'Just method' drafted for hostages' release; standby plane requested

Iran has drafted a "just method" for releasing the 52 American hostages, Tehran radio said today, and Swedish airline officials reported a request for a standby airliner, possibly to fly the hostages out of Iran. The radio statement said Iran's hostage plan, which it did not detail, should not be viewed as a sign of weakness because it will "expose the

spokesman said the conference was cancelled because the president had to "get out of town on urgent business." There was a brief flurry of speculation the conference had been called to deal with new developments in the hostage crisis.

In Stockholm, airline officials said a 199-seat DC-8 airliner is on standby possibly to fly the hostages out of Tehran on two-hour notice. The officials of Scanair, a subsidiary of SAS, Scandinavian Airline System, told reporters an unidentified company in London, acting on behalf of an un-disclosed client, made the request.

Swedish Foreign Ministry spokesman Erik Pierre said the Foreign Ministry had been notified by Scanair of the request for a plane.. Foreign Minister Ola Ullsten, in a

separate phone call to The Associated Press, said "the Foreign Ministry is not involved in this case." The U.S. State Department declined to comment on the report.

In Washington, a State Department official who asked not to be identified said he was aware of the Tehran radio commentary, but "actions speak louder than words."

George Havens, a spokesman for the department's Iran Working Group, said said the United States is hoping that the Iranian Parliament will make a favorable decision Sunday on release of the hostages.

Three days of Parliament debate on the hostages ended in sharp disagreement Wednesday and a public session scheduled for Thursday was postpuned because resalicitrant deputies staged a boycott and prevented a guorum. They said they did not want any action on the hostages until after the U.S. presidential elections and did not want to help President Carter.

Prime Minister Mohammad Ali Rajai, in a separate statement, said Iran was not prepared to "accept

WICHITA FALLS, Texas (AP) - A young mother who says she carved out her daughter's heart with a butcher knife to exorcise imagined demons told a psychologist she was instructed by "spirits" who "touched my body all over," the therapist has testified

Marvin Leon Morris said the defendant told him, "I believed that she was the devil and the heart was full of grass."

Defense attorney Harold Lerew said his client, Patricia Ann Frazier, was temporarily insane the night she killed her 4-year-old daughter, Khunji Wilson

"I thought (that) plant had grown on her heart and the only way to save everybody, myself mainly, was to cut her heart out," Morris said the woman told him. He testified as a defense witness Thursday.

wrapped in a blood-soaked rag. "I loved her sometimes," the woman reportedly said of her child. "I

"I was afraid she would grow up to kill people with her eyes - destroy the world," Morris said the woman told him.

Mrs. Frazier also told Morris that her daughter's "eyes changed all the time. They looked like they were cold black. One time, she was darker -her complexion.

Morris said the defendant told him during a February examination that the child had urged her to commit suicide.

He said she told him of an 1976 incident in California when "Kunji looked up in the closet at my boyfriend's gun and touched her finger to her temple and looked at

me." "That meant she wanted me to kill myself. That's when I decided she wasn't my baby," Morris said the

woman told him. who also testified for the defense, said the woman told him she thought someone had put a curse on her and something "in her apartment was looking at her."

A psychiatrist at Rusk State Hospital testified that Mrs. Frazier was a paranoid schizophrenic who did not have control of her actions when







Digest Stuffed bears recalled

NEW YORK (AP) - A manufacturer has recalled 5 million stuffed "Pot Belly Bears" after federal officials found wires and bits of crushed walnut shells in some of the toys.

The toys were recalled by Hudson Brands Trading Co. in New York City on Wednesday after tens of thousands had been sold nationwide. The federal Consumer Product Safety Commission said the walnut shells and wires inside some of the bears could be hazardous to children.

Edward Fox, toy division manager for Hudson Brands, said Thursday that retailers had been asked to send all of their stock back to New York for X-rays. He said major department stores would be offered the choice of having the toys X-rayed in the

Airline, pilots barter

SAN DIEGO (AP) - Pacific Southwest Airlines and its striking pilots will resume negotiations Monday, and the pilots warn they will turn to a powerful national union if new talks fail.

The pilots struck Sept. 25, idling 200 daily flights in California, Nevada, Arizona and Mexico. Talks are resuming at a mediator's request.

The 500-member Southwest Flight Crew Association has indicated it might go along with PSA's demand that two pilots fly DC-9-80 jets. But if talks fail again, PSA pilots say they will join the 33.000-member Air Line Pilots Association --- which requires three pilots in the jets. The pilots also want a 38 percent pay increase while PSA has offered 29 percent.



THERE ARE NO sacred cows to the challenger, outside of his own. He can point with alarm to the growing power of the church, a government overloaded with bureaucrats or a nation allowing criminals to run rampant. The successful politician never points out that the voters should change just for the sake of change. He views with alarm. He points to it - in neon or flashing signs, if possible. He lives in fear that voters will not take him at his word.

In a sense, economic good times are a threat to the nation's bureaucracies, too. If the economic statistics take on a rosy hue, it would shorten the list of problems that government agencies

are created to combat.

Washington succeeds in painting a rather dismal picture all the time for the rest of the country. There are agencies in Washington who would have you believe that we have been in the grips of hard times since the days of the Great Depression of the early 30s. Those same agencies would also have you think the job of combatting such threats, though difficult, would become impossible without their help.

IN THOSE DARK DAYS, Franklin Delano Roosevelt's New Deal laid the foundation for a plethora of federal agencies which have refused to go away

Although the business cycle has had

its ups and downs in the last four decades, the truth is that the general economic growth of the United States has been absolutely sensational.

And, just as business has prospered, so has the individual. Many of his numbers are living in far better houses, driving far better cars, dressing far better (if not more taste fully) than did the American of the 1930s and 1940s. Furthermore, he knows where he can usually hustle a buck, if he truly needs it.

To Washington, prosperity is that ever elusive something which stays just around the corner. Americans are on to the politician's ploy, but they dislike the thought of not being able to play the game.

FIRST THERE'S President Jimmy Carter who has left the economy in pitiful condition, broken promises struck in stone four years ago, and done little to bolster U.S. prestige around the world. You know when he's making what he considers an important point because his eyes bug out and those pallid eyebrows of his rise a presidential half-inch.

Now, I can't be positive about this,

but I don't think I'm alone in believing

that this is one of the most lackluster


campaigns in the country's history, with two of the drabbest, most

unappealing candidates ever to seek the highest office in the land.

The last, and certainly the least, of the candidates is John Anderson, who seems to thrive on telling VFW members that the nation is spending too much on defense, and who seems to have renounced just about every-thing he has voted for during his tenure in Congress. With the demeanor of a Calvinist minister, he seems ready to eat the microphone during his speeches.

Do I seem to be dwelling too much on the personal styles and too little on the issues? Not if the television news

vised debate between Reagan and the President, the commentators com-mented mostly on whether Carter seemed stiff and cold; whether Reagan seemed tentative and unsure of himself. I was surprised when we didn't get an in-depth report on whether the candidates had worn the right ties for the occasion.

But, then again, what else was there to assess? The questions asked during the debate weren't bad. It's a pity the candidates didn't answer them.

There is so little else to go on in this election that the voters must substitute style for substance in hopes of making an intelligent decision. But, the wonderful thing about this country and its political system is that none of this may make any difference.

Richard Nixon, to my way of think-ing, was a lousy president. Yet, try as he might to subvert and sabotage the best interests of the country he pur-ported to lead, he proved only that we were resilient enough to withstand his attacks from on high.

This Tuesday I will cast my ballot against Ronald Reagan and John Anderson. That means that by process of elimination Carter will be the recipient of my vote.

This is a far cry from the way I thought it would be when I was listening to stories about Abe Lincoln learning to read by firelight or George Washington chopping down cherry trees. 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

This is driving me nuts and I'd appreciate any help you can offer. -Mr SF In some people coldness produces hives; usually they are otherwise healthy. Coldness from air, water or in any form can cause the reaction. If hives were the only result, then the condition would be considered a mere nuisance. However, more serious reactions, other than those you describe so well, are possible vomiting, fast heart rate, fainting and swelling of breathing passages. We know how cold urticaria hap pens. Coldness causes special cells (mast cells) to release histamine in people like you. The histamine causes the hives. In a very few people an underlying illness is present, but with most we cannot find out why the phenomenon occurs. The most important part of treat ment won't be a revelation to you, but it is sometimes too simple to be appreciated - avoidance of coldness. That means bundling up as much as possible. The bike-riding is not a good idea. Swim in warm water. Your medicine is an antihistamine, which has a mild sedative effect, perhaps accounting for your tiredness when taking it. I have only one word of possible encouragement for you cold urticaria gradually disappears with age in most people. Dear Dr. Donohue: My grandchildren take swimming lessons at a pool. With all the chlorine they put in those pools, I just wondered if it could affect their eyesight and why their eyes are always so red when they get out of the water? - Mrs. W.L.

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





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Will Women Vote for Ron?

By ANN MELVIN **Editorial Staff Writer** WHY WOULD any thinking woman vote for Ronald Reagan? That was the question.

For the same reasons any thinking man would, is the only sensible answer. But the pundits persist in trying divide female think-

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ing

from male, and, in MELVIN this presidential election, have defined specific

"women's" issues: fear of war, equal employment opportunity and women's rights. The Carter camp has attempted

to exploit these so-called "women's" issues and claim the women's vote, but these very issues contain Carter's weakest points, and thus work against him. Women, ordinary women, who are neither militant feminists nor moral majority evangelicals, are turning to a Reagan candidacy for relief from the failed leadership of Jimmy Carter on these very issues.

TO BEGIN with, the fear of war issue devised by the Carter campaign to smear Reagan works against Carter.

For while women naturally fear war as all thinking humans do - they are angered at the weakened American defense capability under the Carter administration that for the first time in memory could tantalize Soviets with serious thoughts of aggression.

Women are not happy with the Carter cuts on naval defense, his low ceiling on Army wages, the cancellation of the B1 bomber, Minuteman III and Lance missile programs.

Women, who are not credited with mechanical acumen, understood from the first the purpose of the neutron bomb for effectively stopping Russian tanks - perhaps because they could visualize their boys standing against those tanks - and they did not approve of Carter's scuttling it.

Women are not happy with a Carter who talks tough from a weakened defense position and who then is the very essence of appeasement in the face of Iranian insults, Soviet buildups in Cuba and aggression against Afghanistan

WOMEN are profoundly concerned that Carter canceled Ford's modest but effective 5-year plan that would have rebuilt this nation militarily after the Vietnam anti-war backlash subsided. No. Women don't like war. But what they like less is being so vulnerable, unprotected and weak as to invite war.

The basic thrust of the women's movement has been to gain a position of invulnerability, of strength. What irony then to see that strength gained on a personal basis and yet slipping away for the nation.

Uneasiness about failing American defense capabilities is not the only issue turning women away from Carter to Reagan.

Women constitute nearly onehalf of the American work force and are the majority consumers. The failing American economy is going to lead them to vote their pocketbooks for a Reagan administration.

Women who have fought for better employment opportunities understand full well that in a continually deteriorating economy under Jimmy Carter, their jobs will suffer, their paychecks buy less, their employment opportunities diminish.

Women who earn their daily bread are not so naive to think that lip service to the ERA speaks louder than a 41.4 percent increase in consumer prices and an 18.2 percent drop in the dollar value since 1977.

Women hear the new Carter excuses for double-digit inflation taking another .07 dip in reports over the weekend and are not impressed.

The bottom line on employment opportunities for women is the economy and they know it is suffering under Carter.


And while there has been a lot of talk about Carter's attractiveness to women on the basis of women's rights, women perceive that there has been a steady erosion of basic human rights as he has continued to exploit the old liberalism that is no longer operative in contemporary times.

THE ENTIRE concept of rights is thwarted when, in pursuit of social change, the government abuses basic human rights - as in the use of children as pawns.

How many women who have seen their children endure the failed social experiment of busing to achieve desegregation - who have seen that experiment not only exploit their children but damage basic public education and fail to deliver its promise to minority children - how many of those women will vote for Jimmy Carter and give him the opportunity to continue to shore up that liberal madness on the Supreme Court through additional court appointments in the next four years?

Part of the state restance which None. Women, then, may indeed vote the "women's" issues this year. But they are the primary issues for all Americans. And they are turning women away from Carter and into the Reagan camp.

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





McQueen returns home

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Steve McQueen is back at his California ranch after checking out of a Mexican clinic where he underwent cancer treatments in August.

Warren Cowan, a spokesman for the actor, said he had not been in touch with McQueen other than to confirm that the star of such movies as "Bullitt" was back at his Santa Paula ranch. Cowan said he did not know if McQueen would return soon to Plaza Santa Maria Hospital in Baja California.

Asked about McQueen's condition, Cowan said Thursday, "I'm told he's stable, but I'm not sure how accurate that is.

McQueen left the hospital earlier this week, Cowan said. Two weeks ago, the doctor in charge of McQueen's care said he expected the actor to stay at the clinic for another two months. Dr. Rodrigo Rodriquez said McQueen's cancer apparently had been halted.

Rodriquez could not be reached for comment Thursday

McQueen was on a program that included Laetrile - a substance that has not won acceptance in the U.S. medical community. He also received a vegetarian diet of unprocessed foods, vitamins, minerals and enzymes

"I'm beating last year's record for \$3 million in fund-raising," said Kermit. "I've never done anything this serious before."

Will said Thursday that Mrs. Wrigley, 46, could stay in the fourbedroom condominium on Lake Michigan until he entered a written opinion, and gave her five to seven days after that to find a place to live. His decision came after the Wisconsin appellate court upheld the annulment of the couple's marriage.

Will rejected the argument by Mrs. Wrigley's attorney that she had been promised a condominium before the 1970 marriage, Mrs. Wrigley was ordered out of the apartment in May by a circuit court judge. She appealed to the federal

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

Astros limited partners cautiously await reverse

HOUSTON (AP) - Limited partners controlling 66 percent interest in the Houston Astros say they are moving cautiously to try to reverse the firing of Tal Smith, the general manager who moved the club from the National League cellar to first place in the West division.

"Everybody is busy working on it," said Don Sanders, a Houston investments executive who holds 2 percent interest in the franchise. "We don't want to rush into something and harm our case. We don't want our efforts to boomerang."

According to legal documents, 20 Houston residents invested \$3.36 million for a 56 percent interest in the limited partnership under which the Astros have operated the past 15 months. Many of the limited partners expressed

outrage Monday when General Partner John McMullen fired Smith. Dave LeFevre, a New York attorney who paid \$600,000 for a 10 percent interest

said he and other partners were studying possible ways of reversing McMullen's actions. He said one possible method was to dissolve the limited partnership.

"We will go about it in a most thorough and professional manner and we won't rule out any options," LeFevre said. "That is subject to the partnership agreement and the laws of the land."

Documents filed when the partnership was formed in July 1979 showed McMullen, a New York industrialist, holds 25 percent interest. Another 8 percent is held within his family and 1 percent by a New Jersey

neighbor. The remaining 66 percent is held by Houston residents, whose individual in-terests range from 1 percent to 8 percent, and by LeFevre.

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



She hopes that later in her working career she can say she worked through the Herald. "I really enjoy working here and I enjoy







Unsolved murders along Planes from Texas join highway puzzle lawmen CAP search

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) - A Marcos home about 35 miles four-year string of about 20 north of San Antonio. unsolved murders along a stretch of Interstate 35 brought Texas law enforcement officials together here for an unprecedented brainstorming session this week.

The puzzling murders go back to Aug. 23, 1976, when Lesa Rhea Haley's body was found on I-35 just north of Waxahachie, about 25 miles south of Dallas. The 20-yearold woman was stabbed in the neck with an awl. Like several of the victims, she was a hitchhiker.

"We have run out of leads, out of ideas and we are calling on the assistance of every citizen and every investigator who may have information on these cases," said Williamson County Sheriff Jim Boutwell, whose county straddles the interstate in the state's center. "Our main link to some 20 murders is Interstate 35 on which nearly all the murders were committed.'

The most recent slaying was June 23, when Rodney Bruce Massey was shot four times. His body was dumped in a grassy field near Temple, 70 miles north of Austin.
