Bodies of eight Americans returned

The bodies of the eight U.S. servicemen killed in the failed hostage rescue mission in Iran were turned over today to a Greek Catholic Archbishop who said he would take them on a flight to Switzerland on Tuesday for transfer to the United States.

Iranians said they found a "possibly American" helicopter abandoned in the desert after four helicopters violated Iranian airspace Sunday, the official Pars news agency reported

Tito's body being taken to Belgrade

BELGRADE, Yugoslavia (AP) -The body of President Josip Broz Tito, the World War II hero who forged his own brand of decentralized communism and preserved Yugoslavia's independence from the Soviet Union for more than 30 years, was being brought to Belgrade today to lie in funeral vices Thursday.

The last surviving founder of the Third World movement of non-aligned countries, Tito died Sunday afternoon in the hospital in Ljubljana, capital of the Slovenian Republic in northwest Yugoslavia, where he had been a patient nearly four months. Born on May 7, 1892, he would have been 88 on

Thousands lined the streets of Ljubljana as Tito's light brown casket, draped in the Yugoslav national flag, was taken to the train station and placed aboard the Presidential "blue train." Then, at the only stop, in Zagreb, second largest city, the coffin was taken off the train so thousands more could pay their final respects.

Tite's two sons were accompanying his body on the train to Belgrade.

The government ordered seven days of national mourning and prepared for an influx of foreign leaders for the state funeral. The body was being brought to Belgrade by special train and was to lie in state in the Federal Parliament building. Burial was to be near the Museum of the Revolution in a Belgrade suburb.

Steven Doronjski, 61, a Serb from the autonomous province of Vojvodina, was expected to become party president.

Nichols back to hospital

Dick Nichols, Democratic candidate in the Howard County Commissioner Pct. 3 run-off, was admitted at Malone-Hogan Hospital 10 p.m. Sunday night with a relapse of the herbicide poisoning that hospitalized him last week

"They're trying to find out if he got in contact with it again or if it was still in his system," said Jeanette Nichols, his wife and 118th district chief adult

probation officer.
"They were kind of expecting this. This is kind of a new ball game for them," she said. The poison could affect Nichols' body for as long as 100

Nichols has had the seeds that were treated with the herbicide for at least three years, said Jeanette, and doesn't remember where he bought

The herbicide is a form of chloride. Jeanette said there were as many as 50 names for it.

Nichols suffered seizures again from the poisoining but they only lasted four hours this time. Jeanette said doctors were able to administer a medicine immediately, having treated the poison before.

today. But in Washington, Defense Department spokesman Lt. Cmdr. Gordon Peterson said there was no such violation and the helicopter was the one abandoned during the failed April 25 mission to rescue 53 Americans from Tehran.

The bodies of servicemen killed in that mission were handed over Archbishop Hilarion Capudji, who was accompanied by Swiss Ambassador Eric Lang and the papal representative in Iran, Monsignor Annibale Bugnini, the radio said.

Capudji said he will fly with the bodies Tuesday to Switzerland where he will turn the remains over to the International Red Cross for transfer to the families in the United States.

An earlier Tehran Radio broadcast said Capudji would deliver the bodies to the Vatican. There was no explanation for the change in plans. However, Capudji, who spent three years in an Israeli jail for running guns to the Palestinians, has not been

authorized to act for the Vatican.

Capudji expressed gratitude to revolutionary leader Ayatollah Ruhollah Khomeini for Iran's 'humanitarianism' in handing over the bodies, according to a London-monitored broadcast. "The return of the bodies is a symbol of the sublime spirit of Islam devoid of the slightest political motivation," he was quoted as saying at a meeting with Khomeini

The Americans were killed April 25

when a helicopter and transport plane involved in the mission collided on the ground 200 miles east of Tehran.

The next day the militants holding 50 of the hostages at the U.S. Embassy in Tehran since Nov. 4 announced they were transferring some of the captives to other cities to foil any other rescue operation that might follow.

In the following week, the militants said they had moved groups of their captives to eight cities, and they added Arak and Mahallat, about 155 miles southwest of Tehran, to the list

However, they said some of the hostages were still held at the embassy, and the Foreign Ministry is still holding three embassy officials who were there when the militants seized the embassy.

Tehran Radio also reported the arrival of a delegation of Libyan oil experts today to discuss production and pricing with Iranian Oil Minister Ali Abar Moinfar.

Bush, Kennedy: Parallel themes

DALLAS (AP) — George Bush and Sen. Edward M. Kennedy, the catchup-candidates, are arguing parallel themes - that the front-runners are likely to prove weak this fall in the big states where White House elections are won and lost.

But while they try to make that case, Ronald Reagan and President Carter are gaining delegates and approaching the point where the taunts of their challengers will be academic.

Bush claimed a "stunning" lift fo. his campaign in an unexpectedly close second-place finish in the Texas presidential primary election on Saturday. But it's late in the game to claim comfort in second place. Moreover, while Bush, an adopted Texan, was making a race of the popular vote, Reagan was running up his delegate count

In the delegate competition, the former California governor won a landslide, 65 nominating votes to 15

Overall, in that primary and five weekend GOP conventions and caucuses, Reagan gained 150 Republican delegates, to run his nationwide total to 639. It will take 998 to win the nomination

Reagan won more delegates over the weekend than Bush has won in the entire campaign, the former United Nations ambassador now has 135

Carter upped his national delegate count to 1,137 of the 1,666 he needs for

renomination. Kennedy has 654. The president won easily in the Texas Democratic primary, but it didn't count. The 152 delegates are being selected in a separate caucusconvention system that began as soon as the primary election was over.

The popular vote could offer a clue to Carter's eventual strength, since a voter had to cast a Democratic ballot in the primary in order to prove party credentials to take part in the caucuses Robert S. Strauss, Carter's national

campaign chairman, said the president would gain enough Texas delegates to be assured of nearly 80 percent of the nominating votes he needs to win. Strauss said that will approach 90

percent after the next set of primaries, in Indiana, North Varolina, Tennessee and the District of Columbia on Saturday Among them, those states will award 223 Democratic delegates.

"Our prospects just aren't very good in those states," conceded Richard C. Drayne, a top aide to Kennedy

In addition, Colorado Democrats hold precinct caucuses tonight to begin the process of assigning 40 nominating votes.

Carter easily overwhelmed Sen. Edward Kennedy, D-Mass. - more than 2-to-1 — in the Democratic popularity contest Saturday.

There was no sign the aborted hostage rescue try affected Carter's predicted win over Kennedy.

On the other hand, there was ample evidence that Bush's last-minute campaign drive almost caught frontrunner Reagan, who was not declared victor until early Sunday.

The latest unofficial results on the presidential preference primary: With 99 percent of the Democratic vote counted, Carter had 766,704 or 56

percent; Kennedy 310,701 or 22 percent and uncommitted 256,240 or 19 percent. California Gov. Edmund G. Brown Jr., who withdrew but still had his name on the ballot got a small With 99 percent of the Republican

vote counted, Reagan had 263,616 or 52 percent; Bush 237,379 or 47 percent and 7,923 or 1 percent uncommitted. Reagan's win in the GOP popularity poll indicated he would get 65 of Texas' 80 delegates to the national

convention and Bush 15. The large uncommitted vote among Democrats puzzled party officials. Some said it was caused by farmers protesting Carter's economic policies, others said some Democratic traditionally vote uncommitted, and others said it was a sign the voters did

not like either candidate

In the statewide races, State Rep. Buddy Temple, D-Diboll, upended Texas Railroad Commission John Poerner of Hondo, who after serving on the important oil and gas regulatory body for two years was seeking a six-year full term. Temple will meet former state Sen. Hank Grover, Houston Republican, in November. Grover was victory in a three-man GOP primary race.

Railroad Commissioner Jim Nugent, Kerrville, survived a strong campaign against him by former magazine editor Jim Hightower, Austin, an avowed consumer advocate. Nugent meets Austin attorney H.J. "Doc" Blanchard, who had no GOP opposition.

The top upset in statehouse circles was the defeat of the dean of the Texas Senate, Sen. Bill Moore, D-Bryan, by former Bryan City Attorney Kent Caperton, who has a GOP opponent in November.

Pre-primary public opinion polls indicate the November battle between Carter and Reagan will be bitter and





Veteran offers a plan which might work

A Campo, Colorado, disabled military veteran proposes a solution to the Iranian hostage problem which the Khomeini people might under-

Alvin Jenkins, who said he is gravely concerned over the 50 Americans who are being held in various cities of Iran, forwarded his plan to President Carter, Jenkins suggested that Carter notify the Iranians that they were being fined \$1 million a day for every day that the hostages were forced to spend in the compound, retroactive to the first day of their captivity.

HOW COULD THE 'U.S. government exact such a fine from a nation that is opening hostile to it? Easy. The American assets of the Iranians, said to total several billion dollars, have been frozen in this country for some

Jenkins also suggests that the Iranians should be informed that if our citizens in bondage are not released, unharmed, by the end of the sixth month of confinement, that an additional \$50 million fine be levied against the Iranian assets. At the end of one year of confinement of the Americans, Jenkins would fine the Iranians an additional \$1 million a day

for each of the 365 days our citizens have been held against their will.

What would Jenkins do with the money, in event there was no break in the stalemate? It could, he says, be donated to the American Cancer Society in the name and honor of those citizens being retained in Iran, providing money to help rid the nation of the dreaded disease.

THE INTEREST FROM the Iranian money being held here, suggests Jenkins, could go to the nation's elderly to help pay their heating bills, which the Iranian crisis helped escalate. The banks holding the loot

do not need the money, according to Jenkins, but the old people do, adding that the banking institutions shoul not be allowed to profit from the suffering of American citizens

Jenkins, who served his country during the Korean War, was one of the founders of the American Agricultural Movement.

His idea for resolving the Iranian crisis is most practical, but it is not likely to be adopted by Mr. Carter or by the government. It's too simple to appeal to treaty makers or to governments. They like to beat their heads against impossible situations, then offer plans that simply will not work.

Mothers have their marvelous way of doing things that only her children can appreciate. But when the kids start comparing notes on their mothers, somehow, the stories always

That's why I have always thought that before a woman can have children, she's required to attend the National School of Motherhood.

The advertisement would probably read, "Learn the proper expressions and actions in order to be a mother your children will never forget.'

I SUPPOSE THE expression, "I walked two miles uphill both ways through the rain and the snow when I was in school" have become a part of the American vocabulary

Then there is the expression, "I'm cold. You put on a sweater." Forget the fact your child is hot, he put on the sweater and fainted in the street. If you're cold, make the kid suffer.

Why not make your kid eat all his vegetables. It serves no real purpose, but again make the kid suffer. It's just something that mothers have always done. You can't change old habits.

But putting your children on a guilt trip, and succeeding, is the real test as to whether you're a success as a

For instance, if your children want spaghetti for dinner, see to it that you make steak. And then put them on a guilt trip when they don't want to eat

Or if one of your children is learning to cook, see to it that you tell him something is going wrong and proceed to take over. The age of the child doesn't matter

My mother never did this to me. I didn't learn how to cook until I was in my 20's and out of the house

And if you're wondering why she never taught me, she tried. But never wanted to be bothered. She tried to put me on a guilt trip because I refused to cook. It never worked

See to it that your child makes his

bed before he goes to school. But see to it that he knows that it is not done properly. After all, you can always find a wrinkle somewhere

Or, after your child moves across the country, blame her for the ex-cessive phone bill and say, "I think you made some long distance phone calls when you were home because

my bill is too high." But I guarantee you, she will not feel guilty when you tell her you weren't even home during the billing period. Right, Mom?

There are other things one can do to be a really effective mother. For instance send your child to the store in your car for a quart of milk. The next day when you use the car, come home "If you're going to use my car, the least you can do is replace the

OR SEND HIM to the store to pick up anything for dinner. When he gets home with fish, ask him why he didn't buy chicken.

When he is young, encourage him to save his money from his lawn mowing jobs so he can buy a new bicycle. When he finally does get it, ask him why he didn't buy - fill in the blank the cheaper one, the smaller, one, or the blue one. Most important, when he then expresses a desire for a stereo, say, "I told you you shouldn't have spent your money on the bicycle. Forget the fact that you did. If you don't say it, you wouldn't be practicing motherhood properly.

When my friends and I were about seven years old, a truck came down a road behind our homes which was dangerous for kids. The truck was holding spinach and quite a bit of it fell out. After the truck was safely down the road, we all ran out and confiscated it for our mothers. When we went home, we were all punished for running out on the road.

My mother's idea was to send me to my room for a few hours.

When I was called out for dinner. guess what was on the table? You guessed it. The spinach.

And for some odd reason, she did not feel guilty when I asked her why I was punished for getting the spinach when she int urn, cooked it for dinner.

I'm not sure if that particular child rearing technique was effective on me. But what it did do, was give me some ending paragraphs for a column I'd write years later because I'd never forget it. I think it backfired on her

DEAR DR. GRAHAM: I was shocked when our 11-year-old boy came home from school the other day and used some foul language. What reasons can we give him for

not doing this? - Mrs. W.E. DEAR MRS. W.E.: I am glad you are concerned about this, and that you want to deal with it frankly with your son. The use of obscene language has become so common today - even in the media - that he may well think it is normal and acceptable. It is important for you to show him that you do not consider it acceptable, and give him reasons for it

One reason such language is wrong is because it clearly blasphemes the person and character of God. In the Bible, the names of God are held in great reverence. (In fact, sincere Jews often would refuse to write the name of God, because they considered it so holy.) The reason for this is that the name is more than a label - it should remind us of all God is. When God's name is used as a swear word, however, it says that the person has a very low view of God. This is why the Bible commands, "You shall not

misuse the name of the Lord your God, for the Lord will not hold anyone guiltless who misuses his name' (Exodus 20:7). The Bible also says: "Do not let any unwholesome talk come out of your mouths, but only what is helpful for building others up according to their needs, that it may benefit those who listen" (Ephesians

Another reason such talk is wrong for your son is probably because of his motives. Why is he doing this? One reason may be because he wants to be 'part of the gang," while another reason could be that he thinks it makes him more adult, or masculine. But you should show him that these are not necessarily good motives, or right conclusions, and he must learn to resist the pressures of those around

Most of all, encourage your son to turn to Christ and allow Him to be Lord of his life. He is reaching a critical time in his life and needs to learn to walk with God everyday so that he can resist the temptations which come his way.


careful with fire. Two incidents that took place Thursday reminded us of how costly our carelessness can be, in some cases to other people.

Secondary causes galore can be adduced to explain the failure of the Iranian rescue effort. But behind that intrinsically risky mission, its poor timing and pathetic consequences, there lies a single massive condition from which everything else derives. That is the anctimonious moralism of Jimmy Carter.

Iran, from the very first, brought out the president's pietistic vanity. Mr. Carter would not sully his hands to save the shah, or foster a military regime. When the avatollah came to power, the president did not acknowledge to himself or the world that there had taken place a shift bound to have catastrophic consequences. On the contrary he deluded himself in the conceit that he and Khomeini, as men of God, could make accommodation.

THE SEIZURE of the hostages on November 4 was quintessentially a political event with international overtones. The ayatollah and those around him initiated the action to save a floundering revolution by transferring blame to foreign villains. The right American reaction would have been to cast the episode in its political and strategic context

In that spirit - as not a few of us said at the time - Carter would have stigmatized the seizure as an illegitimate event irrelevant to any past American behavior and unprecedented even in the malign actions of Stalin, Hitler and Attila the Hun. There would have been no discussion of grievances until the hostages were released. The U.S. would have reserved the right to take any kind of including retaliatory action military action

Carter, instead, made the hostages a test of personality and morality. He iterated and reiterated his deep concern over their fate. He declared publicly he would take no action to eopardize their lives. He received half a dozen who had been released under ambiguous circumstances as if they were conquering heroes

He entered into negotiations for release of the rest. He asked the country to burn candles for them at Christmas. He refused to participate in the presidential campaign until the hostages had been released. In short, he made the 50 hostages the top American priority in the world - the be-all and end-all of national and international politics.

Once aware of Carter's willingness to negotiate under duress, the Iranian leaders did the obvious. They made the president the plaything of their politics. They kept holding out hopes for release in return for concessions. Each time Washington gave, Tehran upped the price. Repeatedly Carter was made to look impotent. Repeatedly he felt obliged to take actions that showed strength. In the nature of things, those actions could

Thus there was the freezing of Iran's assets in this country - a step with adverse consequences still to come. There was the overreaction to the Soviet invasion of Afghanistan with threats of punishment that cannot be delivered. There was the start and stop and start again of moves for allied sanctions against Iran which now look so foolish

The rescue operation was conceived in the same halfhearted, second-best spirit. It was delayed for months while Jimmy Carter tried his hand with the ayatollah. Had it been carried out earlier - in January, say - it would have appeared a normal response to an act of international terror

Dear Dr. Donohue ! have been told I have cardiovasculai disease. My doctor is vague about this and I just don't understand what is going on. It seems it is a degenerative disease. Is this so? I would like to know if I can live a long time or if my life can be shortened by it. I feel good, except the worry is driving me crazy I'm 51

Mr F B Cardiovascular disease is the lead ing disease of our society, a fact which is probably of no comfort whatever to you, F.B. But at least I'll try to ex-

plain it for you. The problem stems from changes in blood vessels, particularly of arteries. That is the "vascular" part of cardiovascular disease. The walls of the arteries become coated with deposits of fat. As the deposits grow, blood flows slows to a trickle. Organs served by clogged arteries get little blood. When the arteries to the heart are affected the heart muscle does not get enough blood. That's the "cardio" part of the problem. The basic

problem, though, lies with the vessels There is almost no person middle aged or older who is spared some amount of this. If that is what you mean by degenerative disease — a change from a healthy state to a less healthy one with age - then cardiovascular disease is a degenerative condition

It may not be possible to dissolve the fat deposits in the arteries, but much can be done to reduce further risks. Keeping weight at normal levels, reducing cholesterol and other animal fats in the diet, quitting cigarettes and getting whatever exercise your health allows all help.

No one can predict life-span except in a very general way. If I could the insurance companies would be beating a path to my door. As long as you are not having symptoms, such as pain on exertion, etc. you should be able to live out your three score 10 (or more) — if — if you get your preventive act together.

They deplore the lack of professionalism in Carter's exercise of diplomacy. As Hutson put it, "we have a bunch of amateurs running foreign policy." Here are just a few cases in

The Israeli-Egyptian pact was a stunning blow to America's Arab allies. Whom did the president send to explain it to them? His son, Chip Carter, accompanied by national security advisor Zbigniew Brzezinski. Jordan's King Hussein invited Brzezinski to a luncheon, but dispatched Chip to eat with the children. In Saudi Arabia, the sophisticated Saudis included Chip at the meals, but excluded him from important discussions. Said one source gravely: "I do not send my child to

Du-Pont further states that marijuana is a powerful drug that influences the entire body. Marijuana, he says, stays in the body for over a week from a single dose and that if a person is only smoking marijuana once a week, his body would be continuously exposed to the major ingredient tetrahydrocannabinol

Furthermore DuPont states that there is laboratory evidence to show that marijuana is more likely to cause cancerlike lesions than in cigarette (also bad for your health) smoke.

Everything doesn't cause cancer

Caution: Everything does NOT cause

That message comes from the Public Health Service of the Department of Health, Education and Welfare — the same agency that frequently warns people about the things that DO cause cancer.

It is designed to ease some of the fears that people feel when they read and hear almost daily reports of cancer-causing agents in the food they eat, the air they breathe and the places they work.

"One of every four Americans can expect to get cancer." says the Public Health Service "But the outlook is not hopeless.

To get its message across, the health service has prepared a 14-page booklet, "Everything Doesn't Cause Cancer." It's available, at no charge, from Dept. 650H at years and 40 years. Cancers of the liver,

the Consumer Information Center, Pueblo,

The booklet provides questions and answers about cancer and what causes it. Here are some highlights:

Q. What causes cancer? A. "Most human cancers are probably caused in part by environmental factors," the health service says. Cancer-causing agents - also called carcinogens - include natural and man-made chemicals, X-rays, sunlight and certain viruses. Most chemicals, however, are not carcinogenic,

Q. How long does it take for cancer to develop once someone has been exposed to a

according to the government experts.

A. It usually takes somewhere between 5

lung or gall bladder which are caused by exposure to vinyl chloride, asbestos or benzidine may not show up for 30 years. Q. How do scientists decide which sub-

stances are dangerous? A. The most common way is to test

potential carcinogens on laboratory animals, mainly mice and rats. Because the rodents have a short natural lifetime, cancers show up relatively quickly.

Q. Just because something causes cancer in mice, does that mean it is bad for people? A. Probably. There are about 30 substances known to cause cancer in humans; almost all of them cause cancer in laboratory animals as well. There are several hundred other chemicals that are under suspicion — we know that they cause cancer in animals; we are less sure about what happens to people. "Nevertheless.

O. The test animals usually are given large doses of the suspected carcinogens. People are exposed to much smaller amounts. Doesn't that mean the tests are

A. No. Millions of people may be exposed to low doses of a possible cancer-causing agent. But scientists can't test millions of mice to see what effect a low dose of a particular substance would have. The high doses simply mean that any potential cancer-causing effects are much more likely to be detected in small groups of rodents because the cancer rate is sharply



ATLANTIC CITY, N.J. (AP) — West Virginia did it to Virginia. Maine did it to Massachusetts. Would South

Jersey secede from New Jersey to become the 51st state. Low rumblings in New Jersey's southland threaten, only half jokingly, to tear the state apart at its waist. And the more some South Jerseyans talk about it, the more serious they get.

"Sure we can do it. We have the smarts," said Albert Freeman, 66, a retired Mount Holly newspaper publisher who leads the rebel cause as self-proclaimed "provisional governor of South Jersey.'

"There's nothing smarter than a dumb farmer," Freeman said. "And that's North Jersey's opinion of us, that we're a bunch of yokels.'

Seaside Heights Mayor George Tompkins has been trying for years to unite South Jersey mayors on

"I'm very serious about it," Tompkins said. "Oh, it started off as a joke after a couple of things came down the pike from Trenton I didn't like. After a while, though, I talked to a number of mayors about it and they liked the

From Bordentown to Cape May, the rebels' cry is the same: too much South Jersey tax money goes to North Jersey in return for too much control by Trenton read 'North Jersey' bureaucrats.

'They're carpetbaggers," said Freeman. "They come down here just the way northerners went to the South right after the Civil War. The problem is largely one of image.

To most northerners, South Jersey is a weekend at the beach, a sail on the bay, a drive through the Pine Barrens and roadside vegetable stands run by country folk.

To many southerners, North Jersey is a metropolitan blur of Newark, Jersey City, Paterson and Rahway. It seems all state funding goes to Meadowlands Stadium, where the New York Giants play football and harness horses race, to Rutgers in New Brunswick, considered New Jersey's state university, and to webs of jammed North Jersey highways.

"I think we take the brunt of the taxation and we don't get anything for it," said Tompkins. "The state spends all its money on the cities of North Jersey. Eventually, South Jersey will be a giant park for the people of North Jer-

Freeman said state staffs and agencies are stacked with North Jerseyans from such alien-sounding places as

Hackensack, Hoboken and Ho-Ho-Kus. Gov. Brendan Byrne's staff is 20-1 North Jerseyans, according to Freeman. All seven Supreme Court justices are North Jerseyans, and the state Board of Education is stacked 21-4, Freeman said.

These city slickers, Tompkins said, control South Jersey's beaches, bays, farms and pinelands through a network of agencies created by, of course, a hostile Legisluture run by North Jersey politicians.

Freeman proposes that South Jersey's eight counties secede along the northern borders of Ocean and Burlington counties, freeing more than 1.8 million South Jerseyans from Trenton's grasp, leaving 5.4 million in North Jersey.

"There's a natural barrier. Monmouth and Mercer counties are both New York-oriented. We're more Philadelphia-oriented. We're an entity and we're a viable entity," Freeman said. "We have everything we need to sustain ourselves.

Camden would be the capital of the new state. But doubters exist even among South Jersey's biggest

Paul Merkoski of The Atlantic City Press once wrote sarcastically that the capital should be not at Camden but at Ancora, site of a state psychiatric hospital. Vineland Mayor Patrick Fiorilli, who has battled

Trenton often, says secession is out of the question. "Vineland is 19 miles south of the Mason-Dixon line. If we wanted to secede, we would have done it in the 1800s," Fiorilli said. "We've been neglected, but we think New Jersey's a great state and we're getting a little recognition now.

Freeman launched his campaign in January 1976 with an off-the-cuff editorial in the Burlington County Herald. To foster the idea, he has handed out more than 4,200 certificates of South Jersey citizenship. Tompkins has written to Maine and West Virginia of-

ficials to ask how their states did it in the 1800s. It all sounds like fun - until talk turns serious about

U.S. closes visa office to Cubans

Intolerable and danaerous situation

WASHINGTON (AP) — Citing what it calls an intolerable and dangerous situation." the nited States is closing its visa office in Cuba ifter Friday's melee, which has left 380 Cubans stranded inside the U.S. diplomatic mission

The decision Sunday will cut off legal immigration to the United States from Cuba but will not affect the illegal sealift operation that has brought more than 12,600 Cubans to Florida from the port city of Mariel since mid-April, U.S. officials said.

In Friday's brawl, American diplomats in Havana said, busloads of security agents attacked a large group of Cubans, mostly former political prisoners, who had gathered at the U.S.

Interests Section in the one-time American Embassy to seek visas. Fifteen people were injured, five seriously.

Under U.S. guidelines for immigration from Cuba, former political prisoners are given preferential treatment. But the group that massed at the interests section Friday, which included 250 former prisoners, has complained about long delays in the processing of their visa applications

State Department spokeswoman Anita Stockman reiterated Sunday the U.S. position that the Cuban government was responsible for the

Granma, a Cuban government newpaper, said Saturday this allegation was a "cynical lie." It

added that Friday's large gathering in front of the interests section was "evidently organized" by the United States and was therefore a "new

In explaining the U.S. decision to close the visa office in Havana, Ms. Stockman said the present situation, with its lack of security or protection for people who have legitimate business with us is intolerable and dangerous.

'The United States cannot continue to operate these programs without the guarantees and cooperation of Cuban authorities." Diplomatic functions not related to the issuing of visas will continue, she said

Pope expresses sorrow THE CLOTHING PARLOR over nine African deaths

BRAZZAVILLE, Congo Republic (AP) - opened at dawn and the huge crowd rushed Pope John Paul II today expressed sorrow forward. Brazzaville "I have no doubt that the authorities will continue to give you genuine freedom of religion, as well as the possibility to work as good citizens for the development of your country," the homily said.

The pontiff arrived here to a joyous welcome from Congolese Catholics and the tolling bells of the Sacre Coeur Cathedral. After a five-hour stop in the Congo, the

pope was flying back to Zaire for an over-night stay in Kisangani, the chief city in northern Zaire.

The Congo, a former French colony now run by a military regime, has an estimated 600,000 Roman Catholics among its population of 15 million. In March 1977 the archbishop of Brazzaville, Cardinal Emile Biayenda, was murdered, apparently by relatives of President Marien Ngovabi, who was killed in a coup a few days earlier. But the Vatican says church-state relations have improved considerably since then.

In Kinshasa, Zaire's capital, the fatalities occurred Sunday when the iron gates to the plaza in front of the People's Palace were

"People just swept in," trampling others underfoot, said Sister Gertrude Kosecka, a Polish missionary in Zaire for 40 years who was caught in the crush and suffered chest The pope was not told of the deaths until

Seated on an ebony throne about 50 feet fromPresident Mobutu Sese Seko, Zaire's authoritarian leader, John Paul urged the new bishops to speak out on the "ethical aspects of society each time that the fundamental rights and liberties of people and the common good demand it." There was no visible reaction from Mobutu.

The crowd roared in approval when the pope shifted from English and French to give greetings in four local dialects: Lingala, Swahili, Tshiluba and Kikongo.

Since his arrival in Zaire last Friday at the start of a six-nation tour, the Polish-born pope has been met with an overwhelmingly enthusiastic reception. His bodyguards have had a hard time containing the crowds, which blocked his path during a visit Saturday to a lepers' hospital on the banks of the Congo River.

John Paul, making the second visit to Africa by a pope, moves on to Kenya Tuesday and then to Ghana, Upper Volta and the Ivory Coast. The Vatican estimates there are 53 million Roman Catholics among the 440 million people of Africa.
