Lazbuddie Tops Goals On TEAMS

Lazbuddie I.S.D. Board of Education, in its regular meeting recently, heard the results of the state-mandated Texas Educational Assessment of Minimum Skills (TEAMS) which was given state-wide to students in grades three, five, seven and nine in February.

School officials and the Board of Education were pleased with the results reported by Anne R. Farris, Elementary Principal and High School Counselor. The report showed that 100 per cent of the students in grades five and seven mastered reading.

Strengths were also shown in the area of mathematics where over 93 per cent of the students in grades five, seven and eleven demonstrated mastery; at the third and ninth grade levels, 83 per cent and 89 per cent demonstrated mastery in mathematics.

In writing, the seventh graders led the district with 93 per cent mastering. At the ninth and eleventh grade levels, 83 per cent and 88 per cent of the students mastered writing while 61 per cent of the third and fifth graders demonstrated mastery.

There was significant improvement in the district's overall scores from previous years. The state originally encouraged districts to strive for 85 per cent mastery. Lazbuddie students have exceeded the state's original expectations at every grade level in math, in four of five grade levels in reading, and in three of five grade levels in writing.

"Reaching the 100 per cent mastery in reading is a goal every school district strives for," said Mrs. Farris. "It's very exciting to see that 100 per cent of the students in two grades in Lazbuddie demonstrated mastery in reading."

Joe A. Hall, superintendent, cited a strong instructional program as part of the reason for the district's success. "Teachers at every grade level are aware of the TEAMS objectives and have prepared their curriculum documents to include intense instruction in reading, writing, and mathematics."

Pioneer Resident Is Dead

William A. Black, 82, of San Antonio, died Saturday, June 20, 1987. Black was a native of Hereford and his father was one of the early settlers of Deaf Smith County. The family still maintains farming interests in the Black Community.

He was a retired district manager of Employers Casualty Company. Black was a graduate of Baylor University and was a member of the past president of CPCU. He was also a member of Sons of the Colonial Clergy, Sons of the Republic of Texas, and Descendants of the Signers of Magna Charta.

The family suggests that memorials be made to the Deaf Smith County Historical Society or the charity of their choice. Graveside services were held in the church-yard of the Concord Methodist Church, a country church outside of Eatonon, Georgia, which was founded in 1810 on the plantation of his great-grandfather.

Mr. and Mrs. Black celebrated their 59th wedding anniversary on June 2, 1987.

Survivors are his wife, Dorothy Sparkman Black, San Antonio; one son and daughter-in-law, Stanley and Carolyn Shotts Black, Santo Domingo, Dominican Republic; three grandchildren, Bill, Caroline and Mike Black; one sister, Mrs. Clement Birkmeyer, Amarillo, and a brother-in-law, Dr. Robert Sparkman, Dallas, Texas.

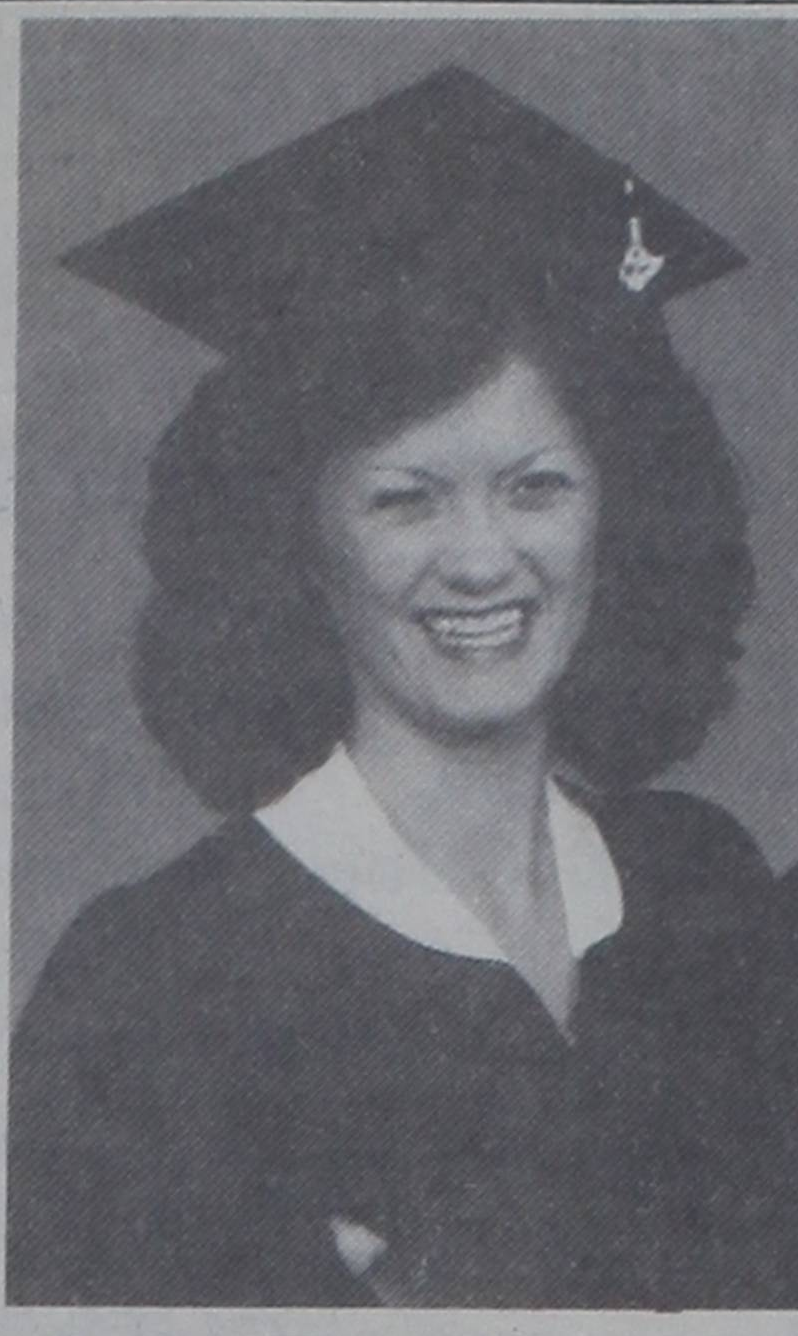
Burial will be in the City of Lubbock Cemetery.

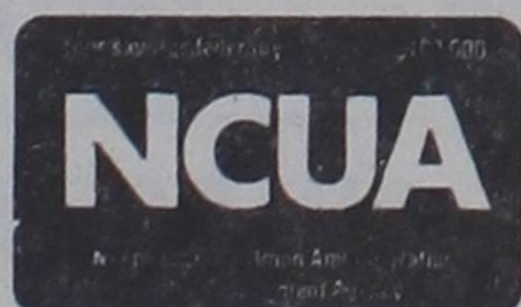

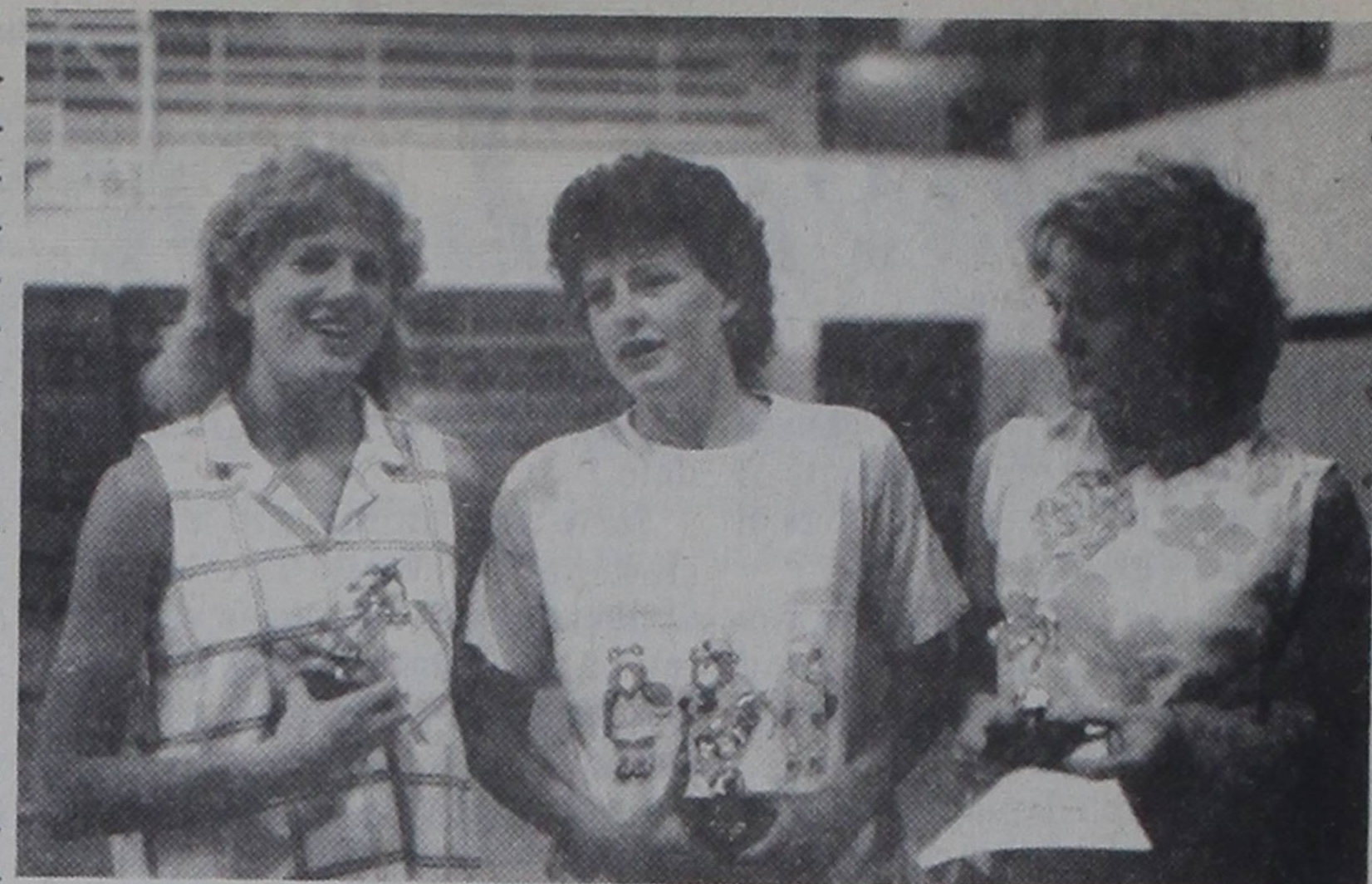

Joining the group were Mr. and Mrs. Ben Sparks and children of Big Springs, Texas. Mr. Sparks is a cousin of the Barker family.

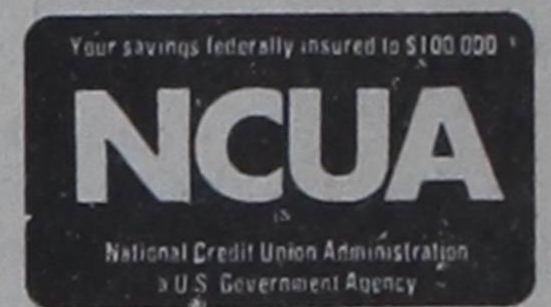

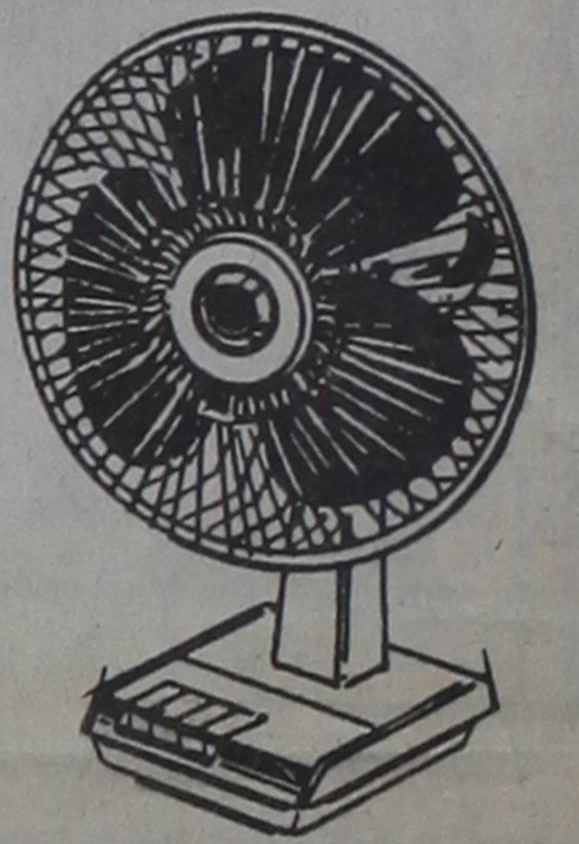
