## School Tax Rate Is Same

The Friona School board voted to leave the tax rate for 1987-88 at 77 cents per \$100 valuation, the same as it was for the past year, at its meeting this past Monday.

Superintendent Tom Jarboe said that in order to leave the tax rate the same, the school district will have to do some deficit spending, and will dip into its surplus to some extent.

School officials realized that the present state of the local economy could not justify a tax increase.

"We expect to go over our tax collections by about \$210,000. However, of this total, \$112,000 is for a roofing job now in progress, and we will collect this money from insurance companies," Jarboe said.

A problem facing the school for next school year is the fact that due to the "1-22 Rule," the school will have to add a third and fourth grade room, in order to be in compliance with Public School Bill 72.

THE UNITED STATES has placed itself squarely in between Iran and Iraq in the Persian Gulf, which is a terribly precarious position in which to be. Those Aryan-Arabic peoples have been fighting among themselves since about 700 B.C.

Bloodshed, violence and martyrdom are a way of life which has been bred into their genes for centuries. What makes U.S. diplomats and politicians assume they can bargain peace between people who simple do not reason on the same level as peace-loving people?

So now we are endangering American lives while escorting oil tankers through the Persian Gulf with the distinct possibility of bringing the U.S. into a full-scale war. All of this is so that we can have enough oil and gas to run here and there in our cars, trucks and planes while the rich get richer. And of course we need lots of rocket fuel so that our missiles will be ready to blow other folks away when the occasion warrants.

When you get right down to it, all wars have been fought so that one side or the other can get richer, which translates into power. The rich start wars: the poor fight (and die) in those wars.

The U.S. seems to get into the mood to go and fight somebody's war about every 18 or 20 years, which is quite relevant since it takes just about that long to grow a new crop of young Americans to ship off to be maimed, killed and blown to bits on foreign soil.

If we thought Vietnam was a no-win war, just wait until we start sending our young people over to those countries which start with "I". Thinking Americans need to try to get the message across to the government that the youth of our nation are not an expendable commodity to be used for fighting foreign wars whenever the economy seems to need a boost.

Instead of spending billions of dollars escorting Kuwaiti oil tankers through the Persian Gulf, wouldn't it make more sense to invest in furthering alternative energy sources in our own homeland? Technology and sources for other fuels are available to us here on U.S. soil, but are not being used to the fullest extent.

Experiments with grain products and also with feedlot manure have proven very effective in the production of ethanol fuel. Goodness knows, we have plenty of those two commodities in the Texas Panhandle. An expanded use of ethanol would be a boost to the sagging agricultural economy of our area. So why do we continue to use petroleum products which clog our motors and pollute our air? I simply don't understand.

Former Friona residents Deon and Ron Awtry are involved in an enterprise in Clovis, New Mexico, producing a 200-proof ethanol fuel from area grain products. They tell us that this three to four percent octane is a clean-burning fuel which enhances a car's performance. There is one of few such plants in the southwest, with the majority of the ethanol plants being located in Illinois and Iowa.

You would think the Federal Government (especially the Air Quality Control people) would be interested in helping to get this infant industry underway all over the country, but so far, only a few state governments have offered any incentive to help with this effort.

Vice President Bush has expressed some interest in pushing grain ethanol production as a boost to the down-trodden farming industry. We need to get busy with some letters to our congressmen, both state and federal, to see what can be done to speed production of alternative energy sources for our country.

Wouldn't it be great if someday soon we could just tell the Persian Gulf countries to take their oil and shove it?

## Frionans Attend Papal Mass In San Antonio

Seven Friona residents were among a group of 86 Catholics from the Amarillo Diocese who attended the mass delivered by Pope John Paul II last Sunday in San Antonio.

Attending from Friona were John and Matilda Baca, Pete and Ofelia Diaz and their son Fiddy, and Joe and Lucy Bermea.

The Friona group gathered in Amarillo at the parking lot adjacent to the Civic Center. They travelled by chartered bus through the Bluebird Travel Agency.

There were two bus-loads from Amarillo. Mrs. Baca said that on the bus on which she and John rode, there were people from Nazareth, Dumas, Hereford, Bovina, Portales, New Mexico, Borger and Pampa.

The delegation arrived in San Antonio about 8:30 p.m. Saturday and checked into their motel.

Making their trip even more memorable was the fact that just after everyone had checked into the motel, the two tour buses were stolen, causing the tour officials to

have to do a lot of scurrying to find rides for the group.

The next morning, the group was taken by school buses out to a shopping mall where they boarded other buses that took them out to the mass site.

They still had to walk about a mile and a half to get to the mass site. The local group arrived at about 9:20 a.m., and the Pope's mass started at 11:15 a.m., lasting until 2:30 p.m.

Mrs. Baca said that the mass was a unique experience. "The music

was beautiful, and the sound was unbelievable.

One of the biggest chores for the affair was distribution of communion to the crowd, which was estimated at 300,000 people. There were about six Eucharistic ministers distributing communion, while the Pope himself distributed communion to 100.

"Everything was extremely well organized. There were ushers who had everything under control," Mrs. Baca reported.

## Commission Eyeing Mild Tax Increase

Parmer County commissioners discussed the possibility of raising county taxes three per cent for the coming year at their meeting Monday in Farwell.

The county is currently operating in the black, but has reached into its reserve funds during the past two years, according to County Judge Porter Roberts.

A public hearing on the proposed 1988 budget has been scheduled for 5 p.m. Monday, September 28 at the county courtroom.

The three per cent hike would be a "survival measure," according to County Judge Porter Roberts.

Roberts blamed the action by state officials in dropping the effective tax rate, which means you'd have to raise taxes by three per cent to stay where you were the previous year.

In other business Monday, the commissioners approved a request

from the county home economist Janette Pierce to pay expenses for an upcoming trip to Louisville, Kentucky. Ms. Pierce has won a national award which will be presented at the conference.

The court also approved a request from the sheriff's department to send three dispatchers to a week-long school in Lubbock, with all expenses paid. Sheriff Bill Morgan also gave a report concerning overtime for his deputies.

The court approved a request to pay the expenses of Charles Aycock, county attorney, to attend a three-day conference in Austin. The conference is designed to bring county and district attorneys up to date on recent actions by the Legislature.

Commissioners approved a mileage allowance of 25 cents per mile for justices of the peace when they are serving in the role of a coroner.

The court tabled a request from Eastern New Mexico Regional Telephone Cooperative on whether to purchase the county's telephones or to continue leasing them.

## School's Enrollment Up Again

Friona's school enrollment as of Monday, September 14 stood at 1,288, according to Superintendent of Schools Tom Jarboe. This was a gain of 13 students over the beginning of the third week of school in 1986, which was September 12, 1986.

The kindergarten group has 108 students, compared to 101 a year ago. The second grade has 101 students, and the sophomore class in high school also has 101 students.

Of the three campuses, the high school shows the largest gain, with 354 students compared to 336 a year ago. That is a 5.3 per cent increase for the high school enrollment.

The elementary school shows a one student gain at this point, 645-644, while junior high totals are nine less, 298-289.

## Rain, Rain-Go Away!

Where is a good drought when you really need one?

That is the question being pondered this week by many farmers in the area, as the September rainy spell continues.

Although the rainfall during the past week has been light, the fields are still wet from the recent rains, and the additional moisture has hampered farmers from doing the work they need to do.

Through Monday of this week, the area had received at least a shower of rain every day for a week. A clearing trend came on Tuesday, with three days of open weather. However, residents were awakened early Friday as thundershowers again invaded the area, with rain predicted for Friday and Saturday.

**56 YEARS AGO--SEPT. 16, 1932**

Five new teachers have been secured in place of some of last year's instructors. Three of these are in the grade school department of the school and two are in high school.

The complete faculty list is as follows: Glenn F. Davis, grade school principal, piano, voice and public school music; O.M. Stewart, geography and history; G.C. Applewhite, geography and history; Mrs. Arvie Lewis, writing and art; Miss Vivian Boston, fourth grade; Miss Louise Jacobsen, third grade and public school music; Miss Herta Meyer, third and first grades; Mrs. H.B. Whitley, first grade and primary superintendent.

Enrollment in the Friona schools reached a total of 446 this week as the new term got off to a good start. Largest class in the grade school was the fifth grade, with 65 students. 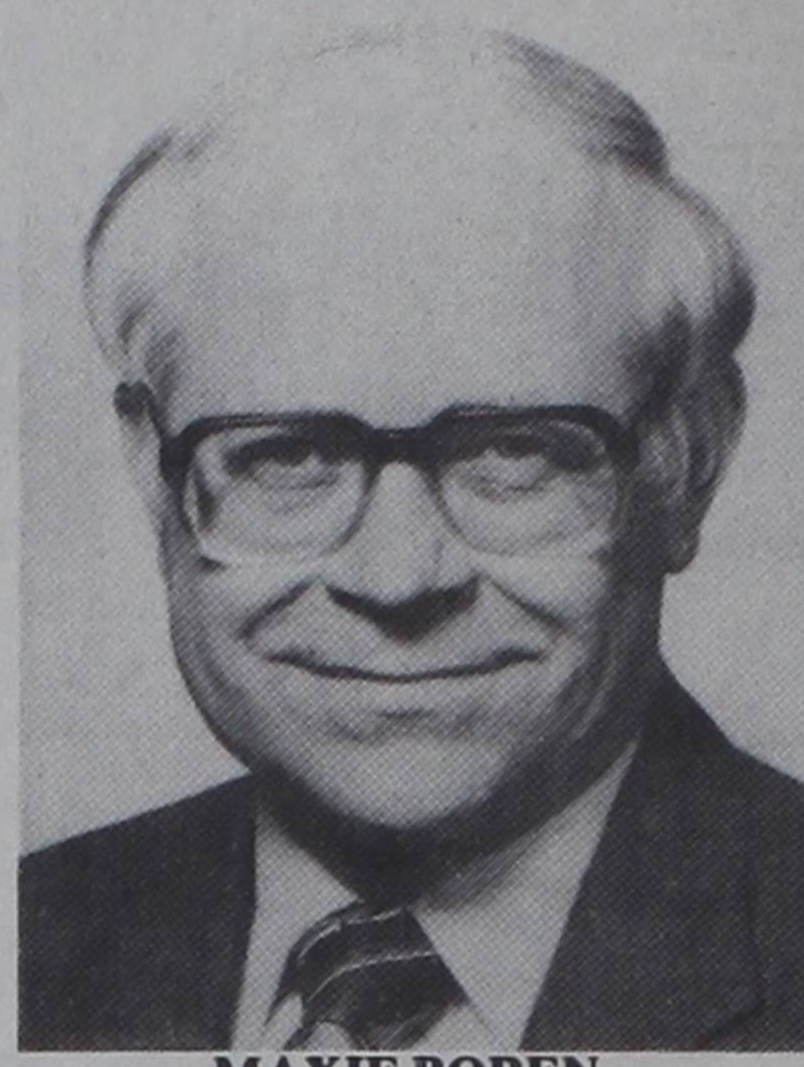
Rickey Rector, who farms south of Friona, had the first load of corn delivered to Friona Wheat Growers.

Everyone is invited and encouraged to attend.

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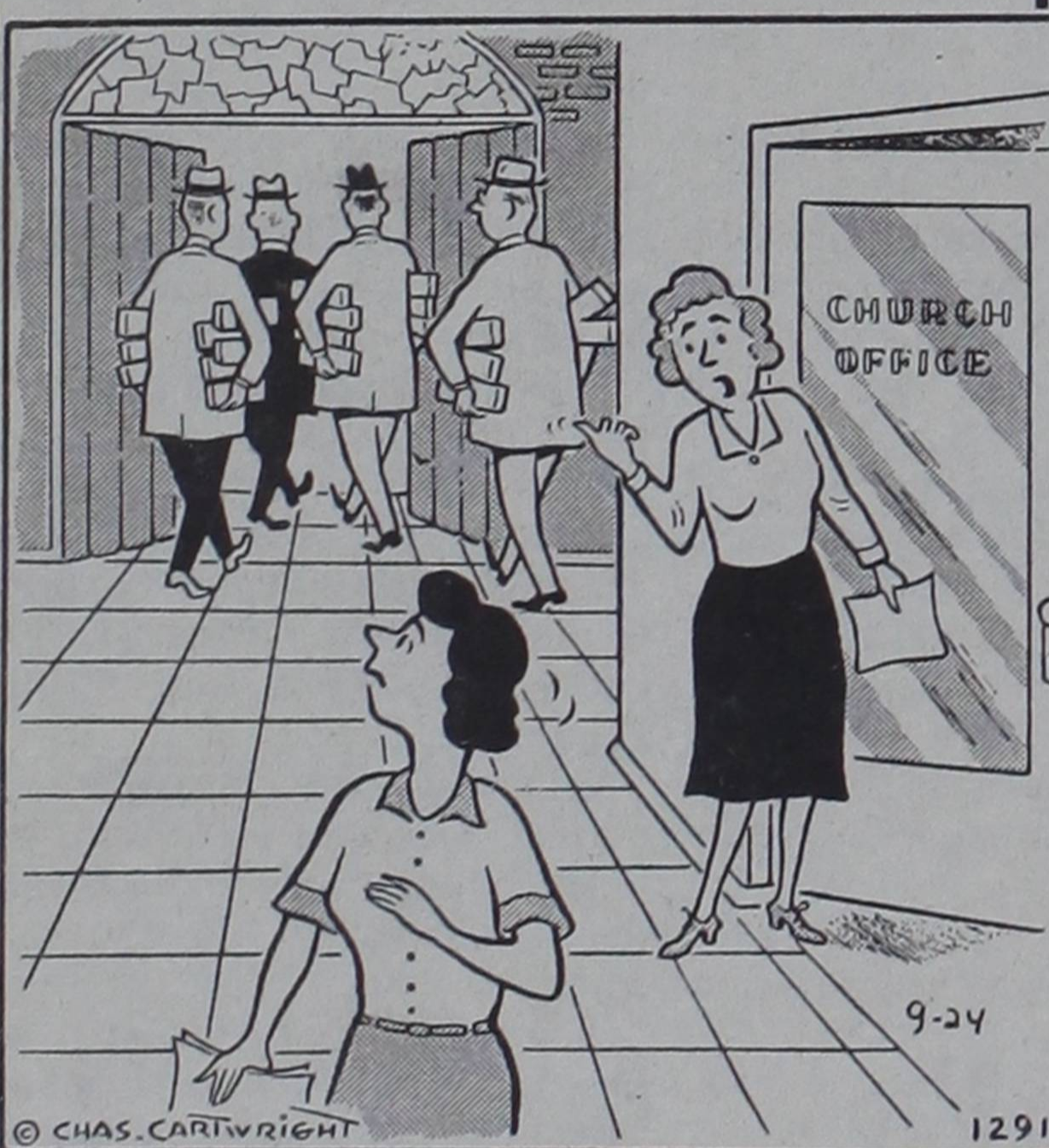

# Chieftains Impressive In Win Over Idalou, 14-7

The Friona Chieftains scored an impressive win last Friday at Idalou, outplaying the home Wildcats by a score of 14-7.

The victory was sweet since it was Friona's first ever over Idalou in football after four losses. Coach Tommy Moss' teams lost twice to the Wildcats in district games, then saw the 'Cats escape with a 9-7 win at Chieftain Field last year, one of only two regular-season losses for the 1986 Chieftains.

The Chiefs showed Idalou a "new look." Quarterback Daniel Echols threw a 26-yard pass to end Stephen Thornton on the first play from scrimmage—something Idalou was not expecting.

Before the game was over, Echols connected on four of eight passing attempts, good for 103 yards.

Echols outgained Idalou's touted quarterback, Tracy Saul, 103-81 in passing yardage, and 127-77 in yards rushing (230-158 total yards) in the individual battle.

The previous week, Saul had been given plaudits by the Lubbock Avalanche-Journal for his 261-yard performance as Idalou beat Shallowater in their opener.

This Friday's performance gained Echols "Player of the Week" honors from the Amarillo Globe-News for the area's class AAA players.

Friona fumbled on its first series, but luckily got the ball back when Idalou returned the favor when Saul coughed up the ball after a hard hit by the Chieftain defense.

Ben Osborn romped through a gaping hole on a trap play, racing 22 yards up the middle before being caught at the Idalou 10. On the next play, sophomore Andre Duran raced across the goal-line for his third TD of the young season.

Junior place-kicker Cody Burney came on to boot the extra point, giving Friona a 7-0 lead with 9:52 left in the opening period.

Idalou drove to the Friona 33 after the kickoff, but lost the ball on downs.

Friona again fumbled, with the Wildcats getting it at the Chieftain 39.

But on Idalou's first play, Echols zipped in front of Saul's long pass and ran 30 yards from the Friona 32 to the Idalou 38.

Friona drove to the 30 but came up a yard shy on fourth down, and the ball again went over.

Saul proved he's a tough runner. The Idalou signal-caller faded to pass, was covered up, and almost caught for a loss by Chieftain defenders.

But the crafty Wildcat bounced off two or three would-be tacklers and rambled 65 yards into the end zone for a touchdown. He kicked the PAT, to tie the game 7-all with 2:03 left in the period.

Fans were almost out of breath and the first quarter wasn't even over yet!

Early in the second quarter Friona forced a punt and Idalou kicked the Chieftains into a big hole at their own four.

But Friona was equal to the challenge. Osborn bolted 20 yards to the 24, Echols made a big third down conversion out to the 36, and then winged a 22-yard pass to Thornton as Friona moved into Wildcat territory at the 37.

Osborn and Echols picked up first downs with runs of 11 and 13 yards, and it seemed the Chieftains were bound to score when they had a first and ten at the Idalou 12.

But an equipment problem forced Friona to take a time out, and on third down, Echols was intercepted near the goal-line to end the scoring threat.

The halftime ended with the score all knotted up at 7-all.

**Friona clearly won the halftime, with a great performance from the 120-piece Chieftain Band, which even drew plaudits from the Idalou partisans.)**

On Friona's first possession of the third quarter, they quickly drove 72 yards in only seven plays to gain the lead and the game's momentum.

Echols ran 21 yards on a quarterback draw play, then found Thornton down the sidelines on a big 37-yard gain down to the Idalou 12.

On a third and five from the seven, Echols ran the quarterback draw play to perfection, going in for the score. Burney's kick made

the score 14-7 with 5:35 left in the quarter.

The teams exchanged punts to begin the fourth quarter, and then Idalou mounted a serious threat to either tie the game or wrest the lead away from the Chieftains.

After Duran punted the Wildcats back to their own 14, they mounted a drive that went to the Friona 35.

Facing fourth and two, Saul had apparently hit his split end for the yardage when a holding penalty against the Wildcats called the play back. The 'Cats had been victims of their own mistakes at various times in the contest.

On the replay, Friona held the Wildcats five yards short of the needed yardage, and took over with two minutes to play.

Echols helped run out the clock and clinched the game with a 24-

yard scamper around left end inside the last minute.

That gave the speedy Chieftain quarterback 127 rushing for the game, a nifty 9.1 yards per carry.

Friona outgained the potent Wildcats, 351-282. Idalou still ranks fourth in the South Plains area for total offense. Saul is the area's number two rusher and number four passer. But this night belonged to his opposing signal-caller, Daniel Echols and his Chieftain teammates.

"Did we only pass eight times? It seemed like a hundred!" said an elated Coach Tommy Moss following the contest. He thought his team had played an outstanding game, especially beating the Wildcats on their home field.

Defensive standout Paul Trimmell slightly sprained an ankle, and bruised his ribs in the hard-hitting game, making him questionable for the Portales game. Several other Chieftains suffered cramps, but Trimmell's injury was the one of most concern.

## Chiefs Trying For Rare 3-0 Grid Start

It had been 25 years since Friona travelled to Portales, N.M. for a football game, and this year's Chieftains were anxious for the new experience.

For one thing, the Greyhound Stadium is now used for the Rams'

home games. It wasn't even built when Friona last played at the New Mexico school.

"We're expecting a tough game this time," said Coach Tommy Moss, hoping the team wasn't expecting a cake walk after beating the Rams 41-0 here last year.

Portales played always-tough Denver City off their feet before losing a 14-12 game two weeks ago, and drubbed West Las Vegas, N.M. last Friday, 46-0.

The Rams, 1-2, have played one more game than the Chiefs. They opened by giving the Clovis Wildcats all they wanted before losing, 14-7.

Friona may be without starting tackle-linebacker Paul Trimmell, who was injured against Idalou. Trimmell's loss could affect the team, since Portales has some big boys, Moss said.

Next Week: Friona returns home after two straight road games to host the Olton Mustangs on September 25. The game will be Friona's Homecoming Game for 1987.

However, Friona's 14-6 lead was quickly trimmed when Idalou scored on a long run, trimming Friona's lead to 14-12.

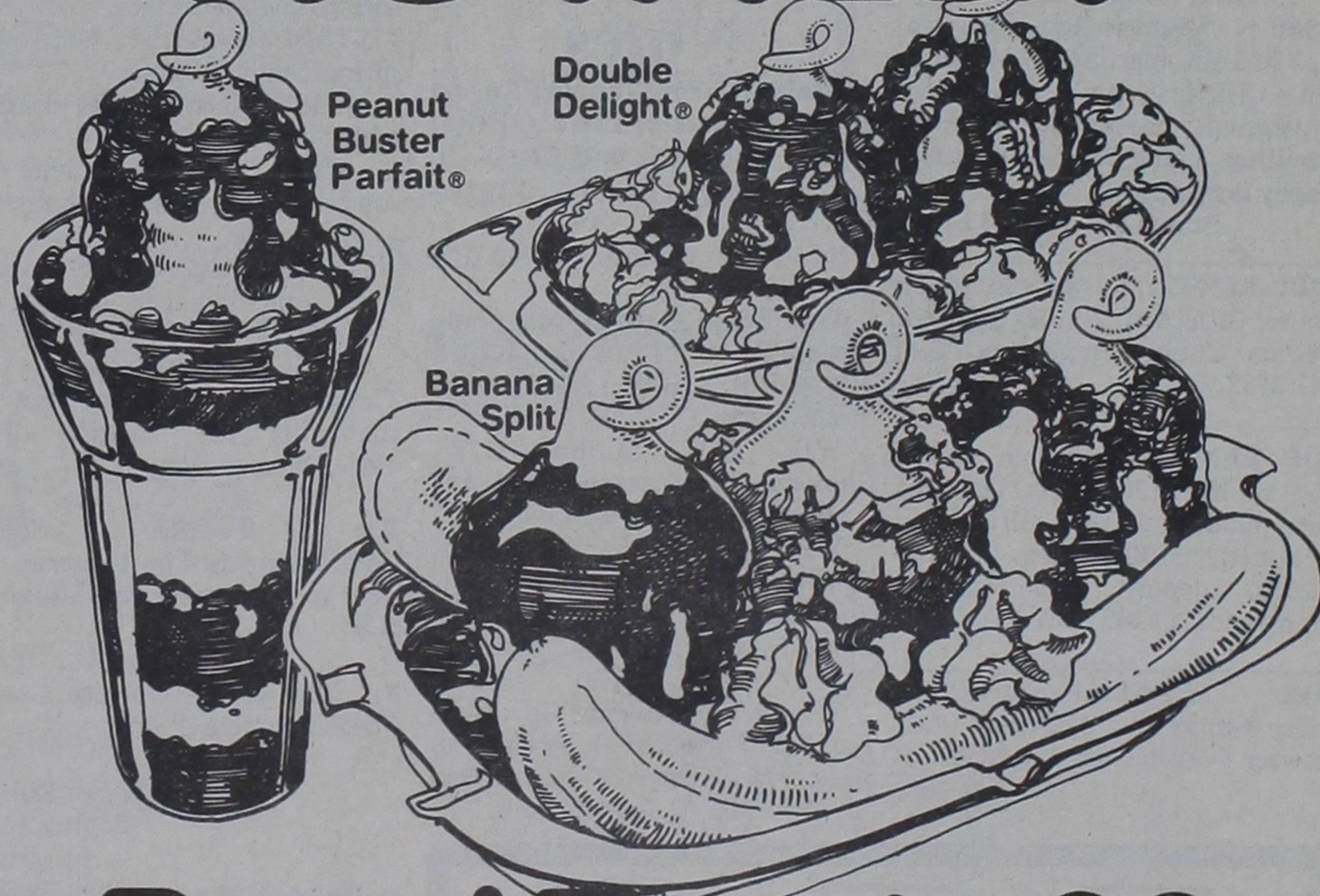
The Wildcats tried for two points but were stopped.

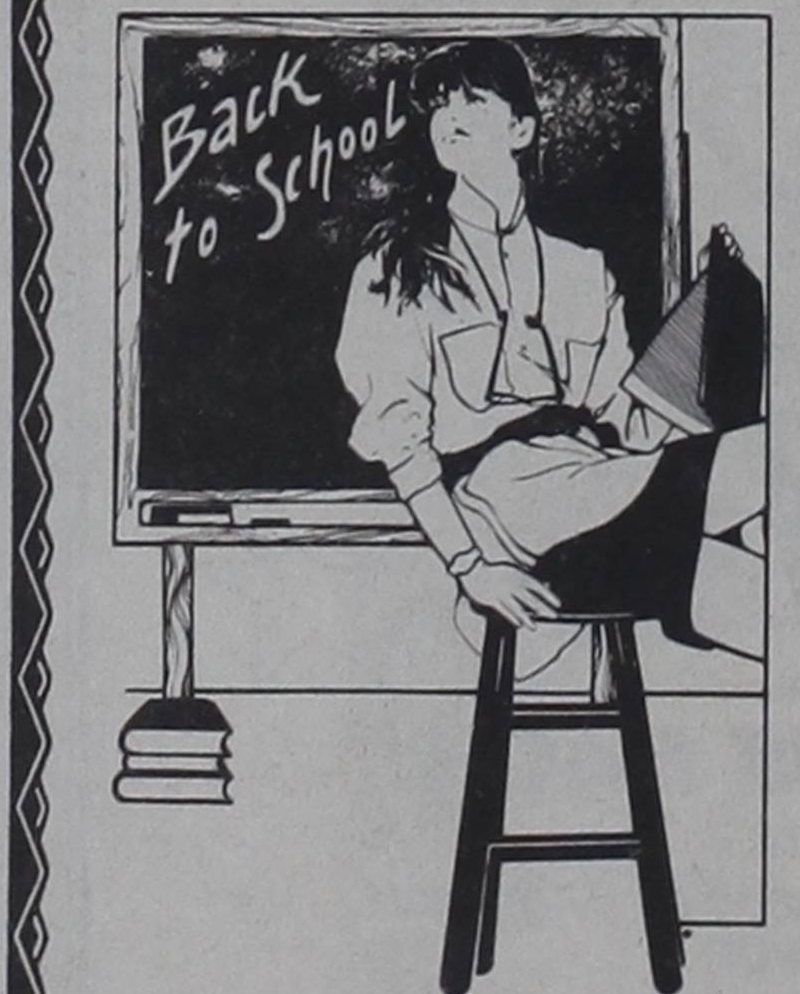

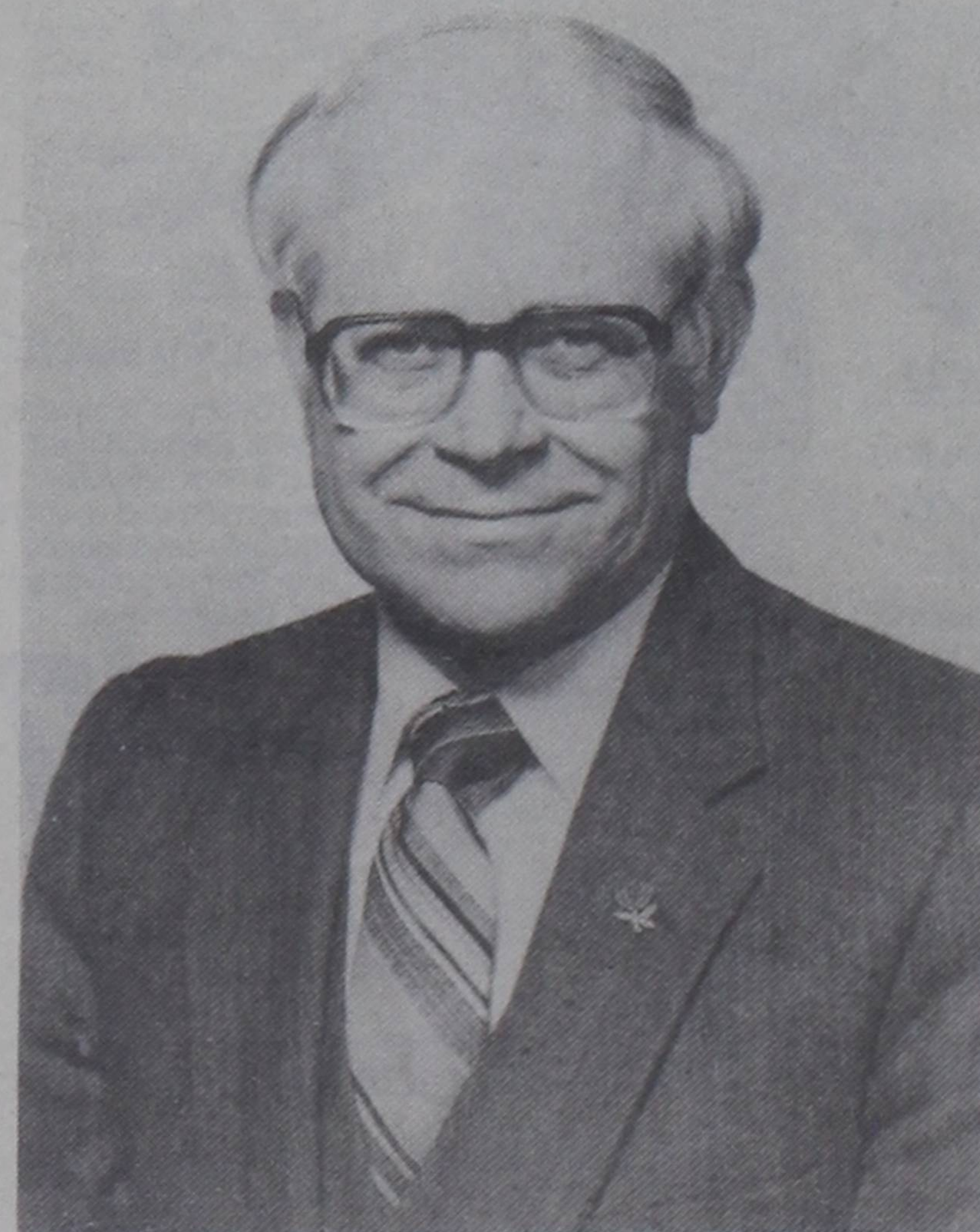

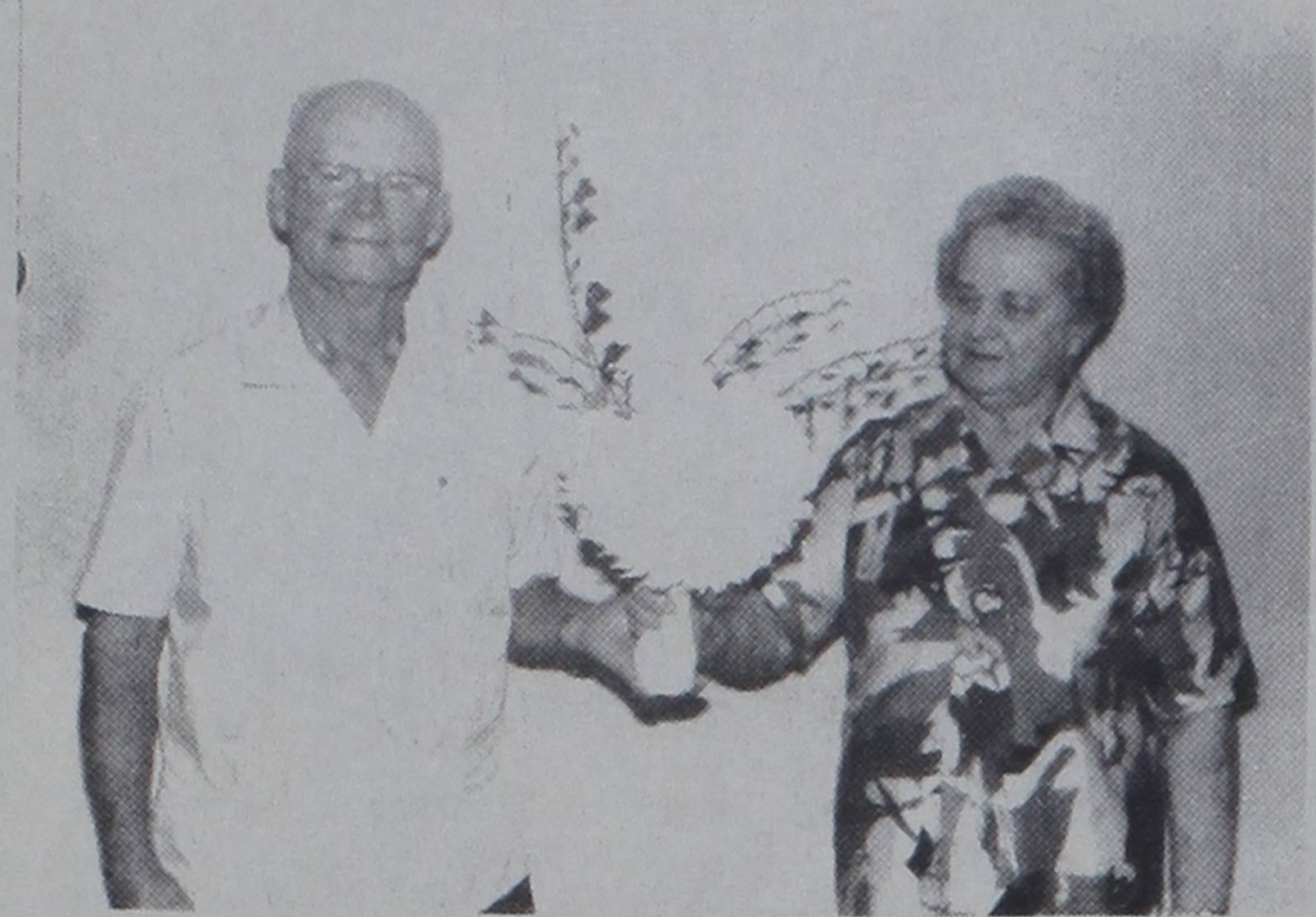

## Sugar Industry Is Unfairly Attacked

(Editor's note: The following is part one of a series of articles in which the sugar industry attempts to defend itself from what it calls "unfair attacks" about the domestic sugar industry.)

The domestic sugar industry is being unfairly attacked by some national media outlets and powerful American political figures who are compensated by foreign industries in direct conflict with American farmers and other national business interests.

That is the conclusion of many state and national sugar producer organizations, including the Texas Sugar Beet Growers Association (TSBGA) headquartered in Hereford.

"The Texas Sugar Beet Growers Association is bitter toward some national magazines and newspapers which are giving consumers false information about our domestic sugar industry," says Bill Cleavinger of Wildorado, TSBGA president.

"We are also angry with many Washington-based lobbyists--including some former members of the Reagan administration--who represent foreign countries which export sugar and many other products into the U.S."

The most recent media attack came from Reader's Digest, which alleged in its August issue that the national sugar policy created high sugar prices for consumers and was a threat to U.S. foreign relations.

Michael Deavers, former White House communications director, and Richard Smith, former chief administrator for overseeing foreign agriculture operations in the USDA, are among the Washington lobbyists the sweetener industry believes are undermining American business interests.

Attacks on the U.S. sugar policy have a direct impact on the economics of the Texas Panhandle-South Plains area. More than 300 of the region's farmers and some 500 landowners count on sugar beet production as a major cash crop.

Holly Sugar Corp., which operates a multi-million dollar sugar beet processing plant in Hereford, employs more than 400 people. Hundreds of other people work for sugar beet growers. All toll, the thousands of people involved in the industry pay tens of millions of dollars in state and local taxes, not to mention the millions in expenditures to chemical companies, implement dealers and other agri-related industries in the region.

The area sugar industry is operating in the black thanks to the national sugar policy. The policy has also helped the overall

domestic industry guarantee a dependable supply of sugar for consumers at prices which have been both stable and below those of most major countries worldwide. And it does all this without costing the federal government a dime in payments to farmers.

Established by Congress in 1981 and extended in the 1985 farm bill, the sugar program provides an 18-cents per pound loan support price to consumers. Import quotas are used to assure that domestic sugar is marketed rather than forfeited to the USDA Commodity Credit Corp.

"With this program, there are no costs to the government other than normal clerical costs of administering it," says Cleavinger, also vice president of the American Sugarbeet Growers Association.

"That is the intent of Congress. There are no government payments to farmers. The policy is based on an orderly marketing procedure which assures a guaranteed supply of sugar to consumers at a reasonable price."

The worldwide sugar industry is complex to say the least and it has a direct affect on the domestic program. The so-called "world sugar price"--which Reader's Digest supported in its article--is actually the "dump price" for sugar from countries which provide heavy subsidies to their own sugar industry.

Since some countries provide high subsidies, overproduction is abundant, meaning selling prices have been pushed far less than the cost of production.

**CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS**  
 SPECIAL ELECTION  
 NOVEMBER 3, 1987

**PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT**  
 House Joint Resolution 104 proposes a constitutional amendment to allow the legislature to provide a guarantee for the Texas grain warehouse self-insurance fund. The guarantee of the fund may not exceed \$5 million, and when the fund reaches \$5 million, the guarantee will cease.  
 The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:  
 "The constitutional amendment to provide for the surety of a grain warehouse fund to be established by the grain industry for the protection of farmers and depositors of grain in public warehouse facilities."  
**PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT**  
 House Joint Resolution 60 proposes a constitutional amendment to permit rural fire prevention districts in counties with populations over 400,000 to levy a tax at a rate not to exceed six cents (\$.06) per \$100 property valuation for the district, if the voters of the district approve the tax.  
 The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:  
 "The constitutional amendment to raise the maximum property tax rate that may be adopted by certain rural fire prevention districts, but only if approved by the districts' residents."  
**PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT**  
 House Joint Resolution 48 proposes a constitutional amendment to extend the school ad valorem tax exemption for elderly persons to the surviving spouse of a person receiving the exemption. If a surviving spouse is at least 55 years old at the time of death of the person receiving the exemption, ad valorem public school taxes could not be increased as long as the homestead remained the residence homestead of the surviving spouse.  
 The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:  
 "The constitutional amendment to limit school tax increases on the residence homestead of the surviving spouse of an elderly person if the surviving spouse is at least 55 years of age."  
**PROPOSITION NO. 4 ON THE BALLOT**  
 House Joint Resolution 5 proposes a constitutional amendment to allow the legislature to create programs and make loans and grants of money for development and diversification of the economy, elimination of unemployment and underemployment, stimulation of agricultural innovation, promotion of agricultural enterprises, and development of transportation and commerce. Bonds or other obligations payable from ad valorem taxes must be approved by the voters in the political subdivision seeking such funding sources.  
 The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:  
 "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to provide assistance to encourage economic development in the state."  
**PROPOSITION NO. 5 ON THE BALLOT**  
 House Joint Resolution 65 proposes a constitutional amendment to permit the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation to contract with the Texas Turnpike Authority and to contribute money to the costs of turnpikes, toll roads and toll bridges of the Authority. The amendment would authorize the governing body of a county with a population over 400,000, a county adjoining such county, and any city or district located in or partially in such county to make agreements with the Texas Turnpike Authority and levy ad valorem taxes to pay part or all of the principal and interest on Turnpike Authority bonds and to pay maintenance and operating expenses of the Turnpike Authority, if the voters approve the tax.  
 The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing agreements between the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation and the Texas Turnpike Authority and the governing bodies of counties with a population of more than 400,000, adjoining counties, and cities and districts located in those counties to aid turnpikes, toll roads, and toll bridges by guaranteeing bonds issued by the Texas Turnpike Authority."  
**PROPOSITION NO. 6 ON THE BALLOT**  
 House Joint Resolution 4 proposes a constitutional amendment to allow the legislature to establish three separate development funds. A Texas product development fund could be established to aid in the development and production of new or improved products in the state. The amendment would authorize the issuance of up to \$15 million of general obligation bonds to provide initial funding for the program. A Texas small business incubator fund could be established to foster and stimulate the development of small businesses in the state. Small businesses operating under the program would be exempt from ad valorem taxation. The amendment would authorize the issuance of up to \$10 million in general obligation bonds to provide initial funding for the program. A Texas agricultural fund could be established to promote the production, processing and marketing of agricultural products produced primarily in Texas by small Texas agricultural businesses. The amendment would authorize the issuance of general obligation bonds in the amount of \$100 million outstanding at one time to carry out the agricultural fund program. The legislature could require review and approval of the issuance of bonds and the use of bond proceeds.  
 The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:  
 "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to provide for state financing of the development and production of Texas products and businesses."  
**PROPOSITION NO. 7 ON THE BALLOT**  
 Senate Joint Resolution 55 proposes a constitutional amendment to authorize the legislature to provide for the issuance of \$400 million in general obligation bonds to be used for loans to local governments for acquisition, construction, repair, renovation, and equipment of public facilities or for grants to local governments for planning public facilities. The amendment would also permit the issuance of revenue bonds for the same purposes to be repaid from excess revenue from repayments of loans made under the amendment and from other revenues pledged to the retirement of revenue bonds. The amendment also authorizes the legislature to provide for review and approval of the issuance of the bonds and the use of the bond proceeds.  
 The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:  
 "The constitutional amendment providing for the issuance of general obligation bonds to finance certain local public facilities."  
**PROPOSITION NO. 8 ON THE BALLOT**  
 Senate Joint Resolution 56 proposes a constitutional amendment to allow the legislature to authorize the issuance of up to \$500 million in general obligation bonds to be used to acquire, construct, and equip new correctional institutions and mental health and mental retardation institutions or to repair existing institutions. The amendment also authorizes the legislature to provide for review and approval of the issuance of the bonds and the projects to be financed by the bond proceeds.  
 The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:  
 "The constitutional amendment authorizing the issuance of general obligation bonds for projects relating to corrections institutions

and mental health and mental retardation facilities."  
**PROPOSITION NO. 9 ON THE BALLOT**  
 Senate Joint Resolution 9 proposes a constitutional amendment to provide that a state legislator is eligible to serve in another state office even if the compensation of the office was increased during his legislative term or even if the appointment is made in whole or in part (including Senate confirmation) by the legislature. The legislator could not, however, receive the increased compensation approved during his legislative term.  
 The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:  
 "The constitutional amendment to provide that a member of the legislature is eligible to be elected or appointed and to serve in a different state office but may not receive an increase in compensation granted to that office during the legislative term to which he was elected."  
**PROPOSITION NO. 10 ON THE BALLOT**  
 Subsections (d) and (e) of Section 1 of Senate Joint Resolution 12 propose a constitutional amendment to allow the legislature to exempt from ad valorem taxation all tangible personal property except structures which are used as residential dwellings and property held or used for the production of income. This exemption would be in addition to the personal property homestead exemption already established by the constitution. If the legislature authorizes the exemption of additional personal property from taxation, under this amendment, local political subdivisions may pass resolutions providing for taxation of such property unless the property is exempt from ad valorem taxation under another law.  
 The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:  
 "The constitutional amendment to allow the legislature to exempt from ad valorem taxation certain personal property not held or used for the production of income."  
**PROPOSITION NO. 11 ON THE BALLOT**  
 Section 1, Subsections (f) and (g) of Senate Joint Resolution 12 propose a constitutional amendment to exempt from ad valorem taxation goods, wares, merchandise, and ores other than oil, gas and petroleum products. These items would be exempt from taxation only if they originated outside the state and were located in the state for a period of 175 days or less for purposes of assembly, storage, manufacture, processing, or fabrication. Such property could be taxed by a county, school district, or municipality if the governing body of the political subdivision took official action to provide for the taxation of the items while they were located in the political subdivision. If the governing body of a political subdivision took official action to tax the items before January 1, 1988, the tax would be effective for the 1988 tax year. If the action were taken after January 1, 1988, and before April 1, 1988, the tax would become effective January 1, 1989.  
 The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:  
 "The constitutional amendment providing for the exemption from ad valorem taxation of certain property that is located in the state for only a temporary period of time."  
**PROPOSITION NO. 12 ON THE BALLOT**  
 Senate Joint Resolution 35 proposes a constitutional amendment to allow a married couple to agree in writing that all or part of their community property will become the property of the surviving spouse if one spouse dies.  
 The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:  
 "The constitutional amendment permitting spouses to hold community property with right of survivorship."  
**PROPOSITION NO. 13 ON THE BALLOT**  
 Senate Joint Resolution 27 proposes a constitutional amendment to authorize the creation of special districts to provide emergency services. The commissioners court in a county participating in a district could, upon approval of the voters, levy an ad

valorem tax of up to ten cents (\$.10) per \$100 valuation of the property located in the district.  
 The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:  
 "The constitutional amendment to allow for the creation and establishment, by law, of special districts to provide emergency services."  
**PROPOSITION NO. 14 ON THE BALLOT**  
 Senate Joint Resolution 34 proposes a constitutional amendment to allow the state a limited right to appeal criminal cases. Under current law, only criminal defendants are allowed to appeal. This proposed amendment would allow the legislature to pass laws granting state prosecutors the right to appeal in limited circumstances.  
 The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:  
 "The constitutional amendment giving the state a limited right to appeal in criminal cases."  
**PROPOSITION NO. 15 ON THE BALLOT**  
 House Joint Resolution 35 proposes a constitutional amendment to abolish the office of county treasurer in Gregg County and transfer the duties of that office to the county auditor or an elected official designated by the commissioners court. The amendment would also abolish the office of county treasurer in Fayette and Nueces counties if a majority of the voters in those counties vote in favor of the amendment. In Fayette County, the functions of the treasurer would be transferred to the county auditor or the officer succeeding to the auditor's functions. In Nueces County, the powers, duties, and functions of the treasurer would be transferred to the county clerk.  
 The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:  
 "The constitutional amendment to provide for the abolition of the office of county treasurer in Gregg, Fayette, and Nueces counties."  
**PROPOSITION NO. 16 ON THE BALLOT**  
 Senate Joint Resolution 6 proposes a constitutional amendment to allow the commissioners court in a county with a population of more than 150,000 to establish more than one Justice of the Peace court in each Justice of the Peace precinct, i.e., to provide for the election of more than one Justice of the Peace in each Justice of the Peace precinct.  
 The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:  
 "The constitutional amendment providing that certain justice precincts may contain more than one justice of the peace court."  
**PROPOSITION NO. 17 ON THE BALLOT**  
 Senate Joint Resolution 26 proposes a constitutional amendment to allow the legislature to define by law those municipal functions that are governmental and those that are proprietary. This authorization would apply to laws passed by the 70th Legislature, 1987, and by future legislatures in regular or special session. A municipality is liable for damages arising out of acts committed under its proprietary functions, but not its governmental functions. Definition of such functions by the legislature would clarify the liability of a municipality in civil lawsuits filed against it.  
 The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:  
 "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to define for all purposes the governmental and proprietary functions of a municipality."  
**PROPOSITION NO. 18 ON THE BALLOT**  
 House Joint Resolution 18 proposes a constitutional amendment to authorize the legislature to provide for the creation, operation, and financing of jail districts. Financing of a jail district could be accomplished through the issuance of bonds and other obligations, or by levy of an ad valorem tax on property located in the district if the qualified electors of a district approve an ad valorem tax or bonds secured by a property tax.  
 The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:  
 "The constitutional amendment relating to the creation, operation, and financing of jail districts."

**PROPOSITION NO. 19 ON THE BALLOT**  
 House Joint Resolution 88 proposes a constitutional amendment to authorize the issuance of \$500 million in general obligation bonds, the proceeds of which will be used to establish a superconducting super collider fund. The fund would be used to provide economic incentives for the superconducting super collider research facility, and the agency administering the fund would be authorized to grant land or property to the United States government for undertakings related to the facility.  
 The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:  
 "The constitutional amendment authorizing the issuance of general obligation bonds to fund undertakings related to a superconducting super collider research facility sponsored or authorized by the United States government, and to make appropriate grants for such undertakings."  
**PROPOSITION NO. 20 ON THE BALLOT**  
 House Joint Resolution 96 proposes a constitutional amendment to allow the legislature to provide ad valorem tax relief for mobile offshore oil and gas well drilling equipment. The tax relief would be limited to equipment that is being stored while not in use in a county that is adjacent to the Gulf of Mexico or on a body of water that is adjacent to the Gulf of Mexico.  
 The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:  
 "The constitutional amendment to provide ad valorem tax relief for certain offshore drilling equipment that is not in use."  
**PROPOSITION NO. 21 ON THE BALLOT**  
 Senate Joint Resolution 17 proposes a constitutional amendment to provide for legislative involvement in the executive branch of government by permitting the legislature to include the speaker of the house of representatives in the membership of an agency or committee that includes officers of the executive branch of government and performs executive functions. Under current law, the legislature is not allowed to exercise any powers in executive matters under Article II of the Texas Constitution, which provides for the "separation of powers" into three distinct departments.  
 The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:  
 "The constitutional amendment permitting the legislature to include the speaker of the house of representatives or the speaker's appointee in the membership of an executive agency or committee."  
**PROPOSITION NO. 22 ON THE BALLOT**  
 Senate Joint Resolution 53 proposes a constitutional amendment to allow the legislature to limit the term of office of a gubernatorial appointee to a vacancy in a state or district office to a partial, temporary term if the appointment is made on or after November 1 of the last year of the governor's term and the governor is not reelected. Under this amendment, the legislature may provide that the tenure of such an appointee would end sooner than the term would normally expire.  
 The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:  
 "The constitutional amendment to allow the legislature to limit the authority of a governor to fill vacancies in state and district offices during the end of the governor's term if the governor is not reelected."  
**PROPOSITION NO. 23 ON THE BALLOT**  
 Senate Joint Resolution 54 proposes a constitutional amendment to authorize the Texas Water Development Board to issue an additional \$400 million in water development bonds. Of the \$400 million authorized, \$200 million would be designated for conservation and development of water resources, \$150 million would be designated for water quality enhancement, and \$50 million would be designated for flood control. The amendment also authorizes the legislature to provide for review and approval of the issuance of the bonds and the use of the bond proceeds.  
 The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to authorize the issuance of an additional \$400 million of Texas Water Development Bonds for water supply, water quality, and flood control purposes."  
**PROPOSITION NO. 24 ON THE BALLOT**  
 House Joint Resolution 83 proposes a constitutional amendment to allow a county to use county equipment and personnel to perform work, without compensation, for another governmental entity if the commissioners court finds that the work will not interfere with the performance of county work and approves performance of the work. The governmental entity must be located wholly or partly in the county, and the governing body of the governmental entity must file a written work request with the commissioners court.  
 The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:  
 "The constitutional amendment to permit a county to perform work, without compensation, for another governmental entity."  
**PROPOSITION NO. 25 ON THE BALLOT**  
 Senate Joint Resolution 5 proposes a constitutional amendment to allow the legislature to authorize Randall County to levy a tax for the benefit of the Amarillo Hospital District. Any such tax could be levied only on property located outside the City of Amarillo and outside the South Randall County Hospital District. The tax could not be more than 75¢ per \$100 property valuation and would be effective only upon approval by the voters in the area to be taxed. If the tax is authorized by the Legislature and approved by voters, the Amarillo Hospital District is to serve residents of part of Randall County. If a tax is levied under this provision, Randall County must repay the State for the cost of publication of this amendment.  
 The proposed amendment also permits the legislature to authorize a hospital district to change its boundaries or jurisdiction if the district was created or authorized by a constitutional provision that includes a description of the boundaries or jurisdiction of the district. Any change in the boundaries or jurisdiction of such a hospital district would become effective only upon approval of the voters in the district.  
 The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:  
 "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to permit the Amarillo Hospital District to serve certain residents of Randall County, to authorize Randall County to provide financial assistance to the district, and to authorize certain hospital districts to change their boundaries or jurisdiction with voter approval."  
**EXPLANATORY STATEMENT FOR STATEWIDE REFERENDUM NO. 1**  
 Senate Bill 86 submits to the voters the question of whether the 15 members of the State Board of Education should be appointed instead of elected. If the proposition passes, the Governor will appoint a member of the board for each district, with the consent of the Senate. If the proposition fails, the members will be elected from these districts.  
 The referendum will appear on the ballot as follows:  
 "The State Board of Education shall be composed of members who are appointed from districts instead of elected, with equal representation throughout the State of Texas."  
**EXPLANATORY STATEMENT FOR STATEWIDE REFERENDUM NO. 2**  
 The Texas Racing Act submits to the voters the question of whether pari-mutuel wagering should be legal in Texas on a county-by-county local option basis. If pari-mutuel wagering is adopted by the voters statewide, a county must also pass a separate proposition on pari-mutuel wagering at an election held in the county before any such wagering may be conducted in that county.  
 The referendum will appear on the ballot as follows:  
 "The legalization of pari-mutuel wagering under the Texas Racing Act on a county-by-county local option basis."

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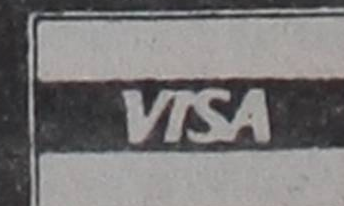
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## New Device To Aid Teaching Of Blind

Janet Rector, a fourth-grade blind student at Friona Grade School, listened intently last week to a rapid, staccato tapping that announced the beginning of an easier way of learning for blind students in the Texas Panhandle.

"It's a robot," Janet said when she heard the noise.  
"It's a magic box," answered Dixie Mercer, direct service specialist for the visually handicapped at the Education Service Center, Region XVI, who was operating the computer.

"Your kidding," Janet replied.  
Yes, Mercer was joking with nine-year-old Janet. Actually the noise was the sound of a device designed to help blind students learn easier and more rapidly. The computer will also make preparing class materials much easier for teachers of blind students.

By means of a special software package, a computer with a typewriter-style keyboard linked to both a Braille printer and an ink printer allows translation of information from ink print to Braille, large print and to speech.

The Region XVI Education Service Center owns three complete computer setups for blind students. One of the systems will be kept at the center for teaching purposes. The other two systems will be operational in the Amarillo and Friona school districts.

For children such as Janet, who are put with children without disabilities, the computer will make school a less trying experience for both teachers and blind students.

In a typical day, Janet will go to a "resource teacher" for about an hour to learn skills such as reading Braille and typing. During the rest of her day, she goes to class with other children who do not have a disability.

The Braille Edit XPress or BEX software package, which the system uses, will ease Janet's learning efforts, although she may have already learned to deal effectively with lack of sight.

Janet's father, Larry Rector, said his daughter has been doing fine even without the system. She scored all A's with the exception of one B last year in her grades.

Janet's resource teacher, Billie Carmichael, said the machine was welcome.

"This is going to be so much simpler," she said.  
Carmichael, who must type Braille for her student, also said using the keyboard on the computer would mean less fatigue on her part.

"The Braille only has six keys-you have to pay attention to type."  
Mercer said Janet will learn to use the computer over the next several months, and her teachers, who usually do not know Braille with the exception of the resource teacher, will use the system for preparing class materials for her.

A Parmer County Fair will be held Saturday, September 19 at the Boy Scout building in Friona.

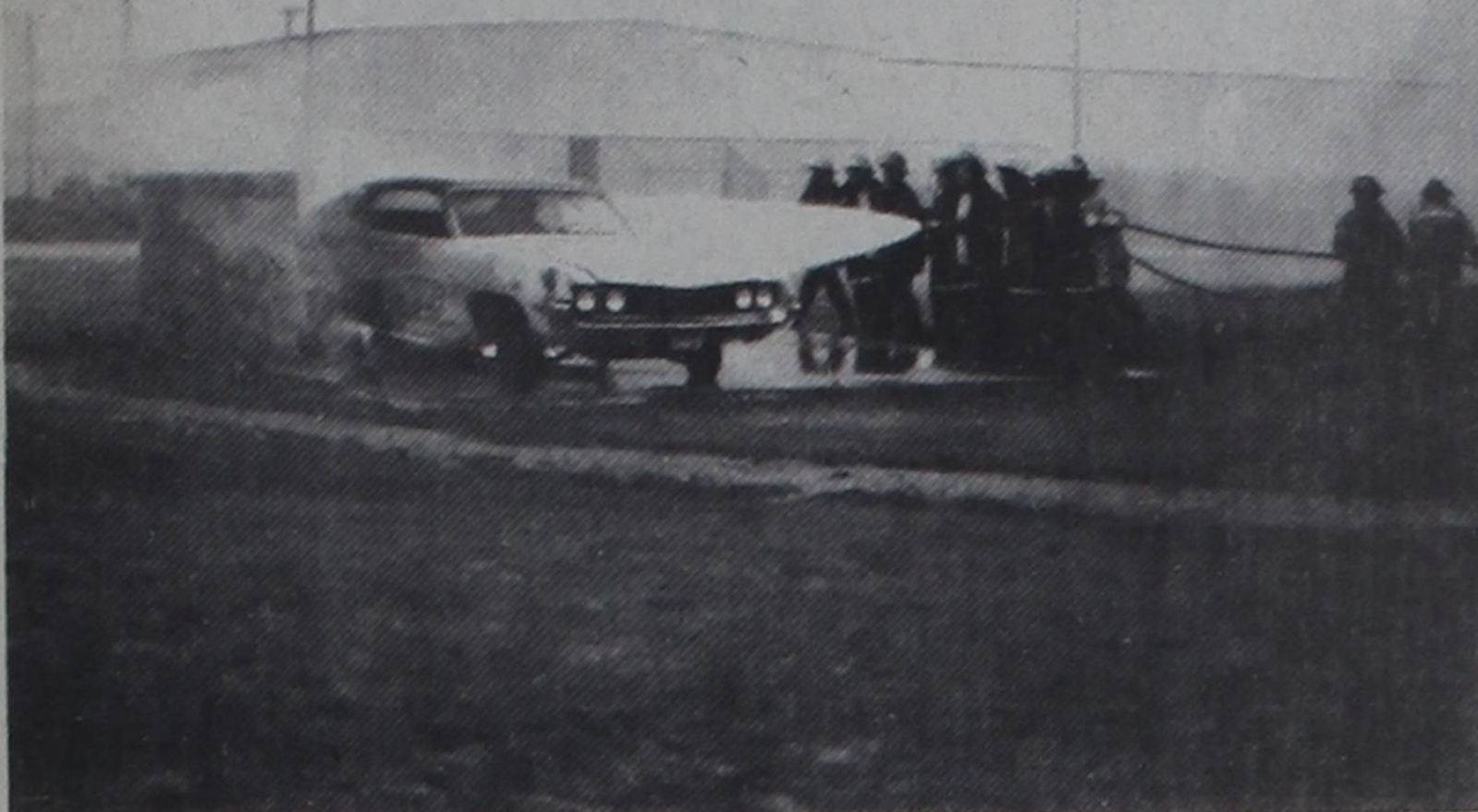
The fair is open to all adults and youth in Parmer County.

## TEAMS Tests Set Locally In October

On October 28 and 29, the Texas Educational Assessment of Minimum Skills (TEAMS) Exit Level Test will be administered at Friona High School. This test measures basic skills in the areas of Math and Language Arts. Students must pass both sections of the test before receiving a high school diploma.

Beginning in October, 1987 and during subsequent Exit Level Test administrations, individuals who have not previously passed both sections of the TEAMS test but have met all other graduation requirements may retake the section(s) not passed.

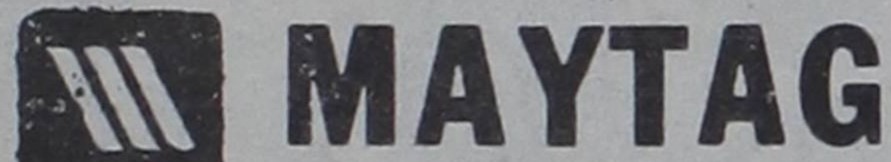

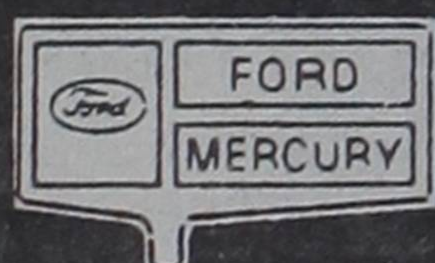

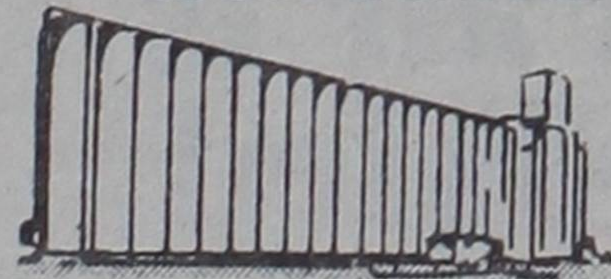
