At least 792 killed

Major earthquake hits Southern Italy

NAPLES, Italy (AP) - The death toll in the earthquake that devastated southern Italy rose to 792 today, the government said, and search teams combed the rubble for more victims in damaged cities and shattered towns and villages.

A big rescue operation was under way to save people believed still buried under rubble from the Sunday night quake and to aid the several thousand people reported injured.

The Interior Ministry said rescuers had reported recovering 792 bodies. "They screamed, oh did they

scream. It was worse than hell," said Angela Enza, who was trapped in a Belvano church when the killer earthquake struck during evening Mass.

Searchers had found 59 bodies half of them children - and reported as many as 100 others missing in the village of 2,200 people nestled in the hills 60 miles east of Naples.

Rescue efforts were hampered by damage to roads and rail lines and by aftershocks that hit every 30 minutes throughout the night, often knocking down buildings damaged by the initial shock.

Thousands were homeless after shivering through a foggy, freezing night outside their collapsed homes. The Italian government declared a day of national mourning and dispatched 10,000 troops to the area.

Rescue efforts were hampered by damage to roads and rail lines.

One of the worst catastrophes hit the small town of Balvano, 60 miles east of Naples, where the walls of the church of Santa Marin Assunta collapsed on an evening Mass filled with children. More than 50 bodies were removed from the rubble, half of them children

Firemen were able to save a twoyear-old boy, still holding a toy car. from the church rubble. Next to him, emergency Cabinet meeting, which proclaimed a day of national mourning, then flew south with Italian President Sandro Pertini to visit the stricken area

Pope John Paul II sent a telegram to the Cardinal of Naples expressing his "shock" for the "unspeakable suffering" of the population, and named a bishop to coordinate church relief efforts.

"I saw the buildings move like waves of the sea," said Luigi Iannone, who was driving near Salerno when the first quake hit at 7:34 p.m. Sunday (1:34 p.m. EST). "It was something terrible.

Aftershocks continued in the night Countless thousands spent the night in the open. Doctors canceled a nationwide strike scheduled for today and reported to their hospitals or rushed to the disaster area.

Seismologists said the quake was centered at Eboli, 17 miles southeast of Salerno. Officials said at least 11 people were killed there.

In Balvano, the worshippers were crushed to death by the collapsing wall of their church as they tried to

"There were at least 300 people at the Mass tonight, including many children. The front wall collapsed as people were trying to get out," said the parish priest, the Rev. Salvtore Pagliuca, his vestments torn and covered with dust

Some 70 people were reported killed in Pescopagano, near Balvano, where a hospital, homes and the police barracks were damaged.

Authorities said Naples, Salerno, Avellino and Potenza were the major cities affected by the quake, which struck as many were sitting down to supper. Fires broke out as people left their stoves on when they fled their homes

Rescue efforts were hampered by damage to roads and rail lines. Telephone and electric lines were down in many places. Three military helicopters were sent from Rome at dawn to survey the stricken area, and other helicopters were to be sent up from bases in the south.

Limited train service began out of Naples and several trains left the city. Railroad officials were checking damage to the tracks.

Iran claims Iraq forces routed from Susangerd

BAGHDAD, Iraq (AP) - Iran claimed its forces routed an Iraqi brigade from the town of Susangerd on the southern war front, while Iraq said its paratroopers and helicopter gunships smashed an Iraqi counterattack at the northern end of the 300mile invasion front.

No quick solution

WASHINGTON (AP) - Secretary of State Edmund S. Muskie said today he sees no short-term solution for freeing the American hostages in Iran

While the Carter administration waits for a new message from Tehran, Muskie said, "Our posture now is that we are holding and circling.

Iran's message, to be delivered through Algerian intermediaries, is in response to U.S. proposals for breaking the deadlock, now in its 55th week

Muskie, in a brief exchange with reporters at the State Department, indicated he did not expect a yes-or-no reply from Iran.

Iran also reported Iragi artillery bombardment of besieged Abadan started new fires in the big oil refinery on the Shatt al-Arab estuary

Pars, the official Iranian news agency, said President Abolhassan Bani-Sadr told it Iranian troops killed 400-450 Iraqi troops, destroyed 20 enemy tanks and captured seven others at Susangerd Sunday.

"The infidels fled in chaos, leaving behind scores of burning tanks," Pars said.

Meanwhile, the Iraqi military command reported rocket-firing helicopter gunships at the northern end of the war zone killed 50 Iranians and destroyed four tanks and three other vehicles in the hills overlooking Iraqi positions at Gilan Garb. It said 95 Iranians were killed in other fighting Sunday.

Both sides reported an Iranian air attack Sunday on northern Iraq, but Baghdad claimed only a civilian car was damaged and is driver wounded. Iran claimed its planes destroyed an electric power station, a chemical plant and a cement factory near Iraq's borders with Turkey and Syria. Former Prime Minister Olof Palme of Sweden met in Baghdad with Iraqi President Saddam Hussein, continuing a peace mission for U.N. Secretary-General Kurt Waldheim. It was not known what Hussein told him, Iranian Prime Minister but Mohammad Ali Rajai told him last week in Tehran that his mission was "a waste of time.

In a related development, Iran called te first U.S. reply to its conditions for the release of 52 American hostages unsatisfactory and asked for a "clear and explicit" yes or no, reports from Tehran said.

Secretary of State Edmund Muskie said last week that the United States, in its letter delivered in Tehran on Nov. 12, accepted the Iranian conditions "in principle." But other U.S. officials reported the United States explained the legal obstacles to immediate fulfillment of the demands for release of more than \$8 billion in Iranian assets frozen by U.S. presidential order, cancellation of all American claims aginst Iran and the return of the fortunes transferred abroad by the late Shah Mohammad Reza Pahlavi and his family.

Iran's reply to the United States was delivered Saturday in Tehran to an Algerian delegation which took it to Algiers. It was not known when it would be delivered to the U.S. representatives

An unidentified farmer in Knott told Commissioner Louis Brown that he wanted the county to drain his land if they were going to pump out Pirkle Lake, However, commissioners only agreed to clear the road, not empty the entire lake.

But fragmentary reports from the town of Sant' Angelo dei Lombardi in Avellino province indicated 300 persons perished in that town. Pescopagano, another povertystricken small town in the province of Avellino, reported 70 bodies had been

recovered from the debris. The quake, measuring 6.8 on the Richter scale, destroyed hundreds of buildings, including a 10-story apartment house in Naples.

Casualty totals increased as more reports were received from the 29 cities, towns and villages that suffered the most damage in the Naples-Salerno area of southern Italy.

"We have only our eyes left to cry, said the mayor of San Mango, a town of 1,800 in Avellino province."My house, my car, everything is gone. There is no one left up there.

The quake was felt from Sicily to the Alps, but the hardest hit area was northeast of the bay of Salerno. More than 100 deaths were reported in the provinces of Salerno and Avellino. while the mountainous province of Potenza reported more than 150 deaths.

Sketchy reports from Avellino said 13 people were killed there, 300 were injured and half of the homes were leveled. In the nearby village of Lioni, a discotheque was destroyed and many were feared dead in the ruins.

In Aversa, north of Naples, the bell tower of a 16th century church collapsed and killed the parish priest, his 84-year-old mother and another woman.

In Lancusi, near Salerno, the quake leveled most of the homes. The bodies of a woman and child and two young men were pulled from the ruins of a three-story building. A man wandered among the rescue workers crying, "Who will give me my babies?

In Potenza, 90 miles east off Naples and near Balvano, an official said virtually all of the city's 50,000 residents fled to the nearby hills and spent the night in their cars or out in the open.

Police in Naples hurled tear gas grenades and fired submachine guns into the air at the Poggioreale Prison after some prisoners tried to escape in the general panic caused by the

HOUSTON (AP) - John McMullen has resigned as general partner of the Houston Astros and the franchise will be operated by a committee of three. including McMullen, attorney Joe Jamail announced today.

The announcement came shortly before Jamail was to go before U.S. District Judge Carl O. Bue to seek a temporary injunction prohibiting McMullen from conducting business for the National League baseball club.

Jamail, who last week filed suit on behalf of limited partners in the Astros ownership, said all decisions in the new organization would be made by the three-man committee.

The suit, charging McMullen with mismanaging the Astros, has now been dropped, Jamail said.

McMullen still has his 34 percent interest, the largest in the club.

The other committee members are Jack Trotter, a Houston investor who owns a 2 percent interest in the Astros, and Herb Neyland

The Houston Post said in today's editions that McMullen had agreed to become one of the limited partners in an ownership reorganization.

1.000 bears to be hunted

HARRISBURG, Pa. (AP) - State conservation officials predicted 1,000 bears would be killed today during a one-day hunt that was unsuccessfully challenged by the Fund for Animals.

The group had contended the hunt should not be permitted because some of the state's 6,000 black bears were contaminated by tranquilizers used earlier in the year by researchers doing population studies. But U.S. District Judge John B. Hannum rejected the challenge Saturday.

The state's game commission said the hunt was a conservation measure designed to thin the bear population. Last year's hunt resulted in the death of 736 bears, a one-day state record, officials said.

Body of pilot recovered

GLENBROOK, Nev. (AP) - A salvage crew has recovered the body of speedboat pilot Lee Taylor, who died in an attempt to set a world water speed record on Lake Tahoe.

The crew used grappling hooks to recover the boat's eight-foot cockpit on Saturday. Taylor, 45, of Bellflower, Calif., was found inside.

The rocket-powered boat, the Discovery II, flipped and flew apart 10 days before as Taylor drove it at high speed.

CORE vote disputed

COLUMBIA, S.C. (AP) - Two factions in the Congress of Racial Equality are disputing the validity of a weekend vote to oust Roy Innis as chairman and executive director of the civil rights group

Innis said that a meeting held Saturday at which a group, claiming to be the CORE governing board, voted to oust him was "a fraud." Innis said "not one active chapter, not one CORE chairman and not one regional CORE chairman was in attendance.'

But Waverly Yates, elected chairman at the meeting attended by 200 people, said the gathering was attended by CORE regional directors from around the country. Yates has been a vocal opponent of Innis.

Collection agency checked

CLEVELAND (AP) - A collection agency established two years ago by the president of the Carpenters Union in Ohio is being investigated by the U.S. Labor Department, according to Joseph D Caiola, an agency official.

The Cleveland Plain Dealer said in Sunday's editions that the collection agency was established as a non-profit corporation, but has a surplus of more than \$100,000. State law prohibits non-profit corporations from showing a profit

The newspaper said the collection agency handles an estimated \$25 million a year in union fringe benefits collected from contractors. Carpenters Union President Milan Marsh could not be reached for comment

The sources said an Algerian delegation that delivered the U.S. response to Iran returned from Tehran on Sunday and were to meet today with Algerian Foreign Minister Mohamed Benyahia

Iranian officials said Sunday the U.S. reply was unsatisfactory, and it wanted a "clear and explicit" yes or no, reports from Tehran say

It was not known if the Algerian delegation was planning to head to Washington

In Washington, State Department spokesman Joe Reap said the U.S. government had received nothing official yet and was still in a 'wait-and-see attitude.'' He said there were no plans yet for anyone to go to Algiers to get the Iranian reply.

Today was the hostages' 387th in captivity since Islamic militants seized the U.S. Embassy in Tehran and its staff on Nov. 4, 1979.



In war, wildlife takes a beating

War is invariably hard on animals. During WW II, meat became so scarce in Germany, it was strictly rationed and some individuals were limited to a quarter pound a month. Prisoners of war were shut out entirely and, had it not been for Red Cross packages, some of them wouldn't have made it.

Teams of Germans went into the forests to bag what wild life they could in order to get enough protein. Horse meat became quite popular in France and remains so to this day

THE NATIONAL WILDLIFE Federation reveals that rare animal species are becoming rarer still, now that Russia has invaded Afghanistan. Up until war broke out there, Afghanistan had one of the most promising conservation programs in the Third World.

At least one herd of feral yak, the product of years of careful conservation work, was destroyed along with flocks of waterfowl and priceless snow leopards. The National Wildlife Federal also reports that out of six conservationists assigned by the United Nation to work in the remote Asian country, only one was left after

The Internationl Wildlife group repeats the disturbing story of a British ecologist, Jeffrey Sayer, who was dispatched to Kabul in January 1979 by the U.N.'s Food and Agricultural Organization to help establish a system of urgently needed wildlife sanctuaries. After a decade of work in the country by the U.N., Afghanistan's conservation consciousness had been stirred, with the result that two key sanctuaries had been established.

One was in the windswept landscape around Ab-i-Estada, one of Asia's great natural aviaries and a haven for about 100,000 greater flamingoes, many ducks, and 33 migrating Siberian cranes - a tenth of the world's population of that species.

Another sanctuary had been mapped out in the Ajar Valley, once a royal hunting preserve and the home for feral yak, ibex and pubably the only wild population of Bactrian deer outside the Soviet Union.

Sayer was to do field studies in these sanctuaries where, although unregulated hunting had been curbed,

poaching and a burgeoning fur trade had taken their toll. According to Khushal Habibi, an Afghan biologist, out of the 119 native mammals, the Caspian tiger, cheetah, and musk ox were already extinct and the snow leopard, sand fox, Blandford's fox, goitered gazelle, markhor and Bactrian deer were endangered.

On May 6, 1979, Saver's efforts in the two localities were stymied when a travel ban was slapped on all foreigners. Sayer stayed busy by working around a reclaimed lake around Kabul. When the Russian soldiers invaded three months later, they reportedly gunned down the migrant waterfowl at Kole Hashmat Khan and ordered Afghan guards to retrieve them from the lake.

SAYER WAS FURTHER depressed when he heard of the fighting in the Ab-i-Estada wildlife sanctuary. And, in the north, the mountain home of some 3,000 Marco Polo sheep was becoming an infiltration corrider for Moslem resistance fighters.

Sayer had reason to believe that the wildlife in the Ajar Valley had been wiped out. Most of the feral yak had been rounded up and slaughtered,

then trucked into the provincial capital for sale

Unregulated hunting in Afghanistan has, no doubt, intensified. While browsing through a Kabul market in early 1980, Sayer found a dozen each of leopard and snow leopard skins for sale.

When Sayer reached his office in the government's National Parks Directorate, a few days after the invasion, he found his Afghan workers in a state of shock. His former assistant had been executed and the director general of the forestry division had been shot to death. At least one colleague had been tortured. In February of this year, a bullet

smashed through Sayer's window. The ecologist knew then it was time to depart.



But other Reagan insiders less sympathetic to Israel received no invitations, Gov. Bill Clements of Texas and George Shultz. a key transition adviser, are warning Reagan that he needs equally good relations with Saudi Arabia and Jordan. Reagan's Mideast policy experts are eyeing Jordan as the crucial link in Reagan's plan for peace on the West Bank.

Exponents of a balanced Mideast policy for the new Reagan administration are pushing hard for a shattering break with President Carter's Camp David process, which is clearly failing. Key elements in their plan:

 Replace Camp David's design for West Bank autonomy with a territorial exchange between Israel and Jordan. That would abruptly shoot down Begin's claims to security rights over the entire West Bank.

Terminate Ambassador Sol Linowitz's mission impossible as special Egyptian-Israeli-U.S. go-between on the autonomy plan.

Assure Saudi Arabia that the new administration will quickly approve the bomb racks and fuel tanks the Saudis must have to give their F-15 fighter-bombers worthwhile range in the Persian Gulf.

Adm. Thomas Moorer, a former chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, warned Reagan just before the election that Saudi Arabia and other Persian Gulf oil states will never fully cooperate with the U.S. until the Palestinian homeland on the West Bank has been returned. That directly contradicts Begin's line that biblical authority gives Israel perpetual West Bank rights.

Begin's allies in the Reagan camp. who believe the fate of the U.S. in the Middle East will rise or fall with that of Israel, are battling back.

Dear Dr. Donohue: I have visited the coast of Florida twice and have been bitten by sandflies or noseum so badly I thought I'd go crazy with itching. Is there any preventive I can take before I go on the beaches? Are sandflies and noseums the same creatures? - Mrs. S.P.

I am trusting my biologist friends for this answer.

I have found no reference to "noseums" in literature. You are referring to a colloquial expression for gnats or midges, which are so tiny that they are sometimes called "no-see-ums." With that settled, we can see-ums. move on

Bites of gnats and midges (no-seeums) cause considerable irritation and can make a sensitive person itch severely. Theyarm during the day near ponds and swan., v areas.

A sandfly is something sise. It is about twice the size of a no-see-um, is a poor flier, but can be seen sort of leaping around. It is more of a night creature than its cousins. Its bite causes a rose-colored spot.

The treatment for both, aside from avoidance, is to use an effective insect repellant. (Incidentally, I do not like to spray such repellants on the body. I think it is much better to spray a bit on the palm of the hand and gently rub it onto the body.) And you must realize that insect repellants have to be reapplied after you come out of the water.

Now, before the Florida Chamber of Commerce writes me a nasty letter, let me add that Florida is not the only place where you find these insects They are all over in warmer climates. Florida is one of my favorite places. A visit there has revived by sinking spirits on more than one occasion. And I have never been bitten by either insect.

Norms in medicine are not absolutes. Medicine is not engineering. because humans are not machines. Everyone is different from everyone else. Even children in the same family are quite different, not only in personality, but biologically. Therefore thre is really no such thing as a normal temperature for everyone. We call 98.6 an average temperature because many people have that. But even during a 24-hour period a person's temperature will vary one to two dosages - lowest in the morning and highest in the late afternoon.

Some have consistently lower or higher temperatures than 98.6. They are not ill, they just vary from the norm. This isn't answering your question. I just wanted to give you some back, ound on body temperature.

If a person had a comistently lower temperature than the average, 98.6, and if his temperature were elevated by 1.6 degrees above that, this would

result from this estrogen effect. It is a normal finding, indicating that estrogen-producing glands are func-

DEAR DR. GRAHAM: Does the Bible say anything about when the Holy Spirit comes to dwell within us as believers? - V.B.

DEAR V.B.: Yes, it does. The Bible teaches that the Holy Spirit comes to dwell within us the moment we accept Christ as our personal Lord and Savior. In fact, if the Holv Spirit is not within us we have not really been born again. The Bible tells us, "Now if any man have not the Spirit of Christ, he is none of his" (Romans 8:9). On the Day of Pentecost Peter told his listeners. "Ye shall receive the gift of the Holy Ghost." He went on the say, "For the promise is unto you, and to your children, and to all that are afar off, even as many as the Lord our God shall call" (Acts 2:38-39)

There are two things to warn against, however. First, we must not depend on our feelings in this matter, but on the fact of God's promise. The Holy Spirit has come to dwell within you if you have put your faith and trust in Christ. However, you may not feel any different, or sense his presence at first. When I came to

Christ I did not feel any different the next day, and yet I knew I had put my trust in Christ. By faith accept the fact that God dwells within you through his Spirit.

Also, just because the Spirit dwells within us does not mean we suddenly have become perfect. Sometimes new believers in Christ are surprised and chagrined when they find they still have temptations, and still sin. The difference is that now the Holy Spirit convicts them of sin, and they have a desire to do right. Also, the Spirit gives us power to overcome temptation and live, and God wants us to live. Each day we should yield ourselves to him, and ask God to guide us and give us the strength to obey his Word. In ourselves we don't have the strength. There is a great deal of interest

In contrast, the Soviets put most of their money into military procurement, construction and development. "Over the past several years, they have spent 75 percent more than the United States for military investment," the Joint Chiefs claim.

Contractors want to rush ahead with dubious weapons before they are proved, pet projects that any turn out to be impractical, military gadgetry that won't function under combat conditions.

U.S. COMPANIES may have a technological advantage, but Soviet factories produce simple, solid equipment that is at least operable. Declare the Joint Chiefs: "Because their planned economy places a high premium on reduced technological risk, Soviet designers stress simplicity in equipment and induce a steady progression of new weapons, with each model displaying modest improvements over the previous one.

"Rather than seeking technological breakthroughs, the Soviets emphasize available technology, a large devicated production base and a







KERMIT, Texas (AP) -Bond has been denied for a 19-vear-old man charged with capital murder in the brutal stabbing death of two women who apparently surprised an intruder in their home.

Kermit, was also charged with one count of attempted capital murder, police said. He was arrested Friday night in Odessa for a traffic violation and transferred to Kermit Saturday, where he was arraigned before Peace Justice Lee Rutledge.

Velasquez was charged with two counts of capital murder and one count of attempted capital murder. Rutledge set bond on the attempted murder count at \$50,000.

Police said the man, who once worked for one of the victim's husbands, was charged with capital murder because the killings occurred during a burglary.

Jeannie Marie Pardue, 51, and her daughter, Lee Ann Wallace, 15, died Nov. 15 after being stabbed repeatedly by a man who broke into the home of Mrs. Pardue's son, Carey Wallace.

Wallace's wife, Molly, was also wounded during the attack. Four other children in the house were unhurt.

Police say the suspect apparently panicked when he found out how many people were in the home and "started cutting people."





Friday's fire at the MGM Grand killed 83 people and injured more than 500.

For easy reference, the records should be sorted into the categories which appear on Schedule A of Form 1040, the IRS says. When itemizing, taxpayers should bear in mind interest paid on loans and mortgages, as well celed checks to their tax as payments for medical returns.

"We got the building evacuated in a minute and a half," said Anne Walton, dormitory director for the hall, the newest dorm on campus.

Firemen said the blaze apparently was caused by a cigarette dropped on a mattress in the third-floor room of students Shelly Ashley of San Antonio and Susie Bradbury of Colorado.

As Fire Lt. Scott Robnett's truck was leaving the fire station, he said he could see flames "coming out the window and leaping up the walls" of the dorm, and his fire captain called additional alarms while still enroute.

Fire officials estimated property loss at \$55,000 and said the fire was confined to the room where it started. but other rooms on the third and second floors sustained smoke, heat and water damage

TCU Housing Director Don Mills said the university regularly conducts dormitory fire drills, and had last called a Wiggins Hall drill in late October

Some of the dorm's 152 residents were away for the weekend, said Ms. Walton. Mills said most of the 50 women left homeless by the fire would be put in other dormitories



IRVING, Texas (AP)- It has been more than a decade since Larry Cole has haunted the Washington Redskins.

Back in the 1960s, the 13year veteran defensive tackle victimized the nation's capital more times than inflation.

He carried his 6-foot-5, 252pound hulk across the Washington goal for three times for touchdowns in 1968 and 1969, twice with fumble returns and once with an interception, to help insure Dallas wins.

Redskins Coach George Allen said he feared Cole more than he did former Cowboy guarterbacks Don Meredith, Craig Morton or Roger Staubach.
