## Star Lites By



MEN HAVE BEEN tinkering with the time ever since Ben Franklin's day, and even before.

Many of us grudgingly changed our clocks on Sunday (and Monday and Tuesday), signaling the beginning of Daylight Savings Time.

This year, as you know by now, we are getting three extra weeks of Daylight Savings Time. Those who push for more and more DST had even more in mind when they tried to pass their legislative programs. It just happened that the three extra weeks in April were all they could get.

The only way the DST proponents got the three-week extension was to attach the daylight-time extension bill onto a 1986 bill which authorized federal funds for fire prevention and control.

Those favoring more "daylight time" were pushing for DST to begin in March. They also had a proposal for shifting the time-zone boundaries to the east, which would "appease the farm areas that complain the loudest about daylight time."

Also, they wanted DST to be extended through the first week of November, which would have given Halloween trick-or-treaters an extra hour of dusk for their

safety. Of all of these, the last proposal makes the most sense. However, it could have been handled by simply changing the end of Daylight Time to October 31, rather than the last Sunday in October.

Residents in a lot of places have a legitimate concern about the safety of school children who must catch buses in morning darkness.

One writer pointed out that when daylight time ends next October, sunrise in Caribou, Maine, and San Diego, California will be at 7 a.m. However, sunrise the same day in Boise, Idaho won't be until 8:10, and in Williston, N.D., it won't be until 8:27.

(We didn't research it, but the same point could probably be made for Clovis, N.M.)

Most farmers have become philosophical about Daylight Savings Time, reasoning that they work from sunup until sundown (or longer) anyway, so it doesn't matter too much how city folks set their clocks.

But there is one problem. In our area, farmers are often members of the school boards and city councils, and serve on any number of other organizations. When we advance the clocks an hour between April and October, we sometimes cause a hardship on the farmers, who may have to leave their work considerably earlier than they otherwise would have, in order to attend to their other

obligations. The proponents of DST say that the change was "to save energy by reducing the use of electricity, to prevent crime, and to reduce traffic accidents. It will help 400,000 people with night

blindness, too." At least most of us don't have the problem faced by Lefty and Paloma Ingersoll, who own and operate Pendulums R Us, the Shoppe of Ten Thousande Clockes in Noonday, Texas.

The Ingersolls pride themselves in having "three acres" of clocks, all of which show the exact, correct time. In order to get the twice each year job accomplished, some 50 friends and neighbors come in to help with the chore.

The neighborly deed started 30 years ago, right after Lefty Ingersoll lost his right arm in a threshing accident.

We're happy that Daylight Savings Time is going to conserve energy. The only question we have is: "When will be begin to get our energy back??

"The most important thing that we had last year, or a net rise, such as what we have this year, in the measured water levels is that the amount of water in the aquifer aquifer is stabilizing," states Don McReynolds, Director of the Geohydrologic Division at the High Plains Water District.

"Most of the time, the amount Friona Elementary School of water-level change is a direct result of the amount of pumping that has occurred," notes McReynolds, "As long as the agricultural economy remains in its present condition, it is likely that this trend of decreasing declines will continue."

Staff at the High Plains Water District annually measure and fee. record the depth to water in the Ogallala aquifer through a network of about 950 observation wells scattered throughout its service area. The wells are privately-owned and spaced at a density of approximately one well per nine square miles.

## Two Elected To Board Of FLB

The Federal Land Bank Association of Muleshoe held its annual Stockholders meeting March 31 in Muleshoe.

Donald Christian and Jimmy Pitcock were elected to the board of directors for three year terms. Other directors are James Glaze, Jim Claunch and William Gromowsky.

The Federal Land Bank will reduce its interest rates for long term mortgages on June 1, according to William C. Liles, president of the Muleshoe Association.

The Land Bank's new variable rates will be 10.25 per cent on farm and ranch loans and 10.50 per cent on rural residence loans. The decrease represents a one-half of one per cent reduction on rural residence loans.

The program carries an even lower interest rate for loans to buy rural real estate. The Squaws' 1600-meter relay He added that the lower interest rate will be available only for a limited time.
