Militants keep captives, Khomeini says

Ayatollah Ruhollah Khomeini ruled today that the 50 American hostages must remain in the hands of the young militants occupying the U.S. Embassy in Tehran until the new Iranian Parliament decides their fate, Khomeini's office announced.

The 79-year-old leader of the Iranian revolutionary regime vetoed President Abolhassan Bani-Sadr's proposal to transfer custody of the captives to the ruling Revolutionary Council after a meeting with Bani-Sadr and Foreign Minister Sadegh

In Washington, President Carter, after spending part of the Easter weekend considering the hostage crisis, said he was near a decision on a new set of economic and diplomatic sanctions against Iran. He remarked that the hostages' captors — he called them "terrorists" — had agreed to release their prisoners to the Iranian government "but the government refused." He did not elaborate.

Talking briefly to reporters after returning from Camp David, Md., he was asked whether he was about to

deciding that in a few minutes,' Carter replied, then went directly to his Oval Office to prepare for a meeting with his national security and foreign affairs advisers.

Today was the 156th day in captivity for the 50 Americans in the embassy and three held in the Iranian Foreign Ministry. Three U.S. clergymen invited by the militants to hold Easter services at the embassy reported the hostages were in excellent condition.

Khomeini for his ruling.
They said one solution, backed by Bani-Sadr and Ghotbzadeh, would have meant a transfer of the hostages to government custody to assure the United States and the world that the American captives were secure and in good health.

He has said repeatedly that the question of their release will be decided by the new Iranian Parliament, which is still in the process of being elected. Carter discusses new sanctions against Iran with key advisers

WASHINGTON (AP) - President Carter met with key advisers for 21/2 hours this morning and planned "further consultations" later in the day as he weighed new economic and diplomatic sanctions against Iran.

Carter conferred with top national security and diplomatic aides after Ayatollah Ruhollah Khomeini blocked the latest effort to transfer control of U.S. hostages in Tehran to the Iranian government.

White House press secretary Jody Powell announced plans for additional talks during the afternoon and indicated he might have more to say later about an announcement of presidential decisions.

Talking briefly to reporters after he returned from an Easter weekend at Camp David, Md., a grim-looking Carter was asked whether he was about to invoke new sanctions.

"We'll be deciding that in a few minutes," Carter replied.

The president went directly to his Oval Office, then to the nearby Cabinet Room for the session with most members of his National Security Council.

At one point, Carter remarked that the hostages' captors — he called them "terrorists" — had agreed to release their prisoners to the Iranian government "but the government refused." He did not elaborate.

Spokesman Powell said he did not know if the White House meeting would lead to an immediate announcement of U.S. retaliatory moves. But he suggested it might take some time to prepare to implement some unspecified decisions, indicating that could delay an an-

Powell said he knew of no plans for a presidential address to the nation.

Secretary of State Cyrus R. Vance and other officials spent part of their Easter Sunday preparing the list of potential sanctions for presentation to the president.

Although there was no suggestion that military action was contemplated, American Navy pilots on a carrier in the Indian Ocean were reported eager to bomb selected targets in Iran.

One official, who asked not to be identified, said in advance of today's meeting that, barring a sudden change for the better in Tehran, there was little doubt a package of sanctions would be adopted. The decision, he told The Associated Press Sunday afternoon, could come "within 24

In Tehran, meanwhile, the ruling Revolutionary Council reached a decision on a plan to transfer the 50

hostages from the control of the militants holding the U.S. Embassy to the government. But Foreign Minister Sadegh Ghotzbadeh said the decision would not be revealed until Monday to give him and President Abolhassan Bani-Sadr time to present that decision to Ayatollah Ruhollah Khomeini for his approval.

The Washington Post, The Washington Post, quoting unnamed American officials, reported today that Carter would move ahead with sanctions unless the Revolutionary Council acted "within ... hours" to remove the Americans from the hands of the militants.

Twice before, the administration has considered, but postponed, imposing additional sanctions to allow mediation efforts and Iranian moderates a chance to find a way of freeing the hostages from their em-

In each case, in February and again last week, those efforts were thwarted by militant Islamic clergymen. By resisting the plan to transfer control of the hostages, the cleries last week left the United States waiting for the election of the new Iranian parliament, which could not consider the hostage question until June at the

The sanctions under consideration would include, at the least, a U.S.-Iran trade embargo affecting all com-modities except food and medicine plus further cuts in the number of Iranian diplomats allowed in the

the election and again one week before in the Howard County clerk's office. The election is May 3. A total of 17 candidates are in the

A. A Wildlife Conservation spokesman and Herald Photographer Bill Forshee, who envisions himself as a veteran angler but not yet 65, said they don't think any state (surrounding or otherwise) permitted out-of-state residents of any age to fish without buying some type of license.

The money going into any state's wildlife conservation program is from taxes paid by the residents of that state. Many states allow their own entire or entire the form of their lines to fish for

AKRON, Ohio (AP) - The Firestone Tire & Rubber Co. and the United Auto Workers are scheduled to resume their talks Tuesday over the company's plans to close six tire plants.

The union objects to Firestone's calling the move which will idle a total of 8,500 workers at plants in Barberton, Akron and Dayton, Ohio; Los Angeles and Salinas, Calif., and Pottstown, Pa. -"irreversible.

That description violates the contract provision that requires the company to negotiate to save the plants, said union leader Peter Bommarito.

YOSEMITE NATIONAL PARK, Calif. (AP) -The body of a 23-year-old mountain climber was recovered near the top of 3,600-foot El Capitan nine days after he began his solo ascent up the vertical cliff, park officials said.

A Yosemite National Park Service spokeswoman said a Navy helicopter lowered rescuers Sunday to a ledge about 250 feet from the top of the granite peak to recover the body of David Kays of LaVerne,

Kays still had rappeling gear around his waist which was secured to ropes so he wouldn't fall, the spokeswoman said. The cause of death was not known and an autopsy was to be performed

Sadness, souvenirs

Love, oh love, oh lost love

KANSAS CITY, Mo. (AP) Memories of a blissful week in 1923, haunted Quintinn Roberts until she decided it wasn't too late to find the young, handsome man with whom she had fallen in love.

The 86-vear-old woman launched a search from her Long Beach, Calif., home. for the man she knew as Floyd Patrick Chambers. The search took a Baptist minister friend, the Rev. Dave Sisson, to Kansas City last week to check records in an effort to learn Chambers' whereabouts

But on Saturday, Miss Roberts learned that her memories and an old photograph on her bureau will be the only souvenir of their week-long romance in 1923. A sister of Chambers said he died in 1963.

"Well, it's nice to have something settled in my mind about what happened to Pat," Miss Roberts said by telephone, adding that all she has now is "memories, four letters and a beautiful picture I say good-night to every night.

Sisson came to Kansas City on Friday to try to unearth some clue to the fate of Miss Roberts' remembered love, and the Kansas City Times on Saturday published a story about the

search. Ann Chambers Russell saw the story and called the newspaper, saying the description and photograph of the man in the story

matched that of one of her older brothers who died 17 years ago.

"It sounded like my brother, but his name was Ira Patrick Chambers, Mrs. Russell said. "It's probably him because he never did like his first name and went by his second name most of the time instead."

She said a picture that accompanied the story also led her to conclude that her brother, who was buried in Stewart. Tenn., was the object of Miss Roberts' search.

Miss Roberts was a nurse at an El Paso, Texas, hospital when she met Chambers in June 1923. Records show Chambers was a clerk at a Kansas City bank before going to El Paso for treatment of a lung condition.

The couple fell in love immediately and spent a week together, dancing every night, Miss Roberts said. After that week, she went on to California with a girlfriend, as previously planned, and he stayed behind in El Paso. They exchanged letters several years, but finally, she lost track of him.

Miss Roberts said she thought about Chambers "off and on for a long time," but lost most of his letters. She said memories of their love affair have come back only in the last year. After putting Chambers' picture on her bureau several months ago, she began her

BOGOTA, Colombia (AP) - Leftist guerrillas freed three more hostages from the Dominican Republic's Embassy on Easter Sunday, but two Colombians among the 20 remaining were reported to have rejected freedom because they expect to make money by staying where they are.

The two reluctants were photographer Jorge Guzman and Luis Valencia, one of the city's best-known gate crashers who puts out a free, irregularly published paper called Diplomatic World.

Guzman, who sold seven rolls of film he took in the embassy for \$22,000, anticipates more pictures and more sales. Valencia, who crashed the embassy's independence day reception and was caught there when the leftist guerrillas also came uninvited, is reported planning to write a book on

Such bargains are available in the Pentagon, but don't bother to make reservations. These dining halls are restricted to top military and civilian brass who earn between \$45,000 and \$70,000 a year.

How can they keep prices so low, you ask? Easy. The restaurants are subsidized by the taxpayers to the tune of \$1.2 million a year.

UPWARDS TO 400 ADMIRALS, generals and other top-ranked military and civilian Defense Department personnel regularly eat things like Delmonico steaks to filet of sole in any one of five dining rooms in the building.

Some of the real stars in the Pentagon have their meals brought to their desks, so demanding is their work, but they still benefit from the

The wheeler-dealers don't eat out of paper plates, either. The meals invariably are served in gold-rimmed china by blue-jacketed waiters. Fresh flowers usually adorn each crisply starched tablecloth

What is the price of food in neighboring restaurants? A steak that costs \$2.65 in the Pentagon will set you back \$4 in a nearby Bonanza.

PENTAGON OFFICIALS say the prices charged in the building's five dining rooms cover the cost of the food and other supplies. Taxpayers, however, foot the bill for the people who prepare the food - the chefs, the cooks, the waiters and maintenance

What is the rationale behind the

idea of keeping dining areas in the building? Officials say they are necessary to provide a 'secure' area in which top military officials can talk about military matters over lunch.

The House Appropriations Committee apparently doesn't subscribe to the story. Several years ago, spokesmen for the committee said the cost of maintaining the dining halls was prohibitive and should be 'sharply reduced.' The panel argued that the dining room could be conso-lidated for use by the various services rather than each branch having its

Problem is Ted

Around the rim

"Teddy! Teddy! Ted-deee!" the crowd screamed as he approached the podium one brisk day in 1972.

The crowd went wild as Kennedy rose to speak in behalf of the can-didate he was with, George McGovern. People were wondering who the crowd really came out to see, Kennedy, or McGovern. The two were taking a swing through the eastern states in the latter part of the cam-

Frank Rizzo, then the mayor of Philadelphia refused to come out of his office in City Hall for the rally that was held at a major intersection of the city, right near his ivory tower. He was a great supporter of Richard Nixon. Rizzo always spouted off at the mouth and that day was no exception, saying something to the effect that if Kennedy hadn't shown up, there would have been a much smaller crowd at the rally. This time he was probably right.

That was three years after Chappaquiddick. It was still too soon to run for office, but his popularity was still

high. What happened? How can a man who has been speculated on as to whether he will run through four elections do so badly once he decides to accept the challenge?

Since a large percentage of the voting population agrees with him on many of the issues, what is the

Part of it is Kennedy himself, his family and to a large extent, the press and the voters, who feel a Kennedy has a right. With all the brothers it went from the right to become president, to the right to become the party's nominee and now it seems, the right to try. And that's about it.

Fortunately or unfortunately for Kennedy, he is following a "legend." Fortunately, because he is being given a chance he normally wouldn't have gotten, just by serving in the senate, which was his first public office. Even so, most critics would agree he has been a much better senator than either of his brothers. Unfortunately, because of his private life, he hasn't lived up to

When you carry the name of Edward Kennedy, you get the roses and the daggers which another politician probably would never get. The public could forgive almost anything he did, if it hadn't been for Chappaquiddick. Now they're wondering if he is stable. He might be wondering why the public can't put it out of their minds. I wonder if he forgets that had it been any other politician, it would have been all over in July, 1969.

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It seems those who couldn't have cared less about Chappaquiddick 11 years ago, are beginning to care now. And his other pranks over the years have all added up to make a losing

Had Kennedy decided not to run this year, against an incumbent president who has been hiding behind the skirts of the hostages, his popularity would still be riding high, the crowds would still come out to see the candidate he would come to campaign with, the press would speculate on why he didn't run and question his intentions for '84 and the public wouldn't be as worried about Chappaquiddick.

But he didn't. He chose to become a candidate. And now, he and his family are learning that a Kennedy isn't forgiven for everything. Instead of being given the right to become president, or the nominee, or a candidate he is only being given the privilege of becoming a nominee. And only because his name is Kennedy.

Chappaquiddick happened close to six years after one assassination and 11 months after the other. The assassinations were so long ago, but after 11 years, Chappaquiddick is still

Now, after 11 years, we're finding out what we knew that day in Philly eight years ago. It was, and is, still too soon for him to run for president.

If Kennedy throws his arms up in

Spleen can be troublemaker

Severe leukopenia (white cell count of 500), also acute arthritis and Afghanistan, the president sounded a thrombocytopenia. The term "Felty's syndrome" was used. What do the words "leukopenia" and "thrombocytopenia" mean? Can you help in all this? - S R

> Let's begin with Felty's syndrome. As the word syndrome implies, it is a group of conditions that occur simultaneously, in this case rheumatoid arthritis, spleen enlargement and a low white blood count (the leukopenia). Other blood changes are found, the anemia and thrombocytopenia, the latter being a lowered number of clotting elements (platelets). That should clear up most of the confusing terminology for you.

> We do not know why all these changes occur in some people who have rheumatoid arthritis, but we know that a consequence of the blood changes, chiefly the low white blood cell count, can be repeated infections. If that is a problem, removal of the spleen is often the answer. The white cell count rises after removal, as do the red cell and thrombocyte counts.

Not everyone with Felty's syndrome needs spleen removal Sometimes the changes are not serious enough to warrant it. A remarkable thing about the spleen, as you may know, is that it can be removed and its duties taken over by other body systems, a remarkable achievement in biological engineering. (See next item for more.)

Dear Dr. Donohue: I am 82 and in excellent health, but recently I was told I am anemic. My red count is low. In the hospital it was found that my spleen was enlarged and was destroying the red blood cells. Please explain how this happens. — Mrs.

During fetal development (in the womb) the spleen's job is to make red blood cells. After birth the spleen's duty changes. It becomes a scavenger, destroying old, worn out red blood cells. It does this by turning into a large spongy filter.

The spleen may become a bit carried away with its responsibility and begin removing too many blood cells indiscriminately — whether 'worn out" or not. Of course, the result is a red blood cell deficiency. At times, removal of the spleen is

As noted in the preceding letter (from S.R.) the spleen has a second important function. It becomes an armory of protective weapons (antibodies) for use against invading

Dear Dr. Donohue: Would cervicitis eventually lead to cancer? Is there some treatment for it? - Mrs. R.E.E.

Cervicitis is inflammation (itis) of the cervix, which is the lower section the uterus. Doctors can find some signs of inflammation in most women. The vagina is laden with bacteria because the mucus-producing glands in the area make it a good place for the growth of bacteria. So the important thing is the severity of the inflammation, also the germ causing

Often no treatment is required if symptoms are mild. If there is a great deal of discharge or if the surface of the cervix is eroded, then vaginal suppositories, cautery (burning) of the area, or antibiotics by mouth may be required.

No one can tell you with confidence whether or not such an inflammation would ever lead to malignancy. It is difficult to establish cause and effect in such matters. Millions of women have some degree of cervicitis. Certainly, some might eventually have cancer of the cervix. Many, many more will not, so it is almost impossible to say cervicitis leads to

Dear Dr. Donohue: I have always wanted to lose some weight. I just could not do it. But now I have lost quite a bit by taking laxatives after I eat anything. I was wondering if this is harmful medically. I do have a heart problem - K R K

"AGAIN"

That's a perfectly awful thing to do. You are going to ruin the normal motor activity of your intestines. Get a sensible diet. I wish you'd have asked me BEFORE you began this nonsense. I can't predict any heart affects, but they would not be good if there were any.

Lost alliance

LONDON Think we just made a mess of it," the British foreign secretary, Lord Carrington, said the other day about cooperation between the U.S. and its allies in responding to the Soviet invasion of Afghanistan. Given that frank spirit, it is possible, after talks with leading officials, to see how the alliance lost its way.

Basically the West Germans, the French and the British governments did their own thing-reacting to the trouble in ways consistent with their national and political interests. They did not pull together with the U. S., and are still not pulling together, because Washington never defined a track which drew them toward joint effort of a serious kind.

West Germany counts as its special interest the maintenance of its eastern policy-or Ostpolitik. Sixteen million other Germans live under communist domination in the state of the east. Berlin is always up for grabs. Important business is to be done with the other countries of Eastern Europe, and with the Soviet Union. So Bonn has a vital national interest in maintaining ties with CHANCELLOR HELMUT SCH-

MIDT has a special political stake in the Soviet connection. The Ostpolitik separates his coalition government from the uncompromising anticommunists in the Christian Democratic opposition. It enables him to hold by his side the left wing of his own Social Democratic Party. With national elections coming on October b, both objectives are crucial. So when the Afghanistan invasion

occurred, Schmidt's first concern was to save his Ostpolitik from overreaction by Washington. He visited the White House earlier this month ready to pay a high price. He was prepared to give the U.S. major support in Turkey or Pakistan, or even to put pressure on radical states such as Libya and South Yemen. When all he was asked to do was boycott the Olympics, he acceded with alacrity. Since then he has been busy cultivating economic ties with Moscow, and protecting political ties with East Germany. All the while he has been saying-for him-very nice things about President Carter.

President Valery Giscard d'Estaing of France has the formidable problem of following in the footsteps of Gen. de Gaulle. He has to make his country count for something in the affairs of the world and in a way that is different from the U.S. That national ex-pectation is reinforced by his political interest to neutralize large blocs of Gaullist and communist voters in the presidential elections next year.

The bent of France, in these conditions, is to go into business on its own. The French president has done

He cultivated Iran by protecting the Ayatollah Khomeini during his period in exile. He endeared himself to Saudi Arabia by sending troops to help put down the troubles in Mecca. He furnished weapons-grade material for a

nuclear reactor to Iraq, and jet war planes. Most recently he has embraced the cause of the Palestine Liberation Organization.

When asked about common objectives, the French claim that the Saudi Arabia and with the PLO will help the U.S. once Washington starts become serious about achieving security in the Persian Gulf area. Such security, the French argue, can be obtained by following another French lead-a deal with Moscow whereby the Russians pull out of Afghanistan and give that country some kind of neutral status.

BRITAIN'S INTEREST IS TO be middle man between the U.S., on one hand, and the French and the Germans on the other. In that way London will maximize its special relation with Washington and its standing with the European Economic Community where it has big fish to fry. In the same way, and not so coincidentally, Prime Minister Margaret Thatcher can show that she is a true Tory, able to stand by the American connection and get the most out of

So Mrs. Thatcher tooted the American horn by giving rhetorical support to a tough stance on Iran and Afghanistan. Lord Carrington sounded the European note by pushing the French idea of neutralizing Afghanistan. Together they are using North Sea oil to pry out of the French and Germans a much better deal on the financial terms of Bricish membership in the Common

The upshot is what Lord Carrington called a "mess" and what many Americans feel to be a lack of strong support from its allies in this country and the continent. Carrington believes that "nobody in particular is to

But the position of the Germans, the French and the British represents the normal ingredient of alliance politicsnot something new. What is new-what remains new-is the inability of Washington to define a steady position that engages heavy British and German cooperation as a matter of self-interest, and French acquies on pain of isolation. For as a British friend said to me the other day,"When the American don't know where they're going, we all get lost."

I suggest you get together with others who share your concern. I would not be in a position to advise you about what can be done specifically; you and others who band together will need to seek expert advice. It may well be that your com-munity already has laws which limit pornography, but they are not being enforced because no one is speaking out on the issue. Whatever you do, be sure you have all the facts and know what your rights are, as well as the rights of others who may disagree with you.

You should also seek to deal with this problem on another, more per-sonal level. Within your family be sure that you encourage a whole-someness and openness about such things as sex. Pornography is wrong for many reasons, but one of the most serious is that it treats other people as objects to be used selfiably for one's self gratification. It is the opposite of the Christian view of love, which seeks to do that which is best for the other person. Our young people need to see true love in our lives and be taught the wonder of human love love given to us by God.

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DALLAS (AP) — For most of her life, Debera Mar-tinson lived in fear of strangers — hiding behind locked doors and refusing to open them to visitors she did not

The 28-year-old nurse and mother pushed furniture against the doors at night and often slept under the bed when her husband, Don, was away, according to neigh-

Friends said they had to telephone in advance if they wanted to drop by to visit her. She was taught from childhood to let no strangers in her house, and she grew up determined to make herself safe from intruders.

"My daughter would not admit a total stranger to her home," said Debera's father, John Monroe Woodson. "She would not open a door (to a caller) unless she could see him or knew him."

Her precautions were wasted. Last week, she was found dead on the floor of her bedroom, a macrame plant holder

wrapped tightly around her neck. A message had been scrawled on her mirror in rosy pink lipstick. It said: "Now we are even Don."

An autopsy showed she died of strangulation, there was emen in her mouth and her hands and wrists probably ad been bound.

Her clothes had been folded neatly, and placed to form a trail leading to her nude body.

There was no sign of forced entry.

"She had a horror of dying like this," said a close friend who requested anonymity. "Debbie Martinson would open a door to rebedy."

Don Martinson, 32, a civil trial lawyer, found his wife's body when he returned home after a day on jury duty.

Their infant son, David, was crying in his crib but

Martinson said he had tried to call his wife at 5 p.m. and

again at 5:30 p.m. There was no answer.

He has yet to give police a detailed statement. A partner in his law firm said Martinson was distraught and under

"There's not a whole lot we can do on this case until we get some information," said Sgt. Bill Parker, head of the police investigating team.

On Friday, however, noted criminal defense attorney Phil Burleson — retained as a "consultant" in the case said Martinson was ready for questioning. Burleson was one of the attorneys who successfully defended Fort Worth millionaire Cullen Davis.

Police say they have no evidence linking Martinson to the crime, and they have ruled out robbery as a motive. The couple had no known enemies and investigators said the lipstick message may have been designed to throw them off the track.

Medical examiners said Mrs. Martinson had been dead four to eight hours when her body was found, placing the time of the killing between 11 a.m. and 3 p.m.

be independently confirmed. and they conflicted with statements in Washington that the Soviets had curtailed their spring offensive, apparently to defuse a U.S. led campaign for an international boycott of the Olympics in Moscow

The Kremlin has poured an estimated 85,000 troops into Afghanistan since last December to prop up the latest in a succession of communist governments embroiled in a two-year-old war with the anti-communist Moslem rebels.

Rather described the war as "18th-century people fighting a 20th-century war, and said the rebels had pleaded with the United States to send weapons.
