Train Derailed At Excel Plant

IN A WEEK'S TIME, Democratic presidential front-runner Gary Hart has been ushered completely out of the scene.

Many people with whom we have discussed the situation seem to be less concerned with whether or not Gary Hart was guilty of the charges that he spent the night with the Miami model as they were that once again the national media has made a vital decision for the country.

Not content with merely trying to influence how we vote on election day, the media now has backed up a step, and made a decision as to who can even seek the nomination for president.

"They have assassinated a future president," complained an ardent Hart supporter last Friday.

It has been pointed out that if the press had always been so much of a watchdog, we might never have had such presidents as Franklin Roosevelt, John F. Kennedy or Lyndon Johnson.

George Washington was lucky. Some historians point out that even the father of our country was less than perfect, but Old George had the good fortune to come along before the likes of the Miami Herald, CBS, ABC, NBC, et al.

Some journalistic experts have taken issue with the methods used by the Miami Herald in breaking the story about Hart and Miss Rice. In fact, Norman Cousins, a former chairman of the Pulitzer Prize committee, called the newspaper's actions "sleazy."

The question has been broached: "Will our political candidates all have to come out of a monastery?" (Opinion: This being the case, we've heard that everything that goes on in a monastery is not necessarily sanctimonious.)

There was a time when the private lives of our nation's leaders, especially the president, were off limits to the press. There was an unwritten law that you did not discuss a president's indiscretions. The pendulum has certainly swung in this regard.

Someone said this week that our national politics are beginning to favor those in England. The British have for many years enjoyed uncovering a scandal involving their political figures.

Not many years ago, the only publications that would have used a headline like the one bannered by the Miami Herald would have been the National Inquirer, and the other "sensational" tabloids you see at your grocer's check-out stand.

In recent weeks, the regular newspapers, along with the television network newscasts, have been about as sensational as anyone needs.

If the trend continues, the networks may have to consider making the "parental discretion" announcement preceding its newscasts, warning that portions of the broadcast may not be suitable for certain members of the family.

CONTRARY TO what you may believe, the 65 miles-per-hour speed limits recently approved by congress and sanctioned by Governor Clements, do not apply to any of the highways in Parmer County.

The speed limit hike from 55 to 65 m.p.h. applies only to the rural Interstate highways. The only highways in the Panhandle which are affected by this change are I-40 east and west, and I-27, between Amarillo and Lubbock.

Many people thought we were getting the higher speed back in our area, but such was not the case. If you drive 65 miles per hour in Parmer County, you'd better keep an eye peeled for the "smokies," because they're liable to pull you over

A Santa Fe freight train struck a truck loaded with boxed beef at the crossing leading to the Excel Packing Plant Monday afternoon.

The driver of the truck, belonging to Willis Shaw Express, was unhurt, but the truck's trailer was totally destroyed.

The train's engine pushed most of the trailer about a quarter of a mile before it could get stopped. Processed meat was scattered along the railroad from the point of impact to where the train was stopped.

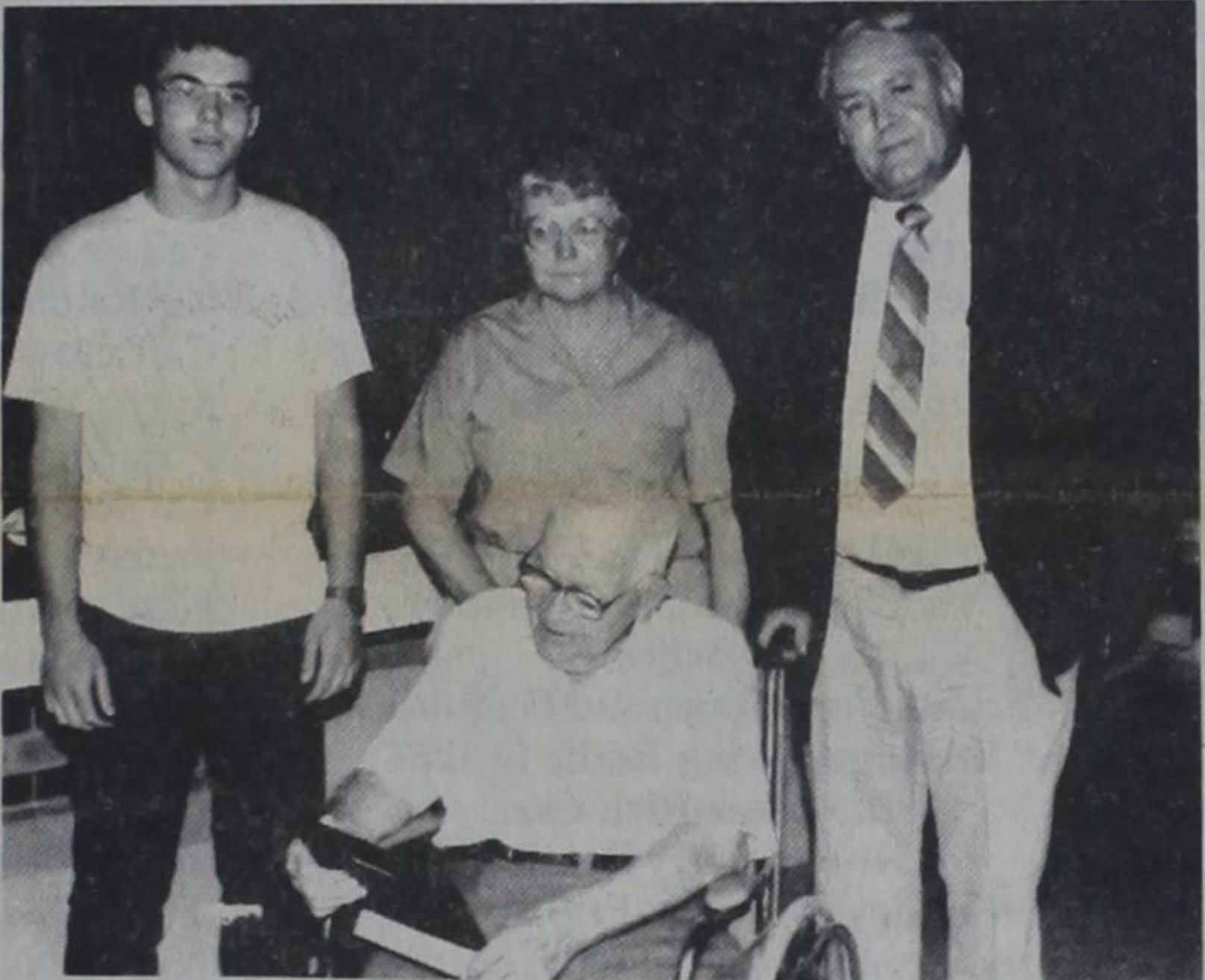
The impact also caused three freight cars on the train to derail, and caused an interruption of traffic for a time on the Santa Fe's main line.

The accident happened at about the time of the shift change at Excel, and caused employees driving to and from the plant some trouble. Traffic had to be routed two miles west of the plant to another crossing.

The accident at the crossing was the first in a number of years, and due to the heavy traffic, that is probably a wonder in itself.

DPS patrolman Trey Ellis said the driver of the truck was Gerald Hendrickson, 53, of New Plymouth, Idaho. He had just loaded at the plant and was headed to Owensboro, Ky. Ellis said the driver was attempting to drive around the warning arms, which were down.

The train engineer was Luther Todd of Amarillo.

The senior graduation is scheduled for 8 p.m. Saturday, May 30 at the junior high auditorium.

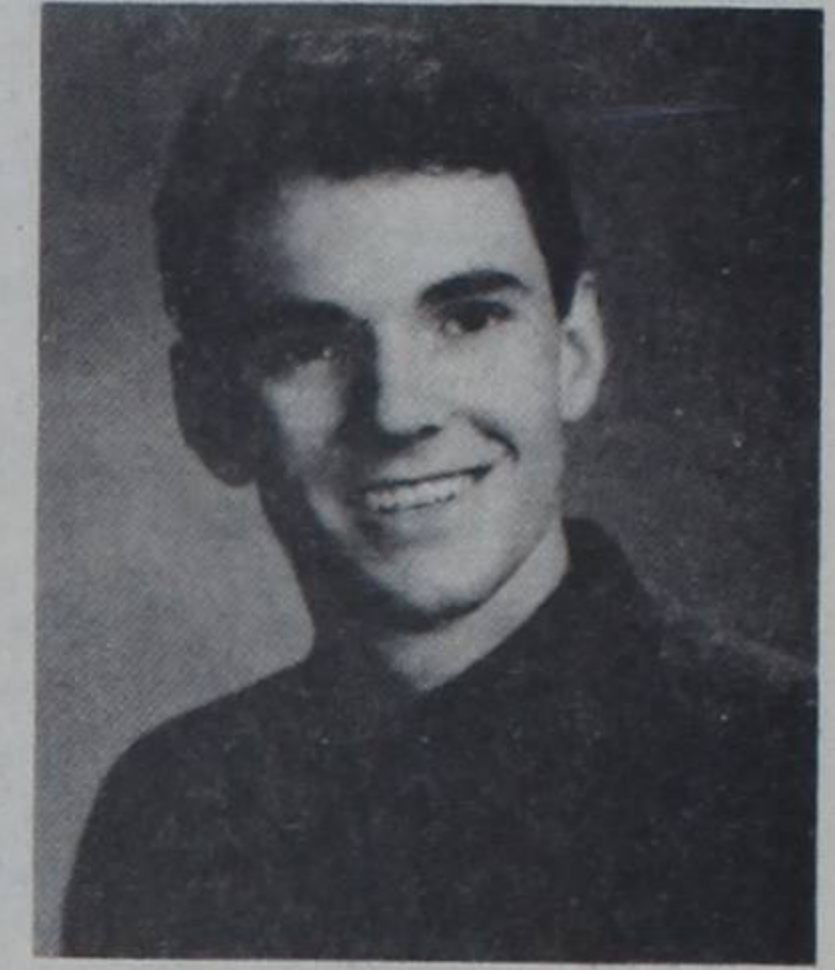
Superintendent Tom Jarboe reminds that Monday, May 25 will be a school holiday (Memorial Day), since no days were missed due to bad weather.

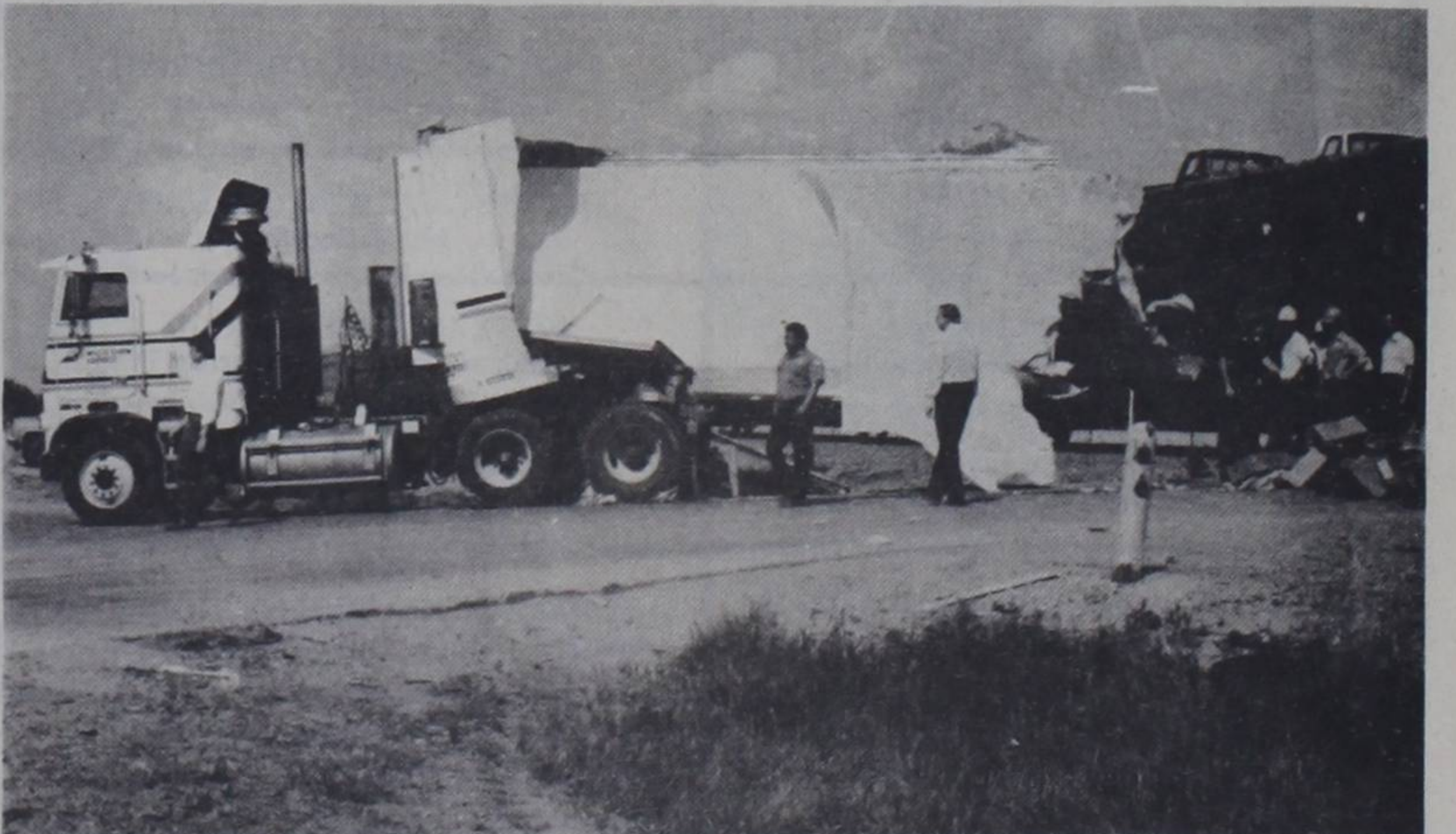

Buckle-Up Week Is Set May 18-25

A majority of Texans now fasten their safety belts, according to recent surveys by the Texas Transportation Institute.

If you're one of the minority, the Texas Coalition for Safety Belts hopes you'll give your belt a try during Texas Buckle-Up Week May 18-25.

Governor Bill Clements has issued a proclamation, and many Texas towns will be conducting safety belt awareness campaigns. The coalition will put special emphasis on the proper use of car seats for small children and on belt use by high school and college students.

"The week before Memorial Day is always a good time to promote safety belt use," said George R. Gustafson, president of Texas Safety Association and a spokesperson for the coalition. "The holiday weekend marks the beginning of the 101 Driving Days of Summer, when Texans hit the road in numbers and the risk of a wreck goes up. Many of our young people graduate and travel to new

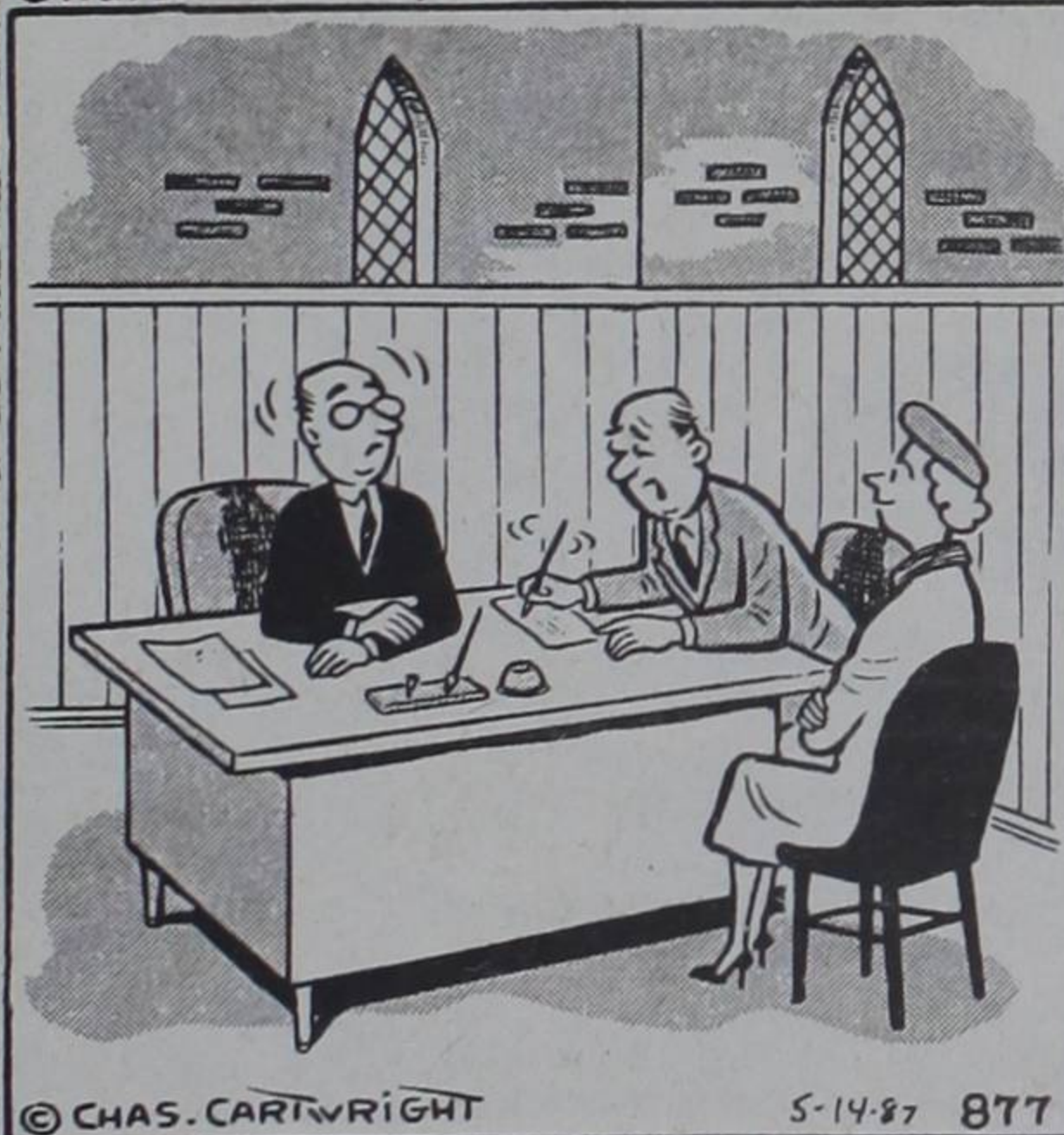
schools or jobs during this time.

"This year, with the speed limit going up to 65 miles per hour on rural interstates, the risk will be even higher," Gustafson added. "We'll have to work hard to keep up the good results we had in the first year under the safety belt law, when front-seat fatalities in cars and pickups decreased by seven per cent. And the 1987 survey by Texas Transportation Institute shows Texans are in need of a safety belt reminder."

In 1986, Texas had one of the highest belt-use rates in the nation, with 66 per cent of drivers buckling up in cars and light trucks. The latest survey, conducted in January, indicated usage had dropped to 59 per cent.

"That's still high, when you consider that the average for states with safety belt laws is 45 per cent," said Gustafson. "But Hawaii had a rate of 68 per cent for drivers and passengers last year, and North Carolina passed us this spring with rates above 70 per cent. Pride demands that we put Texas back on top."

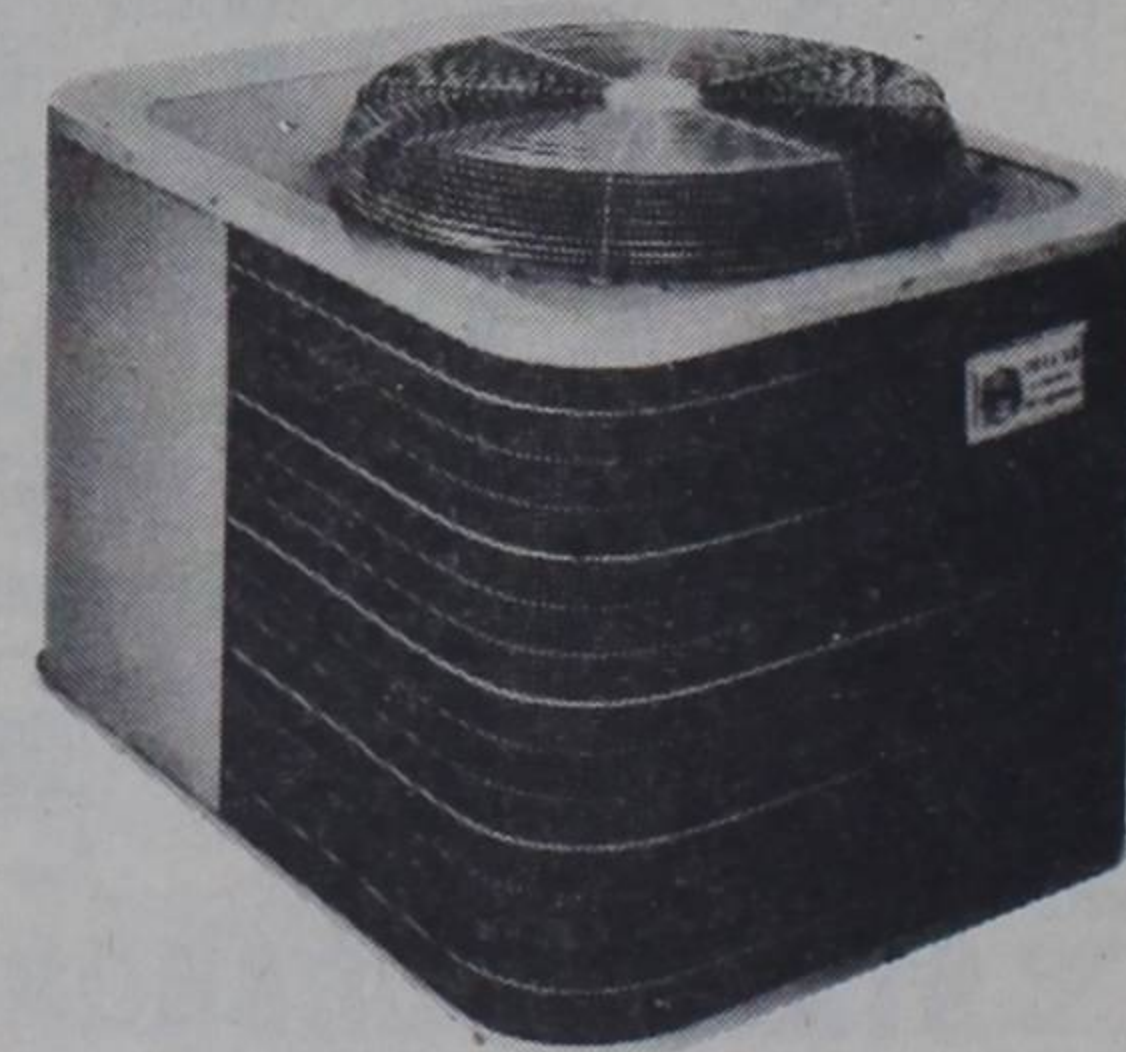

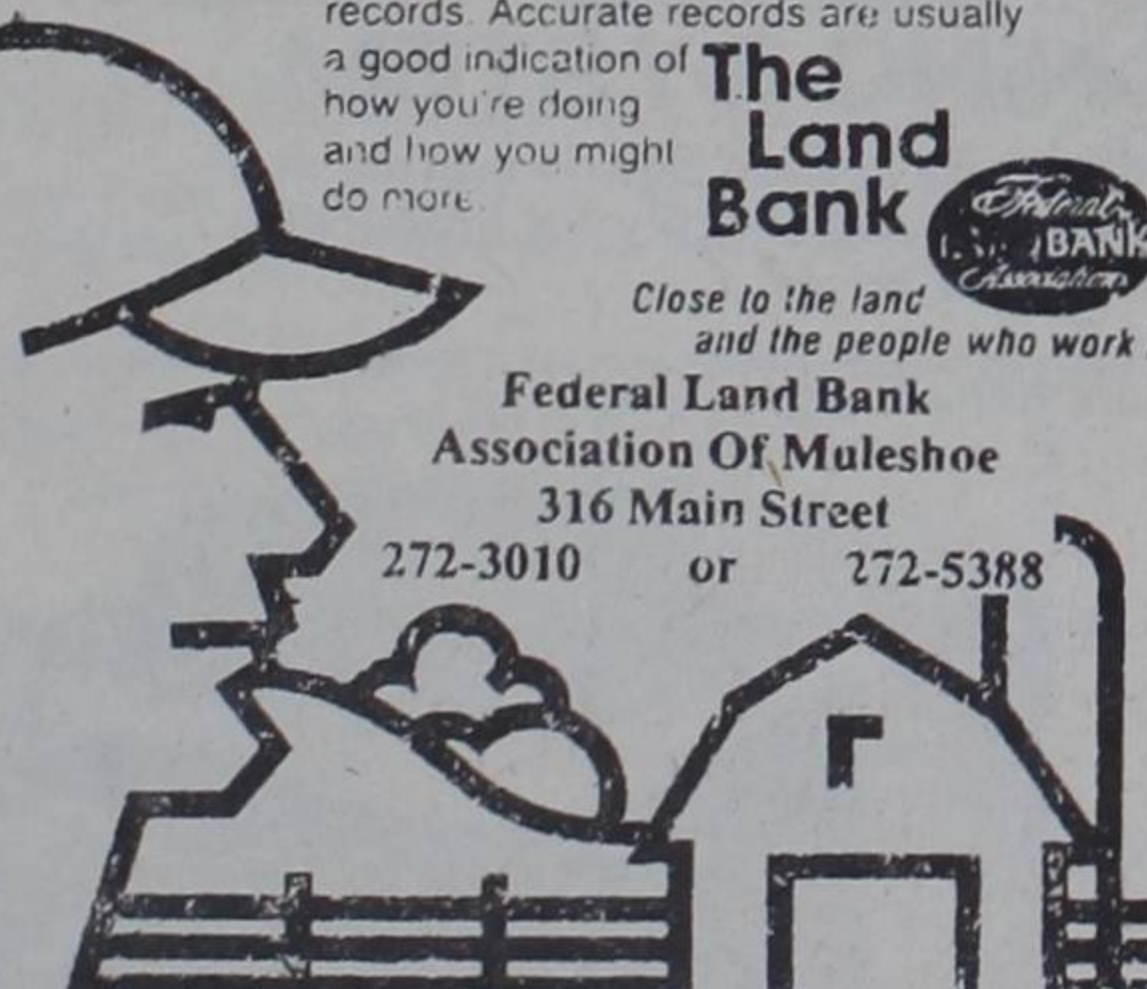

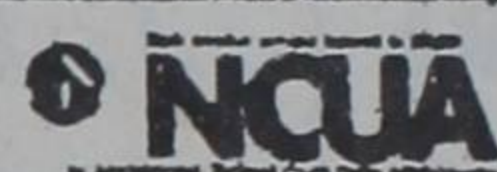

Four age groups will compete: 9 and under; 10 to 14; 15 to 18; and 19 and over.

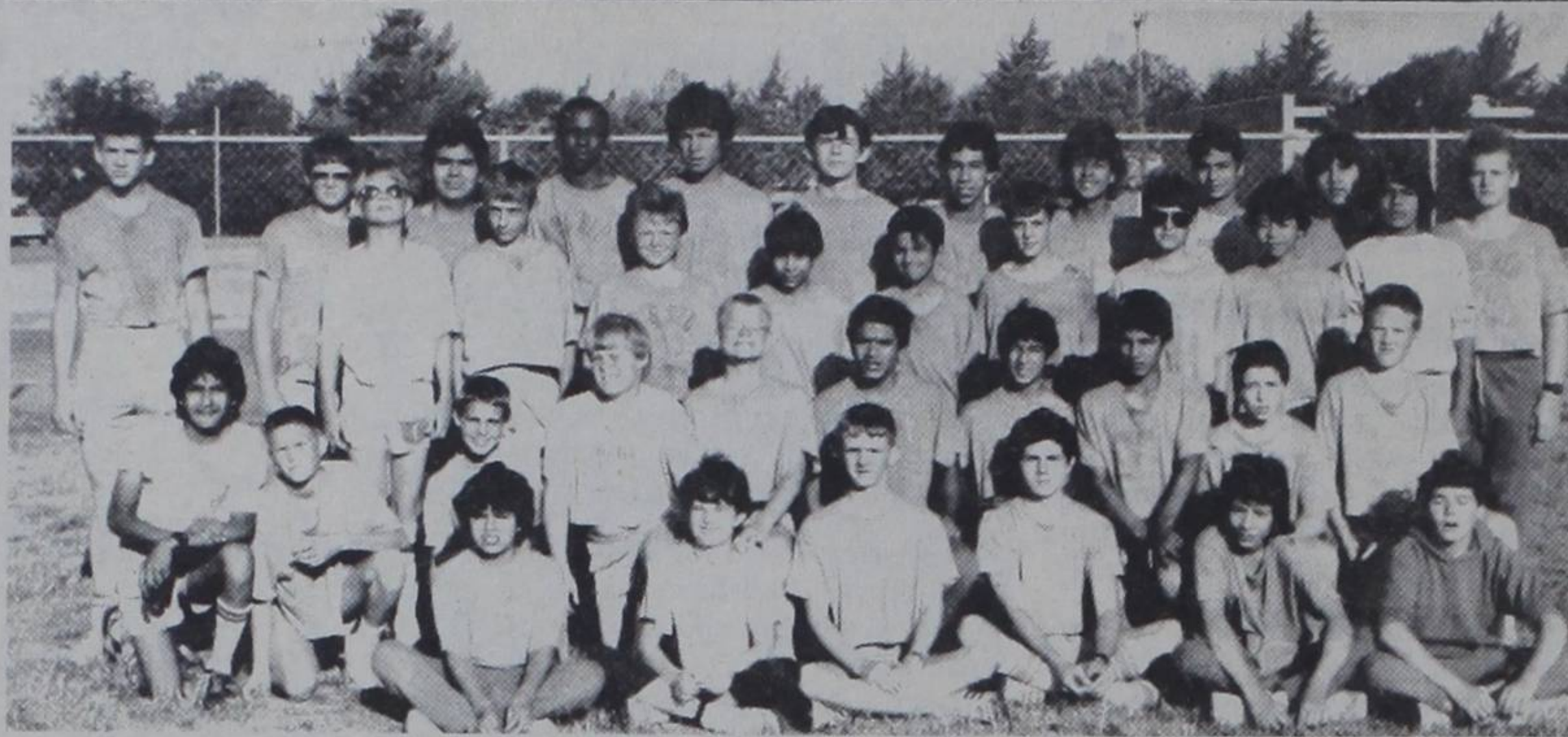

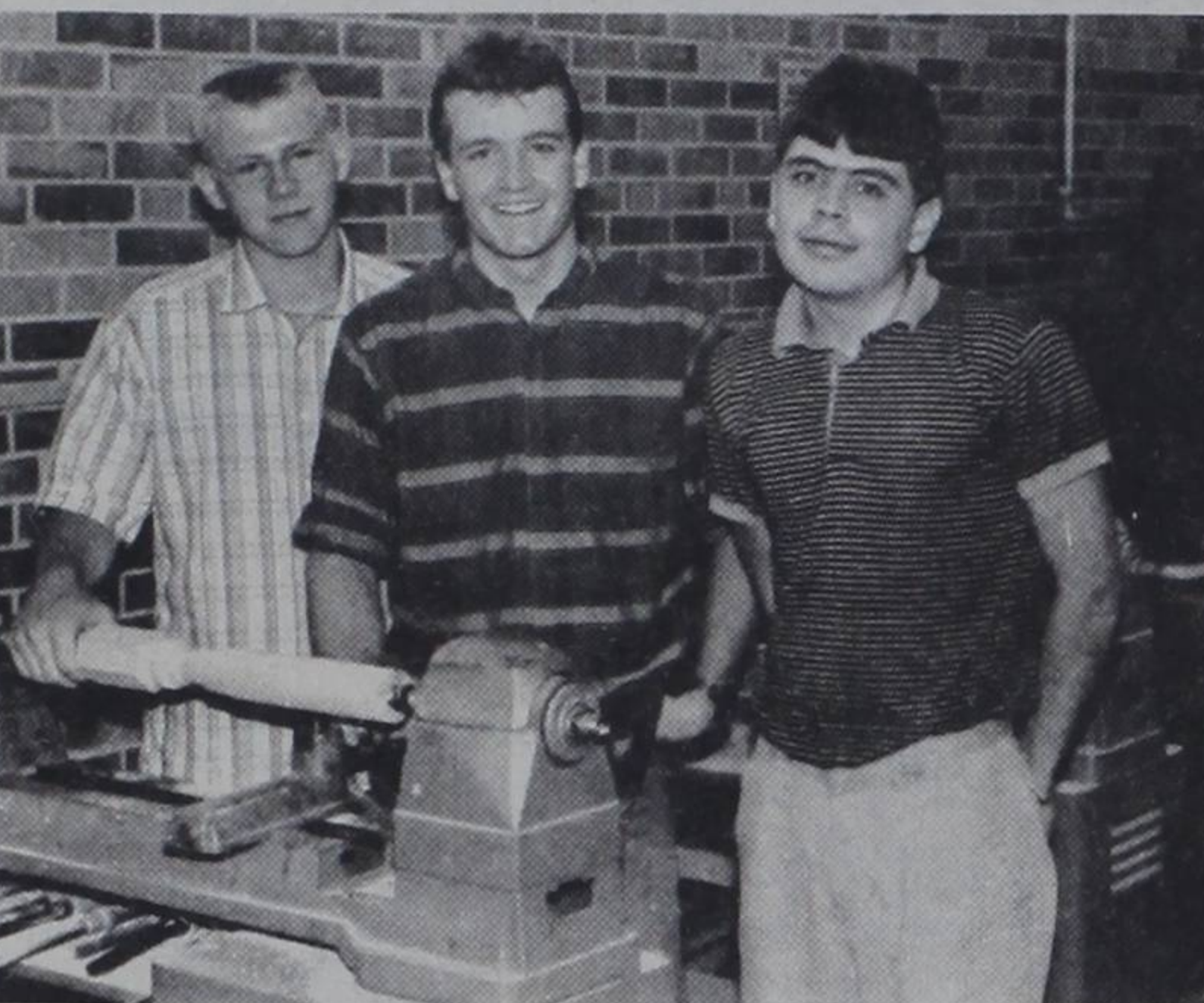
