heard 'em quoted at \$40, at \$45, at \$50.

Where does the added money go. Spoilage is one expense. Then there's the greenery, the vase, the wrapping, labor costs, rent, delivery charges, etc., Flagg

He said some florists are urging people to substitute flowers like carnations -\$17.50 to \$20 a dozen. water. With adequate water, arranged and delivered - or potted plants like tulips for the traditional roses.

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Indictment names 11 in organized crime Texas vehicle theft ring

crime in-Organized have been dictments returned naming 11 persons in what is being described as the largest vehicle theft ring in Texas history, the Dallas Morning News reported

The ring has been responsible for 200 or more vehicle thefts each year for the past two years since four Texas Department of Public Safety officers began an investigation, the newspaper said in a copyright story. Most of the stolen vehicles

were light trucks and 4wheel drive vehicles, investigators said.

Although the indictment names 11 persons, only three have been charged. One of them has been tried and convicted. The other two are Merritt Jack Dunavan, 58,

received a life prison term as a habitual criminal earlier this month based on earlier convictions. He was con-

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officers said he was involved in others.

Others charged and named in the indictments were Billy Jack Walker and his wife, Betty Walker, both of Delta County. They are being held in the Dallas County Jail in lieu of bonds amounting to \$400,000.

The Walkers are named with three other persons who were said to have delivered a vehicle with altered serial numbers to Dallas for sale.

Hopkins County District Attorney James Chapman said Dunavan was charged with the theft of an \$8,000 pickup stolen from an Ennis automobile dealer last August 7. It was offered for sale for \$4,500, Chapman said. He said the plates on the stolen truck matched the plates of a 1976 pickup the same color as the stolen truck

Chapman said Dunavan bought the old truck after it was demolished and used it's serial number on the stolen truck

The theft ring has cost insurance companies and Texas residents millions of dollars, the newspaper said. Many innocent persons who bought the "bargain" bought the bank notes for the vehicles

The DPS has seized 16 stolen vehicles so far and expects to seize 70 to 90 more in the coming weeks, the returned newspaper said.

The governor's statement raises the question: Just how good are Texas' state universities?

Kenneth Ashworth, state commissioner of higher education, and Dean Lorrin Kennamer of the University of Texas College of Education say there are no objective standards of measurement.

But some things still can be said about educational quality in Texas.

Of the 37 tax-supported senior institutions under 15 governing boards, only the University of Texas at Austin and Texas A&M consistently show up on nationwide .departmental Some examples:

The proceeds from Ray's paintings will be donated to charity, probably a school for underprivileged children in East Tennessee, Mrs. Ray



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

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Americans reach for the sale shaker almost as often as they do for the sugar spoon. But just as our diet may be too sweet, it may also be too salty.

The average American consumes 2 to 212 teaspoons of salt a day — or 812 pounds a year. A diet high in salt (sodium chloride) may increase some people's risk of hypertension — high blood lead to stroke, heart disease or kidney failure.

More and more evidence suggests that excess sodium from salt and other food additives may be particularly troublesome for hose people who have a tamny history of high blood pressure. About 10 to 30 percent of all Americans fall nto this category.

Many nutritionists and medical experts are advising Americans to cut down on he salt - and hence the sodium they consume. Sodium restriction is a common treatment for high bood pressure, alone or in conjunction with drugs and

down on sodium isn't as

simple as tossing away the salt shaker From one-fourth to one-half of the salt in the American diet comes already added in processed foods Naturally occurring sodium and the salt consumers add themselves make up the rest.

obviously salty foods such as pretzels, potato chips and bacon, someone trying to pressure, which in turn can restrict sodium may unknowingly consume more than he or she intends by eating common processed foods. Sodium does not just travel in salt, but in many other food ingredients: preservatives (sodium nitrite in cured meats). flavor enhancers (monosodium glutamate, or MSG) and leavening agents (sodium bicarbonate), to name a few. Some don't have a salty taste to indicate that

sodium is present. Anyone on a low-sodium diet would have to avoid products such as canned soup: Some versions have as much as a gram of sodium die's. per serving, which would use up half the day's allowance Unfortunately, cutting of a typical low-sodium diet.

Other foods that contain

significant amounts of sodium are: canned vegetables, cheese, tomato juice, dill pickles, olives, canned tuna and crab, frozen dinners, and condiments such as soy sauce, catsup and salad dressing. And don't forgert breakfast Although it's easy to avoid cereals, instant pudding, ice cream, cookies, cakes and bread.

Labels of food products do not have to state how much sodium they contain, except for foods that claim to be low sodium' or otherwise helpful in sodium or saltrestricted diets. However, this may change because the Drug and Food Administration plans to propose that sodium and potassium content be included on nutrition labeling.

U.S. attorney monitored FBI probes in Oklahoma

OKLAHOMA CITY (AP) The Oklahoma activities of undercover FBI agents conducting a political corruption investigation were personally monitored by U.S. Attorney Larry

Patton denied there was any entrapment action by the FBI in its political corruption probe. But, he did not specifically address accusations by state Senate President Pro Tem Gene Howard, who claims he was the intended victim of an entrapment attempt in the so-called Operation Brilab investigation.

When asked specifically about Howard's accusation, Patton said, "I am advised of conduct of all covert operations and monitor such conduct to ensure that they are in conformity with all

Men claiming to be insurance representatives allegedly offered him \$8,000 a month and \$5,000 in cash if the firm received the state's

insurance business. Two state officials familiar with the state insurance program said the deposit of \$5,000 Howard left with the state was highly unusual since the business in question already had been awarded and since such business was contracted only through competitive bidding.

Howard, an announced candidate for the U.S. Senate, called a press conference Saturday to discuss the bribe attempt. He said he realized he had been contacted by undercover agents when he read news accounts of an undercover investigation of politicians, labor union

figures in Oklahoma, Texas, Louisiana and Arkansas. The probe is nicknamed

Brilab. Howard said he rejected a bribe offered by undercover FBI agents and turned over to the state \$5,000 he discovered in an envelope after the meeting.

At a press conference Monday, Howard said he believed the contact with undercover agents was "a clumsily handled" attempt to entrap him.

'There was no question it was entrapment because made all suggestions," Howard said.

'We're well aware of what the law of entrapment is, and in any sort of activities in which there are covert contacts, we don't create offenses where there were no offenses." Patton said.

Howard contends he met with the undercover agents in mid-November.

He said he mad successful attempt to report the meeting to the head of a state drug agency, but then decided to treat it as a good faith deposit to the state in case the firm the agents said they represented got the state's insurance trade.

The Senate leader sent an aide to the state employee's group health and life insurance board during a meeting Nov. 21. That by Howard's own account was several days after the FBI meeting.

Physicians can learn lot from autopsies

The idea of an autopsy autopsy is unpleasant, a bothers some people. But a relative may want to conmedical examination of a body's internal organs after death may affect insurance policy payments, workers' compensation cases or criminal investigations. Sometimes an autopsy can tell physicians a lot about a disease and help future patients, the Texas Medical

Association (TMA) said. But doctors cannot do without autopsies authorization. The next of kin authorizes an autopsy in most cases. A justice of the peace can order an autopsy if the cause of death is unclear or if suicide or murder is suspected, according to an article in the February issue say that an autopsy must of Texas Medicine, TMA's determine if a person died of monthly journal.

Texas law says someone can authorize donation of his policy authorizes the or her own body or various organs. But since no Texas next of kin still has the option law permits someone to of authorize his or her own examination, although autopsy, the nearest relative preventing it may mean often must decide. Under the stress of grief, the subject might not be easy to consider. Consulting an attorney may clear up any legal questions about authorization. Getting the full facts from a physician caused by his or her ocmay help clear up any other apprehensions.

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Aspirin full of surprises eighty years later

EDITOR'S NOTE -When aspirin was introduced in 1899, it was hailed as the answer to fever and pain. But doctors now wonder if this old standby of the medicine chest may be a new "wonder drug." This is first of a threepart series.

NEW YORK (AP) Eighty years after its introduction as a "wonder drug," plain old aspirin remains full of surprises.

The "pain reliever doctors recommend most" appears to help prevent strokes in some people, may give some protection against heart

attacks and could even aid in diabetes.

This common reducer and antiinflammatory drug is now known to lessen the redness of sunburn and has become part of therapy for a rare and once-fatal disease.

Regardless of the outcome, most doctors agree, that aspirin or drugs like it will be important weapons in: the pharmaceutical arsenal of the 1980s.

This probably would have, surprised Felix Hofmann, the German research chemist who set out in 1893 to find a remedy for his father's

rheumatoid arthritis. Hofmann dug through pharmacopoeias looking for other salicin relatives until he came on acetylsalicylic acid, synthesized by another German chemist in 1853 but unappreciated at that time. Hofmann found a cheaper and simpler way to make acetylsalicylic acid, and it gave his father the first, relief he'd had in 10 years.

Hofmann wanted to call his new drug "a-salicin." But his employers at the pharmaceutical firm Bayer & Co. overruled him, and the drug was christened "Aspirin" when it was

launched in 1899. It remained for John Vane and his colleagues in 1971 to discover how aspirin works.

Vane, of the Royal College of Surgeons in London, showed that aspirin inhibits production prostaglandins, ubiquitous hormone-like substances that are involved in body mechanisms ranging from fever to inducing labor.

Aspirin does this by blocking an enzyme known as prostaglandin synthetase cyclo-oxygenase. The body needs this enzyme to make precursors for most of half-dozen known prostaglandins and a few

other key substances as well. Among the prostaglandins that are blocked are those that make it easier for nerve cells to pass pain signals from one to another; those that raise fever in the body's thermostat in the brain; and those that promote the swelling of inflamed tissue.

But the key to many of aspirin's newest uses is something that was once considered its main drawback - its ability to increase bleeding.

Aspirin does this by inhibiting the blood cells called platelets from making a prostaglandin derivative called thromboxane which allows the platelets to clump together when a blood vessel is injured.

These clumps of platelets lay the foundation for a more substantial blood clot formed of fibrin fibers and red and white blood cells. Thus, platelets initiate blood clotting, but clotting can still" proceed when there is serious injury, even if the : platelets are stilled.

Since the body continually replaces platelets, repeated doses of aspirin are needed.

Unfortunately, if the dose of aspirin is too high, it will also inhibit another prostaglandin prostacyclin - made by the vessel walls. Prostacyclin has the opposite effect from throm-* boxane — it dissolves clots, apparently to keep the dangerously on healthyblood vessel walls.

a number of Now researchers are vestigating whether this anti-clotting action can be. used against a range of diseases in which bloodvessels are damaged including strokes, heart attacks and diabetes.

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

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Illegal aliens abused in Texas

(AP) - A federal civil rights instead used isolated inreport, critical of the Immigration and Naturalization Service's actions in Texas, says there is "convincing evidence" some illegal aliens have been and physically psychologically abused by INS officers.

The 68-page report, which is to be formally released today by the Texas Advisory Committee to the U.S. Civil Rights Commission, sharply criticizes the troubled agency's enforcement procedures and hiring practices in Texas.

INS Acting Regional Commissioner William Zimmer countered that the committee's study was slanted by a general anti-INS bias. He said the committee ignored the agency's

stances — both real and simply alleged - to reach general conclusions.

"We regard the tone of the committee's report as accusatory without firm basis," he said in a letter.

But the report recounted testimony before the committee 18 months ago about alleged physical, psychological and sexual abuse of some illegal aliens by Border Patrol agents.

plagued with problems nationwide, including similar allegations against the Border Patrol all along the U.S.-Mexico border.

"While the design of the open (committee) meeting was not intended to be broad enough to establish patterns discrimination, several

problem areas tended to points recur in the testimony," the report said.

The report said the INS relies on its agents to report abuse by fellow officers, a self-policing policy the committee said is of questionable effectiveness.

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
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
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
