FAME IS SUCH a fleeting thing. What was the name of the fellow who said "Anybody can achieve fame for about 15 minutes?" Unfortunately most of us go through life without ever achieving our 900 seconds in the sun.

For instance, do you remember that Neil Armstrong was the first astronaut to set foot on the moon? That happened 18 years ago this week.

Twenty years from now will we remember the name of the wistful-looking little military colonel who was pounced on by all those Democratic congressmen who were trying to smear the Republican administration's reputation so that they could get Democrats into the White House at the next election?

Being "rich and famous" is an ambition which most young folks aspire to until they reach about age 40 and discover that it's not worth the effort.

Most of the famous names that we remember best are associated with products that we buy, such as Stetson, Folger, Revlon, Winchester and Ralph Lauren. But fame which comes at the expense of the public seems rather tacky to us, since we are the ones paying the price. Right?

It would be nicer to have the type of fame that comes when a lasting monument is established in your name, such as Mt. McKinley, the Lincoln Tunnel, Stemmons Freeway, or Ellis County, Texas. (Couldn't resist that last one.)

But true fame comes when your name becomes not just a household word, but part of the language. Think about the Bowie knife, the Bunsen burner and the Graham cracker. Is a Macintosh the name of an apple, a computer or a type of raincoat?

Poor old Thomas Edison didn't even get the light bulb named after him but A.M. Ampere and James Watt, the Scottish inventor, fared a little better. The enshrinement of some other needs no explanation: Rudolf Diesel, George M. Pullman, Louis Pasteur, the Earl of Cardigan, Louis B. Braille.

Would the old Indian Geronimo be pleased to know that when his name is evoked it is usually followed by an exclamation mark?

Charles Lynch was a Virginia planter at the time of the American Revolution who formed his neighborhood into vigilante mobs to go out and string up the Tories. He did not believe in the jury system, and from him comes the term lynch mob.

The sidewhiskers of Ambrose Everett Burnside, a Union Civil War general, became the fashion of his day. At first, they were "burnsides," but later because of the location on the face, they became "sideburns."

Sam Maverick went against tradition when he did not brand the calves in one of his herds. They came to be known as "mavericks."

The Earl of Sandwich, John Montagu, was a notorious gambler. He insisted on putting his lunch between a couple of pieces of bread so that he could eat without having to leave the gaming table.

Luigi Galvani used electric shocks in his experiments on animals. It was probably an accident when he invented the metallic arc which eventually came to be used to put a thin coating of zinc on other metals to prevent rust. And so we have the word galvanize.

The Marquis de Sade gave us the word sadism and J.I. Guillotin proposed a humane method of execution during the French Revolution. This only proves that when your name reaches the status of fame it does not necessarily have to be associated with something nice.

## Pony Stars Win Dist. Tourney

Friona's Pony League All-Stars won their district tournament at Hereford last week, and then participated in a sectional tournament at Lubbock this week.

The local all-stars bounced back from a 9-6 loss to the Muleshoe All-Stars in their first game, downing the Muleshoe team 9-5 in the second game, and then 10-0 in the "rubber" game, to claim the title.

Ismael Rocha scored three runs for Friona in the first win over Muleshoe, getting a pair of triples and a double.

Friona was leading Muleshoe, 1-0 after three innings in the deciding game. They then scored two runs in the fourth, five in the fifth and four in the seventh for the 10-0 win.

Louis Abeyta pitched a three-hitter for Friona. He retired the Muleshoe team in order three innings, and faced only 17 batters, two over the minimum, in the first five innings.

At the sectional tournament in Lubbock, the team came up against The Lubbock American All-Stars on Tuesday, and dropped a 14-4 decision.

Ismael Rocha socked a home run with a man on for Friona's biggest offense. Scott Houston scored a run in a leadoff role.

In Wednesday's game, the team was limited to three hits, by Chad Hamilton, Scott Houston and Louis Abeyta in the 12-2 loss. The Lubbock team, drawing off high school baseball talent, scored five runs in the first and five in the second.

## AT CONVENTION

## Glenda Ellis Wins FFA Talent Award

More than 5,500 FFA members, vocational agriculture teachers, parents and guests attended the 59th State FFA Convention July 14-17 in Fort Worth.

During the four day convention, FFA members from all across the state gathered to conduct business of the State FFA Association and honor fellow members for their outstanding accomplishments.

Twenty-two agricultural proficiency and other Star awards were presented to outstanding members, and top chapters were recognized in areas of Safety, Superior Chapter and Building Our American Communities. Lone Star FFA Degrees were conferred upon 1,600 FFA members who qualified for the highest state FFA degree as a result of their agricultural and leadership achievements.

The special class, which has been studying "Issues in Food Science," toured Friona's Excel beef packing plant, and then stopped at George Frye's farm in the Black community, particularly interested in Frye's beet crop.

"We have been studying food processing in the High Plains area, and today was our chance to see some of the actual work," said Margarette Harden, PhD, R.D., associate professor at Texas Tech University.

The student group is made up of foreign students. Included in the group were students from Zambia, Africa, Taiwan, Mainland China, India and Pakistan, as well as the United States.

At the Frye farm, George Frye told the students what went in to growing a beet crop, and Terry Anvik, field representative from Holly Sugar Corp., gave the students details about how the sugar is processed at Hereford's Holly Sugar plant.

After their stops in Parmer County, the class, travelling by van, headed to Hereford, where they were to tour Arrowhead Mills, the Holly Sugar plant, Griffin & Brand's processing plant, and then to Dimmitt, where they were to visit the American Fructose plant.

## Close, But Still Dry

The Friona area is still reeling under the longest dry spell of the summer, with very little moisture having been received during the month of July.

Some parts of the area to the south received some moisture last Thursday, July 16, and some got a little rain on Saturday, July 18, but for the most part the showers were spotty.

Everyone in the farming community is ready and needing a good general rain.

## Friona Library Gets Computer With Grant

The Friona Public Library recently received a computer, and City Librarian Darla Bracken has been busy cataloguing the 16,600 books which occupy the library.

Mrs. Bracken said that the library received the computer in March, and by mid-July she had inventoried around 10,000 of the library's books.

The computer was provided to the Friona library through a grant received from the Texas Panhandle Library Systems. Mrs. Bracken said that the basic computer would have cost around \$14,000, and in addition, the local library was fortunate enough to also get the printer as well.

"We had started saving some money to buy a computer, and had about \$2,000 saved up. Then we decided to apply for the grant. We had heard that the grant money might become a thing of the past, and wanted to try while it was still available," Mrs. Bracken said.

The application was made in December of 1986, and in March the Friona library was one of three Texas Panhandle libraries to receive computers, the others being located at Canyon and Dimmitt.

## Reunion Set For 1936-37 FHS Classes

The Friona High School graduating classes of 1936 and 1937 will hold a joint fifty year class reunion on Saturday, July 25 at the Fifth Season Inn East in Amarillo.

Alumni will be attending from Friona, California, Oregon, Washington, Oklahoma and Texas.

The meeting will start at 2 p.m. in the Quarter Horse Room. A banquet will be held on Saturday evening, and much visiting for the rest of the time.

"We were extremely pleased to get the computer when we did. We had been needing to make an inventory of our books, but had been waiting until we got a computer, since we would have had to inventory our books at that time anyway," Darla said.

There are currently 19 libraries on the Texas Panhandle Library system, and the computer connects Friona's libraries instantaneously with all of the other libraries. The use of the computer has made the interlibrary loan system a real "speed demon."

"If a patron comes in wanting to check out a book that we don't have, we can almost always locate it within the system. We can find out immediately where the book is

located," Mrs. Bracken says.

Recently a Friona reader requested a book on Monday, and it arrived at the local library on Wednesday.

"We could get even better service than this if the individual libraries were allowed to send the books directly to those requesting them. Currently you have to send the book to Amarillo, then they ship it out to the library that requested the book. We may eventually be able to cut out the Amarillo stop, and then could get one-day service," the Friona librarian said.

As a member of the Panhandle Library group, the local library has access to all of the libraries in the system and all of the materials that they have.

The computer allows the local library workers to type out library cards electronically.

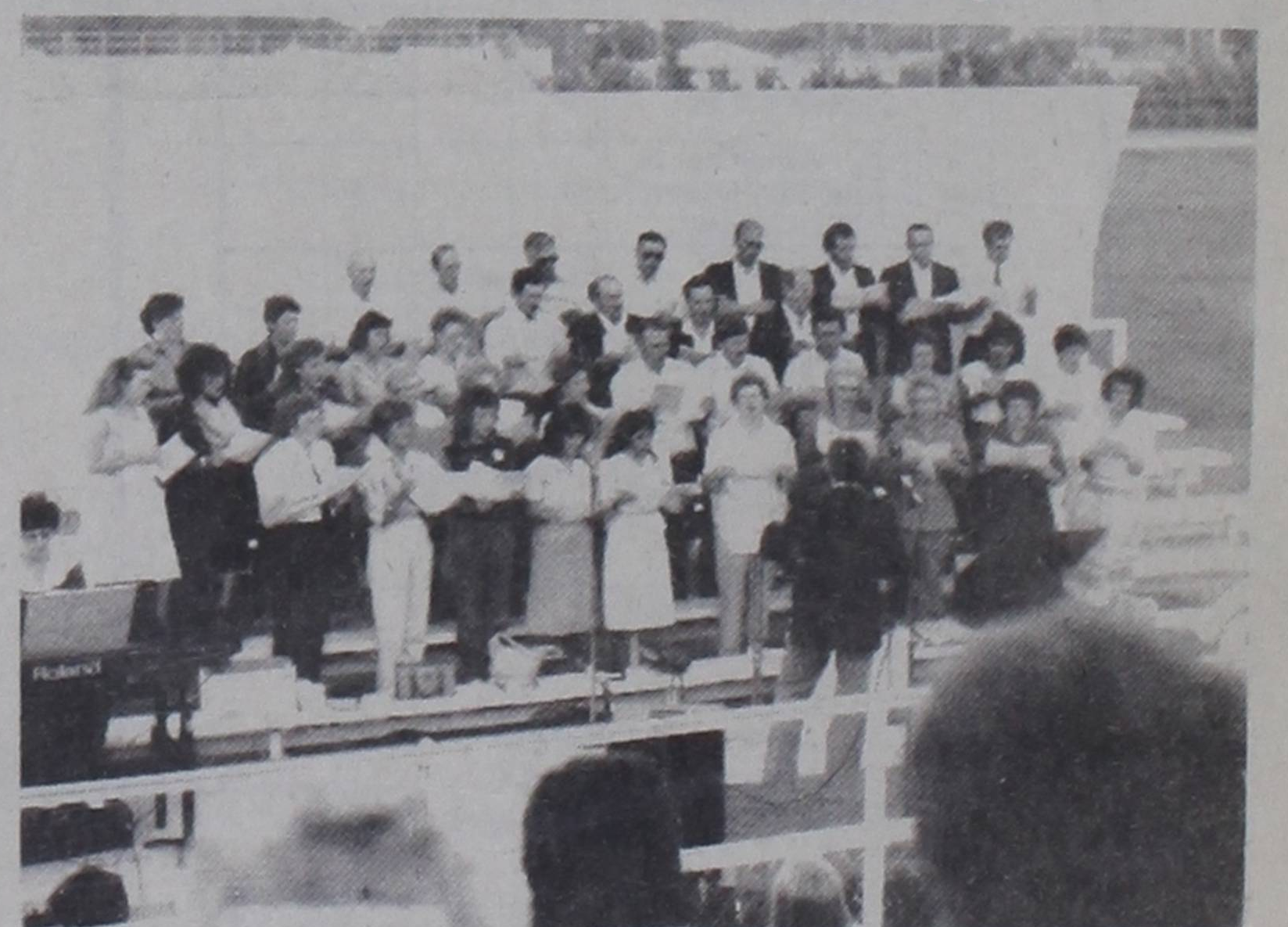
## Hospital To Give X-Ray Screening

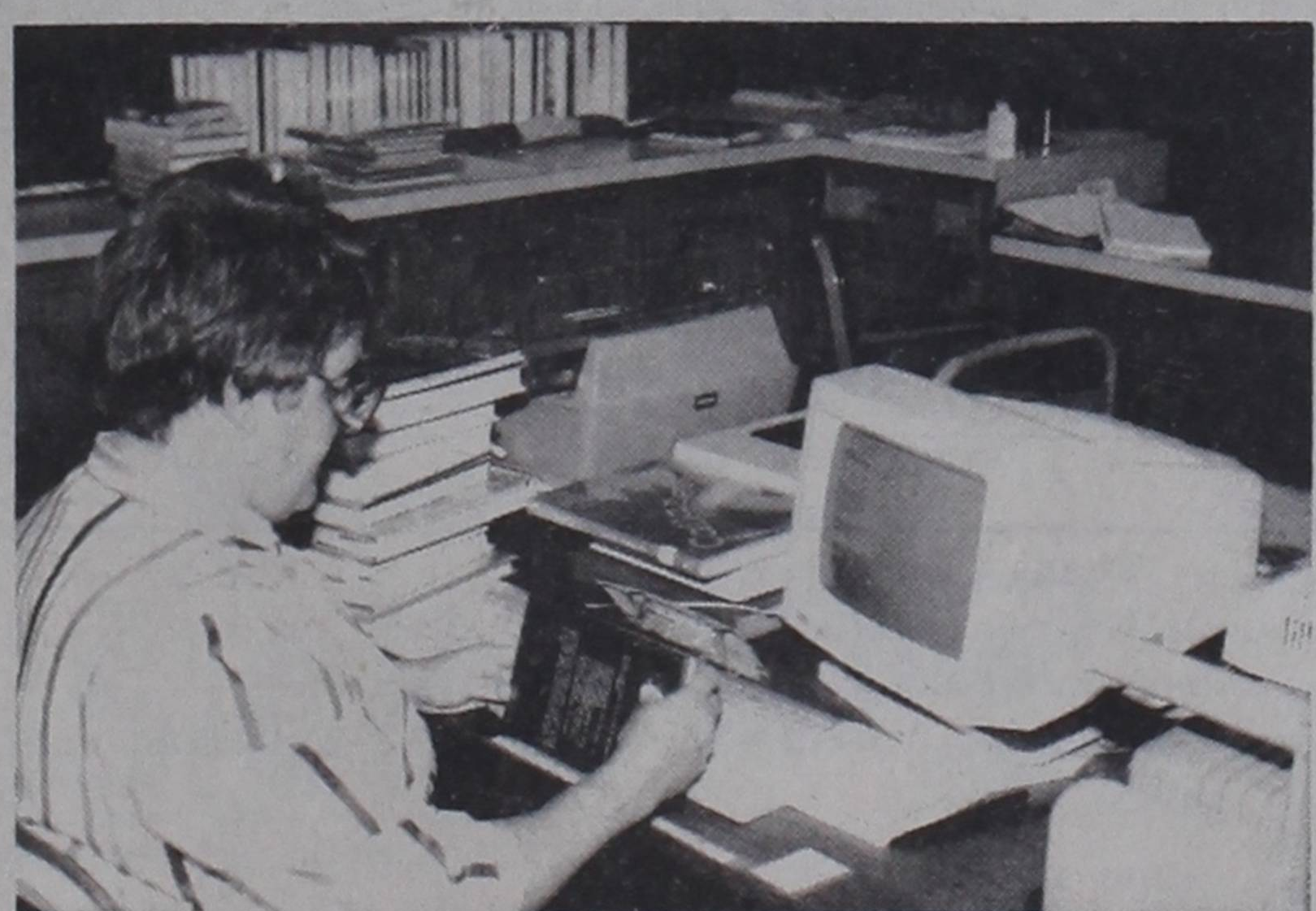
The mammography, using lo-dose x-ray, will be \$80.00 and includes the fee for the radiologist. Ultra sound will also be available and the fee will be \$125.00.

# Friona Flashbacks

....from the files of The Friona Star

**55 YEARS AGO--JULY 22, 1932**

G.W. Durham died following an explosion and fire early Monday morning in the building which housed the M.H. Sylvester garage and machine shop. Durham, who slept in the building, was preparing to retire when the explosion occurred. The four walls of the building were thrown outward, and the ceiling caved in.

**45 YEARS AGO--JULY 17, 1942**

Repeating his statement that only a unified effort of all farmers in Parmer County can rid the county of the serious grasshopper menace, County Agent Garlon Harper reported this week that some progress had been made in killing the hoppers and that farmers who have put the poison bait out according to prescribed methods report good results. 'Hoppers are grown now, and in many cases are moving out of wheat land onto land where other crops are growing.

**35 YEARS AGO--JULY 17, 1952**

Newly-installed officers of the Friona Masonic Lodge include Elroy Wilson, worshipful master; Hadley Reeve, senior warden; M.L. Sylvester, junior warden; C.S. Bainum, senior deacon; Dillie Kelley, secretary; Artis Fallwell, treasurer; Wesley Foster, chaplain; Leonard Coffey, tiler; Claude Miller, junior deacon and Caycee Dunn, senior deacon.

Dr. Rex F. Johnston, former Friona teacher, has been selected as president of the San Angelo Junior College, it has been reported.

**30 YEARS AGO--JULY 18, 1957**

A swimming pool intended for public use is being constructed near Friona. "Completion is expected to be sometime this week," according to the builder, Ed Massey of Friona. Construction of the pool started last week, setting of forms, and concrete pouring followed rapidly. The pool is being built on the east of Highway 60 near the "loop" road intersection.

The fact that Friona is operating on a diminishing supply of water for an ever-growing populace got full attention at the meeting of the Friona city council Monday night.

The problem as presented to the council by city clerk Roy Wilson is: 1. The city is using more water; 2. The water table on one well of the three that are operating has dropped below the depth at which the pump is able to produce water; 3. Rate of water usage is creating

low pressure at times during the day when use is heaviest; 4. It is going to cost some money to remedy the situation; 5. Drawdown on the wells that are producing water now is such that larger pumps and power units will be needed.

**25 YEARS AGO--JULY 19, 1962**

Ed Walters, who farms a mile and a half from Hub, was in fair condition at Northwest Texas Hospital Wednesday after suffering a cracked vertebrae in a wreck Monday in which his pickup was struck by a Santa Fe freight train. Walters' Ford Ranchero was totally demolished Monday night when the eastbound freight struck his vehicle at the Country Club Gin crossing west of Friona.

**20 YEARS AGO--JULY 20, 1967**

City mail delivery for the city of Friona was discussed this week by Postmaster Wright Williams. "Our postal receipts meet the necessary requirements. The main thing we need is hard-surface (sidewalks) areas in places around town, and numbered houses," Williams said.

S.D. Baize, Army Specialist Fourth Class, who has spent the past 11 months in Vietnam, is in the midst of a 30-day pass which he is enjoying at the home of his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Duane Baize.

**15 YEARS AGO--JULY 20, 1972**

Next week could appropriately be termed "Religious Emphasis Week" in Friona. For the first time in a number of years, several churches in Friona, along with churches in Bovina, Lazbuddie and Summerfield, are banding together to sponsor a special evangelistic crusade.

The Friona Community Center committee met Monday night to consider the proposal offered by the City of Friona and Friona Independent School District concerning a site for the community center-showbarn. The committee voted to contact Leo Potishman, who owns the property just south of the site offered by the school, to see if Potishman would also donate that land for the center's use.

**10 YEARS AGO--JULY 17, 1977**

Parmer County again ranked the leader in 1976 in corn production for the state, producing 22.3 per cent of the total Texas crop, Agriculture Commissioner Reagan V. Brown has

announced. County production was 40.2 million bushels.

Five Friona High School girls attended the National Cheerleaders Association Camp of Champs July 3-7 at Eastern New Mexico University and came back with the Spirit Stick, the highest honor presented at the camp. Attending from Friona were Rhonda Parsons, head cheerleader, M'Lynda London, Sylvia Malouf, Jennie Scott, Pam London and Gayle Murdock, the cheerleading sponsor.

**5 YEARS AGO--JULY 18, 1982**

A Friona man and his six-week-old daughter were killed Tuesday, July 13, when the 1977 Monte Carlo in which they were riding collided with a semi-tractor trailer rig at the corner of Highway 214 and Fifth Street. Esteban Reyes, 21, was pronounced dead at the scene. The infant, Maria Anciono Richardson, was transported to Parmer County Community Hospital where she was pronounced dead on arrival.

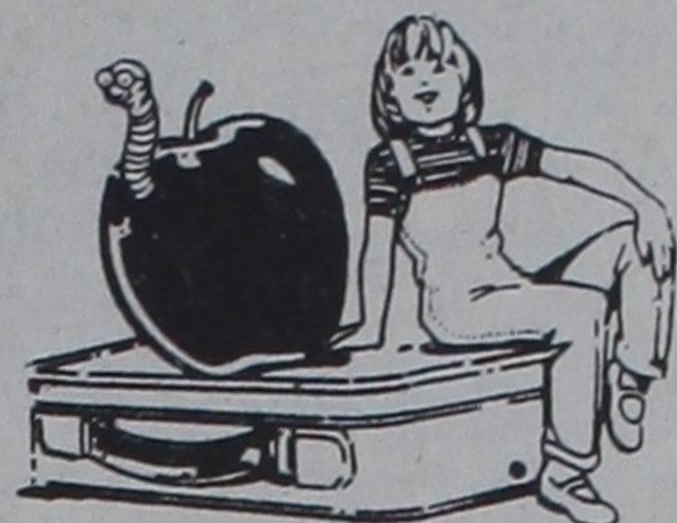






# Library Corner

As Emily Dickinson wrote:  
"There is no frigate like a book  
to take us lands away.  
Nor any coursers like a page  
of prancing poetry."

This traverse may the poorest take  
without oppress of toil.  
How frugal is the chariot  
that bears the human soul!"

In a discussion recently  
concerning what books we had  
read and what influence they had  
had on our lives, it was very  
interesting to learn the selections  
that were made and why.

Even though the whys were not  
discussed at length, the choices  
themselves really caused me to stop  
and think. Besides the obvious  
overall choice of the Bible as the  
truly most influential book, the  
other books were quite varied, as  
varied as the people themselves. I  
narrowed my choices down to two  
finally--"Gifts From the Sea" by  
Anne Morrow Lindbergh and  
"Ann Frank: The Diary of a  
Young Girl." Both of these books  
were ones I read while I was in high  
school and at a very  
impressionable stage in my life.  
Although they are in some ways  
very different, they are also very  
much alike in the sense that they  
are both about coping.

All of us are so very different in  
the way we think and act that it is  
interesting to contemplate the  
reading we do and how it has  
influenced us. Think about what  
your own choices would be and  
why.

In the second quarter of this  
year "Year of the Reader," 2,793  
readers have made use of 6,864  
library items; this compares to  
2,798 patrons and 6,470 items for  
the same quarter in 1986. We also  
recorded our largest June ever with  
3,358 items loaned to 1,050  
patrons; in way of comparison, in  
June of 1977 we loaned 1,050 items  
to 418 patrons. 215 children have  
participated in the Summer  
Reading Club and 47 have  
completed the minimum require-  
ments for certificates.

New Friends officers were  
named in June with Nancy Peace,  
president; Dale Mann, vice  
president; and Peggy Hamil,  
secretary-treasurer. Committee  
chairmen will be contacted soon.

The Friends group has  
sponsored the Library contests for  
the "Animal Antics" Summer  
Reading Club this summer, and  
have purchased the Caldecott and  
Newbery Award and Honor books

for the Library.  
Three new Library Board  
members have also been named:  
Terri Lynn Cox, PTA; John  
Southall, at-large; and Buford  
Hartwick, at-large. Holdover  
members are Lee Witten, at-large  
chairman; Joe Mejia, Noon  
Lions vice chairman; Roy Miller,  
Evening Lions treasurer; Deb  
Hendley, at-large; Nancy Peace,  
Friends of the Library; Susie  
Perez, at-large; Carmaleet Truitt,  
Modern Study Club; and Mary  
Beth Wyly, Young  
Homemakers. Retiring members  
are Estelle Caffey, Sharen Black,  
and Carol Ellis. We appreciate  
these people and their time and  
talents very much.

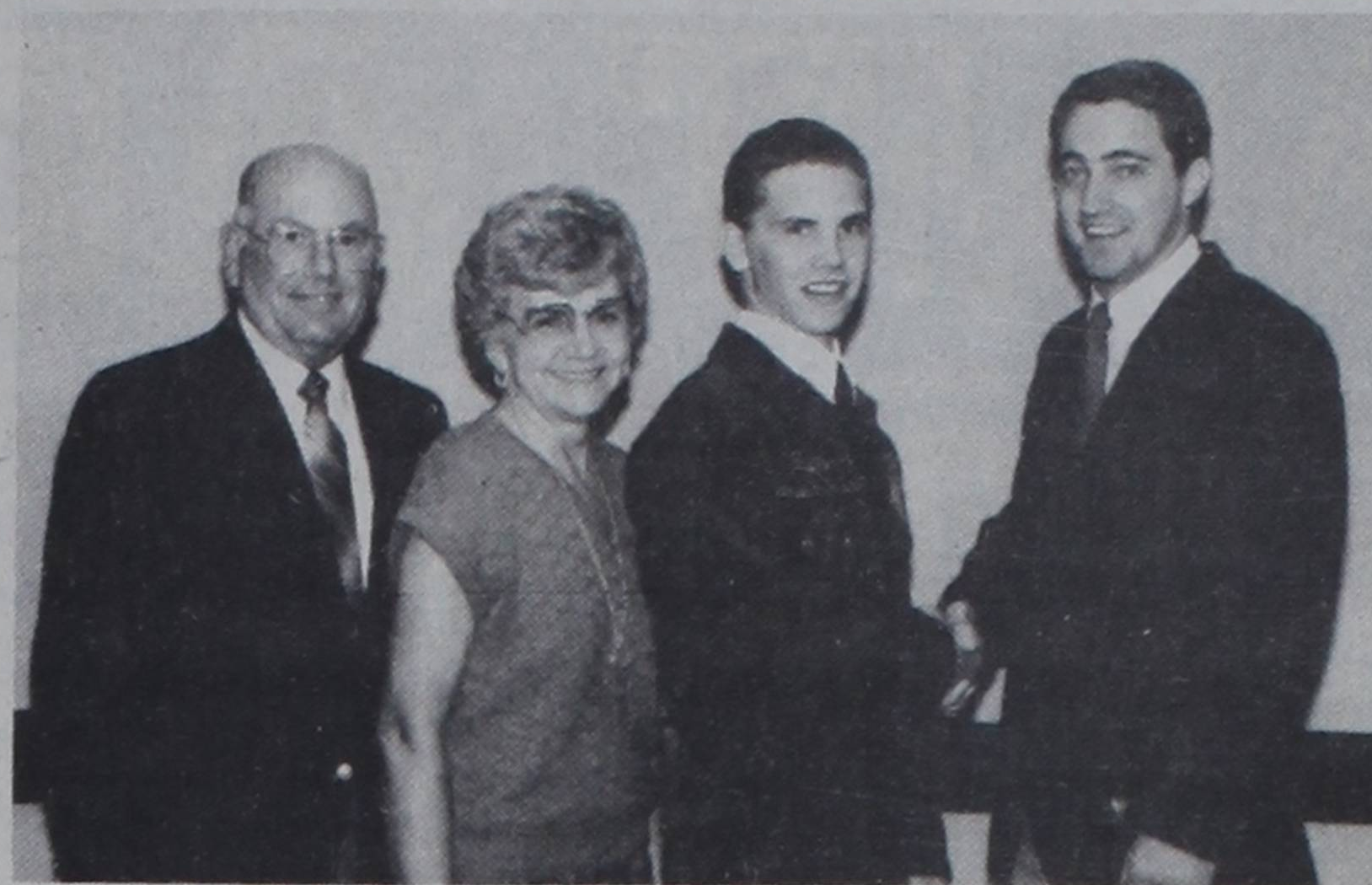

Five citations were issued.

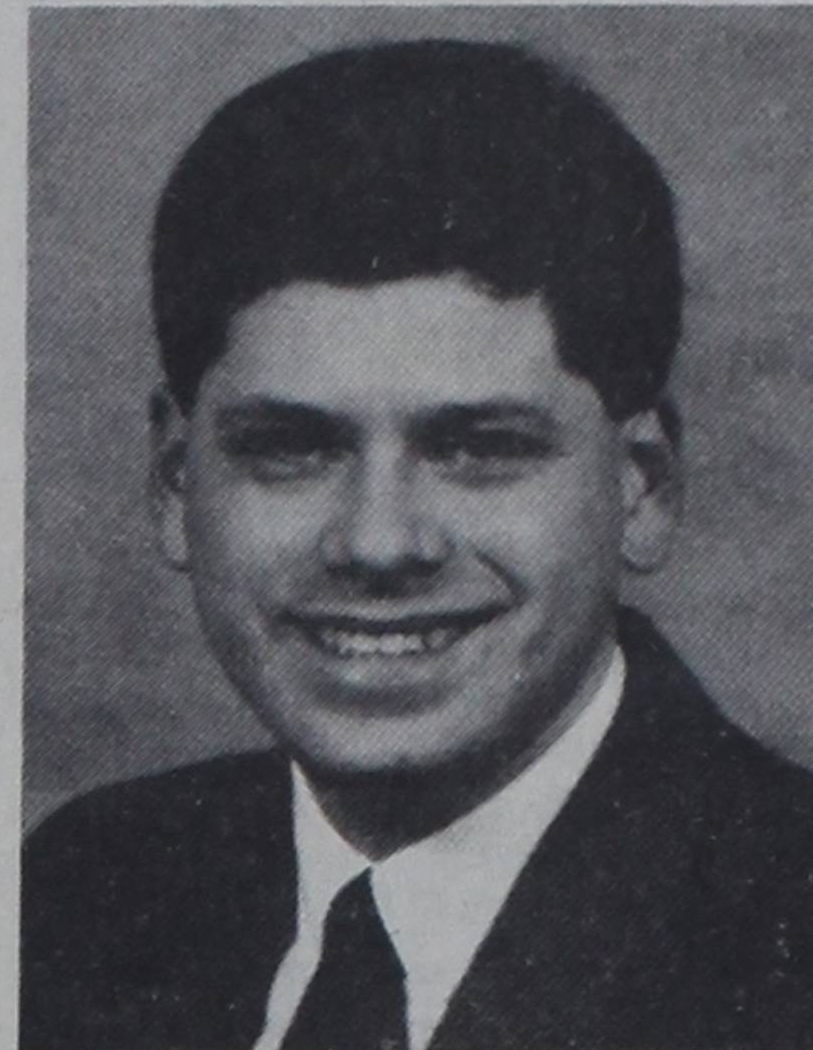
Seven arrests were made--one

## Around The House

### By JANETTE PIERCE

Many fruits and vegetables are  
beginning to ripen, and home  
canners should be getting prepared  
for the harvest. Pre-planning  
before home food preservation can  
make the process easier and safer.

"It's a good idea to check out  
any questions you have before  
beginning any home food  
processing," says Janette Pierce,  
Extension Home Economist,  
Texas A&M University  
Agricultural Extension Service.  
County Extension agents can tell  
you if you preservation methods  
are safe, and will provide you with  
the latest research based processing  
times and procedures.

Using the correct procedures in  
home food preservation is  
important. Incorrect methods

can allow bacteria growth in the  
food, which may cause food  
poisoning or lead to spoilage.

If you have any doubt about the  
safety of your home processed  
food, don't hesitate to call, Pierce  
says.

Food can sometime be saved if  
you act quickly. Tell the agent what  
you think went wrong. Review the  
exact steps you followed when  
processing the food, being careful  
not to leave anything out. The  
smallest thing might make the  
difference.

Have your dial gauge canners  
tested annually, and get any  
questions answered before you  
begin food processing.  
Preparation can save you a lot of  
time, money, and needless  
frustration.

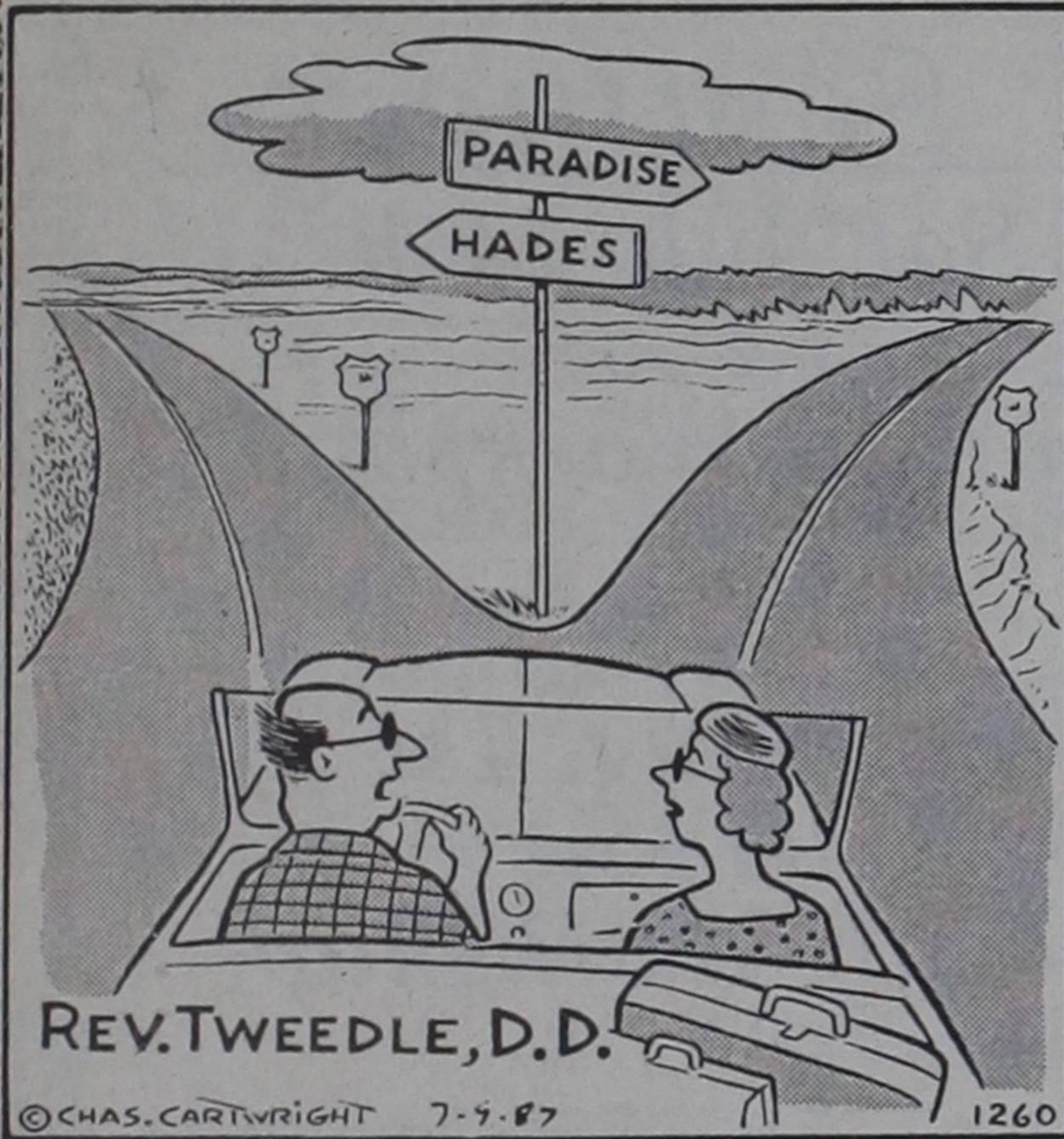

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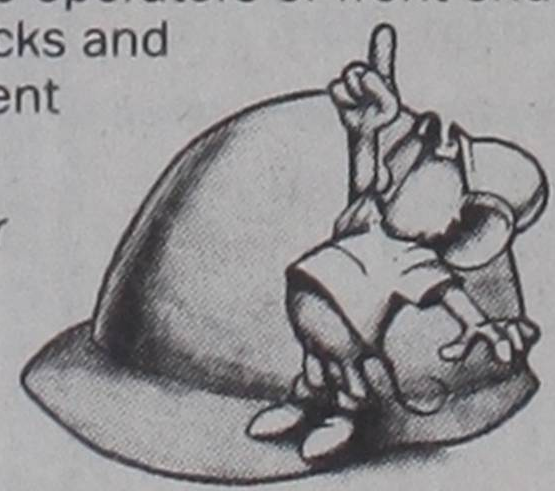

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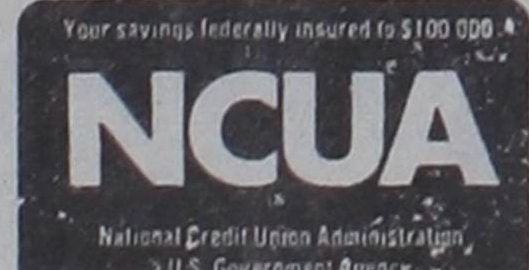

"We invite all our friends and supporters to come out, have some fun and visit with their neighbors in this unique show of unity against the dump," says Alexander.

Admission will be by donation.

A special feature of the event will be presentation of a watercolor painting by noted artist Kenneth Wyatt of Tulia. Wyatt has created the watercolor piece especially for POWER of Hereford, for use in the fund raising effort.

Those attending the POWER social will have an opportunity to win the Wyatt painting, valued at over \$1,000, during a "POWER-surge" that evening. During the "surge" individuals can boost their donations to POWER by a specified amount and receive a ticket qualifying them for a drawing for the painting.

Auction items will include unique theme items relating to resources and industries endangered by the dump. Merchandise will also include a stained glass panel, brass pieces, and ceramic art.

The Nuclear Waste Task Force, which the social seeks to benefit, has been active in the legislative arena as it relates to the waste dump issue.

Operating solely on donated funds, NWF played a major role in obtaining a deletion of funding for waste dump activities in Texas for the current fiscal year, and is working toward legislation that will place a moratorium on further waste dump activities.

## County Will Join Nuke Impact Study

Parmer County will participate in a three-county commission formed to study potential impacts of a proposed nuclear waste dump on rural agricultural communities outside a projected host site in Deaf Smith County.

Dubbed the Castro-Parmer-Swisher Counties Repository Assessment Commission (RAC), the group is made up of the county judge and commissioners courts from each of the three member counties. An executive council of RAC is made up of two county commissioners from each of the counties.

Dale Winders, Castro County Precinct 2 Commissioner from Dimmitt, is chairman of the commission. A.G. House of Tulia, Swisher County Precinct 2 Commissioner, is vice-chairman.

Parmer County members include Judge Porter Roberts; Precinct 1 Commissioner Ernest Anthony of Friona; Precinct 2 Commissioner Thomas Ware of Bovina; Precinct 3 Commissioner Robert White of Farwell; and Precinct 4 Commissioner Raymond McGehee of Lazbuddie.

Other Castro County members of the commission include Judge Polly Simpson of Dimmitt; Precinct 1 Commissioner Curtis Snitker of Hart; Precinct 3 Commissioner Jeff Robertson of Dimmitt; and Precinct 4 Commissioner Vincent Guggemos of Nazareth.

Additional Swisher County members include Judge Joy Johnson; Precinct 1 Commissioner F.L. McGavock of Happy; Precinct 3 Commissioner Roma Boggs of Kress; and Precinct 4 Commissioner W.C. "Buzz" Weathered, also of Kress.

Executive Council members, in addition to Winders and House, include Robertson, Weathered, White and Ware.

The U.S. Department of Energy (DOE) wants to characterize and possibly locate a high-level nuclear waste dump on 15 square miles of prime farmland in Deaf Smith County, between Hereford and Vega. DOE would bury up to 70,000 tons of highly radioactive spent fuel from commercial nuclear power plants and solidified high-level military waste. This waste must be isolated from the environment for 10,000 years, due to its deadly nature.

The dump DOE wants to characterize and possibly locate in

Texas would be a huge mine nearly a half-mile below ground, in bedded salt. DOE must drill through both the Ogallala and Santa Rosa aquifers before it reaches the salt bed it wants to characterize for dumping waste in. The Ogallala aquifer is a critical source of fresh water for a huge area of the Panhandle and seven other states, and could be endangered with contamination.

During characterization, mined salt would be piled atop what's currently productive farm and ranch land in Deaf Smith County.

Opponents of this waste dump claim DOE plans would ruin prime farmland in Deaf Smith County and jeopardize the productivity of numerous surrounding counties.

"Negative impacts of DOE's waste dump wouldn't extend just to the Deaf Smith County line, but beyond, into the whole region," says Winders.

RAC is gearing up for action now, having opened bids for office equipment, etc. last week. RAC is funded through the Governor's Nuclear Waste Programs Office, and is already funded through September, according to Winders.

An initial RAC priority will be a study on direct effects on tax base in the three counties from potential impacts on land prices, food production and the beef cattle industry.
