In the first of three commentaries broadcast Friday, Tehran Radio praised the Carter administration for its "calm tone" and said Reagan's comments were the rantings of a "political cowboy." The second said the U.S. government had accepted all Iranian terms and suggested the crisis might soon be resolved.

But a third commentary said America was not prepared to take

'We have nothing to hide, but at the same time, we are not going to be partners to some indiscriminate witch hunt," Brzezinski said.

Influenza virus wreaked havoc around world 60 years ago

Despite various labels, all flu will make you ill

I was sick, sick for 14 days with the flu. In fact, I was so sick I didn't get to go "home for Christmas" in Durant, Okla. Only the fourth time in my voung life

When I returned to my typewriter, several persons asked, "What kind of flu did you have?"

It doesn't matter what it's called — U.S.S.R., Puerto Rican, Asian, Hong Kong, London or Fort Monmouth —

all influenza makes you feel miserable. Many of us have taken to calling flu any virus that strikes us during the winter, saying we have stomach flu, intestinal flu, or just plain flu. But while such labels are convenient to pin on any of hundreds of common viruses that may infect us during the winter months, these labels are incorrect.

You may experience some minor intestinal symptoms with a case of influenza, but flu is not an intestinal disease. Rather, it is a disease of the upper respiratory tract, a virus that produces toxins - poisons - that attack your breathing system. In addition, not every upperrespiratory virus is flu.

Flu has entered the country with reports of scattered outbreaks in the Rocky Mountain states and California, and it is working its way east.

When the flu finally does strike you, you'll know it. Your joints and muscles will ache, you'll get feverish and stuffy and you may get chills. You will feel as though you are going to die. You may even hope you do. But you won't. Barring complications, you'll be up and around again

Today, we think of influenza as a relatively benign disease — albeit an extremely unpleasant one — that is only a real threat to the very young and very old. There was a time, however, when a case of the flu was nothing to

During the great influenza pandemic — worldwide outbreak — of 1918-19, flu and related pneumonia killed 20 million people. "It was one of the most incredible epidemics of all time, and certainly the most incredible in this century," says Dr. Gary Noble, chief of the respiratory virology branch of the federal Center for Disease Control in Atlanta.

"If this epidemic had appeared in peacetime," says Noble, on leave this year from his job as America's chief flu watcher, "it would have been much more a part of American history and lore.'

It's a real eye opener today — thinking of flu, as we do, as a midwinter inconvenience — to look back at what the fall and winter of 1918-19 were like in this country

"Flu grows by 1300; Malady Spreads in City at Alarming Rate - 37 deaths; Universities Close Classes; 144,095 Cases in Army Camps; 12,570 Ill with Pneumonia; 658 Pneumonia Deaths Reported, Greatest Number Yet In Any One Day" proclaimed the Oct. 6, 1918, Washington

And three days later, another front-page story reported 34 more deaths and 2,174 new cases of flu in the city. At one point the Army reported that flu was killing 34 of every 1,000 men stationed on the "safe" home front. To get an idea of how high that death rate is, compare it with the excitement over Toxic Shock Syndrome, which affects between 5 and 15 of every 100,000 women, and kills less than one woman in 100,000.

What was so different about the influenza virus that wreaked such havoc around the world 60 years ago? Scientists still don't know. They do know there were no antibiotics available to combat the pneumonia. But they aren't sure why the Spanish, or swine, flu of 1918-19 seemed to strike down the young and the healthy, the housewives and farmers, the young men waiting to be shipped overseas, the men and women in their 20s and 30s for whom flu is usually an uncomfortable inconvenience,

"My own opinion is there was something unique about the strain," says Noble, "but I can't discount the

possibility there were two different micro-organisms that circulated at the same time," one a virulent strain of influenza and one an equally tough form of pneumonia "There's no evidence of that," says the virologist, "but perhaps the technology at the time didn't allow" for the detection of the bugs.

Memories of the World War I pandemic spurred federal officials to launch the 1976 swine-flu vaccination program, an effort now considered a bureaucratic disaster to rival the medical disaster of 60 years earlier.

The Swine Flu has been infecting pigs since at least 1930, and the death of a young GI at Fort Dix, N.J., of the same flu strain that killed 20 million during the great pandemic led federal decision-makers to fear there was a chance the strain could cause a major outbreak during the 1976-77 flu season — which also happened to be a presidential election year

What probably happened in 1976, Noble says, is that the swine-influenza virus, which has been infecting pigs since it was first isolated in the laboratory 50 years ago, jumped to man "in a freak occurrence of nature." He went on, "With men under stress, in a boot camp, with crowding, etc., we found transmission of this disease. But it was not able to survive as an epidemic strain in the general population." Almost every year, Noble says, there are sporadic cases of swine flu, but in those cases it is almost always possible to trace the animal-to-human transmission. "What was unique about 1976," he says, "is there was transmission from man to man.

This year there probably will be less worry about flu than 60 years ago. Dr. Alan Kendal, of the CDC's respiratory virology branch, isn't predicting how severe this year's flu outbreak will be, but he will say he's sure that the people who get the flu "will wish that they didn't."

CDC flu watchers are reporting sporadic outbreaks of a so-called H3N2 influenza. A. Scientists use a variety of letters and numbers to describe the different types of influenza, and while the coding means a great deal, you'll feel rotten no matter which type of flu you get.

The type of flu circulating now, for instance, is either an A-Texas-H3N2, or an A-Bangkok-H3N2. The first letter distinguishes the virus from the other basic influenza type, B influenza. The place name indicates where the virus was first isolated in the laboratory. The H refers to the hemagglutinin, or H factor, which causes the clumping of red blood cells, and the N factor refers to neuraminidase, another of the virus' components

If an influenza-virus type that made you ill some time in the past enters your body, your immune system recognizes the H and N components and fights off the infection. If however, the only flu you've had was the A-USSR-H1N1 of 1977, your body will be infected by the

Once you get the flu, there's not much you can do about it. other than suffer. Antibiotics are useless against the flu because it is a viral disease. So what you are basically left with is the ages-old advice to take aspirin or an aspirin substitute for the aches and fever, drink plenty of fluids

Some experts say bed rest won't necessarily help you recover any faster, but you will certainly feel better lying down than you will on the job or in school. And the use of aspirin in cases of viral disease has been questioned, because of the suggestion that aspirin may reduce the body's ability to produce interferon, which fights off viral infection. But aspirin will make you feel better.

As for fluids, there have been honest-to-God studies that indicate chicken soup will make the flu or cold victim feel better. It seems that the steam from the soup is quite effective in loosening, and allowing the draining of, nasal secretions. If you don't like chicken soup, try tea, it's also been shown to be effective

NAIROBI, Kenya (AP) — Police investigating the New Year's Eve hotel bombing that killed at least 13 people are looking for a woman who speaks with a German accent, a Kenyan newspaper reported

In West Germany, two convicted terrorists recently released from an Israeli prison denied any connection with the bombing of the Norfolk Hotel. The two were convicted with three Palestinian terrorists of trying to shoot down an Israeli jetliner in Nairobi five years ago.

The Sunday Nation newspaper quoted a top-level police spokesman as saying the German-accented woman had been in contact with another suspect a man holding a Maltese passport who checked into the room where the bomb went off.

The report strengthened speculation the bombing was the work of international terrorists.

There was still no official casualty list, but the dead included at least one American, identified only as Kenneth Mover

Teens dig intoxicating vapors

DALLAS (AP) Teep age introders bent on sampling intoxicating vapors are cutting fences, slashing gauges and spilling hundreds of thousands of dollars of highly flammable chemicals at a Dallas factory, the owner says.

'Somehow the word has gotten around that we've got toulene," said Elmer Hairgrove, owner of Superior Coatings Inc.. which manufactures commerical lacquers, stains and toners.

And Hairgrove said he is convinced that damage they first attributed to random vandalism is the work of juveniles determined to savor the intoxicating vapors of toulene - the chemical ingredient he said made glue sniffing a rage.

It's kids coming in here to get it. They'd get teed off when they couldn't find the right (storage) tank and would just hit all the tanks. Some of them were just higher than kites when we caught 'em,' said

At least two juveniles and two 17-year-olds have been arrested in the past six months for thefts of toulene from the plant. 'We didn't really realize the magnitude of this

thing until Dec. 1, when ... we thought we better take an inventory," said Hairgrove. "When we found what we lost, it scared us to death.' He said the company has lost 19,150 gallons of

toulene, which it uses to make lacquer and paint products, through spills or thefts and 63,850 gallons of other chemicals from tanks thieves mistook for toulene tanks, he said. Hairgrove estimated the loss 'Sniffing the stuff will burn your brains up in

time; in time it'll kill you," said Hairgrove, who added that workers use the volatile liquid only in well-ventilated areas. He said some teen-age employees, caught at the

toulene tank since the company began keeping watch at night, bragged of selling the chemical, which retails at \$1.45 a gallon, for \$5 to \$7 a pint.

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AUSTIN — Texas officials generally were a lucky bunch in 1980.

House Speaker Bill Clayton became a selfproclaimed walking miracle. He survived a federal Brilab indictment in 1980, won the hearts of his jurors and appears certain to win a fourth term as powerful House speaker this month.

Bill Hobby announced several weeks ago for re-election as lieutenant governor in 1982. That immediately caused a half dozen or so ambitious state senators to drop plans they had for seeking the office.

They aren't afraid of Hobby because he was great public charisma or charm.

In fact, one might argue that he was none of the above. But he's steady, solid, smart, and basically conservative, so the powerful forces in Texas elections have no reason to jump on him.

Gov. Bill Clements had a lucky year. Clayton's indictment gave him a plausible excuse to drop a promised special legislative session that would have been bloody and unproductive.

The governor managed to dance with almost everyone in the early days of the Republican presidential primaries without giving a corsage until the winner was clear. Then, he ends up going steady with the one voted most popular.

Attorney General Mark White managed to file some

against high taxes on coal burned in Texas electrical generating plants, to give the image of running an efficient, if not exciting, office and to spend the entire year without realizing that there was an unpopular Democratic president who

might need his help in Texas. State Land Commissioner Bob "Kamikaze" Armstrong managed, as he did in 1972, to work hard for an unpopular Democratic presidential candidate without harming himself.

Comptroller Bob Bullock managed to spend another year as himself without harming himself too much.

Bullock remained rather quiet last year, allowing his efficient tax officials to go

An organization known as Amnesty International has examined the state of human rights throughout the world and found it generally to be less than

The performances of 110 nations came under Amnesty International's microscope and practically all of them got failing grades.

The crimes against the prince of creatures all over the world ranged from torture to summary execution. Racial persecution was practiced throughout the globe. Those guilty of political dissent ran a good chance of having their heads broken by police truncheons or being thrown into jail.

IN THE SOVIET UNION, according to the report, "inmates of . . . penal institutions were still being subjected

to a regime of chronic hunger, inadequate medical care and difficult, often dangerous compulsory labor.'

Amnesty International (which is based in London, also accused the Russians of the "arrest, trial, imprisonment or forced detention in mental hospitals of many dissenters. In the five years since the signing of the Helsinki accords that supposedly guaranteed certain basic rights to Soviet citizens, some 500 were soaking up striped sunshine.

Malcontents in other nations behind the Iron Curtain including those in East Germany and Romania, were being jailed as people whose only sin was that they wanted to flee the country.

The record of the Iranians in the field of human rights is, of course,

ghastly. Sentences of death or flogging were passed out regularly in the country's kangaroo courts. It was and is highly dangerous for political detainees to be vocal in their protests in Iraq, Syria, Jordan, Saudi Arabia, Morocco and Libva

THE SHODDY RECORD in human rights in the Latin American countries is, of course, well known. Those who stand up to protest often run the risk of losing their capability for standing. so harsh are the methods used by the pro-government forces in Argentina. Chile. El Salvador, Guatemala, Uruguay and Paraguay.



May drop RDF

impotence in the Middle East. But RDF critics have raised three telling objections, which may be enough to cause President-elect Ronald Reagan to drop the concept, at least in its present form.

Briefly stated, the critics say the Rapid Deployment Force will raise political problems in the Arab world, s badly and expensively organized and won't work anyhow

As a mark of the RDF's current low esteem, even Sen. Gary Hart, D-Colo., a respected expert on military matters and originally a supporter of such a force, has now become one of its severest critics.

THE WAY IT IS NOW conceived, the RDF is a multiservice outfit, with elements from all the armed services under command of a Marine Corps officer. Old military hands say interservice rivalry will cripple the RDF at the start. They point to the multiservice disaster of the Iranian rescue mission as a case in point.

Even if everything runs smoothly, the critics say, the Rapid Deployment Force will never be a match for firstrate Soviet troops, or even some of the better-equipped Arab armies.

In fact, the head of the RDF, Gen. P.X. Kelly, has admitted, in classified testimony to Congress, that the force would act as nothing more than a "trip wire" against the Soviets. If it were destroyed by superior Soviet forces — which it surely would be the United States would have to escalate the situation into nuclear warfare

As for the political repercussions of a Rapid Deployment Force, many Arab leaders view it as a thinly disguised weapon, which the United States will use to seize their oil fields. And the Arabs have some persuasive

justification for this belief. In a classified document made available to my associate Ron McRae. Gen. Kelly stated that the RDF might be used to seize oil fields. Though he said such a seizure would occur "most likely in Iran," the possibility has not been lost on Arab leaders. And independent studies have concluded that an attempt by the United States to grab Middle East oil fields would be disaster. The facilities could be

destroyed easily and quickly. Meanwhile, however, the RDF threatens to eat up billions of dollars. One defense contractor has produced a \$600 manual telling its salesmen how to get their share of the bonanza.

AS JUST ONE example of the way costs are already getting out of hand, let's take the Marine Corps' "ex-

peditionary shelter system. Originally a sensible idea provide quick, prefabricated facilities like field hospitals — it has mushroomed beyond all reason.

Thousands of shelters have been authorized - so many, in fact, that it would take one-third of available ships to transport them all, and almost as many men as there are combat Marines to put them up in a battle zone. Shelters were authorized for hobby shops, theaters — and even quarters for the general's specialty

PATERNAL DEVOTION: Rep. Tom Evans, R-Del., was Reagan's earliest supporter in the House and is now a member of his inner circle. As such. Evans was scheduled to meet with Reagan and other top advisers in Los Angeles one morning last month.

Al Regnery, a right-hand man to Ronald Reagan's campaign chairman, Sen. Paul Laxalt, R-Nev., told the businessmen in (they hope) a jocular vein: "We know who did this, and when they come to see us we're going to tell them, 'Go see Warren Magnuson.' IRANIAN TRAFFIC: In the 14

months since the American hostages were seized, more than 28,000 Iranians have left the United States and another 18,000 have come in.

Immigration authorities conducted 56,000 interviews with Iranian students here, and offered 2,152 a chance to leave the country voluntarily. Only 345 did so. Eventually, 159 Iranians were ordered deported, but so far only 91 have left.

DRESSED TO KILL: The Pentagon is finally getting serious about the threat of Soviet chemical warfare but in a peculiarly fumble-fingered way. The Defense Logistics Agency bought 4.2 million protective suits last year for U.S. troops in Europe. Unfortunately, they ordered only 2.8 million footwear covers and only one million pairs of protective gloves.



WASHINGTON - Nobody knows how many there are. There could be hundreds - even thousands. They are members of Reagan's transition team, and they are sweeping through government buildings, trying to find ways to cut out waste and sloth in the

bureaucracy. It isn't an easy job, but

it has to be done. As soon as word is passed that a transition team is on the premises. every bureaucrat rushes to his or her desk and gets to work. Bureaucrats have been through it all before, and the transition people are, in most cases, babes in the woods.

This is how it goes: A TRANSITION team member

stops by a desk "What are you doing?" he asks the bureaucrat.

"I'm working on these authorization papers for my supervisor. 'Where is your supervisor?'' "He took holiday leave and I believe

he is in New Hampshire skiing with

his family. "May I see these authorization

papers? Of course, sir. As you will note, in the first 40 pages, the authority oncurs with the regulations as laid down by the secretary. The next 32 pages deal with the impact study, and this bound report, which is attached, was done by

an outside consulting firm. "We still have one mroe study to come in, which was done by another consulting team, checking out the findings of the first consulting firm. By the way, I voted for Reagan.

gulate an industry?'' "If you read the report, you'll see that it takes as much money to deregulate an industry as it does to regulate one. My father and mother

you can't see it consummated. Can I have your name, sir? I'd like to tell the president-elect you're the most valuable transition team person I've talked to.

"It's Elrod. Melvin Elrod, of Tulsa,



While jumping rope is an excellent way to keep the heart and lungs in shape, there are some disadvantages to it. The feet take a great deal of pounding, especially if you are overweight. The balls of the feet take most of the punishment, so your shoes should be well-padded.

Swimming, cross-country skiing (not for you, apparently) and stationary bike riding are good alternatives. Any exercise should be preceded by leg muscle stretching exercises, the kind you see football players and others do just prior to competition.

Dear Dr. Donohue: Is there a way to combine training for the heart and training for muscle strength? I'd like to do both. — B.P.

Here's a new term for you physical activists - circuit training - which gets to the heart of B.P.'s question.

Pharmacist is indicted

BROWNSVILLE, Texas (AP) - An Edinburg pharmacist has been indicted on federal charges he substituted generic drugs for more expensive name-brand drugs while charging the government for the higher priced medicine.

Elov Hernandez, 38, was named in a federal grand jury indictment on eight counts of Medicaid fraud. The indictments, returned here Wednesday, said the incidents occured from December of 1978 to January

If convicted, Hernandez could be sentenced to a maximum five years in prison andor a \$25,000 fine on each of the eight counts.

The state's leading Medicaid investigator says generic drug fraud is fairly common.

'The monetary loss is not that great." said Jack Elrod. chief investigator for the Medicaid fraud control unit of the Texas Attorney General's office. "It's a few hundred dollars at most, but it's a tairly common

GM prices mixed bag

DETROIT (AP) General Motors Corp. has trimmed the pricetag of the Chevrolet Chevette by \$100 but boosted the prices on most of its other cars.

The company also announced Friday that the price of the "X-car" compacts and the no-longer produced Chevrolet Monza and Pontiac Sunbird subcompacts will stay the same.

That leaves about twothirds of GM's cars with sticker prices that will average \$234 higher Monday, according to a calculation by The Associated Press that GM said it could neither confirm nor deny.

The cheapest GM car, the stripped-down Chevrolet Chevette Scooter will now drop from \$4.695 to \$4.595, a 2.1 percent decline. The most expensive, the Cadillac Seville, will go up \$996 from \$21,088 to \$22,084, a 4.5

percent boost. In addition, delivery charges, which are listed separately from the sticker price, will increase by an average of \$19.

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

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
















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

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — Reggie Wilkes' fumble recovery, one of seven turnovers committed by the Minnesota Vikings in the second half, led to Wilbert Montgomery's 5-yard touchdown run that put Philadelphia ahead for the first time and triggered the Eagles to a 31-16 victory in a National Football League playoff game Saturday.

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

Cautious optimism best describes the feelings of most soybean producers. If you remember the soybean market in 1976-77, you'll have the jump on what's in store for 1980-81. Many soybean analysts see a carbon copy of 1976 in weather; growing season, large supplies, low prices, and a high rate of use and accumulating inventories. Export demand is forecast as being stronger, particularly for meal, which will, hopefully, take up the slack in domestic usage which is seen to be less than last year. Domestic use of soybean oil, which saw ar increase since 1976, should continue in that direction, and since competing supplies of U.S. fats and oils will also be reduced a high rate of soybear oil useage should be encouraged. Assuming a normal product yield per bushel of soybeans, market analysts foresee a good possibility of still higher prices for soybeans at the farm.

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



Many taxpayers, while mailing their federal tax return, wonder what their chances are of being

The rather rough numbers look like this. If you have a non-business income of less than \$50,000, your chances are about one in forty of being examined. If your non-business income exceeds \$50,000 your chances could be as high as one in ten. If you are in business for yourself and have net income of under \$30,000, your chances of examination are about one in thirty. If your net income exceeds that figure, your chances move up to one in twenty. These are rough figures and have a number of variables including the nature of your business and the part of the country in

There are two basic types of IRS audits. The first and least comprehensive is an "office audit." The office auditor will frequently ask for substantiation on a limited number of specific items. It's possible that this type of audit can be as simple as mailing copies of cancelled checks to the office auditor. Unless the auditor is proposing a sizeable additional tax, you may not need professional help.

A "field audit" is much more comprehensive, and is often conducted at your place of business. In addition to substantiation for various expenses, it may also involve points of law. Consider engaging professional assistance at the outset of the audit.

You need not necessarily attend either of these forms of examination. If you sign a full "Power of Attorney in reference to the tax returns in question, your repre sentative can then act fully in your absence. The "Power of Attorney" should state whether or not your representative can consent to changes in your tax liability without your further permission.

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

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

Rat found in pouch of tobacco

SPOKANE, Wash. (AP) -When William H. Bird opened his packet of chewing tobacco, he didn't smell a rat until he bit into one, he alleges in court papers.

Bird filed a \$25,000 suit Friday in Spokane County Superior Court against R.J. Reynolds Tobacco Co. He alleged he suffered psychological damage as a result of his discovery of a rodent in his chaw of Day's Work tobacco.

Included in the suit's paperwork are two color snapshots of a stiff gray rat nestled in an opened pouch of brown tobacco. Bird said he bought the rat-packed pouch in Cusick on July 30, 1979. The suit contends Bird had

"consumed approximately one-third of the plug before biting into a partially decomposed and mummified rat corpse contained therein.

Since then, Bird claimed, he has suffered stress whenever he sees tobacco of any kind or people using it. His attorney, Dennis Scott of Newport, said his client has had to seek counseling.

First non-Asian birth of rare monkey listed

Big Spring (Texas) Herald, Sun, Jan. 4, 1981

SAN DIEGO (AP) - The first birth of a Chinese Francois' leaf monkey outside of Asia was not only historic, but also a surprise, according to officials at the San Diego Zoo.

"We didn't even know the mother was expecting until she was in quarantine after her arrival" at the zoo two months months ago, zoo primatologist Diane Brockman said Friday. "We found out during routine X-rays.

When she went on exhibit, we kept checking her girth, but it wasn't until last week that she showed much growth and we knew she was due in the next couple of weeks. The birth Thursday was a real surprise," Ms. Brockman said.

In-chun, the 10-year-old female who gave birth to a 16-inch, 8-ounce male, was one of four leaf-eating monkeys that came to the zoo in October from the People's Republic of China.

Adult monkeys are black langurs with white facial hair and long tails. The newborn monkey is black with an orange-color ad head. Adults are expected to grow to nearly 3 feet n length, not

including tail. The monkeys, obtained from the Canton Zoo, reportedly are an endangered species in China. Zoo officials said the only leaf monkeys outside China are in a Yokohama, Japan,

Because they become seriously ill when fed peanuts, the staple of zoo visitors, the monkeys are kept in a glass enclosure in San Diego.

Natives of the Guangxi province near the Vietnamese border, the Chinese leaf-eaters were named when Vietnam was under French control. Ms. Brockman said that

Gyess what? I'm pregnant again and living again with my mother. About three weeks ago Jim came to see me again but he wasn't too happy that I was pregnant. He wants me to move back to Alliance and to have an abortion. Personally, I don't believe in abortions so I'm

confused. Please help me. -Connie, Alliance, Ohio.

Connie: Don't go back to Alliance unless you return with your mother. It appears that most of your problems occurred when you were not with her.

Kelly: The first two weeks are the hardest! I know because I've been there.

Smoking is a smelly, nasty, expensive and unhealthy habit and to whip it forever at age 14 would be wonderful.
