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Jury selection under way

Clayton arraigned in Brilab inquiry

Speaker Billy Clayton and the three others indicted in the FBI Brilab investigation were arraigned for a second time today, a mere formality, and all once again pleaded innocent.

Typographical errors in the indictment against Clayton, labor leader L.G. Moore, and Austin attornies Donald R. Ray and Randall B. Wood, necessitated this second arraignment.

Shortly afterward, a panel of 100 people assembled in the courtroom for the selection of a jury for the trial of Clayton, Ray and Wood. Moore will be tried at a later date.

Jobs, justice promised

Robert O'Conor they would need about one and a half weeks to present their case and defense attorneys estimated they would need at least

The jury selection is expected to take at least two days.

Clayton, a veteran of 20 years in the Texas Legislature, and attorneys Wood and Ray were indicted by a grand jury June 12 on charges of extortion, racketeering, fraud and

The indictment accuses Clayton of accepting \$5,000 from labor leader L.G. Moore of Deer Park during a

Carter campaigning

Entries slow to come in

It's feast or famine for Agriculture Division and Women's Division entries being submitted at Howard County Fair today, said superintendents of the two divisions.

The summer drought is slowing submission of agricultural entries to a snail's pace.

At 10:30 a.m. there were only 15 entries submitted.

The agricultural division is going to be a little slow. They're bringing in what they have," said Bertie Shaw, general superintendent of the division. A little cotton has been brought in, okra, peppers, carrots, and watermelons.

"The dry weather is really cutting down on the number of entries we're having," said Mrs. Shaw. Entries don't close until 4:30 p.m.

and bring what they have." Entries that wouldn't normally be submitted are being submitted. "People are saying, 'My little ol' bitty entry won't amount to anything," but they are being encouraged to bring in their produce anyway, said Mrs. Shaw.

The Women's division, on the other hand, is experiencing a higher number of entries than last year.

"It's looking good. We're just swamped with entries. We're going to have a beautiful exhibit. Canned goods will be the least because of the drought. Arts and crafts are just piled up," said Bula Rhodes, general superintendent of the Women's

Local men have also been submitting needle and latch work. Mrs. Rhodes said doctors were prescribing the craft "strictly for people who are very nervous.

Mrs. Rhodes said there would be at least 600 entries this year. Bertie Shaw described the county

WASHINGTON (AP) - Tim Kraft, who as President Carter's national campaign manager has run the dayto-day details of Carter's re-election effort, is taking a "leave of absence" amid an investigation into allegations he used cocaine in 1977.

Kraft said in a statement issued Sunday that he is "completely innocent of the charges," which reportedly are being investigated by a special prosecutor

But, he added, "I have concluded that I can best serve the president and avoid political exploitation of the false charges against me by taking a leave of absence from the campaign.

"I have not worked hard for President Carter for the past six years just to become a subject of political controversy in the final six weeks of his re-election campaign," Kraft said, Kraft 39 worked as a White House aide before joining the re-election effort and is the third high-level

Carter aide to become involved in a drug controversy. He worked directly under - and at one point shared a house with — Hamilton Jordan, who was accused of using cocaine at New York's Studio 54

A special prosecutor, Arthur Christy of New York, found there was not sufficient evidence to prosecute Jordan on cocaine charges, and Kraft mentioned in his statement that it was Christy's investigation which led to the allegations against him.

Kraft said he was advised by the Justice Department last week that "matters under preliminary investigation by the FBI had been referred to the court for the appointment of a special prosecutor, and I have now learned from press reports that a special prosecutor has in fact been appointed."

The New York Times reported

Sunday that a panel of federal judges had appointed New Orleans attorney Gerald J. Gallinghouse to investigate an allegation that Kraft had used cocaine several years ago in the Louisiana city

Neither Gallinghouse, the White House nor the Justice Department would comment on the investigation of Kraft.

Robert S. Strauss, chairman of the Carter re-election campaign, issued a statement Sunday saying

"I deeply regret that the Carter-Mondale campaign will be deprived of the services of a fine young man who has categorically denied the allegations against him. I have no doubt that Tim will be vindicated and I trust that everyone will understand that the appointment of a special prosecutor under the Ethics in Government Act is in no way an indication of guilt or wrongdoing.

Abbie Hoffman

NEW YORK (AP) - Abbie Hoffman was indicted today by a grand jury on bail-jumping charges for allegedly fleeing in 1974 to avoid prosecution on drug charges.

Hoffman, 43, was handcuffed and led out of Manhattan's state Supreme Court to be photographed, finger-printed and booked on the new charge, which carries a maximum of four

which carries a maximum of four Hoffman surrendered Sept. 4 to face charges that he sold three pounds of cocaine to an undercover police of-

ficer in 1973. The founder of the Youth International Party, or Yippies, faces a maximum sentence of life in prison if convicted on the drug charge, but sources have said Hoffman would be allowed to plead to an unspecified

reduced charge.

Hoffman told reporters after his surrender that he spent most of his fugitve years as a free-lance writer and community activist in Fineview, N.Y., a small community near the St. He was released on his own

recognizance by Justice Milton Williams, who noted that Hoffman had surrendered voluntarily.

His surrender coincided with the publication of his new book, "Soon To Be A Major Motion Picture."

Man admits firing shotgun

LUBBOCK, Texas (AP) — A Lubbock man died early Sunday morning from a shotgun blast fired by a 78-year-old man who told police he thought someone was trying to break into his home.

Pedro Martinez, Jr., 35, was pronounced dead on arrival at Lubbock General. An autopsy showed he had been struck by about 75 pellets in the chest, shoulder and throat, police said.

Three men also were wounded in the incident. The case will be turned over to the district attorney's office today, police said.

Justice of the Peace Wayne LaCroix has ruled the death a homicide, the city's 25th this year.

The man told police he was awakened by people fighting outside his front door, heard gunshots and then telephoned police. After he called police, he said he heard glass

breaking. He grabbed his shotgun and fired three times, once toward the ceiling and twice through the front door, he told officers. Also wounded were Israel Espinoza, 23;





other communities across America, are plagued with hot check writers. People who might be solid citizens in every other way do not see anything wrong with handing across a promissory note to a business man for goods or services received, even though there is no chance the money. will be at the bank when the receiver of the check goes by to pick it up.

Perhaps the bad check writers would be less prone to try and pass such IOUs if a system here could be developed like the one now being used

IN THE PAST in Lubbock, the hot check artist usually was charged with a misdemeanor, which at most carries one year in jail as punishment.

Now, the district attorney's worthlesscheck office is prosecuting many bogus check writers for felony theft.

It's paying off," according to Mark McBride, who illustrated his optimistic attitude by pointing to recent grand jury indictments against upwards to 20 people true-billed for felony thefts each month.

That's a far cry from a year ago, when indictments for such offenses were practically nil. Although there has always been cooperation between the JP courts, where criminal charges are filed, and the district attorney's office, in charge of case prosecution, the physical separation between the two created a situation where the right hand didn't always know what the left hand was doing.

merchant had a choice of making a complaint on a hot check either taking the information to one of the three JPs within the city or to the district attorney's office.

But when a merchant could file complaints in all these places, a JP in one precinct had no way of knowing if that same individual his office had charged was being prosecuted for passing a bogus check in another precinct as well

HABITUAL WORTHLESS check writers often skipped through the system with only misdemeanor fines small checks because one precinct's JP was unaware of perhaps dozens of bad checks filed against the same individual in Lubbock County's six other JP courts

Now, according to McBride, the worthless check office helps alleviate this problem by keeping detailed records from across the county on continual offenders.

Where the writer of one small bad check can be charged only with a misdemeanor, McBride noted, the check office information allows authorities to aggregate the sums of many small bad checks by one writer. And, he added, the total frequently surpasses the statutory minimum of \$200 required for a felony theft charge to be filed.

There is no telling what the dollar count amounts to here from bad check writers but, over a year's time, it no doubt reaches hundreds of thousands of dollars. Many of those are by people who habitually break the law.

Reagan vs staff

WASHINGTON - Ronald Reagan's clear reaffirmation Tuesday night of Kemp-Roth tax reduction as the heart of his economic growth program only came after yet another effort by his staff to retreat under Democratic fire. Reagan reflexively objected to a draft of the economic speech that would have stretched the three-year 30 percent tax cut to five years. Like much else foisted on him of late by his

properly exposed him to charges that he was conceding the anti-tax cut The avalanche of economic advisers

from the Ford administration had suffocated tax cut talk until Tuesday night's address in Chicago before the International Business Council. Most of his recent stump speeches have not even mentioned tax reduction. His new television spets soft-pedal the

THAT IS ANOTHER example of the Reagan campaign deteriorating into a struggle between candidate and staff. While aides whisper comments to newsmen about the blundering candidate, the fact is that many of the campaign bloopers since the national conventions are more attributable to

This was pointed up Sept. 3 when Reagan and five outside economic advisers, he in a sport shirt and they coatless but wearing ties, met in the garden at Wexford, his rented Virginia estate. The draft — prepared by Dr. Martin Anderson, a senior domestic policy adviser, and veteran Republican speechwriter William Gavin - would have stretched Reagan-Kemp-Roth tax cuts over five

candidate. This must be changed back to three years, Reagan said. Rep. Jack Kemp, discussing issues face-to-face with Reagan for the first time in six months, naturally agreed, Less naturally, he was backed by Dr. Charles Walker, former deputy treasury secretary who once pressed for a stretch-out but has now joined forces with Kemp.

For political justification, Reagan passed around a new Gallup Poll commissioned by the U.S. Chamber of Commerce which shows a 54 percent to 30 percent nationwide margin in support of a 10 percent rate reduction in taxes this year — as proposed in the first year of Kemp-Roth. The same

voters think inflation would be increased by a 10 percent tax cut.

These figures should come as a surprise only to those politicians and journalists who seem to think that hard-pressed taxpayers really do not want relief. When we ask voters in our own door-to-door interviewing whether they favor an immediate tax cut, the response is usually positive and frequently incredulous that anybody would have to ask.

BUT THE CARTER theme that tax reduction is inflationary poison being forced on desperately resisting taxpayers had been making headway within the Reagan camp. Indeed, on the day of the economic meeting at Wexford, an astute Democratic strategist told us the Carter team's attacks had succeeded in stifling Reagan's tax reduction talk.

Besides insisting on the three-year tax reduction span, Reagan also was displeased with the vagueness of the first draft. To make his point, he told his advisers he would rather deliver an accompanying fact sheet than the speech; as a result, figures from the fact sheet detailing massive tax increases under the present system

were inserted in his speech. This is not merely sloppy staff work that is commonplace in the Reagan campaign. One Reagan-for-president leaflet, listing only Ford administration officials as the candidate's economic team, calls for tax reduction providing people "with more money to spend, creating a demand for more goods and services.'

Such an argument is pure Keynesian, demand-side economics. ignores supply-side economic theory behind the tax cuts, as stated by Reagan in Chicago Tuesday night: "More than any single thing, high rates of taxation destroy incentive to earn, to save, to invest. They cripple productivity, lead to deficit financing and inflation and create unem-

Here is a doctrine that Ronald Reagan believes strikes a most responsive chord with ordinary Americans in these days of economic stress, even if his staffers and the economists inherited from President Ford do not. But it had been so long since Reagan talked that way that many close listeners, including pleased Democratic politicians, thought he had forgotten his own lessons. In this as in much else, the candidate's sins can be traced to his

Unlike your views and thoughts, it is not human speculation -it is God's Word.

When we turn to the Bible we find several very important truths on this subject. For one thing, we discover

The government's fueleconomy figures for new cars, criticized for years by motorists who say they don't reflect reality, may be

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The Environmental Protection Agency is considering various formulas to adjust the laboratory test figures downward and better reflect what a driver can expect on the road. EPA officials say they have not decided how much the

but they hope to issue notice of a proposed rule change in the next few weeks.

Critics say the effort is long overdue. An Energy Department study of the actual mileage drivers got showed the EPA ratings for 1978 model cars were 21 percent too high.

Rep. Les Aspin, D-Wis., issuing his own report on the ratings, said they were "more myth than reality." "Some of the disparity can

be blamed on the auto companies that exploit every loophole and in a few cases may be cheating outright, but much of the blame has to be laid at the doors of the EPA," Aspin said. "The public is being misled and the worst thing is that it's the federal government doing

the misleading." The tests are done in laboratories with cars running on treadmills rather than under actual driving conditions, a situation the

EPA admits leads to inflated figures since rough roads, wind resistance and other weather factors aren't present to reduce mileage. But the EPA maintains at

Aspin's report also attacks the EPA tests because fuel not measured directly but by an indirect sampling of exhaust emissions. He said this analysis can exaggerate fuel

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
