Militants agree to hostage transfer

Militants holding American hostages inside the occupied U.S. Embassy in Tehran said today they are ready to turn their captives over to the ruling Revolutionary Council if requested. The transfer could come Saturday, two council members said.

Iranian President Abolhassan Bani-Sadr, interviewed on American sion, said President Carter had met his demands for the government to take control of the hostages, and that he would ask the council to make a decision later in the day.

A spokesman for the militants said,

"We will accept any decision that the Revolutionary Council takes because it is the highest body in the country which is supported by Ayatollah Ruhollah Khomeini," leader of the

The militants had relied on Khomeini's support to defy an at-tempt by Bani-Sadr last month to take custody of the Americans.

Bani-Sadr, speaking to CBS and NBC News, said the Revolutionary Council would decide on the timing of the transfer, and that an Iranian Parliament to meet this summer would settle the fate of the Americans.

He also said that the hostages would be allowed visitors, but that the council would decide whether their families would be able to see them. No family members have been allowed to see the hostages since militants seized the embassy 152 days ago.

Two members of the Revolutionary Council were quoted as saying the hostages could be transfered as early as Saturday. The Tehran newspaper Kayhan reported that council members Eztalah Sahabi and Ayatollah Mahdavi Kani discussed the issue with the militants.

Sahabi said he and another council

member, Hashami Rafsanjani, are permanent go-betweens in discussions involving the council and the

Kani said that Khomeini would settle any differences that might arise between the council and the militants. Khomeini generally has backed the militants, who demand the return of ousted Shah Mohammad Reza Pahlavi and his wealth to Iran as the price of the hostages' freedom.


The shah, recuperating from removal of his cancerous spleen in a Cairo hospital, was visited today by Egyptian President Anwar Sadat, who reiterated the former monarch would be staying in Egypt permanently. It appeared to be an indirect rejection of the militants'

One group close to the militants has denounced moving the hostages. The group, known as The Struggling Moslem Movement, told a Western reporter in Tehran that President Carter has been using threats and flattery to try to force Bani-Sadr to take custody of the hostages.

A spokesman for the movement said that Carter obviously hopes to Khomeini before the new Parliament

He said Carter will call the Iranian government the only regime in history not to hand over diplomatic hostages once the Revolutionary Council has taken control of the Americans, and that this would put pressure on Bani-Sadr and Khomeini to let the hostages

However, the Carter administration says it will be "restrained" in its efforts to free the hostages and is urging the public to "stay cool, at

Howard County bank deposits soar to all-time high record

Deposits in Howard County banks leaped nearly \$18 million during the first quarter of 1980 to an all-time high

The total at the end of the fourth quarter in 1979 was \$164,717,182. A year ago, the county's four banks had an aggregate of \$139,326,686 in

Every financial institution in the county showed a gain during the first quarter of the new year. First National, with nearly \$86 million in deposits, led the way. State National continued to show phenomenal growth and Coahoma State Bank reported more than \$10 million in deposits for the first time in history.

Steady activity in the oil business in the county, together with a record cotton crop harvested on Howard County farms, contributed heavily to the record deposits.

Loans, on the other hand, were down slightly from Dec. 31, 1979, and showed a decrease of more than \$7 million in a year's time.

Jimmy Taylor, president of the First National Bank, said the money on deposit here indicated how healthy the economy was, especially when compared with financial institutions in other parts of the country.

Ordinarily, the loan demand starts to increase here sometime during the first quarter of the year but farmers

did so well raising and selling their cotton after last year's crop that most

A factor in the loan picture, too, is President Carter's demand that banks show credit restraint in efforts to curb inflation. That has slowed down borrowing by the individual.

of them still have cash on hand.

When the demand for loans diminishes, as has been the case this quarter, banks like those in the county are not prone to let 'the money lie there.' They purchase federal securities and loan money to bigger banks which, in turn, make the money

"No, we are not hurt by reduced local borrowing," one banker here said, indicating the banks preferred to loan locally but they turn to options

when the money demand lessens.

Deposits in local banks didn't pass the \$100 million mark until Dec. 31, 1975, when the total reached \$103,662,000. They passed \$50 million for the first time Dec. 31, 1968, when they reached \$53,091,000.

Even allowing for inflation, the growth in deposits here has been little bort of remarkable

FTC drops deceptive food ad rule

Pro-consumers lose to criticism

Federal Trade Commission, reeling under congressional criticism of its pro-consumer regulations, is cutting back one of its major projects, a rule designed to end deceptive food ad-

The commission has approved for publication in the Federal Register a proposal to drop a four-year effort to write industry guidelines on nutrition claims for food products, such as a cereal ad that claims to provide the full minimum daily adult requirement of a particular vitamin.

The FTC still could monitor such advertisements and take action against individual companies if a claim were found to be false, but there would be no industry standard.

The commission said it will continue to work on rules for energy and calorie claims in food advertisements,

Higgins' statement was not received until Wednesday afternoon, two days after the deadline.

"I haven't been able to determine any penalty connected with the late filing. The election code just says that it is unlawful to file late," said

Ferguson.

"I really don't have any comment about this. The government has its data, I have my data, and it cems like everything has been straightened out," said Higgins this morning.

The actions come as congressional conferees are trying to reconcile bills passed by the House and Senate amid criticisms of FTC 'overregulation" of industry. Among provisions are ones that would end FTC consideration of rules over television advertising aimed at children and funeral homes.

The guidelines, which have not been implemented, were intended to "ensure that when the food industry chooses to use certain claims about the nutritional value of foods in selling its products, it does so in a nondeceptive and fair manner and does not exploit the public's lack of sophistication."

When first proposed in 1974, the rule was said to result in part from a 1969 White House conference on nutrition

New teacher's group forms

TSTA gets back talk

Teachers Association will be getting back talk from a new, 19,000-member teachers' organization when it asks the Legislature next year for higher pay and collective

The Association of Texas Professional Educators was formed by the merger of the Association of Texas Educators (ATE) and the Texas Professional Educators (TPE).

Presidents-elect of the two organizations held a news conference Wednesday to announce the merger and denounce the TSTA for even thinking about collective bargaining.

"Our main thing will be to fight against collective bargaining and unionism and to keep school teaching a profession in this state," said Gloria McMeans of Stanton, president-elect of TPE.

Teachers and administrators who opposed TSTA's decision to unify with the National Education Association (NEA) formed ATE and TPE in 1975.

NEA has strongly supported collective bargaining for teachers while opposing

Morrow, executive director of ATE. Alafair. Hammett of Santa Rosa, president-elect of ATE, said she opposes collective bargaining because she believes it interferes with "the smooth teaching of students. It usually ends with some striking or walkouts:

Both Ms. McMeans and Ms. Hammett agreed with the TSTA's view that teachers need higher salaries but said the new organization has not come up with an exact

Neither has TSTA, but Morrow said, "TSTA has made totally unrealistic demands on a salary bill. We have been much more willing to cooperate than they

"Nobody needs a raise any better than teachers. But when I became a teacher, I knew in advance I was not going to get rich doing it. Teaching is more of a calling than a job someone goes out and gets because there s nothing else to do," said Ms. McMeans.



We can't let Russia strengthen hand

The person who would be hopelessly at sea is the one 30 years of age or older who would be given a Geography test concerning countries of the world, based on what he or she was taught in school

The countries are many which have undergone name changes during the past three decades. That is especially true among Third World nations. Who had heard of Botswana, Burundi, Dahomey, Gabon and Lesotho a quarter of a century ago?

NOW THE MAP makers must prepare for another change. Rhodesia is no more. The new government of Zimbabwe is taking shape. The big fear among the Anglo tribes inhabitating the earth is not that the blacks will rule Zimbabwe but that the nation is leaning toward Marxism.

Robert Mugabe, commissioned to establish a government in Africa's newest nation, has followed a moderate course to date. He has brought his chief rival, Joshua Nkomo, into a leadership role. He has also appointed two whites to his cabinet. He has promised to adhere to the constitution, veering away from Marxism. In addition, he has asked for a delay in the transfer of power in order to better prepare the new government to assume the role.

Perhaps this is all a sham, as the opponents of Mugabe fear. For now, however, there are at least some hopeful signs.

The west, particularly the English and the United States, can play an active role at this stage and in Zimbabwe's future. We should be prepared to spearhead an international effort to provide aid to the Mugabe government.

ZIMBABWE HAS monumental problems — and they are not all racial or ideological. The economy has been badly hurt by years of strife. Mugabe inherited a hefty deficit. The former all-white regime was heavily dependent upon South Africa for economic support. In view of South Africa's stand on segregation of the races, that could well be withdrawn. The large number of refugees, including those now returned or still returning from guerrilla camps outside Zimbabwe, will require massive assistance.

These are concerns to which the West should respond and quickly. Doing so is the surest way to prevent the necessity for Mugabe to go elsewhere - into a Soviet embrace for the help he must have if Zimbabwe is to survive and prosper.

We must not only extend the hand or fellowship to Mugabe, but tangible support as well. The Zimbabwe experiment in settling war by election may well fail. Without our support now, it most certainly shall, and losing here means that Russia would only strengthen its hand in a very critical area

The recent New York Times-CBS test balloon may show that doing what is right and doing what is politically necessary is not always the same thing for a president seeking reelection.

The New York Times released figures from a poll, which asked respondents to select between President Carter and Ronald Reagan as their choice for president.

The poll shows that 34 percent of those queried would vote for Carter, no matter what. Similarly, 26 percent asked would vote for Reagan, regardless of the circumstances.

THIS LEAVES WHAT the pollsters called the "volatile 40 percent" who will decide the 1980 presidential election. Of this number, interestingly, 16 percent said they would vote for Gerald Ford over Carter, but Carter over Reagan.

Of Carter's support, the poll revealed that the less-well-to-do and the black make up the large part of Carter's electoral foundation.

This may be the tragedy of Carter running for re-election, for his budget cuts, which he announced Monday, will hit the hardest those likely to vote for him.

Economists across the spectrum believe the budget trimming is necessary. Soaring interest rates are eating up the middle class in this country; the shop-keeper, farmer and potential home-owner are not being able to carry their activities which are

essential to our economy.

Interest rates are pushing many businesses to the brink at 20 percent. Most businesses use loans to finance inventory, but with the 36 percent jump in cost of stocking shleves, the shop-keeper has little choice to raise prices.

Interest rates are threatening to affect adversely food cost. Farmers are finding it difficult to finance seed,

The budget cuts hit at the black and the poor. Public-service jobs will be cut, food and nutrition programs are being slimmed and revenue sharing is

being trimmed. This hits at the heart of the black ote, which turned the tide for Carter in the Industrial Northeast and in his native South. Ford took 55 percent of the white vote in the heart of Dixie in 1976. It was some 82 percent of the blacks voting for Carter in this region that made the difference.

THE BLACK VOTE difference was applicable in Ohio and New York, which Carter also carried.

The American voter acts according to his pocket book. The Depression of the 30's caused an entire electoral shift from the Republican Party to the Democrats; and the Republicans have never yet recovered.

The Republican opposition in November will likely be Reagan. The campaign for re-election will be toughened in that Carter is actually putting into effect the 1976 GOP Platform that called for reduced federal spending, more local control and less government interference in the

On top of this, Reagan looms to do well among the working class by embracing a tax cut fashioned by U.S. Rep. Jack Kemp, R-N.Y.

Many in this country will be hurt by the fiscal belt tightening. Carter's austerity program, while needed to calm the wage-price spiral, may cause insurgency among his sup-porters. This could be bad news in November for the president if they vent this protest by not voting.



Weight on Carter

WASHINGTON - The burdens of the presidency are weighing down heavily on the sagging shoulders of Jimmy Carter. White House sources say he has pulled deeper into his turtle shell as foreign crises and economic problems have become more con

nding. District months of the From dawn until midnight, he usually can be found alone, bent over stacks of presidential papers, boning up on interminable details, scribbling instructions to his subordinates,

of all Americans. Intimates describe him as a troubled man who broods over the crises he cannot control and the problems he cannot solve. He has become obsessed over the fate of the American hostages in Iran, these sources say, much the same as Lyndon Johnson fretted about Vietnam and Richard Nixon sulked over

Watergate. CARTER OFTEN appears strained and fatigued, his face drawn, his eyes bloodshot. His personal physician, Rear Adm. William Lukash, acknowledged that Carter is showing strain but stressed that his health is sound. "You perceive the fatigue more in an intuitive sense than in

anything physical," he said. Some aides have also sensed the quiet anguish seething within the president. He prays a lot. "I pray privately," he told a visitor, "and I do it several times a day.

A few associates have started to ask: Has the world's biggest job become too big for Jimmy Carter to handle? Other aides wonder whether the job is too big for anyone to cope with, whether world events are raging

out of control. Many presidential observers view Carter as a decent fellow who would make a terrific neighbor but who is not of his element in the White House. Unfamiliar with the leverage of power, he has a tendency to tilt the delicate federal machinery. His solutions invariably cause new, often worse, problems which then demand

even more drastic solutions. Yet Carter appears to have mastered the paperwork of the presidency. He buries himself in paperwork. He spends hours committing to memory facts and figures They become guideposts, which he uses in his discussions with subordinates. He has often flabbergasted them by quoting the most trivial

AFTER THE AFGHANISTAN invasion, he could recite the names of the key cities and the distance between them. He plunges into the details of each new problem as if he were taking a cram course. Yet he seems to lack the ability to brush aside the trivia when crucial decisions are needed. "He is a memorizer," explained one close associate, "not a

It was also typical of Carter to confine himself in the White House for the duration of the hostage crisis. He has always had a tendency to isolate and insulate himself from the Washington whirl. He has a desire for solitude and a craving for an orderly environment. "I value solitude," he once told me. "I kind of hunger after

So he has tried to encapsulate himself from unnecessary turmout,

dealing regularly only with those trusted, select few whose faces and accents are familiar. He has turned the Oval Office into a glass bubble.

The trouble with all this is that a sething enterpoise life america cannot be led from a glass bubble.

POSTGRADUATE PERKS:
Thousands of former government

employees are enjoying VIP treatment from U.S. and foreign customs and immigration officials because they improperly held onto their diplomatic or official passports. Unlike ordinary travelers using

regular passports, the holders of diplomatic and official passports are usually waved through customs and other formalities both in foreign countries and when they return to the United States. It's a traditional courtesy extended to government officials and employees on a reciprocal basis.

When someone leaves government service, he or she is supposed to turn in the special passport and go back to standing in line with the rest of the tourists. But most federal agencies don't bother to go after the prestigious passports. As a result, at least 350,000

diplomatic and official passports are currently "outstanding," according to a General Accounting Office in-vestigation requested by Sen. Max Baucus, D-Mont.

In a test check by GAO, the State Department alone was unable to count for 60 percent of the passports held by former top officials.

Even when an agency does try to collect an ex-official's fancy travel document, it doesn't always succeed. A former head of the General Services Administration, for example, stalled for months after being asked to turn in his official passport.

WATCH ON WASTE: The Farmers Home Administration, which provides low-interest loans to needy farmers, decided six years ago it needed a fancy new computer to help it in this worthwhile task. The results have been anything but worthwhile. After an expenditure of \$17 million, the computer, called UMIS, is still not in operation. Government inspectors discovered that so many technical bugs had cropped up in the UMIS system that it will take another five years to get it working, and the total bill will come to \$42 million. The inspectors concluded that UMIS will probably never do its assigned task, and suggested that it would be better in the long run to junk UMIS and design a new computer from scratch.

Questions that might enliven a cocktail-party conversation can become expensive propositions when they pique a bureaucrat's curiosity. The Agriculture Department is paying a University of Texas scholar \$90,000 to find out why people become etarians. The research will delve into the backgrounds of selected vegetarians and the "socio-economic factors" that led to their gustatorial convictions. Carnivores will be studied too, just to add balance to the

"Well, when you can make 17 or 18 percent by just putting your money into Treasury notes, it makes no sense to manufacture grommets any

"But the country needs grommets."

"Look, we're a business like any other business, and we have to make a profit for our stockholders. If we can make more on bank notes than we can on grommets, I have an obligation to do it, or I'll be sued.

"But all you're doing is making money on money. That doesn't do anything for the productivity in the country

"THAT'S EASY for you to say. But do you realize how tough it is to run a grommet factory? You have to deal with unions, employee benefits, government regulations, late-paying customers, and surly clients. And all you make on it is a lousy 10 percent. But if you use the same money to buy notes, you're dealing with one guy at the bank, making one telephone call a day and the money just rolls in." "It does sound easier than making grommets," I admitted. "But if everybody stops making a product and invests in the money market, there won't be anything to buy. Won't that spur on inflation?

"Probably. But I'm not a financial expert, and I'm sure the economists in Washington have a good answer to that one. After all, if they didn't know what they were doing, they wouldn't

Dear Dr. Donohue: I have been told that I have protein overspill in my urine and as yet my doctor cannot tell me what causes it or if it is serious. Can you explain something about this? Does it mean I must stop eating

all high-protein food? - V.J.M. Protein doesn't belong in urine that's for sure. It is a valuable body builder and that's where it belongs in body tissue. So when doctors find it in urine they want to know why. Proteinuria, which is the medical name for protein in urine, is a sign; it is not an illness. When found, it is necessary to learn if it is due to harmless conditions or if it indicates something amiss in the kidneys which, in any case, are responsible for

letting protein get into the urine. An important first step is a check of the first urine specimen of the day after arising. Some people have proteinuria after being on their feet for some time or after vigorous exercising. A football player would show high urine protein after a game, for example, but after a night's rest his urine would return to normal. This is called "orthostatic proteinuria,"

and it is harmless. If there is protein in urine at all times, then the patient's total urine voided over a 24-hour period is collected and examined. If this shows a total amount of protein greater than 150-200 milligrams, the next step is an X-ray of the kidneys or a kidney needle biopsy to get precise clues as to what is amiss.

If kidney disease is found, that has to be treated. Protein in the diet is restricted only in very serious kidney diseases. You do not have to restrict protein until your doctor tells you to. Stick with him while he sorts out the

WASHINGTON (AP) -Tests with scores of young children indicate they are selective television viewers who can tune it out or turn it off when it doesn't interest according

Dr. Daniel R. Anderson of the University of Massachusetts in Amherst said Thursday he has found that most children do not begin serious TV watching until they are about 2 or 21/2 years old.

When they are old enough to watch, they look at what interests them or what they understand, Anderson said. And when they are not interested, they will change channels to find something else or even turn the set off if they can, he added.

The notion that children become slaves to television is overblown," Anderson said in a telephone interview. "I see television as one element in a complex web of relationships. It's given far too much credit for

The research, sponsored by the National Science Foundation, showed that children younger than 21/2 years do not watch TV in a deliberate manner, although their attention is attracted occasionally by the sights and sounds

At 3 years or older, they show a sharp increase in attention and seem to watch TV as something to do in itself.



Severe storm strikes Wichita Falls again

Swift currents in a rain-

swollen creek swept away a Wichita Falls woman and an infant who had abandoned a car after tornado sirens sounded and sought shelter in an underground drainage

Police recovered the body of Oma Crawford, 41, but her grandson, 3month-old Jerry Crawford, was missing and presumed dead late Wednesday night.

Another person was slightly injured Wednesday when a tornado destroyed four mobile homes, damaged two houses, demolished three barns and downed power lines near Whitt in Parker County, a Department of Public Safety spokesman

Funnel clouds accompanied severe thunderstorms that danced across wide areas of North Texas on Wednesday and heavy downpours triggered flash flooding in several

Large damaging hail pelted Parker, Wise, Palo Pinto, Hood, Johnson, Tarrant and Ellis counties, causing extensive damage in some

Wichita Falls residents - still nervous in the wake of last year's massive tornado that killed 46 persons scurried for cover when sirens announced the sightings of twisters in Wichita and Archer counties.

Heavy rains Wednesday afternoon turned Wichita Falls streets into raging rivers that swept vehicles aside.

It was the same heavy rains that sent water racing through the twomile-long underground culvert where eight Crawford family members and a friend sought refuge from what they thought was an advancing tornado.

Terry Crawford said the family followed

firmed sightings near Holliday in Archer County and three miles north of Lake Kickapoo.

Residents in the southwest quadrant of the Wichita Falls - plowed under by the April 10, 1979 tornado - heeded warnings and ran inside their "When the sirens

sounded, I had to go tell people on the street who weren't here last year what the sirens meant and what they should do," one resident said.

Thunderstorms also dumped rain in far South Texas, far Southeast Texas and along the coast

Next stop, Texas legislators

WASHINGTON (AP) — Texas Railroad Commissioner John Poerner says state legislators are the next stop on his campaign promoting Japanese style, high speed trains as viable transportation between Dallas-Fort Worth, Houston and San Antonio.

Poerner pushed the idea Wednesday in a meeting with some members of the Texas congressional delegation. "The state of Texas is now ripe for rapid rail transit,"

he said later at a news conference. Poerner, who faces a Democratic primary battle next month, said the state's rapidly expanding population and the rising cost of gasoline make trains increasingly at-

The high speed "bullet" trains would run at speeds up to 150 mph, possibly along the median strips of interstate highways between the largest Texas cities.

The San Antonio to Dallas-Fort Worth route would run

through Waco, Temple and Austin, adding more prospective customers.

The plan would coincide with efforts to expand traditional Amtrak passenger service in the three-way intercity corridor commonly known as the Texas

Triangle "It will take 20 years to get the supertrains built," Poerner said.

He estimated that a complete feasibility study of expanded passenger train service in Texas would cost between \$3 million and \$5 million.

Amtrak has about \$20 million available for feasibility studies nationwide, Poerner said. It was uncertain how much would be available for Texas or what portion, if any, that state funds would have to pay.

The railroad commissioner said he was satisfied by the response received in the three to four months he has talked about bullet trains.

The House passed Tuesday a bill that includes the Texas Triangle among 13 intercity corridor named for potentially improved intercity rail service.

Rats not only prison pest

SHREVEPORT, La. (AP) - Rats are real none too clean. pests at the Caddo Correctional Institute, where guards make a game of chasing and kicking at them in the kitchen and dining

The prison farm on 1,200 acres of mostly wooded land 28 miles south of Shreveport has 400 inmates.

Superintendent Gene A. Scroggy said rat poison would be put at strategic poi ts inside the building walls, but added that an anti-rat campaign was complicated by the prisoners

"I am reluctant to put rat poison out for the simple reason that you don't know what inmate will attempt to put rat poison in the food," Scroggy said.

Shreveport Journal reporter Bill Hensel Jr. worked two weeks at the prison farm as a guard trainee. He said rats running about on top of the tiled ceiling sounded like tiny pebbles rolling around overhead - a rustling noise that became part of the

Hensel also said the kitchen help seemed a dangerous shortage of guards.

A surprising amount of friendly tussling takes place between guards and inmates, and Scroggy said he thinks it is because the guards fear getting caught in a hostage situation in case of an escape attempt.

Drug-sniffing

Three students who say their constitutional rights are being violated by a school policy that allows drugsniffing dogs to randomly search students have challenged the policy in federal court.

A class action suit filed Wednesday in Houston on behalf of the students by the American Civil Liberties Union asks U.S. District Judge Robert O'Conor to halt the searches at Baytown Sterling High School.

The students - Robby Horton, 18, his sister Heather, 15, and Sandra Sanchez, also 18 - have been singled out by the dogs and searched, according to Arthur Val Perkins, their attorney.

Perkins said none of the three were found to have drugs in their possession. The suit says only a bottle of perfume was found when a purse belonging to Ms. Sanchez was searched Jan.

in Afghanistan. Anita DeFrantz of Princeton, N.J., a rower who is the spokesperson for the 47member council, said she and three other Olympic athletes were to meet with Joseph Onek, White House deputy counsel, to give details of the plan, which a White House aide already

has said is unacceptable. Under the terms of the counterproposal, the athletes would not participate in opening and closing ceremonies and would not show up to accept any medals they win. They would arrive in Moscow just before they compete and leave immediately after, remaining in the Olympic Village or training facilities during the time they are on Soviet soil. They would not sightsee or engage in any other tourist activities.

Meanwhile, ad-ministration officials said Monday that plans for an alternative Olympics, which were rejected by the sports governing bodies last weekend, were put on a backburner while broader support for a Games boycott

IOC leaders to discuss revolutionary rule change

Revolutionary rule changes that would enable athletes to compete at the Summer Olympics, even if their national teams are not entered, will be discussed by Olympic leaders in Lausanne this month.

"This has often been discussed down the years," said Lord Killanin, president of the International Olympic Committee. "It was being talked about after World War II, when there were displaced persons without nationality and some athletes were deprived of a chance of competing in the Olympics. But there was always objection that the NOCs (National Olympic Committees) would be undermined.

The prospective changes, ones that allow athletes to circumvent boycotts enforced by their governments, appear to have only a small chance of being ratified. The possibility remained, however, the changes could be accepted by the IOC in time for athletes to submit their entries by the deadline of May 24.

"Anything is possible, because the athletes come first," said Killanin, adding, 'I will want to talk to the international sports federations first."

The IOC executive board meets with the federations April 21-22.

Also slated for discussion at Lausanne is a plan of financial aid for NOCs that lose government support because of the current controversy over the Soviet military presence in Afghanistan.

The IOC would have some money to spare from its Solidarity program, which helps amateur sport around the world from television revenue

"But we would be limited in what we

could do," said Count Jean de Beaumont of France, an IOC executive board member and chairman of the IOC's Finance Commission. "It costs a lot of money to prepare and equip a team and send it to the Olympic Games.

Last year, for the first time, the IOC allotted some money from Solidarity to help with travel and accommodation expenses at the Games. This was before the Afghanistan crisis arose and was intended chiefly to help NOCs of small countries.

Under the charter, athletes must be entered for the Olympics by their National Olympic Committees. But some IOC members have proposed that athletes should be allowed to enter individually if

For example, they say if the U.S. Olympic Committee responds to President Carter's call for a boycott of the Games and does not enter a team, American athletes who have said they want to go to Moscow should be allowed to compete.

"There is still time for us to do something for the Games in Moscow. But at this stage, I do not believe we shall succeed," de Beaumont said.

Plans to change the Olympic rules could meet stiff resistance. IOC members will argue that changes could undermine the national comittees, the backbone of the worldwide Olympic movement.

The IOC recognizes 143 NOCs around the world. They are, in effect, the IOC's local branches and are responsible for promoting the Olympic movement in their countries and preparing athletes for the

Japanese holding decision

TOKYO (AP) — A ranking cabinet official said today that there should be some more time before Japan spells out the final government policy on its participation in the Moscow Summer Olympic Games, hinting he may remove his previous remarks in favor

Chief Cabinet Secretay Masayoshi Ito told the diet (parliament): "We'll still have to watch the outcome of national olympic committee meetings in the United States and West Germany to decide whether the government should review its standpoint on par-ticipation."

In a press conference March 26, Ito told reporters, "There was no change in the government's position toward the Moscow Olympics...it is desirable for the Japanese Olympic Committee (JOC) to boycott the Games."



Legislators expect a report from the board next January outlining any changes in state law that might be needed to assure that old people and the elderly can get the policies they need.

Anderson may try another

road to fame

-WASHINGTON (AP) John Anderson insists he 'won't be hounded out" of the race for the Republican presidential nomination, but he's still clutching the option of trying another track to the White House

And an Associated Press survey shows he could, in fact, get his name on most state ballots as an independent or third-party candidate in November, though he could face some formidable obstacles.

"A third-party candidacy is being urged on me by a lot of people," Anderson told students at George Washington University Wednesday night. "I will consider that matter very carefully.

That was just about as far as the Illinois congressman can be pushed these days on the subject.

If the choice in November is "between the incumbent and (Ronald) Reagan, millions and millions of people aren't going to have any choice," he told the **GWU students**

But he vowed to "continue to march." meanwhile, for the GOP nomination in spite of his failure to win a single primary.

Anderson already is too late to get on the ballot as an independent in Ohio and he stands little chance of making it in Michigan.

The state with one of the toughest requirements for listing an independent presidential candidate is California, which requires petitions signed by 101,296 voters. Petitioners must obtain the signatures between June 9, six days after the California primary, and Aug. 8.

Carolyn Stewart, the California director of the Anderson campaign, when asked if she were gearing up for a possible petition drive, said, "Not really. Until I am told to do otherwise, my priority is to work very hard on our voter registration drive.'

However, when asked if she thought there would be any problem obtaining the necessary signatures should the Anderson strategy shift to an independent candidacy, she replied, "It would be a piece of cake."

Among the major states where Anderson could easily qualify for listing on the November ballot are New York, Illinois, Minnesota, Florida, as well as Pennsylvania.

The New York Times reported negotiators for the MTA and the striking bus and subway unions had agreed to resume bargaining today.

"There indeed has been movement," said mediation chairman Walter Gellhorn. "It is premature to talk of a contract, but there has been a clarification of issues."

However, union leaders warned New Yorkers not to expect a quick end to the mass transit collapse that has stranded 5.5 million daily passengers, filled up hotels and brought an additional 500,000 persons into the borough of Manhattan. "It's going to take at least a week to get this out of their system," Transport Workers Union local president John Lawe said of his membership. "They have the strike fever.

Union leaders were due in court today to face con-tempt charges for calling the walkout in defiance of an injunction. The union leaders could be jailed. In ad-dition, state law prohibits strikes by public employees and provides for fines for strikers of two days pay for each day off.

On Wednesday, traffic jams 14 lanes wide and extending for two miles were reported at major Manhattan entry points as commuters left behind by the walkout of 33,000 bus and subway workers streamed into the city. It was the first crowded day of the strike — Tuesday was the first day of Passover and

other people just stayed home.

Traffic accidents were up more than to percent, but reports of major crime dropped 23 percent as the city doubled the number of police pounding pavement already crowded to overflowing with walkers, joggers and roller-skaters.

Journalist chides news media for love of 'theater'

AUSTIN - Political campaign coverage suffers in the United States because the media are more concerned with theatrical events than important issues, Pulitzer prize-winning journalist David Halberstam said here.

Halberstam, whose most recent book, "The Powers That Be," deals with the growing influence of the American news media spoke at the University of Texas. In his speech, he gave a serious verbal bludgeoning

primarily to television news broadcasts. Television news underestimates the serious economic problems that make the present presidential election the

most important since 1940, he said. "Because of television, we are made to believe the transcending issue is Iran," Halberstam said. "Iran

happens to be marvelous theater — dramatic — hostages, and television loves theater.'

The demise of the economy is given less importance on

television because it is not theatrical or visual, said Halberstam, who received the Pulitzer Prize for his

Vietnam reporting in the early 1960s. He said he is melancholy that the media have not focused on the issues, such as the economy, that have the most serious ramifications for American society.
"We may be watching the death of the middle class," but one would never think so from watching the news,

Halberstam said. Instead, the media emphasize trivial events, such as

strategy and confrontation between candidates, He cited the New Hampshire Republican debate where the main question reporters asked was "Did Ronald

Reagan really outsnooked George Bush?" "Where from the networks is an examination of Ronald Reagan as governor of California?" Halberstam asked, 'We have had more coverage of the firing of John Sears,

his campaign manager."

President Carter uses the media well, but would find

Ronald Reagan a tough opponent because Reagan would ideologize the race, Halberstam said. Networks are too much a part of the political process, he said. Conventions are "media celebrations" where the viewer is much more familiar with the media stars than

with the people they are covering.

As a result, viewers worry more about the questions of "Will Walter beat out John and David? Will Eric come





This top name is then crossed off and the buyer's name is added to the bottom of each copy before sold again.
