Jury selection under way

Clayton arraigned in Brilab inquiry

HOUSTON (AP) — Texas House Speaker Billy Clayton and the three others indicted in the FBI Brilab investigation were arraigned for a second time today, a mere formality, and all once again pleaded innocent. Typographical errors in the indictment against Clayton, labor leader L.G. Moore, and Austin attorneys Donald R. Ray and Randall B. Wood, necessitated this second arraignment. Shortly afterward, a panel of 100 people assembled in the courtroom for the selection of a jury for the trial of Clayton, Ray and Wood. Moore will be tried at a later date.

Prosecutors told U.S. District Judge Robert O'Connor they would need about one and a half weeks to present their case and defense attorneys estimated they would need at least three weeks. The jury selection is expected to take at least two days. Clayton, a veteran of 20 years in the Texas Legislature, and attorneys Wood and Ray were indicted by a grand jury June 12 on charges of extortion, racketeering, fraud and conspiracy. The indictment accuses Clayton of accepting \$5,000 from labor leader L.G. Moore of Deer Park during a

Nov. 8, 1979, meeting. At the meeting and taping the conversation was FBI informant Joseph Hauser. The trial originally was to start Sept. 8, but was postponed three times by U.S. District Judge Robert O'Connor — twice so the defense could appeal from legal rulings and once because of the Jewish holiday Rosh Hashana. Defense attorneys suffered a setback Friday when U.S. Supreme Court Justice Lewis F. Powell refused to grant limited immunity to Moore. The labor leader, also charged in the Brilab investigation, is to stand trial at a later date.

Jobs, justice promised

Carter campaigning in Corpus Christi

CORPUS CHRISTI, Texas (AP) — President Carter began a whirlwind tour of the South today to try to cement his strength against a Republican challenge in his native Dixie. Ronald Reagan wasn't far behind. Carter's first stop was Texas, which presidential spokesman Jody Powell conceded is very close between Carter and his Republican challenger. Powell noted the Republicans expect to raise \$2 million to spend in Texas in addition to the public funds available to presidential candidates. "That's gonna be a real problem for us," the White House press secretary told reporters aboard Air Force One

en route from Washington. Powell also announced Carter will hold a news conference in Washington Thursday afternoon. It will be his first since Aug. 4. Carter carried every state of the old Confederacy except Virginia in 1976, but his political operatives expect the conservative Reagan to present formidable opposition in the president's native South this fall. One key state is Texas, where Carter was holding a "town hall" meeting in Corpus Christi this morning before going on to Houston for a Democratic National Committee fund-raiser and a rally for campaign volunteers.

On his arrival at Corpus Christi Naval Air Station, the president was greeted by several hundred flag-waving civilians and a Mexican dance ensemble wearing sombreros and native costumes. In remarks prepared for the Corpus Christi gathering, where Mexican-Americans are a major political force and the Navy has a major air base, Carter promised jobs and justice for Hispanics and strengthening of the armed forces. The president said "nearly 5 million Hispanics are at work today — one out of four in a new job" created during his administration.

Carter re-election aide takes leave amid drug investigation

WASHINGTON (AP) — Tim Kraft, who as President Carter's national campaign manager has run the day-to-day details of Carter's re-election effort, is taking a "leave of absence" amid an investigation into allegations he used cocaine in 1977. Kraft said in a statement issued Sunday that he is "completely innocent of the charges," which reportedly are being investigated by a special prosecutor. But, he added, "I have concluded that I can best serve the president and avoid political exploitation of the false charges against me by taking a leave of absence from the campaign." "I have not worked hard for President Carter for the past six years just to become a subject of political controversy in the final six weeks of his re-election campaign," Kraft said. Kraft, 39, worked as a White House aide before joining the re-election effort and is the third high-level Carter aide to become involved in a drug controversy. He worked directly under — and at one point shared a house with — Hamilton Jordan, who was accused of using cocaine at New York's Studio 54

discotheque. A special prosecutor, Arthur Christy of New York, found there was not sufficient evidence to prosecute Jordan on cocaine charges, and Kraft mentioned in his statement that it was Christy's investigation which led to the allegations against him. He said they grew out of an "investigation by a previous special prosecutor into allegations against Hamilton Jordan which after a protracted investigation were proven to be baseless." Kraft said he was advised by the Justice Department last week that "matters under preliminary investigation by the FBI had been referred to the court for the appointment of a special prosecutor, and I have now learned from press reports that a special prosecutor has in fact been appointed." The New York Times reported

Sunday that a panel of federal judges had appointed New Orleans attorney Gerald J. Gallinghouse to investigate an allegation that Kraft had used cocaine several years ago in the Louisiana city. Neither Gallinghouse, the White House nor the Justice Department would comment on the investigation of Kraft. Robert S. Strauss, chairman of the Carter re-election campaign, issued a statement Sunday saying: "I deeply regret that the Carter-Mondale campaign will be deprived of the services of a fine young man who has categorically denied the allegations against him. I have no doubt that Tim will be vindicated and I trust that everyone will understand that the appointment of a special prosecutor under the Ethics in Government Act is in no way an indication of guilt or wrongdoing."

Trustees plan study of bids

Howard College trustees will consider bids on music equipment and discuss the employment of a Director of Administrative Services and a bursar when they convene in regular session here at noon Tuesday. The board will also discuss a telephone system for the school and look into a plan for compensation for special assignments for Division Heads on the college campus. A proposal to renovate the school administration building will be discussed, as well as a plan for per diem policy. The trustees will also take another look at bids for new college vehicles. A report from College President Dr. Charles Hays will conclude the meeting.

Potential voters from 36 counties are expected to participate Tuesday, Sept. 23 in "Texas Round-up for Reagan-Bush" events scheduled in Abilene, Big Spring, San Angelo and Brownwood. Gov. Bill Clements and former Governor John Connally are being featured in the 23 county "Round-Up" tour. It is being sponsored by the Texas Victory Committee on behalf of the Reagan-Bush ticket. It is aimed at registering Reagan-Bush supporters before the Oct. 3 deadline and encouraging them to vote Nov. 4. Clements and Connally and their wives will begin the day in Abilene for the first of four West Texas rallies at 9:30 a.m. at the Civic Center. They will hold a news conference immediately after the round-up rally. Then they come to Big Spring for a noon luncheon and rally and press conference at the Dorothy Garrett Coliseum. Tickets will be sold locally for the event and in the outlying counties of Scurry, Dawson, Glass-

cock, Martin, Sterling, Andrews, Gaines, Borden and Mitchell. Later they travel to San Angelo for a rally on the lawn of the Tom Green county courthouse at 2:30 p.m. The day's activities will be rounded up with a free barbecue supper expected to draw participants from 11 counties at the Brownwood Coliseum at 6:30 p.m. John Armstrong of Kingsville, the "Round-Up" chairman, said Clements and Connally have been drawing enthusiastic crowds at all of the events which began in the Texas Panhandle Sept. 7. "It is obvious that people are fed up with the Jimmy Carter hogwash and lack of leadership responsible for inflation, high unemployment and other economic hardships," said Armstrong. "We must make sure that the majority of the people eligible to vote register before the deadline and then go to the polls Nov. 4 in order to save this country from disaster."

For fair's farm division

Entries slow to come in

It's feast or famine for Agriculture Division and Women's Division entries being submitted at Howard County Fair today, said superintendents of the two divisions. The summer drought is slowing submission of agricultural entries to a snail's pace. At 10:30 a.m. there were only 15 entries submitted. "The agricultural division is going to be a little slow. They're bringing in what they have," said Bertie Shaw, general superintendent of the division. A little cotton has been brought in, okra, peppers, carrots, and watermelons. "The dry weather is really cutting down on the number of entries we're having," said Mrs. Shaw. Entries don't close until 4:30 p.m. "We're telling people to go home

and bring what they have." Entries that wouldn't normally be submitted are being submitted. "People are saying, 'My little ol' bitty entry won't amount to anything,' but they are being encouraged to bring in their produce anyway," said Mrs. Shaw. The Women's division, on the other hand, is experiencing a higher number of entries than last year. "It's looking good. We're just swamped with entries. We're going to have a beautiful exhibit. Canned goods will be the least because of the drought. Arts and crafts are just piled up," said Bula Rhodes, general superintendent of the Women's Division. She explained the reason for the abundance. "Both men and women have more leisure time. We're finding that a lot of men are doing these

things also." Men have submitted woodworking and furniture entries. Local men have also been submitting needle and latch work. Mrs. Rhodes said doctors were prescribing the craft "strictly for people who are very nervous." Mrs. Rhodes said there would be at least 600 entries this year. Bertie Shaw described the county fair as "a good thing. It encourages people to be proud of what they are. I just think it's a real good thing for a community." Women's Division judging started at 1:30 p.m. At 4 p.m. the fair officially opens, though there will be no formal ceremony at which time sale of tickets begins. Two events get under way at 7 p.m. An event called "Battle of the Bands" will begin at 7 p.m. Also at 7 p.m. the Barrow Show begins. There will be 18 Durocs entered, along with 17 Cross-breds, and nine others. The barrows will be sold at auction at 7 p.m. Tuesday. The carnival will still be in full swing tonight and the Zoological Petting Zoo enables young and old alike to purchase handfuls of feed for the animals. The zoo of Odessa has been coming here for three years.

Special Crime Line may be installed locally

Local detectives may install a special Crime Line at the Big Spring Police Department sometime next week. The line, which will be used to gain information about a variety of crimes which have occurred in the city, is the brainchild of Detective George Quintero. "I've heard about a line like this working in other cities, and I thought it would be a good idea for Big Spring," said Quintero. The line will provide a direct phone link to the local detective division for people who wish to volunteer information about various crimes which will be listed by the police department. The caller may remain completely anonymous to officers. According to Quintero, crimes will be listed in the Big Spring Herald on a weekly basis. The crimes listed will include those in which detectives have reached a dead end; those which seem to reoccur often in a particular area; those which involve a great deal of money; and vandalism, which officers find particularly hard to track down. Quintero hopes to be able to offer rewards for information about some crimes in the future, but has not yet found funding. In the meantime, he

hopes that information will be volunteered without the reward incentive.

Man admits firing shotgun

LUBBOCK, Texas (AP) — A Lubbock man died early Sunday morning from a shotgun blast fired by a 78-year-old man who told police he thought someone was trying to break into his home.

Pedro Martinez, Jr., 35, was pronounced dead on arrival at Lubbock General. An autopsy showed he had been struck by about 75 pellets in the chest, shoulder and throat, police said.

Three men also were wounded in the incident. The case will be turned over to the district attorney's office today, police said.

Justice of the Peace Wayne LaCroix has ruled the death a homicide, the city's 25th year.

The man told police he was awakened by people fighting outside his front door, heard gunshots and then telephoned police.

After he called police, he said he heard glass breaking. He grabbed his shotgun and fired three times, once toward the ceiling and twice through the front door, he told officers.

Also wounded were Israel Espinoza, 23; Guadalupe Enriquez, 30; and Leo Bardia Garcia, 38. Garcia was in satisfactory condition at Lubbock General.

Balloon, spirits go up

PITTSBURGH (AP) — Know someone who needs a lift?

A new service, Balloons Over America, offers well-wishers an alternative to roses or greeting cards. For a fee, a customer can send a friend a fistful of helium-filled, beachball-size balloons tied to ribbon streamers.

"I've never seen anybody not smile when they get them," said Dan Weisberg, operator of the new franchise here.

Balloons Over Pittsburgh, which opened a month ago, is one of the franchises. Weisberg said others are located in Boston, New York's Long Island, Baltimore, Atlanta and London.

The deliveries, at a cost of \$21 a dozen, are made in cities that have the franchises. For those that don't, parcel post is used.

The balloons are showing up in the most unlikely places — such as the chambers of Pennsylvania Supreme Court Justice Rolf Larsen.

Weisberg delivered a dozen birthday balloons to Pittsburgh Steeler lineman L.C. Greenwood from his wife, Jane. And he took "a roomful of balloons" to Suzanne Lacy, wife of Pittsburgh Pirate Lee Lacy, during a recent hospital stay.

Weisberg usually is greeted with stares and wide-eyed expressions when he enters office buildings surrounded by colorful balloons.

"The best part is going into hospitals," he said. "A floor full of nurses will follow you into a room."

Jury selection is under way

Jury selections began today in 118th District Court for two upcoming criminal trials.

Frank Morphis, 23, Sand Springs, will be tried first for aggravated robbery of the Paper Moon Lounge. He was arrested the morning of April 19 and released on \$50,000 bond set by Justice of the Peace Lewis Heflin. He was indicted June 11.

"Dooley," who holds dual citizenship in his home land and this country, is staying with his grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. S.M. Rushing, here.

Head count up after 2 weeks

OPEC oil pricing debated

Iran threatens blocking action

VIENNA, Austria (AP) — Iran tangled with Saudi Arabia today and threatened to block OPEC's first joint plan for raising oil prices and controlling production. The 13-nation cartel opened debate on the long-term proposal at its 20th anniversary meeting here.

OPEC General-Secretary Rene Ortiz confirmed that oil pricing had been discussed in the first session. Iran's chief delegate, Ali Akbar Moïnfar, threatened to block action on the plan unless the Organization of Petroleum Exporting Countries conference also

discussed production. Iran blocked Iraq from chairing the conference, apparently because of the two countries' recent border fighting, conference sources said. Iran threatened to demand a reversal of the agenda if Iraq took the chair, forcing a discussion of

current oil prices and production disputes before taking up the long-term strategy — the official subject of the meeting. Algeria, which has held the presidency since the June meeting in Algiers, was chosen to serve as chairman. Iraq was originally scheduled to preside over the meeting and also hold the rotating presidency until an OPEC summit in Baghdad starting Nov. 4.

Algerian Foreign Minister Mohammed S. Benyahia was named chairman and Iraqi Oil Minister Tayeh Abdul Karim was named alternate chairman. The OPEC secretary-general said Iraq will preside at the Baghdad conference as originally planned.

"If we do not have a short-term decision on production, then it's a joke to have a long-term strategy," said Iran's chief delegate. He called for a Saudi production cut to drain off the current world oil glut and keep prices up.

"That's not right," Saudi Oil Minister Sheik Ahmed Zaki Yamani, a proponent of the long-term plan, told reporters when asked about Moïnfar's contention. He said Saudi Arabia still had made no decision about its fourth-quarter production.

Although no serious disagreement previously appeared looming over the joint strategy of the Organization of Petroleum Exporting Countries, Moïnfar said when asked if he thought a long-term pricing plan would be

worked out, "I don't think so."

But with the oil market glutted again, several ministers predicted there would be no price increase before next year.

There had appeared to be general agreement among the oil, finance and foreign ministers on a long-term strategy plan with provisions for raising oil prices every three months to keep up with world inflation, currency fluctuations and economic growth in industrial countries.

They also had appeared ready to agree on automatic joint cuts in production when the market is oversupplied and joint increases when supplies are felt to be too low.

"Hopefully we will have a unanimous decision," said Sheik Ahmed Zaki Yamani, Saudi Arabia's oil minister and a major backer of the plan.

"In the long term, we want to gradually reach the cost of alternative sources of energy," said Iraqi Oil Minister Tayeh Abdul Karim.

"This will encourage the industrialized countries to shift their dependence to other forms of energy. Otherwise, there will be a disaster at the end of the 1980s."

"Even if the OPEC countries produce at their maximum capacity there will not be enough oil. We will also be protected against inflation and any fall in the dollar."

OPEC economists estimate that the cost of energy from other sources now averages the equivalent of \$60 a barrel. OPEC's base price is \$32 for a 42-gallon barrel of oil.

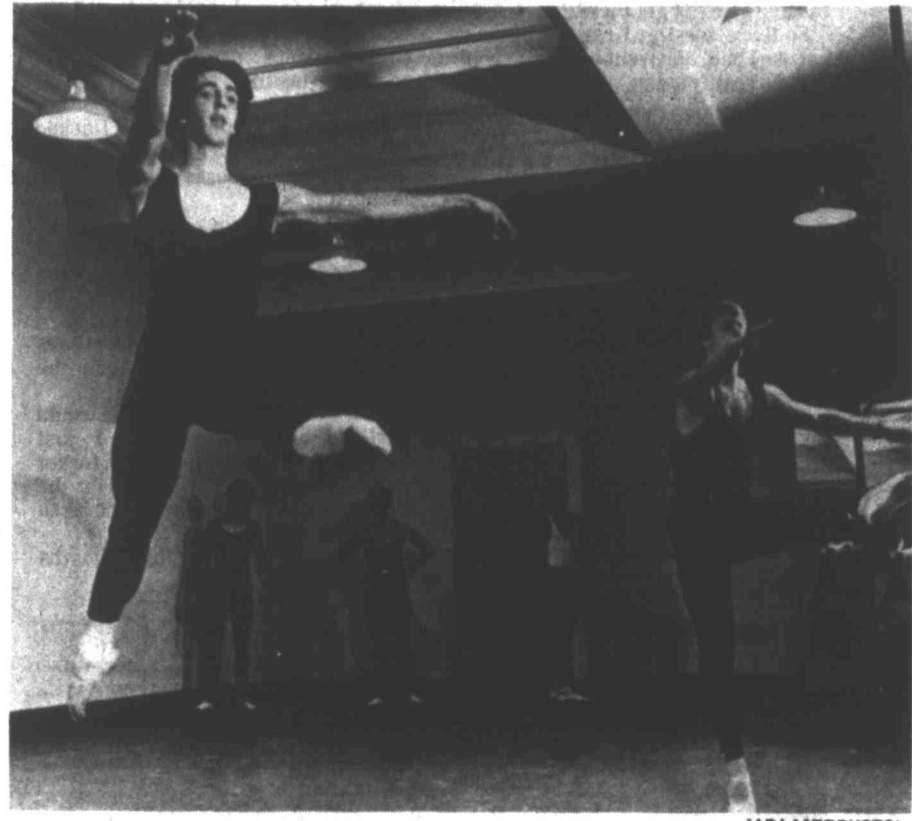
Since January 1979, market conditions, OPEC economic worries and world politics have driven oil prices up 132 percent. Some British economists predict the OPEC plan would raise oil prices 15 percent within a year. But some of the oil ministers on their arrival in Vienna said the current glut in the world's oil markets, largely attributed to high Saudi production, made any increase in the \$32 base price unlikely before 1981.

Saudi Arabia was under pressure from more militant OPEC members to reduce its output of 9.5 million barrels a day and to raise its base price of \$28 a barrel to the \$32 level set by other OPEC members in June. But Yamani pointed out to reporters that the Saudi

price is close to the prevailing market price of \$29.50.

The meeting is the biggest gathering of the organization in its headquarters city since the 1975 terrorist attack on a meeting of oil ministers in Vienna. Pro-Palestinian guerrillas killed an Austrian policeman, an OPEC guard and a Libyan statistician, then took 11 of the oil ministers hostage and took them to North Africa.

After that, OPEC held its big meetings in various other cities under extraordinarily heavy security protection.

Air piracy attempts staged during weekend

MIAMI (AP) — Amid a weekend of hijacking activity, the captain of an Eastern Airlines jetliner carrying 95 passengers said "no" when a man passed a flight attendant a note demanding to go to Havana. Ignoring a bomb threat, he landed here safely, the FBI says.

The captain acted one day after a Delta Air Lines 727 was diverted to Cuba in the ninth successful skyjacking since Aug. 10. The jet's seven-member crew and 81 passengers returned safely to Atlanta early Sunday.

Also Sunday, an Eastern ticket agent in Orlando stopped a Cuban refugee who was carrying a bottle of gasoline as he tried to board a plane. On Saturday, another person was arrested after an incident on the ground, and on Friday another hijacking was foiled.

While authorities say the man arrested in Orlando apparently came to this country in the "Freedom Flotilla," they have not identified the two men who diverted the Delta jetliner on a flight from New Orleans to Atlanta, except to say they were Spanish-speaking.

Seven hijackings since Aug. 10 have been blamed on homesick Cuban refugees.

In Sunday's foiled hijacking, an Eastern Boeing 727 captain ignored a would-be hijacker's "kind of long and rambling note" that "said he wanted to go to Havana and had placed a bomb somewhere," according to FBI and Eastern officials.

Carlos Jesus Figueroa, 45, a Tampa resident since arriving from Cuba in the 1960s, was arrested when the plane — on a flight from Tampa to Miami — landed at Miami International Airport. No formal charges had been filed against Figueroa early today, the FBI said.

Figueroa told reporters he wanted to return to Cuba "because I didn't want to live in this country."

The pilot's name was not disclosed because of objections of the Airline Pilot's Association, but officials said the decision whether to land the plane with 95 passengers and a crew of seven or fly to Havana was up to him alone.

"It's certainly up to the pilot... He has the ultimate responsibility and complete

command of his aircraft," said Jack Barker, the Federal Aviation Administration spokesman in Atlanta.

Eastern officials searched their Florida airport facilities and police searched Tampa International Airport, but no bomb was found, they said.

Saturday night, the Delta Air Lines Boeing 727 was diverted to Havana by two men who brandished bottles of liquid and cigarette lighters and repeated "Cuba" and "Havana" because they spoke no English.

The other 81 passengers returned safely to Atlanta early Sunday after a five-hour odyssey, and FBI agents were still trying to identify the hijackers.

In Orlando Sunday, a 43-year-old Cuban refugee was arrested after an Eastern ticket agent matched him with an FAA profile of potential air pirates, and police found a bottle, inside a sock, with about six ounces of gasoline in it.

Miguel Angel Boizantame was charged with attempted destruction of an aircraft and was jailed pending a hearing before a U.S. magistrate, said Orlando policeman William Simmons.

Simmons had stopped frisking the man after the refugee complained the search was painful because of a recent hernia operation.

When the man went to retrieve his belongings after being told he could not board Eastern's flight 969 to Miami and San Juan, Puerto Rico, Simmons found the bottle and noticed "the obvious bulge" at the site of the alleged surgery was gone. "I patted him down and arrested him and we later determined he had never had surgery," Simmons said.

In another ground incident in Windsor Locks, Conn., a 51-year-old Massachusetts man was arrested Saturday at Bradley International Airport after allegedly telling a stewardess aboard an Eastern Airlines jet that "this plane is going to Cuba."

State police were unsure whether the statement, made while the plane was still on the ground, was a joke or a serious threat. But under state law it is illegal to "say anything that could lead to a panic" while on board a plane, said Trooper Ray Oellette.

Harry Swenor, of Springfield, Mass., was charged with breach of the peace and falsely reporting an incident.

On Friday, an attempted hijacking of an Eastern flight from Newark, N.J., to Miami was foiled when two passengers and a stewardess overpowering a Cuban refugee demanding to go to Havana.

89 reported killed in Saudi crash

RIYADH, Saudi Arabia (AP) — A Saudi air force C-130 Hercules troop transport crashed in flames at an airport near Medina, killing all 89 persons aboard, the Saudi Defense Ministry said today.

The Sunday evening crash was the second air disaster in Saudi Arabia in 27 days. On Aug. 19, a Saudi Tristar jetliner based at Riyadh airport, killing 301 passengers and crewmen in the third worst disaster in civil aviation history. Most of the victims were Saudis and Pakistanis.

A Defense Ministry communique issued 14 hours after the crash of the U.S.-built Hercules quoted eyewitnesses as saying the front section of the plane was on fire when the craft fell to earth.

It said the plane was carrying a "group of servicemen" when it crashed near Islam's second holiest city. It was not immediately known if there were any foreigners aboard.

The communique, broadcast by Riyadh Radio, did not give any indication of the cause of the crash. It said Crown Prince Fahd, the day-to-day ruler of this oil-rich kingdom, stayed up all night "following up the progress of the investigation" into the crash.

Crasper nabbed in Oklahoma

Stephen Crasper, 28, Porterville, Calif., was charged Friday with unauthorized use of a motor vehicle.

Crasper was arrested Thursday in Norman, Okla., on a state warrant for parole violation issued by the Texas Department of Corrections.

Bond was set at \$15,000 by Judge Lewis Heflin. No bond has been set.

'More myth than reality'

Mileage estimates may be changed

WASHINGTON (AP) — The government's fuel-economy figures for new cars, criticized for years by motorists who say they don't reflect reality, may be overhauled.

The Environmental Protection Agency is considering various formulas to adjust the laboratory test figures downward and better reflect what a driver can expect on the road. EPA officials say they have not decided how much the

figures should be reduced, but they hope to issue notice of a proposed rule change in the next few weeks.

Critics say the effort is long overdue. An Energy Department study of the actual mileage drivers got showed the EPA ratings for 1978 model cars were 21 percent too high.

Rep. Les Aspin, D-Wis., issuing his own report on the ratings, said they were "more myth than reality."

"Some of the disparity can be blamed on the auto companies that exploit every loophole and in a few cases may be cheating outright, but much of the blame has to be laid at the doors of the EPA," Aspin said. "The public is being misled and the worst thing is that it's the federal government doing the misleading."

The tests are done in laboratories with cars running on treadmills rather than under actual driving conditions, a situation the

EPA admits leads to inflated figures since rough roads, wind resistance and other weather factors aren't present to reduce mileage.

But the EPA maintains it is necessary to test the cars in the laboratory to get a uniformity of results.

Aspin's report also attacks the EPA tests because fuel consumption is not measured directly but by an indirect sampling of exhaust emissions. He said this analysis can exaggerate fuel economy by 4 percent.

But Gregg Dana, an EPA official who works in the fuel-test program, defended the exhaust method, which compares carbon levels in the fuel with levels in the exhaust to determine gasoline mileage.

He said the method gives an accurate reading and also provides the agency with information on emission levels, the principal reason the agency runs the tests.

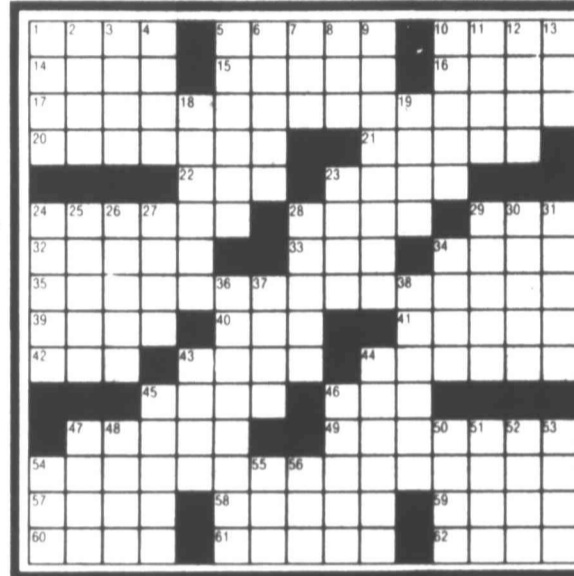
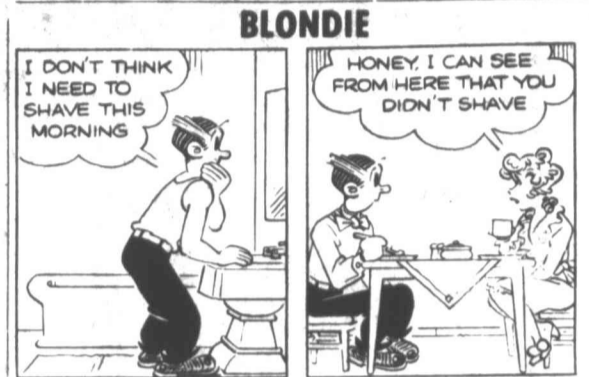

Since he has come home from the hospital he doesn't want to see any of his friends or leave the house at all. His brothers say that it will take time but I'm not so sure that I want to wait.

I really like this guy but I'm starting to think about dating other boys. What do you think I should do? Jeany, Santa Rosa, Calif.

Jeany: I think in your case that you would only make yourself miserable waiting for this boy to "get back to normal" if ever. You do not seem like the type to consider loyalty as a most important asset. By all means date other boys.

Dr. Wallace: I am a teacher and have a "small" protest against your advice that you gave Lisa of Goshen, Ind.

This letter concerned Lisa and her problem with want-

ing to date her stepbrother. She is getting a considerable amount of "hassle" from her mother, and now, you intensify that feeling by advising her to keep the relationship "casual and friendly and not personal and serious."

Were the boy in question a blood-brother, I, too, would give the same advice. A stepbrother is not "blood-kin," and if Lisa's happiness can be achieved by dating, and yes, becoming personally involved with her stepbrother, I don't think that she should be penalized because her father happened to choose the boy's mother as his wife.

I realize that the situation is further bothered by the term "stepbrother." But there is so little chance of true happiness in this world that I believe that Lisa should be given every opportunity to achieve hers. Who knows? Had her father not married the boy's mother, Lisa may have found the boy on her own.

With today's high probability of broken families, I'm sure that this problem will

J.F.B.: I appreciate your point of view and if Lisa's mother would have encouraged the relationship (the boy was living with his mother) I would have felt the way you do.

But, if dating her stepbrother is going to cause serious family tensions, then it just isn't worth the turmoil. Remember that Lisa is only 15 and thinking of dating, not marrying this boy. Surely in the next five or six years she will meet someone else who will give her "true happiness." If not, who is to tell her who she should not date?

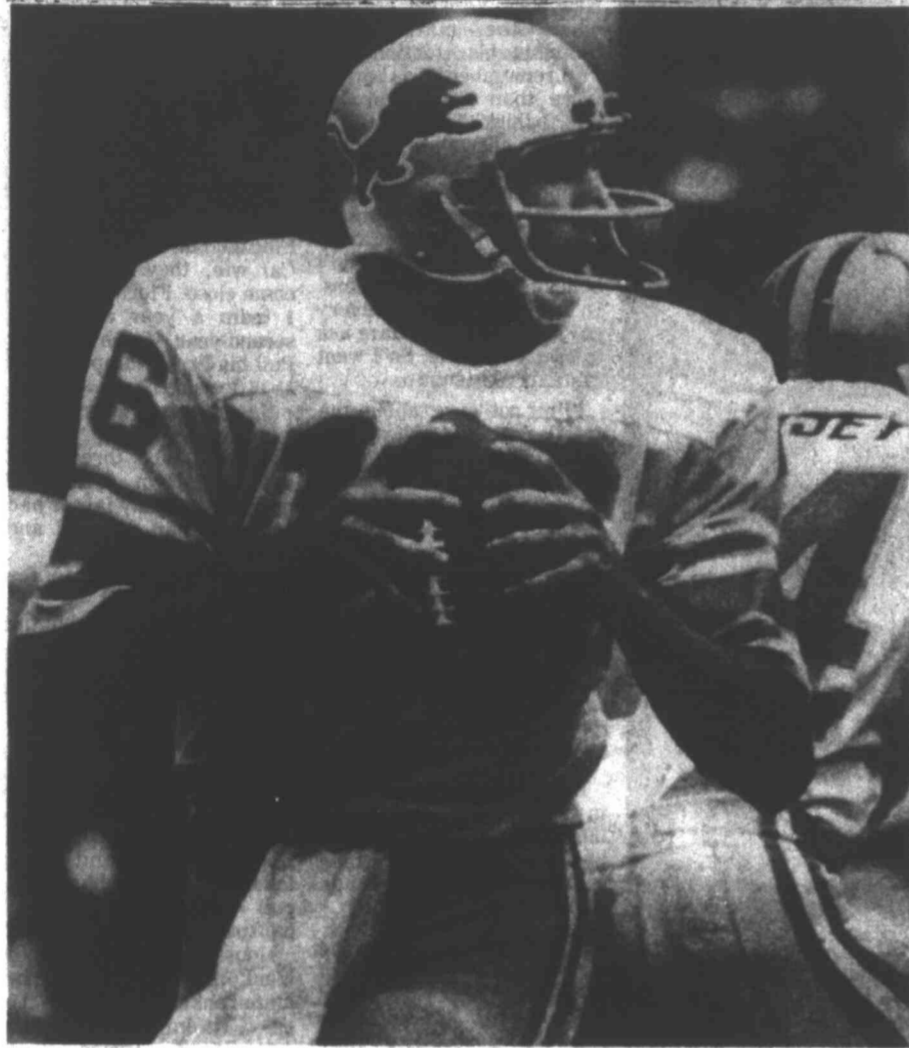

Robinson's big plays defeat Dallas, 41-20

DENVER (AP) — In a performance which left many Denver fans shaking their heads in disbelief, the Broncos shook off last week's dismal showing to whip the Dallas Cowboys 41-20 with what Coach Red Miller called "a total team effort."

Quarterback Matt Robinson ran for two touchdowns, safety Bill Thompson led a big-play defense with a 32-yard return of a fumble for a touchdown, and Fred Steinfert kicked field goals of 46 and 55 yards — the latter a team record for distance.

All three got game balls following Sunday's National Football League contest, but the offensive line and numerous other players also could have been recipients.

"Matt Robinson used his head and made some big plays, the offensive line did an excellent job, the kicking game and special teams were good — the whole team

played well," said Miller after the Broncos beat the Cowboys for the first time ever in the regular season and rebounded from a 21-6 loss to Philadelphia a week ago.

The 41 points represented the most ever scored by Denver against an NFC team, and the most scored against Dallas since 1970.

"We were flat," said Dallas Coach Tom Landry. "Denver played old fashioned football, nothing fancy. They ran it right at us. They outbit us from the start. We were continually giving the ball away, and you can't do that against a good defensive team."

The Broncos scored on their first three possessions to take a 17-0 lead. Robinson capped an 80-yard drive to open the game by sneaking the final yard for the TD. Steinfert made it 10-0 early in the second quarter with a field goal.

Dallas' final touchdown was a 22-yard pass from White to Hill, and Steinfert's record field goal capped the scoring with 26 seconds left.

Hancock missed much of last season with back problems and failed to make the top 60 money-winners, the list which determines exemptions from qualifying.

"That was my big goal," he said. "Winning was an added dividend."

The victory was worth \$45,000 from the total purse of \$250,000, boosted his season's earnings to \$105,134 and placed him in the field for the 1981 Masters and Tournament of Champions.

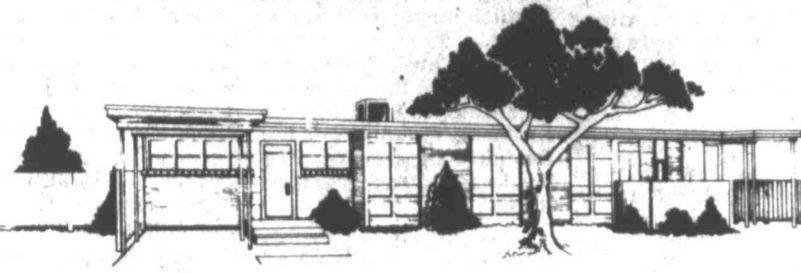

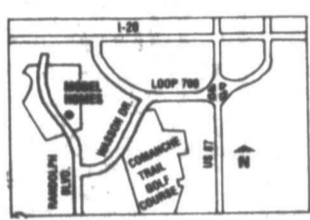

Three Houston policemen quit, one suspended
HOUSTON (AP) - Three policemen have resigned from the Houston Police Department and another was suspended for 30 days without pay for "goofing off," a department spokesman said.

Officers James D. Kerr, Gary M. Raney and Robbie Kimmons resigned Friday after an hour session with Police Chief B.K. Johnson. Patrolman Robert C. Price was suspended for one month.

Assistant Chief Rodney McKeenan said a detailed investigation by the Internal Affairs Department, based on a complaint from a civilian, prompted the action.

Richard Cobb, attorney for the Houston Police Union, said no criminal allegations were made against the officers.

"They were goofing off. They went out of their district while on duty. They were out of service for about a half hour and they got caught," Cobb said.

Hostage debate to begin Tuesday

The speaker of the Iranian Parliament says debate on the U.S. hostages will begin Tuesday, the 31st day in captivity for the 52 Americans.

Radio Tehran said Speaker Hashemi Rafsanjani told the Swiss charge d'affaires in Tehran Sunday: "A decision was made in the Majlis (Parliament) today regarding a reply to the letter by the U.S. Congress, and substantial discussion on the hostages will begin on Tuesday and the Majlis will make a decision."

"Since the U.S. Congress letter was read out in the Majlis and was also covered, we expect the U.S. government to publish the text of the Majlis letter of reply for the American public. If it fails to do this, it will have shown its lack of good will, and this will have an adverse effect on our talks."

On Friday, Ayatollah Ruhollah Khomeini, the leader of the Iranian revolution, listed four conditions for the release of the hostages. They did not include the previous demand for an apology from the United States, a condition the Carter administration rejected, and U.S. observers interpreted this as a hopeful sign.

But Hojatoleslam Mousavi Khomeini, a member of the Majlis and the spiritual leader of the militants holding the hostages, told the English-language newspaper Tehran Times that a U.S. apology is a basic condition for the release of the Americans. He said Khomeini "listed some of the conditions for the release of the hostages but not all of them."

Hojatoleslam Sayyed Ali Khamenei, leader of Friday prayers in Tehran, a Majlis deputy and Khomeini's adviser in military affairs, also told the Tehran Times the United States must apologize.

Khomeini's four conditions were release of Iranian assets frozen by President Carter after the hostages were seized Nov. 4, guarantees by the United States that it will not interfere in Iran's internal affairs, suspension of all U.S. claims against Iran and return of the ousted shah's wealth.

Iran's official Pars news agency said an Iraqi jet fighter tried to attack a helicopter flying President Abolhassan Bani-Sadr and Prime Minister Mohammad Ali Rajai on a border inspection tour Saturday, but Iranian warplanes forced the Iraqi MiG to flee.

Coup stems Turkey's political bloodbath

ANKARA, Turkey (AP) - The political bloodbath between left-wing and right-wing extremists that took as many as 25 lives a day has been stemmed, at least temporarily, by the coup led by Turkey's military chief three days ago.

Terrorist bullets reportedly have taken only one life since the armed forces seized power on Friday. Informal sources said an army captain died in a gun battle late Saturday while leading his troops against suspected leftists in the south-central city of Adana. Two leftists were wounded.

Troops fanned out Sunday in house-to-house searches for terrorists in Ankara and suburban Istanbul and witnesses reported a number of suspects rounded up. It was not known how many persons were detained, but the military government reported the arrest of 182 terrorists in the eastern province of Elazig.

Turkes, the fugitive leader of the ultra-rightist National Action Party, turned himself in to authorities only hours before a deadline set by the ruling National Security Council for his surrender, the state radio said.

Turkes, a former colonel, was the only major political leader to escape arrest and detention in the roundup that followed the coup. Radio Ankara said he was flown to a military post on an island in the Aegean Sea where the chairman of the fundamentalist Moslem National Salvation Party, Necmettin Erbakan, was being held.

Violence between ultra-nationalists, such as Turkes' followers, and leftist factions has taken an estimated 5,000 lives in the past five years, including 2,000 so far this year. It was this factional bloodshed and the civilian government's inability to quell it that prompted Gen. Kenan Evren, the 62-year-old chief of staff, to stage Turkey's third military coup in 20 years.

The leaders of the two main political parties, Prime Minister Suleyman Demirel and former Prime Minister Bulent Ecevit are reported being held with their wives at a military spa at Gallipoli on the Dardanelles. Evren also disbanded Parliament, abolished the constitution and banned all political parties.

More than 100 of the 450 members of the lower house of Parliament were reported arrested, including 25 members of Demirel's conservative Justice Party, 33 from Ecevit's moderate-leftist Republican Peoples Party, all 17 deputies from Turkes' National Action Party, 22 from Erbakan's National Salvation Party and five independent members.

Evren, who is running the country along with four other generals on the National Security Council, has promised to restore civilian rule after adoption of a new constitution and other reforms aimed at curbing soaring unemployment and inflation in addition to the political violence.

LA schools will open amid busing confusion

LOS ANGELES (AP) - One day before the opening of classes for a half million children, Los Angeles school officials today were struggling to assign teachers and tell as many as 100,000 students where they will be going in the first year of an integration-busing plan 17 years in the making.

More than 1,000 buses will take to Los Angeles' streets on Tuesday to carry youngsters to other neighborhoods, but the extent of the integration plan for the nation's second-largest school district remains muddled by late court maneuvers.

A number of schools and children still don't know whether they will be involved in Superior Court Judge Paul Egly's mandatory plan. The one thing school officials do know is that 46 schools involved in busing during the last two years, plus an undetermined number of others, will be involved in the program.

There are about 700 schools in the district. Some 497 were considered in the integration plan, and between 145 and 165 schools are expected to be involved in the busing program.

The uncertainty over who will be bused and to where is bound to lead to some "significant logistical problems" for schools, bus drivers, parents and children on opening day, said Associate School Superintendent Jerry Halverson.

Officials were sending a "parent advisory" today to all parents potentially affected by busing and setting up a telephone "hotline," he said.

"At this time it's not the most convenient thing in the world," said one black parent whose child will be bused, "but we are just praying that it will be successful and that the children won't be psychologically affected by this abrupt change."

Coup stems Turkey's political bloodbath

ANKARA, Turkey (AP) - The political bloodbath between left-wing and right-wing extremists that took as many as 25 lives a day has been stemmed, at least temporarily, by the coup led by Turkey's military chief three days ago.

Terrorist bullets reportedly have taken only one life since the armed forces seized power on Friday. Informal sources said an army captain died in a gun battle late Saturday while leading his troops against suspected leftists in the south-central city of Adana. Two leftists were wounded.

Troops fanned out Sunday in house-to-house searches for terrorists in Ankara and suburban Istanbul and witnesses reported a number of suspects rounded up. It was not known how many persons were detained, but the military government reported the arrest of 182 terrorists in the eastern province of Elazig.

Turkes, the fugitive leader of the ultra-rightist National Action Party, turned himself in to authorities only hours before a deadline set by the ruling National Security Council for his surrender, the state radio said.

Turkes, a former colonel, was the only major political leader to escape arrest and detention in the roundup that followed the coup. Radio Ankara said he was flown to a military post on an island in the Aegean Sea where the chairman of the fundamentalist Moslem National Salvation Party, Necmettin Erbakan, was being held.

Violence between ultra-nationalists, such as Turkes' followers, and leftist factions has taken an estimated 5,000 lives in the past five years, including 2,000 so far this year. It was this factional bloodshed and the civilian government's inability to quell it that prompted Gen. Kenan Evren, the 62-year-old chief of staff, to stage Turkey's third military coup in 20 years.

More than 100 of the 450 members of the lower house of Parliament were reported arrested, including 25 members of Demirel's conservative Justice Party, 33 from Ecevit's moderate-leftist Republican Peoples Party, all 17 deputies from Turkes' National Action Party, 22 from Erbakan's National Salvation Party and five independent members.

Evren, who is running the country along with four other generals on the National Security Council, has promised to restore civilian rule after adoption of a new constitution and other reforms aimed at curbing soaring unemployment and inflation in addition to the political violence.
