# OPEC nations agree on need to cut production

ALGIERS, Algeria (AP) — The 13 Organization of Petroleum Exporting Countries tentatively agreed today on the need to cut oil production, but Saudi Arabia, the world's leading producer, said it would not cooperate without an accord on prices, Venezuelan Oil Minister Humberto Calderon Berti said.

Iranian Oil Minister Ali Akbar Moinfar said after the first round of closed-door talks that oil ministers had agreed on the need to reduce OPEC output to 26.5 million barrels a day. OPEC now produces about 27.5 million-28 million barrels daily.

Ministers of the 13-nation group were scheduled to discuss the sensitive pricing issue later today, but Kuwait Oil Minister Ali Khalifah al-

Conference sources said without a compromise, prices would stay about the same for the rest of 1980. Analysts here say disunity within the oil cartel saves money for oil consumers, including the United States.

The sources said during the session Monday night that Iranian Oil Minister Ali Akhbar Moinfar accused Iraq and Saudi Arabia of "serving American imperialism by raising production rates."

They said Iraqi Oil Minister Tayeh Abdel-Karim shouted back that Iraq was the first power in the Organization of Petroleum Exporting Countries to nationalize Westernowned oil operations.

The sources said Saudi Arabia's minister did not even attend and

Qatar's walked out of the hall in the middle of the session. But the oil ministers of the 13-member nations met again today, without staff assistants, in an effort to reach an agreement on pricing policy and production levels.

"The most important thing is not the price but production," Moinfar told reporters, adding that he and other OPEC militants would press for Saudi Arabia to cut its output. Conference sources said the Saudis, who produce one-third of OPEC's output at 9.5 million barrels a day, were resisting the pressure to decrease production levels by 1 million barrels

Qatar sources, meanwhile, said Iran was also urging a cut in production by Iraq, OPEC's second largest producer with daily production of 3.5 million barrels.

Production levels are a key issue because a "mini-glut" of oil on world markets is making it difficult for those OPEC members whose oil is expensive to sell their crude. OPEC officials estimate the current world surplus at about 1 million barrels a day.

Iraq has proposed that all OPEC nations charge \$32 a barrel for their oil. Under the proposal, OPEC hawks—including Iran—would have to

drop present prices by \$3 a barrel, middle-of-the-roaders would raise theirs \$2 and Saudi Arabia, which produces one-third of all OPEC oil, would increase prices \$4.

But Moinfar said "there was no way" Iran would decrease prices, that he was "sure" there would be no agreement and that along with Algeria, Libya and Nigeria, Iran will continue to sell oil for as much as it can get for it.

For different reasons than Iran, Saudi Oil Minister Sheik Ahmed Zaki Yamani is resisting the Iraqi plan, which would raise the world's oil bill and boost U.S. gasoline and heating oil costs more than 7 cents a gallon.

Yamani told reporters he was "very pessimistic" the pricing-structuring plan would succeed. The Saudis oppose the plan in hopes that a slackening demand on world oil markets will force other OPEC nations to charge less for their oil later this year, conference sources said.

Yamani recently predicted oil prices will collapse by fall because of reduced demand caused in part by the U.S. recession.

## Police warn of blitz

## Bombs explode in Tel Aviv suburb

Two bombs planted by Arab terrorists exploded in a Tel Aviv suburb today, and the city's police warned that Palestinian guerrilla organizations might be planning a letter-bomb blitz. Meanwhile, President Carter's plan to resume the talks on Palestinian autonomy appeared to be moving forward.

One bomb was planted at a military pickup point in Peah Tikvah for soldiers traveling to their base, and the second in a trash bin in the town, about six miles from Tel Aviv.

Authorities reported no injuries or damage, but said: "Check all your mail carefully for name, return address and size. If you have any picions, report immediately to the

..rab guerrilla groups have threatened to step up their attacks from Lebanon, and more recently from Jordan, in response to the sudden escalation of violence in the occupied West Bank.

Egypt has accepted Carter's proposal that Egyptian and Israeli negotiators meet in Washington to try and break a month-long deadlock in the Palestinian autonomy talks. Israel has said it may send its negotiator to Washington this week, but has not commented directly on Carter's offer.

Meanwhile, Secretary of State Edmund S. Muskie urged Israel and Egypt to work for a political climate that would aid the talks. However, Muskie also denounced new Israeli settlements on the West Bank of the Jordan as disrupting chances for an agreement on the future of the Palestinians living there.

"If negotiations are to succeed, no party should take steps on its own that prejudge the outcome," Muskie said in his first speech on the Middle East

# Carter says he didn't notice rocks hurled at his motorcade

pression.

MIAMI (AP) — President Carter says he didn't notice the rocks and bottles tossed at his motorcade by a jeering crowd, but the mayor of this racially torn city is worried that the incident could spoil any benefits of the president's visit to a riot-scarred neighborhood.

It was one of the most violent en-

counters in Carter's presidency.
One photographer was hit with a bottle, but no one was reported hurt—or arrested — when 600 people scrambled for safety late Monday as the motorcade was bombarded. Carter had waved to the crowd, at which point the crowd began booing and shouting insults. When the rocks and bottles came, Carter ducked into

his car and sped off.

Dade Metro Police Cmdr. Douglas
Hughes said "a few kids at the back of
the crowd" had thrown the debris.

The incident, which followed demonstrations by blacks and Cuban exiles, occurred as Carter left a meeting with black leaders in Liberty City, the neighborhood burned and looted last month in racial riots that claimed 16 lives. Police in riot gear cleared the block and the only damages reported were broken windows on another motorcade vehicle. Carter's car was nicked by a

beer bottle.

"I think the bottle-throwing incident is a natural expression of people who are frustrated," said Mayor Maurice Ferre. "Most of the crowd wasn't involved...I don't think they were throwing bottles at Jimmy Carter, but at the presidency. This is a con-

tinuation of the other — it is an ex-

Ferre said he feared "this one little incident that took five seconds" would detract from Carter's attempt to soothe raw nerves in the black and Cuban communities with promises of jobs, justice and compassion.

Ferre said the president did not make specific commitments to provide assistance to the riot area. "It was a bland meeting — we did not come forth with an organized plan. He made no commitments and wasn't asked to make any," Ferre said. "It

was a missed opportunity."
"So far as the demonstrators are concerned, I didn't see them," Carter said later on arrival in Seattle, where he is to address big city mayors. "But they have a problem in that area that we're all working together to try to

White House press secretary Jody Powell, asked Carter's reaction to the incident, said, "His feeling was that it was a worthwhile visit and that it was important that he came." Presidential aide Jack Watson said a program of aid for Miami is expected to be ready in two weeks.

Carter's visit was his first to South Florida since the May rioting sparked by the aquittal of four white former policemen charged in the beating death of a black businessman. It also was his first contact with Miami's Cuban exile community. The Freedom Flotilla, which has brought more than 112,000 refugees to the United States, began seven weeks

since becoming secretary of state last month following the resignation of Cyrus Vance.

President Anwar Sadat, who announced the Egyptian decision Monday, said his government was consulting Washington on a date. Senior foreign ministry sources in Cairo said Egypt proposed the first week of July. Sadat said Egypt would make its decision known "in a few date."

Israeli Prime Minister Menachem Begin has said Interior Minister Yosef Burg, who has led the Israeli delegation at the autonomy talks, may go to Washington this week to discuss a date for resumption of the talks. He declined to say whether Carter had invited Burg.

Burg told reporters in Tel Aviv that he expected a procedural meeting, but would not comment on Begin's statement about a trip to Washington.

"I believe we will not have negotiations about the essence of the autonomy, but about the procedure: when we will meet, which working groups should meet and so on preparations for the real meeting," he said.

aid. Sadat also indicated that Washington meeting would be preparatory to full resumption of the talks.

Under the Camp David accords, the Egyptian-Israeli talks were supposed to have produced a Palestinian autonomy plan by May 26. Sadat suspended the talks in early May because of what he called a "dismal political atmosphere" created by Israel in its refusal to discuss the status of Arab East Jerusalem.

Muskie's remarks, delivered at the Washington Press Club, were intended for western Europeans as well as Arabs and Israelis. With the autonomy talks stalled, the Europeans are preparing U.N. resolutions in support of Palestinian "self-determination," a codeword for statehood.

Muskie said the Carter administration wouldn't object to new initiatives that further the Camp David process, "but we will strongly oppose any efforts that would derail that process."

Carter and Muskie haved warned Europeans against cutting across the Camp David peacemaking process for the Middle East.

## Plots in plots

WASHINGTON - In an earlier column, I told how eight members of Congress were caught in the ABSCAM trap, but seven others were let out before the trap was sprung. Several of the eight were filmed accepting bribes from FBI undercover agents. The same intermediaries who brought in the eight legislators for their payoffs also offered to produce another seven. But curiously, the Justice Department was not interested

The FBI agents and their star witness. Mel Weinberg, "were frustrated and bewildered at a series of orders from the Justice Depart ment in Washington which prevented them from pursuing what they regarded as promising leads.

THIS SENSATIONAL allegation is contained in a confidential book proposal prepared by Bob Greene, whose investigative reporting earned Newsday a Pulitzer Prize. It is clear from the text that one of Greene's informants is the government's own chief witness. Weinberg himself

Five weeks ago, I reported that the Justice Department had been selective in pursuing ABSCAM leads. I noted that some of President Carter's political opponents had been pursued while some of his supporters

I reported that the FBI had an intense interest in House Speaker Tip O'Neill. There is no evidence that the FBI agents could have netted him, but they were eager to try. Then the Justice Department sent word that 'we don't think (the O'Neill investigation) is profitable to pursue.

Here are two other big fish who escaped the ABSCAM net:

House Judiciary Chairman Peter Rodino, D-N.J. - Just as the FBI agents were about to draw Rodino into their net, the Justice Department scotched the investigation. They were dealing with Rodino's son-in-law, Charles Stanziale, who now swears he resisted the baited fish hook

But Greene declares flatly: "Contrary to his public statement, the sonin-law of powerful Judiciary Committee Chairman Peter Rodino eagerly talked with Weinberg and an undercover FBI agent about getting legal fees for his law firm ... and strongly intimated that he could deliver Congressman Rodino in

A SOURCE CLOSE to the investigation told my associate Gary Cohn that the Justice Department "cooled on Rodino just as the agents were getting closer to meeting him." The source insisted that a meeting with Rodino "could have been pulled off," although there is no indication that he would have taken any money or even would have discussed a payment.

The Justice Department's tampering with the Rodino investigation, inside sources suggest, so angered the undercover men that they leaked the ABSCAM story.

Sen. Strom Thurmond, R-S.C. -Justice Department sources first hesitated to pursue the 77-year-old Senate veteran, then gave the goahead, then called off the

vestigation.

By Green's account, Rep. John Jenrette, D-S.C., offered to deliver Thurmond for \$100,000. But, says Greene, Jenrette insisted upon picking up the money himself, contending that Thurmond wouldn't meet with the undercover operatives in person. There is no proof that Thurmond was aware of Jenrette's dickering

Jenrette was caught on videotape; no further attempt was made to reel in Thurmond

significantly, both Rodino and Thurmond, as powers on the House and Senate Judiciary committees, respectively, have been strong supporters of the Justice Department

The ABSCAM caper was directed personally by Attorney General Banjamin Civiletti and the head of the Justice Department's criminal division. Philip Heymann. Their spokesman has denied any interference with the ABSCAM investi-

PARTY SURPRISE: The biggest fear in Ronald Reagan's inner circle right now is that Jimmy Carter will get an unexpected boost in the election campaign from an "October surprise." Reagan's advisers worry that a startling news development like last year's "November surprise," the Tehran hostage seizure, will rally support around a beleaguered

There's not much the Republicans can do to forestall such an unpredictable blockbuster, so they'll continue to hammer away at the gap between candidate Carter's promises and President Carter's achievements.

Meanwhile, Reagan is working on a "July surprise" of his own for unveiling at the Detroit convention. His choice of a running mate, insiders confide, will be someone who can broaden his appeal, rather than a political carbon copy who might please only a narrow base of ultraconservative true believers.

INFLUENCE DIGEST: Several Moslem powers, including Saudi Arabia, Kuwait and Pakistan, have brought secret pressure on Iran to return the American hostages, end the crisis and restore stability to the Persian Gulf region. ... 

## Some tips on poisons

Paul G. Donohue. M.D.

SPECIAL NOTE FOR READERS I received a letter from the poison control center in my area and I thought I should pass on to you the good advice contained in it. Vacations seem particularly dangerous times

Many children, especially those under five years of age, are accidentally poisoned every year. The tips to avoid this have been offered many times, but they merit repeating There were a few new ones in the

Lock up all medicines Don't take medicines in front of

Don't call the children's medicine Discard old medicine regularly

and dump it down the drain Avoid bringing toxic substances into your house Store cleaning supplies out of

sight and reach of children Don't store medicines, cleaning agents or pesticides near food;

-Keep all products in the original containers Rinse out containers thoroughly

before disposing of them, and -Have on hand an ounce of syrup of ipecac. This makes the child vomit. You should not give it to a child suspected of taking a poisonous substance until you check with your doctor. Ipecac is not to be given in all cases of poisoning, but it should be available if it is needed

Keen your doctor's phone number in a readily-accessible place and find out if there is a poison control center in your area Keep that number handy too And teach your child never to accept anything to eat or drink offered them by another child without first asking you about it

Dear Dr Donohue: I am worried about my diet. I read recently about sprue and I had all the symptoms, so I eliminated from my diet all wheat. oats and rye products. That made me feel better I substitute rice and potatoes. But two years ago I was told. had kidney problems and had calcium stones removed. I was told to eliminate all dairy products from my diet, which I have done. My general health is good, but what if I continue to eliminate dairy products and grains?

I am glad you feel better after eliminating wheat from your diet. But I am worried, not only about you missing out on a balance diet, but also about your getting a proper diagnosis

You may have sprue, that peculiar disease of the intestine caused by the inability to tolerate gluten products (such as wheat). You cannot diagnose sprue just by trial-and-error diet as you have done. There are many more reliable tests available. I urge you to consult a physician for a proper diagnosis and for counseling on your diet The non-wheat diet is depriving you of considerable nutriments, and there may be no reason for that You might get a better idea of sprue and diet from the booklet. "Colitis and Kindred Complains." which is available by mailing 50 cents and a stamped, self-addressed envelope to me care of the Big Spring Herald Your letter dramatizes how ill-

advised some self-diagnosis can be. Dear Dr. Donohue I am a male, 21 I have recently read where elderly people who have had cataracts removed have had small contact lenses placed inside the eyes to help correct vision. Do you think that would be possible for a person my age. who does not have cataracts, but just bad evesight? - B.R.

A cataract is an opaque eye lens which leaves a person without the ability to focus light. So if the clouded lens is removed, the person must either wear special cataract glasses (contacts) or have an artificial lens implanted inside the eye. That is not a 'contact' lens, but an actual artificial

replacement for the one removed. You are now wearing glasses or contacts because your vision is not good. Your lens is OK, so removing that would not improve your vision at all. Your problem is correction of the faulty focusing of light. For the person who has had a cataract removed, the need is for a substitute for the missing

FOR M.L. - A short answer to your long question (which is probably what you wanted anyway) is that yes, a man with B-positive blood and a woman with A-positive blood can have an O-positive child. You wouldn't believe how nearly incomprehensible

a long answer would have been. Unless properly treated, both glaucoma and cataracts can lead to blindness. If you are afflicted with either of these ailments or know someone who is, write to Dr. Donohue. in care of the Big Spring Herald, for his booklet. "Cataracts and Glaucoma." Dear Dr. Donohue: Geriatrics is the medicine of older people, correct? When should a person put himself in the hands of a specialist in geriatrics. then? At 65? - J.K. Geriatrics is the study of problems

of aging, not necessarily of older people. We are all aging, whether we are 45, 65 or 75 Thus, if a 50-year-old were to have a problem related to the aging process exclusively, perhaps a reduced liver function, then the knowledge geriatricians have in the field would be just as applicable to him as to a 70-year-old

Dear Dr Donohue: How can you tell whether a headache is caused from overuse of the eyes, as from a lot of intense reading? - R T

Eyestrain can produce a dull aching around the eyes or around the forehead and temples. Resting the eyes brings relief, but it is well to have the eyes tested afterward. Often farsightedness or an astigmatism may be contributing to the strain.

## Judge rules voluntary deduction plan illegal

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — Comptroller Bob Bullock's union dues check-off plan, viewed as a step up for state employee unions, was shot down Monday by a state

Bullock said he hoped Attorney General Mark White would appeal to the 3rd Court of Civil Appeals here, and a spokesman said White probably would

State District Judge Herman Jones said Bullock's voluntary payroll deduction plan — which could have included charitable donations and credit union deposits as well as union dues — was illegal.

Jones enjoined Bullock from implementing the checkoff system on June 30.

Jones agreed with the Texas Right to Work Committee and other plaintiffs that Bullock could not set up his payroll deduction system without specific authorization from the Legislature. Warren Craig, attorney for the Right to Work Com-

mittee, had called Bullock's action "just an end run around the Legislature."

Craig said lawmakers had rejected, or at least failed to pass, several bills in 1979 authorizing union dues check-off and other voluntary payroll deductions.

Bullock announced the check-off plan after Attorney General Mark White said he could set it up even though he had no specific legislative authorization.

The only taker so far has been the American Federation of State, County and Municipal Employees, which has more than 200 members in the comptroller's department.
Union organizers applauded White's opinion because check-off saves administrative costs for a union and avoids unpleasantness with members who fall behind in their dues

Jones said, however, that White had read the law in-

## Small quake rumbles through Panhandle

AMARILLO, Texas (AP) — One woman said her house swayed, but no damage or injuries were reported from a small earthquake that rumbled through the Texas Panhandle and western Oklahoma Monday evening.

The U.S. Geological Survey's Earthquake Information Center in Golden, Colo., said the 5:37 p.m. CDT tremor registered 3.6 on the Richter scale. The National Weather Service here said the quake,

which lasted only a few seconds, was felt 70 to 80 miles from the epicenter in the Miami area of the eastern Panhandle.

"It shook parts of Gary, Hudson, Carson and Potter counties," a NWS spokesman said. Earthquakes are "not very common, but they're not

that uncommon" in the Panhandle, he said. "They're not 'We first thought it was a sonic boom or an explosion," said Fire Chief Pleasant Meadows in White Deer, Texas,

northeast of Amarillo. The Richter scale is a measure of ground motion as recorded on seismographs. Every increase of one number means a tenfold increase in magnitude. An earthquake of 3.5 on the Richter scale can cause slight damage in the

The San Francisco earthquake of 1906, which occurred before the Richter scale was devised, has been estimated at 7.9 on the Richter scale - about 10,000 times stronger than Monday's disturbance in the Panhandle.

## Kermit sinkhole quiet as cracks widening

KERMIT, Texas (AP) - The West Texas sinkhole, apparently satisfied with a 50-foot by 8-foot chunk of earth it had for breakfast Monday, was quiet the rest of the day. Cracks extending from the crater continued to widen, however, and officials theorized a recent rain may have been a factor

Winkler County Sheriff's Deputy Randy Tenney said the latest cave-in occurred on a corner of the chasm away from Petro Lewis Corp.'s oil well and Shell Oil Co.'s tank

He said Shell workers were draining the tanks closest to the hole and rerouting some pipelines broken when the hole suddenly appeared last Tuesday A Shell spokesman, however, said the drainage had

nothing to do with the sinkhole.

"We drained 'em when we needed some oil to pump," he said late Monday. "It was just normal usage." The spokesman also disputed officials' estimates that the crater had grown larger than three football fields. He

said a measurement of the hole Sunday showed it was about 465 feet by 200 feet. Cracks surrounding the sinkhole have crept to within 100 feet of the oil well and 300 feet of a highway, which has been closed to the public. Shell's tank farm remains

several hundred feet from the cracks. Petro Lewis workers capped the well with cement last week as a precautionary measure.

## Rabies vaccine to be replaced

WASHINGTON (AP) — The painful series of rabies shots that has protected Americans from the fatai disease for decades probably will be replaced by a newly approved vaccine, specialists say. The Food and Drug Administration approved the safer,

more effective vaccine Monday. It was developed in France and used for years in Europe.

The vaccine's U.S. distributor says all state health departments should have initial supplies of the vaccine by the end of the month.

The new vaccine is made from rabies viruses grown in cultures of human cells, instead of in duck eggs like the old one. The new vaccine protects virtually all people exposed to rabies and has far fewer adverse reactions than the duck egg type, the FDA said.

An added feature is that the new vaccine provides protection after five injections instead of the 23 required with the older type.

This is a momentous day for rabies protection in this country," said Dr. William Winkler of the federal Center for Disease Control, who said the new vaccine should replace most of the demand for the old one

Winkler said in a telephone interview that about 30,000 persons get precautionary rabies vaccinations each year in this country, usually after having been bitten by animals suspected of having the disease.

Winkler noted that the new vaccine, like the duck egg variety, is not useful after symptoms of rabies develop. The rabies virus attacks the nervous system and after symptoms such as muscle spasms and headache occur, the outcome is almost always fatal, he said.

Aggressive preventive measures to reduce exposures in the last 20 years has cut confirmed human cases to less than five per year in this country, but the disease usually means death unless treated early, he said

THE THIEF ON THE CROSS PART II By B.W. Briggs As we ended in Part I, Jesus had authority to forgive sins in any way he desired. (Jn. 18:36; Mk. 2:5-12; Lk. 17:48-50; 19:9-10). To position ourselves as living under the same will and period as the thief, is to completely sever ourselves from Christ. (Gal. 5:4: Heb. 10:1-30) We are living under a different will today! Baptism as pictured in the new will of Christ was not in effect before the cross. What about the rich young ruler? Was the command to him a universal one? If so, to be a child of God with eternity in reach, we must sell all that we have! Jesus had prescribed other conditions for forgiveness that are not universal. (See Luke 18:18-23) A will is only in effect after the death of its maker. The Old Testament is of none effect today! (Col. 2:14; Rom 6:14). We live on this side of the cross under a new will while the thief lived on the other side of the cross under the old will. The cross stands between the old and new covenants. (Heb. 7:12; 9:15.). Salvation today is not effected by what Jesus did prior to the cross — that is as far as conditions of salvation. People are commanded what to do today. (Rom. 10:9-10; Mk. 16:16) The thief received no commandment as to pardon Christ present will has conditions of forgiveness. His will continues to the end of time. (Heb. 7:12; 24-25) Therefore, the old will or covenant has no effect as to the present conditions or will for the pardon of mankind. The cases of salvation before the cross were not cases of "gospel conversions." The gospel elements had not yet taken form or fulfillment (1 Cor 15:1-7). Therefore, since the gospel is the death, burial. and resurrection of Christ, it couldn't be obeyed until that same message had fulfillment! (Lk. 24:44 f : 2 Thess. 1:3-10) Jesus had to die before the new will was of effect. (Heb. 9:15-17). Note, if you will, some conditions for a will to be effective. 1) TESTATOR - will maker of sound mind and age (Lk. 3:23), 2) LEGACY something to bequeath (Jn. 10:10; 2 Cor. 8:9). 3) HEIRS - those to receive the estate and its benefits (Mt. 11:28; Tit. 2:11). 4) CONDITIONS — must be clearly stated by the maker and carried out to the fullest by the heirs (Lk. 6:46; Jn. 12:48 f). 5) WIT-NESSES — must be competent (Lk. 24:38; Acts 1:8; 21-22 2:32, 26:1-18) 6) DEATH — the testator must die before the will is operative (Jn. 19:30, 33-34). 7) EXECUTORS - they administer the will and the estate therein - The apostles did that very thing on Pentecost (Jn. 14:26; 16:13; Lk. 24:44; Acts 2:22-41) They read the will of Christ on that day! (Acts 1:3; 2; Mt. 16:16: Mt. 28:18-19; Lk. 24:46-47; Mt. 16:18-19)

Note also that every new testament examples of salvation included baptism. Where is an example of salvation where baptism is excluded? The New Testament knows nothing of an un-baptized saved person! Acts 2:37-38 proves that the people were commanded to be baptized as well as Mark 16:16 for the remission of sins. I'm not a Greek scholar — but the scholars, whoever they be, that formed the translating committees "all" translate the Greek word eis into "for" or in the name of Jesus - showing a different baptism than that before the cross (Acts 19:1-7) Baptism is definitely connected with the Holy Spirit, or why Acts 2:38 and Acts 19:1-7 with Pauls questionings? Someone might say, "George Washington and Abraham Lincoln never paid income tax, so neither will I!" But even our constitution does not recognize an ex post facto law. (Article 1, Section 9). Many people use the same reasoning in an attempt to negate the true meaning of verses like Acts 2:38, Mark 16:16; and 1 Peter 3.21. The debate obviously is not with man - it's with God! Whatever Jesus did prior to the cross does not effect His will of today. If I gave out \$100 bills to everyone today, would that mean that everyone automatically comes into my will? NO! Only those who are included in my will and who obey its terms (conditions). If Jesus had said, "He that believeth in me, and is baptized, shall become a millionaire; he that believeth not shall not," how many would misunderstand? I venture to say that wet millionaires; he that believeth not shall not," how many would misunderstand? I venture to say that wet millionaires would not be lacking among us! If Christ did not mean what he said in Mark 16:16, then language has no meaning! Please consider Hebrews 5:8-9 and Matthew 7:21-23. The only way to God is in Christ. (Acts 4:12; Heb. 9:15; Gal. 3:26-27; 2 Cor. 5:17). I know that it seems we in the churches of Christ harp on Acts 2:38 alot. But allow me to explain why this verse is such a key one between our differences. We believe John 3:16 and like verses just as you. We believe that FAITH IS IMPARITIVE TO SALVATION. How could we not? The scriptures are there in plain sight? We agree with you that REPENTANCE IS IMPARITIVE TO SALVATION. How could we not? The scriptures are there is plan sight! Again, we agree that CON-FESSION IS IMPARITIVE TO SALVATION. How could we not? The scriptures are there in plain sight! I once said all I hear was silence on some of the verses listed above in support of baptism for salvation. Well, that's not totally true. 





## Infant's next breath could be his last

W.Va. (AP) - Kitty Cooper dreads the sound of bells in the night because they may be a signal that her 13month-old son has stopped

breathing again. "The first time it happened, he was just four weeks old," Mrs. Cooper said recently. "It was my anniversary and, thank God, I hadn't drunk too much champagne.

That night she was restless and decided to check on Alex, her new baby.

"I reached over to his crib, he sleeps right next to us, and felt him. He felt like he wasn't breathing, but I thought it was just my imagination. So I put my finger under his nose and still couldn't feel anything.
Then I turned him over and saw that hewas blue."

She woke her husband, Bob, but he was unable to clear away the mucous that months. had formed in the baby's throat. They rushed Alex to the hospital and on the way. she said, the baby began

breathing again. Had he not awakened, the

7,000 infants in the country. Since that first episode, Mrs. Cooper said, her son has stopped breathing at least 50 times. Now when he does, the Coopers are alerted by a bell on a monitoring device they attach to Alex whenever they put him in his

The device, featuring an electrode attached to the child's body, is set to sound the alarm if his breathing or heartbeat stops for as long as 20 seconds.

"We started out at 10 seconds and eventually will go to 25 seconds," Mrs. Cooper said. "At first, my son would stop breathing two or three times a day. Then, it was once a week. Now, he Cabell-Huntington Hospital stops about every two to get a monitoring device.

## No Saturday mail delivery? U.S. would be one of few

LONDON (AP) - The U.S. Postal Service wants to cut out Saturday mail deliveries, but other countries deliver letters six days a week and seem happy to go on doing so. The Soviet Union has seven-day deliveries.

An Associated Press survey of 15 European countries and Japan showed all but Portugal have Saturday mail delivery of some kind.

While Turkey does not deliver ordinary mail on weekends, it does carry express letters, and Finland and Japan will deliver Sunday if the sender pays extra

In Britain, Post Office spokeswoman Kathy Blundy said there was talk a few vears ago of stopping Saturday deliveries so the mailmen could have the day

> 'But since they got a raise I don't think any more has been said about it." she said. Seeking to cut costs, the Belgian Post Office has long wanted to end Saturday delivery, but the nation said no, as newspapers and magazines there are bought through the mail. Parcels are not delivered in Belgium on Saturdays, however, nor is advertising matter posted in mass — known as junk

mail. An internal U.S. Postal Service study obtained from congressional source Monday said elimination of Saturday mail delivery in America — a likely result of congressional budget cuts would also hurt mail service

the rest of the week. Some other countries limit Saturday delivery to firstclass letters and hold over second-class mail bearing lower-priced stamps until Monday.

France scores tops for number of deliveries: two morning and one afternoon in Paris and other big cities Monday through Friday, and two on Saturday morning. Britain, Switzerland.

Belgium, Turkey and the Soviet Union have two deliveries daily Monday through Friday. On Saturday, all the countries surveyed, except France, have just one delivery. The Soviet Union delivers on Sunday.

ATLANTA (AP) - Home provides daily and its excomputer owners will be able to "dial" news stories from The Associated Press and a group of the cooperative's member newspapers under an information retrieval experiment announced today AP President Keith

Fuller said that a minimum of 11 AP member newspapers will work with the AP and CompuServe Inc., a Columbus, Ohio, computer firm, to provide information to people with personal computers.

Beginning this summer, the newspapers and AP will provide news, business, sports and feature data to CompuServe computers in Columbus. Any individual with a personal computer will be able to get this in-formation by dialing special telephone numbers. Users of the system will pay \$5 an hour for the service.

The first of the 11 newspapers to participate will be the Columbus Dispatch, Fuller said. Each paper will experiment for a six-month period, providing news, features and advertising material in its community.

'At The Associated Press. we believe that any inmust revolve around the newspaper in the community," Fuller said. "We strongly believe our member newspapers and radio and television stations are in the best position to be the successful information processor in this new technology.

"CompuServe agreed. As a result, the AP member will be the data provider, advertising gatherer and service marketer in its town.
The information retrieval


