Wild turkeys on the rise: 1.8 million in 49 states

WASHINGTON — The wild turkey has something to gobble about: Its population is in the best shape yet this century.

This sleeker, cagier cousin of the domestic turkey has faced some hard times since the Pilgrims drew on a "great store of wild Turkeys" for their Thanksgiving in 1621.

The turkey declined steadily in the 1700s and by the 19th century was eliminated from most of its original 39-state range. North America's largest game bird, Meleagris gallopavo, was the victim of overhunting and the loss of its woodland habitat to man.

"Even as late as 1942, there were only an estimated 20,000 or 30,000 birds left in the entire country," said Gene Smith, editor of Turkey Call and an officer of the National Wild Turkey Federation. At that time turkeys were confined to 21 states, most in the Southeast.

Today, said Smith, there are an estimated 1.8 million wild turkeys in 49 states — all but Alaska. More than 40 states have spring or fall turkey hunting seasons.

What turned the tide was wildlife management, with a little trial and error. Restoration efforts began after World War II with pen-reared wild turkeys. But problems arose, as Smith explained:

"The wildlife management profession discovered that pen-raised (wild) turkeys weren't truly wild. They weren't self-sufficient and they lost the wariness that let them survive."

The subsequent mingling of pen-reared birds with purebred wild turkeys caused other problems, Smith asserted: "It polluted the gene pool and introduced poultry diseases such as blackhead and fowlpox."

So instead, managers began using a trap-and-transfer program to move wild flocks from high-density areas to habitats where the species could flourish. Some turkeys are snared with rocket-fired nets; others are lured to eat a drugged bait, then wake up in a new home.

In the mid-1950s, ornithologist S. Dillon Ripley put several dozen wild turkeys on his family farm in northwestern Connecticut. Today Ripley, the secretary of the Smithsonian Institution, estimates there are 200 or 300 wild turkeys on and around the farm.

"I like having them around simply because they're native — they were there 100 years ago and they represent an American thing," he said.

"As you know, Benjamin Franklin thought the turkey ought to be the national bird. He thought it was very

vulgar to pick the bald-headed eagle because it's a carrion-eater, whereas he thought the turkey a noble bird.

"I don't necessarily feel exactly the same, but I think they're awfully pleasant to see — if you ever can. They're hard to see."

That's because keen eyesight and a big streak of wariness are two of the bird's greatest assets. And once the turkey spots an unnatural shape or movement, it can fly to safety at speeds of up to 55 miles an hour, or take off at a run of 15 mph or more.

Adult males and females travel in separate flocks. Their days are spent in search of nuts, berries, fruit, seeds, plants, and insects — or, during the spring breeding season, in search of the opposite sex. Gobblers and hens find each other by trading gobbles and calls — unless a hunter lures a tom into range by imitating a hen's call.

During courting the gobbler puts on his finest colors for hens. His iridescent brown tail feathers fan out, his fatter-than-usual chest puffs up, and the fleshy wattles hanging from his head and neck fill with blood and turn bright red.

After mating, the hen takes on parenthood by herself. She builds a simple ground nest and lays about a dozen eggs. The poult that hatch some 28 days later can see, run around, and feed themselves almost at once. Within 10 days they can fly.

For when the sun goes down, the turkeys go up — to three limbs where they roost for a safer night's sleep. At least trees are the usual choice. A wild turkey founding raised at a rural Maryland home picked a more up-to-date roost: the neighbors' television antenna. Added his owner: "We promised to pay for any damages, but they said he improves the reception."

When a gobbler reaches full growth at age 2, he could weigh as much as 35 pounds, although average weights are far less.

The wild turkey today is both outnumbered and outnumbered by his domestic cousin. The Agriculture Department said U.S. turkey production topped 167 million this year. Actually, domestic turkeys are descendants of North America's other turkey species, the oscillated turkey of Mexico. That bird was domesticated by the Aztecs, brought to Europe by Spaniards, and returned here by American colonists.

Weather Winter storm watch in northeast Texas

A winter storm watch was issued for northwest Texas today, as a cold front moving across the state brought a chance of snow to the area.

Heavy fog, meanwhile, extended from East Texas along the coast early today, and reduced visibility to less than a mile in some areas.

The only clear skies in Texas were in southwest and south central parts of the state, but the clouds were expected to dissipate in the next few days as a surface high pressure system makes its way southward.

Early morning temperatures ranged from the 20s in the Panhandle and southwest Texas mountains to the 50s in eastern and south central sections.

The forecast called for clouds statewide today, with snow or light rain in the northwest through Tuesday. Highs were expected to range from the 30s in North Texas to mid-70s in extreme South Texas.

Reagan taking time choosing Cabinet

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Ronald Reagan and six of his closest advisers are paring the long list of prospective Cabinet secretaries. But the president-elect says he doesn't know when decisions will be made.

Reagan scheduled a two-hour meeting today at his Pacific Palisades home with six aides he calls "our own people," including Vice President-elect George Bush, who flew in for the session.

Also invited were Edwin Meese, who will be Reagan's White House counselor; Michael Deaver, a close aide; James Baker, who will be White House chief of staff; Sen. Paul Laxalt, R-Nev.; and Pendleton James, an executive talent scout.

After attending church Sunday, Reagan told reporters, "We are beginning to narrow the list." Asked, however, when he expected any decisions to be made, he responded: "I couldn't tell you. We are sure going to do our best."

Reagan met for three hours Saturday with 20 members of his so-called kitchen cabinet, whom he expected to prepare a list of possible choices for each of the 13 Cabinet posts.

Asked afterward if the list had been narrowed to three names per position, Reagan told reporters: "Oh, my goodness, I wish it were down to three." He called the Saturday session "a good meeting," but said it was just part of a "long and laborious process of combing a lot of names."

Meese said there would be no announcements until after Thanksgiving. One aide said the announcements probably would come between next Sunday and Dec. 5, three days before Reagan is scheduled to return to Washington.

On Reagan's schedule after today's meeting were the presentation of a turkey by the Turkey Growers Association and a visit to his allergist. Reagan and his

Texas plane crash victim found alive in California

SALT FLAT, Texas (AP) — A man believed killed in a weekend West Texas airplane crash has been found alive Sunday in California, leaving investigators unsure about the death toll from the wreck.

"One of the men tentatively identified as dead has been located by his parents in California," Department of Public Safety spokesman Bill Carter said Sunday, adding that "all the other identifications remain tentative."

Carter said initial reports indicated four people were aboard an Air Commander 560 that broke up in flight, crashed nose down and exploded about six miles west of Salt Flat in Hudspeth County.

Identification papers were found at the site for George H. Riley, 30; Felix Gomez Jr., 31; Julio Hernandez Guerrero, 32, a Mexican national living in Parker,

Execution delayed

HOUSTON (AP) — A man convicted of shooting a Montgomery County juvenile probation officer to death during a burglary has received a stay of execution.

U.S. District Judge Ross Sterling granted an indefinite stay to Joseph Blaine Starvaggi, 27, scheduled to die Tuesday by lethal injection in the Texas Department of Corrections at Huntsville.

Starvaggi was convicted of killing John Denson, 43, during a burglary at Denson's Magnolia home on Nov. 19, 1976.

Anthony P. Griffin, Starvaggi's attorney, says he will argue that the jury in the original trial was improper because of the questioning of jurors about the death penalty.

Fire ruled out as cause of WFAA helicopter crash

WAXAHACHIE, Texas (AP) — A National Transportation Safety Board investigator says a television helicopter that crashed and killed three people apparently did not catch fire before it fell to earth.

"My initial observation is that the engine was operating when the helicopter hit the ground," NTSB investigator Frank Roth said Sunday.

He also said that the charred remains of the helicopter showed no evidence of an inflight fire.

Roth said pieces of the helicopter were strewn "400 feet in front of where it hit and 550 feet behind it." He added that a final report on the crash would be issued in about a month.

The aircraft plunged to the ground in the Saturday night fog and rain, exploded and burst into flames when it

It's a gentle, effective means of removing various stains — even dry latex paint which sticks firmly to the skin and is difficult to wash off with soap and water. Because of this, it could help avoid occupational skin disorders among painters, plumbers, mechanics and others who have difficulty removing stains and who often use irritating and potentially harmful solvent cleaners, notes Family Circle.

Women find that pumice is perfect for removing calluses from feet and for smoothing heels to prevent nylon hose from snagging.

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To wreck China's economy

Two 'Gang of Four' members admit plot

PEKING (AP) — Two members of the "Gang of Four" went before the special court in Peking today to admit their part in helping to wreck China's economy, plotting to usurp power and persecuting tens of thousands of their countrymen, including the wily political survivor who now leads the nation.

The Foreign Ministry announced that the show trial of the radical leaders of the Cultural Revolution resumed with the interrogation of Wang Hongwen, a former vice chairman of the Chinese Communist Party, and Yao Wenyuan, another former member of the party Politburo, before an

audience of about 600 people. They were reported to have confessed to the charges against them.

The other two radical leaders in the Gang of Four, Mao Tse-tung's widow Jiang Qing and former Vice Premier Zhang Chunqiao, are on trial with them on the same charges. But foreign observers said their testimony was delayed because they refused to

cooperate and confess. The radical Gang of Four, which put revolution ahead of modernization, is accused among other things of denouncing Communist Party Vice Chairman Deng Xiaoping, the architect of the present regime's modernization program and the most influential member of the regime, as a "counter-revolutionary double-dealer," a "capitalist

roadster" and a "representative of the comprador bourgeoisie." Before the revolution, a comprador was a Chinese who represented a foreign business in China.

The defendants today also faced charges of trying to frame the late Premier Chou En-lai, Deng's mentor who tried to temper the excesses of the 1966-76 Cultural Revolution.

In 1974, the indictment

says, the foursome told Mao that Deng, Chou and others were plotting to seize power. Deng was purged from the party in 1976 and rehabilitated in 1977 following Mao's death and the arrest of the four radical leaders.

Yao, 49, is a propagandist and polemicist from Shanghai who became a member of the ruling Politburo and personal

advisor to Jiang Qing. Wang, 45, is a former Shanghai textile worker nicknamed "the helicopter" because of his rapid ascent to a vice chairmanship in the Communist Party.

The trial opened Thursday when indictments were read to the four political leaders and to six other defendants accused of plotting with the late Defense Minister Lin Biao to assassinate Mao and

take over the government. Following the reading of the indictment, the defendants were separated into two groups to be tried separately.

The trials are expected to last through late December, with some sources reporting all will be sentenced on Christmas Eve. All face the death sentence, and there will be no appeal from the sentence of the special tribunal of the Supreme

People's Court. On Sunday, former air force chief Wu Faxian confessed to the court that he abetted the plot against Mao by appointing Lin's son to take over his command.

The foreign press is barred from the court sessions, but information on the trial is provided by the Foreign Ministry, the official Chinese press and television reports and by unofficial sources.

Congress discusses environment

WASHINGTON (AP) — With the House of Representatives having already fled town for Thanksgiving, the Senate is convening in lone session to confront the vexing environmental problem of toxic chemical wastes.

Prodded by the chambers' leaders, supporters and opponents of federal legislation held intensive negotiations last week and agreed on a compromise \$1.6 billion bill establishing a "superfund" to clean up the barrels and pits of dangerous chemicals that are seeping into the environment.

The bill is intended as Congress' answer to environmental disasters such as New York's Love Canal, where a neighborhood was built atop an abandoned chemical dump. It was years before residents discovered they were being poisoned by the leaking wastes.

Since then, similar problems have been found across the nation, and the **senator general has warned** that chemical contamination will be the major public health concern of the 1980s.

While the fund may seem large, it is only a shadow of the \$4.2 billion bill Senate sponsors originally demanded.

Stabbing charges filed

KERMIT, Texas (AP) — Bond has been denied for a 19-year-old man charged with capital murder in the brutal stabbing death of two women who apparently surprised an intruder in their home.

Victor Velasquez, of Kermit, was also charged with one count of attempted capital murder, police said. He was arrested Friday night in Odessa for a traffic violation and transferred to Kermit Saturday, where he was arraigned before Peace Justice Lee Rutledge.

Velasquez was charged with two counts of capital murder and one count of attempted capital murder. Rutledge set bond on the attempted murder count at \$50,000.

Police said the man, who once worked for one of the victim's husbands, was charged with capital murder because the killings occurred during a burglary.

Jeanie Marie Pardue, 51, and her daughter, Lee Ann Wallace, 15, died Nov. 15 after being stabbed repeatedly by a man who broke into the home of Mrs. Pardue's son, Carey Wallace.

Wallace's wife, Molly, was also wounded during the attack. Four other children in the house were unharmed.

Police say the suspect apparently panicked when he found out how many people were in the home and "started cutting people."

Boy Scouts taught death tactics

HOUSTON (AP) — A Southeast Texas paramilitary camp run by a Ku Klux Klan adviser and a convicted felon is teaching Boy Scouts and Civil Air Patrol cadets how to kill, a newspaper here has reported.

From 12 to 30 Explorer Scouts and CAP cadets have learned how to strangle people, decapitate enemies with a machete and fire semi-automatic weapons, the Houston Chronicle reported Sunday.

"We're not teaching these boys how to snipe," contended John Bryant, who was convicted of illegal sale of automatic weapons last January in Memphis. "They only shoot a few rounds, not proficiently by any means."

Bryant's probated sentence does not allow him to handle guns, probation officer Rick Espinosa told the Chronicle.

Partner Joe Bogart, a Klan member for two years, said he choked other Marines into unconsciousness during boot camp training.

But "we didn't have the boys choke each other. We just showed them how to do it," he said.

The youths come from the CAP unit at Ellington Air Force Base and Explorers Scout Post 2125 at the base.

Renfro said Bryant asked Bogart the same day to form the Explorer troop.

Several parents said their sons told them Bryant and Bogart made frequent racial slurs and frequently lectured on guerrilla warfare, the Chronicle said.

The post was supposed to be teaching scouts about military careers, said Don Townsend, director of the Houston Explorer program.

Advisers are checked out by the FBI "to see that they are staunch upstanding citizens," Townsend added. He said the FBI returned a "positive report" on Bogart.

If unorthodox activities are discovered, then "our action would be to pull the charter completely," he said.

Joseph Walters, a 17-year-old Clear Creek High School junior in nearby League City, said he dropped out of the Explorer program after the first meeting, when Bryant said he was going to teach the troop how to "hijack an airplane."

Bryant denied the allegation and said CAP officers were trying to "assassinate" his character.

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Fire at Harrah's in Reno

RENO, Nev. (AP) — Operations at Harrah's Club are nearly back to normal today after a kitchen fire Sunday forced about 1,500 patrons to flee the club in a reminder of the MGM Grand Hotel's fatal fire in Las Vegas.

No injuries were reported in the fire that broke out at 10:19 PST Sunday in a kitchen at the 25-story, 324-room hotel-casino, authorities said.

The fire was extinguished in 10 minutes with most damage limited to the kitchen of the Steakhouse Restaurant in hotel's basement, said Reno Fire Department Battalion Chief Jim Neil.

About 500 lodgers and 1,000 gambling guests were evacuated from the building 15 minutes after the fire started, said hotel spokeswoman Candy Pearce. By this morning, all guests had returned to the hotel, she added.

Friday's fire at the MGM Grand killed 83 people and injured more than 500.

"The smoke was pretty well funneled outside," Neil said. "There was some smoke in the building but nothing that represented any danger."

But John Weiss of Fort Lauderdale, Fla., in his room on the 18th floor, said he felt threatened and that there was no warning.

"A buddy of mine down the hall heard people screaming," Weiss said. "He banged on my door for about five minutes until I woke up. There was no fire but the smoke was in the hall."

Guests huddled in robes and slippers in the freezing cold outside the hotel.

Eithel Shelton of St. Maries, Idaho, in the ground floor cabaret when the fire occurred, said patrons left the hotel calmly.

"It makes you kind of worried after thinking about the MGM in Las Vegas," she said. "When this happened, we thought, 'Oh boy, here we go again.'"

Harrah's Club was built before Nevada fire codes required sprinkler systems. The building's only sprinklers are on the ground floor, Neil said.

However, according to Ms. Pearce, each room has a smoke detection alarm and the fire protection system functioned properly.

Holiday death projections

CHICAGO (AP) — Traffic accidents during the four-day Thanksgiving holiday weekend will claim between 500 and 600 lives, according to National Safety Council projections.

During last year's four-day Thanksgiving weekend, 475 people lost their lives on the nation's roads, the council said.

This year's holiday period begins at 6 p.m. EST Wednesday and ends at midnight Sunday.

The most lives lost in traffic accidents over a four-day holiday period was 764 during the Thanksgiving weekend in 1968. Since the 55 mph speed limit went into effect in 1974, the greatest number of people killed during a four-day holiday was 713 over the Christmas weekend of 1975.

For a three-day weekend, the most fatalities recorded were 688 during the 1968 Labor Day holiday. The highest three-day total since the 55 mph speed limit took effect was 553 over the July 4, 1977, weekend.

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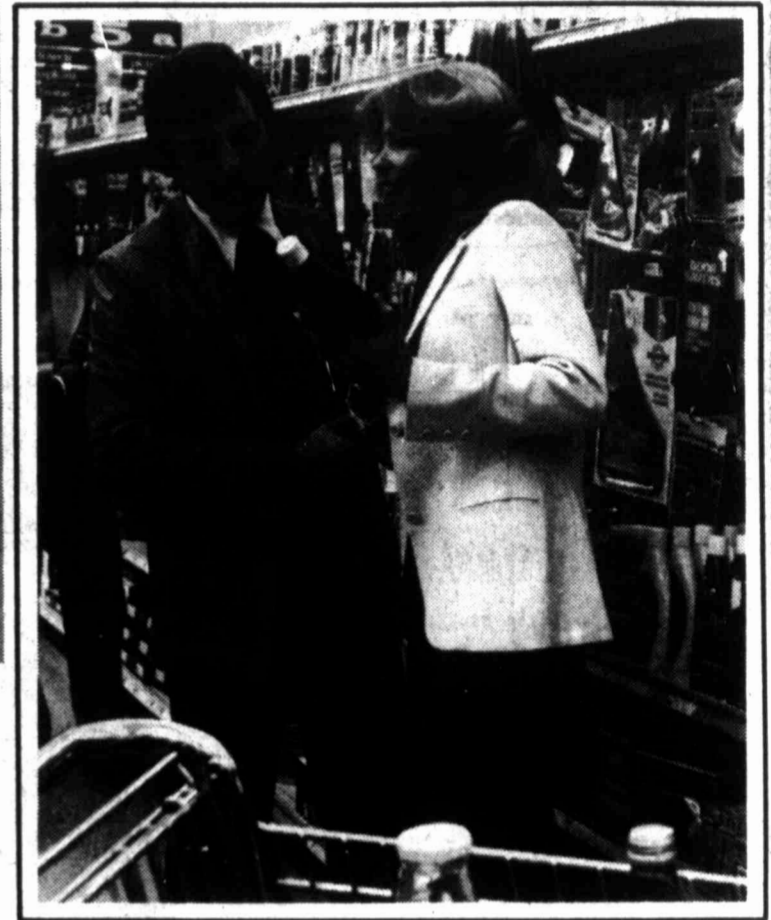
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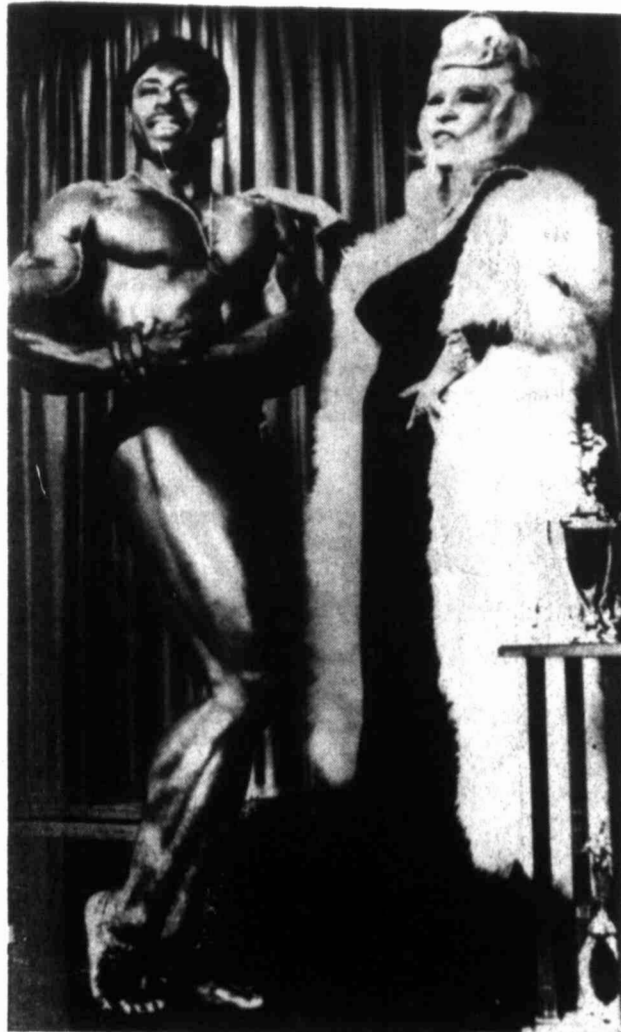

Her controversial humor became a legend

Memorial to be held for Mae West

HOLLYWOOD, Calif. (AP) — Mae West, the unabashed seductress of stage and screen who purred "Come up and see me sometime" and became an

American legend, will be buried at private services this week.

Miss West was sitting in a chair in her Hollywood penthouse when she died

Saturday at the age of 87 apparently of old age and the aftermath of a stroke that had hospitalized her for three months this fall.

The stroke had impaired

her speech, but not the spirit that carried her through an 80-year career. From her hospital bed she sent word to a reporter friend that she was suffering from a fall out of bed while dreaming about Burt Reynolds.

Paul Novak, the blonde sex queen's constant companion for the last 26 years, promised "the greatest Hollywood funeral we've ever had."

However, a spokeswoman for the mortuary handling funeral arrangements said Sunday that details about the services would not be released, at the request of her friends and family.

Earlier, Miss West's agent, Jerry Martin, said a memorial service was tentatively scheduled for Tuesday at the First Presbyterian Church in Beverly Hills, with interment to follow at a Brooklyn, N.Y., cemetery where her father, mother and brother are buried.

Miss West made only 10 films, but became famous in the 1920s and 1930s for her platinum hair, violet eyes, hourglass shape, undulating walk and the risqué one-liners she delivered with one

hand on hip and one patting her curls.

She wrote many of the lines herself. "Come up and see me sometime" and "When I'm good, I'm very good, but when I'm bad — I'm better" were daring in those days, but a Depression-stricken America laughed.

One of her film lines later became the title of her 1959 autobiography. A bejeweled Miss West enters a nightclub and the hat-check girl marvels, "Goodness, what beautiful diamonds!"

Replies Miss West: "Goodness had nothing to do with it, dearie."

Mae West gave her birthdate as Aug. 17, 1893. The daughter of a Brooklyn

livery stable owner, she started performing at age 5 and by 14 was a regular on the national vaudeville circuit.

In 1911 she made her Broadway debut, but it wasn't until 1920 that she wrote her first play, which she also produced. It was called "Sex" and despite the refusal of newspapers to advertise it, it ran for 375 performances before it was closed by police. Found guilty of "corrupting the morals of youth," Miss West served eight days in prison.

Her films included such classics as "I'm No Angel" and, with W.C. Fields, "My Little Chickadee."

Parachutist may have been foiled by wind in jump

ST. LOUIS (AP) — Veteran parachutist Kenneth Swyers, who landed atop the 630-foot Gateway Arch and then fell to his death, meant only to glide between the legs of the monument but may have been foiled by wind, his wife says.

"He wanted a picture of himself as he came down, getting the Arch in the background while he was under full canopy," said Millie Swyers, who was watching from below when the accident occurred Saturday.

"All I saw was his canopy collapse. I thought, 'He must be holding on to something up there.' I knew something was wrong, but it didn't hit me until I saw people start running," she said. "All I can think of was that it might have been the wind — he might have got caught as he started to make a turn."

Mrs. Swyers said her 33-year-old husband, an employee of Westinghouse Electric Co. and veteran of more than 1,600 jumps, had planned the jump for two weeks.

"Kenny was not a hot dog, daredevil skydiver," Mrs. Swyers said, adding that "the closest thing he ever did to a stunt" was to make nine successful jumps into Busch Stadium for events such as the Shriner's Circus.

One witness said he thought Swyers was trying to land on the arch.

Peter Loehr of Ohio, said Swyers apparently aimed for the peak of the arch, where a trapdoor opening into the monument is located.

"He landed very well. I guess he had no footing. He just slid down, fast. Where he landed was out of our field of vision, but I knew he was

dead," Loehr said.

The arch, the tallest monument in the nation, has

been the target of thrill-seekers since the exterior was completed in October 1965.

Four are arrested in murder of Austin girl

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — Three 17-year-olds and a 15-year-old boy have been arrested in connection with the rape-slaying of a 16-year-old girl whose body was found six weeks after she disappeared earlier this year.

Assistant District Attorney Nate Stark said the four suspects, all from Austin, were arrested Sunday in connection with the death of Elaine McCuiston, who was

last seen June 27 riding her bicycle near her home.

Her nude body was found six weeks later off Interstate 35 near Waco. Stark said the girl had been raped and shot in the head with a .38-caliber pistol.

He also said the four suspects knew the victim. A witness reportedly saw the victim in a car with the four suspects.

Sunday a drive they say is related to the seven members' occupation of a Kerr-McGee conference room last week. The occupation began when talks ended with a company official who wouldn't discuss reparations to the afflicted miners.

The group claims it has created the Safe Energy Division of the Oklahoma City-based energy conglomerate.

"The first act of the Safe Energy Division is to institute a food drive for the Indian widows and families of the miners who have died," a prepared statement said.

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Tower route hard to figure

Voters not predictable

AUSTIN — Speculation last week about Sen. John Tower accepting a Ronald Reagan Cabinet appointment set ambitious politicians of both major parties to salivating about the chances of replacing him.

At this writing, we only know that Tower knows he's being considered for appointment as defense secretary and he hasn't said flat-out no to the possibility.

It's hard to believe that the Wichita Falls Republican would give up the Senate seat he has held and repeatedly defended successfully since 1961 — especially now that he's chairman of the Armed Services Committee and has four years to go on his term.

It's also hard to believe that the Republicans would risk losing the seat to a Democrat. But they might.

They might be so confident after the Republican show of power on Nov. 4 that they think the risks are minimal. But they might be wrong.

If Tower becomes defense secretary, Gov. Bill Clements would appoint a successor in the Senate and call a special election for within 60 to 90 days. He undoubtedly would appoint a fellow Republican, and political wisdom says that such an appointed incumbent has an advantage in the election.

Tell that to Bill Blakely, if you can find him. The Democrats had a plan 20 years ago to make him a U.S. senator, and it worked, briefly.

Then Gov. Price Daniel appointed Blakely to a Senate vacancy created when Lyndon B. Johnson stepped down after his election as vice president in 1960. Daniel then called a

special election that Blakely was supposed to win.

But an upstart professor at Midwestern State University at Wichita Falls didn't play the game the way the Democratic big shots had planned it. Tower beat a large field of Democrats to become the first Republican U.S. senator from Texas since Reconstruction.

It would be ironic if Tower accepted a Cabinet post and that led to a Democrat reclaiming his Senate seat. Republican leaders, including Reagan, might think there would be nothing to worry about if Texas GOP star John Connally agreed to run for Tower's seat. But that could be dangerous confidence.

Connally undoubtedly would be a strong candidate, particularly in light of the GOP voting tendencies on Nov. 4. But many Texas voters that day still showed a tendency to go with Democrats after the presidential spot on the ballot.

Even in the GOP-land of Harris County (Houston), a majority cast ballots for Railroad Commission incumbent Jim Nugent, a Democrat. And many of the GOP judicial candidates appointed by Clements fell to Democratic challengers with much smaller campaign warchests.

And, as President Carter discovered, the voters are volatile this year. Much could happen by the time a special election is held.

It's also true that in that special election, the Democratic candidates would have an advantage that their Nov. 4 cohorts didn't have. Jimmy Carter will have gone back to Georgia by election time and would be less of an albatross around their necks.

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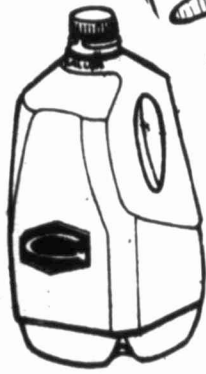
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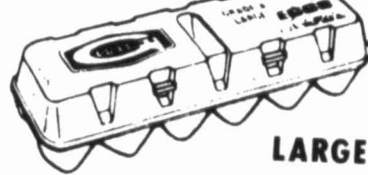
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Taxpayers should compile receipts to support claims

Taxpayers, especially those who itemize, should begin compiling receipts and other records to support claims on their Federal tax returns, the Internal Revenue Service advises. These records can be used to back up claims in case the return is examined and also assist taxpayers by reminding them of potentially overlooked deductions.

For easy reference, the records should be sorted into the categories which appear on Schedule A of Form 1040, the IRS says. When itemizing, taxpayers should bear in mind interest paid on loans and mortgages, as well as payments for medical

insurance which are documented on various financial statements. These amounts are often deductible, and frequently overlooked.

Medical expenses, union dues and charitable contributions are a few other commonly claimed deductions for which IRS examiners often request supporting evidence. Keeping canceled checks, pay stubs, and bills can be helpful in supporting these claims. However, the IRS notes that taxpayers should not attach receipts or canceled checks to their tax returns.

TCU students flee 3-alarm dorm fire

FORT WORTH, Texas (AP) — More than 100 Texas Christian University women students, some clad only in nightgowns, fled into a cold, pre-dawn drizzle when a three-alarm fire struck their dormitory.

"I couldn't see because my eyes were burning, but I saw some flames coming out of the room. Everybody was perfectly calm," Kristen Anderson, a senior from Chicago said after fire stuck the Mary Libscomb Wiggins hall on the TCU campus early Sunday.

There were no injuries and college officials said an orderly evacuation by the students plus quick work by firemen prevented a disaster.

"We got the building evacuated in a minute and a half," said Anne Walton, dormitory director for the hall, the newest dorm on campus.

Firemen said the blaze apparently was caused by a cigarette dropped on a mattress in the third-floor room of students Shelly Ashley of San Antonio and Susie Bradbury of Colorado.

As Fire Lt. Scott Robnett's truck was leaving the fire station, he said he could see flames "coming out the window and leaping up the walls" of the dorm, and his fire captain called additional alarms while still enroute.

Fire officials estimated property loss at \$55,000 and said the fire was confined to the room where it started, but other rooms on the third and second floors sustained smoke, heat and water damage.

TCU Housing Director Don Mills said the university regularly conducts dormitory fire drills, and had last called a Wiggins Hall drill in late October.

Some of the dorm's 152 residents were away for the weekend, said Ms. Walton. Mills said most of the 50 women left homeless by the fire would be put in other dormitories.

The dorm, built in 1972, has both smoke and fire detectors, and the university is in the process of installing similar equipment in each of its dormitories. Fire Chief Don Peacock

"We're pleased with what TCU has done (for fire safety)," he said.

Once the women reached safety, their main concern was keeping warm as they stood in 40-degree drizzle clad in their nightclothes. Many of the students huddled together for warmth as their dormitory burned.

Liberals last week were touting Jim Hightower as a possible candidate for the Senate if Tower steps down.

Hightower is the Denison native and former Texas Observer editor who ran a credible race for the Railroad Commission on a consumer-platform last spring.

In an obvious dig at the senator's height, one Austin liberal already has proposed a campaign slogan: "Why not trade a short Tower for a Hightower?"

That might be nixed by Hightower, however. He would just about see eye-to-eye with Tower physically, if not politically.

HOUSTON (AP) — Houston Astros players who are unsigned for next season are having a difficult time contending with the ownership squabble between general partner John McMullen and a group of limited partners.

Players and their agents are concerned they will have difficulty negotiating under the unsettled conditions, especially if the limited partners get their wish.

The limited partners, who last week voted to dissolve the arrangement, went into federal court today seeking a temporary injunction to keep McMullen from conducting business and to have a receiver appointed to oversee the Astros.

"When you're dealing with a receiver of a professional ball club, you're really not doing business," said Tom Reich, who represents several Astros players. "While this dispute is going on, it will be difficult to have any business dealings with the club."

Pitcher Vern Ruhie, a key factor in Houston's drive to the National League Western Division title, is unsigned for 1981 and the ownership situation concerns his agent, Randy Hendricks.

Baylor not the same team

Tide in for a surprise

The Baylor Bears have given fair warning to Alabama that they aren't the same awed team which was mauled by the Crimson Tide 45-0 two years ago in Tuscaloosa.

The Bears, guest team in the Cotton Bowl New Year's Day, finished their blitz of Southwest Conference foes Saturday with a convincing 16-0 defeat of the Texas Longhorns.

"We'd read some of the things the Texas players were saying about us in the newspapers," said linebacker Doak Field. "They were saying that the Cotton Bowl would be the Bore Bowl."

"Well, we just needed to show everybody that Baylor has every right to be playing in the Cotton Bowl. Every right!"

Field added that Alabama as the opponent means "just like this game against Texas we still have a lot to prove." Baylor was beaten by 41-20 by Penn State in the 1975 Cotton Bowl, but Coach Grant Teaff said this is a different Baylor team than the one that lost to Penn State and to Alabama two years ago.

"We were so awed in 1974 our eyes were glazed over," said Teaff. "We didn't know what was going on. Now, we

know the right way to prepare a team for a bowl. We proved that last year when we beat Clemson in the Peach Bowl."

Asked if Baylor would have an emotional advantage through the revenge motive against Alabama, Teaff said "That game is a long way off. But I know we will make the Cotton Bowl proud. This is a different group of kids than the one that lost to Alabama. We learned a lot."

Baylor begins workouts in earnest Dec. 19 and will come to Dallas Dec. 27th along with Alabama, the earliest Coach Paul (Bear) Bryant has ever brought his team to the site of a bowl.

"We'd heard that some of the Eastern press and even some in Texas had inferred we were not good enough to be playing in the Cotton Bowl," said Teaff. "Well, we were galled and we wanted to do it right."

It was the first shutout against a Fred Akers coached team since he took over from Darrell Royal.

In fact, it was the first Baylor blanking of a Longhorn team since 1939.

"We wanted to get as high a national ranking as we could going into the Cotton Bowl," said Teaff. "We wanted to go into the game against Alabama with the

feeling that the Cotton Bowl and the Southwest Conference was proud of us."

Jim Brock, executive vice president of the Cotton Bowl, assured Teaff the bowl was most happy. He gave Teaff a cowboy hat and even had a 32-page brochure on the 45th classic which he passed around the press box.

"Baylor put on a great show," said Brock. "We're fortunate to have them. What they did today is sure going to get Alabama's attention."

It was the first time since 1922 that Baylor had gone unbeaten and untied in league play.

"Today we proved that we're deserving of the title and the Cotton Bowl," said defensive tackle Joe Campbell. "People said that we're not that good a representative. I wonder what they're saying now." league. They are very deserving."

Baylor's 10-1 record is the best in the school's history.

The Longhorns, who play North Carolina in the Bluebonnet Bowl New Year's Eve, tumbled out of second place with the loss.

Houston, which will play in the Garden State Bowl against Navy, blasted Texas Tech 34-7 to move into second place alone with a 5-2 mark. Houston has one game

to play against Rice Saturday.

Southern Methodist, a 31-7 victor over Arkansas, jumped into third place with a 5-3 record. Texas at 4-3 has a game to go against Texas A&M.

Texas Tech and Rice are 3-4, Arkansas and Texas A&M 2-5, and Texas Christian, which lost to A&M 13-10, was alone in the cellar at 1-7.

For SMU, it was the first time the Mustangs had won eight regular season games since 1966. They play in the Holiday Bowl Dec. 19 against Brigham Young.

Between Duran, Leonard Dislike is for real

NEW ORLEANS (AP) — Sugar Ray Leonard is doing everything but sticking pins in Roberto Duran dolls as he prepares for Tuesday night's rematch with the tough Panamanian who took away his WBC welterweight boxing title five months ago.

And he's getting a lot of help from his Svengali, Trainer Angelo Dundee, a master at psychological warfare.

Spurs of venom are flying between the two camps — not fabricated barbs designed to bolster a sagging gate but a genuine case of mutual dislike.

"Sugar Ray didn't know what to make of Duran when he fought him last June in Montreal," Dundee said, referring to the Panamanian's close 15-round decision.

"He was a bit in awe — not afraid, mind you — of Duran and Duran's reputation of being pound-for-pound the best fighter in the world. So outside the ring he treated Duran with respect."

"When Duran threw tantrums and put on those macho displays, Sugar Ray thought it was cute and laughed it off. He found out later Duran was a bad guy, an animal."

"Duran was rude. He was vulgar. He fouled my man 25 times — look at the films and count 'em — and rubbed it in. He took Sugar Ray's decency and courtesy as a sign of weakness. Sugar Ray was stunned by it. I am sure it affected his fight."

"I won't happen this time. We'll give the guy what he gave us."

Dundee has taken the initiative in the war of intimidation and started grabbing most of the media attention.

He keeps vigorously protesting Duran's rough and tumble butting tactics. He has insisted the Panamanian shave his craggy beard. And he has offended Duran's Spanish interpreter.

It was Dundee who conceived the idea that he and Leonard appear at last Thursday's news conference in long black beards and mimic the champion's boast, "I weel keel him."

Dundee accused Duran's interpreter, Luis Henrique, of using his own words and not those of Duran in interpretations.

"Duran can speak English as well as I do," Dundee charged. "To use an interpreter, it's like throwing out a wet fish."

Dundee has gone further to charge that Duran has been even more objectionable than in the last fight.

"He had Sugar Ray's brother and sister thrown out of his workout, saying they were spies," the trainer said. "Every time he or one of his people sees one of our group they make a vulgar remark or gesture."

"Sugar Ray is fed up to here with it. I think you'll see a different Leonard Tuesday night."

The mild-mannered Leonard was asked if he disliked Duran.

"I wouldn't want to live next door to him," the former Olympic gold medalist replied.

Duran was asked if his attitude toward Leonard and Leonard's camp was a publicity hype for the fight.

In translation, Duran's reply came out firm and clear:

"No, I do not like heem."

Average Texas home may cost \$134,000 in 1990

COLLEGE STATION — A study prepared by the Texas Real Estate Research Center at Texas A&M University reports the average Texas home could cost \$134,000 in 1990, more foreign investors will be snapping up Texas real estate and despite rising costs the single-family, detached home is here to stay.

Compiled by university researchers, the figures show the average sale price of a single-family home in Texas at the beginning of 1980 was \$54,900. This is a 12 percent per year increase since 1976 when compounded annually. The average Texas home four years ago sold for \$34,700.

The TRERC report lists several factors which contributed to the increase. These include the increased demand due to the rapid rise in household formations and a growing desire for home ownership, and the continuing increase in the costs of construction materials, labor, financing and land.

The study shows material and labor costs rose by more than 40 percent from 1973 to 1978.

Another factor affecting housing costs will be innovations in lending procedures, the researchers said. Designed to satisfy homebuyers' demand for mortgage money, these innovations include alternative instruments, relaxed usury ceilings, greater liquidity for lenders and use of ground leases on single-family homes.

Despite rising costs and the growing number of apartments and condominiums, the detached, single-family home is here to stay, according to the report entitled, "Texas Real Estate: 1990."

"Household heads between the ages of 35 and 50 with families will prefer the detached-living units," said Dr. Arthur Wright, a principal contributor to the report, "while young couples and empty nesters will tend to select more communal-type units."

Among the advantages cited in the report for a detached, single-family home are privacy and freedom. As Wright put it, "If real income rises in the future, people will not have to sacrifice privacy and independence — even if they might be forced to give up some floor space or push carpets."

While home sizes declined from an average of 1,692 square feet in 1974 to 1,600 square feet in 1978, the report suggests the average Texas home may be reduced to 1,400 square feet by 1990 without decreasing the average space per person. That's because the size of the average Texas household has been dropping as well.

down from 2.80 persons in 1976 to a predicted 2.55 persons in 1990.

The researchers also predict foreign investment in Texas real estate will accelerate.

The report suggests legislation will be introduced in the 1980s to monitor, but not necessarily restrict, all foreign investment in U.S. real estate.

The data gathered from this monitoring will be used to estimate economic effects such as the balance of payments and land use and to note any concentrations of ownership that may be perceived as harmful to state or national interests.

These predictions follow on the heels of worldwide political uncertainty and inflation in the 1970s which motivated a wave of foreign investment in U.S. real estate. Foreign investors include financial institutions such as banks, pension funds, life insurance companies, industrial companies, real estate developers and syndicators.

NEW YORK (AP) — Ronald P. Reagan, the 22-year-old dancer son of the president-elect, married his

live-in girlfriend Monday without telling his parents in advance, a friend of the couple said.

Reagan and Doria Palmieri, were married in a civil ceremony, said the friend, who asked not to be identified. The couple had lived together in Greenwich Village since January.

President-elect Ronald Reagan and his wife, Nancy, were not told of the marriage in advance, the friend said, terming the marriage an

"elopement." He said no honeymoon or celebration was planned and that "it will just be business as usual."
