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Iranians threaten trial of hostages

Iran's Parliament speaker, in angry reaction to the detention of Iranian students in the United States, declared today that the Parliament debate on the American hostages is being postponed and preparations for their trial as "spies" might soon begin, Tehran Radio reported.

Iranian President Abolhassan Bani-Sadr called on the detained Iranians, meanwhile, to resist deportation by U.S. authorities, "so that they have to drag you into the planes" if

Alleged police mistreatment of the 193 young Iranians, who were

arrested during a demonstration last week in Washington, touched off a series of bitter protests in Iran, where many demanded that the threatened trial of the 52 American hostages as "spies" begin immediately.

Revolutionary leader Ayatollah Ruhollah Khomeini has decreed that the fate of the hostages, who today began their 10th month in captivity, is in the hands of the Iranian Parliament, or Majlis. Almost 200 U.S. congressmen recently wrote to Majlis Speaker Hashemi Rafsanjani asking that the issue be given top priority

But today, speaking at the morning session of the Majlis, Rafsanjani was quoted as saying: "Our reaction (to the Iranians' detention) is to postpone the discussion on the letter of the American congressmen. In this respect the Majlis has suggested a plan that the Supreme Judicial Council should be asked to prepare the grounds for the trial of the hostages."

The statement was reported by state-run Tehran radio in a broadcast monitored in London. It could not be determined immediately how firm the trial plans were.

Many members of the Islamic

Republican Party, which controls the Majlis, favor putting the Americans on trial for alleged espionage, and then either "punishing" or expelling them

The radio also quoted Bani-Sadr as saying in a letter to the Iranian Islamic Society in America and Canada that the U.S.-detained Iranians should "stand firm."

"If they are going to deport you, resist as far as possible, so that they have to drag you into the planes," he reportedly wrote.

Many of the detained Iranians, being held in New York prisons, are

on a hunger strike

U.S. officials said all 169 men held at a federal prison in New York State were examined Sunday by an Iranian doctor from New York City who found less than a half-dozen injuries, all of them minor. Officials said about 40 Iranians had been treated for the

effects of their hunger strike and said charges injured demonstrators were locked up without treatment were 'categorically untrue.

U.S. immigration authorities said deportation hearings could begin within a week for the 169, along with 20 Iranian women demonstrators held in

a New York City federal detention center. Four other men are hospitalized - three in New York and one in Washington.

They were arrested in Washington July 27 when their demonstration in support of Khomeini's regime turned into a violent confrontation with anti-Khomeini counter-demonstrators and police

The Iranians' lawyers have charged the demonstrators were brutalized by police. All have refused to reveal their names. U.S. officials say most are believed to be college students



Hurricane Allen hits island of Barbados

BRIDGETOWN, Barbados (AP) Hurricane Allen, packing winds up to 125 mph, tore into the Caribbean island of Barbados, ripping roofs off houses and flooding some coastal areas. It took aim at St. Lucia in the Windward chain but passed the island and moved over open Caribbean waters today


There were no immediate reports of deaths or injuries from Allen, the season's first hurricane, but authorities said thousands were driven into public shelters and that houses in the northern and eastern parts of Barbados were heavily damaged

The wind picked up corrugated sheets of metal used as fencing in Bridgetown and tossed them about. On the southeast coast, flood waters were reported three feet high.

Telephone communications to the area were knocked out when the id Barb shortly after midnight. In San Juan, Puerto Rico, telephone operators said they had been unable to reach any of the Lesser Antilles since coming on duty at midnight.

At 9 a.m., the U.S. National Weather Service in San Juan reported the center of the hurricane was near latitude 14.2 north, longitude 63.5

Huge weekend brushfire burns 20,000 acres in West Texas

SONORA, Texas (AP) - More than 100 volunteers, using hand sprayers, trucked-in water and bulldozers. battled for three days and saw more than 21,000 acres of pastureland destroyed before the finally controlled a range fire in West Texas.

Sonora Fire Chief Carl Teaff supervised the the effort in 100-degree temperatures and winds whipping up to 35 mph.

"We were just lucky," Teaff said after the fire finally was brought under control Sunday afternoon. Teaff directed the efforts of "about 60 volunteer firemen and about 50 civilians" during the firefighting efforts

The fire, which was dying Saturday until stiff prairie winds fanned smoldering grass back into flames, scorched 34 square miles of grasslands, estimated firefighter Ken Thorp. He made the estimate after making an aerial survey of the burned area in a private airplane.

"We have it under control now, but it'll burn for another 4 or 5 days in the middle," he said. "There's about 30 people still watching it with stock sprayers. That will probably dwindle to about 15 in a day or so.

His force of volunteers dug firebreaks around the flames with earth-moving equipment and used portable stock sprayers filled with water hauled from towns as far as 30 miles away

Firefighters from Sonora, Ozona, El Dorado, Junction and Menard manned five bulldozers in their effort to choke off the blaze. Seven oilfield tank trucks ferried water to the remote area, located northeast of Sonora in West Central Texas. Teaff said importing water is

nothing new in the dry, flat country.

"We always have a problem with water. It's superdry," Teaff said. "We haven't had any rain except for a few sprinkles for six months. Teaff said the fire started about 3

p.m. Friday when sparks from a welder's torch ignited pastureland on a ranch near Sonora.

Firefighters thought the blaze was contained early Saturday, but gusty winds sent it roaring out of control

about 10 a.m.

Flames came close to two ranch houses Saturday, and at least two other residences were endangered.

"You can't see the flame, but you can see the smoke," said Taylor Barton of the San Angelo Standard-Times. "You can smell it when you go outside. There's no ash fallout, but it got dark and a kind of a mucky look to the sky and the sun was a big, red ball.

"It's the worst grass fire we've ever had," said cattle rancher Elmer Wilson, whose pastures were ruined by the blaze. "We will have to sell and get rid of about half our cattle. We had good. dry grass which was completely destroyed and now there's nothing left for them to eat." he said.

The American Chamber of Commerce Researchers Association réleased a report, its second of the year, this week on the cost of living across the country. The report showed Big Spring had a drop in average prices in 13 out of 25 food items from e first of January to the first of pril. Utility bills also showed a decline in the report

The ACCRA report is compiled four mes a year from data submitted by ambers of commerce in over 200 cutes nationwide. Each chamber thers the average price in six categories. They are groceries, using, transportation, utilities alth care and miscellaneous goods and services

From the prices submitted an dex value representing a norm was ablished. The index value was 100. In the grocery category, the local chamber of commerce took the prices 25 market items and average the Jures. 'Freeway Killer' returned

LOS ANGELES (AP) - A 19-year-old Michigan man has been returned to California to face a murder charge stemming from one of the "Freeway Killer" slayings.

James M. Munro was booked into jail here Sunday pending arraignment today. The youth, arrested in Michigan on Thursday, was named in a warrant issued here for investigation of murder in connection with the strangulation of 18-year-old Steven Jay Wells of Downey, whose body was found June 3.

Munro is one of three men charged in the case dubbed the Freeway Killings. The bodies of 44 young men have been found dumped along Southern California freeways since December 1972.

`Lagoon' posing hazardous woes

WOBURN, Mass. (AP) - When she is especially upset. 26-year-old Jean Shure goes to wr k wearing a T-shirt with a bitter message printed acro... the front: "Woburn may be hazardous to your health.'

Her job at the Woodcraft Supply Co. is 1,000 yards from an abandoned, three-quarter-acre pit. Some romantically call it a lagoon, but dried arsenic is so concentrated in it that two pounds of soil contain enough poison to kill five adults, health officials say.

Soil samples also have turned up various acids, an-timony, chromium, formaldehyde, hexamine, lead, tin, zinc and tannery wastes such as cow, and horse hides and the search goes on.

Across the road, a pump sucks up potentially explosive methane gas seeping into another office building from wastes buried as long as a century ago. Tanneries, explosives and fertilizer factories have used the site since 1853.

Powdered arsenic and chromium wastes in the Industroplex industrial park still blow into the atmosphere. A consent decree, under which a contractor who owns some of the contaminated land agreed to cover it, is tied up in a court fight

Meanwhile, barbed wire strung to keep youngsters and animals out of the area has proven useless, residents say.

"We're tired all the time," said Ms. Shure. "And we don't know why. We still eat outdoors on nice days. But we wonder if anything is happening to us.

Woburn has the highest cancer rate among Massachusetts communities of 20,000 or more, and the state Department of Public Health says Woburn's 569 cancer cases between 1969 and 1978 was 12 percent more than a community its size should have had. Between 1974 and 1978, the difference was 24 percent.

The city's 14 cases of childhood leukemia over 10 years when five could be expected — have triggered a special study by the national Center for Disease Control. Results are due in October.

"The people are scared," said the Rev. Bruce Young, an Episcopal priest who is among those trying to determine what toxic wastes are doing to this community of 37,000 located 12 miles north of Boston.

Cancer, arsenic and methane are only part of Woburn's litany of toxic troubles, which also include:

-Trichlorthlyene, a commercial solvent suspected of causing cancer, in two wells serving the east side of town. They were closed.

-Tetrachloroethylene, also a cancer-causing suspect, in the vinyl lining of the town's water pipes. -Radioactive material dumped in the industrial park

Big bagel of Bubbes

SAN RAFAEL, Calif. (AP) - It took a carpenter's saw to cut open what was billed as the world's largest bagel - a 30-pound creation served at a brunch for Jewish grandmothers.

The bagel, two feet in diameter, was made by a local baker using high protein-flour and employing the boiling and baking methods that give bagels a crusty outside and chewy inside. A normal bagel is four inches across and weighs about four ounces

The idea of serving a big bagel at the Sunday brunch came from Marlene Posner of the Marin Jewish Community Center. She called the meal a "Bagel Brunch for Bubbes." Bubbe is the Yiddish word for grandmother.

Mrs. Posner said she contacted the publishers of the Guinness Book of World Records to find out if there was a larger bagel on record

"To their knowledge, there wasn't," she said. The 150 people who showed up for the brunch didn't get to sample the bagel, however. "The baker is going to bake it harder and then it's going to be varnished and hung on display," Mrs. Posner said.

For example, in an interview with the New York Times magazine on goals for a second term. Carter placed emphasis on revitalizing American industry. In discussing that goal, he talked of a "partnership between government and business." But only provided it was "within the bounds of propriety

IN OTHER WORDS, the President still sees something illicit in good relations with the business community. Experience has taught him nothing, nor can it be believed that a second term, free of constituency pressures connected with reelection. would be different. As much as ever Carter is in the grip of the moralistic small-town populist values that have so characterized his first term

The Billy affair, in these conditions has been seized upon by many Democrats as an occasion for unloading the President at the convention in New York. The 40 House members who have expressed an interest in forcing the President out comprised a typical expression of that sentiment.

They are not Kennedy supporters, and they believe - probably rightly that Kennedy would withdraw if Carter also excused himself. But neither are they typical, centrist Democrats. They tend to come from what were once Republican districts

Favoritism rampant, contestant says

Fights over Miss Texas crown nothing new

FORT WORTH, Texas (AP) — When the 1980 Miss Texas crown was awarded in a courtroom instead of on the Tarrant County Convention Center stage, longfestering backstage complaints about the pageant turned into daily headlines.

The tawdry stories revealed in court tales of minor cheating, backbiting and resentment of pageant officials by contestants and sponsors — marked a further step in the Texas pageant's evolution from a beauty contest to a high-stakes, high-pressure business.

"We just take the pageant more seriously than some other states," admits B. Don Magness, Miss Texas Pageant chairman and the target of most of the heated complaints.

"We work at it very hard," Magness said of the effort he expends grooming Miss Texas for the Miss America contest. "When we go up to Atlantic City, we go up there to win."

A woman earns the right to compete for the Miss Texas title, which carries a full college scholarship, a vintage sports car and a large cash prize as well as a ticket to the Miss America pageant, by winning local pageants licensed by the state contest. And local pageant directors have complained privately about the Miss Texas contest every year for the past 10 years, charging favoritism.

Some years ago the El Paso pageant directors said Magness decided in advance which local winners would make the best Miss Texas, brought them to his suburban Fort Worth home and groomed them for weeks before the Texas pageant.

One of them, Miss Denton, Shirley Cothran, eventually became Miss America of 1975. The El Paso people went public with their complaint and the El Paso franchise was revoked. There was no Miss El Paso at the 1960 Miss Texas Pageant.

The reigning Miss Houston, Lu Ann Caughey, is a twoyear veteran of Miss Texas competition, but 1980 was her last shot.

"I'm never going back, never. And I'd never encourage it for anyone," she said.

Miss Caughey said favoritism was rampant, and that the judges had picked the top 10 finalists in time for evening gown rehearsals, hours before the official announcement.

"All the girls, all 69 of them, practiced once but the girls

who turned out to be the top 10 practiced twice," she said. "They must have thought we were dumb or something. Everyone knew who the finalists were."

This year, the sponsors for Miss Dallas, Bobbie Lynn Candler, sued when their contestant finished second to Miss Lubbock, Terri Eoff. They claimed Miss Eoff ran overtime in the talent competition, gaining unfair advantage over other contestants, and did so with the tacit approval of Magness and other pageant officials. Pageant attorneys retaliated with claims that Miss


Pageant attorneys retaliated with claims that Miss Candler had, herself, violated the rules by lying about her height and wearing the wrong style of shoe during a rehearsal.

After judge Hal Lattimore ruled against the suit, ordering Miss Eoff to keep her crown, Miss Dallas officials said Magness tried to make sure Miss Candler did not win, and even tried to keep her from entering her third Miss Texas competition.

"He didn't want me in the contest," Miss Candler said of Magness. "See, it's his hobby and passion in life to remake a girl for the Miss America Pageant. ... I think that's why he disfavored me. I was already prepared to go to Atlantic City. The only thing he might be able to do for me is help me with my wardrobe."

Magness' response to Miss Candler's accusation was a terse "No comment," but on the subject of grooming Miss Eoff for Atlantic City, he waxes enthusiastic about a project that will reach from hair — "I don't like it. It's too fluffy ... it can look better." — to toe.

"We'll buy her a new wardrobe, have her work with a coach on her talent — everything to get her ready," Magness said. "Her eyebrows in particlar need help. They're not as I'd like them to be.

ROME (AP) - While the leftist Red Brigades have grabbed attention with daring terrorist attacks in recent years, Italy's neo-fascist extremists have been spreading death and destruction at a steady pace

Seeing themselves as the heirs to the "squadristi," the strong-arm squads who helped Italy's fascist dictator Benito Mussolini take power in the 1920s, rightwing extremists have been blamed for some of the bloodiest attacks in postwar Italy.

Now far-rightists have come under suspicion in the devastating explosion at the Bologna train station that killed at least 84 people, a tragedy investigators believe bears the stamp of a right-wing bombing.

Bologna's police chief, Italo Perrante, said he was "95 percent or even more" sure that terrorists had planted a powerful explosive. He said he suspected they were right-wingers because of similar attacks claimed by the right in the past. Right-wing extremist groups go under

such names as New Order, Black Order, the Year Zero, National Vanguard, National Revolutionary Front and Armed Revolutionary Nuclei. Some of their members, including ex-paratroopers, have been arrested in paramilitary camps wearing Nazi or fascist dress or in their

homes filled with arms and explosives. New Order has been specifically banned on charges that it represents an attempt to reconstruct the Fascist Party, outlawed under the postwar constitution

Terrorism analysts noted that two gangs, New Order and National Vanguard, have expressed support for violent actions aimed at crowds of people in public places.

Bombings and shootings by groups of both political stripes recall the climate of violence and fear that preceded Mussolini's seizure of power in the 1922 March on Rome. Italians call it the "strategy of tension" aimed at capitalizing on crisis to bring about a takeover by another strongman.

MOSCOW (AP) - Soviet ballerina Ludmilla Vlasova spent three days last year trying to con-vince U.S. officials that she wanted to go home. Now the Bolshoi star says she wants to come to America after all.

Miss Vlasova says Soviet authorities have promised her she can leave the country and join her husband, Alexander Godunov, who defected to the United States during a Bolshoi tour.

Last August, a Soviet airliner was grounded for 73 hours at New York's Kennedy International Airport until U.S. officials were assured Miss Vlasova did not wish to stay with Godunov.

Economical seers: It's for politics and money

NEW YORK (AP) — While it still might turn out to be the second worst recession since the Great Depression of the 1930s, the current downturn is already being written off by some allegedly far-seeing seers.

This, of course, is an ancient behavioral trait of so-called economic observers. They love to anticipate. They spent two years telling us a recession was coming; now they are telling us an upturn is on the way.

There is prestige in calling the turns, and money, too. It pays to go out on a limb, because if you happen to be right you can forever after advertise the fact. And if you are wrong, you can help people forget.

One well-known economic forecaster helps that process along by means of his own poor memory. If events trip him up, he merely adjusts the record and advises his clients: "As I told you six months ago ...

There is another class of seer who forecasts not for money but for politics, and on which to base the claim that a recovery is we are seeing plenty of that ilk in the past under way." For one thing, these indicators few weeks. They are an indomitable sort, always trying to offset misery with hope.

Are we in a recession? Well, it's hard to deny it but you can try. Isn't it really more civilized to say, as did Treasury Secretary G. William Miller, that "we're forming the summer that they couldn't continue in that basis for a recovery?

'The commanding fact, of course, is that Reagan has a wide initial lead in this presidential race," Harris said. 'Reagan has gained 14 points since June as a result of his highly positive showing at the Republican National Convention last month


Weather Thunderstorms rage through West Texas

In his first full-scale campaign address since winning the Republican presidential nomination 21/2 weeks ago. Reagan attacked Carter's foreign policy as vacillating - and confusing to foreign governments - before a crowd estimated at 30,000 at the Neshoba County Fair in rural Mississippi

"Our friends don't know whether to trust us, and our enemies no longer respect us." Reagan said

Reagan's campaign announced, too, that he is sending his running mate. George Bush, to visit China and Japan in mid-August, during the Democratic convention, for informal talks with leaders of both countries.

Aides said Reagan scheduled his first post-convention speech in Mississippi because that is one of the states where he believes he can crack Carter's southern base

From Mississippi, Reagan is moving into other traditionally Democratic territory -for talks with Jewish leaders in New York, a walk through the impoverished South Bronx in an effort to capture the blue-collar vote.

The former California governor, while in New York, also will address the National Urban League, whose annual convention

will hear a great deal of political rhetoric this week

Sen. Edward M. Kennedy and independent candidate John Anderson will speak to the civil rights group today, Reagan will give his speech Tuesday, and President Carter will be the speaker Wednesdav

Kennedy said Sunday his own campaign's survey had found he had the votes to "open" the Democratic National Convention. And though Kennedy said he was taking things one step at a time, he added:

"I'm confident that with an open convention we can gain the nomination.

An aide to Kennedy, Richard Burke, said a telephone survey had been taken of 700 to 800 Carter delegates believed to be "soft" on the question of the Democratic convention rule that would assure Carter first-ballot nomination.

Burke said it showed 350 who said they would vote for an open convention, 100 others who probably would and an additional 115 who were possible converts. Those would be in addition to Kennedy's own more than 1,200 delegates, Burke said, and would be enough to win the rules fight for Kennedy

ABC News said Sunday night, however, that its own survey of about three-quarters of the delegates showed 52 percent favoring the Carter-backed rule, 43 percent against it, and 5 percent undecided. It said that meant Carter had lost about 150 delegates, not enough to deny him the nomination.

Bush stops briefly in Texas

DALLAS (AP) - Hoping to drum up support of traditional Democratic voters, Republican vice presidential nominee George Bush today interrupts his vacation for a one-day visit to his adopted home state. Bush flies from his Kennebunkport, Maine, summer home to this conservative Texas city - his first appearance on the campaign trail since he was named Ronald Reagan's running mate at the GOP convention in Detroit last monnth.

Upon arrival at the Dallas-Fort Worth Regional Airport, the former CIA director and United Nations ambassador was to address the National Medical Association. the National Dental Association and the National Nurses Association board of directors meeting here.

Texas, with 26 electoral votes, is considered a pivotal state with strong Republican ties. However, the Democrats have carried four of the last five presidential elections.

GOP strategists hope the former Texas congressman can woo a substantial number of Democratic, particularly black, voters into the Republican camp before the November general election.
