Bond Sales Are Up 23%

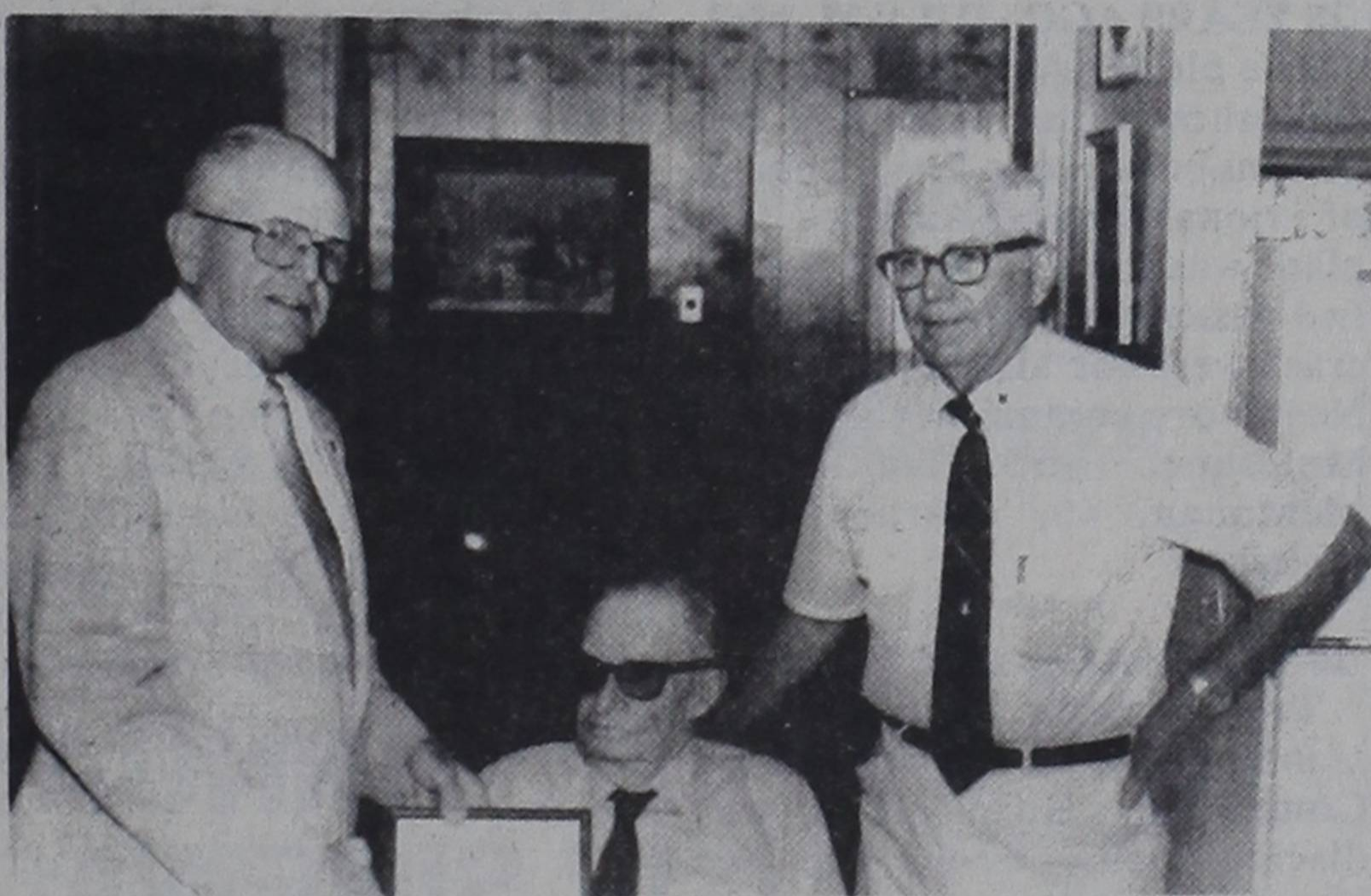

Due to the earlier than usual dates for Maize Days (September 1-5), the parade comes on Saturday, September 5, at the end of just one week of school.

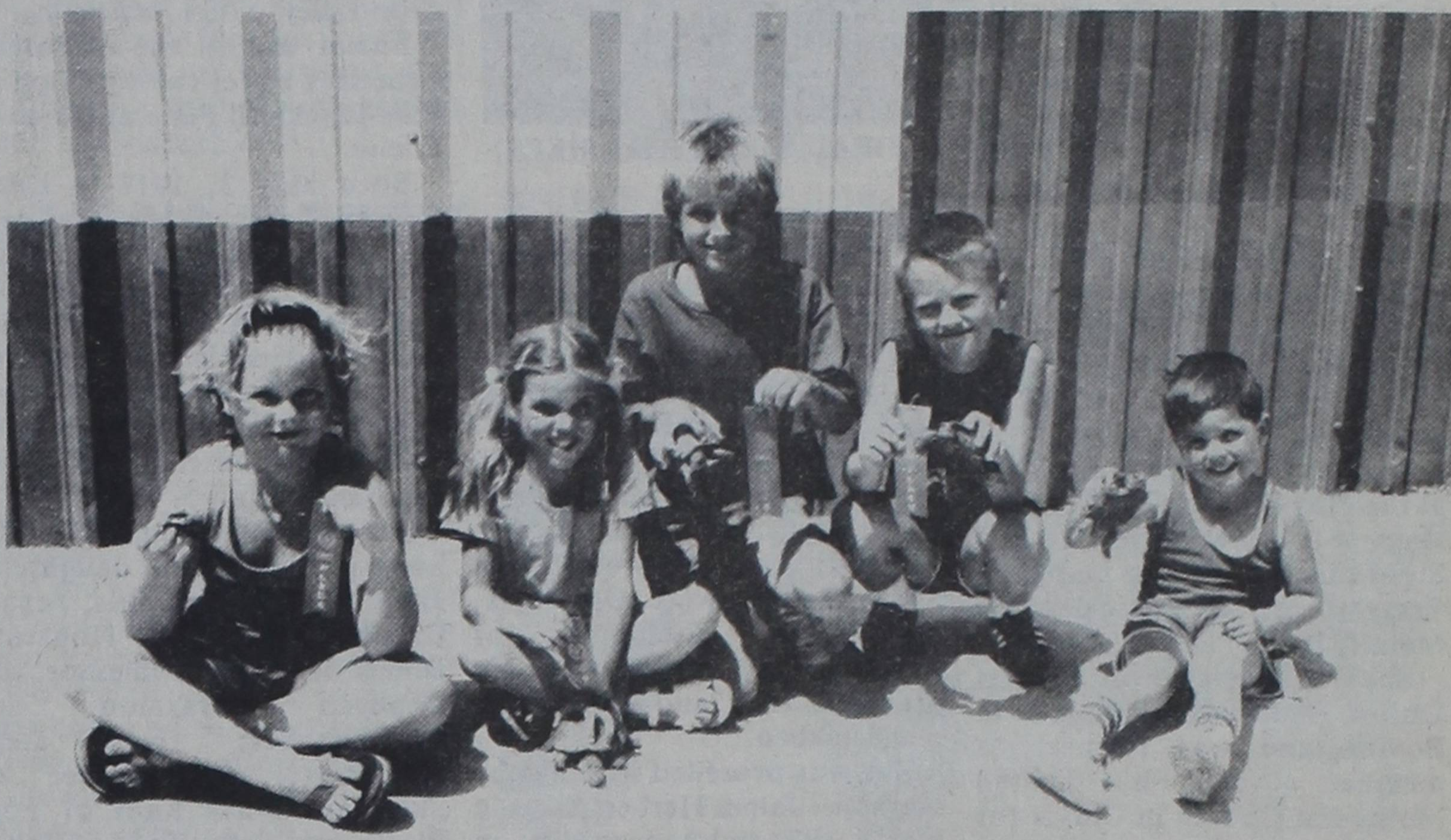
"We hope that the high school kids will be able to come up with some floats, since this is always a highlight of the parade," Mrs. Alexander said.

Apparent Tornado Leaves Damage Here

"I said to myself, 'is that train going to come right through the house?'" reported June Floyd of 1301 Columbia, about the apparent funnel cloud that awakened a number of Friona residents after midnight last Saturday.

Mrs. Floyd said she decided that the loud noise she heard was something other than a train, and got up to inspect. She had a window open for ventilation, and there was an ironing board in her kitchen with a towel draped across it.

"Suddenly the towel was picked up and wrapped around me. I was aware that dirt and debris was being blown into my utility porch. I decided to waken my son and grandson, who were sleeping in another room, but by the time I got back to their room, it was all over," said the longtime Friona resident.

At the Bud Rainey residence, 1503 Jackson, a large Mulberry tree was uprooted and laid over in the Rainey's front yard. The tree was approximately 16 years old, and was about two feet in diameter at the large part of the trunk.

"We had come home about midnight. At about 12:15 or 12:30 I heard a loud noise and the next thing we knew, the tree was blown

over. I remember I saw a small cloud in the west when we were coming home, but it didn't look at all dangerous," Rainey said.

Next door, at the J.P. Sims residence, 1501 Jackson, they lost a smaller tree, which like the one at the Rainey residence was pulled up and laid on the front lawn.

At Four-Way Pump Service, 302 East 14th Street, John Taylor said the company's two-way radio antenna was bent almost flat by the late-night "blow."

A section of fence at the Joy Osborn home, 1309 Columbia, was blown down, and across the alley at the residence of Mr. and Mrs. A.L. (Jake) Outland, limbs on a Mimosa tree were broken off.

Tree branches were also reported broken at the residence of James Warren, 1506 Jackson, and a fence at the Frank Truitt residence, 1407 Columbia, was picked up and deposited in a neighbor's yard.

It was reported that Helen Fallwell lost a storage shed that night.

A large dead limb in a tree at the Bill Ellis residence, 1201 Maple, which had withstood high winds earlier in the summer, was blown to the ground.

All of the incidents reported here are in the northeastern section of Friona, within a two or three block span. If you chart the damage, it apparently moved from southwest to northeast, the usual tornado direction, from 12th or 13th Street to the north edge of town.

Several other residents also reported having awakened by the wind when the cloud blew in. "I thought it was going to blow me

out of bed," said Edward White, who said he got up to shut a window.

Although there has been no reported confirmed sighting of a funnel, this appears to have been the second incident of a funnel dipping down into the city this summer, the other one being on West Highway 60 in the Sutter's Inn-Reeve Chevrolet-Olds vicinity in late May.

And we've lost count of the number of funnel sightings in the immediate area, which began the week prior to graduation exercises.

Meantime, the Friona area was still needing a good rain at press time this week, having missed a chance on Thursday night when a cloud passed to the south of town, bringing mostly thunder and lightning.

Special Class Aids Young Children

A unique preschool group has been meeting in Friona twice weekly. The children who come with their mothers all have special needs. They are enrolled in the Rural Infant Education Program (RIEP).

This program is jointly sponsored by Central Plains Mental Health-Mental Retardation Center of Plainview and Early Childhood Intervention of the Texas Education Agency.

There are currently six children who meet in the Parmer County Counseling office. However, some Parmer County children receive homebound services once a week with a teacher visiting the child's home because this better meets the needs of that individual child.

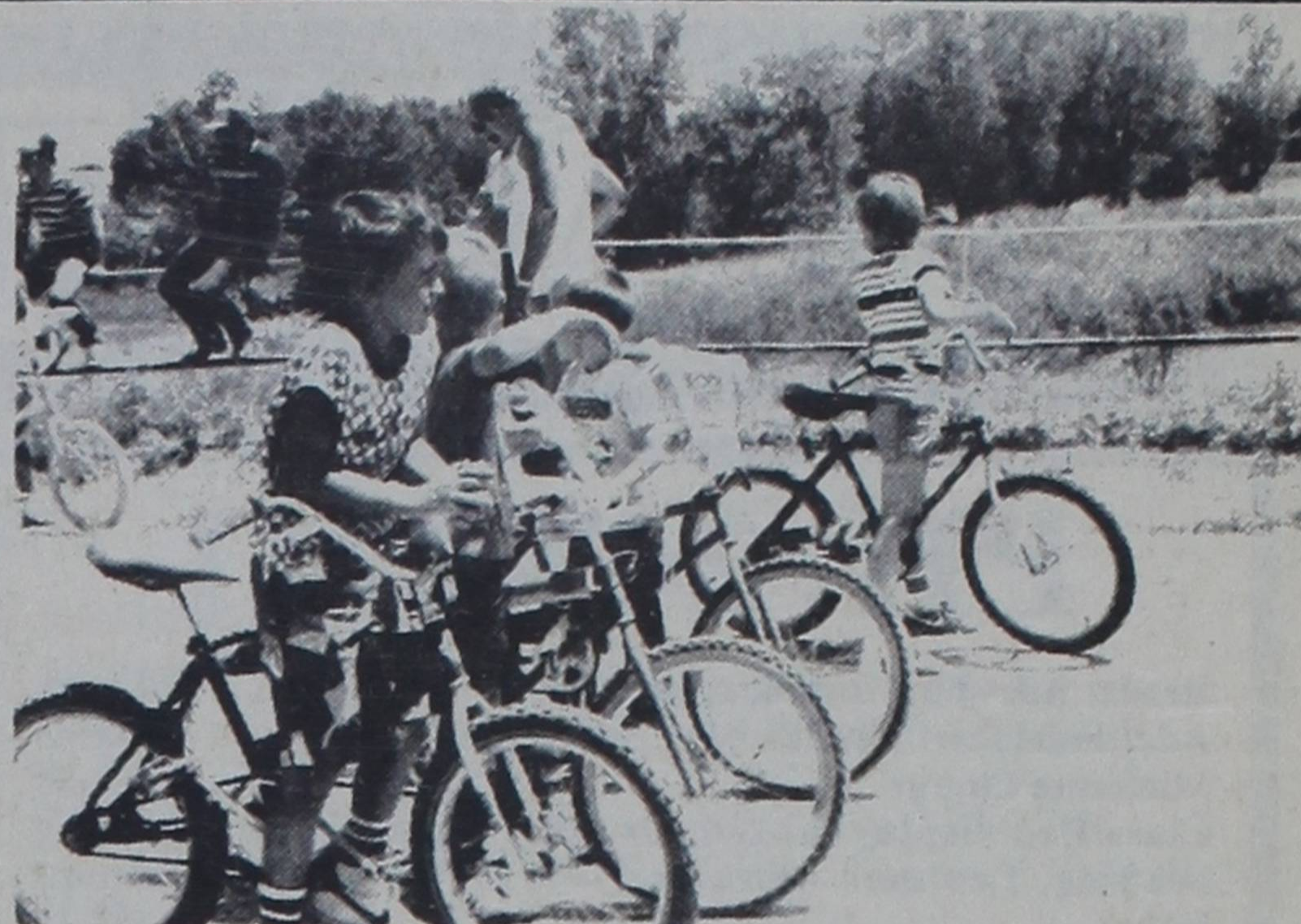
Like the placement decision based on individual needs, each child has a plan with goals written annually according to a personal assessment. The program addresses needs of the child in developing motor, cognitive, personal-social, and language skills.

The Rural Infant Education Program serves children birth to three years old in a nine-county area including Parmer County.

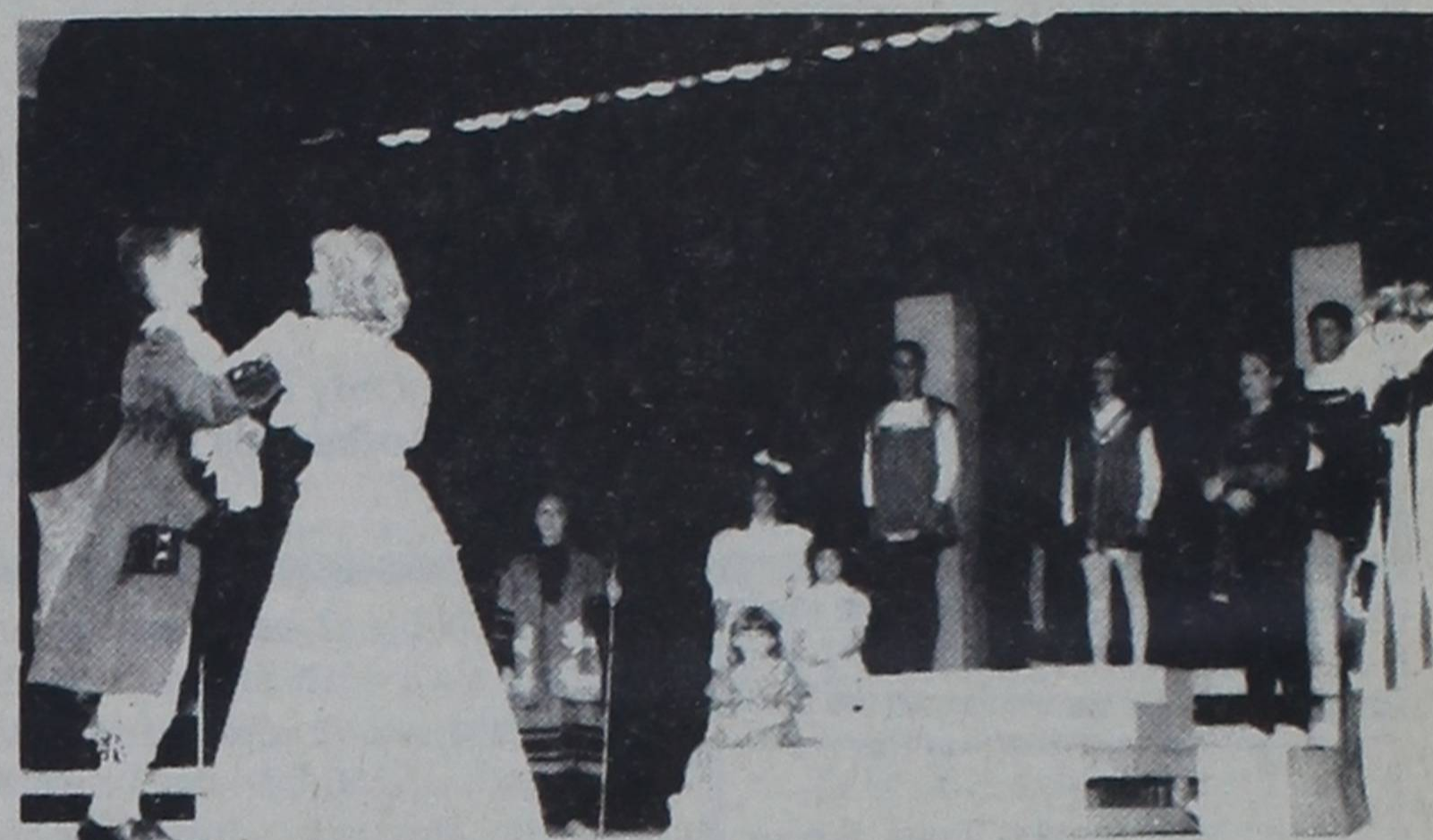
Parents play a key role in providing opportunities for their child to learn. RIEP supports the parents as they seek to meet the needs of their special child. The teacher becomes a resource person as well as confidant and counselor for parents as they work through the myriad of emotions that accompany the birth and rearing of a handicapped child.

To assure a smooth transition to public school, the Rural Infant Education Program works closely with the Parmer County Special Education Coop. Federal law requires that public school provide a free and appropriate public education for all special needs children beginning the school year after they reach their third birthday.

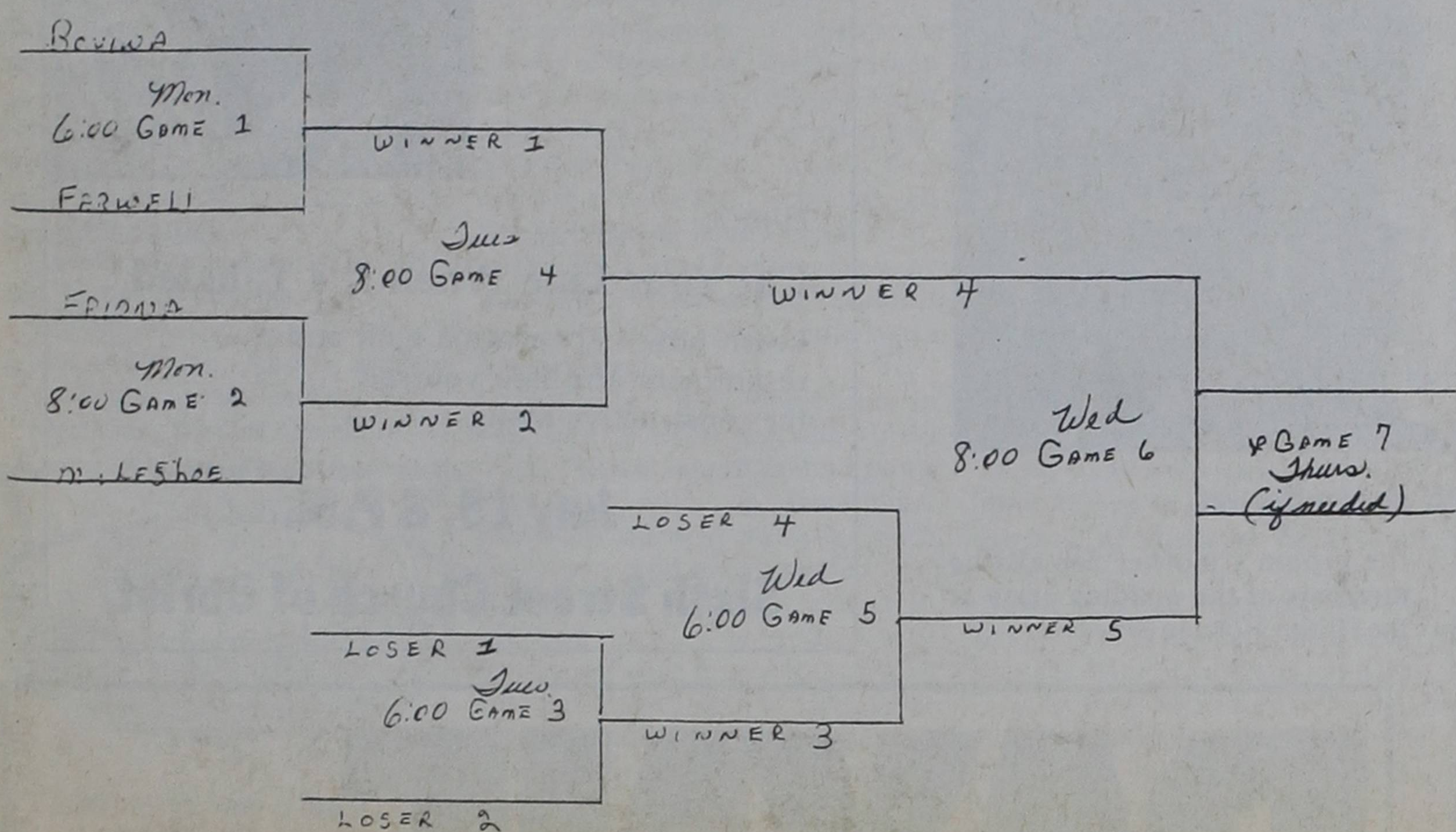
WINNING FORM...Rod Britting, shown making a "pitch," was the winner in the horseshoe tournament here July Fourth.

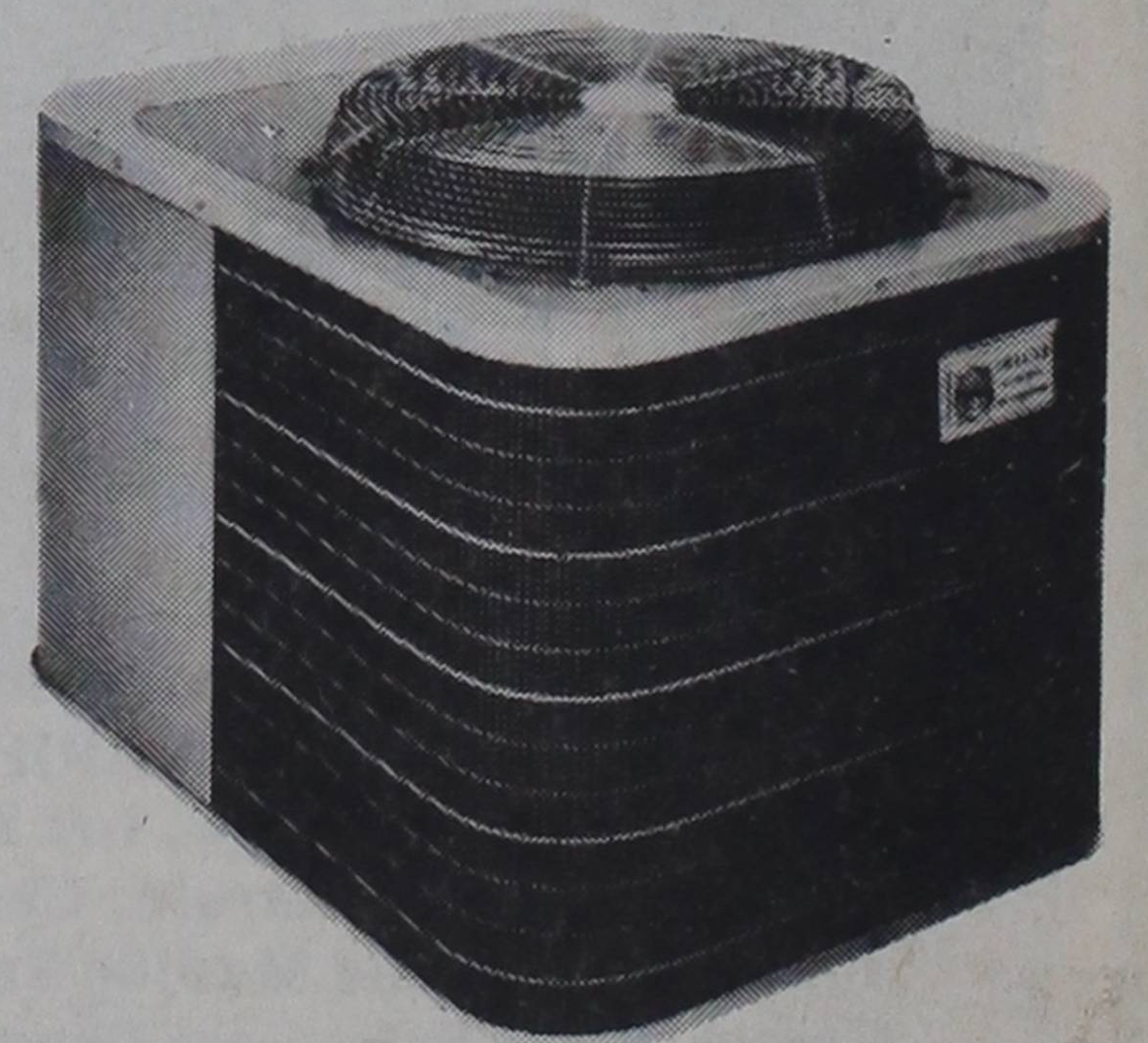

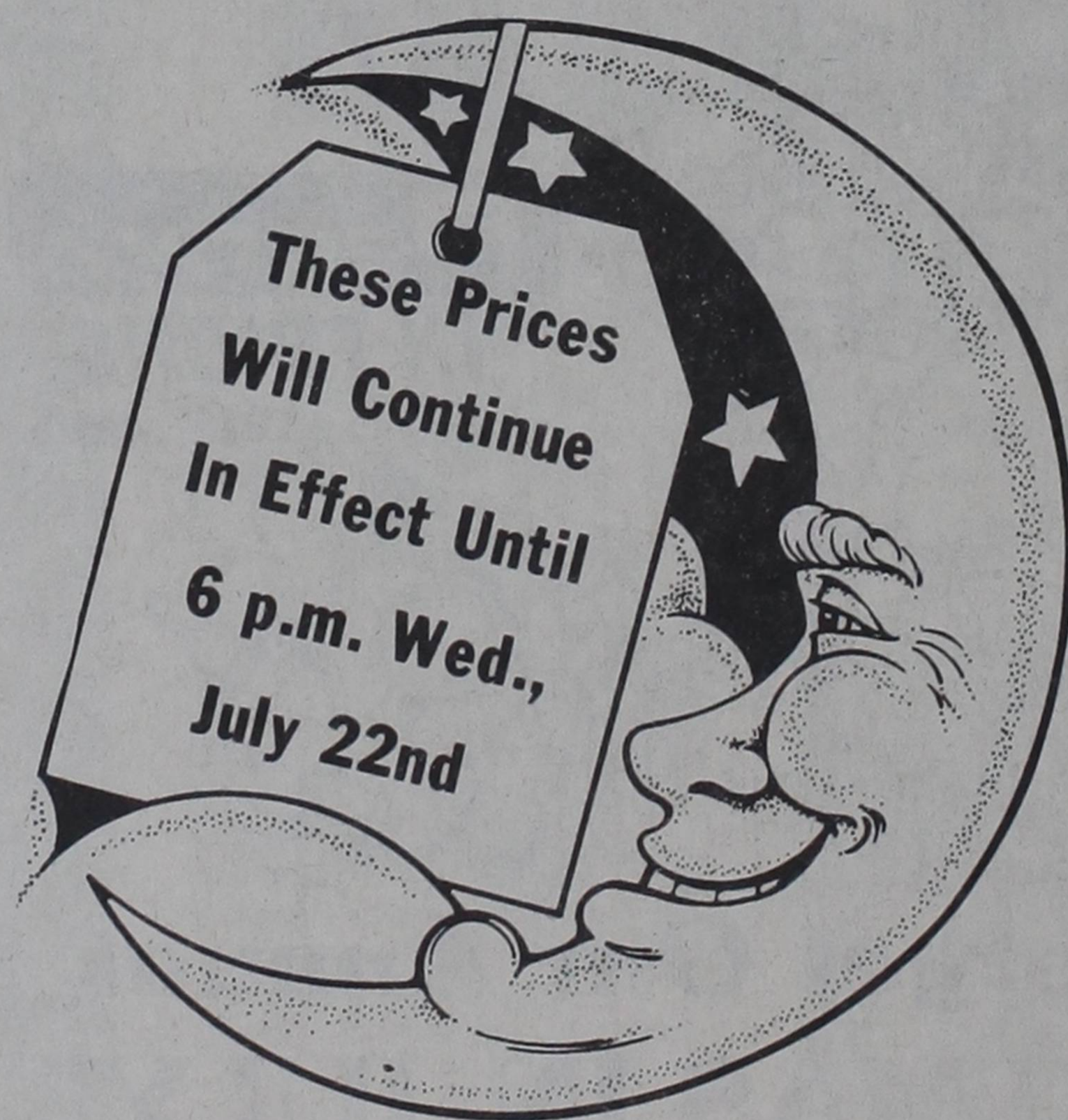
