# **Plane hijacker** is identified

MIAMI (AP) - The man who hijacked an American Airlines jet to Cuba has been described as a dental school dropout and Moslem convert who was trying to escape racial and religious prejudice in the United States

Prensa Latina, the official Cuban news agency, identified the hijacking suspect Thursday as Muhammad Jalal Deen Akbar, formerly Gerald Leland Merity.

Officials at the University of California-San Franciso said a man by the same name quit their dental school last year.

Havana radio broadcasts monitored in Miami identified the man as a "former student of odontology born in Minneapolis, Minn."

It quoted him as saying that he "abandoned his studies at the University of San Francisco late last year because of political and religious conflicts with university authorities." "He said that he left the United States for religious and political

reasons because any leader that shows the Negroes the way is exposed to being destroyed, blackmailed or assassinated," the broadcast said.

Officials at UC-San Francisco said Akbar, 35, first registered at the School of Dentistry in the fall of 1977. The school said Akbar, who gave his hometown as Minneapolis, withdrew voluntarily at the beginning of the current term and had no record of disciplinary problems.

A quiet man described as a black in his 30s scaled a wall at the Ontario, Calif., airport Wednesday morning and forced his way aboard an American Airlines Boeing 727. Seven crew members were aboard but no passengers. The plane was forced to go to Havana with a fueling stop at Dallas. The plane and crew returned to Miami late Wednesday, leaving the hijacker in Havana.

The State Department in Washington said that Cuba informed the United States the hjacker was in custody and would be prosecuted

# United States seeks Israeli withdrawal from Lebanon

TEL AVIV, Israel (AP) - The United States is reportedly urging Israel to withdraw its troops from southeastern Lebanon, and Defense Minister Ezer Weizman says they won't stay permanently.

Weizman met here Thursday with William Brown, the U.S. charge d'affaires, who an announcement said requested "clarification" of Israel's intentions in southern Lebanon. No details of the meeting were released, but U.N. sources said the United States was urging the Israelis to pull back.

There is some indication of beginning of a withdrawal of the Israeli forces," a spokesman for Secretary-General Kurt Waldheim said in New York. But no such indications were reported from the border area

Israeli military sources said the army crossed the border to block more Palestinian guerrilla raids like across its northern frontier. Weizman said, "First of all (it was done) to make it easier on the settlements ... This battle has gone on for 10 or 12 years and it's not a simple thing.'

Israel's string of collective farms lining the rugged Galilee border with Lebanon have been frequent targets of attacks by Palestinian guerrillas from Lebanon. The attack Monday on the Misgav Am kibbutz coincided with Egyptian President Anwar Sadat's meeting in Washington with President Carter, and there was speculation that another raid would be staged while Begin was meeting with

Carter. ources said the Israelis have deployed about 360 soldiers and 23 armored personnel carriers anchored in five emplacements along an 11-mile-long arc some three miles inside Lebanese territory.

Lebanon accused Israel of an "insolent violation" of U.N. resolutions and demanded a Security Council session on the "explosive situation." The council was to meet in closed session this afternoon to discuss the situation and what to do about it

# Iranian president threatens war with Iraq, Israel

### **By the Associated Press**

Iranian President Abolhassan Bani-Sadr today threatened war on Iraq and battles against Israel and warned America's oil-thirsty allies they won't get "so much as snake's poison" from Iran if they back President Carter's sanctions to free the 50 American hostages seized 160 days ago.

Accusing Iraq of "dancing to any music that America played," Bani-Sadr warned "we will go to war" if there is a worsening in the scattershot

hostages. Wednesday the Moslem militants occupying the U.S. Embassy in Tehran since Nov. 4 threatened to kill all 50 of their captives if the United States intervened militarily. On Thursday, one of the militants told NBC News they would kill them all if Iraq or any other U.S. "puppet" invaded.

"If they should kill any of our people, a border spat with Iraq would be the least of their problems," a

White House official in Washington commented.

Iraq urged other Arab nations to rally behind it against Iran, and its official news agency declared: "This crazy, racist Khomeini is nothing but a turbaned shah.

The nine nations of the European Common Market announced that their ambassadors in Tehran would call on Bani-Sadr and demand that a date be set for the release of the hostages.

# Carter disappointed at lack of support from U.S. allies

WASHINGTON (AP) - Three days after announcing new sanctions against Iran, President Carter says he's disappointed that American allies haven't been more supportive of the U.S. moves.

"We've been disappointed" that some allies have not been willing to back the moves designed to win freedom for the 53 Americans held in Tehran, Carter told the American

Society of Newspaper Editors. As Carter was speaking Thursday, foreign ministers of the nine **European Common Market nations** said their governments would "demand" that the hostages be freed. But they did not say whether any sanctions would be imposed if the

demand goes unheeded. Administration officials, speaking privately, said Thursday they felt the Europeans would take a variety of steps, some recalling ambassadors and others imposing different kinds of restraint on trade with Iran.

But they said they expected none would go as far as the United States, which this week completely broke relations and barred all trade except

in food and medicine to protest the continued captivity of the Americans.

The administration has said its sanctions will be much more effective if other nations join them, increasing Iran's sense of isolation and economic hardship.

On Thursday, Norway, which is not in the EEC, recalled its ambassador to Tehran in response to Carter's appeal and the U.S. State Department said West Germany was withdrawing its ambassador from Tehran.

Carter's speech was a wide-ranging outline of his recent foreign policy moves. In it, he warned Iran anew that the United States "will pursue every - and 1 repeat - every legitimate use of power to bring our people home."

Adding another element of uncertainty over Iran at the ASNE meeting was CIA Director Stansfield Turner's response when asked whether thought sanctions would compel the Iranians to release the hostages.

### Libel suit dismissed

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) - The California Supreme Court has dismissed a libel and invasion of privacy suit against the attorney who wrote a book about his prosecution of the Charles Manson crime 'family

The decision Thursday overturned an appellate court ruling that "Helter Skelter" might be read as connecting mental health worker James Forsher with the death of Ronald Hughes, who represented Manson follower Leslie Van Houton.

The court said no statement in the book by Vincent Bugliosi, who successfully prosecuted Manson in the 1969 slayings of Sharon Tate and six others could alone be said to libel Forsher.

LAKE FOREST, Ill. (AP) - A van driver was charged with transporting an insecure load of hazardous materials after the doors of his vehicle sprang open and boxes of low-grade rad medical supplies tumbled onto a highway near here, police said. A three-mile section of U.S. 41 was closed for five hours after the spill of boxes containing diagnostic kits for thyroid disorders and hepatitis. The kits, which contain low-level radioactive substances. were being transported from a Chicago suburb to a city terminal, according to a spokesman for Abbott Laboratories. State police said no measurable radioactivity was detected after the Thursday accident.

### 'HikaNation' begins

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) - It will take a year to walk the 4,500 miles from this city to Washington, D.C., but organizers of the "HikaNation" say they have 80 people willing to go the distance. The trek is to begin here Saturday. Organizer

Mike McReynolds said some people have quit their jobs and sold their possessions to "bring to the American public the fact that hiking is a healthy outdoor activity" and to promote walking trails.

He said the group expects to reach the nation's capital in May or June 1981 and present "whoever the president is" with a scroll bearing the name of every mayor of every town along the way.

### Regents not included

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) - The law providing for public school employee pay at levels equal to prevailing local rates does not apply to the University of California regents, the state Supreme Court has ruled.

The regents argued successfully that the state constitution gave them independence in running the university system. The San Francisco Labor Council, which brought the action, contended the regents' independence was limited to academic matters, not working conditions.

The court ruled the constitution gave the regents full power of government limited only to "such legislative controls as may be necessary to insure security of its funds.



# **Bicycle sales** booming in U.S.

Maybe the message is getting through. Maybe Americans have become acutely aware (1) that there is a serious energy shortage, and (2) that they would be helping themselves as well as contributing to the nation's welfare by exercising more.

Look how many more people are out walking or jogging today than there were a decade ago. (There are men in the medical profession who insist that jogging is not good for people who sit behind a desk all day, but no one bad

mouths walking as a plus factor. Walking not only improves one's muscle tone but it provides time for one to collect one's thoughts, too). THERE IS DEFINITELY a boom in bicycle sales, inspired, no doubt, by the ballooning cost of gasoline. Bicycling has always been very


popular in most countries of Europe and the Far East. Now that form of exercise and recreation is becoming very popular in the United States. The Bicycle Manufacturers Association reports that Americans

purchased an estimated 10.8 million bikes last year, pushing sales past the billion-dollar mark for the first time in history.

Those who have reached middle age or older can recall when an adult seen on a bicycle was someone not cut from the common cloth, who maybe danced to a different drummer. If he wore a clamp around his leg or knickers, he was put down as a real oddball. Now, cyclists have become such an ordinary sight on American streets.

adults riding bicycles for fun, for exercise or even as a means of getting from one place to another. It is a phenomenon to encourage, with both health and fuel conservation in mind. One week ago I pronounced judgment on the controversy over the alleged "apology" by President Carter to the ayatollah. The text of the disputed documents had been released on March 29 in Tehran. The president heatedly denied that he had either written or authorized the transmission of the message to the ayatollah. The Iranians argued its authenticity citing the means of its transmittal (through the Swiss embassy, by hand; exactly duplicating established procedures for communicating with the Iranian government, if that is the right word for it)

My contribution to the dispute was a textual analysis in which I concluded that there isn't a forger in the world capable on assignment, of putting together such a string of sentences, combining unctuousness and circumlotion; that the fingerprint had to be that of the Carter State Department. Just as no one could have forged Alger Hiss's Woodstock typewriter, so - I concluded - no one could have improvised the kind of foreign policy letter characteristic of the Carter White House.

I AM PERSUADED that though technically I was right, my conclusion was wrong, and I herewith retract it. What happened?

For one week I was incommunicable. On returning, I found an urgent message from someone highly placed in the sensitive bunkers of the Carter White House. He said the following:

I'M GOING TO TELLYOU, first, what really happened. Then I'm going to give you two reasons why you should believe me.

1) The so-called apology letter was put together by someone in Switzerland who does diplomatic work for us on a more or less stringer-basis. He is an Argentine-Frenchman we have used before to relay messages to Tehran. He also has had access to any number of draft-paragraphs prepared for any number of contingencies, even as the War Department accumulates ngency planning arrangements.

One of the unfortunate consequences of having to take steroid (cortisone-like) drugs for long periods are the side effects you mention. This called "Cushing's syndrome

pumping of the heart. The second represents the arterial pressure between beats.

Treatment can reduce pressure readings, whether systolic or diastolic, and treatment doesn't always have to mean drugs. Weight control and reduction of salt intake, plus sensible and allowable exercise, may be all that is needed.

# Showing strength

Around the rim

Walter Cronkite pronounces it "goats-bazadee." Other newsmen seem to prefer some variation of 'gopes-zah-day." But it seems, more and more, that the goals of Iranian Foreign Minister Ghotbzadeh, his government, and his people are as elusive as the pronunciation of that strange, foreign name.

We have just suffered through two intensely frustrating weeks of dealing with the terrorists who hold our countrymen captive. The Iranians have thrown out false promises that, like fireflies, appear as small pin-pricks of light, now here, now there, on a very long, dark night.

THE SITUATION remains unchanged except for one thing: all illusion of control, of direction, vanished in that small country during these last two weeks. And that makes for a scary and volatile scenario.

Before, it could be reasoned that President Bani Sadr and Ghotbzadeh had to protect their own moderate heads by placating the terrorists and the extreme fringes within the country. Implicit in this reasoning was the assumption that, one, they were capable of bringing the hostages under government control, and two, that they wanted to. That small hope has vanished.

IT NOW APPEARS that we are dealing with a hydra-headed monster. incapable of controlling its movements. Where the promises and the consequent breaking of those promises may before have been construed as a choreographed exercise in wearing down America's resolve, it now seems that those actions were merely symptoms of a country gone haywire. Iran's rulers showed the world that they answered to the terrorists rather than vice-versa when they failed to take control of the hostages. Yet the humiliating consequences of this action seem not to have dawned on anyone in the Iranian government.


It is now evident that America and its president are faced with a foe that has lost the ability to reason, or, at the very least, the ability to translate reason into action.

THE QUESTION of what to do next is painful. The answer may be even more painful: More of the same. The foolhardiness of military retaliation has been evident to most since the first day of the hostages' captivity. The Iranians, themselves, have amplified the truth of this with their threat to kill the hostages in the event of any military incursion.

It appears that economic sanctions will achieve little unless coordinated among U.S. allies; a prospect that is beginning to seem unlikely. Even if economic sanctions could be effectively enforced, what good would they do against a country full of ascetics who seem to welcome hardship as a national soul cleanser?

WHAT AMERICA FACES is a long period of waiting, and then waiting some more. Ultimately we may be forced to concede officially the part we played in returning the shah to the throne.

To endure this wait, and the taunts from those who claim that to wait is to show weakness, will be agonizing. But if we can endure the vigil, we will be able to say that our strength as a nation lies in our patience.

2) There are objective as well as subjective reasons why you should believe this. Objectively, the last thing even a maladroit administration would do is apologize to the avatollah before the hostages were released. Should such an apology ever be forthcoming - and the president swears it will not - then it is inconceivable that it would be volunteered before the hostages were actually in hand. It can't convincingly be contended that so egregious an error in timing would be voluntarily committed.

NOTE, TOO, that if the White House had in fact authorized the transmission, there would have been a 48 hour delay before making the ritual denial. That is the way it works: You do not send over a serious letter and instantly deny its authenticity. You wait a few hours hoping that the communication will have the desired impact.

Now: Anyone who wishes to believe it might come up with the following explanation - namely that Hamilton Jordan, without advising the president, proceeded on Jordan's own initiative to authorize our contact to put together and deliver the message.

Short-term use rarely causes such problems.

There is a common dilemma that exists in medicine. Doctors are aware that a medication might cause unpleasant side effects, but feel the illness is severe enough to warrant using it, asking the patient to put up with the effects.

There are many conditions (including some lung problems) that do require long-term steroid treatment. Without it, the illness cannot be controlled, as with your respiratory problem, for example. Once an illness is brought under control it may be possible to lessen or adjust the schedule of drug dosages

Giving steroids on alternate days with the day's dose given early in the morning can help prevent some of the things you describe. There is a great big BUT that has to be used here.

This change in dosage schedule can be done only under the watchful eye of your doctor should he find a trial acceptable for your case. If alternateday therapy is feasible, there might be fewer skin, muscle and bone changes. I absolutely forbid you to alter your dosage on your own as a trial. Your doctor had a good reason for arriving at the dosage schedule you are now using. Changing things on your own might have results worse for you than those you report from the present dosage. You can discuss this with your physician.

Dear Dr. Donohue: Will you please comment on blood pressure especially on patients who have only an increase in systolic pressure? Does treating these patients do any good? Like your style of writing. - Mrs. P.N

Any high blood pressure increases the chances of having heart disease, stroke and artery hardening.

WASHINGTON - In the furor over Afghanistan and the Soviet threat to neighboring Pakistan, the American intelligence community is carefully monitoring what could be another jolt to peace in the Middle East - the imminent development of a nuclear bomb by Pakistan

Recent top-secret intelligence reports predict that the Pakistanis -who scorned the offer of conventional U.S. military weapons as "peanuts' may explode their first atomic device by the end of the year. Asian and European intelligence sources. who have shared their information with the United States, are convinced of the Pakistanis' early success in achieving nuclear capability.

THE PREVAILING VIEW among U.S. analysts, chiefly the State Department's Bureau of Intelligence and Research, is that the Pakistanis would not perfect a nuclear bomb before the summer of 1981 at the earliest. But these sources now concede that they could have been over-optimistic, since they were unaware of the Pakistanis' clandestine, top-speed efforts.

Although Pakistan has repeatedly denied it is working on a nuclear bomb, intelligence analysts dismiss these protestations as patently ridiculous. The heavily guarded uranium enrichment plant being built at Kahuta, 25 miles south of Islambad, will give the Pakistan's enough fissionable material to build a bomb. All the experts agree it was only a matter of time. The alarming development is that the time period is being shortened drastically.

In Dr. Abdul Qadar Khan, the Pakistanis already have the technological expertise for nuclear capability. Khan is a Western-trained Pakistani who had access to the secret designs and technology of a supersophisticated uranium enrichment plant in the Netherlands.

He allegedly stole some of the Dutch plant's blueprints, plus a list of contractors. Using dummy corporations, Pakistan has been quietly buying the materials needed for its own enrichment plant on the Dutch model. Though evidence against Khan presented in international forums last year was overwhelming, Pakistan has refused even to admit he exists.

UNDER KHAN'S GUIDANCE, and with the help of 1979 Nobel Pcize-winning physicist, Dr. Abdus Salam, the Pakistanis are so far along the nuclear trail that military-scientific

teams have already been looking for suitable desert expanses for an underground test explosion. When Pakistan does get its nuclear

bomb, the world will enter a new and more dangerous era. A shaky dictatorship like Gen. Muhammad Zia's, armed with a nuclear arsenal, is frightening enough. What makes the situation far worse is that Pakistan will likely share its nuclear know-how with even less responsible Arab nations, like the fanatic Gen. Muammar Qaddafi's Libya who is a protector of terrorists and an implacable foe of Israel.

Intelligence sources explained that Pakistan is obligated to share its nuclear capability with Libya and Saudi Arabia, which have provided financial aid to its military and nuclear programs.

IN 1977, THE CIA SECRETLY reported that Libya had promised to help Pakistan pay for a French nuclear reprocessing facility, but the United States was able to scotch the deal. Recent reports detail Libya's apparent financial involvement in the Pakistani uranium plant at Kahuta.

The Carter administration is concerned at the idea of someone like Qaddafi - or even the Palestine Liberation Organization - having an atomic bomb. A high-level task force, therefore, has been assigned to devise contingency plans for a Pakistani nucleal explosion. But my sources fear there really isn't much that can be done.

PAPER CHASE: Hell hath no fury like a bureaucrat scorned. The meat processors pleaded with Congress for relief.

"Some people may prefer home collection but they should be told it will cost more." she said

Nell Hahn, attorney for Acorn, urged the board to add to the rules a requirement that advertising for such coverage - called "industrial life" should disclose the additional cost policyholders must pay because of at-home collection of premiums.

Insurance men generally criticized the rules because they differ from model rules recommended the by National Association of Insurance Commissioners (NAIC) and adopted by 36 states.

They also objected to regulating all forms of insurance advertising - life, health. auto and homeowners — in one set of regulations.


