## Friona Certified As "TEXCEL" City

Friona is one of 12 cities in the state of Texas which will be certified as a "TEXCEL" city, under the Texas Cities for Economic Leadership program.

The Friona Chamber of Commerce submitted an application in January of 1986, and has participated in a 16-month program which culminated in its success this week.

Of the cities which made application to participate in

TEXCEL, 38 started in the program statewide, with only 12 to be certified as "TEXCEL cities."

Other cities in the Panhandle who took part in the program were Pampa, Tulia, Childress, Hereford and Canadian.

Bill Stovell, past president of the Chamber, and Kathy Beard, Chamber manager, will travel to Killeen next Thursday to receive Friona's certificate as an official "TEXCEL city."

The TEXCEL program was sponsored by the Texas Economic Development Commission.

Representatives from the Chamber and City of Friona have attended both regional and state training sessions, which tutored the local officials in such areas as prospecting for new jobs; expanding their local base, financing and putting financing together.

The Chamber of Commerce compiled an assessment of the city's needs by meeting with community representatives and planning the overall strategy.

The City of Friona paid the travel expenses involved with the program.

During the past month, the Chamber received a "dummy" questionnaire from the TEDC, listing a "potential industry" which might be courted for location locally.

Kathy Beard and her Chamber/City workers had five days to respond to the questionnaire, and were asked to provide information dealing with such matters as utilities, availability of certain elements, potential site, etc.

Mrs. Beard worked up a four-page response, as well as a comprehensive tabulation that listed facts on what the local area had to offer the proposed industry.

Then on Tuesday of this week the local TEXCEL committee hosted a representative of the TEDC, who posed as the personal representative of the industry seeking a new location.

From the time the group met the official at the airport in Amarillo, they were graded as to their presentation. The group provided a meal for the visitor, who confronted the local officials with a barrage of questions.

The questions dealt not only with what services the city had to offer, what sort of SAT test results students in the local school have had, but also dealing with problems dealing with the industry's "expansion."

The group took the visitor to a potential site, and answered questions pertaining to its qualifications.

"It was a very thorough grilling," stated Mrs. Beard.

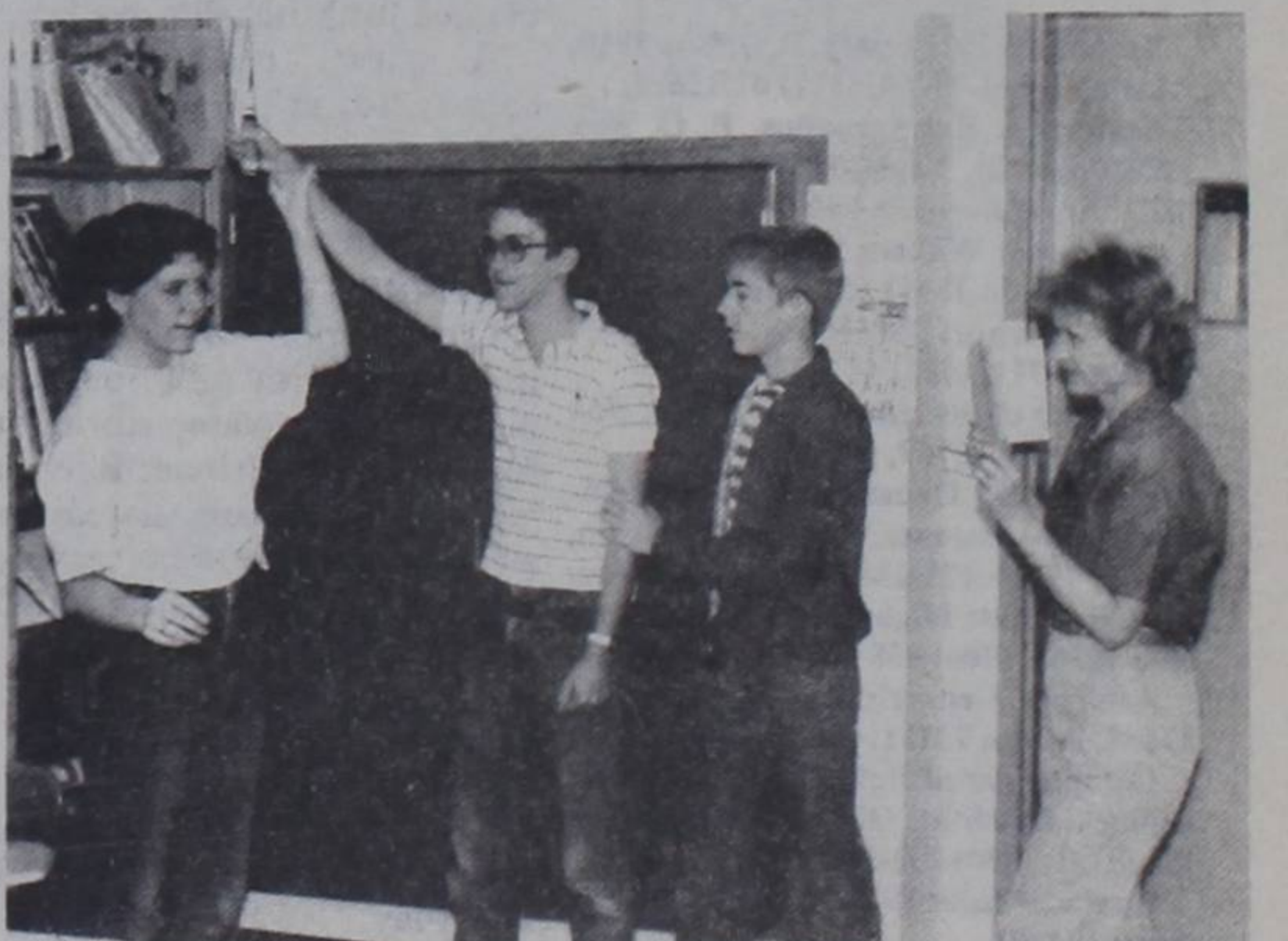
The new teacher comes well prepared for her new assignment.

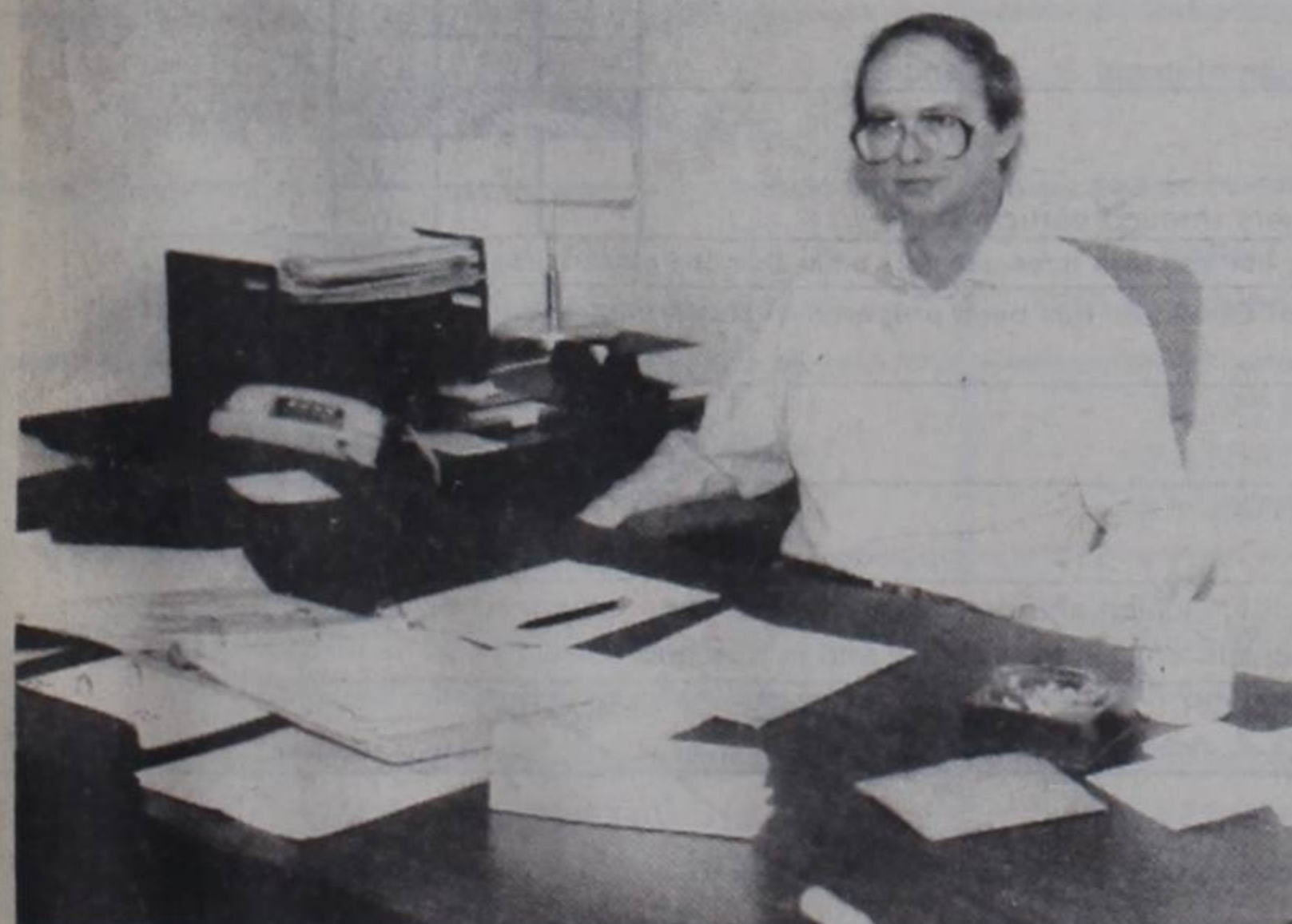
in school, played by Charlie Snead.

**55 YEARS AGO--APRIL 8, 1932**  
The 1932 Friona school election passed off Saturday very quietly and resulted in the election of David Mosley, F.W. Reeve and J.B. McFarland.

Friona's third city election passed into history Tuesday evening, when the election forces had finished the count and declared the results. M.A. Crum was elected mayor. Other candidates were F.W. Reeve and S. Mitchell. F.L. Spring and E.V. Rushing were elected board members. Other candidates for board members were D.H. Meade, E.B. McLellan and L.R. Dilger.

**45 YEARS AGO--APRIL 3, 1942**  
Residents of Friona and surrounding territory will be privileged to take the Red Cross First Aid course, according to announcements today. The course, as in many other communities, will be taught by State Highway Patrolmen and will feature two classes each week.

On Thursday, the Chamber of Commerce received a call from the TEDC telling them that Friona would be a certified TEXCEL city, which was appropriate reward for the 16 months of work on the project.

"This at least gives us a 'foot in the door' where industrial expansion is concerned. Austin is now aware of us," Mrs. Beard said, after the conclusion of the leadership program.

As an example of what the TEXCEL program could mean to Friona, it was explained that when companies call the TEDC for information as to possible sites for expansion within the state of Texas, that organization will be well versed on what Friona has to offer.

The TEDC will be expected to review all of the qualifications of its TEXCEL members, and recommend one or more that might fit the criteria of the business in question.

Friona is one of only a few cities under 5,000 which took part in the program, and made it through to TEXCEL certification.

Also, it was important that the Austin-based TEDC was made aware of the Panhandle area, Ms. Beard said. "I think they have been surprised at what is available in this part of the state," she stated.

Ms. Beard and City Manager Beelee Goodwin have been the key officials who have participated in the training sessions.

Others who have served on the TEXCEL program have included Bill Stovell, Pat Fleming, David Barnett, Harry Hutcheson, Bill Wilshire, Wesley Barnett, Robert Neelley, Ron Davenport, Ab Hendley and Tom Jarboe.

**30 YEARS AGO--APRIL 4, 1957**  
One man received serious injuries and another one was less seriously hurt in a well drilling accident on the Leonard Haws farm east of town Monday afternoon. At the time of the accident the drill stem was being lifted up so that a joint of pipe could be put into the hole. Sonny Weaks became pinned beneath the drill stem and called to Waymon Wilkins to get him out. In trying to free Weaks, Wilkins became entangled in the cat line and was twisted in the rope by both his feet and arms. Upon hearing the confusion Bill Bandy ran to turn off the motor. Weaks suffered a gash in his head. He was treated at Parmer County Community Hospital and released. Wilkins was moved to Northwest Texas Hospital in Amarillo.

**25 YEARS AGO--APRIL 5, 1962**  
Plaques were presented to Friona's outstanding citizens at the Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture annual banquet Friday. Mrs. Arvella England was chosen most courteous employee; Miss Jo Phillips, teacher of the year; George Jones, man of the year; and Mrs. Rose Lange, woman of the year.

Voting was very light in the city election Tuesday. Of the estimated 490 qualified voters in the city, 76 cast ballots. Raymond Fleming was re-elected mayor for another term and Glenn Reeve and Ralph Taylor gained alderman positions.

**20 YEARS AGO--MARCH 30, 1967**  
David White, sixth grade student at Friona Junior High School, won the Parmer County junior spelling bee held at Bovina last week. David, the son of Mr. and Mrs. N.C. White, Jr. of Route 1, Friona, won the bee over some 14 other spellers from throughout the county.

**15 YEARS AGO--APRIL 6, 1972**  
Friona voters turned out in near-record numbers, in spite of the Easter weekend, to give their okay to two \$50,000 bond issues last Saturday on the annual city election ballot. Voters also returned incumbent aldermen Gary Brown and Bill Ellis to the City Council. Mayor R.L. Fleming, unopposed on the ballot, was re-elected. The new fire station issue (Proposition 1) passed by approximately a 3-1 margin, getting 306 favorable votes, to 119 opposed. The \$50,000 waterworks issue (Proposition 2) passed by a larger margin of approximately 6-1, with 366 favorable votes to only 60 votes against.

**10 YEARS AGO--APRIL 10, 1977**  
Lonnie Mitchell, 55, died in a rural house fire early Wednesday morning, and his wife Norma was treated for minor burns at Parmer County Community Hospital. Mitchell was discovered in an inside room, lying just inside a doorway. Smoke inhalation was blamed for Mitchell's death.

## V. Coffey's Rites Held In Melrose

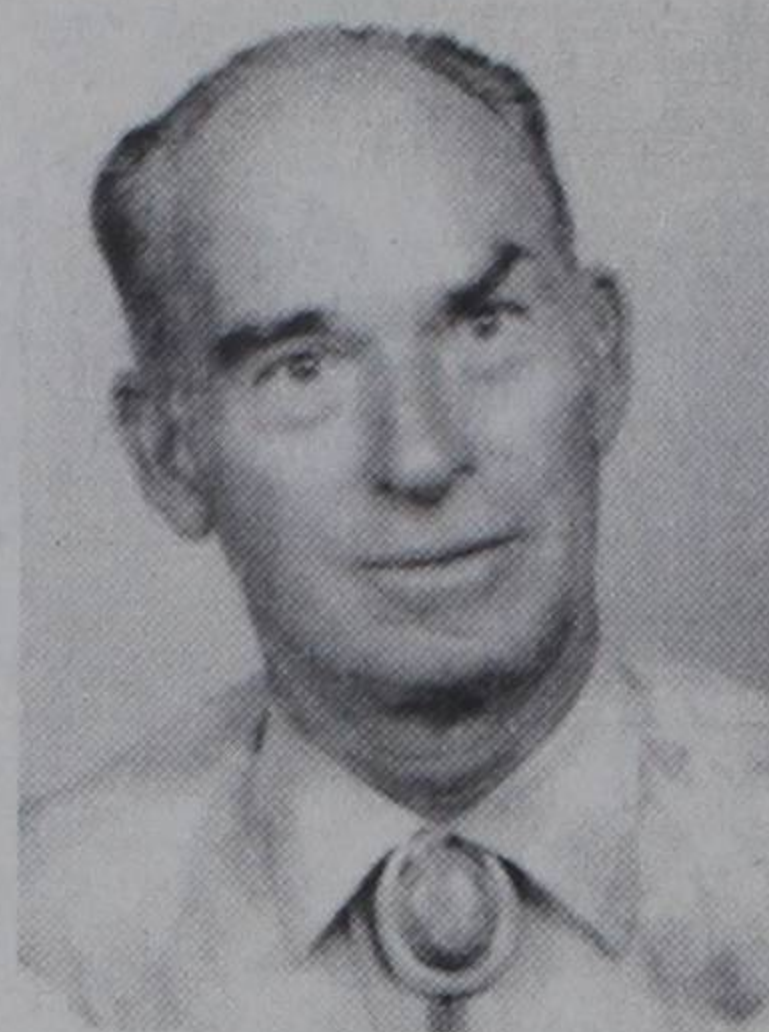

# Olton Meeting Will Discuss Waste Dump

The public is invited to attend a meeting in the Olton High Auditorium at 7:30 p.m. on Monday, April 27 to hear a discussion about the nuclear waste issue and the Texas Panhandle. The meeting is sponsored by the Olton Chamber of Commerce and the First United Methodist Church.

Speakers will include Delbert Devin, president of the Dimmitt-based Nuclear Waste Task Force, and Dr. Gary Keith, director of the Texas Department of Agriculture's Nuclear Waste Studies Project.

"Things are really heating up

over the Deaf Smith nuclear waste issue here in the Panhandle, in Austin, and in Washington," said Devin, "and it's much better that we have these kinds of heated public discussions now, than have to deal with the heat and radioactivity of nuclear waste for generations to come."

Devin is a family farmer in Swisher County. He has taught animal science at Texas Tech and is active in the Methodist Church. He helped found STAND (Serious Texans Against Nuclear Dumping), the Nuclear Waste Task Force, and the new National Nuclear Waste Task Force. Devin has attended citizen meetings on nuclear waste issues in Nevada, Washington, D.C., Minnesota, Massachusetts, and even Canada. And he has testified before Congress and the U.S. Department of Energy.

Dr. Keith was appointed by Agriculture Commissioner Jim Hightower to direct the Texas Department of Agriculture's studies of the potential impacts of nuclear waste on the agricultural economy and Panhandle communities. Keith is a public policy analyst with a Ph.D. in political science from Brandeis University.

He has previously worked for the House Study Group of the Texas Legislature and has taught at the University of Texas and other colleges. TDA has conducted

a series of surveys of Panhandle residents and businesses which have shown overwhelming opposition to placing nuclear waste in the Panhandle.

"We need to be talking about nuclear waste to people who live 100 miles from Deaf Smith County and people who live 500 miles away," Keith said. "It has now been one year since the devastating accident at the nuclear power plant in Chernobyl. It's been only a few weeks since farmers and ranchers in South Texas managed to stall the transfer of a uranium disposal site license."

We're only a couple of years away from the transportation of nuclear waste, possibly through the Lubbock area, to the Waste Isolation Pilot Project (WIPP) site in New Mexico. It's important that all of us become aware of the issues that nuclear accidents, nuclear waste, and nuclear waste transportation raise for our communities.

And, if we're successful in getting people involved in the Deaf Smith issue now, maybe, we can stop the dump from even coming into the center of our agricultural base."

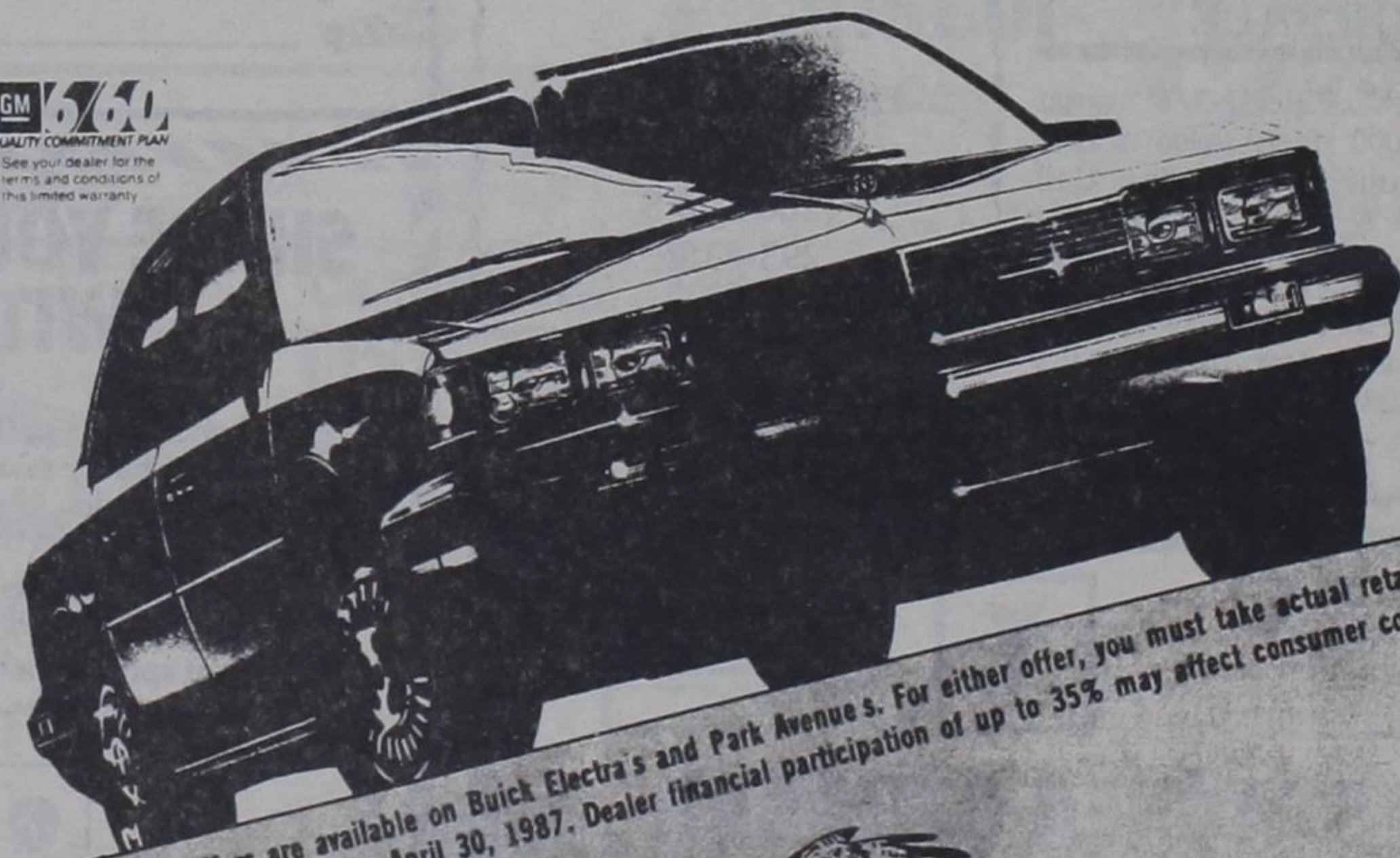

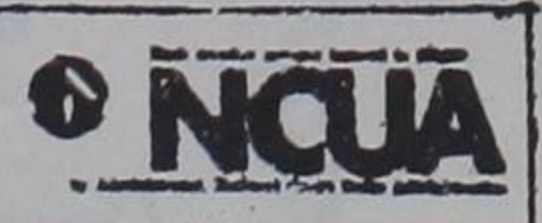

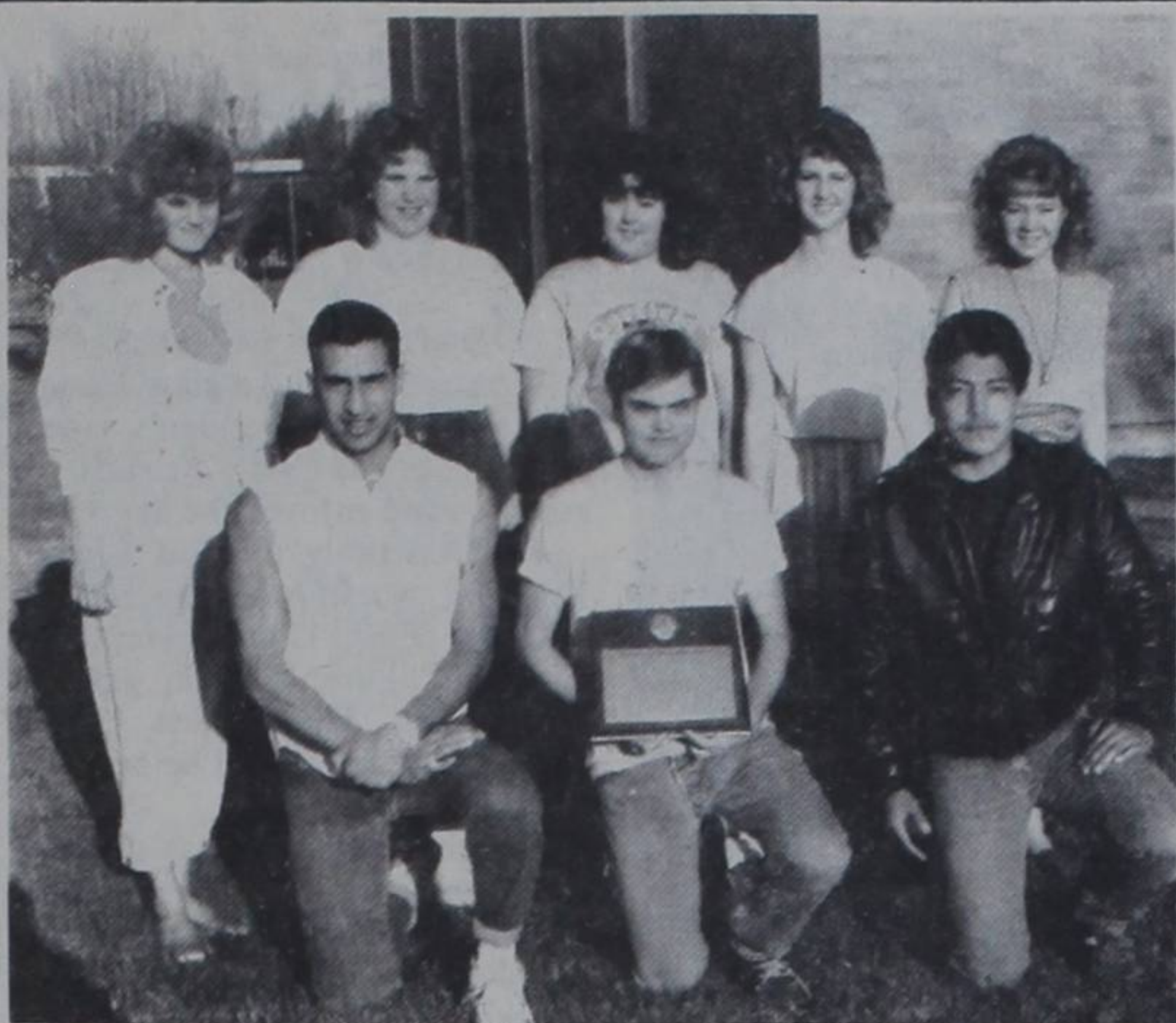

Burial will be in the Olton Cemetery under the direction of Foskey-Flemins Funeral Home of Olton.

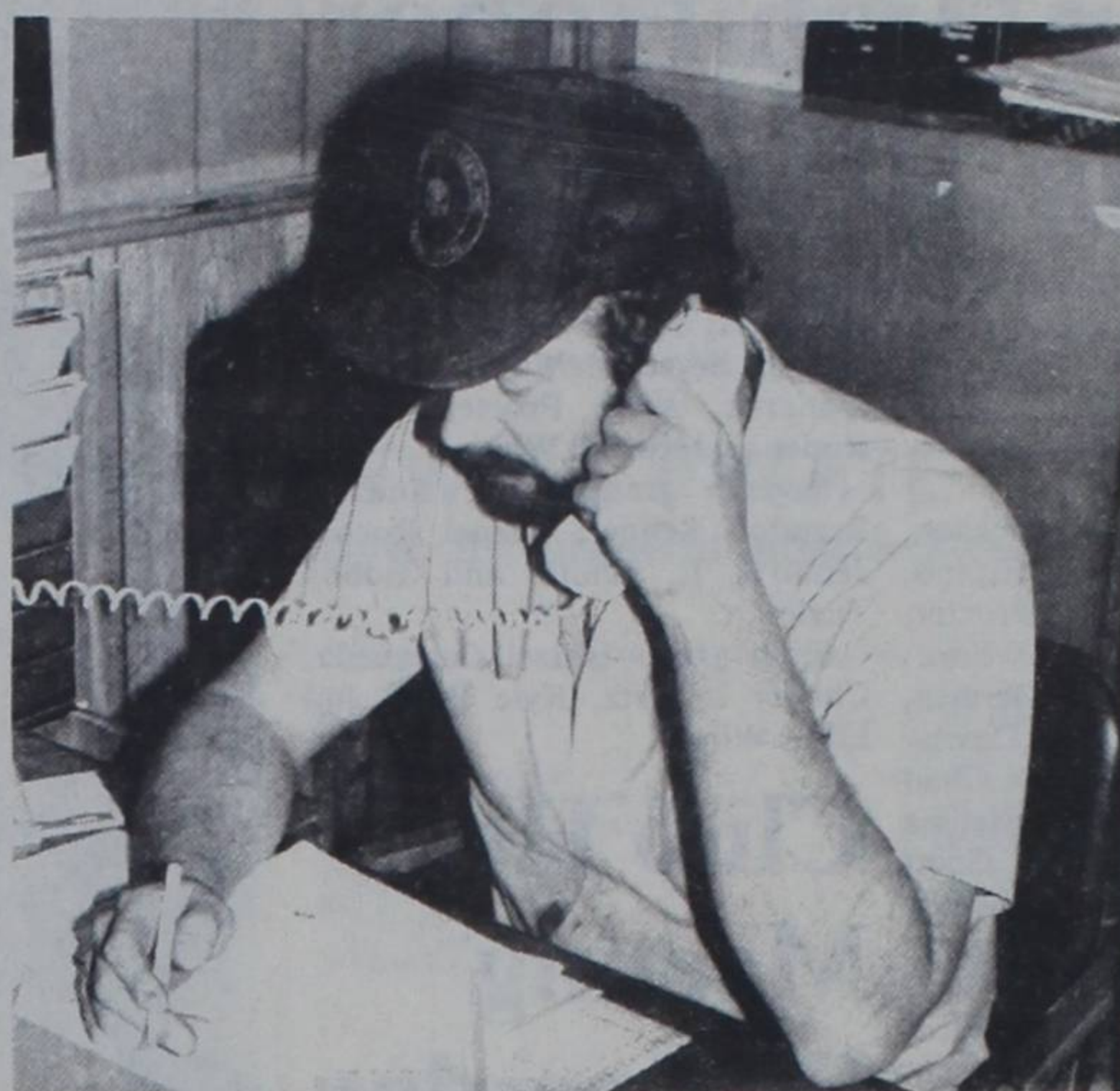

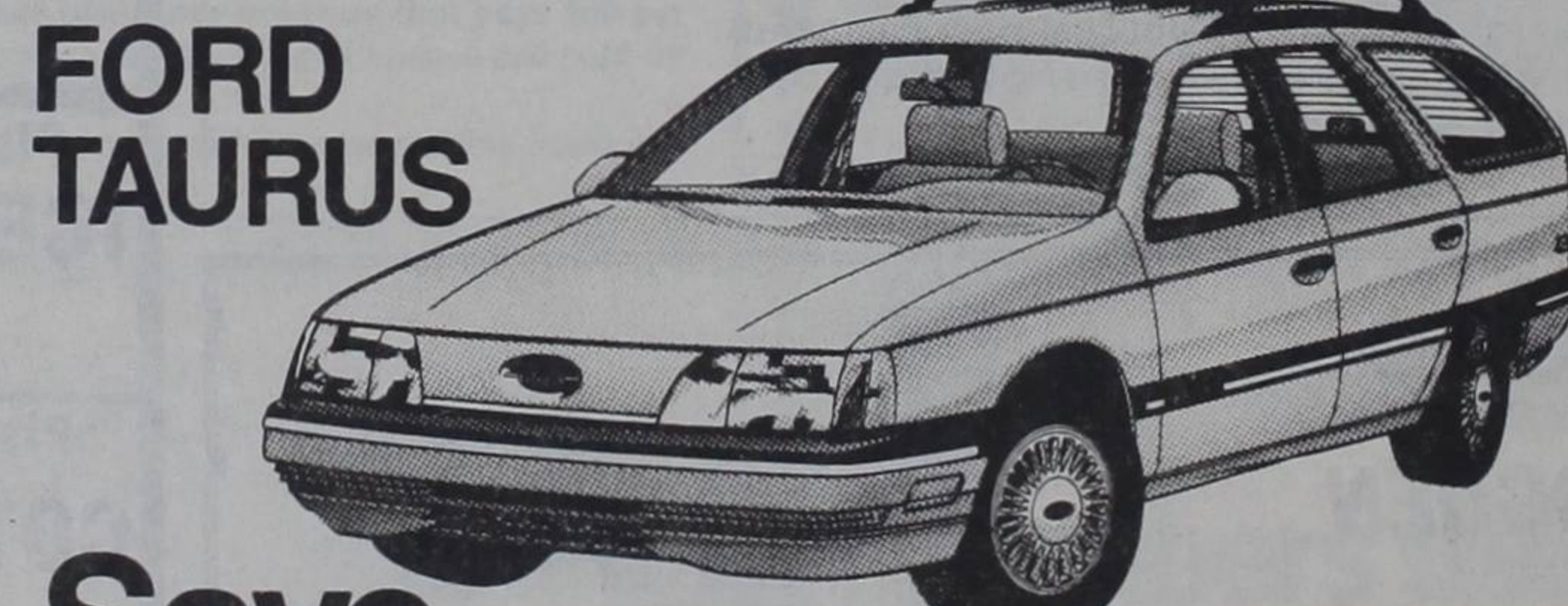

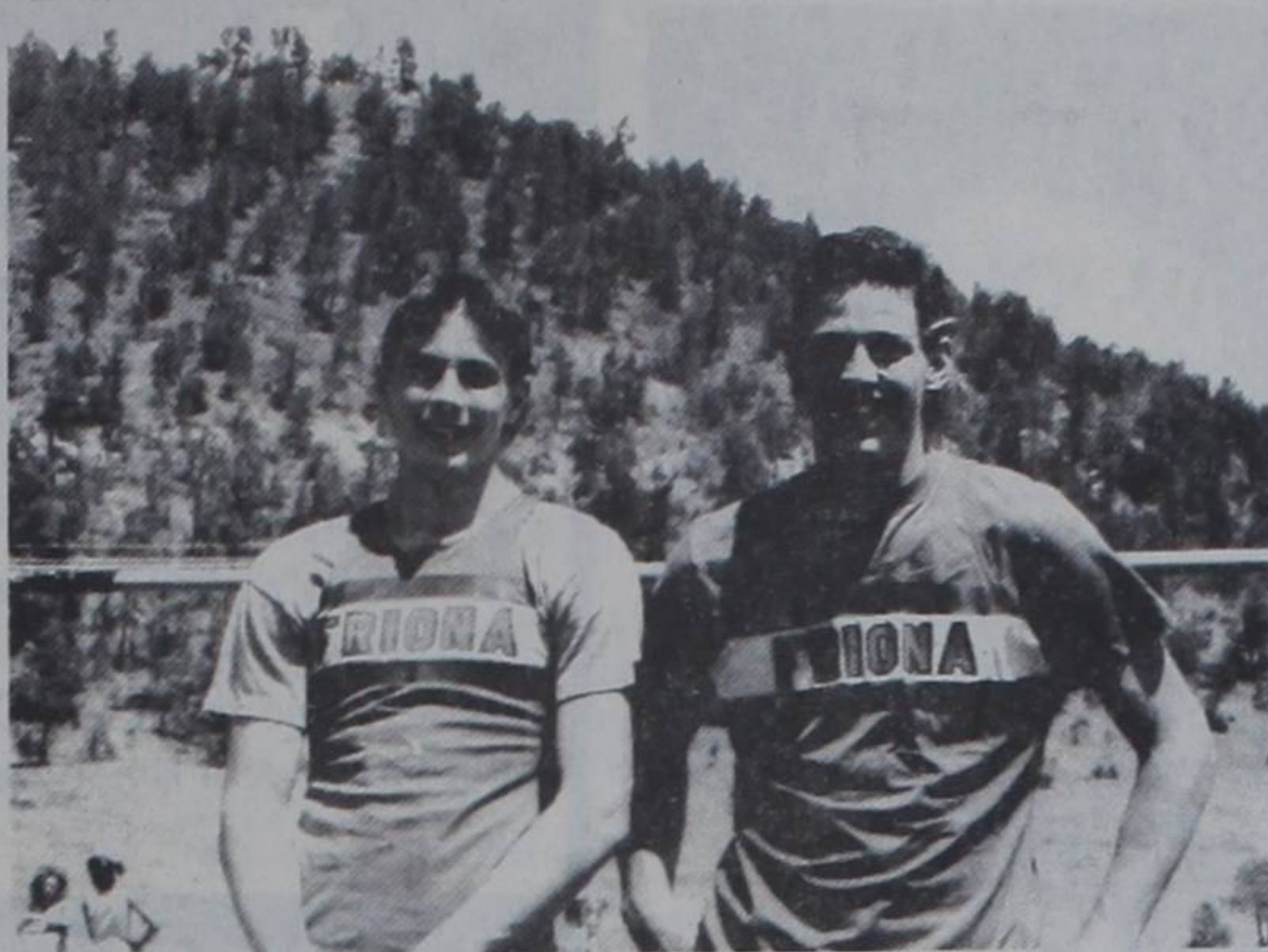
"I felt real good. But I couldn't get my steps down when I tried for 15-6," said Britting.

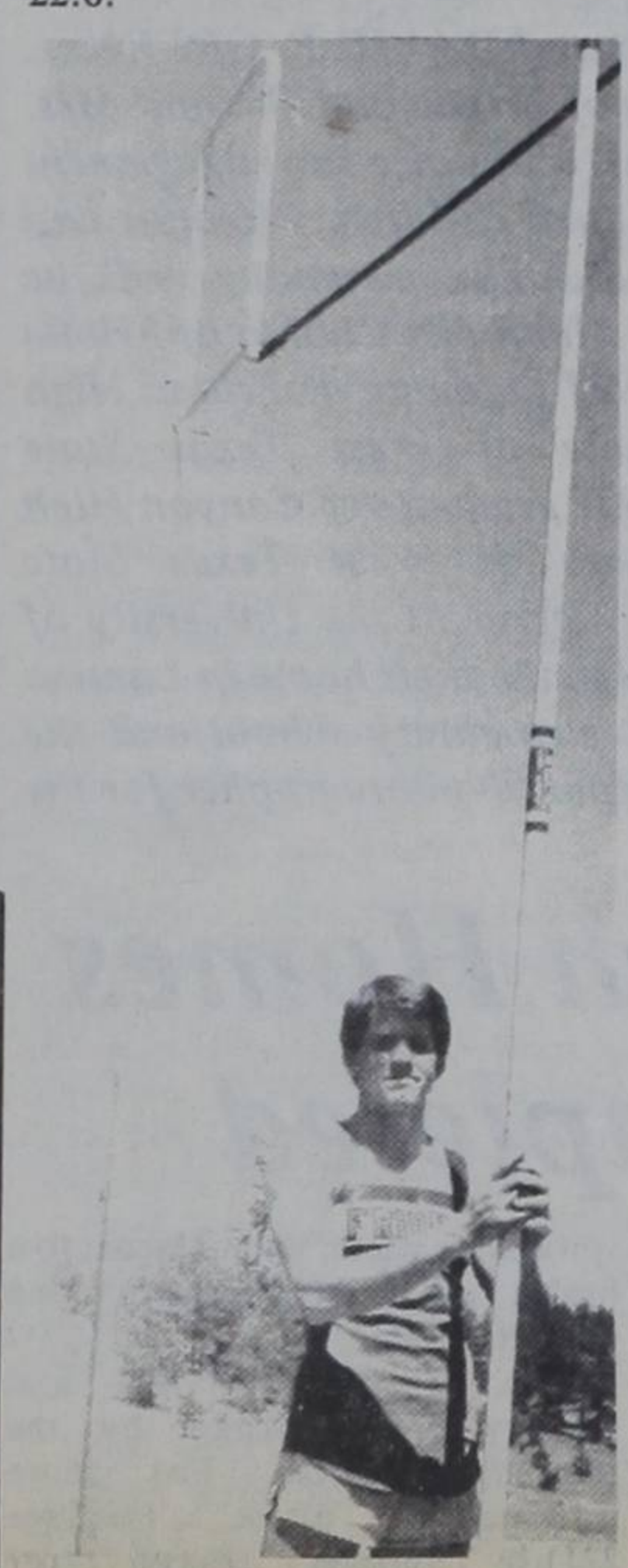
