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Flames engulf Saudi jet; all 265 aboard perish

RIYADH, Saudi Arabia (AP) — Flames engulfed a Saudi Arabian jetliner after it made an emergency return to the Riyadh airport and all 265 persons aboard perished, the official Saudi press agency reported today. It was the fourth-largest death toll in aviation history.

The plane was on a flight from Karachi, Pakistan, to Riyadh, to Jidda, Saudi Arabia. About 75 percent of the victims were Saudi Arabians who boarded the plane in Karachi, said Saudi airline officials in the Pakistani city. Earlier, officials in Karachi said most of the passengers were Pakistanis returning to work in Saudi Arabia after visits home for the Eid festival at the end of the Moslem holy month of Ramadan.

There were no immediate official reports that any Americans were

plane "As the tongues of flames shot out ficials the windows of the plane, it became impossible to open the doors from outside or inside," said a statement from the Saudi Civil Aviation Department. "The whole plane was engulfed in flames."

The Saudi state radio said the Tristar caught fire Tuesday night a few minutes after taking off from Riyadh, the Saudi capital on the east side of the country. The flight was headed for Jidda, the Red Sea port 500 miles west of Riyadh.

The plane turned back. As it approached for an emergency landing, the broadcast report said, fire brigades and ambulances were rushed to the runway and rescue helicopters took to the air. A "fierce glow of fire" could be seen.

The pilot told the control tower he was trying to rush his 249 passengers to safety through the emergency exits, the report continued, but radio contact was cut and the body of the plane became wrapped in flames.

"We are from Allah and unto him we return," said the Saudi government radio, quoting from the Koran, the holy book of Islam.

In addition to the passengers, the plane carried a crew of 16, the airline said.

The airport compound was guarded by security men, while a team of experts began the investigation to determine the cause of the fire. Reporters were barred from the area. The worst accident in aviation

history occurred on Tenerife in the Canary Islands in March 1977, when 582 persons were killed in the collision on a runway of two Boeing 747s operated by Pan American and the Dutch airline KLM.

The second worst, and the greatest loss of life in a single-plane accident, was the crash of a Turkish Airlines DC-10 northeast of Paris in March 1974 in which 346 people perished.

The crash of an American Airlines DC-10 in Chicago in May 1979 killed 273 people.

TEL AVIV, Israel (AP) — Israeli fighter jets bombed Palestinian targets in southern Lebanon today for the second consecutive day after guerrillas pounded Israel's northern Galilee panhandle with a barrage of rockets, the military command announced.

A brief communique said all Israeli planes returned safely after bombing "forward and organizational bases used for strikes" against Israel. It did not identify the targets.

Officers here said Palestinian crews fired several Soviet-made Katyusha rockets at settlements in Galilee, but no one was injured.

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southern Lebanon shelled guerrilla strongholds in the areas of Arnoun and Beaufort Castle, targets of a major raid by Israeli troops and planes late Monday and early Tuesday.

The Israelis claimed up to 60 Arab guerrillas were killed in the earlier operation. They said three Israeli soldiers were killed.

A spokesman for Israel's military command denied a report from the Palestinian news agency WAFA that Israeli border gunners shelled guerrilla strongholds in three southern Lebanese towns.

WAFA said Israeli border gunners and right-wing Christian militiamen this morning launched a 30-minute artillery barrage on the port city of Tyre, the town of Nabatiyeh and the neighboring village of Aishieh, all southern Lebanese towns controlled by Palestinian guerriller, WAFA

which is controlled by the Palestine Liberation Organization, said one Palestinian woman was wounded in the attack. After Monday night's major Israeli

raid against Palestinian strongholds in southern Lebanon, Lt. Gen. Raphael Eytan, the Israeli chief of staff, said his forces would continue to take the initiative and carry the fight to their foes north of the Israeli-Lebanese border.

In Washington, the State Department was less specific, saying: "We are deeply concerned by rising tensions and violence in that area. We call on all parties to act with restraint."

The raid was the third attack on Palestinian positions in south Lebanon in a week and the biggest Israeli operation across the border since the 90 day invasion in 1978.

Carter on shaky ground

with American veterans

WASHINGTON (AP) — In his first act as president on his first day in office, Jimmy Carter antagonized the powerful organizations which claim to speak for America's 31 million veterans his relationship with veterans has been rocky ever since. This weak, the first post-convention

This week, the first post-convention week of the election campaign, Carter is trying to patch matters up with veterans' groups; Ronald Reagan, his Republican rival, is capitalizing on their coolness toward the White House

Reagan addressed the VFW convention Monday in Chicago and was to speak before the American Legion convention in Boston today. Carter flies to Boston to address the Legion on Thursday. Independent candidate John B. Anderson went before the Legionnairus Tuesday.

Back on Jan. 21, 1977, the Veterans of Foreign Wars called Carter's inaugural day "probably one of the saddest days in the history of our country" because the new president, fulfilling a campaign promise, in his first act pardoned almost all Vietnam draft evaders.

On Monday, the VFW, having since

found additional grievances with Carter, handed out its first political endorsement. In backing Reagan, the VFW ended an 80-year history of political neutrality.

Reagan, accepting the endorsement, went on the attack. He told the VFW, "This anti-veteran administration has stacked the deck against you."

Veterans Administrator Max Cleland, who lost both legs and his right forearm in Vietnam, replied: "I am surprised and alarmed at Governor Reagan's distortion of the facts about our nation's veterans. Once again his rhetoric has overtaken reality."

Although veterans groups are unhappy with the administration's record, privately some of their leaders concede that, given the temper and the budgets of the times, they probably would be unhappy with any administration.

Cleland himself comes under criticism when officials of veterans groups speak on a not-to-be-quoted basis.

Big Spring woman dies in car mishap

A 16-year-old Big Spring woman was killed when her car went out of control on the South Service Road of IS 20, 1 a.m. today.

The one-car accident claimed the life of Toni Jo Clark, Sterling City Route.

According to reports, her Datsun B-210 had been eastbound on the service road when it went out of control, striking a curb on the opposite side of the road, and rolling three times. The auto came to a stop on its roof near DeVore's Texaco Service Station, 801 IS 20.

The victim was transported by Shaffer Ambulance Service to Malone-Hogan Hospital, where she died minutes after arrival. country.

After the Iranians challenged the policy, a federal judge temporarily enjoined the school from instituting it July 16 and asked the Justice Department for its position. The agency filed a memo Friday that the school rule invades federal authority over foreign policy.



Corporate profit decline will mean more layoffs

The sharp drop in corporate profits from April through June means that companies will continue to cut back their spending and lay off more workers in coming months, private economists

The squeeze on companies is tightened further by suddenly rising interest rates that discourage borrowing for new plants and equipment, these

economists explain. Moreover, a revival of rampant inflation last month will add to the cost of new business investment and dampen any prospect of a rapid resurgence in con-

sumer demand — a force Sandra that should exist if com- econom panies are going to risk heavy spending.

These trends - which would ensure a very sluggish recovery from the current recession - were painted in interviews Tuesday with economists from three of the nation's leading private forecasting firms.

The economists agreed that the decline in corporate profits - while not unexpected virtually guarantees that companies will further cut back activity and lay off more workers. "This is a trigger for cutting employment," said

inescapable." Chase Econometrics, Data Resources Inc., and Evans Economics all predicted a sustained shrinkage of corporate profits through this year as the recession continues - although at an easing pace.

On Tuesday, the Commerce Department reported that corporate profits fell steeply from the first quarter to the second quarter. This occurred while the nation's entire economy plunged 9 percent from April through June as the full force of the recession took hold.

Pre-tax profits from April through June fell 19.8 percent from the first quarter, while after-tax profits declined 18.2 percent. Corporate profits from current production a measure that adjusts for depreciation and the replacement of inventory fell nearly 11 percent from

first quarter to second quarter. Companies did manage to retain more of their total earnings during the second quarter than in the first However, these quarter. retained profits were 13 percent below levels set during the same three-month period in 1979, Commerce Department figures show.

"If retained earnings are shrinking, and interest rates are up, business investment will be choked off in coming months," said Ms. Shaber.



NFD taking dead aim at networks

Up to now, the major television networks - or more properly the people who draw the grand designs for them — have largely ignored the National Federation for Decency.

The networks are not unaware of the federation's motives - to see that the shows entering the majority of American homes clean up their acts.

INFO RECENTLY came out with a list of top ten programs it regarded as having high moral content

In the appointed order, they were (1 Little House on the Prairie, (2 The Waltons, (3 Here's Boomer, (4 Palmerstown, USA, (5 Wonderful World of Disney, (6 Different Strokes, (7 Trapper John, MD, (8 Chips, (9

Eight is Enough and (1\$ Galactica. It's one list NBC, the perennial loser in Neilson ratings, leads the parade, since Little House on the Prairie is produced by that network.

The federation also lists the top ten programs with non-Christian value content. A few on the list might surprise you. They include:

(1. United, States; (2 Archie Bunker's Place; (3 Dallas; (4 Three's Company; (5 The Ropers; (6 Flo; (7 WKRP; (8 Knots Landing; (9 Sanford; (10 Love Boat.

The NFD reported it found that non-Christian values are depicted in a favorable light nearly three times as often as traditional Christian values and individuals depicted as Christians were presented in a positive manner just slightly more often than in a negative image

NBC was the only network whose overall programs were rated more Christian values oriented than non-Christian.

THE MONITERS used in the NFD's values "...love, respect for God and persons, honesty, marital fidelity, hope, faith, attitude, clean speech, kindness, faithfulness, proper perspective toward possessions, fairness, forgiveness and etc." Non Christian values were the opposite

Prudential Insurance was cited as the top Christian value programs sponsor, followed by Citicorp, Texaco, Krafco, J.C. Penney, Sunkist Growers, Hallmark Cards, Shell Oil,

Volkswagen and Oscar Mayer. A food company, a soap company and a motor car company topped the list of sponsors of so-called non-Christian values.




In fact, I've even gotten to where I like to travel on the thing. We've taken trips to Colorado City and Amarillo on but I insist that we both wear helmets.

What it all boils down to is this -- 'If you can't beat 'em, join' - and I did.



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
Carter's unity vans, Novak

NEW YORK - As Sen. Edward M. Kennedy withdrew from the presidential race and party leaders proclaimed a new "unity," the party was continuing its 12-year-old struggle over national security policy in skirmishes all the way from Madison Square Garden to Kennebunk, Maine.

While trying to ignore the presence of the Russian Bear, the 3,300 delegates in New York were preparing to act as a deliberative body to decide whether the most important new weapons system of President Carter's administration, the MX mobile missile, should be condemned. Meanwhile, two high administration officials were arriving in Maine to soothe Secretary of State Edmund S. Muskie's fury, worked up by McGovernites in the State Department, over Carter's new nuclear strategy

THE DELEGATES WILL leave New York with the post-Vietnam split papered over at best, or possibly ruptured further. That split dwarfs the philosophical division on display last month at the Republican convention over equal rights for women. On the transcendent issues of foreign policy, the Republican Party has united behind Ronald Reagan; on those same issues at Madison Square Garden, the Democrats were no less divided than they have been ever since their tormented 1968 convention in Chicago

Admist perfunctory assaults on Reference and pro-ERA demon-strations, an intimation that the U.S. is in a world struggle with the Soviet Union was delivered to unlistening delegates by Sen. Daniel Patrick Moynihan. He chose an expedient rhetorical device, coined by the late Sen. George Aiken, who said of Vietnam, claim victory and get out. Movnihan's Monday night speech claimed Jimmy Carter has seen the truth of the Soviet threat and is organizing the U.S. to contain it. It was not merely that the delegates who stuck around after the suspenseending rules fight Monday night had no interest in Moynihan's warnings about the world struggle. A majority probably did not approve of Carter's new world posture, as described by Moynihan. The substantial opposition to MX reflects that. But the dispatch of two aircraft from the Defense and State Departments to Muskie's summer home in Maine suggests Moynihan was overoptimistic. With the nuclearstrategy directive signed by the president himself last month, the backfire started at the State Department. Former foreign policy advisers to Sen. George McGovern, hired for top posts in Carter's fledgling administration, fueled it. They never have accepted the reality of Moscow's expansionism and have goaded Muskie into outrage over the new policy

Plans dusted off

WASHINGTON - President Carter's national security adviser, Zbigniew Brzezinski, told visitors recently that world leaders would be wrong to suppose the United States is reluctant to use its power. The United States, he said, is merely "playing possum

He did not mention that, even as he spoke, the president was -rushing ahead with plans to invade Iran. My associate Dale Van Atta has spent three months piecing together the invasion plan. KHARG ISLAND is the site of the oil terminal through which 90 percent of Iran's crude is pumped into tankers for export. Not long after the U.S. hostages were seized in Iran, contingency plans were developed for an assault on Kharg Island.


Intussusception is a telescoping of part of the intestine within itself. It is like pushing in an extended telescope to its smallest size. When this happens to the intestine, blood supply is cut off and that part can die. If this is going to occur it usually does so between eight and 12 months. In only a small percentage of cases can a precise cause be found — such as an intestinal polyp or an intestinal viral infection.

Is it hereditary? Not that we know of But here we are in that grav area called familial tendency. There is a slightly greater tendency toward it in some families. You have nothing to blame vourselves for. Food is not a problem. Your children were fed according to the book. Nor was the morning sickness medicine a likely cause

The two standard treatments are those you describe - surgery and the lower GI (gastro-intestinal) X-ray. The intestine sometimes becomes untelescoped from the barium used in the X-ray. You ask about recurrence. The chances are from 2 to 10 percent. Your knowledge of the condition is good, but you need not take any special precautions. hostage rescue attempt. Under top security, the United States has been helping the Egyptians upgrade their air bases, which would be vital staging areas for an Iranian operation. Ultra-secret communications and military equipment have also been shipped to Egypt. A special logistics force has been

began in May, would hamper military operations in Iran during the summer The president can argue, therefore, that October is a good time for the invasion.

But planners believe the timing is intended to save Carter's political skin. They suspect his real intent is to create a national emergency that will keep him in the White House. Political studies show that a president can increase his support dramatically by whipping up patriotic fervor

Footnote: As I've stressed in earlier columns, the invasion plan will not become operational until the president gives the green light. He would need some pretext for the invasion, such as the trial or execution of a hostage, sources say. But one planner acknowledged that "a ustification could be easily publicized peforehand." Meanwhile, Carter is continuing his secret diplomatic efforts to secure the release of the hostages. He would prefer to bring them home before the election by peaceful means. But sources close to the operation say that if the peaceful efforts fail, as expected, the president intends to activate the invasion plan. The risk, of course, is war

PIPELINE IN PERIL: The bureaucrats are fiddling around while the pipeline burns. The FBI insists that it's up to the Department of Transportation to police the Trans-Alaska Pipeline and investigate bombings and other violent interruptions in the flow of oil. But an angry Rep. John Dingell, D-Mich., is threatening legislative action if the bureau doesn't change its tune.

"To injure or destroy any interstate pipeline facility is a crime against the United States and should be treated as such by the Department of Justice," he wrote privately to Attorney General Benjamin Civiletti. Adding that DOT has "no criminal enforcement capability," Dingell called the FBI's jurisdictional buck-passing wholly without foundation.



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

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

Hit-and-run driver being sought

Man remains in serious condition after rescuing woman from fire

DALLAS $(AP) \rightarrow An$ unemployed oil field worker who rescued a woman from a burning car remained in serious condition at a Dallas hospital early today while police searched for the hit-and-run driver that ran him down.

Michael Boyd, 22, was struck by the same vehicle that plowed into the rear of an overturned car, setting it on fire about midnight Friday. Boyd pulled 20-year-old Lori Adams out of the flaming wreckage and was hit when the fleeing driver sped away.

The impact tossed Boyd 20 feet into the air. He landed face down and slide about 60 feet along the pavement.

Police said Tuesday night they still were looking for the driver who fled on foot after hitting a second car on Dallas' Stemmons Freeway in his escape attempt.

Investigators said they obtained a name and address from license plate numbers, but that the man has not returned home or to work since the accident.

"I'd like to take him (the suspect) up here and just show him," said Boyd's wife, Johnna. She brought the couple's 13-day-old son, Michael Lee, to stay with relatives in Lewisville during her vigil at Parkland Memorial Hospital.

"Both of his legs are broke and his jaw is broke in two places. All of his front teeth are knocked out, his right arm is broke and his right wrist is crushed," said Boyd's sister, Claire Robinson.

"The doctor, she doesn't think he'll ever use his right wist like he did before," Mrs. Robinson said. "His right knee was crushed. His head, it's like a closed wound. His brain is pressing on the inside. His lungs are full of fluid.'' Relatives nodded numbly and wondered how Boyd would pay his medical bills as friends told them he ''saved that girl's life.''

Boyd was traveling from Lewisville, north of Dallas, with his brother Terry and friend Brian Christy when they came upon the woman's overturned car.

Terry Boyd began directing traffic from behind her car when the hit-and-run driver approached and hit the car from behind.

The three men pulled Ms. Adams out of the car, seconds before it exploded, she said.

"The guy that ran into the back of me put it into reverse and floorboarded it to try and leave the scene. He pulled around the side of the car and that's when he hit Mike. He must have been going faster than 60 miles an hour."

Ms. Adams escaped with second-degree burns on one arm and singed hair.

Boyd had just lost his job with a drilling rig outside Baytown, near Houston, and was en route back to the coast to pick up his possessions when the accident occurred. He had planned to return to Lewisville to look for work.

Mrs. Boyd said her husband was anxious for news of their new baby, and "he opened his eyes this morning." About all he can do is squeeze your hand, though."

Unions want endorsement delayed

CHICAGO (AP) — Leaders of the AFL-CIO are, gathered here with the intention of endorsing President Carter for re-election, but a number of disgruntled unions are fighting to postpone a vote of support because of their displeasure with the president.

In what appeared to be a clear sign of organized labor's less-than-enthusiastic feelings about Carter, leaders of several unions planned to surre unions planned to surrent at today's executive meeting that the a correctedership body postpone recommending an endorsement of Carter until either Thursday or perhaps until Sept. 4, when all the AFL-CIO presidents are to meet.

As the union leaders convened here Tuesday night, several indicated they want an endorsement postponed so that each union could try to negotiate concessions from the administration on issues of special concern to them.

"We're all going to eventually endorse Carter," said one union official who favored postponing an endorsement. "The only question is when," said the official, who did not want to be identified. AFL-CIO president Lane Kirkland had planned to schedule a quick vote today with the 34-member council recommending an endorsement to its general board, which is composed of leaders of all 104 affiliated unions.

But the reluctant unions, numbering more than a halfdozen, said that enough of a groundswell might develop for a postponement, which would represent at lee # a artial repudiation of the projdent.

Among the unions whose presidents have expressed reluctance about an immediate endorsement are the American Federation of State, County and Municipal Employees, American Federation of Teachers, Airline Pilots Association, Brotherhood of Railway and Airline Clerks, and the American Federation of Government Employees. Many of those union leaders had supported Sen. Edlard M. Kennedy for the Democratic nomination.

In past elections, with the exception of 1972, the executive council has recommended endorsing the Democratic presidential candidate right after the convention, and the general board made it official several

weeks later

Although the AFL-CIO may delay the process this time, it apparently does not want another stand of neutrality similar to 1972, when it remained neutral in the contest between Richard Att McGovern.

William W. Winpisinger, president of the International Association of Machinists, is the only council member who has stated flatly that he will not support Carter for reelection because of the president's economic and energy policies

A few other leaders of AFL-CIO unions that had backed Kennedy in the Democratic primaries have threatened to stay neutral rather than back Carter, but their colleagues expect them to endorse Carter eventually.

As in 1976, when organized labor lined up solidly behind Jimmy Carter despite deep misgivings about him, labor leaders are returning to a candidate who has irked them repeatedly over economic issues but who seems clearly preferable to the Republican candidate.

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Anderson will be on Texas ballot; Demos still trying to keep him off

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — Rep. John B. Anderson's name will appear on Texas' November ballot as an independent candidate for president, says Secretary of State George Strake.

However, Texas Democrats continued to check today to see if there was a way to keep Anderson off the ballot. Anderson is expected to take away Texas votes from

Presi Carter, the Democratic nominee, if he appears as an independent. Strake told a news conference Tuesday that a sample of the 80,000 signatures submitted by Anderson's supporters had been checked and 73 percent of them proved to be legitimate, which would give him the 40,719 needed to get on the ballot.

Strake also said similar checks of petitions gave the Libertarian Party a place on the ballot but denied a ballot spot to the Socialist Workers Party and the Citizens Party.

June Middlebrooks, deputy director of the Texas Democratic Party headquarters, said Anderson's petitions were being run through the Democrats' computer. If enough Democratic names show up to affect Strake's decision, then the party may sue. Strake said most of the names removed from the Anderson petitons were either illegible or were those of

voters in May 3 Republican presidential primary. "We did not remove any names of those who voted in the Democratic presidential primary," Strake said. Strake has contended that Republican voters could not

sign Anderson petitions but Democrats could, because the GOP primary was binding in selection of national convention delegates while the Democratic poll was a "beauty contest."


Attorney General Mark White issued an opinion saying persons who voted in the Democratic primary also were prohibited from signing presidential nominating petitions. Strake said Anderson submitted almost 80,000 signatures on petitions. He said his staff verified one percent of the signatures, just as White, his predecessor, had done. The sample was tested in the 80 counties where the signatures were collected. Strake said the 800 signatures tested showed that 585, or about 73 percent, were legal.

"We feel every optimistic about our current decision," said Strake

When asked if he expected a lawsuit, he said "If I were them, I wouldn't do it. I think it would be an expensive losing ordeal."

Ms. Middlebrooks said the Democrats will attempt to determine in comparing Anderson's signatures with their own computer files of registered Democratic voters on May 3 whether the petitions approved by Strake contain enough Democratic signatures to keep Anderson from being certified.

"If we find enough Democratic names, we will file suit," Ms. Middlebrooks said.





MIAMI (AP) - This season's American Conference East race may be decided at the negotiating table. In Miami, will top rusher Larry Csonka and star linebacker Larry Gordon return to the fold in time for the Dolphins' championship defense? In New England, will leading rusher Sam Cunningham, All-Pro safety Mike Haynes and top reserves quarterback Tom Owen and tackle Richard Bishop be back to fill the few holes the Patriots have?

Only their agents know for sure.

And while they're talking about tax brackets and deferred payoffs, the New York Jets behind speedsters Wesley Walker and Lam Jones may sprint to the first championship involving the Jets since Joe Namath, who now plays Li'l Abner in an off Broadway theater, played gian-killer against Don Shula's 1969 Super Bowl Baltimore Colts.

Meanwhile, the young Buffalo Bills, using a shotgun formation on offense, may shoot down some of the contenders, and the Baltimore Colts, if Bert Jones' shoulder is finally healthy, could again become a factor in the race.

This may be a fateful season for Shula, who joined the Dolphins in 1970. His Dolphins contract runs out next spring, and it seems likely he will have several NFL and college jobs to tempt him away from Miami. If this is to be Sula's last year here, it goes without

"If you don't learn by your own mistakes and the mistakes of others," he said, "then you are in trouble." NBC assures us it has learned from the mistakes of

ABC. Bob Arum, it is hoped, has learned from the mistakes of Don King. The last time a boxing promoter and a television

network joined forces was the King-ABC operation called the United States Boxing Championships, a project that raised all manner of difficult questions about the ratings and records of the participating fighters and the tournament matchups.

Now television will try again with a different promoter- Arum instead of King-and a different network-NBC instead of ABC. And it isn't even a tournament, just a fistful of top young boxers breaking into the professional ranks. Still, the players in this game remember the King-ABC episode and you get the feeling they're being extra careful this time around.





Surviving 'Winnie-the-Pooh' and writing books

DARTMOUTH, England (AP) - The real Christopher Robin says he was "embarrassed all my life" about being the boy in the poems and Winnie-the-Pooh stories of his father, A.A. Milne.

"But that's all finished now," he says. "I had to get into the second half of the 20th century." Christopher Robin Milne will be 60 on Thursday. Stick-

thin, gray-haired, bespectacled, still showing a trace of his childhood stammer, he is a bookseller turned writer, whose innate shyness doesn't start to fade until he has chatted for at least an hour.

The little boy pictured by his father kneeling at the foot of the bed to say his prayers in real life spent five years in the British army in World War II, saw half a dozen deserts, built bridges, defused bombs, survived shellfire that killed and mutilated men all around him and took a head-wound from shrapnel in Italy.

The battered teddy bear called Winnie-the-Pooh has

survived too, but that bear of very little brain, as his creator said of him, now lives across the Atlantic. Pooh, Eeyore, Piglet and other members of the family are in a showcase at Dutton's, the New York publishers of the Pooh books.

Milne has been invited to visit the United States but has never gone. Would he go to see Pooh if he did? "No, I wouldn't," he said firmly. "What would I expect

to find that I don't already know? "I grew away from Christopher Robin when I was 8 or 9

years old. That was 50 years ago. But the tourists who come to the bookshop don't want to think of me as anyone else," he said ruefully.

Just then, a voice winged between the shelves, bringing temporary halt to the interview. "There he is. Go and shake hands and you can say you've shaken hands with Christopher Robin

"Let's go upstairs," said Milne, leading the way to the

top of his Harbor Bookshop in Dartmouth, a plot of picture-book Devon on the River Dart estuary. The harbor wall is lined with contemporary Christopher Robins dangling fishing lines for crabs.

Milne and his wife, Lesley, came to Dartmouth in 1951 after an unhappy period in which he couldn't find a job to suit him. For a time, he'd sold lampshades in a London store.

"I hadn't been trained for anything," he said, "My name was famous all over the world but it made me miserable to be pointed out as the son of my father.

"I wanted to escape from his fame and from 'Christopher Robin.' We ran away from London and the bookshop we opened was a success. We have been happy here, even if it did mean wrapping up those four books for customers '

Those four books - books which made Alan Alexander Milne and his only child famous - sold and are still selling in millions, translated into more than 20 languages

The first came out in 1924 - "When we were veryyoung" - a collection of 44 verses in which the boy and his nanny go to Buckingham Palace and the famous bear bought at Harrods when Christopher Robin was a year old - makes his bow.

In 1925, the Milnes moved from London to the Sussex woodlands around Cotchford Farm, and there A.A. Milne set his next book - "Winnie-the-Pooh" - in what the younger Milne still fondly recalls as the beautiful setting of "my idyllic childhood."

More poems followed in 1927 with "Now we are six," and more stories in 1928 in "The House at Pooh Corner."

"Right from the start, journalists visited us to interview my father and to see me," Milne recalled. "There were a lot of silly stories. I was teased and boys did call out, 'Where's your teddy bear?'"

His father died in 1956, his mother, Dorothy, in 1971. In 1974, when he was 54, the son finally exorcised Christopher Robin

"I did it by writing a book, 'The Enchanted Places, which was the story of my childhood. I didn't know what I really thought until I stopped being him. Every child wants to grow up."



THE ONE WAY by B.W. Briggs

WE CANNOT BUT SPEAK THE THINGS WHICH WE SAW AND HEARD...So boldly did Peter and John speak before the rulers in Acts 4! But was it just words without conviction? I think not! I know not! Because in Acts 5 we find them imprisoned again for speaking those same things of Jesus the Christ. In that context they make the statement, "we must obey God rather than men." Are these type of men alive today, friends? I have heard of people giving their lives and their freedoms for speaking the good news about Jesus. I know of brethen who have been imprisoned for spreading the gospel. Yes, people like Peter and John still exist. But Peter and John represent only two of the many who were being persecuted for THE FAITH! In the eighth chapter of this same letter we see the Jerusalem church under fire. They are scattered throughout the regions of Judea and Samaria. In so doing they continued to spread the gospel, in spite of Saul's threatenings and slaughters. Regardless of Saul's breaking and entering practices, they continue whole heartedly to spread that good news. Whatever the cost - they are ready to die for the message of Jesus! In Revelation 12, verse eleven, we read that the Christians in victory are those who have overcome by three principles. 1) Because of the Lamb's blood. 2) Because of the word of their testimony. 3) Because they loved not their lives - even if it brought death. The three principles mentioned in the Revelation context are common to other New Testament writings. The church has been bought with a price. (Acts 20:28.) Blood specifically! And it does not own itself, whether individually or corporately. (1 Cor. 6:19-20). That is the initial step into Christ! Secondly, speaking the words of Christ will bring salvation and persecution. (Matt. 10:20-39.) Thirdly, faithfulness to your spoken profession will in many cases (depending as to when you have lived) bring death to you and yours. (Matt. 23:34-35; 10:21, 28; Rev. 6:9; 20:4.) Now, what kind of person are you? Are you as Peter and John or are you as Judas who totally sold out the Lord. Or maybe Peter is a better example having denied the Lord thrice? However, Peter repented! I suppose most of us faulter at times. But have you ever really counted the cost and decided to finish it out. Many people are like those disciples who once walked with him but eventually ceased following. Is there something that is stopping you from making a commitment? Are you bold enough to take the challenge? Would you rather obey God than man? If you have not obeyed the following, you are unsaved. Regardless of what your "pastor" or 'preacher" tells you, have you obeyed God in the following? (John 3:18; 8:23-24; Lk. 13:3, 5; Mt. 10:32-33; Rom. 10:9-10; Mk. 16:15-16; Mt. 28:19-20; Jn. 3:3-5.)




