LAST WEEK we discussed the state's prison system, in relation to the types of people who make up the system.

It is well known by most Texas residents that our prisons are full to overflowing. In fact, it has come to the point that prison officials have been obligated in recent months and years to give certain prisoners early releases so as to have room for newly-sentenced prisoners.

The prison dilemma was one of the problems addressed by the Texas Legislature in their recently-concluded session, and unfortunately, one of the matters that was not resolved by the lawmakers.

On a recent Friday, the prison system released some 225 inmates, whom the officials deemed suitable for early release, mainly so they could admit another 225 prisoners the following Monday.

The question in Ye Editor's mind is: Do the 225 prisoners being admitted this week pose any more of a threat to society than those released to make room for the new crop?

They say that necessity is the mother of invention, and prison officials have come up with a new device that they bestow on certain low-risk inmates who are given early release.

These prisoners are fitted with special anklets, which contain electronic devices which allow the authorities to find them if they are not at home, where they are supposed to be. These low-risk prisoners are released to their homes until such times as their sentences have expired.

The anklets cannot be removed (at least that's what they say), and prisoners would find themselves in a worse set of circumstances if they were to find a way to remove the devices.

Since it costs taxpayers roughly \$12,000 per year for each person in our prison system, the "anklet" system effects a nice saving, since these prisoners can be maintained for \$9.00 to \$11.00 per day, or around \$4,000 per year.

The overcrowding problem is one that has affected not only the state prisons, but also certain city and county jails, such as Amarillo's.

Parmer County's adequate jail has been able to host several prisoners who were "farmed out" to the county by larger cities with cramped facilities. The county has been able to receive reimbursement for providing for prisoners in this manner.

It may be recalled by those who attended the meetings a few years ago on stimulating the local economy that one of the ideas brought out was to attempt to get a new prison built in the local area. While some folks might not want to have a prison in their backyard, it's sort of like some potential industries which have drawbacks--and some communities will make a big effort along this line.

There are those who say that the solution to the prison problem lies in the establishment of privately-owned and operated prison institutions. The private sector, many people argue, could come up with a way to cope with the problem, take it off the state's hands, and turn the prison system into a profit-making venture.

This may be possible, but it definitely would present one of the biggest challenges the private sector ever had.

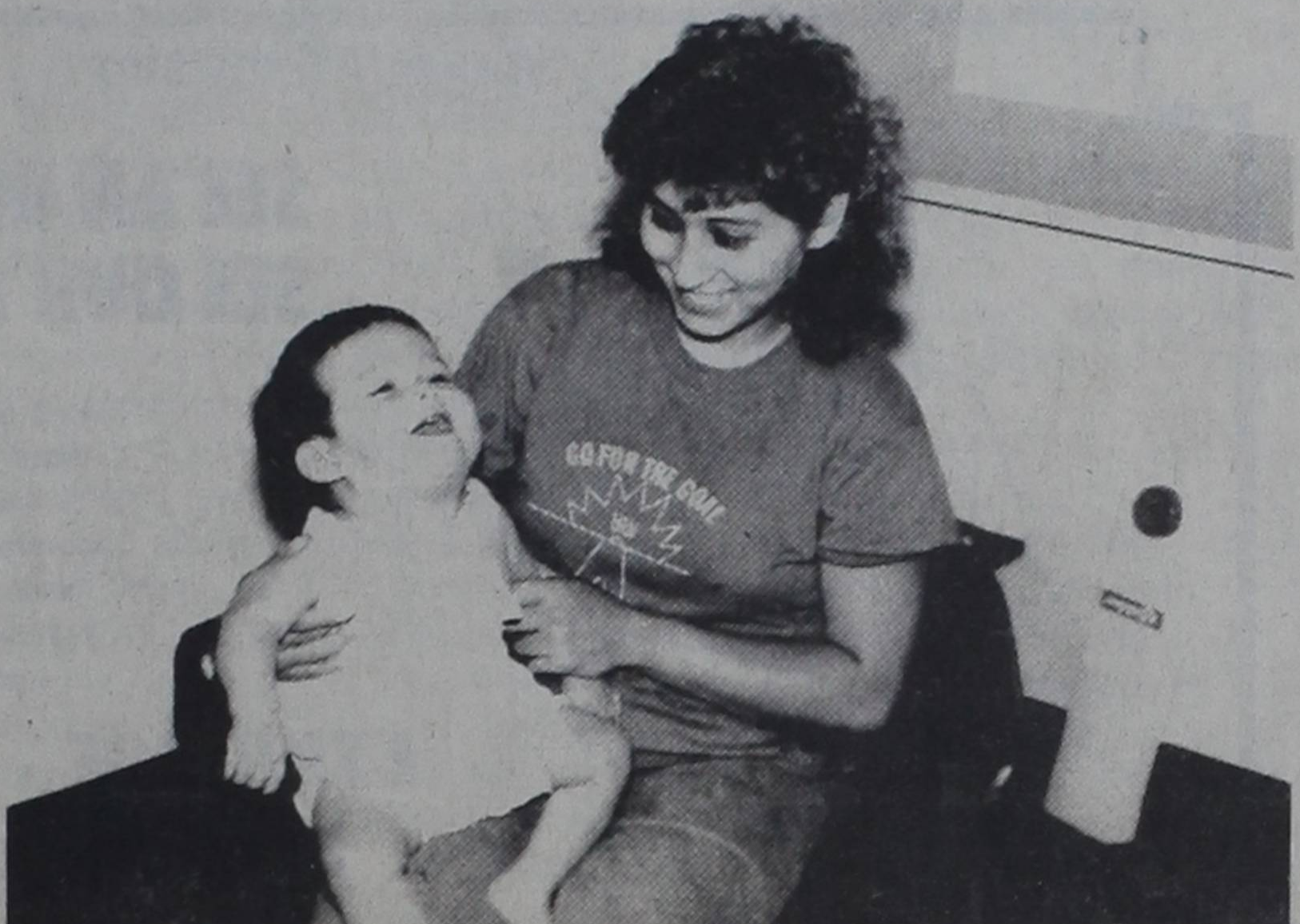
At any rate, our prison system remains a problem, and one that is likely to be with us for awhile. Like so many of our present problems, this one has not developed overnight. Likewise, it's going to take some time to resolve.

Kimberly Carrera suffers from hydrocephalus (water on the brain). She was born 28 weeks premature after her mother suffered a ruptured appendix while five months pregnant. The infant weighed only two pounds, nine ounces at birth.

The baby was born at Deaf Smith General Hospital in Hereford, December 8, 1985, and was shortly transferred to Northwest Texas Hospital in Amarillo. She was in the hospital four months before being allowed to come home, but has been in and out of hospitals ever since.

Kimberly has undergone 20 surgeries in her short lifetime. In addition to her major problem, she has been hospitalized for whooping cough, and had yellow jaundice when first born.

The youngster spent six weeks in a Dallas hospital in January when the tube that was inserted in her head was causing infection.

Just a week ago, the Carreras took young Kimberly to Dallas for a checkup. The doctors did a cat scan, and told the family he was impressed with the infant's progress. She will have to go back to Dallas in another six months for a followup.

Mrs. Carrera (Delia) said that hospital bills have totalled over \$250,000. Insurance has covered most of the expenses, but the family currently owes about \$1200 in hospital expenses, she said.

Carrera currently works as a meat cutter at Excel Corp., but was employed at Millard Warehouse when Kimberly was born.

Members of the Easter Opry Road Show are mostly from Hereford. However, some local talent is being lined up to join the group for the special benefit.

Last summer a similar benefit concert was held in honor of the Larry White family, and proved very successful.

FROM MAY HAILSTORM

Local Roof Damage Affects 700 Homes

If you have noticed an upsurge in carpenters and roofers during the past couple of weeks, it's because a high percentage of Friona's homes are having to have new roofs, following what has been described as the worst hailstorm to hit the city in the past 30 years.

The hailstorm of May 24 covered at least 35 per cent of the town. It has been estimated that 600 to 700 homes suffered severe damage during the storm.

"The worst of the damage occurred west of Grand Street, although another area in the northeast part of town also was hit hard," said Wendell Gresham, a partner in Ethridge-Spring Agency. "This is the worst storm from a loss standpoint in the 20 years I've been in Friona. All of the local roofing people are busy, and there may be ten to fifteen out-of-town roofing concerns in town," Gresham said.

Gresham said it was virtually impossible to make a dollar estimate on the storm's damage, saying some of the roofs replaced will cost in the neighborhood of \$2500, and some of the wood shingle roofs will run around \$8,000.

Gresham said that according to what he had seen and heard, businesses on Main Street weren't hurt much by the storm. The junior high and grade schools' roofs suffered only minor damage, while the high school building's roof was badly damaged. Some damage was reported at the nursing home, hospital and bank.

In addition to the roofs, other property also suffered, including cars. Gresham said the losses to cars was averaging from \$1,000 to 2,000. The car lots at Reeve \$2,000. The car lots at Reeve Mercury sustained heavy damage. "It could have been a lot worse. The hail could have been baseball-sized, and then we'd have had a lot of bad leaks. The damage we had was not that severe, and there were very few emergencies in getting the roof work done," Gresham said.

Another positive angle from the hailstorm is the fact that the increased building activity has stimulated the local economy to some extent.

"We're doing as much business as possible with the local lumberyard. We're getting some financing at the local bank. We personally have a 20-man crew. They are eating meals here, and buying things at the grocery stores, and so forth," said Garry Mann, owner of West Texas Roofing of Amarillo.

A few extra summer jobs were created for young men who didn't mind climbing onto the roofs and

working outdoors.

Motels have been doing a brisk business, as not only roofers but insurance adjusters have helped

the local motels' business in recent weeks. At one time, it was said that Farm Bureau had nine adjusters in town.

June 22 through July 3 are the dates for this year's 1987 Summer Drama Workshop, sponsored by the Friona Fine Arts Council.

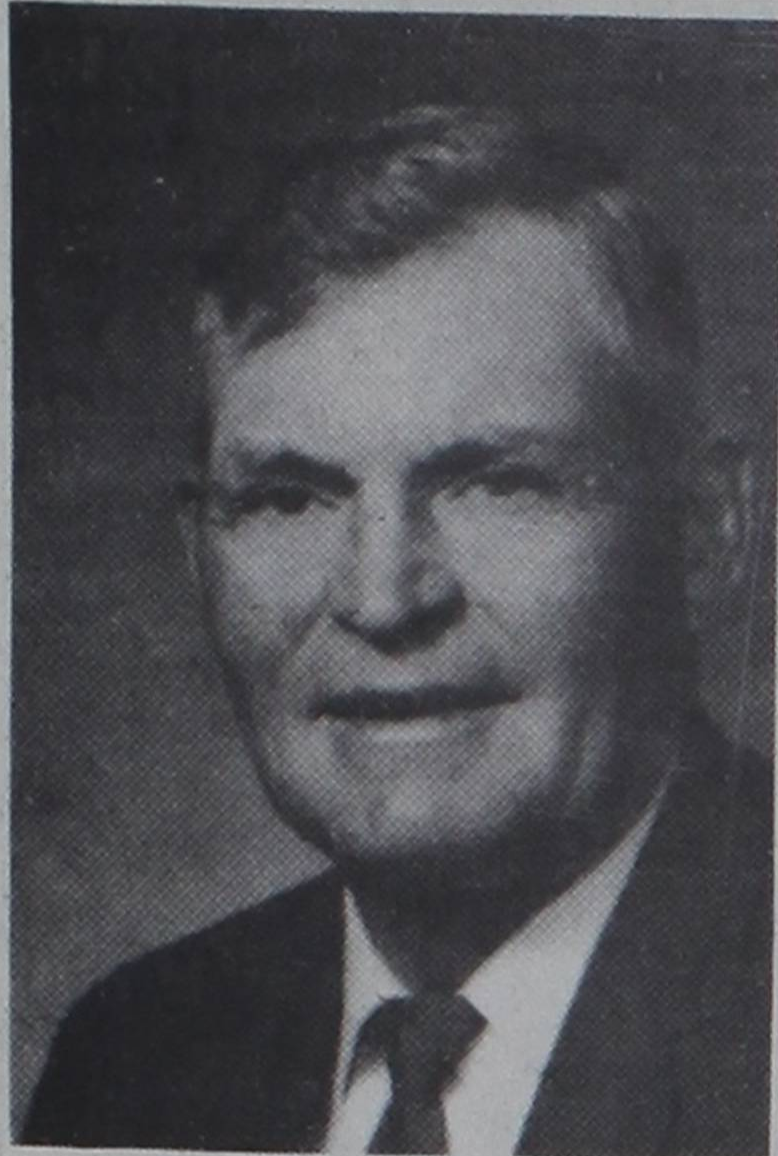
Forms may be picked up at 1615 W. 10th Street or 213 West 8th Street.

55 YEARS AGO--JUNE 17, 1932

The city commission held a called meeting Monday night in the office of the secretary, with the mayor and both commissioners present, and discussed ways and means of collecting funds with which to meet payment for the water meters, which the city has been installing during the past few weeks. Water Superintendent, L.G. Sympon, reported that the entire city is now under meter with the exception of about ten places, and meters were at that time ordered to fill out this list.

45 YEARS AGO--JUNE 5, 1942

A chance to get real variety in their entertainment diet is offered Friona people next Thursday night, June 11, when the play "Miss Jimmy" will be presented at the Friona Grade School auditorium. The city's newest eating establishment will feature drive-up speakers, the first in Friona, and will also cater to those who wish to eat inside.

A.W. Anthony, Sr. and Ralph G. Wilson were re-elected to terms as directors for the Friona Wheat Growers, Inc., at the 28th annual meeting Tuesday night at Friona High School. A total of \$370,059.33 is to be distributed to members this year as dividends. With 1,654 checks to be issued, this is an average of \$223.70.

20 YEARS AGO--JUNE 8, 1967

A feed manufacturing plant will be built in Friona, it was announced this week by a group of Friona businessmen. Construction is slated to begin as soon as possible. The plant, which will manufacture primarily feedlot supplements and range pellets, will be located just east of the Friona

city limits on the south side of Highway 60. The plant will employ seven or eight men. Ron Davenport has been hired as manager of the new plant, which is scheduled to open this fall.

10 YEARS AGO--JUNE 19, 1977

The Friona City Council voted in a called session Friday to purchase an all-new containerized trash system for the city. A bid by the Pak-Mor company of San Antonio in the amount of \$80,834 was accepted by the council in a brief meeting. The system is expected to not be operational until December of this year, at which time the city's system of barrel trash cans will be done away with.

5 YEARS AGO--JUNE 13, 1982

Parmer County was once again hit by stormy weather Thursday evening, and the loss toll may once again be high in some areas. Greatest loss from the storm appeared to be at Bovina Feeders, located 6½ miles west of Clay's Corner. A spokesman for the feeding operation said Friday morning that at least 500, maybe 1,000, head of cattle were drowned. There were 21 pens under water after the storm. It

hailed for 2-2½ hours, from marble to golf-ball in size, and came a flood of rain. Golf-ball sized hail was also reported southwest of Friona. At press time, the exact number of cattle lost at the feeding operation was unknown, because it was slow work, having to pull the dead cattle out one at a time with bulldozers and tractors.

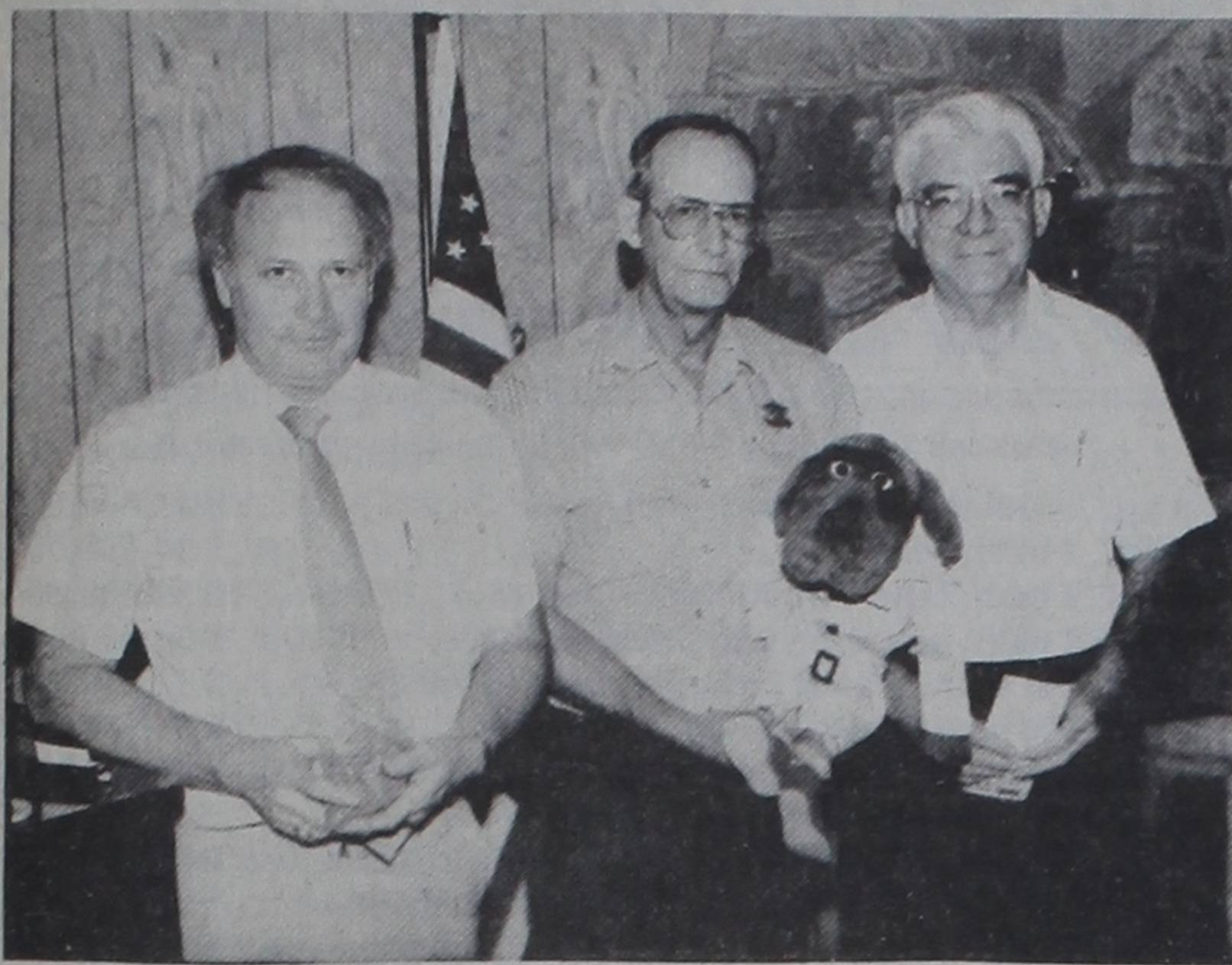

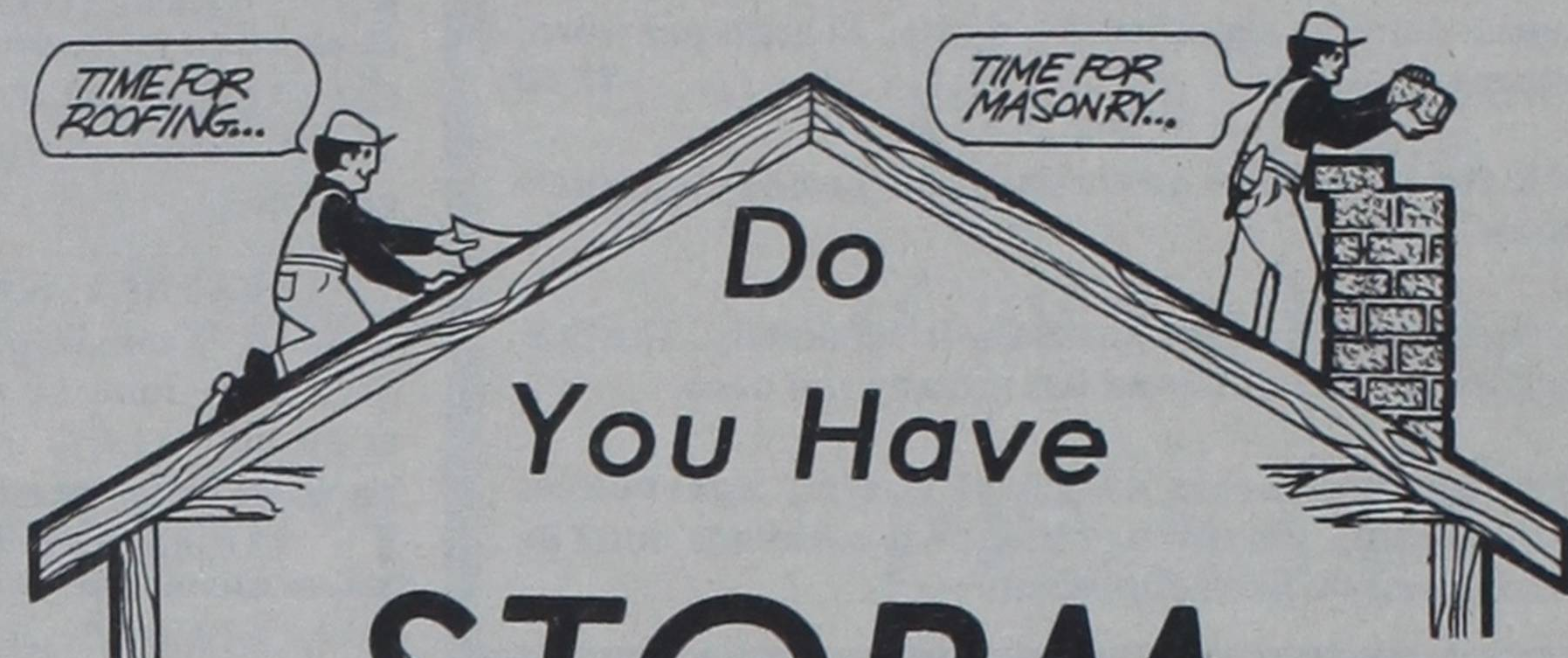

Warren Excels At Duke

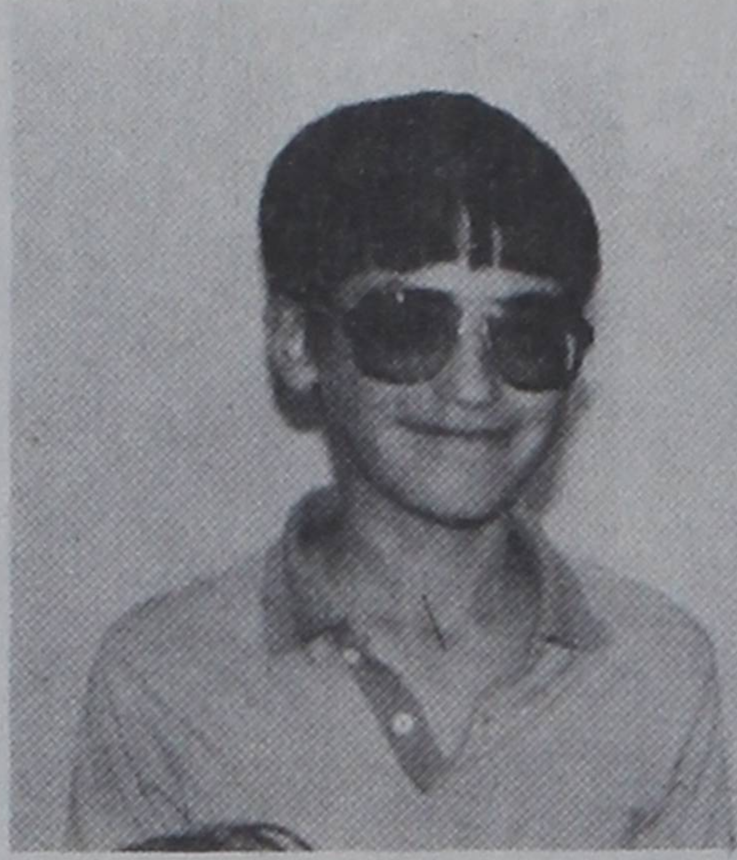
James Warren, a seventh grade student in Friona Junior High School, participated in Duke University's Seventh Annual Search for mathematically and verbally brilliant students.

KENNY CARR, son of Kenneth and Betty Jean (Gore) Carr of Mineola, graduated from Mineola High School and was the class salutatorian with a 97.62 average. Carr plans to attend Texas A&M University. Bob Spohn of Friona is his great-uncle. Mary Ford is his great-grandmother and Florence Ford Gore is his grandmother. They are all former residents of Friona. Carr was also named winner of the 1987 DeKalb Agricultural Accomplishment Award.

The students took the Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT), a college entrance test, as participants in Duke University's Talent Identification Program (TIP).

There were 7,712 seventh graders or 12-year-olds who participated in the program. Of these 1,675 scored equal to or greater than 500 on SAT-Math or SAT-Verbal. There were 293 with SAT-Verbal greater than or SAT-Math greater than 600, or combined score of 1,000.

"Einstein's Universe" for scoring 600 or above on the math portion of the SAT and received a book "The Elements of Style" for scoring 1,000 or above on the combined verbal and math SAT score. He will attend the Duke University Summer Talent Identification Program June 28-July 18, at Duke University, Salem, North Carolina.

The Talent Identification Program was established in 1980 to identify bright young students, to help develop their special abilities, and to direct them toward special academic programs for the gifted and talented. These seventh grade students scored equal to or greater than 50 per cent of college-bound high school seniors on the SAT test.

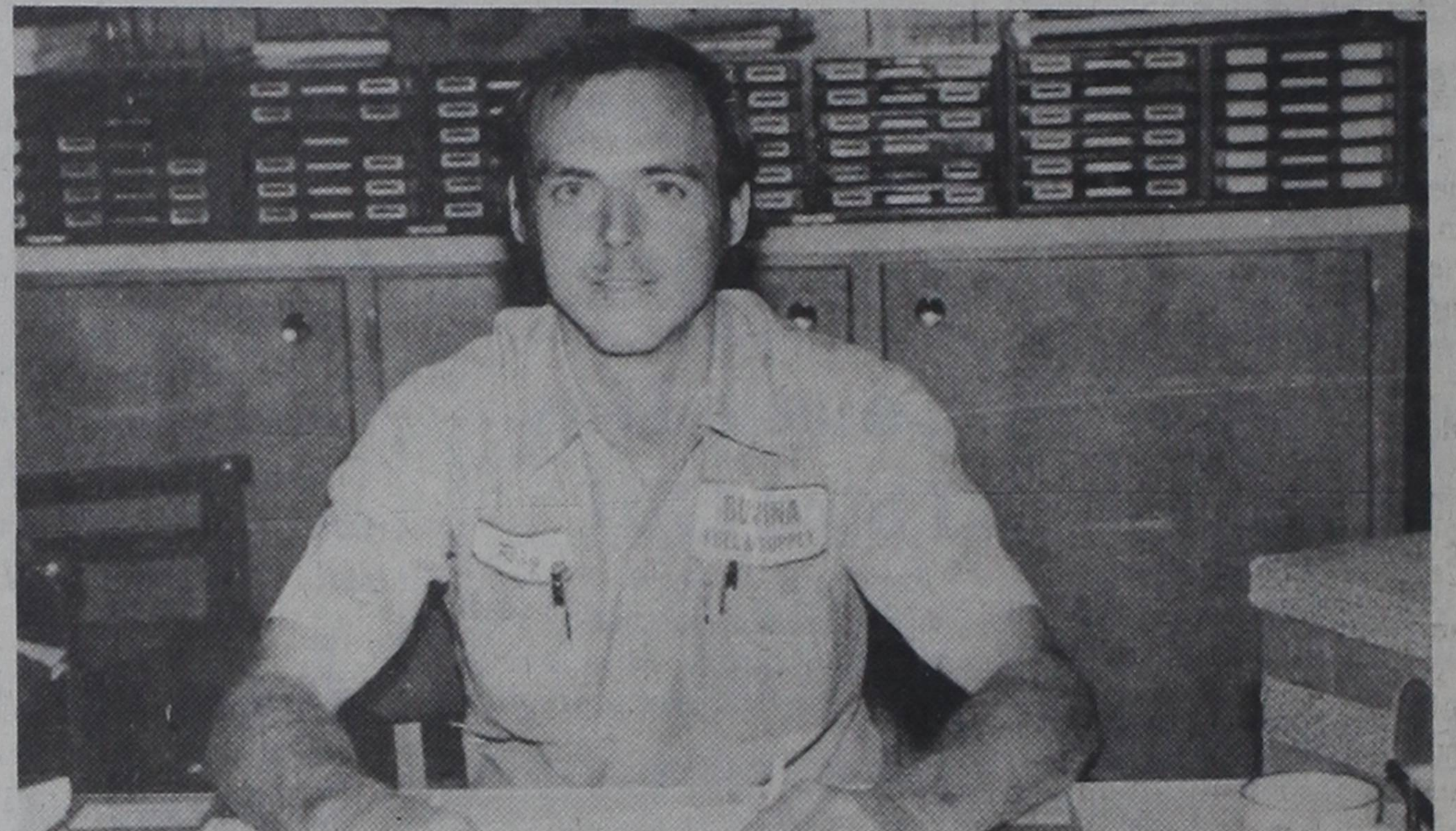

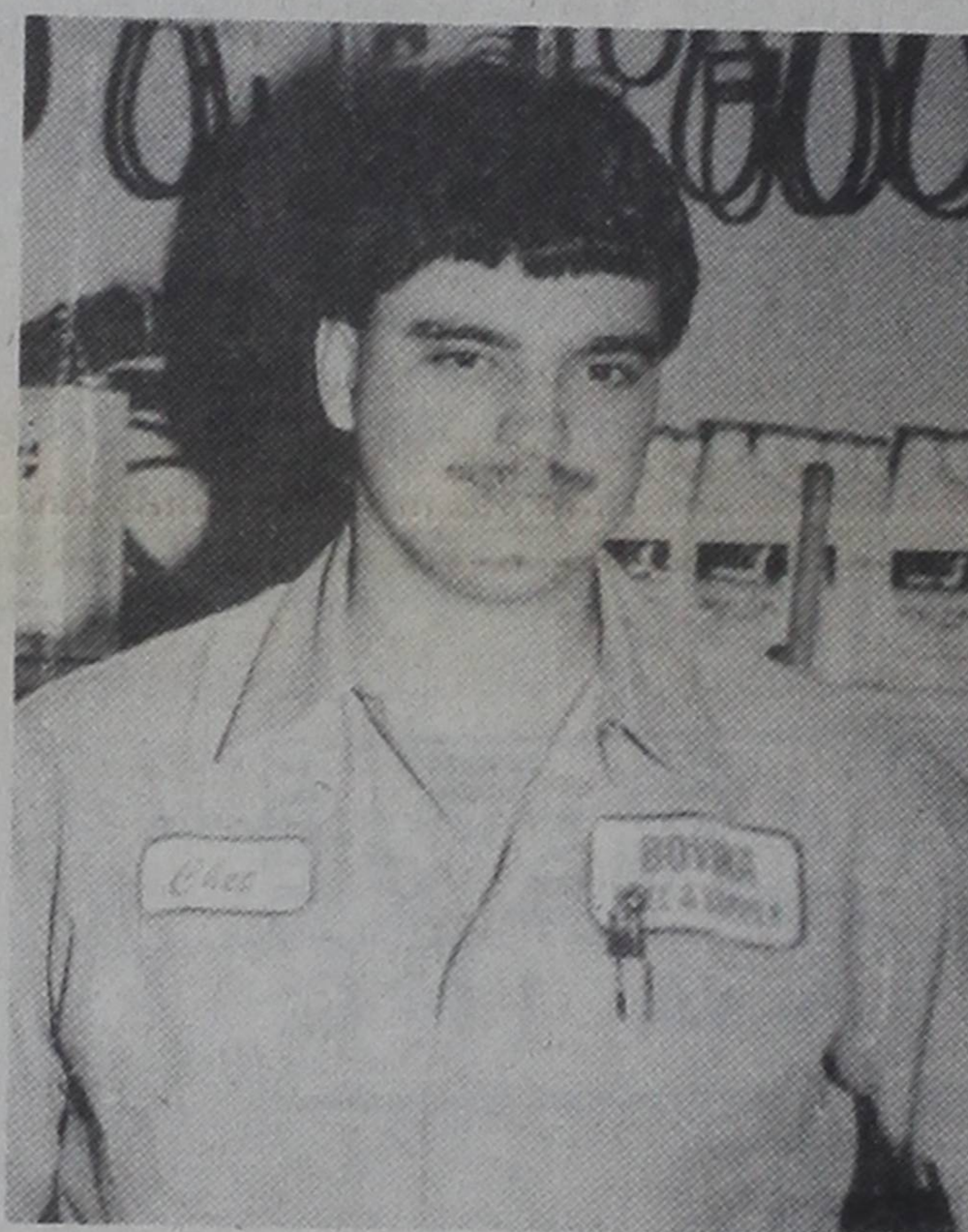

College Expanding Research On ALS

Baylor College of Medicine neurologists are expanding a study of the anti-rejection drug cyclosporine in the treatment of Amyotrophic Lateral Sclerosis (ALS), known as Lou Gehrig's Disease.

While the drug may not help all patients, preliminary tests suggest it may slow the progression of ALS in patients who are in the early stages of the disease, said Dr. Stanley H. Appel, chairman of neurology at Baylor.

The drug tests are based on the theory that ALS may be related to a change in the immune system, which causes antibodies to attack and destroy cells that control muscle movement. This gradual deterioration of the muscles and nervous system eventually impairs the ability to walk, speak and even swallow. There is no cure for ALS and no known cause. Most people live three to five years after

diagnosis.

Cyclosporine is the major drug used to prevent organ transplant rejections because it suppresses the body's immune system.

"If ALS is caused by antibodies attacking the cells in the spine that control muscles, then a drug that will suppress the attacking antibodies might help patients," Appel said. "Cells that have been destroyed cannot be replaced, but if we can save cells from being attacked by the antibodies, we may be able to stabilize some symptoms of ALS and slow progression of the disease."

The expanded study will involve 120 male patients at Baylor and three other medical centers in New York and Wisconsin. Study participants will be given the drug cyclosporine or an inactive substance (placebo) in liquid form, and monitored closely on a monthly basis for one year. There is no charge for participating in the study.

Around The House In Parmer County

By JANETTE PIERCE

As summer approaches, Texas' water conservation problems become more evident. Consumers can help in the conservation effort by using common sense and following some easy water and energy saving ideas.

Janette Pierce, Parmer County Extension Home Economist, says, "There are many ways to conserve water in the home. Cutting down on home water consumption helps stretch the fresh water supply and saves money as well."

She suggests that people, "Take short showers instead of baths, run dishwashers and washing machines only when they're full, and turn off the water while shaving or brushing teeth in order to save water."

According to the home economist, the bathroom should be a site for much conservation. Approximately 60 to 80 gallons of water per person are consumed daily in a typical household, and 75 per cent of that water is used in the bathroom. Each toilet flush alone uses anywhere from 5-8 gallons, and many people use this much water to dispose of a facial tissue instead of tossing it in the garbage.

To conserve water, toilet dams can be inexpensively installed to reduce the flow by as much as 50 per cent. Placing a filled,

weighted, water container in the tank can displace the volume of the container for each flush. Be sure not to use bricks for this purpose because they crumble and cause damage, she cautions.

"Showers, which are the greatest hot water consumers, can be made more efficient by installing restrictors to cut the flow in half. Aerating heads which mix air with the water are another option. They often come equipped with an on-off button which makes it possible to turn off the water while lathering. Aerators also can make sinks more efficient."

Setting back the thermostat on the hot water heater, cleaning it occasionally, and insulating the tank will make the system more efficient. This cuts down on consumption since there is less waiting for hot water, and it decreases energy costs.

"Outdoor water usage also can be reduced. Watering the lawn only when necessary, and soaking it down to the roots is a good idea. Avoiding watering during the hot part of the day, or on windy days can help conserve. Try collecting rainwater in a barrel to use for watering around the house."

Water conservation is everyone's problem. Some solutions can be easy to implement, save energy and money as well.

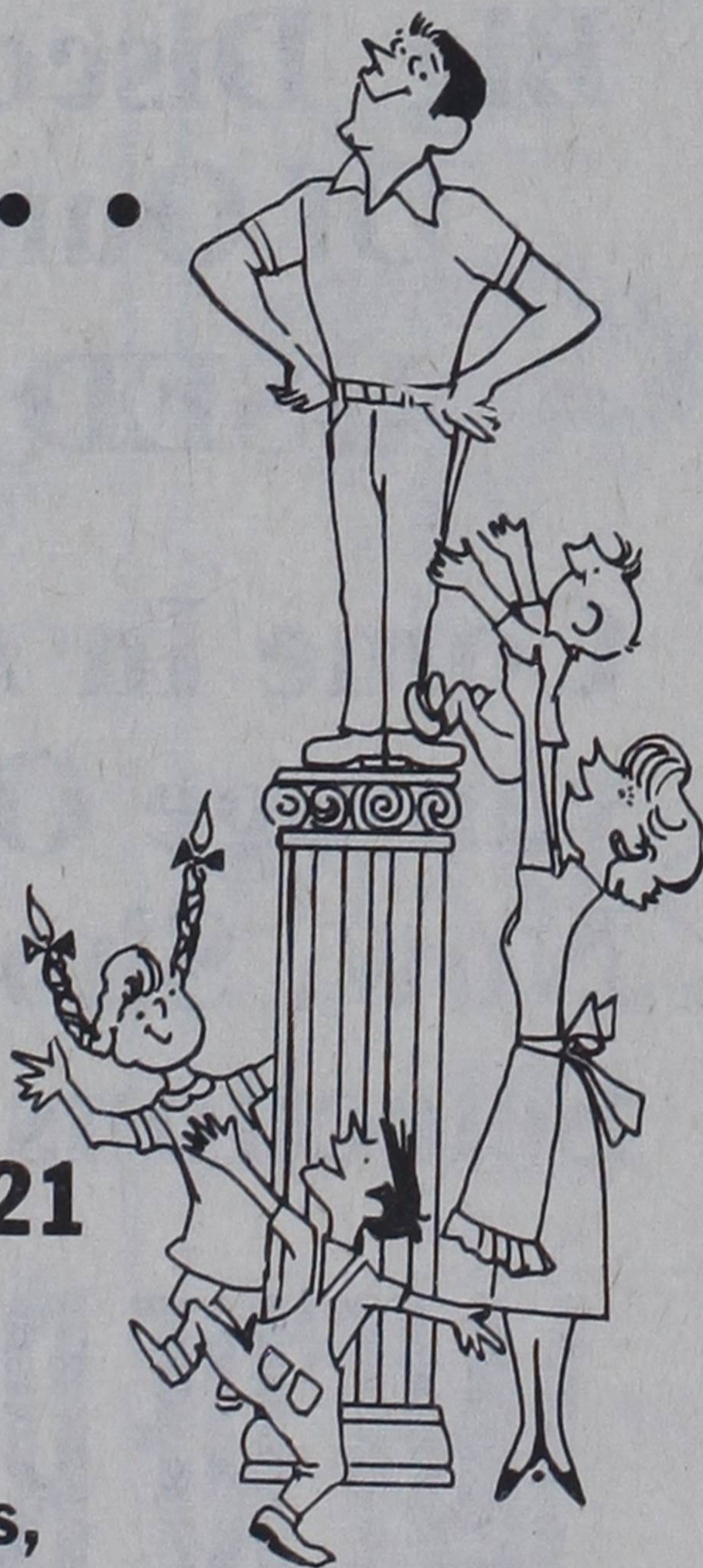

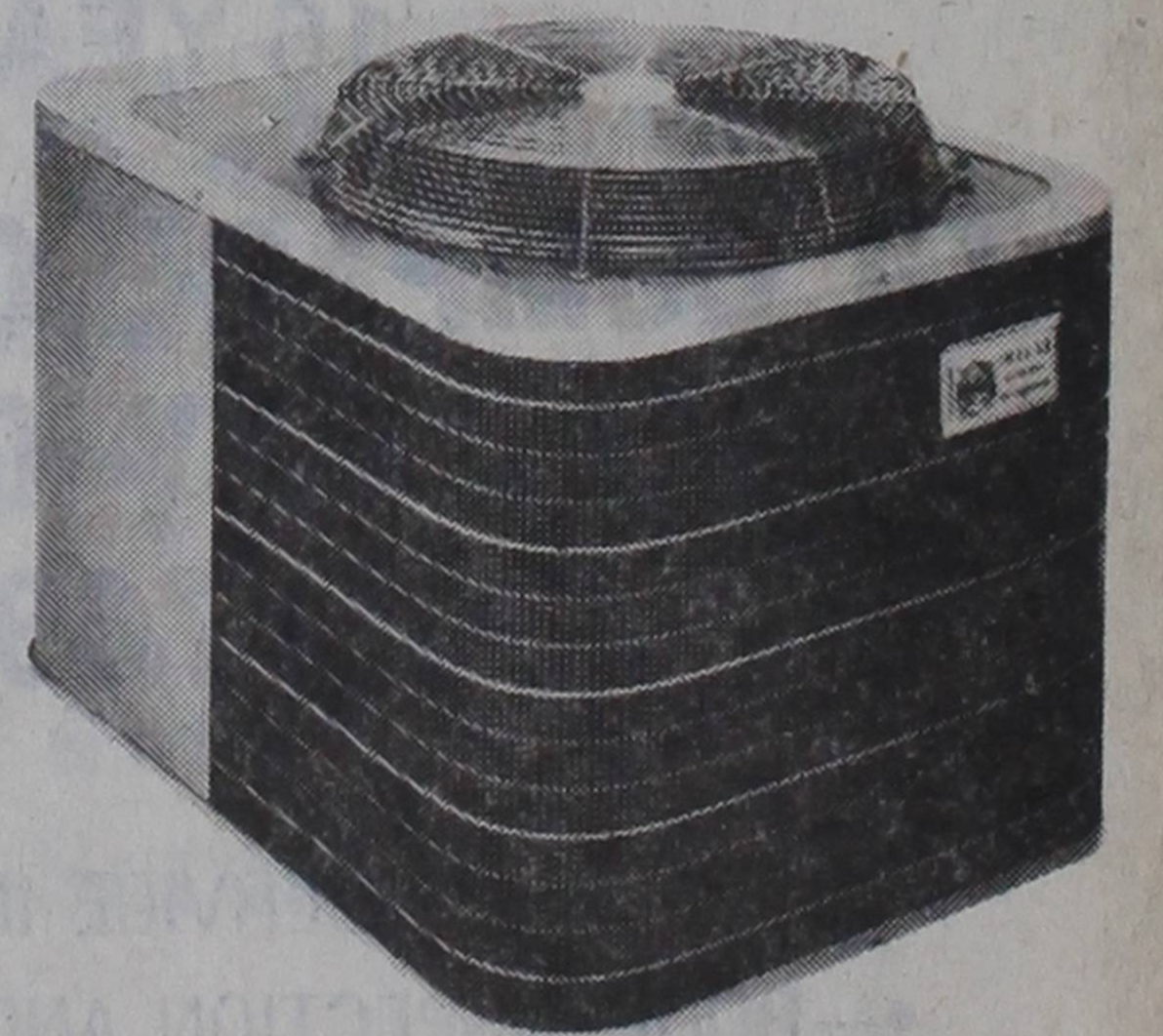

Health Seminar Set June 23 In Friona

Heart disease is a problem of enormous magnitude. Each year this disorder is responsible for 54 per cent of all deaths in the United States. This is more than all other causes of death combined and almost three times more than cancer, the second major cause of death.

We also can look at diseases in economic terms. Heart diseases cost this nation over \$50 billion a year; over half of this cost, \$33 billion, is attributed to premature death or death before the age of 65 due to cardiovascular disease. These estimated costs are related to lost wages, lost productivity, and the medical expenses associated with the disease.

High blood cholesterol is a risk factor in heart disease. The higher the level of cholesterol in the blood, the more likely a subject is to sustain a heart attack.

"Working Towards a Healthier Heart: The Prudent Diet," is a seminar designed to make people aware of what they can do to help prevent heart disease. This

program is sponsored by The Panhandle Health Care Coalition, a non-profit organization involved with providing health care to people without financial resources for health care.

The seminar is designed to help the participant: 1) understand the role that cholesterol, fats, and salt play in their heart's health, and 2) be able to make healthier food choices to decrease the risk of cardiac disease.

Stephanie Klainer, registered dietician, will be presenting the evening seminar. Ms. Klainer is the chief clinical dietician for Northwest Texas Hospital in Amarillo. 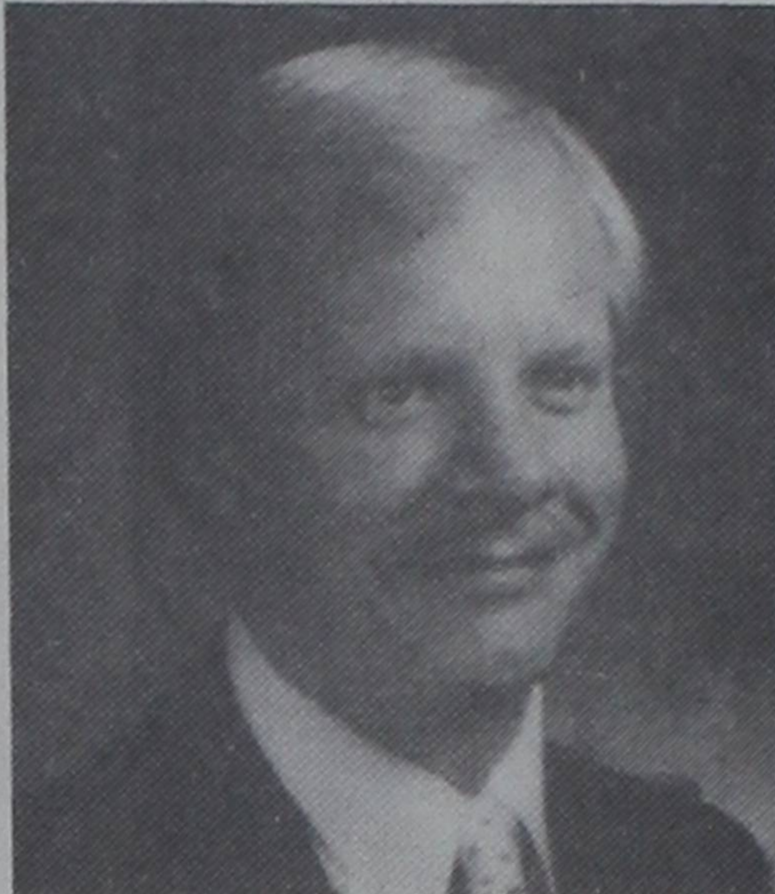

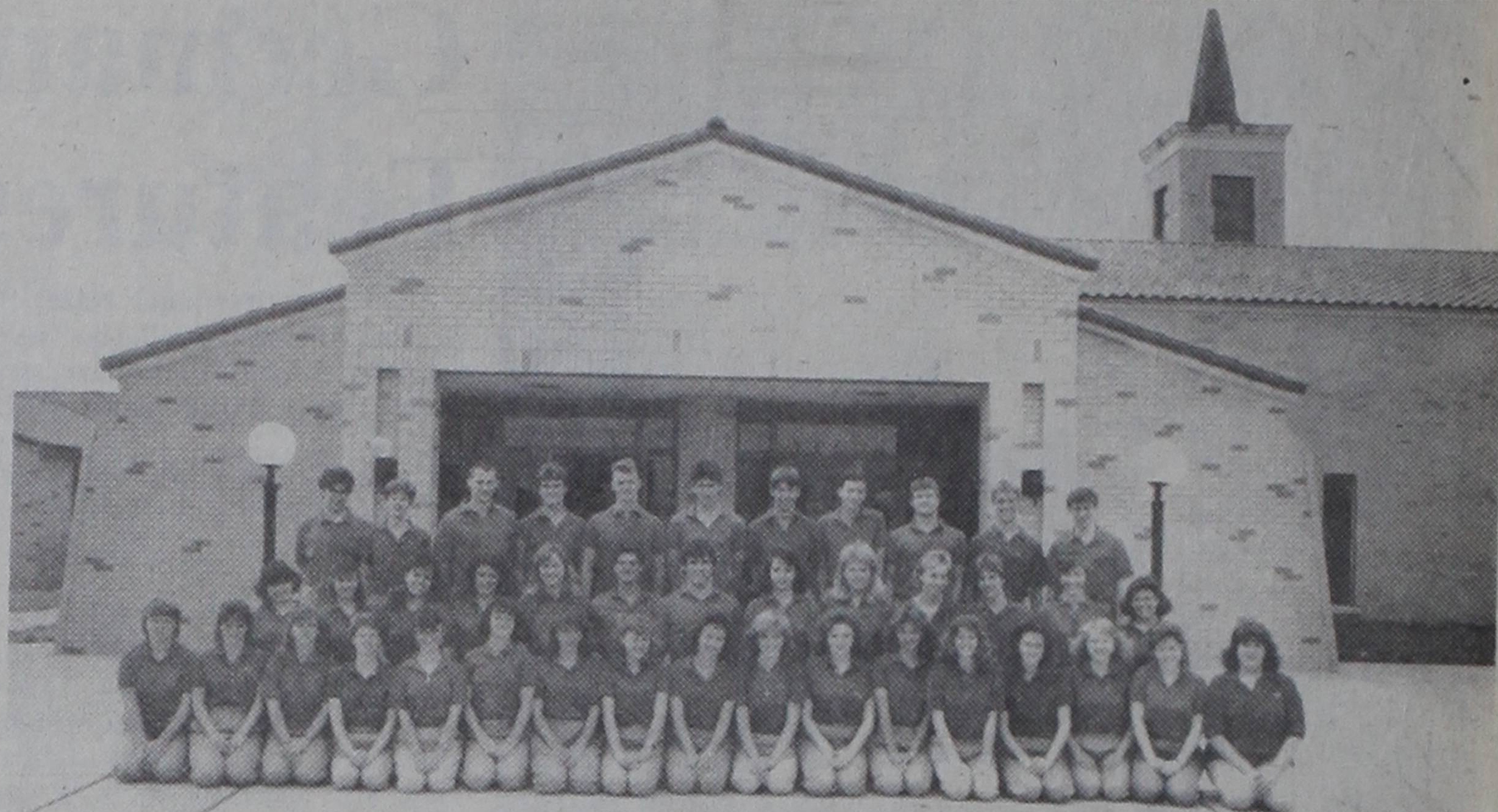
Mr. Bostic has served as Director of this summer touring choir since 1982. The choir is accompanied by Mrs. Debby Vester, who is the Music Assistant
