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## **Convoy reportedly moving** nuclear warhead from silo

DAMASCUS, Ark. (AP) - A convoy of eight military vehicles led by a security van left a Titan II missile site today, apparently transporting a nuclear warhead inside a canister labeled "Do Not Drop."

tain tight security over the operation, refusing to confirm the widely held belief that a warhead was blown hundreds of feet into the air from the silo in a fuel explosion last Friday. The blast, that occurred when a wrench was dropped in the silo, killed a sergeant and injuring 21 other men.

Despite the secrecy, an Air Force colonel directing the convoy smiled and gave a thumbs-up sign to an AP reporter who asked, "Is that what you wouldn't confirm or deny?"

As television crews and reporters across U.S. Highway 65 from the gate prepared for the exit by the convoy, the helicopter took off and headed in the direction of Little Rock Air Force

The convoy was led by an Air Force pickup truck and a security van with flashing blue lights.

The tractor-trailer truck believed to have been carrying the warhead was loaded with two large canisters anchored to the trailer. One of the canisters was blue. The other was silver and green.

Both were labeled "Do Not Drop." The convoy headed in the direction of Damascus, the first town to be evacuated when the explosion occurred.


Meanwhile, Secretary of Defense Harold Brown said Sunday that he had ordered an Air Force investigation of the nation's 18 Titan II missile installations with an eye toward safety improvements.

Gov. Bill Clinton was touring the missile silo site today, the first official other than military personnel allowed in the area. The Air Force said the news media also would be permitted a tour.

Air Force crews worked in secrecy Sunday to remove debris from the farmland where pieces of the Titan II missile scattered after an explosion in its silo early Friday, killing one person, and the Defense Department again declined to say whether a nuclear warhead was involved.

The Rev. Tommy Hall assailed the official silence during his sermon at the First Baptist Church, saying Damascus residents have a right to know what risks they faced "because we are Americans, we are paying the bills.

"We don't want secrets revealed to

The blast catapulted the warhead out of the underground silo, according to tapes of military radio transmissions monitored by the Arkansas Gazette. The New York Times today quoted military sources as confirmin that an unarmed nuclear warhead was aboard the missile.

Brown announced the safety investigation amid expression of concern from members of Congress and sources close to the Strategic Air Command about the Titan II system's safety and usefulness

Brown said on CBS-TV's "Face the Nation" program that warheads are designed to ensure against accidental detonation, but added:

"I've instructed the Air Force, after talking with the president, to make a careful look at the safety in all the other installations, and examine what can be done to further minimize chances of accidents, and to examine the Titan force and its safety in general

An unidentified government source told The New York Times the warhead involved in the accident was an older, larger model and the smaller new models might not have come through the explosion as well.

Amid tight security, heavy trucks, a helicopter and a crane Sunday entered the compound where the warhead was believed to have been hurled



## Iraqi jets raid Tehran

### airport; war escalates

Iragi MiGs raided Tehran's international airport and at least a halfdozen other Iranian air installations today and Iraq's state radio said three weeks of air, ground and sea hostilities had "escalated into a fullscale war.

In Ankara, Turkey, a spokesman for the Iraqi Embassy told The Associated Press Iraq has declared war on Iran.

Baghdad said its warplanes hit nine airstrips in the midday strikes and lost two of its Soviet-made MiG jets. A top Iranian military official said several" air bases were raided, and an Iranian revolutionary guard commander claimed six MiGs attacked seven air installations.

A thick column of smoke rose from the Tehran airport area and the sound of explosions rocked the capital, but Iranian Radio continued its ordinary programs.

Reports of the airport bombings came one day after Iraq and Iran each claimed heavy damage to the other in a naval and artillery battle at the head of the Persian Gulf. It was the heaviest fighting so far in the border conflict between the two oil giants. Iran and Iraq have been sparring along their borders for months, but the fighting escalated last week after Iraq cancelled a 1975 treaty. The treaty ended the late Shah Mohammad Reza Pahlavi's support of a Kurdish rebellion in northern Iraq and in return put the last 60 miles of the boundary between the two countr down the middle of the Shatt al-Arab waterway.

In abrogating the treaty, Iraq said it was resuming sovereignty over the eastern half of the estuary, which is formed by the union of the Tigris and Euphrates Rivers and connects Basrah, Iraq's chief port, as well as Iran's Khorramshahr and Abadan with the Persian Gulf.

The family "assassinated, committed genocide, stole, and committed fraud" during more than 40 years of rule, charged Vice Minister of Justice Carlos Arguello.

The Nicaraguans, who hired lawyers in Washington, D.C., and Miami to handle extradition proceedings, "expect a positive result from the U.S. government," Arguello said.

Somoza, assassinated Wednesday in Paraguay, was buried here Saturday after a funeral that drew hundreds of Nicaraguans who fled after the leftist Sandinistas overthrew Somoza's regime last year.

Arguello and Tito Castillo. Nicaragua's minister of justice, said at a news conference Sunday that their government wants to prosecute all Somoza's relatives in the United States and some 35 former government workers who allegedly committed "major criminal acts."

Nicaragua also wants Somoza's U.S. property - worth "easily in the hundreds of millions" - returned to "our people, the rightful owners," Arguello said.

He would not say what the family owned or where it was.

## Iraq-Iran hostilities rising

today said: "the puppet and mercenary Iraqi government has started raids against Iranian air territory...the Iranian army will not tolerate aggression ... and shall give a bitter lesson to (Iraqi President) Saddam Hussein," according to Tehran Radio.

An Iranian revolutionary guard commander said MiGs bombed airports at Ahvaz, Hamadan, Tabriz, Dezful, Tolumbeh Sabz near Ahvaz, Boushehr, as well as Tehran. Another person called a Western reporter in Tehran and reported the airports in Tabriz, Ahwaz and Boushehr were bombed concurrently

An earlier report from a witness to the Tehran airport bombing said an Iranian Phantom jet fighter bombed Mehrabad Airport and was shot down by other Iranian fighter planes. He quoted a friend at the airport as saying "many have been killed." There was no immediate explanation of how an Iranian Phantom jet could have been involved.

A spokesman at the Mehrabad control tower said an Iranian Air Force Boeing 707 was damaged in the attack, as was housing under construction in the area.

A second witness said earlier there was a fire at the Mehrabad Airport, caused by careless workers. There was no official government

comment on either report.

All communications were functioning sporadically with the airport, four miles west of Tehran.

The report came one day after Iraq and Iran each claimed heavy damage to the other in a naval and artillery battle at the head of the Persian Gulf It was the heaviest fighting so far in the border war between the two oil giants.

Baghdad Radio said Iraqi forces destroyed eight Iranian gunboats Sunday in the Shatt al-Arab estuary and the Iranian naval base at Khosrowabad, 20 miles south of the Abadan oil refinery. It admitted the loss of one Iraqi patrol boat.

The Iraqi news agency said Iraqi forces attacked after Iranian gunboats opened fire on a British cargo ship sailing toward the Iraqi port of Basrah. The agency said the bridge of the British ship was hit, but the the vessel continued its journey and the Iranian gunboats were repulsed.

The agency said Iraqi gunboats also drove off Iranian gunboats that approached a Kuwaiti ship and a Singapore ship sailing in the waterway

Meanwhile, Tehran Radio said Iranian forces sank an Iraqi vessel and drove four others aground during the fighting. It said Iran lost a police boat and a number of crewmen were injured and that artillery, tanks, missiles and other ''heavy machinery" took part in the battle.

An Iranian army" communique reported heavy fighting all along the Iranian artillery fire.

The Iraqi news agency said "Arab youths of Arabistan" rocketed Abadan Airport and the port of Khorramshahr, destroying part of the airport and killing or wounding "several" people. It added that fire could be seen in Khorramshahr. It said "Arabistan militants" also attacked an Iranian army camp near Al Beemah, killing or wounding 'several' soldiers.





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## Major repairs are needed now

Perhaps a highway funding bill being championed by US Sen. Lloyd Bentsen is being shaped up at just the right time

Hearings on S. 2913, which will determine the future of the federal role in highways, began anew in the upper body recently. Bentsen hopes to move highway funding legislation early next year

American freeways, most of which have exceeded their 20-year design life, needs major repairs now, according to a Texas A&M civil engineering professor named Dr. William B. Ledbetter, a recognized expert in highway construction.

According to Ledbetter, there are two ways to make the massive repairs and both have drawbacks.

"WE HAVE THE techniques now to rehabilitate these pavements in onefourth mile long segments, one lane at a time, in 48 hours," Ledbetter said. 'I'm talking about removing the top 12 inches of roadway and putting it back. Traffic meanwhile continues to use the other lane.

The price tag for this sort of rehabilitation would be prohibitive, the Texas Transportation Institute researcher warned

'It just won't be 20 to 50 per cent off. The cost would be two or three times higher than the alternative," he explained.

The alternative involves shutting down the whole freeway until the entire job is accomplished

Ledbetter and others researched the technology to rapidly reconstitute or replace pavement structure on heavily traveled urban freeways. Ledbetter says that nowhere are the

problems of pavement more severe and more trying than on urban freeways that must be kept open to traffic during the construction process

Ledbetter believes two maladies of the nation's highway system must be cured before sufficient highway funding can be provided.

"First, highway are constructed and maintained by decreasing revenues that are directly tied to gasoline consumption, which is being reduced," he said. "This must be coupled with inflation, which is much more severe in the highway field than the general economy.

SECOND, THE ENGINEER said the problem is worse for highways because the materials used are energy intensive. These more directly reflect cost increases due to inflation.

Bentsen's bill proposes to increase obligation authority for the nation's highway program to \$9.5 billion for fiscal years 1982-83, expands the current Interstate 3-R program to include reconstruction and changes the federal-state matching ratio from 75-25 to 90-10.

It also increases the bridge repair and replacement program to \$1.5 billion a year, and changes the 4-cent-per-gallon federal gasoline to 4 per cent of the average wholesale price and extends the Highway Trust Fund beyond its scheduled expiration date



Unless he makes a dramatic breakthrough in his Sunday night debate with Reagan and Jimmy Carter's empty chair, his campaign may be headed for obsolescence, its impact limited to a very few states none of which he will actually carry.

When we asked Anderson about the political syndrome of voters who want Anderson but will accept Carter t stop Reagan, he was philosophical. He conceded the problem but did not advance'a solution. What makes it such a problem for Anderson is that he is not an ideological magnet who transfixes his supporters as George Wallace did in 1968. Wallacites had an allegiance to Wallace that nothing could break, but the appeal of Anderson is based on the unpopularity

irritation. A pimple is born. Blockage of skin glands further complicates matters by allowing the oil to accumulate under the skin and the bacteria to multiply.

> So you see, you have to unblock the ducts, kill off the bacteria and reduce oil production to end the acne problem. We can attack acne on at least two of these fronts. Soaps help peel the skin and unblock the ducts. There are many such soaps available. Since the back is a difficult place to reach, find a long-handled brush. Lotions, such as one containing tretinoin, help (prescription needed) Sunlight acts as a skin peeler. Antibiotics attack on the bacterial front, and again you need a prescription.

There is not much you can do about the excess production of oil, but this will not be so much a problem as you get on in years. There has been a great deal of talk about diet increasing oiliness. If you find that a particular food makes your acne worse, of course avoid it.

I suggest you see a doctor, both for the prescription help and for special treatment of very large acne pimples. Some may need to be incised, and sometimes local injections of steroids are required. Since physical irritation can add to the back problem, you should avoid long periods of sitting against hard back rests. Strapless bras and halter dresses should be worn when possible. If you can manage to sleep on your tummy, fine. If you get under a physician's care, he can follow the course of your acne and add or subtract to your treatment as

Yours is a good question, and brief. I hope I can, by answering it, clear up some of the misunderstanding about the kinds of hepatitis.

Hepatitis is liver inflammation. A number of substances can cause such inflammation, but when we think of hepatitis we automatically think of a viral infection as the cause. That is infectious heptatis, but it is not the only kind.

Mushroom poisoning, carbon tetrachloride, drugs and alcohol all can produce the liver inflammation --

DEAR DR. GRAHAM: I have heard people say that if a person commits suicide, it is impossible for him to go to heaven. Is this true?-D.R.

DEAR D.R.: I find nothing in the Bible to support that idea, but this does not mean that suicide is not a grave matter, because it is, and we should do everything we can to prevent it. The Bible commands, 'You shall not murder'' (Exodus 20:13), and many theologians have included suicide in this. Suicide can also be a very selfish act, in which a person gives no apparent thought to the grief and heartache he brings to others.

While I condemn suicide, I think there are also several things you should keep in mind. For one thing, it is clear that persons who commit suicide often have become mentally unstable and are not fully aware what they are doing. God knows this about them, and we have to leave them in God's hands.

Then remember especially that we are never saved because of anything we might do to commend ourselves to God. We can never be saved by our

good works - only God's grace and mercy can save us. That is why Christ came into this world -- to do for us what we could never do ourselves. Salvation is by grace for every person who trusts Christ. If a person has trusted Christ - has truly repented of sin and accepted Christ as Lord and Savior - then he is saved. Even the drastic step of suicide cannot erase what God has promised to those who trust him.

I don't want to be misunderstood on this serious question. There may be someone right now who is reading these words and contemplating suicide. I would do everything in my power to keep you from that terrible act, because it is not God's will and he has something better for you. You may feel that there is no hope in your life. But if you will look in faith to Christ, he will give you hope and purpose for the future. He loves you, and wants to help you and use you to help other people. Let Christ be Lord of your life, and you will know in a fresh way the truth of Jesus' promise of joy and peace to those who know

## Feds claim many Texas sheriffs on the take

TYLER, Texas (AP) — The badges of many Texas sheriffs have been tarnished by graft, federal authorities say, and low salaries, broad official powers and the temptations of big bucks from narcotics and gambling rackets.

U.S. Attorney John Hannah, who successfully prosecuted sheriffs in Gregg, Fannin and Cherokee counties of East Texas during the past two years, believes corruption arises because of widespread authority bestowed on sheriffs by the Texas Constitution.

"When you get absolute authority, it tends to corrupt absolutely. I don't think it is any deeper than that," he said. Hannah said sheriffs, unlike city police administrators,

are not under close official scrutiny. "People don't realize how tremendously powerful the

sheriff is," said Hannah. "He is the chief law enforcement officer in the county and in the rural areas he is still called

#### 'high sheriff.

"This differs from a city police officer or chief because he's appointed and has 15 people looking over his shoulder ... there is absolutely nobody in the world that tells the

... there is absolutely nobody in the world that tells the high sheriff what to do," he added. Hannah said a rural sheriff can supplement his income

easily without stirring public concern. "Td say in an average size Texas county with a population of 50,000 people, a crooked sheriff could make

\$30,000 to \$40,000 a year without even being blatant about it," Hannah said. "The biggest possibility for making money would be in condoning narcotics traffic," he continued. "More money

condoning narcotics traffic," he continued. "More money is involved in that than any other criminal activity." Veteran FBI agent Bill Hinshaw, who investigated

allegations of corruption in Gregg County, said he believes at least half the state's 254 sheriffs are on the take. The public's attitude toward corrupt sheriffs is a major problem in obtaining convictions, Hinshaw said.

"I was involved in once case," said Hinshaw, "where a sheriff stood up in court and said, 'Sure I've taken money from pimps and gamblers but I've never asked for a raise in the years I've served this county.' And you know, the jury walked him right out of that court a free man."

Hinshaw adds that corrupt individuals often carry great weight in local election campaigns, making it difficult for an honest sheriff to do his job.

"One sheriff," said the FBI agent, "told us about an illegal gambling operation in his county and he requested federal intervention and his confidentiality ... he was afraid if it were known that he provided information, one of the people involved in the illegal operation would then ... back someone to run against him.

"That is a sad commentary when a sheriff in his own county can't be proud of enforcing the law."

One of the problems, Hannah said, is that rural sheriffs' pay is so poor that qualified people don't usually run for the job, which is an elective office in Texas.

Hannah said he hopes the Texas Department of Public Safety and Texas Rangers will begin keeping a closer eye on the sheriff's departments across Texas, and pledges that his office will continue its aggressive prosecution of lawmen on the take.

"I can't imagine anything worse for citizens than to have corrupt law enforcement," he said.



Since J.R. Richard suffered a stroke in July and was lost to the Houston Astros, they have followed a Golden Ruhle: Do unto the rest of the National League as J.R. would have done.

Vern Ruhle, who started the year with a mediocre 30-38 major-league record, has been a key member of the Houston pitching staff that has been strong even without Richard. He now has a 10-4 record, including Sunday's three-hit, 5-1 victory over the San Francisco Giants in which he flirted with a no-nitae for 2.9 the inclusion hitter for 7 2-3rd innings.

Coupled with Cincinnati's 7-2 victory over Los Angeles in 11 innings, the triumph gave the Astros a one-game lead in the NL West - one half game better than they were after Richard's last appearance July 14. 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

### SMU buries feud with 17-14 win By the Associated Press

As far as Southern Methodist Coach Ron Meyer is concerned, the "feud" with Texas Christian Coach F.A. Dry is buried.

"I told F.A. before the game Saturday night I wanted to keep everything on a football level and he said 'so do I.' We shook hands on it," Meyer said. "The controversy just kept boiling up. It was my fault and I told F.A. so. I told him I just wanted to bury it.'

Meyer admitted he "popped off" a couple of times. "I said some matter of fact things that were taken out of context but I admit it wasn't too classy," Meyer "I told our team before they took the field against TCU I didn't want any cat-calling. I just wanted football.'

And football Southwest Conference style is what the 39,000 fans at Texas Stadium got in a wild game settled when quarterback Mike Ford sneaked an inch for a touchdown in the final 52 seconds, giving SMU a 17-14 victory

Ford was injured in the TCU game last season and knocked out for the year.
