## Carter, Reagan win big in primary

CONCORD, N.H. (AP) — Sen. Edward Kennedy, now a three-time loser, is overhauling his presidential campaign in desperate quest of a comeback against President Carter. And Ronald Reagan, under new management, is back atop the

Republican field. Democrat Carter and Reagan were the big winners in Tuesday's New Hampshire presidential primary elections. Kennedy and former U.N. Ambassador George Bush were the

"This is the first and it sure is the best," said Reagan. In his first outing, last month in Iowa, Reagan was an upset loser to Bush.

Carter, in a victory statement of his own, said his triumph shows voters "support the policies that we've espoused" on foreign crises, inflation

Carter bested Kennedy by 11 percentage points, 49 percent to 38 percent. California Gov. Edmund Brown Jr. earned 10 percent.

Reagan fashioned a Republican landslide, capturing 50 percent of the vote in a seven-way race, and building a margin of better than 2-to-1 over Bush. Sen. Bob Dole ran dead last and said he would enter no more

Meanwhile, at party caucuses in Minnesota Tuesday night, Carter was the easy winner in a Democratic straw vote, while Reagan held a 33-30 percent edge with about half the Republican balloting counted.

Kennedy didn't attempt a challenge to Carter in Minnesota, but the New England defeat pushed him closer to elimination as an effective opponent for the Democratic nomination.

His task now is to maintain the credibility and the finances to get there. He meets Carter in his own Massachusetts next Tuesday, and ranks a heavy favorite.

White House Press Secretary Jody Powell said Carter would be satisfied with 20 percent of the vote in Massachusetts. He wouldn't, but Carter's strategy is to set targets and thus expectations - as low as possible

The New Hampshire balloting ended a brief Bush reign as the leader among Republicans. But Bush said he had succeeded in making the GOP competition a two-man race with Reagan.

Reagan's win came hours after the former California governor ousted campaign manager John P. Sears, his chief strategist in two presidential contests, and replaced him with William J. Casey, former head of the Securities and Exchange Com-

Reagan said he did it because of differences over campaign spending priorities, and because he now wants to emphasize the "people to people type of campaigning I have been doing here in New Hampshire.'

Kennedy's campaign manager and brother-in-law, Stephen Smith, said there will be "a considerable number of changes" in the personnel and strategy of Kennedy's organization. He would not spell them out.

Though Kennedy was campaigning today in Birmingham and Montgomery Ala., Smith said he will devote little time or money to the South, Carter's home region. Instead, Smith said. Kennedy will concentrate on Massachusetts and make his next major push in Illinois' primary on

The vote in New Hampshire's record turnout read this way:

Carter, 53,586 or 49 percent, which won him 10 nominating delegates. Kennedy, 41,540 or 38 percent, for 9

Brown, 10,727 or 10 percent. Two minor candidates got the

The delegate apportionment was based on showings statewide and in each of New Hampshire's two congressional districts

The Republican results Reagan, 72,940 for 5 percent and 13 delegate votes for the nomination.

Bush, 33,471 for 23 percent and 5

Sen. Howard Baker Jr., 18,832 for 13 percent and 2 delegates.

Rep. John B. Anderson of Illinois, 14,706 for 10 percent and 2 delegates. Rep. Philip Crane of Illinois, 2,628 or

Former Gov. John B. Connally of Texas, 2,241 or 2 percent. Dole of Kansas, 608.

Former President Gerald R. Ford polled 380 write-in votes.

Minnesota also staged presidential contest Tuesday, at precinct caucuses that began the process of selecting 75 Democratic and 34 Republican National Convention delegates. Carter backers are certain to dominate delegate selection in the home state of Vice President Walter Mondale. Reagan was comfortably ahead of Bush. Neither the Democratic nor GOP straw poll binds

In Manchester, Kennedy held what amounted to a celebration of defeat. "Well, we got almost 40 percent of the vote," he told cheering supporters. "Four years ago, Jimmy Carter got 28 percent of the vote and he claimed

victory and we're claiming victory tonight." (Carter's 28 percent put him first in a big field)

It was Kennedy's second setback in New England. Carter beat him in Maine caucuses on Feb. 10. The president's margin there was 3.4 percent. Spokesmen for Kennedy said that signaled progress because Carter was the 2-to-1 victor in Iowa caucuses on Jan. 21.

## Gun victim in critical condition

The man who was allegedly shot in the head by a Big Spring patrolman has a slightly higher than 50-50 chance of surviving, according to his physician, J.W. Tipton.

"And if he lives, he has months of plastic surgery ahead of him," he

Mark Boocher, 29, 2205 Main, was shot once in the head early Monday morning by a .38 caliber bullet. Big Spring Police Patrolman Sean Curran, charged in connection with the shooting, was immediately suspended without pay

Boocher is still listed in critical but stable condition at Malone-Hogan Hospital. He will be taken into surgery Thursday for the second time, to have the wound examined and the dressings changed.

He will be kept in the intensive care unit of the hospital for at least another week. Physicians are keeping a watch for meningitis, which can be caused by bullet fragments which may have remained in his head.

According to Tipton, the bullet entered the left side of his face, under his eye. The bullet ripped through his face and discharged near his left ear. "I think the only thing that saved his

life was that the bullet entered his face at a slight angle," he said. Tipton said Boocher's sight in his

left eye "might be impaired." "We still don't know if he's going to live. His chances are a little better than 50-50 that he's going to make it. And if he does, he has months of

plastic surgery ahead of him.' According to sources, Boocher has lived in Big Spring approximately three weeks. He is employed as the foreman of the box department at. Cameo Energy Homes. Katherine Curran, Sean Curran's estranged

wife, is also an employee of Cameo. Curran and his wife separated approximately the beginning of December. Mrs. Curran moved to a new address while her husband stayed at their old residence. Their two-yearold daughter lives with Mrs. Curran.

Curran had worked the night shift Sunday. After work, early Monday morning, he passed his estranged wife's residence where she was scraping her car windows, before departing for work. Upon seeing him, she went inside her residence and closed the front door.

Curran rang the doorbell and his wife answered. Curran allegedly walked in and started searching the

Boocher was preparing to go to work. When Curran saw him behind a door, he allegedly shot him.

Curran was arrested and charged with aggravated assault in connection with the shooting. He was released on \$25,000 bond set by Justice of the Peace Bob West.

When contacted by the Big Spring Herald Tuesday morning in connection with the incident, Mrs. Curran declined to comment saying, "The whole thing is going to come out and I don't want to talk about it now."

When she was called a second time Tuesday afternoon and asked to comment on the above information she said, "It may sound bad, but that's the way it is.

Sean Curran refused comment Tuesday afternoon on the advice of his attorney, Robert Moore III. Contacted by the Herald, Moore also declined comment

According to reports, Boocher does not have any known relatives living in Big Spring. However, it has been reported that some of them have called the hospital. One male friend reportedly has visited him in the hospital.

Distress sale necessary

### KWAB may face foreclosure

WASHINGTON - The Texas creditor for four television stations owned by Grayson Enterprises this week told the Federal Communications Commission it will foreclose on the properties April 1 if authorities do not approve a pending

Paul Froyd, an attorney for the FCC, said the Mercantile National Bank at Dallas wants to recoup \$3.9 million in debts Grayson owes on television stations KTXS in Abilene, KLBK in Lubbock, KMOM in Monahans and KWAB in Big Spring.

Grayson, meanwhile, has applied to the FCC to sell the stations to two minority-owned companies - Prima Inc., and Permian Basin — for a price that last week was revised down to \$14.1 million from \$15 million.

Grayson wants to sell KTXS and KLBK to Prima, and KWAB and KMOM to Permian Basin.

The so-called distress sale is necessary because in July 1977 the FCC cited Grayson stations for alleged violations of FCC regulations including fraudulent billing and airing

However, federal law allows a station under investigations to opt to sell the property "substantially below market value" to a group of investors, the majority of whom are black financiers.

'The law was made to encourage black participation in the television industry," said Froyd.

The owners of Prima Inc. are Dr. John Robert Lee, an assistant director of athletics at the University of Wisconsin, Larry Reed, an assistant basketball coach at the University of Wisconsin and Wayne Embrey, a former professional basketball player

with the New York Knicks. The investors in Permian Basin Television are a group of Hispanic American businessmen and lawyers from Albuquerque. Froyd said Grayson's selling price is clearly below market value, estimated at \$18.7 million.

"Since the FCC, in effect, is letting Grayson sell rather than be investigated for possibly violating its regulations, we want to make sure they are selling the television stations below what they could normally get," Froyd said Froyd predicted, however, that an

appropriate price may be reached 'within months. He said that if the FCC approved a

sale before April 1, it is unlikely the Dallas bank would foreclose. And the bank at any time before that time could change its mind about

foreclosure "It would be a very anti-community

sort of thing to do," said Froyd. There is little doubt they could get their money out of the properties, but the stations would have to re-apply for licenses that might take up to a year

He said the bank would only be selling the stations real estate. buildings, machinery and towers.

At the same time, former U.S. Rep. Barbara Jordan, D-Tex., who had initially made a bid to buy three of the stations, has asked the FCC not to approve a sale to Prima and Permian. Midland Telecasting Inc. has also

asked the FCC not to approve the sale to the minority-owned investors, claiming the selling price is too high.

### Housing construction down

NEW YORK (AP) - Housing construction nationwide has fallen for the first time in five years following credit-tightening moves by the Federal Reserve, according to an industry survey.

The F.W. Dodge Division of McGraw-Hill Information Systems Co. said the 10.5 percent decline in 1979 was felt even in some booming cities in the Southwest

Dodge said 1,767,905 homes were built in 1979, down from 1,975,640 the year before. In the fourth quarter, when the Fed boosted interest rates in a bid to control inflation, the total was down 19.2 percent from the same period the year before.





### Minnesota caucus overshadowed

MINNEAPOLIS (AP) President Carter and Ronald Reagan scored victories in Minnesota party caucuses, but the triumphs here were somewhat overshadowed by events in New Hampshire.

National convention delegates were chosen in the New England state's primary election Tuesday. But the non-binding straw polls in Minnesota were only the first step in selecting that state's contingent.

Republican returns from about 2,000 of Minnesota's 4,024 precincts showed Reagan with 33 percent, George Bush with 30 percent

and Rep. John Anderson of Illinois with 13 percent. They were followed by Sen. Howard Baker of Tennessee with 7 percent; John Connally, 6 percent; Rep. Philip Crane of Illinois, 3 percent, and Sen. Bob Dole of Kansas, 1 percent. Six percent were undecided

The state Republican organization spent \$12,000 for a computer operation to tally results, but the system broke down. A manual count was abandoned early today after tabulators lost track of the total number of precincts tallied.












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

### Some medical terms just scary

Paul G. Donohue, M.D.

(A reader, who prefers not to have her letter printed, has great concern about various terms used in a medical report. I would like to share at least my answer with other readers.)

Some medical terms get so colored that their practical meanings are destroyed. This is true of such words as "cancer" and "malignancy."

Most people associate those words with prolonged illness or death. That is not true in many instances 'Carcinoma in situ'' (one phrase that bothered the reader) is an example

Yes, carcinoma does mean cancer. Yes, it is malignant. No, it does not have to mean uncurable; it does not have to mean prolonged illness or death. "Epidermoid carcinoma in situ of the cervix" means that malignant changes have occurred in some of the cells of the cervix (the base of the uterus). It means, too, that the carcinoma is contained in one place. That is what "in situ" means. That implies that complete cure can be obtained with appropriate treatment, such as

surgery 'Dysplasia' is another trouble word. It means there are changes in the nucleus and insides of cells, making them abnormal. These are not cancerous changes. There is a chance that, left alone, they may develop into cancer. This kind of change is often found adjacent to areas of carcinoma in situ. Again, appropriate treatment

ends the problem. Another confusing term is "focal." All this means is that the changes were found in a specific defined area and were not generalized. The writer was also disturbed by the term 'decensus," used with regard to the uterus. All that means is that the uterus had dropped. It does not imply

malignancy. Some doctors may in such cases avoid the word "malignancy." It is not to cheat the patient of the "truth," but only to avoid undue anxiety because of the coloring some precise medical words take on in the public

Dear Dr. Donohue: I am a regular reader. I was in the hospital recently for a bleeding ulcer. I was in the hospital 12 days, then home eight days and then was right back in. I got septicemia. I have not been able to find out if there is any connection between the first trip and the second or where I got the septicemia. Can you explain? - M.G.

Septicemia is blood poisoning from bacteria. Bacteria or bacterial products (toxins) somehow got from

your body into your bloodstream.

The ways this can happen are many. Short-lived "showers" of bacteria often get into the blood, and the body may be able to filter them out on its own. But if bacteria are continuously released into the blood, a potentially serious condition arises that requires treatment with antibiotics.

It is possible for such bacteria to get into the blood circulation by way of an ulcer, but this cannot be said for sure. As you know, many people have ulcers without getting septicemia from them. Any number of other routes exist. Something as commonplace as a boil can provide the gateway to the bloodstream

In any event, I am sure that attention is being focused on trying to heal up those ulcers to prevent any recurrence. If the ulcer was the entry route, healing it will eliminate the problem. I hope this has happened already

Dear Dr. Donohue: I am interested in time-released aspirin. The contents are double the ordinary aspirin. I am 73 and have arthritis that bothers me at night so that I cannot sleep. I would like to try it. - B.G.

Time-release preparations of drugs are designed to produce slow, gradual, uniform release from the stomach and intestinal tract into the bloodstream. Potential advantages of such preparations are the fewer number of times you have to take them and the stretching out of effects, as overnight. Varying sizes of the components of the medicine (for example, some are prepared in the form of tiny beads) allow the staggered, gradual release. Nothing wrong with

Certainly, you could try the preparation you mention to see if it does give you overnight relief. The manufacturer is reputable. The fact that the tablet has twice the amount of medication means you should take only one instead of two, or half of whatever amount you were taking in conventional aspirin over the time period needed.

Dear Dr. Donohue: My daughter began her menstrual periods. She is only nine, and, of course, we are concerned about what this holds for her future. Can you comment? - Mrs.

DEAR DR. GRAHAM: Why do you think Christians aren't persecuted today? Doesn't the Bible say we should expect persecution? — B.B.


DEAR B.B.: Yes, the Bible warns us that persecution may well be the lot of Christians, and this has often been the case through the centuries. It tells us, "Everyone who wants to live a godly life in Christ Jesus will be persecuted" (II Timothy 3:12). One reason for this is because an unbelieving world hates God, and therefore

hates His people. This does not mean, of course, that persecution will always be the same in every situation. As he wrote the words I just quoted, Paul was in prison awaiting execution for his faith in Christ. The one to whom he writes (Timothy), however, is freely pursuing his ministry in another part of the Roman Empire. Today there are many parts of the world where it is very difficult to be a Christian because of persecution (either by governments or hostile religions or other sources). In our own nation, physical persecution is not our

problem (although we should remember to pray for those in other parts of the world who are physically persecuted for the faith).

But I believe not all persecution is physical. The purpose of persecution, remember, is to stamp out a person's faith. Neither one of us could remember the products the commercials were attempting to sell.

The cleverly created and perfectly performed advertisements had succeeded in selling the commercials. The products, however, were lost in the catchy music and crazy antics portrayed in the brief sales pitches:

Commercials may continue to get more cute, more witty and even more popular, but somewhere along the way, their purpose—selling products— is going to be defeated by their cleverness.



### Violence expected

WASHINGTON - The death of organized crime's pornography czar, Michael (Mickey) Zaffarano - who dropped dead of a heart attack as FBI agents were closing in on him — will touch off a gangland war among Mafia chiefs seeking control of the multibillion-dollar porno industry, according to knowledgeable law enforcement sources.

Zaffarano, 57, was the owner of the D.C. Playhouse in Washington, D.C., and the Pussy Cat Theater in New York City. But this modest front concealed Zaffarano's real role as the mob's porno king for the entire country. Sources told my associate Gary Cohn that Zaffarano was the Mafia's main man when it came to dealing out distributorships to the various mob families and mediating the frequent disputes among the territorial imperators.

ZAFFARANO WAS a capo (cap tain) in the Bonanno Mafia family, but he had become trusted by the other underworld families to make sure that everyone got a fair share of the mob's immense take from pornographic films and publications. As part of the FBI's anti-pornography "Miporn" operation, undercover G-men attended conferences at which Zaffarano directed his Mafia colleagues in setting prices and territories.

Secret law enforcement files give additional evidence of Zaffarano's position in the smut trade. According to one such report, Zaffarano boasted to an FBI undercover agent that he was "the main distributor of pornographic films in the United States.

Another report describes Zaffarano's role as mediator between competing elements of the mob in porn matters. "He has been involved in numerous shakedowns and extortions of pornography dealers on the West Coast in an attempt to control various aspects of the pornography business," the report states. "Zaffarano is the link between organized crime figures in the United States and the West Coast pornography in-

His key role as the arbitrator among the various Mafia families lusting after profits from the porno business makes Zaffarano's unexpected demise a serious concern - not only to the mobsters who depended on him as the smut umpire, but to federal investigators who are trying to keep track of the sordid industry.

HIS DEATH "brings violence back" to the smut business, according to one law enforcement source. While there is no question of the mob's control over the porno business, the source explained, violence is likely to follow the death of the underworld arbiter as local Mafia families try to muscle in on other families' territory.

One confidential report explains the smut industry's operations: "Pornography is the third largest income maker for La Cosa Nostra in the United States, behind gambling and narcotics. Although La Cosa Nostra does not physically oversee the dayto-day workings of the majority of pornography bu s in the United States, it is rent they have 'agreements' those involved in the pornography susiness, in allowing these people to operate independently by paying off members of organized crime for the privilege of being allowed to operate in certain geographic areas. Information obreflects extortion of pornographic dealers, distributors and processors as presently a lucrative activity of La Cosa Nostra.

An example of the porno industry's lucrative take is the notorious movie "Deep Throat," which grossed \$50 million on an initial investment of \$25,000. With stakes like that, it's no wonder that organized crime figures are willing to get tough over the profits from pornography.
PLAYING GAMES: The Soviet



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## Disco a new category at Grammy Awards

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Disco has its own category and so does rock'n'roll, again — as some of the biggest stars in the music industry meet for the 22nd Annual Grammy Awards ceremonies tonight.

Country singer Kenny Rogers is host of the twohour CBS telecast that will include appearances by George Burns, Natalie Cole, Bob Dylan, Deborah Harry of Blondie, Isaac Hayes, Kris Kristofferson, Barbara Mandrell, Chuck Mangione and Sarah Vaughn.

Awards will be made in a record 58 categories, but only 14 winners will be named on the air. The rest will be announced just before the telecast.

In keeping with what has become a virtual Grammy tradition, there were six new categories added this year one in disco, one in jazzfusion and four in rock.

The rock categories are more like reincarnations than innovations. In 1961, the National Academy Recording Arts and Sciences first acknowledged the rock explosion by introducing a best rock recording award.

Four years later, there were four rock categories, called contemporary (R & R) categories. Soon the "R & R" designation was dropped

### New changes in President Tito's state

BELGRADE, Yugoslavia (AP) - President Tito's doctors said today the 87year-old Yugoslav leader's grave condition remained unchanged but that there was an increase in bleeding on his lung and heart which had never been previously mentioned.

"In addition to ap pearances on his lungs and heart mentioned yesterday, tendency for bleeding has been more marked," a bulletin from his doctors said. "Intensive measures of treatment are being further applied.'

On Tuesday, doctors issued one of their most pessimistic bulletins on Tito's failing health, saying they they were unable to check pneumonia contracted by Tito. They also said his heartbeat had become increasingly erratic

Medical sources not involved in Tito's treatment said that statement appeared to indicate the president's heart had trouble acting as a pump, which they said may be caused by an imbalance in blood salts.

This imbalance could be brought on either by the dialysis treatment Tito is undergoing because of his weakened kidneys, or by lack of oxygen in the blood, the sources said.

One difficulty complicates the other, the sources explained, and the problem develops into a vicious circle that eventually results in the total breakdown of the body's major organs and

The President's doctors revealed only last Saturday that Tito had been suffering several days pneumonia

A day earlier, they disclosed that they had been bolstering his weakened kidneys through dialysis, or the use of an artificial kidney to cleanse the blood

The complications developed after Tito's left leg was amputated Jan. 20 in a last-ditch effort to avoid fatal gangrene poisoning due to a blood circulation blockage. Medication begun earlier that month, as well as minor surgery, had failed to solve the problem.

### Sears faces conspiracy allegations

LOS ANGELES (AP) -Sears, Roebuck and Co. faces federal grand jury charges of conspiracy and of making false statements to U.S. Customs officials in an alleged nine-year scheme to conceal \$1.1 million in rebates from a Japanese

television set manufacturer. The indictment against the nation's largest retailer was issued Tuesday by a federal grand jury sitting in Los Angeles. It was the first of a series of indictments expected out of grand juries in Los Angeles and elsewhere that have been conducting a year-long probe of so-called "dumping" of Japanese television sets on U.S. markets.

Such actions may have resulted in millions of dollars in unpaid customs duties by American retailers

Dumping is the sale of foreign-made items in the U.S. at prices below those in the producing country. While the practice is not illegal. U.S. Customs requires that the importing retailer pay duties on the difference between the domestic and overseas retail price.

Such laws are designed to protect U.S. manufacturers and laborers from what is seen as unfair competition from cheap foreign imports.

The indictment charges Sears with understating on Customs forms the retail price in Japan of the television sets and of paying kickbacks to Japanese manufacturers.

Thus, the indictment alleges, Sears avoided paying Customs duties by making false declarations that did not disclose "kickbacks, rebates and credits privately arranged between Sears" and others.

A Sears spokesman in Chicago said Tuesday: "We believe the company's conduct was proper and legal. It appears that the government has misinterpreted the process by which Sears negotiated its costs for a line of imported television sets. We will plead not guilty to the charges.

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
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

LONDON (AP) — A grisly secret held for almost 60 years by the swirling snows and howling winds on Mount Everest may soon yield to a team of Japanese climbers already planning their spring ascent.

Did British climbers George Leigh Mallory and Andrew Irvine, who perished on Everest's icy slopes in June 1924, actually conquer the summit nearly 30 years before the famous climb of Sir Edmund Hillary and

his Sherpa companion, Tenzing Norgay? The answer hinges on whether the Japanese climbers can find the body of an Englishman' sighted in 1975 by a Chinese climber - and on whether the body is that of Mallory, with camera and film still intact.

Experts say the film could retain its images - even over 56 years - because of the extreme cold on the world's highest mountain, and might be developed to show Mallory or Irvine triumphantly holding the British fiag aloft on the summit of Everest. Such a photograph would rewrite

mountaineering history. Noel Odell, geologist on the Mallory expedition, was the last person to see the climbers, two dark specks on the white snow some 800 feet from the 29,021-foot summit. That was on June 8, 1924.

I still think it is very likely that they made it." Odell told The Associated Press in a recent interview.

And Lord Hunt, 69, who organized the 1953 British expedition that put New Zeulander Hillary at the top, has reacted generously to the prospect of having his greatest achievement dwarfed.

'No one would be happier than I if it were proved they reached the top, and I really mean that," Hunt said from his office at the Royal Geographical Society. "Mallory and Irvine were my childhood heroes, and it was this mystery that set it all off for me when I

British climber Doug Scott, who scaled Everest in 1975, said: "It's possible. And when you think of Everest, you think of

Hillary and Tenzing and Mallory In 1924, Mallory — a decorated World War I hero and master at an exclusive British boys' school — was 37. Irvine was 22.

They set out to scale Everest in the same conquering tradition of the British Empire that inspired the doomed Antarctic expedition of Robert Falcon Scott 12 years

Odell, now an 89-year-old professor living in Cambridge, England, has long believed the pair could have reached the summit and perished as they tried to return to the camp set up at 27,000 feet.

Irvine's ice axe was found in 1933 at 27,495 teet. Odell believes that since the pinnacle is rocky, the useless axe could have been jettisoned on the way up.

Odell also raises another possibility.

He said the body sighted in 1975 by Chinese climber Wang Hung Pao - rather than being that of Mallory - could be one of six Russians who are believed to have perished in an avalanche in the 1950s.

The Russians have never admitted their attempt failed. I have questioned Soviet mountaineers, and they deny the whole thing, said Odela

If the body turns out to be that of Irvine, Everest will keep its secret. Odell said only Mallory was carrying a camera.

Wang was with Japanese climber Yoshinori Hasegawa last October when he told him about sighting the body. Wang, communicating with Hasegawa in Chinese characters common to both languages, said the body was still intact, frozen and half covered with snow, the clothes crumbled and blown off by wind.

Wang said there was a hole in his cheek and his mouth was open. Hasegawa related. 'And when he touched his clothing, which was already worn to tatters, it flew into pieces and they danced on his breath.

But Wang could not be questioned further. He died in an avalanche on Everest the next

Hasegawa's 40-member team left Tokyo for Everest, on the China-Nepal border, on Feb. 22. There they will plan their assault, to start in May.

Hillary's team scaled Everest from Nepal. Hasegawa's team will take the route from the Tibetan side — the route taken by Mallory. The Japanese are the first noncommunist climbers to be allowed to use the route, which was closed to the outside world

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



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

### Anita Bryant may be out

ORLANDO, Fla. (AP) - More than a year after Florida oranges ended up in the middle of a controversy over homosexual rights, citrus spokeswoman Anita Bryant may be on the way out. Miss Bryant's contract with the Florida Citrus Commission expires in August and agency marketing director Douglas Hoffer says no more commercials with the singer are planned. Her departure is "probably true if the commission goes along with it," Hoffer said.

The former beauty queen, who has represented citrus growers since 1968, began to lose favor last year after leading the 1978 campaign against homosexual rights in South Florida. Gay activists urged a boycott of Florida products and two industry lawyers, in arguing that Florida identification should not be required on product labels, told the state Supreme Court recently they did not necessarily want their products tied too closely to Miss Bryant.

### Miss Piggy not eligible

HOLLYWOOD (AP) - People are people but Miss Piggy, the snout-nosed bombshell of the big and little screens, is only a puppet — and not eligible for a best actress Oscar, say Academy Awards officials.

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
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
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HOUSTON (AP)— Leonel Castillo, the commissioner of the U.S. Immigration and Naturalization Service from 1977 to 1979, says illegal aliens are "the most exploited, most vulnerable group in the United States.

Testifying Tuesday in a federal court trial challenging the constitutionality of a Texas school law, Castillo said, "The exploitation includes everything from law wages to poor working conditions to physical abuse

"And most illegal aliens will avoid federal or states authorities unless their situation becomes critical." he said.

Castillo, now head of a Houston consulting firm, said the illegal aliens, the great majority of whom are Mexican nationals, "pay more in taxes than they receive in services" while living

"All pay property taxes through rent, and all pay sales taxes, 80 percent pay income taxes and

contribute to Social Security through payroll deducations," he said. The trial before U.S. District Judge Woodrow Seals is now in its second week and expected to

last three more weeks. A group of Hispanic parents filed lawsuits against several Texas school districts where their children are either forbidden to attend classes or must pay tuition.

Seals ordered the suits held in abeyance until he heard testimony and determined the constitutionality of the 1975 law which prohibits state financial aid for the education of the illegal alien children.

Representatives of the state attorney general's office have argued that if an estimated 110.000 undocumented children are forced upon the school system, the financial load will be too heavy for many districts.

The lawyers for the State of Texas also have questioned whether taxpayers should be required to pay for the education of those who are in the United States illegally and who do not contribute a fair share of the dollars needed to support the school systems.

Several witnesses brought to the stand by the plaintiffs have disputed the cost factors; offered alternatives to meet any shortage of bilingual teachers; and criticized any attempt to sterotype the illegal aliens as poor, illiterates who pay no

NEW YORK (AP) — ABC won the networks' prime-time ratings race for the week ending Feb. 24 with plenty of help from the Winter Olympics, and despite an unexpected rush from NBC, figures from the A.C. Nielsen Co. showed.



Irony, **Follis** and big bucks

FOR THOSE OF YOU WHO MISSED last Friday night's 5-AAAA championship between Midland and Odessa Permian, you missed probably the loudest explosion of noise in the short history of basketball in Dorothy Garrett

Coliseum Permian won, 83-82, but not before both sides had made even a casual observer

more than interested. There were two aspects of irony that

were obvious in the emotional contest. The first concerned Midland's talented 6'9" junior, Herbert Johnson. It is not that often that local fans get the chance to see such a high school specimen that is as versatile as the Midland underclassman, especially when he was playing in

O.W. FOLLIS, head basketball coach at Lamesa High School, has made things confusing for sports historians in the past

The 1979-80 National High School Sports Record Book, put out by the National Federation of Coaches, had reported that the national record for wins by a coach at a single school was 809.

The Golden Tors set their sights on this goal, and won number 809 against Brownfield on February 12. This supposedly tied the record.

But alas, on the following Tuesday, Lubbock Avalanche Journal sportswriter Russ Parsons reported that Follis actually needed 897 wins at Lamesa to break the national winning mark.

THAT WAS SET BY C.E. "NIG" WOMACK, who in 28 years of coaching the Hawley Bearcat boys (located just north of Abilene, Texas) had accumulated 896 wins, compared to only 147

losses — a winning percentage of .859. What's even more astonishing is that Womack also coached the Hawley women for 18 years, from 1948 to 1966. His record in his female stint was 673-110.

Nevertheless, some have reported that Follis went ahead and broke the record with his 810th win, a victory over Sweet-

Follis, in the meantime, seemed to be unaffected by the confusion, stating: "I wasn't worried about it anyway. There was a lot of talk about it, but I didn't know what the record was. I just went by what the newspaper here and the TV

Follis said that his state record of three Class AAA state championships still means more to him than the victory number record.

.... MANY PARENTS SEEM TO BE TELLING their children that the big money in sports comes from success in golf and tennis. That's not the rest of the story, however

Thanks to the free agency and multimillion dollar contracts of the past three years, baseball has risen to the top of sports in average salaries. The average salary of a baseball

player in 1979 was a handsome \$120,000, compared to 'merely' \$48,000 in 1976. Pro basketball did have the highest average salary in the past two years, but they have been overpassed by the baseball players. The average salary in

the NBA is \$110,000 per year. Meanwhile, pro football, just barely behind baseball four years ago at \$42,000 per annum, has not increased as rapidly as the national pastime. The average

NFL gridder made \$68,893 in 1979 Golf and tennis do have their big money superstars (like Bjorn Borg and Jimmy Connors exceeding one million in 79), but their overall pay structure is one of a dictatorial society.

Of the 279 golfers on the PGA tour, only 35 made over the \$100,000 mark, with Tom Watson's \$462,636 leading the group. In tennis, a near totalitarian system prevails. While Borg, McEnroe and Jimbo (Playmate Lover) Connors all made over one million, there were only 32

of 110 professional tennis players on the tour that made over \$100,000 in 1979

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

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
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## Fratianne expected to turn pro quickly


Mrs. Fratianne said it appeared to her that the judges were predisposed to give Linda lower marks.

She claimed they were "manipulated" by the views of Carlo Fassi, the Denver-based coach of some other Olympic figure skating competitors, including men's gold medalist Robin Cousins of Great Britain.

Fassi was asked on Monday to comment on Mrs. Fratianne's charge, and he told the Washington Post: "I don't want to comment on anything so silly.

Mrs. Fratianne said Fassi, who also coached 1976 Olympic gold medalist Dorothy Hamill, allegedly expressed the opinion that Fratianne was the second best American woman skater at Lake Placid — behind sixth place finisher Lise-Marie Allen of Garden Grove,

"If she had done a bad job or succumbed to the pressure I would have understood," Mrs. Fratianne said of judges' marks given her daughter. "But she didn't. She skated very well.'



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

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



"There's no conflict of interest here," Wooters said. "We try to move cotton." He said the policy of Cotton Inc. has been to promote exports by "serving as a




