Volcanic ash drifts over three states

Abrasive volcanic ash coughed up by Mount St. Helens drifted over three states today following a volcanic eruption that killed at least five people, left 21 missing, and forced thousands to flee a mile-wide wall of steaming mud.

The ash - which prompted health warnings - fell half an inch deep on the ground up to 500 miles away following Sunday's convulsion that turned day into night in much of eastern Washington, Idaho and western Montana.

A plume of steam and ash was still billowing 14,000 feet high from a crater a half-mile wide today, but

fuming rivers of mud and gas which roared down the flanks of the peak earlier. There were no sightings of lava flows during the eruption.

Both the Cowlitz the Toutle rivers were dropping after being swollen Sunday by the mudflows.

"It's still perking, but it is not as violent," said Sam Frear, a spokesman for the Forest Service said. "We hope we've seen the worst." Rescue helicopters planned to take to the air to search for the 21 people still missing. The Red Cross estimates between 2,500 and 3,000 persons have

been evacuated. The explosion early Sunday once pristine and snow-covered 9,677foot peak, which until March had been quiet since 1857.

"It looks like the aftermath of an atomic explosion," said Dwight E. Reber, a pilot for Columbia Helicopters Inc. of Aurora, Ore.

Politics denied Owusu shot at meda

He did not even get to compete. The 1976 Montreal Games was Joshua Owusu's best opportunity to capture an Olympic medal, Josh's former track coach, Bill Lane, said.

"He would have won in '76," said Lane, who coached Josh at Angelo State University. "That was his year to win. He could wake up in the middle of the night and jump 25 feet for you.'

Unfortunately for Josh, a transplanted Big Spring resident from Ghana, the decision of African politicians prevented him from his quest for an Olympic medal.

'I was ready for 1976," Josh said. "By the end of June 1976, I had the second best jump of those competing in Montreal." Josh had jumped earlier in the year 26-feet, 103/4-inches. He was listed by Sports Illustrated as a top contender for the gold medal in the long jump.

Shortly before the opening of the Games on July 18, 1976, 30 countries, mostly African, withdrew from Montreal. One of these countries was Ghana.

In the Summer of 1976, a New Zealand rugby team visited white-ruled South Africa. The Supreme African Sports Council charged the visit by the team was unofficially blessed by the Wellington govern-

The sports council demanded that either Wellington send its Olympic team home or the International Olympic committee expel New Zealand. Neither happened.

A fourth of the 119 participating nations left Montreal. A total of 600 of the 8,340 competing athletes were involved. One of these was Josh.

"At first I was bitter," Josh commented. "When I heard about the boycott, I told my coach I was going to jump for another country. I just wanted to get into the Olympics. I spent too much time for it not to

"He could wake up in the middle of the night and jump 25 feet for you."

Josh added, "After I lost in '72 (Munich), I worked terribly hard to get back into shape for this one. The Olympics is the climax of all athletics

In 1972, Josh had competed in the Munich Olympics. There in a the Pre-Olympic Meet in Post Stadium he had the best mark of those competing in the long jump event.

In the finals, though, Josh finished fourth with a jump of 26-feet, 31/2inches. The mark was 3/4 of an inch short of a bronze medal. The mark was also 2 and %-inches short of his pre-Olympic mark

"I didn't know all the details of the walkout," Josh said. "After I found out about the issues and what efforts

were made to solve the problems, I could sympathize with my country's

In 1973 and 1974, Josh had blitzed the amateur track and field circuits.

"By the end of June 1976, I had the second best jump of those competing in Montreal."

Josh won in 1973 the triple and long jumps in both the All-African Games and the British Commonwealth Games. This year, he also defeated 1972 Olympic gold medalist Randy Williams in the Astrodome Federation Indoor Meet in Houston.

In 1974, Josh took first in four events in the Lone Star Conference Meet. He won the long jump with a leap of 25feet, 51/2-inches. He captured the triple jump and the 440-yard dash. He ran a leg on the winning 440-yard relay.

At the 1974 National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics Meet. Josh set a new record in the long jump. springing 25-feet, 81/4-inches. His record setting feat was his fifth national title in four years of competition for the little state school in San Angelo. Three of his five titles were in the long

years at Angelo State University, Josh was twice named the top field performer in the Lone Star Conference

Following graduation with a

bachelor's degree, Josh entered Texas Tech University and began graduate study in chemical en-

Josh continued to work out in Lubbock and moved to Big Spring in the Spring 1976, taking a job as a process engineer with Cosden Oil and Chemical. He felt at the time coming here he was in the best shape of his track career. All the cards seemed to be in his favor.

"I was so confident. That's the main reason I was so disappointed, because I was all set to go."

Robinson did go on and win the 1976 gold medal in the long jump, with a mark of 27-feet, 4% inches. Randy Williams, the gold medalist in the long jump in 1972, took second with a jump of 26-feet, 71/4-inches - more than three inches shorter than Josh's best

"I was probably more disappointed (in 1976) than 1972," Josh said. "There my dreams went down the drain.



Illegal border traffic

TUCSON, Ariz. (AP) — These illegal aliens cross the border under harsh conditions - jammed into wire cages or gunny sacks, squeezed into hidden car-door compartments, often pumped full of tequila to keep them quiet. The mortality rate is

These aliens are birds. Parrots and other exotic birds are being sneaked over the Mexican border, and federal officials say they bring their smugglers millions of dollars for what often are small investments.

The illegal trade has gone on for decades but now is on the rise.

"There's been a marked increase in bird smuggling, which reflects the increasing popularity of birds as pets," said Jerome Hollander, a federal Cstoms spokesman in Los Angeles "More smugglers are seeing

Pet shop owners and individuals will pay top prices for parrots, and that means there's lots of money in smuggling them -"pound for pound more value than in marijuana," Hollander said.

A smuggler can buy a bird in Mexico for a dollar or less and sell it for several hundred, Meisner said.

Last month, a San Diego Customs auction of 120 birds seized in a 1979 smuggling attempt brought \$50,000, including \$2,100 for each of four macaws and \$2,300 for a pair of eclectus parrots, Hollander said.

Dave Meisner, a Customs special agent in Southern California, said smuggled Mexican birds alone bring \$5 million to \$10 million a year in the United States. Many other birds from South and Centrell American jungles are brought through Mexico, he added.

Smugglers often sell their birds to pet shops. They fill cages with parrots and carry them across the border in remote places, or they silence the birds with tequila, seats, in the trunks or in the door panels of

their cars. The object is to avoid the federal quarantine required for all imported birds. The quarantine is aimed at preventing the

import of diseases, including psittacosis, a bacteria that can cause pneumonia in people, and Newcastle disease, a virus that apparently is harmless to humans but

Federal authorities recall how Newcastle

disease spread through California's poultry industry in the 1970s, forcing destruction of

12 million chickens at a loss of \$56 million. After that, bird imports were banned for a time. Later, strict import rules went into effect, requiring bird importers to submit them for 30-day quarantines - for which importers must pay.

People bringing one or two birds across pay \$80 to keep one bird for 30 days and \$100 for two birds at the several border quarantine centers. Several places in Texas and California have commercial birdimport centers, with quarantine facilities available for thousands of birds. In the Los Angeles area, 47 quarantine centers handle birds arriving by air from international

'It's obvious that birds are smuggled to avoid the quarantine period, because it costs money," said Richard Swindler, in charge of Customs investigations at Nogales, Ariz.

Smugglers also appear to have little concern for spreading diseases. Officials say the death rate among smuggled birds is high, from either sickness or lack of adequate care in transportation.

Individuals bringing exotic birds in as pets also must submit them for quarantine. But because of red tape and because bird peddlers in Mexico often give advice on smuggling, officials said, many people bring them across illegally.

'You can go down to Tijuana and buy a bird," Meisner said. "They'll wrap it up and tell you how to smuggle it across the border. And they'll even take Mastercharge or Visa and the local

Big-time operators are being caught at an increasing rate, with half a dozen major cases in Southern California and Arizona Among the cases are:

- Five persons arrested, including a Tucson pet shop owner, after Customs of ficers saw 156 birds passed through the border fence on May 1. The 139 half-moon conure parrots and 17 lilac-crowned parrots were valued at \$10,000.

- Three persons arrested April 13 when an undercover Customs officer took delivery of 50 military macaws worth \$800 each.

 A Mexican arrested April 3 after an officer found 70 parrots in his car at Nogales. The birds were worth \$14,000.

GTE employees jailed; one injured

PORTLAND, Texas (AP) — Three General Telephone Co. of the Southwest employees were jailed for investigation of malicious mischief this weekend and leaders of a strike against the company said several unrelated picket line incidents left at least one striker

San Patricio County Deputy Van Elliot said the three men were arrested after witnesses told authorities they saw the men trying to cut company telephone cables

The men were arraigned before Justice of the Peace Charlott Griffin, who set preliminary bond at \$10,000, Almost two dozen separate incidents of vandalism

against company property since the Communication Workers of America went on strike just after midnight Friday, company official Clovis McCallister said at company headquarters in San Angelo.

About 8,000 workers in four states - 5,000 of them in Texas — are involved in the walkout, union leaders said. T.O Moses, of CWA Local 12171 and chairman of the union bargaining committee said Sunday two strikers were involved in picket line incidents over the weekend.

Shortly before 11 p.m. Saturday night, picketer Don Mills was struck by a car leaving the General Telephone company parking lot at Coppell, just northwest of Dallas, Moses said. Mills was knocked up onto the hood of the car and suffered minor injuries, Moses said.

CWA member Janice Mills was struck by a rubber dart from a passing vehicle at a picket line in Del Rio, Moses

Moses said "CWA has advised each member that CWA does not condone nor encourage" vandalism of General Telephone property, and offered to repair damaged equipment "without charge to the company.

McCallister said there were 12 incidents of damage to company equipment in Broken Arrow, Okla., a Tulsa suburb, five incidents in the Dallas suburb of Garland, and other reports of vandalism in Plano, Rosharon, Weslaco, Texarkana and Hobbs, N.M.

However, he said none of the incidents led to serious interruptions of telephone service, "as far as I know.

The two cut cables near Texarkana interfered briefly with service to the Red River Army Depot and some homes, but service was restored to the depot, company officials said





Conservatives rejoice over change

Two agencies peculiar to government may have benefitted by recent changes, brought about by the resignation of Cyrus Vance as U.S. Secretary of State.

Edmund Muskie, the Democrat from Maine, left the U.S. Senate to take Vance's old job. He was succeeded as chairman of the Senate Budget Committee by Sen. Ernest Hollings, the Democrat from South Carolina.

Muskie earned his spurs in the upper house as a liberal. He consistently voted for programs that called for the spending of a lot of big

ALTHOUGH HE IS regarded as no

friend to energy-rich states like Texas, Hollings is convinced that government needs to become more fiscally responsible.

Hollings, let it be said, has done an about-face in taking a stance against unlimited spending. It was only about a year ago that the senator from South Carolina appeared ready to fall in step with liberals on domestic spending. This year, he has not only voted for damming the flow of federal money to domestic problems but has stumped for the cutbacks and asked others to join him.

When the Republicans proposed to reduce the budget by \$2.5 billion, Hollings was the only Democrat on the committee to go along with the idea

Hollings must have been listening to some of the taxpayers back home, for he was moved to remark:

"A lot of us feel that the thing is getting out of hand, that nobody's in charge. Unless Congress gets control of the budget, we're headed for disaster.

Hollings has yet to prove that he is a man who can get things done but the mere fact that he is expressing alarm over the size of the government's deficit places him ahead of Muskie.

THE TAXPAYERS got another break recently when Rep. Robert Drinan, a Jesuit priest, was told in so many words to vacate his seat in the lower house by the Pope of Rome.

Drinan was occupying the seat from the Fourth District of Massachusetts There is a good chance that the voters could elect a fiscal conservative in the padre's place.

Closer to home, Cong. Jack Brooks of Beaumont, long recognized as one of the big spenders in the Congress, will have to wait a while to learn if he can return to Congress. His 246-vote edge was close enough to dictate a recount. Even if finally declared the winner, it appears that people like Brooks, who has been in the house 28 years, would get the message that the electorate wants a return to sanity in spending programs.

There may be hope yet for the



Media events

Around the rim

The Democratic caucus was to be held in Frog Lick, Ala. The three networks sent their cameras, equipment, technicians and reporters to Lyle's Bait Shop in Frog Lick waiting in anticipation, hoping the nation will realize what a fantastic news operation they have.

The three old men sat in front of the store. One of them announced, "Ready boys? ... Heads it's Teddy, tails it's Jimmy."

IT SOUNDS RIDICULOUS, doesn't it? It never happened, but Harper's Magazine had the good taste and intelligence to run a cartoon with the above story on it a few months back. With the race to the White House

starting earlier and taking longer, we, the public are subjected to more and more "media events."

That is when something will be scheduled specifically for the cameras that would normally have no news significance. Sometimes, it is the only thing a television news team has to show on the tube that night. After all, the reporters have to bring back something to their superiors. The competition is tough out there. If there is nothing newsworthy, they have to have something visual to bring back while they talk over the film. Video is all important with television news.

When you watch television network news at night, how much of the real news are you getting compared with reading a newspaper? Recent studies show the answer is - not much.

Sure, you get to see the way a candidate walks and talks. But rarely will you ever get to see or hear anything that contains any real news substance

If you don't believe it try it yourself. Measure the front page of the New York Times. Measure the amount of presidential campaign news coverage and then measure the amount of space devoted to the issues. Do the same with a half-hour news cast. How many minutes are devoted to the campaigns and how much of that is devoted to the issues? If you do this over a period of weeks, the per-centages will show the New York Times winning out every time.

When you watch network news what do you see? The candidate getting on a plane, off a plane or shaking hands in a crowd. In 1976. Jimmy Carter gave the airplane entrances and exits one final touch. the clothing bag over the shoulder.

IN THE ABOVE STUDY I mentioned, you might see what issues the networks and the newspapers spend the most time on. This year I would bet the networks are going with Iran. while the newspapers are going with the economy. The story of the economy, probably the most important issue right now, is not visually effective.

If anyone has ever gone to a presidential campaign rally, the first thing one notes is that everything is geared to that all important network television camera. The local television cameras come after that in importance to the candidate. They are followed by still photographers and then newspaper reporters. After all, they only have to listen, they don't have to see.

The expression "pressing the flesh" so the politicians can get "close to the people" has been said so often, the people - and worse than that, the politicians themselves - actually believe it. What it is really for is to get on the local and network evening news. Politicians know the networks have to have something to take back They comply, and quite willingly.

I'm waiting for the day that Mr Cronkite and his colleagues will say that the reporter covering Kennedy told us he went through eight cities. making the same speech and creating media events. And then follow it up with similar reports on the other



Earthquake conditions

Immediately after the busted rescue mission in Iran, I asked a half dozen senior Democrats about the possibility of an inner-party revolt that would force an open convention and the unhorsing of President Carter. All scoffed at the notion. One - the man who figured to have the keenest feel for delegate sentiment and the most to lose from a Republican victory - said: "I swell in the world of reality

Reality changes, to be sure. But my mini-sampling suggests that several hugely unlikely conditions will all have to come together in a brief period before a serious threat to Jimmy Carter can be mounted in the Democratic Party. The conditions for a Democratic earthquake are as

FIRST, RONALD REAGAN has to open a commanding lead over Carter in the opinion polls. At present senior Democrats do not take the former California governor all that seriously. They believe that he is shallow, inexperienced and prone to make bad mistakes on the stump. They think that with attention going first to Kennedy, then to George Bush, then to John Anderson and now to Carter, that he has yet to be exposed to the full glare of media scrutiny. They expect he'll sink, not rise, in the polls.

Nor are they impressed by the pulling power of the Republican Party. I cited an analysis of the Wisconsin and Kansas primaries made by Horace Busby, a former aide to President Johnson who now works as a business consultant. The Busby analysis shows that 60 percent of the eligible voters participated in the Republican primaries as against only 40 percent in the Democratic

Those numbers suggest, to me and to others, the possibility of a Republican landslide in the fall. But the senior Democrats seem confident that with a little work they can continue to hold comfortable majorities in both houses. So one condition necessary to shake them into action is convincing evidence that Reagan can beat Carter so badly as to threaten

primaries.

Democratic control of the Congress. A second condition is a strong showing by John Anderson in the polls, and also in raising money, and in getting his name on the presidential ballot. The senior Democrats all think of a two-man race — Carter versus Reagan. They acknowledge widespread disaffection in the Democratic Party. But they place the unhappiness chiefly among liberal Democrats on the two coasts. They believe that in the end, the liberals, faced with the prospect of Reagan, will return to the fold and vote for Carter.

Anderson is important because he represents respectable middle ground. If he begins to show strength, the liberals will not feel pinned to a choice between Reagan and Carter. They can deliver a message by going to Anderson in droves. In that event nobody could predict the outcome, and the confidence of the senior Democrats in Carter would again be badly shaken.

A third condition is the withdrawal of Sen. Edward Kennedy. The senior

Democrats, in touch with both teh Kennedy and the Carter camps, report an unprecedented degree of

even more bitter. THE KENNEDY FORCES think of Carter as a Democrat who has adopted Republican policies - a renegade. The senator and his people talk of carrying the fight through the primaries and on to the convention floor. Even if beaten there, it is not clear the Kennedyites will back

unless Kennedy quits first. The supreme testing time for all these possibilities remains weeks off. A Kennedy withdrawal is not even thinkable until after the June 3 primaries in California, Ohio and New Jersey. The true dimensions of Gov. Reagan's appeal will probably not emerge until he finally nails down the nomination - presumably in the California primary. As to the Anderson campaign, it is only into its first days. The effort to put the candidate's name on the ballot in 50 states, for example, is, while going strong, still in the study

Big changes in outlook are equally unlikely after the Republican convention in mid-July. The first nomination tends to freeze developments until after the second.

WASHINGTON - A secret agreement between the Soviet Communist Party and the Sandinista Marxist Party of Nicaragua, signed in Moscow in late March, points to major new Soviet intervention and a possible Nicaragua-Cuban military accord in the increasingly-hostile Caribbean backyard of the United States

The Soviet government would be unlikely to sign a party-to-party agreement with a foreign country unless Moscow regarded that country as a reliable, long-term partner," a leading Latin American authority told

The secret agreement between the two ruling parties is regarded by noncommunist Latin nations as a dangerous Soviet intrusion into the Central American heartland. It appears aimed at planting Soviet influence and arms smack on the bridge between the Americas, flanked by what used to be the peaceful lake of the Caribbean but what is now becoming an alien sea dominated by the Soviet dependency of Cuba.

What is actually contained in the secret party-to-party agreement is not known here or by the governments of principal Latin American countries There is reason to suspect, however, that Moscow is encouraging a military link between communist Cuba and the Sandinistas, who toppled Anastasio Somoza's right-wing dictatorship last year. That link would guarantee money, arms and supplies for Nicaragua

If so, Moscow would gain automatic entree to the struggling Sandinista regime through a kindly intermediary

Cuba's Fidel Castro. Without Castro, the Marast revolution on strategically-placed Nicaragua could not have succeeded last summer.

The Soviet plan is to communize Central America and, using that land bridge as a dagger pointing north and south, extend its influence onto the two continents. What is surprising to top policy-makers in the Carter administration is the speed with which this Soviet campaign is progressing. and the increasing boldness of the men in Moscow and their agents in

Havana. U.S intelligence sources are now certain, for example, that Castro is upgrading his estimated 144 SAM-2 anti-aircraft missile sites on Cuba Now single-stage rockets, the Soviet made SAM-2 is acquiring three new boosters. Some U.S. officials believe the purpose is to provide better air defenses for possible U.S. retaliation against a Soviet-Cuban decision to redeploy nuclear weapons in Cuba some time in the future

After the 1962 Cuban missile crisis. the Russians promised never again to move offensive nuclear weapons into Cuba. But the Soviet invasion of Afghanistan broke the back of detente and U.S.-Cuban relations are at a new poisoned in part by Castro's deadly missionary work in Central America. Castro is clearly preparing for new confrontation with Washington

He now has at least 2,000 Cuban agents in Nicaragua, including military advisers who control a small training camp at Esteli and a fortified air facility at Montelemar. Some U.S. officials claim that although the Sandinista regime is controlled today by pro-Castro Marxists, a political power struggle continues within the revolutionary group

If so, there was no sign of it during the four-day, late-March Moscow summit between the Sandinistas and two of the highest Soviet leaders, including Politburo member A.P. Kirilenko and Boris Ponomarev, Moscow's chief liaison with foreign Communist Parties

Dear Dr. Donohue Last summer my face tanned in blotches. There were places on my forehead and the lower parts of my cheeks that just didn't seem to tan. By winter it was not so noticeable, because my tan had faded. But it is still slightly blotched. I have noticed a few other women with the same problem Lam 31 Could you tell me what could be causing this and what can be done to avoid it this

+ Miss L. M. Special cells of the skin are responsible for tanning. They are called "melanocytes." which when stimulated by sunlight produce skin pigment - melanin

There are several possible causes or the blotchiness the Pill develop a condition called chloasma, brownish patches The same situation is found in some women during pregnancy, and this is often referred to as the "mask of pregnancy" Hormones are involved

in both instances Another condition involving the melanocytes is called vitiligo VIEtih-LIE-go) This is eaused by a lack of malanin production. The result is outwardly the same, only instead of brown patches causing the blotchiness it is actually the non-pigmented areas that cause it. For this, some success has been reported with the use of

psoralen drugs followed up with exposure to sunlight A fungal infection called "tinea versicolor" can produce the uneven tanning appearance. Its presence is determined by examining skin scrapings under a microscope. Treatment is with anti-fungal lotions

If extra melanin production is the cause, use of sunscreen lotions and avoidance of excessive sun exposure should minimize the problem. Wear a broad-brimmed sun hat

Tanning under any conditions is not the most healthful thing one can do for skin Excess sunning can cause premature aging of skin I don't expect this warning to have the slightest effect on the numbers of sun wor shippers this summer

Dear Dr. Donohue: Please explain 'middle pain." Why does it occur in some women at the time of ovulation? I am one of those women who experience this. I don't really understand it and am confused, even a bit scared. I get regular examinations and my doctor can't find any problems. - J K C

get midway in their menstrual cycle.

the term more commonly used It is thought to be linked to ovulation, which occurs at mid-cycle. The pain may last from a few hours to two or three days, so for some women it can be a difficult problem. Simple analgesics help most

The German for it is "mittleshmerz.

Sometimes there is simultaneous bleeding that may mimic a menstrual period. There is no agreement as to why this happens, although it may be related to a drop in estrogen levels. which occurs at the time of ovulation.

If there is doubt as to the cause of the bleeding or if there is no regular menstruation later (and no conditions such as growths that commonly cause uterine bleeding.

Dear Dr Donohue: A friend, a woman, developed acne and the cause was said to be from injections of vitamin B-12 she was getting. Is this possible? - Mrs T T

Yes It is apparently fairly common, especially in women. The acne disappears within a week or two of discontinuing the injections. The acne usually appears a week or two after beginning the therapy.

Dear Dr Donohue: Will a man with gonorrhea always know he has the illness? - H K

There is a myth that needs to be destroyed when talking about gonorrhea. It is popularly thought that all infected males have symptoms the typical discharge) and that all women have few or no symptoms. That is simply not true. As many as 20 percent of infected men will not have the discharge or other signs of gonorrhea The numbers of infected women who have no signs range from 30 to 60 percent of cases. A good deal of gonorrheal infection is transmitted by people who have minimal signs and

It lasts from 15 to 24 months, but in some people it can pesist for years. A variant of lichen planus, called lichen planus actinicus, is what you may have. This appears on skin exposed to sunlight. The cause is, not known, xcept that the sun's rays play a role.

DEAR DR. GRAHAM: I know smoking pot is not supposed to be good for me, but it feels so good when I do it that I don't want to stop. I think it helps me deal with my problems. Can you give me any reasons why I should stop? -

DEAR H.W .: I do not believe that using marijuana (or any other drug, including alcohol) really helps you deal with your problems. In fact, the opposite is the case. By relying on such things, you hide from your problems and never solve them. Some day you will discover that your problems are still there, and may even have become too overwhelming to solve completely

You have already suggested one reason why you should stop using this drug - it is not good for you. Recent medical tests seem to confirm this clearly, and you are risking permanent damage to your body (including your brain) by continued use. But it is also harming you emotionally. By refusing to face up to

your problems and solve them, you are failing to learn what it means to accept responsibility. You cannot have a full and satisfying life unless you learn to accept responsibility.

There is also a more basic reason why you should stop your dependence on this drug. It is a spiritual reason. God created you and loves you very much. You are not here by chance; instead, God has a purpose for you in life. You will find His purpose only if you give your life to Him and let Him guide you. At the present time you are allowing yourself to be ruled by your own desires. In one sense, you are allowing this drug to take the place of God in your life.





A boy's courageous story of willpower

DALLAS (AP) — Timmy Boynton is trapped in a body that no longer responds to his wishes. For the last two years, he has escaped from that prison by blinking his eyes and twisting his

Timmy, who will be eight this month, is the victim of a hit-and-run accident. Paralyzed from the neck down, his doctors say he never will move again.

On April 28, 1978, while playing outside his east Dallas home, a car struck Timmy, snapping his spinal cord, both his arms, his collarbone and puncturing his lungs.

"When I saw him, I couldn't believe it was him," said his father, Timothy Boynton. "I went

Rushed to a nearby hospital, Timmy was in a coma for three months, hanging on a slender threads of life and tubes that ran through his "Everybody told me he'd be a vegetable," said

Then, an amazing thing happened. Timmy blinked his eyes. It was his first attempt at communication. And

what was first a tiny movement has developed

into a sophisticated language of blinks, eye rolls and grimaces. After a year at one hospital, the money ran out, Timmy's father said. Boynton, who supports three other children on his \$10,000-a-year salary as a city water department worker, had Timmy

made a ward of the state and transferred to Parkland Memorial Hospital.

"He may have another legal guardian, but he's still my boy," Boynton said. "I visit hhim every day. I never was for charity, I've always worked for a living. I had to swallow my pride, because

there was no way that I could pay for him to stay at Baylor (University Medical Center)."

The two carry on a very special conversation, father asking son questions, and repeating the grimaced answers aloud. It has not been easy for the Boynton family, who endured much before Timmy accident.

Boynton walks with a severe limp from a basketball injury, his wife has difficulty talking from a childhood disease. One sister suffered spinal meningitis just before the accident and the brother who witnessed the hit-and-run has emotional adjustment problems. "It hasn't been the easiest," Boynton ad-

For the driver of the car, who eventually was arrested, the penalty was a \$40,000 fine and five years' probation.

More common sense needed

Will politics always rule money?

NEW YORK (AP) - The failures of economic policy in the past few years has proven the need for more common sense and less financial gadgetry, but that isn't to say the nation will guide itself by that knowledge

Politics, the economists say, will always override sound fiscal and monetary judgments if only because politicians inherently believe that money solves problems, especially their own re-election challenge

But economists too are at fault, some of them anyway, for they have failed to communicate the dangers and sometimes have buried their heads in clouds of statistics and analyses and printouts that add up to zero.

An illustration was provided the other day when a follower of - if not believer in - economic forecasts came upon a year-old assessment by an esteemed, highly paid member of the forecasting fraternity

The forecast made back then in early 1979 stated that by the same time next year, which is now, the country would be emerging from recession. Understandable enough: It was a simple error. Anyone can make them.

Two factors, however, compounded the error Without apologies, the economist simply offered a new forecast: The recession into which we are descending the earlier forecast had said we'd be recovering) would

be more severe than was expected. It was made to a group of lawmakers, who presumably wouldn't have accepted his testimony unless the possibility existed it might affect their thinking on how to run the legislative affairs of government.

The blame isn't limited to politicians and economists alone, because everyone knows that he or she had a bit to do with our troubles, such as running up credit and otherwise spending beyond one's means

But the consumer at least can argue that he acted as he did because the politicians were acting the way they did, that is, spending money like it was only paper. If money was to become just paper, the consumer reasoned, why shouldn't he get rid of it as quickly as possible?

We are now trying to recover from that disaster by returning value to paper money, which in just half a decade lost half its buying power. We are trying to assimilate the lessons learned, or rather relearned.

The first of them is that there is no way anyone, with the possible exception of Uncle Sam, can continue indefintely to spend beyond his means. Eventually, the bills catch up with you, and maybe the law too.

The second could be that you can't please everyone. There are too many social problems in the world to conquer them all at once. Besides, solutions require brains and dedication as well as money



Dickey, the NCAA 60-yard indoor dash champion, says he will compete in one more meet before he ends his track career.

His sore hamstring permitting, Dickey will compete in the NCAA track and field meet beginning June 5 in Austin. However, he was not expected to compete in the Quad-Conference meet among the Western Athletic Conference, the Big Eight, the Southeastern Conference and the Southwest Conference in Austin next

"I'll give my leg some rest over the next couple of weeks so I'll be ready," said Dickey, "My career's not over until the NCAA's, and I'm really looking forward to that. I've been there before and done all right and I know that I'll do it again.

Twe been running track all my life and it will be hard to give up. I love it.'

Dickey lost the 100 Saturday night, at the SWC track and field championship meet, to Houston's Carl Lewis and finished second behind Lewis in a 440-yard-relay anchor duel. However, Dickey earned the Aggies six points with his third-place finish in the 100 and shared in the Ags' eight points with a second-place windup in

Texas A&M won the team championship over the Houston Cougars and Dickey was much of the dif-

His hamstring problem was aggravated when he spent a week in Baltimore working out for the Colts of the National Football League who had made him their

"I thought Curtis Dickey did just great," said Texas A&M assistant coach Ted Nelson. "Here he had been up at Baltimore and he had a bad leg. He's coming into a lot of money soon and he didn't have to be here. He did it out of loyalty to Texas A&M.

Dickey said, "Without the hamstring trouble I think I could have won the 100 but last Monday I lifted weights pretty heavy and ran a bunch of 40-yard dashes for time ... and I was in two-a-day workouts

"Wednesday night I came back to College Station and Thursday we came over here to Waco. Then I ran Friday and ran again Saturday ... it just makes you
