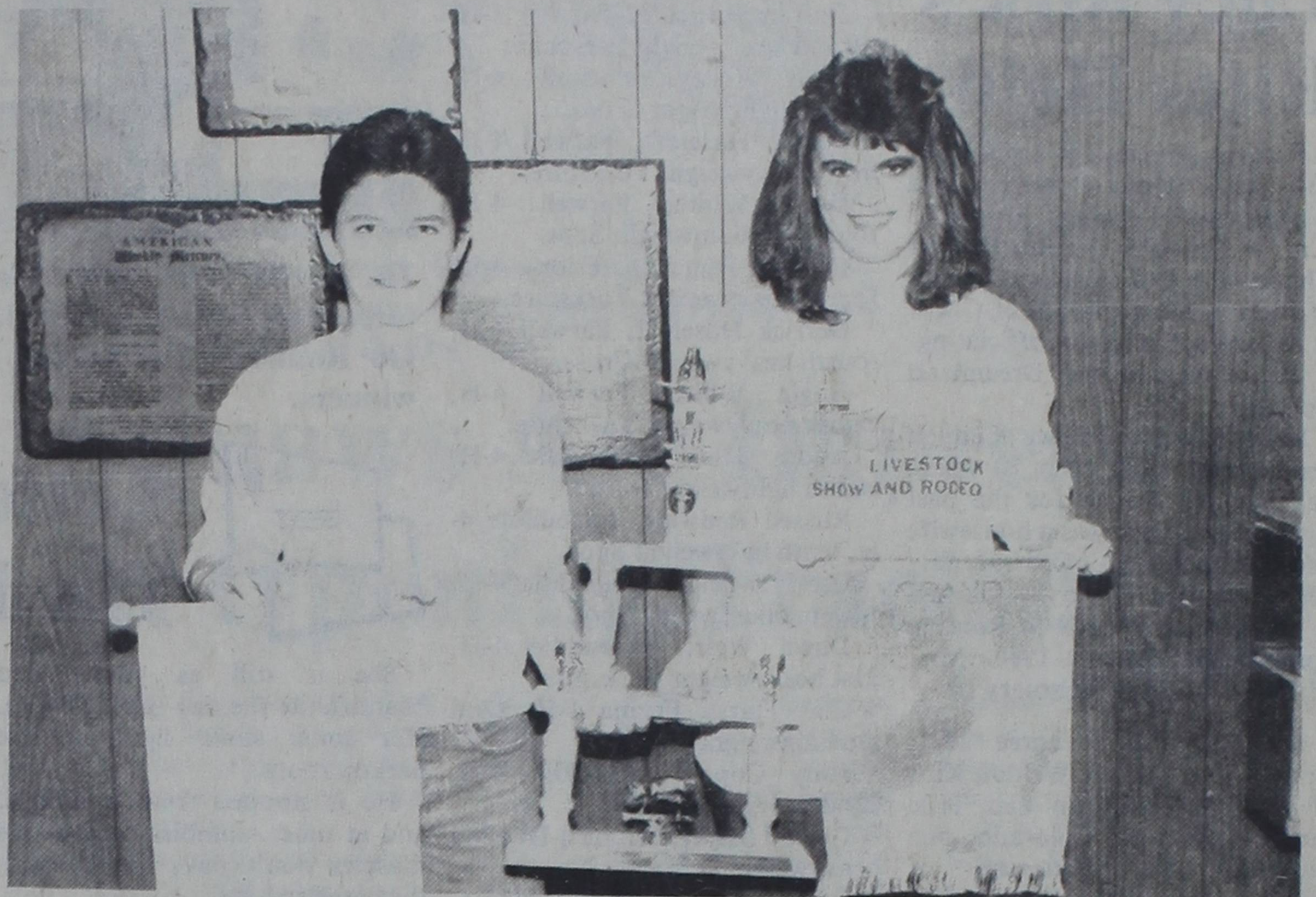
New directors for 1987 will also be recognized at the meeting. They are John Baxter, Joe Mejia, Harry Hutcheson, Hendley and Ron Smiley.

A MOVEMENT SEEMS to be underway in Amarillo to do away with the term "Panhandle." Those pushing the movement argue that the term *Panhandle* is somewhat nebulous, and has a bad connotation to those the area might be trying to entice to move here.

An article in the current issue of *Accent West* points out that dictionaries give the word "panhandle" as a verb which means "to beg." After acknowledging it as a pan appendage, they say panhandle as a noun refers to "the remote area of certain states."

"So, the composite of these definitions is that panhandle means 'a remote beggar,' not exactly the best image to convey to an industrial development prospect," the magazine asserts.

An Amarillo television station wanted to know what the name "Panhandle" communicated to New York advertising agency media buyers. An outline map of the state was mailed to 100 of them with the request that they shade in the area they thought might be called the Panhandle.

Seventy-three of the 100 returned the card, on which 50 per cent had shaded in the Big Bend area. Twenty-five per cent had shaded in the Rio Grande Valley. The other 25 per cent had the Panhandle located correctly.

"One has to speculate that of the 23 who didn't return the card, some saw no resemblance to a pan or a handle and didn't care to guess. Viewing the map of Texas objectively, one's imagination is stretched to see this area as a handle of a pan," the article continues.

Our panhandle is a little less obvious than the panhandle of Oklahoma. Now that must be the state that started the term in the first place.

Those who are concerned with the problem also think that the term "Golden Spread" also comes up short, conjuring up vast wheat fields, without picturing the energetic diversified economy.

Similarly, the term "High Plains" although having a positive ring, "sounds beautiful, cool, windy, and empty," the magazine says.

The alternative, according to the movers and shakers of Amarillo, is "The Crown of Texas."

"The important point is that we need a name that captures not just the beauty of our land and our colorful heritage, but the vitality, warmth, pride and enthusiasm of our people. We want to evoke images of our abundant natural resources, our clean water and air, our sturdy institutions--religious, political and educational, our diverse cultural amenities and unbonded opportunities of every kind," the article insists.

Those of us living in Parmer County are probably not as put off by the term Panhandle as some. A number of the national news and weather reporters on network television know about the Texas Panhandle. Listen to the morning network weather forecast, if you don't believe it.

Changing such an embedded nickname as the Panhandle may require a lot of doing, but we wish the folks in Amarillo luck if they think it will help.

By the way, if we ask an Amarillo resident where you're from, don't try to impress us with this "Crown" business. We have no trouble locating Amarillo. It's just north of Canyon.

All Teachers Are Rehired By Board

All present teachers in the Friona School System will be offered contracts for the 1987-88 school term, as per action Monday at the monthly meeting of the Friona School board of trustees.

In other action, the board indicated that it would participate to the extent of \$15,000 toward construction of an all-weather track at Chieftain Field.

It was reported that the Chieftain Parents organization has some money they plan to donate

toward the project, and are looking for possible grants with an eye toward fund-raisers to assist the project.

The first estimate to build a first-class all-weather track at FHS was \$60,000.

In other business, the board approved the annual Performance Report for the district. The board also denied a request for forgiveness of penalty and interest on a delinquent tax account.

The school calendar for 1987-88 was approved. It will be very similar to the present school calendar, with a two-week break at Christmas time.

The Textbook Committee's report on books for 1987-88 was approved.

The board members cast their ballots for Region XVI service center directors.

The tax report showed that 89 per cent of the taxes were collected as of February 20.

The board reviewed the budget status, and made minor amendments. February bills were approved for payment.

CHS Asks For Dues

The Community Heritage Society is needing funds to continue with the renovation of the old Santa Fe depot building on the City Park, according to the Society's president, Lois Norwood.

"If everyone who is a member of the Society or who is interested in the depot project would come forth and pay their \$5.00 dues for 1987 we could begin to make some good progress on the depot," Miss Norwood said.

Heritage Society dues can be paid to Peggy Monroe at Friona State Bank or to the society president Mary Johnston at Box 831, Friona. Memorial donations are also encouraged, and can be made at the bank.

Plans are currently underway for some money making projects which will be announced next month.

Lazbuddie Youth Has Houston Champ

A Lazbuddie family came up with a way to combat the soft agriculture economy: have a grand champion at the Houston Livestock Show.

That's what 16-year-old Susan Redwine, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Harrol Redwine, accomplished. The 247-pound Hampshire-Duroc cross, named "Sparkplug," sold at the show's premium auction for \$35,000.

The seventh time was charmed for the Lazbuddie youngster, entering the Houston Show for the seventh year. She is a former exhibitor of the Grand Champion at the Parmer County Jr. Livestock Show (1984).

In addition, Susan's brother, Russell, who exhibited the Reserve Champion Barrow at the 1987 Parmer County Show, made it to the premium sale with his 213-pound Poland China barrow, nicknamed "Axle." The barrow was tenth in its class.

In order to qualify for the show, most prestigious in the state, the exhibitors first have to survive a "sifting" process at Brenham. Of approximately 2,600 barrows whose owners had hopes of showing at Houston, only 1,200 survived the cut.

In winning the breed champion banner for the crossbreeds, Susan had to win out over some 125 barrows in the heavyweight division of the Crossbred division.

The win for the Lazbuddie family capped off a remarkable comeback, after Susan was injured in a pickup accident near the family's farm last December 12.

She rolled her pickup over on a slick dirt road, and sustained serious injuries.

Among her injuries were broken ribs, plus cuts and abrasions to her face. She spent about a week in the hospital, and had to have eye surgery as well as plastic surgery on her face at Amarillo.

While Susan was convalescing, her 12-year-old brother, Russell, had to take over the feeding and care of the barrows, so that they turned out to be more of a "partnership" for the youngsters. "We feel that Russell deserves a lot of credit for the way the barrow progressed," his parents said.

The Redwines had words of thanks to all of the FFA and 4-H Club members and adult leaders who were on hand to help boost them along on the recent trip to Houston. "There are a lot of fine folks in Parmer County, and they gave us a big boost. I hope we get a chance to help them sometime," Redwine said.

Susan's first cousin, 12-year-old Melissa O'Donald of Amarillo, made it a family affair by exhibiting the Reserve Champion Barrow at Houston. Melissa's 232-pound Hampshire sold at auction for \$23,000.

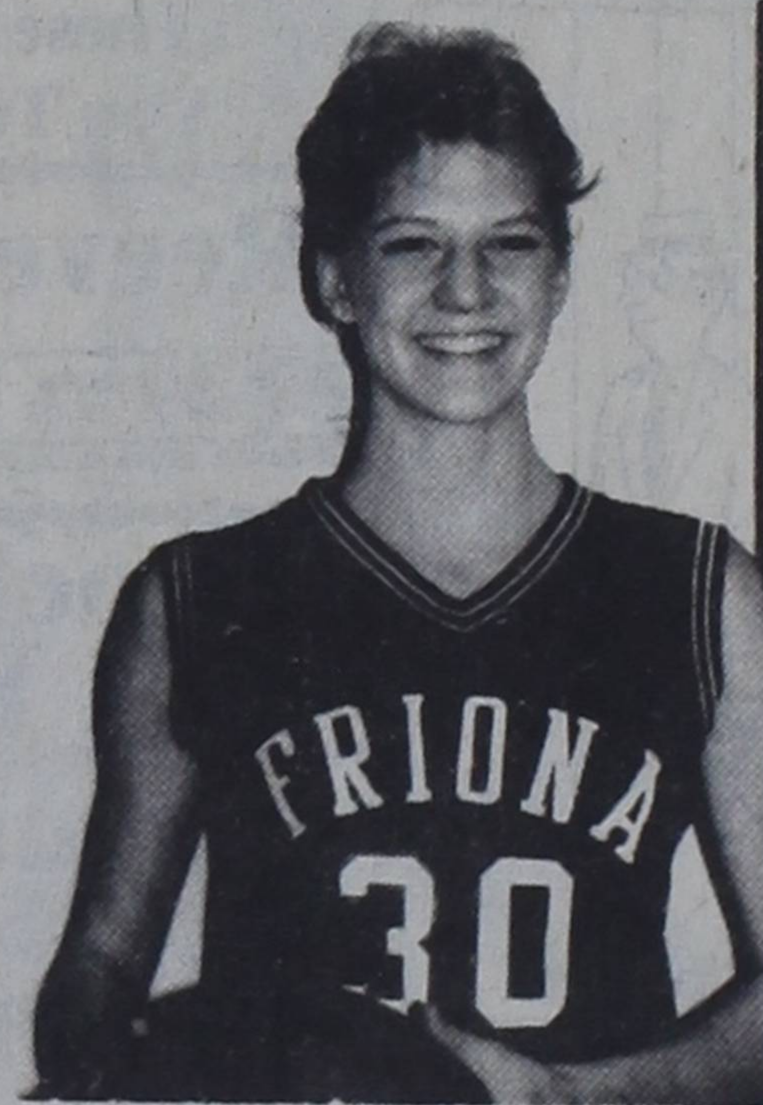
Susan is the daughter of the former Charlotte Seaton, and Melissa is the daughter of the former Theresa Seaton. Both of the girls' uncles, Jimmie Dale and Ricky Seaton, have exhibited grand champion barrows at Houston, making them second generation winners.

The girls are the granddaughters of Mr. and Mrs. Jimmie Seaton of Lazbuddie. Both gave their grandfather credit for helping select the hogs for this year's show. "He really has an eye for them," said Susan, who plans to use the money from the auction sale to attend West Texas State University.

The barrow was produced by swine breeder Joe Tarter of Lazbuddie, and Redwine says that speaks well for the ability of local breeders to produce top-notch stock.

Susan is a member of the Parmer County 4-H program.

"Things being like they are, this will be a big help. It's nice to know that the college expenses are paid," Redwine said.

Ronda Ratcliff, a member of the Friona Squaws' bi-district championship team, has been chosen to take part in the Golden Spread All-Star games, to be held Friday and Saturday, April 3-4 at the West Texas State University Fieldhouse.

Miss Ratcliff was chosen to play on the "North" team, and her team will play at 6:30 p.m. April 3, and will play again April 4.

"Ronda is very deserving of being chosen. She worked real hard all year," stated her coach, Vicki Hatton.

During her senior year, Miss Ratcliff averaged 14 points per game, hitting 47 per cent of her field goal shots and 50 per cent of her shots from the free throw line. She also averaged eight rebounds per game and three assists.

She improved all of her shooting and scoring marks from a year ago, and was ranked in the top ten girls scorers and rebounders on the South Plains by the Lubbock Avalanche-Journal throughout the season.

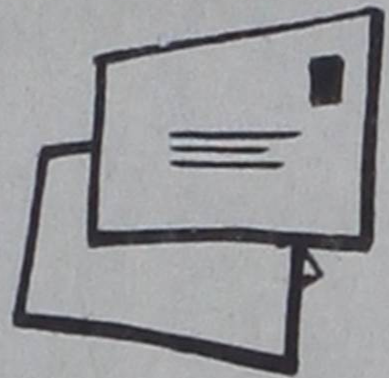

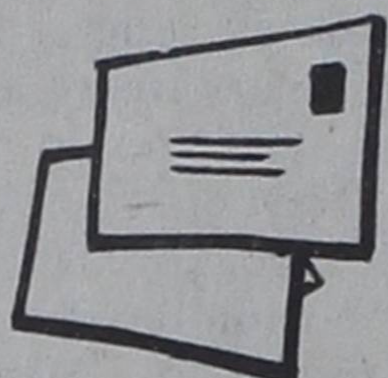

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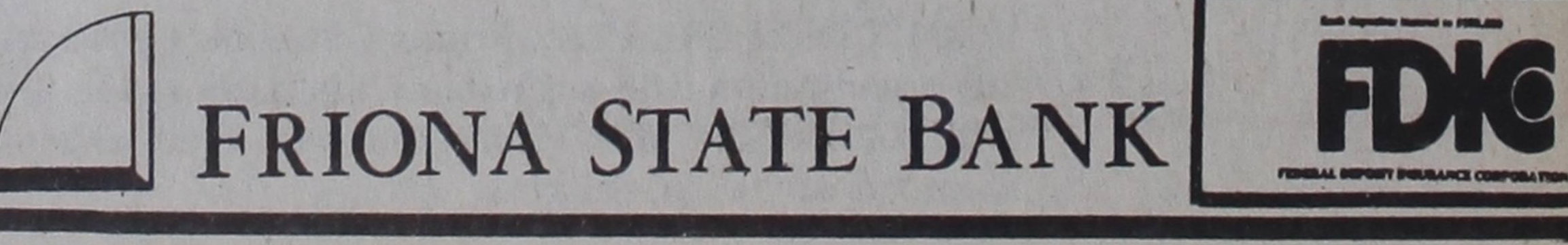
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BURNEY SETS MARK

Chieftains Rally To Win Local Meet

After a somewhat shaky start, the Friona Chieftains got everything together in the finals, and scored a come-from-behind team win in their own invitational meet here last Saturday.

Going into the final event, the 1600-meter (mile) relay, Friona was trailing in the point standings with 82 points to 90 for Dalhart and 88 for Denver City.

But the mile relay foursome scored a smashing win, to give Friona the team title. Members of the relay team are Toby Gibson, Cody Bracken, Stephen Thornton and Daniel Echols.

The winning time by the relay foursome, 3:34.9, was the fastest on the local track in a number of years, and was very close to the best time recorded in the event by the 1986 team.

A highlight of the meet was when high jumper Shy Burney cleared 6-8 to win his event and set a new meet and school record. Burney barely missed his final attempt at 6-9, when the bar wobbled and fell off.

Echols won the 400-meter dash with an excellent time of 51.85. Coach Steve Williams said Echols' time was the best for the event since he has been track coach at FHS.

Friona's only other win was by Toby Gibson in the 200-meter dash. He won the event in 23.88, edging Dalhart's Hopson by .01.

Early in the meet, things were not looking good for Friona's chances to win the team title. Pole vaulter Rod Britting passed until the bar reached 12-6, and then failed to clear this height. Britting thus went from a favorite in the event to no points.

Then, the 400-meter relay team dropped the baton in the preliminaries and failed to qualify for the finals, and hurdler Peter Malouf fell in his preliminary race, likewise failing to make the finals.

"After the break, between the preliminaries and the finals, things turned around pretty well for us. I thought the times by the relay team, Echols, Gibson and Burney's jump were super for this early in the season," Williams said.

Echols was second to Burney's record performance in the high jump with a leap of 6-4. This gave him 23 points, for individual

honors. Also placing second were Jeff Chaney in the shot put with a toss of 44-4½; Daniel Padilla in the discus with a throw of 138-7 and Stephen Thornton in the 300-meter intermediate hurdles in 42.75. Thornton was edged at the tape for first place.

Lance Gatlin placed third in the 110-meter high hurdles at 16.51; and Sam Montoya was third in the pole vault, clearing 12 feet.

Glenn Trimmell placed fourth in the shot put at 43-1¼; Bracken placed fifth in the 200-meter dash at 24.57; Chaney was sixth in the discus at 124-11 and Mickey Pena was sixth in the 800-meter run at 2:18.31.

John Ed Duke barely missed scoring, placing seventh in the 3200-meter (two mile) run with a time of 11:43.02.

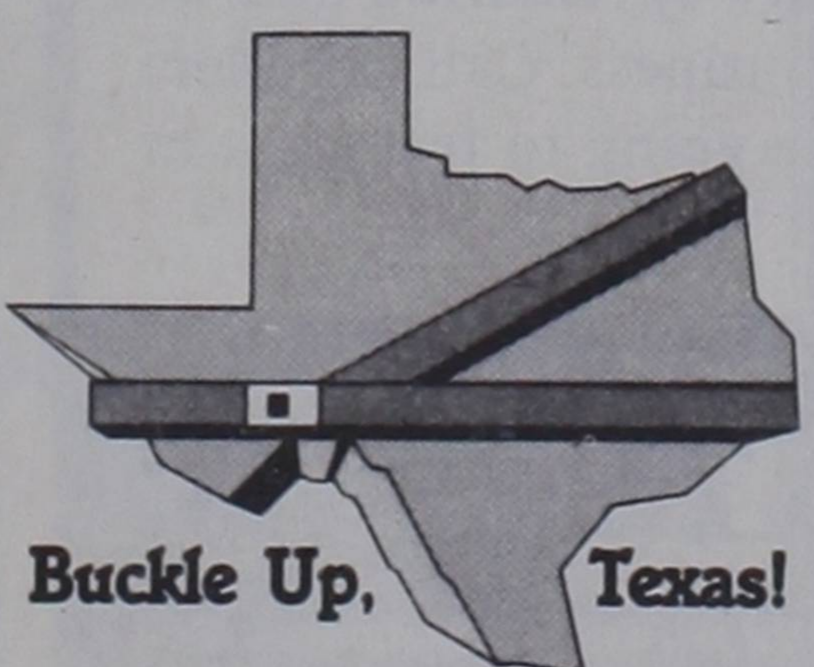

Squaws Are Impressive In Opening Track Meet

The Friona Squaws opened their 1987 track season by placing second in what turned out to be a triangular meet on their home track last Saturday.

The Squaws scored 160 points to trail winning Springlake-Earth, 207 points, and lead third-place Littlefield, who scored 140 points.

Friona had a double winner in senior Ronda Ratcliff. Miss Ratcliff won the high jump at 4-10, and the 400-meter dash at 68.4. She also ran a leg on the winning 1600-meter relay team, to account for 25 points.

The team also had a stellar performance from sophomore Sindy Preston, who won the long jump with a leap of 14-9¼; placed second in the high jump at 4-8, and second in the 200-meter dash at 28.39. This gave Miss Preston 26 points for the day.

Lacye Osborn won the 800-meter run with a time of 2:44.26, and ran on the 1600-meter team. Other members of the relay team besides Misses Osborn and Ratcliff were Michelle Echols and Dara Wells.

The relay team clocked a 4:42.26 to outdistance their two opponents.

Michelle Echols, a freshman member of the varsity, had a 21-point effort for the day. She was second in the 400-meter dash at 68.83, was fourth in the high jump, clearing 4-4, and ran on the 1600-meter and 400-meter relay teams.

Another freshman, Julie Howard, pushed Littlefield's Macha in the 100-meter dash, placing second by .04 of a second, with a time of 14.37. Miss Howard also ran on the second place sprint relay team and the third place 800-meter team.

Cindy Ureste, a third freshman, placed third in the 100-meter race with a time of 14.59, and ran on the 400-meter and 800-meter relay teams, to account for 13 points.

Misty Cole, yet another freshman, was second to Miss Osborn in the 800-meter race at 3:03.66, and ran on the 400-meter relay team.

Dara Wells gave Friona a sweep in the 400-meter race, finishing third to Misses Ratcliff and Echols with a time of 72.04, and ran a leg on the 1600-meter team.

Other point-makers included freshmen Dana and Dona Auburg. The twins placed third and fourth

in the 100-meter hurdles race, with times of 21.39 (Dana) and 21.51, (Dona). Dona placed fifth in the triple jump at 24-1, and both girls ran on the 800-meter relay team.

Staci Mueller—a freshman—placed fourth in the 200-meter dash at 32.74.

"We got some good performances from these young members of the squad. We'll have a tough meet this week at Roosevelt," said Coach Vicki Hatton.

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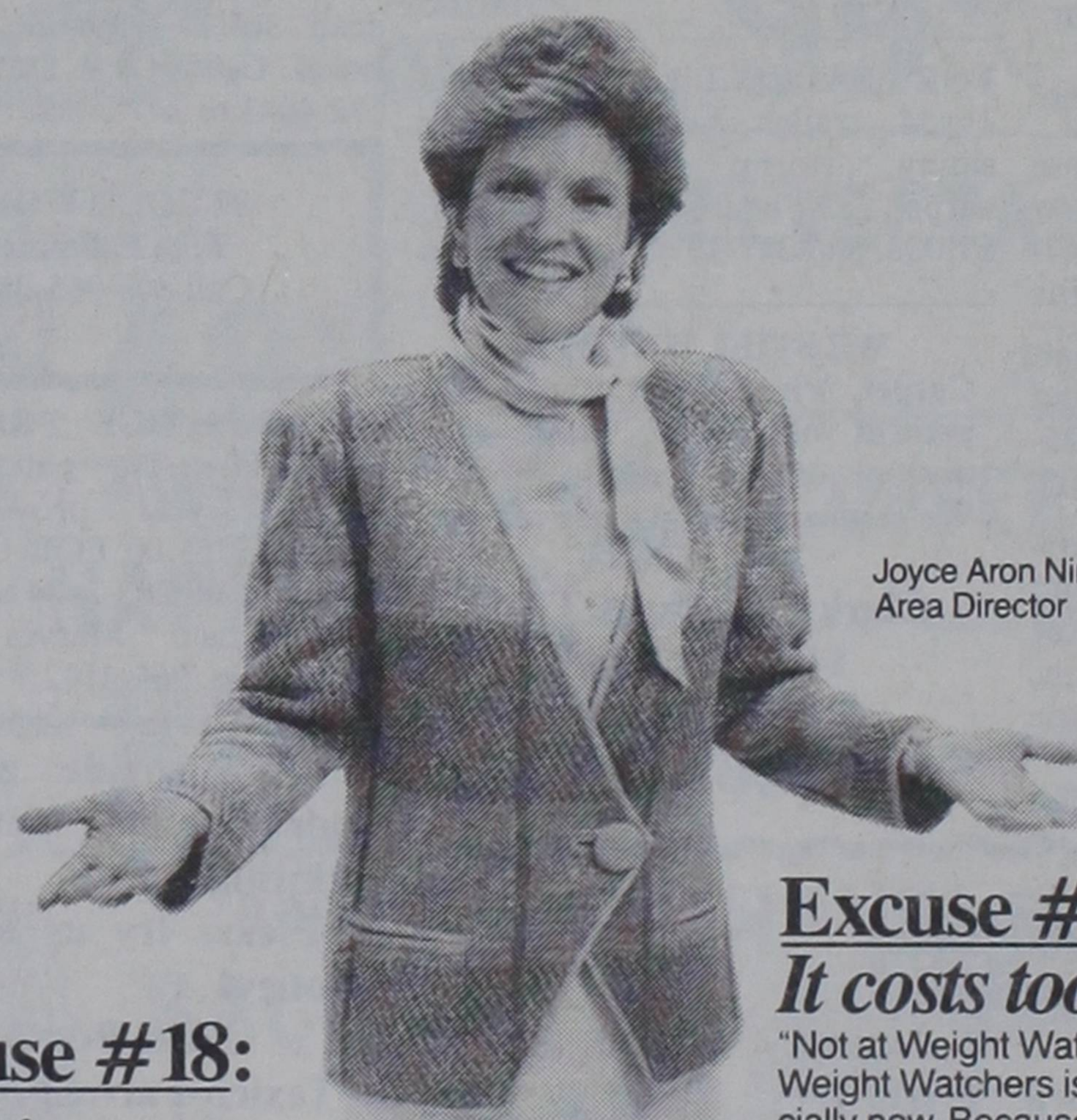

Library Users Have New Experiences

Library users appear to be active people who welcome new experiences, according to a study just completed by the American Library Association that analyzed

the responses of nearly 4,000 adults to an annual lifestyle and attitude survey.

Fifty-eight per cent of all the respondents said they had used a library in the last year, and 34 per cent had visited one at least five times. The ALA survey shows that more women than men go to the library, and most frequent visitors are likely to have children under 17 at home.

They are more adventurous about travel and how they spend their time than non-users. They are more likely to go to a concert, an art gallery or a lecture. They are also more sociable, according to their responses, which indicate that they give and attend more parties than non-users.

Their family incomes were higher and they were more likely to have a college education, the study shows.

The heaviest library users--those who visit at least 12 times a year--are more interested in new and exciting experiences than non-users. They are more likely to swim, ski, jog or go boating and bicycling. They are interested in camping, as are non-users, but are far less likely to go hunting.

Library users are also more optimistic about the future and feel good about themselves. They more frequently volunteer for civic activities than non-users.

Although the study does not fully represent the very rich or the very poor, ALA officials note, projected nationally more than 78 million adults visit the library at least once a year.

Each year, library users check out more than 1 billion books, video cassettes, games, software, records, business machines and other materials offered, the ALA reports.

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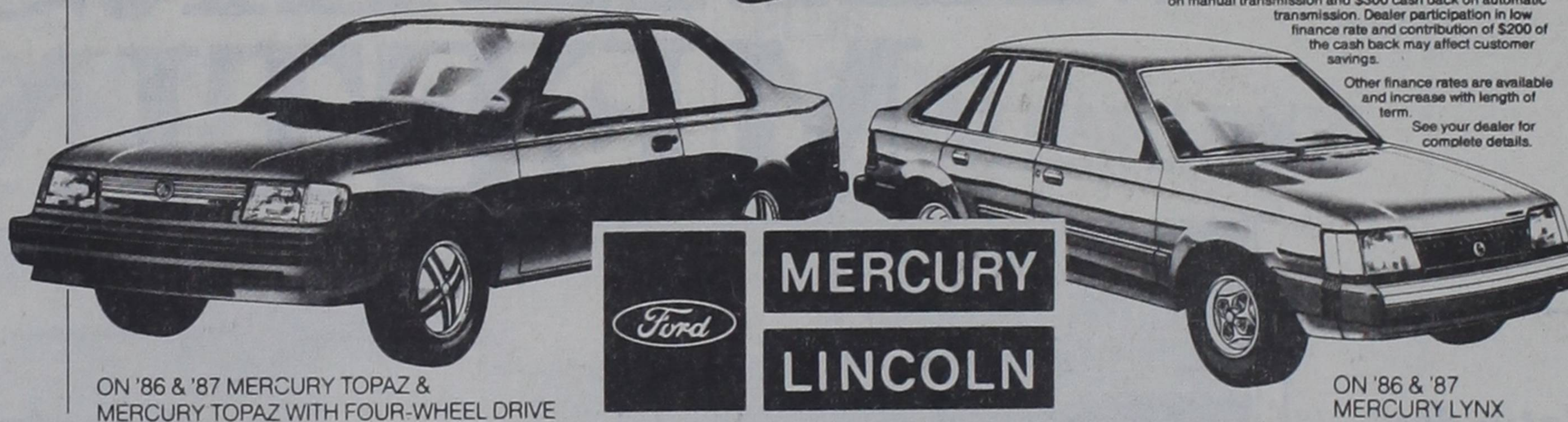
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Randa Allen, Lynn Copley Exchange Wedding Vows

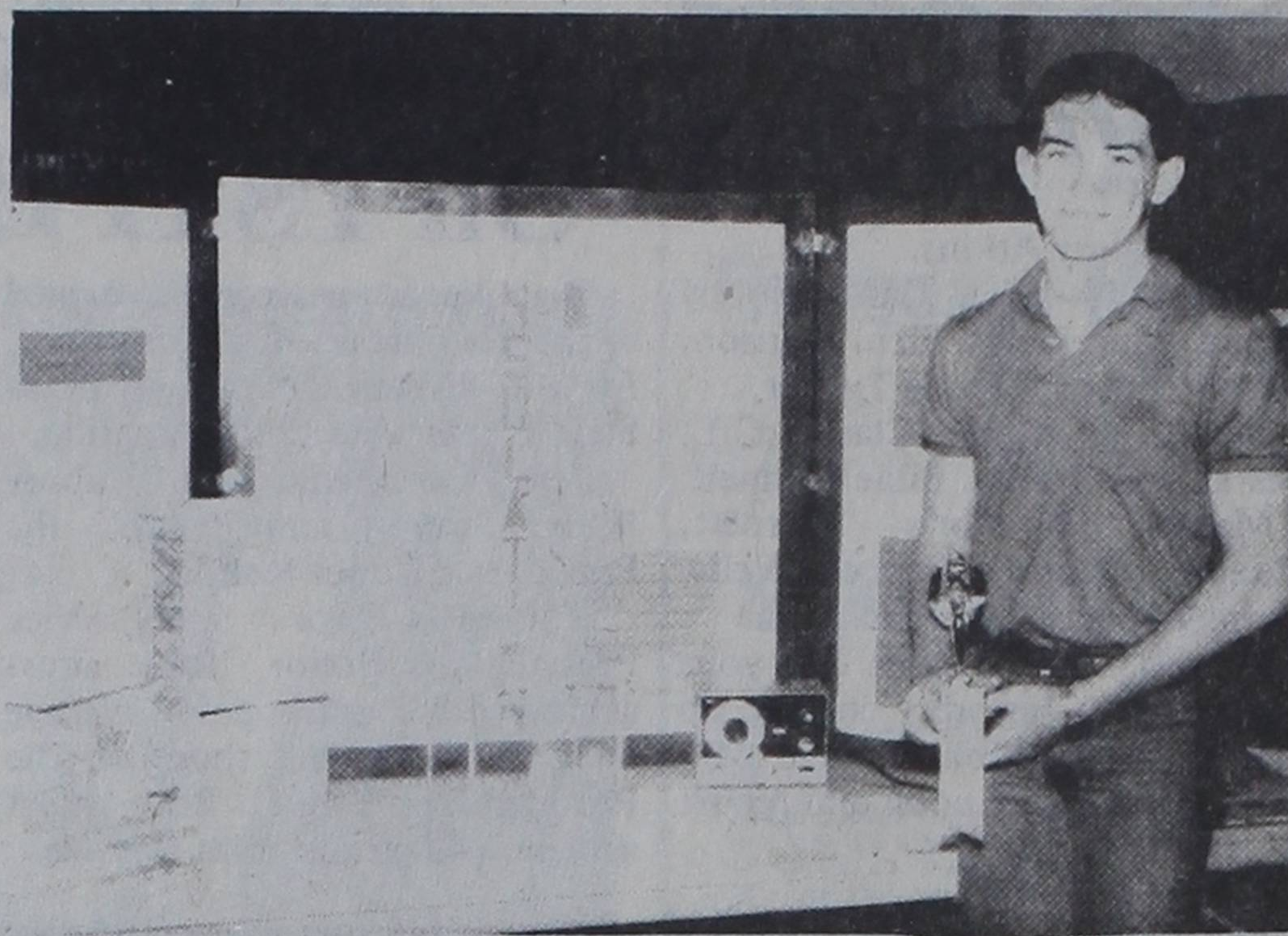
