### Ray told FBI man he could get contract

HOUSTON (AP) - Austin attorney Donald Ray told an FBI undercover agent, posing as an insurance company representative, that he would try

pany representative, that he would try
to get some important advanced information on the multimillion-dollarstate employee insurance contract.

In a tape recording played to a
federal court jury today, Ray told
Michael Wachs that he would make an effort to get the new specifications on the insurance program so Prudential Insurance Co. "would have more time to work on their bid and would be far ahead of others.

Wachs was working undercover as an official of Prudential in attempting to get the bidding re-opened on the insurance contract.

In other tapes played today, labor official L.G. Moore told Wachs that Texas House Speaker Billy Clayton 'needs help" on 16 to 20 House races.

Moore suggested that the insurance company come up with \$10,000 to help Clayton with candidates who were pledged to support him in his bid for re-election as speaker.

# Roscoe sewers still flooded; Sweetwater drought is at an end

in this water-logged hamlet today face their 22nd day without working toilets while just eight miles down the road, folks in Sweetwater heave a sigh of relief as heavy rains fill their dwindling lakes and blot out a summerlong rationing plan.

The steady rain that fell over much of West and North Texas over the weekend slacked off Monday night. but several rivers and creeks in the area still threatened to flood out of their banks today

The National Weather Service said a cold front moving into the Panhandle today should reach the sodden prairielands by Tuesday, brining an end to the wet weather.

Lowland areas flooded from San Angele north to Wichita Falls and east to Dallas, but water in many areas began to recede Monday night.

The weather service said a rancher just south of Stamford, 40 miles north of Abilene, recorded a six-day rainfall total of 17.80 inches, one of the highest recorded in the state San Angelo established a new

rainfall record for September with 11 inches, breaking the 1959 mark of 9.20. In the 24-hour period ending at 9 p.m. Monday, Fort Worth recorded 3.44 inches, Texarkana had 3.27, Mineral Wells had 3.08 and Dallas, 2.57. Residents of about 50 homes fled

Hamlin, 40 miles northwest of Abilene, when weekend rains forced the California Creek out of its banks, but most had returned home today. Rain fell intermittently in Roscoe Monday as workers packed sandbags

three trunks struggled to drain the system with pumps. "If the sandbags don't hold, raw sewage will flow into the town," said

Mayor Bedford P. "Beep" Cain. He said the dams should hold unless the town is hit by another downpour.

The sewer system was closed and Roscoe's 1,400 residents ordered not to use their toilets on Sept. 9, when rainfall from Tropical Storm Danielle seeped into the sewer system. People in this Nolan County farm town have been sharing 40 portable toilets since

"Conservatively we've had 17.5 inches through the 28th," said Cain. 'We've had 160 homes with water in them in the past 20 days. A lot of our cotton fields are damaged.

But in neighboring Sweetwater. where townsfolk weathered the summer under emergency drought conditions, the rain brought welcome

"We increased our (water) storage capacity from 17 percent to 49 percent and caught just a little over 15,000 acre feet," said Sweetwater City Manager Joe Benton. "We now are equal to what we had back in April of

Back in June, 500 people gathered at a Sweetwater church to pray for an end to a six-year drought.

"Our prayers have been answered," said the Rev. Orvel Brantley, pastor of Lamar Street Baptist Church and one of the rally's organizers. "We never did run plumb out of water and now we've had several good rains. The Lord has well kept his promise."

An unofficial total of 9.45 inches were recorded in Sweetwater, but Benton said even if it doesn't rain until 1982, the city now has a 35-month supply of water on hand. Stiff water rates passed earlier in the summer by the city council probably will be

just about even now," Benton said. 'Anything else we catch now is a bonus."

A few residents moved out of Roscoe, but officials said most citizens are stayinig at home and coping with their rustic conditions.

Mrs. and Mrs. H.L. McAdams were among those who sought higher They were flooded out of Roscoe

three weeks ago, their house filled with water and their furniture ruined. so they packed up and moved to Hamlin, a city that almost never

Less than 24 hours after they moved into their new house - complete with new carpet - they were flooded out.

"We spent one night and ate two meals," said McAdams, 79, as he cleaned the mud from his kitchen "They told us when we came up

here it never flooded," said Mrs. McAdams, 83. "I thought it was safe But the McAdams said they won't

move again. "We can't keep running," Mrs. McAdams said.

Residents in Roscoe were learning a bit about the pioneer spirit.

"We're dipping our water from the bathroom to the outside through the window," said Nelda Hobbs. "Whoever takes a bath has to empty his own water."

She said her husband rigged her washing machine so that it drains into their yard, and they wash dishes in a basin and dump it dutside. "I was raised like this — we didn't

have an indoor john," she said.

Iraq survives counterattacks

# Iran resumes hostage debate

BAGHDAD, Iraq (AP) - Iraq said its troops shook off counterattacks today in all sectors of western Iran captured by invading Iraqi forces. Iranian warplanes raided Baghdad, sending a huge cloud of smoke billowing from the area where fuel tanks for electric generating facilities are located.

In Tehran, the Iranian Parliament resumed debate on the fate of the 52 American hostages in their 332nd day of captivity and appointed a sevenmember committee to investigate their case, the state-run radio reported. It said Parliament would debate on Sunday the commission's powers, but decided that the final decision on the hostages would be made by Parliament, not the com-

The Iranian command claimed that its forces destroyed six Iraqi tanks today in fighting in western Iran, Tehran radio reported. The communique also claimed 140 Iraqi tanks destroyed Sunday and Monday in heavy land and air battles in the northern sector of the war front near

Qasr-e-Shirin and 21 more in the southern sector.

The Iranian Phantoms con-

centrated their bombing runs on the southwestern part of Baghdad, where Baghdad University is situated. The Iragis fired anti-aircraft guns and surface-to-air missiles, and witnesses said several jets were knocked down. The raid was the first air raid on Baghdad since Saturday in the nineday-old war between the Persian Gulf oil giants. Air attacks on major oil refineries in the southern part of both countries have halted theor flow of oil to the world

## Local residents will be paying higher prices for electricity

Big Spring residents, and other customers of Texas Electric Service Company, will be paying higher

prices for electricity in the future. The Texas Public Utility Commission this morning approved a rate increase that will give TESCO about

half the increase it insisted it needed.

The package approved by the commission will mean approximately a ten percent boost in monthly bills of residential customers. In that case, a resident paying \$40 a month for power would henceforth be billed for \$44.

Texas Electric serves 78 cities in

North, Central and West Texas, including Big Spring. The firm had asked for a \$123 million increase. The commission approved, with a series of changes, a hearing examiner's report recommending \$67 million in in-

Exact rates will not be known until examiner Mark Zeppa revives his report to include the changes ordered by the commission.

Under TESCO's initial request, a \$40 monthly residential bill would have gone to about \$50, a 25 percent

Lake J.B. Thomas, located in Borden and Scurry County, has picked up 2.41 vertical feet since Monday morning, bringing the total in the basin to 64,540 acre feet. When full, the lake will

hold 204,000 acre feet. The Colorado River, which spills into the lake, was still running three foot deep shortly before noon. Bull Creek, who also feeds Lake Thomas, was running four feet deep.

Lake Thomas is at its highest level since 1973. The reservoir has trapped 60,000 acre feet of water this year. 40,000 in September alone.

Lake E. V. Spence has had a vertical rise of 2.2 feet since Monday morning and stands to pick up a lot more. The Colorado River going into the lake is still rising. The river is running nine feet deep above Colorado City and Lake Colorado City is

LOUISVILLE, Ky. (AP) — "It is a service that people surrogate Parenting need to know about," she Associates Inc. is expecting added.

Ms. Brophy said the parents in this first case have not met the surrogate mother, but have spoken to her by telephone.

When asked about how much contact the surrogate wanted to have with the child while he or she grows up, she replied, "I don't really think she (the surrogate) wants any further contact with the child, other than knowing it's healthy and happy."

The lawyer said Surrogate Parenting had to devise its own contract between the biological mother and the prospective parents. There was no model to go by.

The birth certificate will bear the names of the father and the surrogate mother. According to Ms. Brophy, the child must be legally adopted by the wife of the

Ms. Brophy would not divulge how much the surrogate mothers are being "We ask the women to just tell us what they're interested in," she said, adding that most of the surrogate fees range from \$5,000 to \$10,000.

The attorney said that in many states where it is illegal to pay for a child, the wife can apply to be the baby's stepmother.

During an initial threehour consultation between the prospective parents and

Brophy and Levin try to point out all the things that could go wrong: the surrogate mother could change her mind, the child might not be born healthy, their contracts have not been

tested as a legal precedent. The session, she said, informs clients "how we got started, how our procedure works now, what kind of examinations we put those women through.

Those examinations include a fertility exam, psychiatric and psy-chological testing and a check of the surrogate's children to make sure they're healthy. Some couples, Ms. Brophy said, may request extra tests of the surrogate mothers, such as an IQ test.

The information about the surrogates is stored in a computer so that the organization and the parents can call up descriptions of women who would be appropriate biological mothers.

During the pregnancy, the father is required to take out insurance policies to provide for the the surrogate mother's family should she die while pregnant and for the baby should the father

Ms. Brophy said she knows of no other such organization and that the service has heard from interested parties in some 30 states.

Strapping an extra high tax on gasoline is no solution to anything. They may not be the movers and the shakers of this society but the energies they display on the job keep this country going. Depriving them of the chance to buy automobile fuel would only complicate matter for the captains of industry. 

WATCH ON WASTE: Even after years of well-publicized scandal, the General Services Administration persists in its spendthrift ways with the taxpayers' money. An investigation ordered by Sen. Jim Sadder, D-Tenn., found that more than a year the GSA has been paying rent for expensive office space in Manhattan's West Fifties that was never used. The 24,000 square feet of empty space, supposed to have been occupied by the Drug Enforcement Agency, cost nearly \$338,000 for a 15month period.



### Inflamed arteries cause pulselessness

Paul G. Donohue, M.D.

Dear Dr. Donohue: Very few doctors know anything about what I have — pulseless disease. The doctor told us it was an Oriental disease. I am not Oriental. Would you please tell me a doctor that specializes in this, or someone who wants to do some

Let me clear up the Oriental matter first. Pulseless disease was first described by Dr. Takayasu, a Japanese researcher, so it is also wn as Takavasıı's disease It may affect persons of any ethnic background. Women are more often

Pulseless disease is an unusual illness in which sections of the large arteries in the body become inflammed. The inflammation may be so extensive that flow of blood is cut off, hence the pulse in that artery is lost and hence its name. The cause is not known, although there is some credence given to the idea of it being what is called an auto-immune disease; the body becomes confused and thinks its own tissues are foreign substances and reacts against them in this case to its own arteries.

The symptom (pain) occurs in the area of the affected arteries. If blood flow to an arm is blocked, that arm is painful. There may be general symptoms, too - fever, weight loss, night sweats, joint pain.

Your state's medical school has an excellent department of internal medicine. You might find a physician there who has special interest in pulseless disease.

Dear Dr. Donohue: I am a 79-yearold woman with the usual old age complaints. I have high blood pressure and diverticulosis. Am having a horrible time with my bowels. Have difficulty in having bowel movements. Is there any harm in using a glycerine suppository? I drink prune juice at bedtime.

Too frequent use of a glycerine suppository can lead to the same problem any laxative can — the laxative habit. That's the biggest problem with suppositories. In addition to the prune juice, make sure you add fiber to your diet - bran, for example. It is difficult to convince folks that fiber is helpful. Many people think anything of a fiber nature will

DEAR DR. GRAHAM: I am interested in reading the Bible, but some of my friends say that I can't really understand the Bible unless I have lots of theological education. They say I ought to leave the study of the Bible to ministers or other people like that. What do you say? — C.S.M.

DEAR C.S.M.: I do not agree with your friends. While a person who has much education may be able to understand some things in the Bible more fully, that should not keep you from reading the Bible. The testimony of millions of Christians through the ages is that "The law of the Lord is perfect, reviving the soul. The statutes of the Lord are trustworthy, making wise the simple" (Psalm 19:7). In fact, I know many people who have very little education and yet they have a profound grasp of the Bible's truth because they have studied it reverently and carefully. How should you read the Bible? First of all, read it prayerfully. It is God's Word, and you should pray that

the Holy Spirit who inspired it will also illumine your heart and mind and help you to understand it. Let the prayer of the Psalmist be your prayer as well: "Open my eyes that I may see wonderful things in your law" (Psalm Then read it intelligently. By this I

What does this passage say about God, or about man, or about our responsibility? Is there a promise to be trusted. or a command to be obeyed? # Dora Roberts Rehab Center grows from dream to reality

Center, a private, non-profit agency, is open, it invests \$1,000 in salaries, equipment use, building operation and maintenance.

It is easy to understand why the Rehab Center is so dependent upon the Howard County United Way, which is gearing up for its annual fall appeal for funds.

Only if the UW achieves its goal will all agencies, including the Rehab Center, get the money apportioned

Nearly 20 years ago, there was no rehabilitation center in Big Spring. Volunteers transported physical therapy patients to Midland then, the rehabilitation center has grown from a dream, to a city-wide project, to a reality.

The first rehabilitation center in Big Spring was the Howard County Re-Built habilitation Center. in 1961 north of the YMCA, the building's materials were donated by local businesses, and all labor was supplied free by local building contractors. The Center, and all those who cooperated in its construction, suffered a major blow a few months after its completion. The Center was built on fill-land; when an unusually hard storm dumped eight inches of rain on Big Spring, the structure literally collapsed under entire afternoon just the strain.

The director at this time was a dedicated physical therapist and humanitarian, Jim Thompson. He was to be director of the Center in its various locations for thirteen years. Undaunted by the loss of the new building, Thompson located an old rental house on Edwards Street and made that the home of the Rehabilitation Center until 1965.

Lillian Staggs, who has worked for the Center as a physical therapy assistant and receptionist since 1964, recalls that old house:

"In the Winter, I would come to work at 7:30 in the morning so I could light the gas heaters and try to get the place warm. My desk was in the old living room. It was about 12' by 12', and waiting patients would be crowded into that little room.

VATICAN CITY (AP) -American Roman Catholic bishops called on Pope John Paul II to take a more tolerant attitude toward the millions of Catholics who The two years are yiolate the church's ban on

> We cannot credibly treat the problem of contraception without clear and honest recognition of the grave demographic problem of our times," Archbishop John R. Quinn of San Francisco told more than 200 Catholic bishops holding a month-long synod on the role of the Christian family in the modern world.

> Speaking on behalf of the National Conference of Catholic Bishops of the United States, Quinn said Monday: "A very large number of men and women of good will do not accept the

(church's) teaching on the intrinsic evil of each and every use of contraceptives."

Asserting that these people cannot be dismissed as "obdurate, ignorant" people of bad will, he called on the Vatican to sponsor "a completely honest examination" of the birth control issue resulting in a new church doctrine of 'responsible parenthood.'

Russell Shaw, spokesman for the U.S. delegation to the synod, said Quinn was not pressing for specific change in the church's rejection of contraception but rather for a more sympathetic attitude toward couples who feel they must use the mechanical and chemical methods of birth control banned by the church.

"Pope Paul VI took a very compassionate view toward people, who, for one reason or another, couldn't live up to the teachings church." Shaw said.

The only method of birth control accepted by the Catholic Church is the rhythm method of abstinence from sexua relations during the fertile period before a woman's menstrual period.

Quinn cited a Princeton University study which concluded that nearly 71 percent of American Catholic women used birth control methods condemned by their church. He cited another report that only 29 percent of the American priests believed artificial contraception was intrinsically immoral and only 26 percent would deny absolution to those using it.

"This widespread theoretical and practical opposition to the teaching on contraception constitutes a profound theological and pastoral problem for the church," said Quinn.

# Panel suggests limit on doctors

WASHINGTON (AP) -Predicting a surplus of 70,000 doctors by 1990, a panel of medical experts today urged that medical schools limit enrollments and encourage new doctors to forgo glamorous surgical specialties in favor of general practice.

The Graduate Medical Education National Advisory Committee also recommended extra federal financial rewards for practice in areas with a shortage of doctors.

The voluminous report, to Secretary of Health and Human Services Patricia Roberts Harris, was being released at a news conference today by Dr. Alvin R. Tarlov, a University of Chicago medical school professor who chaired the panel.

"There will be too many physicians in 1990. There will be substantial imbalances in some specialties," the panel predicted. "There will continue to be a marked unevenness in geographic distribution of physicians.

The panel said the nation had 375,000 active physicians han it needed.

It said that to encourage students to become primarycare physicians rather than surgical specialists, the early phase of medical school should emphasize "a broad-based clinical experience" and put "a more vigorous and imaginative emphasis...on ambulatory care."

The report said medical graduates over the next decade should be urged to in 1978, almost 44,000 fewer enter either specialties nan it needed. where shortages are ex-But by 1990, it forecast, pected by 1990 — such as there will be 536,000, a child psychiatry, emergency surplus of 70,000.
