March stormed in like an avenging lion Saturday, stunning much of the nation with record sub-zero cold, carstopping snow up to a foot or more deep and freezing rain that put out forest fires burning across Dixie.

With dozens of towns and cities in several states suffering their-coldest March 1 of the century, residents of Embarrass, Minn., could brag that their thermometers dropped to 35 degrees below zero.

Snow hubcap deep and still falling bogged down much of southern Ohio and northern Kentucky as the storm rolled eastward out of Oklahoma and eastern Kansas across the Ohio Valley

get up to a foot of snow and forecasters said parts of Virginia, West Virginia and Maryland would get up to 18 inches.

At least two storm-related deaths were reported, one a truck driver who leaped from his skidding rig in Kentucky and was struck by it, and one a motorist whose car slid off an icy road in South Carolina.

The National Weather Service in West Virginia warned of an "extremely dangerous winter storm" in the state's mountainous southeastern counties, with strong winds and heavy

In Virginia, highway department spokesman Al Coates said: "There are 52,000 miles in the state highway system and we are recommending snow tires or chains for every mile. The agency had already used up \$13 million of the \$16 budget for snow removal this winter before Saturday's

storm.
An ice storm ripped down power lines in Oklahoma, leaving 60,000 homes in Oklahoma City and neighboring communities without electricity in sub-freezing weather out the night. Officials said it may be Sunday night before all of the



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

Heart, pulse rates should be same

Paul G. Donohue, M.D.

Dear Dr. Donohue: My heart beat is minute. I don't know what happens very regular, but my pulse is in the 80s most of the time, sometimes higher Could this indicate heart trouble? I have no other symptoms. Do athletes have a higher heart rate than non-

athletes? - B.R. An explanation first. Each time the heart beats, a jet of blood is shot out into the arteries. This

surge is felt as the pulse - at the wrist, the neck or in any artery close to the skin. The pulse should equal the heart beat. You can time the heart itself by placing your hand just below the nipple on the left side of the chest. If there is a difference between the

heart beat and the pulse rate, this may be significant. It can indicate that some heart beats are not strong enough to send the jets of blood into the arteries with sufficient force to be felt at the pulse site.

Many conditions may cause a variance. Some are harmless, like an occasional premature heart beat. Some are more serious, like a true heart rhythm disturbance.

The normal heart rate (and pulse rate) is between 60 and 100 beats per minute. Athletes usually have slower heart rates. They can get by with fewer beats because their hearts pump more blood with each beat. They have more efficient pumps because of their training. It's said that Bjorn Borg (the tennis player) has a heart (and pulse) rate of only 30 per

Dear Editor It has always been that the Olympic games gave all people a certain glimmer of hope for peace: that people of vastly different beliefs and political viewpoints could meet together as one group, if only for a

Eight years ago, we watched with apprehension and horror, as political terrorists held athletes hostage, and tragedy ensued in Munich. There was an outcry of nations against this abdominable act of politics in the

Olympic games. Yet now, the president of the United States, with the support of the public. has declared that, in a sense, the American athletes be held hostage for political reasons. They are to boycott the 1980 summer Games. Why?

I honestly do not believe that it is because of a deep conviction, to world peace, against the Soviets for their military intervention in Afghanistan. For we are not of a deep enough conviction to willingly stop selling them grain (only a small amount is being withheld). We have not and are not boycotting the selling of important technology, either indirectly or directly, to Russia. In this very paper we have been told explicity of companies, such as Texas Instruments and Ford, selling to the Soviets or their allies, technical equipment or knowledge, which was converted with the foreknowledge of these companies as to this possibility) to make the very vehicles which were used to invade Afghanistan. After I filed suit, but before I amended my pleadings asking that the alleged violations be held void, I attempted, through their attorney, John T. Ferguson, to set up a meeting with them to try to work matters out without further court proceedings. This they also declined to do:

I brought my law suit, but Hays and his controlled board of directors caused it, by their continued blatant disregard for legal requirements indicating they would handle things any way they got good and ready, regardless of the law - and further that they had no intention of changing to conform to the law

They are not above the law. The Supreme Court has held that not even the President of the United States is above the law

If they had made any reasonable attempt to comply with the Open Meetings Act with proper agendas, and with the Open Records Act. 1 would not have brought this lawsuit. as there would have been no reason to

The real truth is that the "special session" is to be held because they didn't comply with the law. They passed resolutions and acted upon items that did not appear on the agenda, and in doing so they acted illegally. Now they must go back and try to clean up their act so it will withstand the scrutiny of the court.



Cigar-smoking Italian plays unusual role

Relative of local man spearheaded white heroin bust

A cousin of former Big Spring City Councilman Eddie Aeri was instrumental in January of cracking a drug smuggling operation that has proven to be embarrassing to American **Airlines**

Tony Acri, a veteran Drug Enforcement Administration agent, commanded a durg investigation in Miami, which is considered the drug capital of the world. The drug operation found that several American Airlines employees were smuggling in white heroin, supposedly the top substance of the narcotic world.

The former local city councilman had another cousin, Carmine Acri. who worked as a drug agent for a federal agency in Mellonsville, Pa. Carmine Acri was killed some ten years ago on an undercover operation.

Tony Acri, a cigarsmoking Italian, posed as the head of an underworld organization that specialized enforcement agent met with an American Airlines engineer. Sixto Williams. Williams was working with the airlines in Aruba, a small island country in the Lesser Antilles

At the meeting, Williams gave Acri a sample of

"The stuff was quality, Acri said. "It wasn't the brown Mexican heroin that's been plentiful in the past. This stuff was Far Eastern heroin, probably Lebanese."

The presence of the crystal narcotic startled the Drug Enforcement Administration and caused officials from the agency to step up its effort. A lab report shoed that the substance Williams gave Acri was 56 percent pure heroin. The narcotic was triple the strength of conventional heroin







LOS ANGELES (AP) — Al Davis, general managing partner of the Oakland Raiders, signed an agreement Saturday to move the National Football League team to the Los Angeles Memorial Coliseum for the 1980 season, despite legal activity that threatens to block the shift.

Los Angeles Mayor Tom Bradley had opened a news conference by saying, "After months many negotiations, I am happy to announce that the Raiders are coming to the Los Angeles Memorial Coliseum." Then he added, Memorial "It's still a long and difficult

"We know it's going to be tough," Davis said. "There are going to be a lot of obstacles in the way. But I consider obstacles as normal and treat them that way in the normal course of business day.

Davis said the Raiders will begin moving their operations from Oakland to Los Angeles by March 12, with "ticket facilities" among the first to be set up.

The city sought the National Football League team after the Rams announced they would move from Los Angeles to Anaheim beginning with the 1980 NFL season.

On Friday, the 9th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals in San Francisco issued a ruling which in effect preserved a National Football League rule governing team transfers.

The court extended a stay of a preliminary injunction against the NFL rule by U.S. District Judge Harry Pregerson, which was issued here Feb. 21.

The Coliseum Commisson had gone to court Feb. 4 asking for an injunction to keep the NFL from enforcing the rule that requires 21 of its 28 team owners to approve the move of a team.

Oakland Mayor Lionel Wilson said he was "shocked to think that the Raiders would take that kind of actioncin defiance of the court and the league itself. It'll be interesting to see what action the league takes in this

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

Milburn triumph

NEW YORK (AP) - For Eamonn Coghlan, it was just like mother cross-country event or road race, which he ran in his native Ireland early in the winter as a conditioner for the American indoor track season

For Rod Milburn, it brought back memories of years ago, when he was the king of the high hurdlers.

There were times I had doubts. Was I going to be able come back and be competitive?" said the rejuvenated Milburn, after posting his first victory as an amateur in seven years, capturing the 60-yard hurdies in 7.09 seconds.

Coghlan and Milburn were the most popular performers ir a meet that produced several world indoor bests. American records and meet marks.

'Every race until now I've been committed to run the mile (or 1,500 meters)," said Coghlan after proving convincingly that he could conquer longer distances on the tricky banked indoor boards.

"I wanted to have one three-mile race. I was hoping to break 13 minutes, and if the field was tougher. the time definitely would have been under 13

minutes. Perhaps the field did not appear so tough to Coghlan because he was so overpowering.

In cruising to his impressive triumph, he had the third fastest three-mile time ever, the fastest for an 11lap-to-the-mile track and the fastest ever run in the United



'You can see right now that we're a perfect combination," Martin joked. "We do have a lot in common - the only difference between Charlie Finley and myself is that he has more money. Charlie won't be any problem at all and I won't be any problem to him.

'There won't be any telephone calls like you guys have been reading about. He's promised me that already. Heck, when I first joined the Yankees, George Steinbrenner used to call me all the time, but he found out I tore the phone off the wall, so he quit calling."

In addition to not fighting, Martin pledged a more exciting version of the A's - which shouldn't be difficult since last year's team lost 108 games, the most for the franchise since 1916 when it was in Philadelphia.

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
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



The GED exam, the legal equivalent of a high school diploma, will be given four times during March: 8 a.m.-3 p.m. March 1; 5-8 p.m. March 3-4; 8:30-4 p.m. March 12; and 1-4 p.m.

A \$10 fee must be paid at the OC counseling center prior to the test.

A career assessment seminar and test have been scheduled for 2-5 p.m. March 3. Both the seminar and test are free, and are designed to aid persons in choosing a career or selecting an alternative.

The advanced placement

or College-Level Examination Program (CLEP), is designed for students seeking advanced standing credit on the college level. 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


