a.m. today at the body of water. Justice of the Peace Bobby West pronounced the man dead at 10:45 a.m. today and ordered an autospy. Positive identification of the corpse has not been ascertained

The victim is believed to be Daniel Ortega Diaz, 25, of 503 S. Bell. Diaz was listed as missing since Sunday when he was last seen by friends in the

The three men had been drinking

"They (the other two) had gone to sleep," Susie said. "When they woke up, they found his stuff still there.'

Around 5 p.m. Galaviz and Calderon reported Diaz missing. Galaviz told police he had last seen Diaz swimming about 100 yards north of the

Parks and Wildlife men from the area dragged the lake all day Monday, unable to locate the body.

Carmen Viasana of 604 Abrams reported himself to Big Spring police around 10 a.m. yesterday. A warrant was served on Viasana for the murder of Leslie Dean Richardson, 17, of 608

Richardson died at 8:30 a.m. Saturday at Odessa's Medical Hospital from a small caliber gunshot wound to the right temple.

According to police reports, Richardson and a 16-year-old friend were driving around Big Spring Friday. The two picked up Viasana and the Mexican-American youth asked to be taken to Moss Creek Lake. Richardson refused the request.

Richardson a short time later dropped Viasana off to pick up some money. Shortly after, Richardson was shot while sitting in the driver's seat. The shooting occurred at Douglas and West Ninth around 11:50 p.m. Friday.

DALLAS (AP) — Federal judges are under protection because of a reported plot by a tax protest group to

U.S. Marshal Clint Peoples has asked police departments in the Dallas-Fort Worth area and in other sections of the Northern District of Texas to join his deputies in guarding

At least eight judges in the 100county district, which stretches from Dallas to the Panhandle, were guarded.

The right-wing tax protest group was to kill 50 judges and other officials in commando-style attacks to dramatize its contention that income taxes violate constitutional rights, the Dallas News reported

Fort Worth police confirmed they

assigned officers to protect U.S. District Judges Eldon Mahon and David O. Belew during the July Fourth weekend.

No attempts to kill officials have been reported recently.

'The security has relaxed somewhat since that time, but judges are still receiving protection." the News quoted one official as saving.

The two highest ranking officers in the department have expressed their intention not to apply for the police chief position. The top spot in the department was opened June 20 when City Manager Don Davis asked then police chief Stanley Bogart to resign. Sherrill Farmer, a captain at the

time of the administrative shake up, was named interim police chief. Farmer, a 24-year veteran with the force, said, "I haven't made ap-

plication for the job. He added, "I have told people I am not really interested in the job." The reason for the disinterest, he said, was

the political nature of the chief's job.

Farmer has been a captain with the police department for eight years. In that time, he has served as head of the uniform services — the detail concentrating on traffic, communications and the jail — and the criminal division. The criminal division includes the work of detectives, iden-

Patrol Capt. Claude Morris also said he will not apply for the police chief position "I haven't really been considering

it." Morris said. He added, "I don't think I even qualify. They are looking for someone

with four years of college Morris started with the police department here in 1956 and stayed on until 1964. That year he went to work for the Howard County Sheriff's Office. He returned to the Big Spring

Police Department in 1968. Davis said, "We haven't solicited applications from them." The city manager added that at the time of Bogart's firing, he asked Farmer if the captain was interested in the job Farmer said he was not

The city of Big Spring is currently advertising for a person to fill the position of police chief in the Texas Municipal League magazine and some criminology journals.

The qualifications the city is seeking, Davis said, are advanced

not come as much of a surprise. Consider, however, that the source of the forecast was the renowned "Old Farmer's Almanac," whose secret formula for predicting the weather has over the years become the envy of

others in the business. The almanac, established in 1792 and printed now in Dublin, N.H., bills itself as "America's oldest continuously published periodical." Its latest forecasts came in the 188th

Not that the almanac missed it altogether as far as sweltering Texans are concerned, however.

Texas and Oklahoma, the publication said, would have "warmer than average weather" from May through August. And the almanac did foresee "hot" weather for the region in mid-June, which is about when the current deadly heat wave began.

The almanac apparently wasn't giving away any secrets about the intensity of the hot spell. The National Weather Service reports that generally, temperatures across Texas have been about 20 degrees above

And while rain has been scarce in Texas, you wouldn't have known it from reading the almanac. It warned of possible flooding from "heavy rains" over northwest Texas after mid-June.

In one passage of the almanac, the editors boast of a "secret weather forecasting formula" and the "most modern scientific calculations based on solar activity.

1 Texas drought forces expected in Panhandle ranchers to cut herds

Texas ranchers are taking

their hungry cattle to market earlier this year, forced to sell by a merciless drought that has dried up feedland and made large herds too expensive to feed.

"The ranchers are having to sell their cattle a little early this year, and cut back their herds because they just don't have the pasture for them due to the drought conditions right now," said J.R. Taylor, manager of Amarillo Livestock Auction

While the early sales have not yet flooded the market. ranchers are making only small profits or just breaking even as more and more of them take their excess cattle to the stockvards.

Bobby Lee Henson of Hereford daughter breeder Walter Graham. said breeders are especially hard-hit by the weather.

"It (the effects if the drought) always hits breeders early on because the ranchers are cutting back on their herds instead of building up," said Mrs. Henson, who added that Graham also ranches near Happy. "They don't need bulls, and have to put more money toward feeding, so we tose customers "We weren't badly hurt

until last week," she said. Herd reduction has a domino effect on the whole cattle industry, she said.

"We lose customers, therefore we have to cut back on our own herd," Mrs. Henson said.

Dear Dr. Donohue: What is your opinion of having a gastric bypass done? How much overweight does one have to be and is there any danger? I have had a weight problem all my life. I lose on special diets, but then regain every bit, and then some. I have blood pressure problems and foot problems made worse by my weight. - J.S.

I consider the surgery a last resort. There are two different operations. In one, the lower end of the stomach is reattached to the lower end of the small intestine. That's an intestinal bypass. Food thus bypasses most of the small intestine, from where it is normally absorbed by the body

to which you refer bypass, specifically. Here, the surgeon makes the stomach into a smaller narrower pouch by sewing it up the middle. With smaller stomach capacity the person feels "filled" by less food, so eats less and loses weight

Both procedures are major ones but the sewing of the stomach does not have quite so many complications as does bypassing the small intestine.

There are many potential bypass problems. Diarrhea often results, kidney stones may form and there can liver complications. Also, bypassing the small intestine may lead to iron, vitamin and other

deficiencies. You do not for some reason mention your degree of overweight, which would be a prime consideration. Such surgery is usually reserved for grossly overweight patients for whom all other methods of weight loss have failed and in whom the obesity represents a severe threat

Several weeks ago the Supreme Court of the United States made one of the few decisions I have agreed with in many years. They ruled that the federal government did not have to pay for the abortions of women on

ALTHOUGH THE COURT and the country are widely divided on the issue. I feel that the ruling is a step in the right direction. I always have been opposed to abortion. I always will be opposed to the taking of an innocent life, whether it be inside or outside the mother's womb. Many critics of the decision to

uphold the Hyde Amendment say that it favors the rich and discriminates against the poor. Also, they argue that many more poor women will be endangering their lives by self-inflicted abortions. It seems these critics know no solution other than after-the-fact A Dallas television station reported

the case of a woman on welfare with three kids. She said she could not afford to feed any more children and that the ruling would prevent her from having abortions and would force her to feed other mouths

In my opinion, pro-abortionists and this woman should turn their attentions to preventing pregnancies instead of trying to end them. It would be a lot more practical and a lot less

I have no facts to back my opinion, but I feel that a few lessons in birth control would be less costly than to perform an abortion. Questionable ties

DETROIT - As evidence of his well-heralded gift for picking expert advisers. Ronald Reagan has chosen an erstwhile publicist for former Portuguese colonial interests — a registered foreign agent — as his chief foreign policy aide

Two others on the Reagan foreign policy team are current or former registered agents representing Israel. Two more Reagan campaign aides have been identified as agents for the Taiwanese government

REAGAN'S TOP foreign policy mestor, Richard V. Allen, was briefly a member of Richard Nixon's National Security Council. He fostered the impression that he was a Ph.D., and liked to be called "Dr. Allen." When it turned out that his doctoral thesis for the University of Munich had not yet been accepted, he reluctantly took a downgrading to just plain "Mr. Allen.

Allen abruptly departed the National Security Council in 1969, sources told my reporters Lucette Lagnado and Joe Spear, because of a personality conflict with Dr. Henry Kissinger (a genuine Ph.D.). Allen was later accused of having pressured the Grumman Corp. for contributions to Nixon's 1972 campaign, a charge he denied when called before a

congressional subcommittee Allen's Portuguese connection be gan in 1973 when he registered as a foreign agent for a trade association known as the Overseas Companies of Portugal This was a consortium of major Portuguese companies with major investments in the then colonies of Angola and Mozambique.

The consortium paid Allen \$60,000 a year to promote its interests. The companies hoped to persuade Americans - or at least Congress to support the Portuguese dictatorship's determination to hold onto its increasingly restive African colonies One of Allen's projects was a "foreign visitors program." which netted among others, Rep. Phil Crane, R-Ill. and his wife, who took a trip to Portugal, Angola and Mozambique in

Allen's efforts were in vain. The dictatorship collapsed in 1974 and the Portuguese empire crumbled, as did the business consortium that had propped it up

THE OTHER FORMER or current foreign agents in the Reagan camp are Uri Ra'anan, who represented Israel in the United States from 1959 to 1964; Rita Hauser, a New York attorney who is still a registered agent for Bank Hapoalim of Israel; Michael Deaver and Peter Hannaford, who are registered agents for the government of Taiwan

Footnote: Allen confirmed that he was an agent for the Portuguese consortium and he was not a Ph.D. saying "I can't help what people call me." tiny fraction of the American electorate had voted the other way - or stayed home - in 1976? How would Gerald Ford have handled the foreign and domestic crises that have beset Jimmy Carter? Ford himself has steadfastly

refused to comment on the gravest crisis to face Jimmy Carter - the Tehran hostage situation - until the hostages are freed. Monday morning quarterbacking would be a disservice. he feels. In general, Ford, knowing what a

backbreaking job the presidency is, has been reluctant to criticize Car ter's handling of the office. In addition, he and Carter have established a cordial relationship, though they meet infrequently.

But from those who are privy to Ford's thinking, I have pieced together a "What if?" list of the ways he would have responded to the Carter

crises Foreign policy: Ford blames much of Carter's trouble on the president's vacillation and confusion, his failure to act decisively as Ford himself did in the Mayaguez incident. Firmness and quick action, he feels, should have been shown on the Soviet brigade in Cuba, the Iranian crisis and the Afghanistan invasion.

Economy: Ford would not have chosen an anti-inflation course based on creating unemployment, and would have cracked down on foreign imports that cost American jobs.

Politics: Ford finds especially distasteful Carter's habit of milking every situation for political advantage. He would not have linked the hostage crisis to the campaign with a "Rose Garden" strategy, and would never have sniped at Cyrus Vance publicly

Congress: Ford deplores Carter's bungled relations with Capitol Hill, citing in particular the polarization over the Panama Canal treaties which he feels he could have avoided.

GAME PLAN: Here's how John Anderson hopes to win — that's right win — in November: He will choose a prominent Democrat to join him on the independent ticket Heading Anderson's list are two

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Three die trying to protect bowling alley from burglars

HOUSTON (AP) - When a northside bowling alley was burglarized this weekend, four young people volunteered to stay overnight as protection against further robberies. During the night, three were shot to death, execution-style.

Investigators said they hoped the lone survivor of the bloodbath — a teen-ager who was shot in the head - could give them a clue to help track the killers.

Investigators speculated that robbery was the motive for the bloody break-in. About \$800 was taken from a cash register near the bodies, police said. The four were apparently told to lie on the floor and then each was shot once in the head.

"Hate," said Betty Rappe, a bowling alley employee and friend of the victims. "That's all it could be. Hate."

Police identified those killed as Stephen Allen Sims, 25, assistant manager of Fair Lanes Windfeyn Bowling Center in northwest Houston; Tommy Lee Temple, a 17year-old employee of the alley; and Temple's girlfriend, Arden Alane Felsher, also

Gregory Garner, 18, also an employee, was in critical condition following the shootings and authorities said he may lose

Garner's father, Ira, found the bodies early Monday when his son called home for help, unable to speak clearly.

'How do you describe four bodies lying there, three of them dead?" asked the elder Garner. "It was a nightmare.

Officials said the four young people stayed at the alley after the 11:30 p.m. closing time Sunday, one day after thieves made off with change from cigarette and game machines.

"They just wanted to feel like the building was secure," said Fair Lanes spokesman Jim Self. "I'm sure they never imagined someone would show up.'

Miss Rappe said Temple was a personable high school senior who had worked at the alley since it opened last year and who hoped to become a professional bowler.

"He was probably the most popular employee out here," she said. "All he ever wanted to do was bowl.


Police said the first indication something was wrong at the alley was when Garner's parents received a telephone call from their

"I left. I didn't know he was hurt until I arrived," said the elder Garner. Police said the teen-ager told his mother on the phone, "They just left, my head's bleeding. When Garner's father arrived at the alley.

he found the front door open and saw the three bodies lying face down in their own blood. Temple and Sims already were dead. Miss Felsher died at the scene a short while later, authorities said. Police said they attempted to get some

information from the younger Garner before he lost consciousness. The murder site, they said, provided few, if any clues to the killers.

Garner said he asked his son if he knew the gunmen. His son said, "No.

Indians winning back land, rights

BOULDER, Colo. (AP) — Sixteen lawyers hunting and fishing rights. — 10 of them Indians, all of them experts in treaty law and in water, fishing and hunting rights - are working to right two centuries of wrongs.

Members of the Native American Rights Fund, they are part of the crop of young, resourceful Indian attorneys nurtured by a 1967 scholarship fund set up for Indians who

wanted to be lawyers The new lawyers are today winning back in court lands and rights lost at the treaty table and on the battlefield over a period of

At the heart of this effort is the Native American Rights Fund, whose director, John Echohawk, 34, is a Pawnee who went to

law school on a government scholarship. Echohawk says that besides winning back lands and rights in court for the roughly 1 million U.S. Indians, the NARF has striven to convince Indians they can resist assimilation.

Half of the nation's Indian population still lives on reservations, he noted.

"Until recently, Indians have accepted what the government told them, because they had no advocates. People are brainwashed into following what the government has told them," he said.

This is changing because the fund and other Indian rights advocates are wielding government statutes and the Constitution with a vengeance in the courtrooom

In its first 10 years, the fund has:

rights on the Great Lakes from encroachment by the state of Michigan. Assisted Indians in the Puget Sound area of Washington to get the right to catch

reservation fishing places. the Cheyenne-Arapaho tribes in the fund.

The fund is also on the verge of settling a huge land claim case in Maine, where the Passamaquoddy and Penobscot tribes are trying to recover 12.5 million acres of land and billions of dollars. A proposed settlement before Congress would give the tribes 300,000 acres and \$27 million in a trust

The fund, which operates on money from government, foundations and individuals, is celebrating its 10th anniversary.

Echohawk credits the fund's emphasis on Indian treaty law for its success. At first, he said, the fund looked to black and Chicano groups as models, but its leaders quickly decided that tribal sovereignty - rather than civil rights - should be the fund's chief

"Indians, in effect, are the third sovereign in the country, with states and the federal government the other two," Echohawk said.

'Until recently. Indians have been subjected to heavy-handed, paternalistic federal policy. If there was any consistent federal policy before, it was that tribes would be assimilated and would go out of

"Congress just assumed that Indians wanted to be like everyone else. Indians didn't want this. They wanted to live as tribes on their land.

Until the 1960s, Echohawk said, the federal government's pursued a relentless drive to strip Indians of tribal status. Protected the Chippewa tribe's fishing Without tribal status, tribal lands go on state and local tax rolls and soon the land is gone. "Too many of them (Indians) end up on

Gary Swaye, assistant executive director of Sherman Oaks Community Hospital, said the 39year-old comedian's condition was upgraded from serious to satisfactory after undergoing the surgery Monday.

Dr. Jack Grossman grafted skin to Pryor's neck, back arms and chest in the latest operation and should be able to tell by this weekend if Pryor has to undergo further surgery, Swaye said.

Pryor was burned on the upper half of his body in an accident June 9 at his home.

Wallace 'somewhat improved

PORTLAND, Ore. (AP) - After three weeks of special treatment to relieve his pain and discomfort caused by paralysis, former Alabama Gov. George Wallace was heading home feeling "somewhat improved.

Wallace told reporters as he was being wheeled out the door of the Oregon Health Sciences Center Monday that he he will continue his treatments with the controversial drug dimethyl sulfoxide, DMSO,

"I feel somewhat improved, but it remains to be seen what permanent effect it will have," he said. The drug is approved only for use as a treatment for a rare liver ailment, except at selected institutions, such as the Oregon center, where it is being tested.

Tax reduction won't be part of Carter review

WASHINGTON (AP) — Despite calls for a tax cut to stimulate the slumping economy, President Carter won't propose a tax reduction next week as part of his mid-year budget review, administration sources say

Carter met with his top economic advisers in Georgia last weekend and made it clear he wants to resist mounting pressures from rival Republicans and congressional Democrats for a tax reduction in an election year, the sources, who declined to be identified, said

As a result, the administration has chosen to assume no tax cut in predicting the direction of the economy for the rest of 1980 and all of 1981 when it releases its mid-year review next Monday.

All Carter is expected to do is repeat support for a tax reduction sometime in the future, but there will be no timetable, these sources emphasize.

Eventually, the administration hopes to draft a tax cut aimed in large part to spur productivity and encourage

business investment, officials say. Ronald Reagan, who will be nominated by the Republicans for president this week, has proposed a \$36 billion tax reduction for next year, and Democratic senators are planning to unveil a counterproposal of their own by September, with hopes of enacting a tax bill before

the end of this year The mid-year review will offer sharply revised budget estimates for fiscal 1980, which ends Sept. 30, and fiscal 1981 — the result of a worsening recession that has cut tax revenues and increased spending, particularly for

unemployment benefits The administration now predicts the federal deficit will swell to about \$60 billion in fiscal 1980, compared to the \$36.5 billion gap it estimated in March. At that time, Carter revised earlier 1981 budget proposals and offered a small surplus for the fiscal year that starts Oct. 1.

Hopes of a surplus, or even a balanced budget, in fiscal 1981 will be officially laid to rest in the mid-year review, with the administration expected to estimate a \$25 to \$30 billion 1981 deficit, sources said.

Both fiscal 1980 and 1981 projections do not assume a tax cut, which would considerly widen the deficits. Private economists estimate that with a tax cut, the 1981 budget gap would exceed \$50 billion.

The mid-year review also will dramatically increase estimates of unemployment.

Carter economic advisers now see joblessness rising to 8.5 percent by the end of 1980 and remaining near that level through 1981, sources said.

BAPTIZED UNTO MOSES IN THE CLOUD AND IN THE SEA Recently I was asked to give an explanation of 1 Corinthians 10:1-2. This was in regard to the definition given to "baptism" from another article.
The question was this: If baptism means immersion or complete overwhelming, then how could this have been done in the case of the Israelites crossing the sea when it was dry? First of all, this is an excellent and thought provoking question. However, like all questions that propose problems, there is an answer. Consider, if you will, this answer! We can see first of all that all the fathers were under the cloud and passed through the sea. Note the word all in verse one, for it will become an important word in consideration of the act of baptism. It was essential; yea imperative for all the Israelites to cross the sea. If they would have waited on the other side in disobedience, they would have all been slaughtered. They had to believe in Moses. They had to stop murmuring and trust in the hand of Jehovah to deliver. This baptism, whatever you presently believe it to mean, was the act in which Israel became free. This baptism was the dividing line between Egyptian bondage and freedom. Whatever the baptism means, without it the Israelites are lost! Therefore, all must be baptized in the cloud and in the sea. Baptism is a burial (Rom. 6:4). With two walls of water on each side and a cloud over them, the fathers were buried from the sight of Pharaoh and the Egyptians. However, they argue with Paul who says they were "under the cloud," "in the cloud." The language of Paul implies that the cloud was in front of them which made them under it, and in it as it passed to their rear. Read Exodus 14:19 for that confirmation. Let's return next week for a conclusion on the



The facilities are perhaps the best of any Olympic Games — a stadium which seats 103,000; other venues comparable with those anywhere; a press center which is both spacious and functional. New, modern hotels have risen over the skyline. Accommodations are generally exceptional.

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

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
